FEATURE TO WYNNEWOOD

Beats Midnight Sun and St. Quentin in Buffalo Times Handicap.

Charlotte C. and Bengore Carry C. J. Brockmiller's Colors to Double Victory.

FORT ERIE, Ontario, August 16.—Wynnewood, J. T. Strite's Ben Brush—Waldens gelding whose races lately have been watched with interest because of a pair of good efforts behind Irish Kiss, ran back to his best form this afternoon and upset calculations in the Buffalo Times Handicap, at a mile, around which was built the fifth day's program of the Fort Erie meeting. Midnight Sun finished second and St. Quentin third. Well rated by jockey Kennedy, Wynnewood raced close behind the pace set by Midnight Sun to the far turn, where he moved up on the outside and drew away through the last eighth. Simpson, who had the mount on Midnight Sun, lodged a claim of foul against Kennedy for swerving in front of him after straightening out for the run home, but the complaint was not entertained by the stewards.

Light rain fell upon the course in the morning, but did not slow the track to any appreciable extent, and good time was made in all the races. The colors of C. J. Brockmiller were carried to a double victory by Charlotte C. and Bengore in the first and second races, respectively. The former, overlooked in the betting, was rushed to the front by jockey Morrissey and won from Lady Granite and Bee's Nest among others of a medium sized field of two-year-olds over the three-quarter-mile route. Bengore, ridden by jockey Kennedy, took the measure of a band of Canadian bred, going a mile. Statim finished second and Galley Head third. Bengore was pronounced favorite and Statim equally strong as a second choice.

O. E. Pons, acting in the interests of E. Loh, bought of Rome Respite the filly American Rose, a half sister of Charlie Leydecker.

Bucrana also was sold this morning by Mr. Rensselaer to F. Garrett, and ran in the interests of his new owner in the sixth race.

C. F. Clark has turned over the J. H. Louchheim horses Tenite and Colonel Lit to J. S. Ownbey, who will take them to Connaught Park, to be turned out on the farm of J. S. Barbee at the conclusion of the racing at Windsor.

JOCKEY CLAVER OUT OF DANGER.

Jockey Claver, who was injured while galloping one of the Ross horses here Saturday, is reported improving satisfactorily in a Buffalo hospital. A bar of a gate struck him over the eye. At first it was believed that he would lose the sight of the member, but this fear has been dispelled.

Jockey T. Nolan arrived this morning from Saratoga to ride the horses of J. K. L. Ross, but did not appear in the saddle today because of a misunderstanding of the lifting of his suspension. Commander Ross wired Fred Scheike that starter Cassidy had rescinded Nolan's suspension, but the stewards here haven't been so advised by the stewards at Saratoga.

J. R. Skinker was an arrival today from his home in Washington.

Weights for the Edward W. Maginn Memorial Handicap, at a mile and a sixteenth, for three-year-olds and over, which will feature the closing card of the current meeting, were announced today. J. K. L. Ross' Boniface is allotted the post of honor with an impost of 132 pounds. H. G. Bedwell and jockey Sande will be here Wednesday to saddle and to ride the Ross color bearer in the handicap.

Jockey H. Myers returned to the saddle today after serving a short suspension.

Secretary Joseph McLennan has been notified by railroad officials that there will be twenty express cars available for shipment of horses from here to Windsor Wednesday night over the Michigan Central.

J. Mott was at the track today arranging with horsemen for shipment to Ottawa. Eight or ten of the stables that have been racing here will be sent direct to Connaught Park. Included in the consignment will be the horses of W. L. Oliver and E. T. Zollicoffer.

C. A. Clay, the Kentucky breeder, accompanied by E. G. Stoll, secretary of the Kentucky Racing Commission, spent Saturday here on their way by motor from Saratoga to the Bluegrass State.

C. Mitchell, an apprentice rider who has been serving here for J. Walters, has been turned over to Lloyd Gentry.

MAN O' WAR VS. SIR BARTON

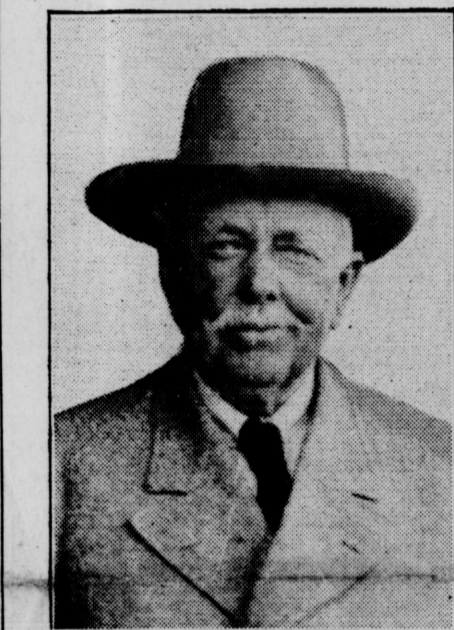

LEXINGTON, Ky., August 16.—Four yearlings purchased by G. L. Blackford of Denison, Texas, at Saratoga were shipped from here this afternoon to Latonia in charge of J. H. Snell to be broken under the direction of trainer R. N. Vestal, who arrived here last night from Canada. The Blackford string of racers will be shipped from Canada to Latonia tomorrow. Mr. Blackford is due here from Saratoga within a few days. He is in the market for a stallion to take the place of Meelick, which died several weeks ago at his Texas ranch. Trainer Vestal is not well, as he is suffering from asthma.

TURF CAREER OF GREEN B. MORRIS

DEAD MAN HAD A WONDERFUL ARRAY OF GREAT RACERS IN HIS CARE WHEN IN HIS PRIME

Of late years it has been the custom to refer to Green B. Morris in terms to convey the impression that he was one of the oldest men on earth. Quite erroneous this. It is true that he had been around quite awhile, but there are plenty of older men who are still quite spry and inwardly of the belief that they are entirely capable of holding their own with their juniors. Green B. died at 83 years of age. Most of the people now connected with racing found him a prominent figure on the turf when the sport first engaged their attention, hence without reflection unconsciously contracted the habit of considering him in the same light as if he had quite really and truly been a centenarian. He was by birth a Mississippian and was born at Madison in that state in 1837. His folks moved to Missouri while he was a lad and when he was but fourteen years old "he bullwhacked" in a cattle train across the plains and mountains to California. There, in mining, stock trading and other pursuits, he remained until 1864. Then he returned to Missouri and it was not long before he drifted into racing. Such records as are available show that he raced a horse called Zuzu at Mobile, Ala., late in 1869. This may have been his first thoroughbred, but of this there is no certainty. Zuzu had won races for Gen. Abe Buford, but does not appear to have won after she passed into the possession of Mr. Morris. She was a chestnut filly by Ulverston—Minnow, breeding that reads quaintly now. It is thus established that he was racing at least one horse as long ago as fifty-one years ago and it is probably the case that there is not now an active turfman who can match that record.

Early in the seventies Morris formed a racing partnership with the Missouri breeder, James D. Patton, and it was not long until the firm name of Morris & Patton gained recognition East and West. Bill Dillon, Fellowplay and Minter were renowned horses that he campaigned in those early days, and good ones they were. He threw in his calling and grew in skill as a trainer and judge of horses and began to fly at the high game of the turf with marked success and success that stayed with him for a long time. He achieved a sensational triumph in 1882 when he won the Kentucky Derby with Apollo. That year Dwyer Bros. owned a fine colt by Fillet—Mercedez, named Runnymede. He was an even-money favorite, and by virtue of his record and the presence of the redoubtable Jimmy McLaughlin in the saddle deserved to be such. Apollo was such an outsider that he sold in the auction pools and was 30 to 1 in the books. But in a sensational finish Apollo won by a half length, with Runnymede second and Mike Dwyer lost a barrel of money over this unexpected result. Green Morris assured him and others that the best horse had won, but this was not so. When it came to the running of the Clark Stakes a few days later Runnymede simply lost Apollo and won by ten lengths, while Billy Lakeland's Babeok beat Apollo for second place. Still Apollo was quite a good colt and won a number of other races that year, including the Kentucky St. Leger of two miles at the Louisville Jockey Club. Morris found the experienced race, which might very well be revived by the New Louisville Jockey Club, but did not quite succeed, finishing second to Leonatus with Drake Carter in 1883 and second to Joe Cotton with Bersan in 1885. Bersan was a capital race horse and because of a peculiar bony protrusion above his eye was called "the horned horse." As in the case of Runnymede and Apollo, he had his revenge on Joe Cotton in the Clark Stakes, which he won, easily, with Troubadour second and Joe Cotton third. Bersan belonged to Morris singly, but Morris & Patton had another excellent three-year-old that year in the Pat Malloy colt, Favor, which ran second to Lucky Baldwin's Volante in the American Derby at Washington Park, and was favorite in the betting. He was not equal to beating Volante, but won many important races East and West that year and in the year or two following.

Many devoted turfmen ply their calling year in and year out, always cherishing the hope of some day coming into possession of one of those gems of horsemanship which bring fame and fortune to an owner, without ever realizing that hope. Until in recent years Green B. Morris knew but little of such disappointment. From the time he began to race his first good horse, Bill Dillon, he had in his ownership or charge a remarkable succession of high-class racers. Sir Dixon, Strathmeath, Judge Morrow, Apollo, Minter, Drake Carter, Freeman, Ten Stone, Star Ruby, Curard, Rex, Sombra, Old England, Fellowplay, Favor, Pupil, Knight Templar, Tipstaff, Rena B., Modrine, Bedeck, Star Chime, Janice, Slave, Money Mass, Duke of Kent, Lobengula, Sallie Clequet, Modroclo and Ellen were names to come with in the host of brilliant performers he trained and sent to victorious careers on the track. Sir Dixon he only raced as a two-year-old and, having won with him the Bay District and the Select Stakes at Monmouth Park and the Flatbush Stakes at Sheepshead Bay, Camden Stakes with Dwyer Bros. for a big sum, but most of the others named raced in his charge until their days of usefulness on the track had waned. Sir Dixon was the best son of Billet and an extremely successful sire after his retirement from racing, heading the American sire list in 1901. Of all the horses he owned and raced Strathmeath was the greatest winner. This was a bay gelding by Strathmore—Flower of Meath, which, among other races, won for him the Spring Stakes and Partridge Stakes at Sheepshead Bay, Tyro Stakes and Junior Champion Stakes at Monmouth Park and the Algeria Stakes at Gravesend as a two-year-old, and the American Derby at Washington Park, Stockton Stakes at Monmouth Park and the Twin City Handicap at Sheepshead Bay when a three-year-old. He raced on successfully for several years and ranks thirteenth in the American list of winners of \$100,000 or more, with a total of \$114,958 won. At the same time Morris owned the fine racer, Judge Morrow, which won the Brooklyn Handicap of 1892 for him, as well as many other races and a total of \$77,213. It was at this time that he attained his condition of greatest prosperity and was a wealthy man and the possessor of a fine residence property in Brooklyn.

In racing he was a careful and resourceful man, overlooking little that might be conducive to success. On the day when the American Derby of 1891 was to be run the track was "spotty" and drying out from a drenching rain of the night previous. Shortly after the start for its entire length and carefully noted its condition at every point. The result of this inspection was that in the race, Covington raced Strathmeath along with the other horses for the first half mile, then he began to veer him in and out in a way puzzling to the vast throng of spectators, but, exactly as had been mapped out by Morris, carefully following the course that had been selected in the stroll around the track. It resulted from this that, while Strathmeath really ran farther than the others horses, he was running comfortably over sound going all through that last important mile, while his competitors were now and then unbalanced in their stride by plunging into soft spots. In no small measure was Strathmeath's easy triumph over Poet Scout and Kingman due to this intelligent measure, which did not occur to any other owner or rider concerned.

Another striking illustration of his skill and shrewdness in meeting an emergency was furnished in connection with the horse Star Ruby. This animal had been imported from England by J. B. Haggin and was his property, but was raced in partnership by Mr. Morris, as was also the case in regard to many other Haggin-owned horses. Being a horse of extreme speed, Star Ruby had been raced almost exclusively in sprints and was considered a sprinter only. But he had been entered in the four-mile Thornton Stakes of 1896, run at the old Bay District track. Morris was racing his horses at San Francisco then, but did not intend to start Star Ruby in the long race. However, desiring to send the horse to the stud with more than a sprinting record, Mr. Haggin ordered him to be started in the Thornton Stakes. This occurred so shortly prior to the date of the race that no time remained in which to give Star Ruby an orthodox preparation for a dash of four miles. His sagacious jockey, W. Martin, was called into council and the two wise heads devised what proved to be a novel, but highly successful plan for winning a four-mile race by a dash of three-quarters of a mile. Only three started, the other two being Gilead, which had won the stake in 1895, and the proved stayer, Claudius. No such four-mile race was ever witnessed. Claudius went off in the lead, with Gilead lapped on him, and ran thus for the first two miles. At the end of the first mile Star Ruby and Willie Martin were just turning into the homestretch as the two leaders dashed by the grandstand. At the end of two miles the gap had widened to all of a half mile and it was nearly the same when three miles had been covered, with Gilead now leading. Of course, to all appearances, Star Ruby did not possess the ghost of a chance and the spectators were giving little attention and applause to the really exciting struggle going on between Gilead and Claudius, with exhausting effect for both. It was not until in the fourth and last mile that the bit of racing strategy devised by Morris and Martin carried out with the signal skill and coolness by the latter was made manifest to the astonished people who had lost sight of Star Ruby. When he turned into the backstretch Gilead, now having Claudius well beaten, was turning out of it on the far turn. With three-quarters to go, Martin released Star Ruby from restraint and the way he closed up on the two tired toilers far in front seemed almost magical to the startled beholders. Yet it was a simple enough affair. Star Ruby had been so skillfully saved that he was a comparatively fresh horse when he began his sprint of three-quarters. He ran that three-quarters in 1:15 and such a rate of speed in the last mile of a four-mile race was bound to be decisive. He passed Claudius before reaching the homestretch and, nailing Gilead when beginning the last eighth, passed him and won pulling up by a length.

Good old Green B. He had no Sir Dixon, Strathmeath or Judge Morrow in late years and his wealth has gone as it came, but he did the best he could with what he had and, was an ornament to American racing.

THIRD WEEK AT SARATOGA

Opens With Interesting Racing Over a Good Track.

Western Horses Favored With Unusual Success—Leochares Still to Be Considered.

SARATOGA, N. Y., August 16.—For the first time since the meeting opened here horses which came from Kentucky figured to a noticeable extent and they captured a majority of the races, including the Kentucky Stakes, which was for two-year-olds and had a guaranteed value of \$2,500, of which the winner's net portion amounted to \$1,950. The winner in this was the Fletcher-Keene owned Loveliness, which triumphed in decisive style over Cubanita and Lough Storm. Good racing luck, coupled with a well-judged ride, gave a prominent part in her victory. With equally favorable conditions Lough Storm would have won. The latter was away slowly and taken wide for the entire race, the stretch turn being especially disastrous, for it was here that she had a loss of more ground than the margin by which she was beaten. Loveliness, on the other hand, by staying close to the inner rail, saved considerable ground and, responding well to the riding of Wida, she gradually forged into the lead and drew out decisively in the last sixteenth. Cubanita, under a hard drive, lasted well and just managed to outstay Lough Storm.

While the stake race had the most monetary consideration, the mile handicap with an array of cracks entered, was easily the feature race, and it resulted in one of the best contests of the present meeting, the quartet of leaders being separated by small margins, with the entire field being driven to the limit. The winner in this was the veteran Leochares, which, running in his usual game style, outstayed Fair Gain and Wyoming. E. R. Bradley's Best Pal was the favorite one in the race, but a faulty beginning, coupled with being forced to race extremely wide, was responsible for his defeat. It was the general opinion that he would have been the winner had he had anything like an even break in the racing luck.

The Bradley connections made ample amends in the concluding races for losses sustained on Best Pal, when his Blowing Bubbles won in game style, but racing luck this time favored the Kentuckian, for Blowing Bubbles benefited extensively through being able to save much ground on the stretch turn. The start in the race was a straggling one, with Bayword and Blowing Bubbles the leaders, but Blowing Bubbles shortly afterwards suffered from interference, then recovered, quickly and remained in close proximity of the leaders and finishing gamely won in the last seventy yards from Nohant and Pennington.

The steep-chase resulted in an easy victory for the favorite Midas II., which came fast over the last three jumps and displaced Jay Bird from the lead and held Brand safe in the final sprint on the flat. Jay Bird passed the finish in third place long before Worstdead had taken the last jump. Syrdarya came to grief at the club house jump.

Brink and Mormon fought out the finish in the opener and Brink won in the last sixteenth, third money going to Marion Hollins.

FOUR STRAIGHT FOR TENONS BON.

Tenons Bon, which has already figured in three winning performances here, made it a fourth, when he landed the fifth race in easy style from King Agrappa. The latter furnished an upset by outstaying the heavily supported second choice Great Gall for second place.

During G. H. Keene's absence in Detroit on business connected with the Devonshire meeting, J. T. Ireland will saddle the horses racing in the name of M. H. Fletcher, which includes Loveliness.

Roll On was claimed from the last race Saturday by Lloyd Gentry at a cost of \$2,210, and Rama was claimed in the same race by F. J. Kelley for \$2,475.

Jockey Colfietti was suspended for six days by the starter for disobedience at the post.

Weather conditions today were again humid and sultry, with a slight shower just before the horses went to the post for the last race. Indications are for more rain.

Race goers may confidently expect a repetition of the duel between Man o' War and John P. Grier, which made the Dwyer Stakes such a superb contest when the same three-year-olds met here on Saturday next in the Travers Stakes. It will be remembered that Man o' War, after a terrific struggle, carrying 126 pounds to John P. Grier's 108, won the Aqueduct prize. On next Saturday the champion will shoulder 129 pounds as against John P. Grier's 115. Both colts are receiving special preparation for the contest, which has for many years been a three-year-old attraction at this point, having been first run in 1864. As it is at a mile and a quarter, the distance is ample for a fair and square test of the best form of the colts engaged. There may be others starters, but as long as Man o' War and John P. Grier go to the post the public will be satisfied and a record for the meeting in the way of attendance should be established.

Martin Nathanson, who will serve as racing secretary of the Havana track and who also will serve in a similar capacity at Havre de Grace next fall, joined General Manager Frank Bruen this morning and will, while they are here, arrange the complete racing program for the Havana meeting. It has already been settled that no purse of less than \$700 value will be offered.

Jockey Kummer, who has been out of the saddle for some time on account of injuries, will resume riding tomorrow.

Love Tap, which was entered to be sold for \$2,000 in the Kentucky Stakes, was claimed for \$4,605 by Edward B. McLean.

N. Hopper has added the two-year-old Santa Clause to his stable, securing him by private sale from John E. Madden.

Gus Scheer was claimed from the first race by G. S. Goodacre at a cost of \$1,705. He will be trained by E. J. Crawford.

CURRENT NOTES OF THE TURF

A shipment of ten horses, including those owned by J. A. Strode, "Doc" Remus, S. Bernides and W. L. Davenshire, has arrived at Montreal from Reno, Nev. Jockey Ames accompanied the shipment.

The fair meeting now in progress at Hazerstown, Md., is the first to be held under the supervision of the recently appointed Maryland Racing Commission. Two members of that body were present on opening day.

PAST THE HALF WAY MARK

Saratoga Meeting on Final Lap; No Diminution in Interest.

Travers and United States Hotel Stakes Are Big Features of This Week's Racing.

(BY C. J. FITZGERALD).

SARATOGA, N. Y., August 16.—The meeting of the Saratoga Association for the Improvement of the Breed of Horses is half over, but the attendance, which has been large throughout the meeting, shows no signs of diminution. With some of the best features still to be decided, the eyes of the entire American turf world will remain focussed on Saratoga to the close of the meeting.

Transients touring the country find racing a potent attraction, and often those who stop over for a day find the sport so alluring that they remain much longer. There have been many such at the Spa this season, and there will be many more before the first of September. They have heard of the delights of Saratoga, and in these days of the automobile, when it is possible for a party to make the journey from either New York or Montreal by motor in a trifle over seven hours, the thought of a day with the thoroughbreds is frequently irresistible.

If there is a chance of seeing Man o' War in action the appeal is all the stronger. The turf has never had such a drawing card as the big three-year-old, and his name is on the lips of everybody. His picture has been thrown on the screen in every hamlet in the land, and more has been written about him since his appearance than any of other dozen horses in the same period. The fact that he frequently is opposed by horses which cannot make him display the wonderful powers which mark him as a horse apart does not seem to make any difference. The public appears to be satisfied to admire his faultless proportions in the paddock, and afterwards marvel at the ease with which he devours space.

INCHCAPE AND LEONARDO II.

On the same day the Grand Union Hotel Stakes and the Beverwyck Handicap Steeplechase will be carded. The former has a splendid list of eligibles and it should furnish a fine test of the qualities of our juveniles. The rivals Inchcape and Leonardo II. are the headliners, but they are not the only two-year-olds of promise engaged by any means. Touch Me Not, The Bohemian, Seraph, Star Voter, Oriole, Brigadier General, Prudery, Broom Spun, Dimmesdale and other youngsters that have shown fine form will no doubt be found among the field. George Odum thinks he has in Oriole a colt capable of taking the measure of any youngster over a heavy course, and if the going is bad on Saturday it will be a good time to test the mud running qualities of those opposed to the angular son of Assagai.

The jumping material out this season is not up to the standard of other years, but the best of it will be found among the Beverwyck eligibles. The race should be a potent attraction to all those who like cross-country sport. It should help to round out a well-balanced card. For tomorrow the Saranac Handicap with \$2,500 added has been graced with the name of Man o' War among the overnight acceptances, but the champion has been asked to carry 140 pounds and it may be that trainer Louis Feustel will not put the crack Riddle colt to such a severe test, especially as tomorrow's race will only be in the nature of a gallop for his engagement in the Travers next Saturday. The other entries in the Saranac are Brookholt, Wedding Cake, Edwina, Busy Signal, Dinna Care, Blazes and Krewer. The record for the event is 1:36 1/2, made by Moter Cop in 1919 with 119 pounds up.

A novelty in the shape of the Grab Bag Handicap, for two-year-olds, will be Wednesday's feature. According to the conditions, candidates may be leased, raced in the name and colors of any individual. In the six years of its existence it has only been won once by a starter under lease. This was in 1917 when President R. T. Wilson named Jack Har J. The race has a guaranteed value of \$4,000.

CEBRIAN'S YEARLINGS GET LESSONS

LEXINGTON, Ky., August 16.—Edward Cebrian's twelve yearlings, foaled in California, which have been at John S. Barbee's Glen Helen Farm for several months, have been shipped to Louisville to be broken by John Lewie. There are several extremely fast mules of this character in the Lexington country. Charles Thompson owns one from the dam of Hank O'Day that has been "cleaning up" at fairs the past two years. William Whaley, of Paris, has a mare mule, dam Blazing Star, the dam of Blazes, that is said to be very fast.

DODGE MAY PROVE TO BE GOOD SIRE

Dodge is the sire of some promising colts at Macomber's ranch in California. Mr. Macomber paid \$17,500 for Dodge as a three-year-old and always regretted parting with him after the son of Jim Gaffney broke down. Dodge is a patched-up cripple, but is still capable of winning races, and some day he should make a name for himself as a sire.

\$5,000 ADDED SELLING STAKE

Seldom Are "Platers" Afforded Opportunity to Contest for Such a Large Sum.

DETROIT, Mich., August 16.—Five thousand dollars in added money is a big sum for a selling stake race. But that is the amount the eligibles to the D. & C. Stake will run for during the Windsor Jockey Club's second meeting, July 21 to 28. Members of the claiming division at the races are not often afforded the opportunity to participate in such watermelon slicing, and the result will be that the starters in the D. & C. will classify closer to the handicap contingent than to the so-called "selling plater" class.

The distance of the stake is three-quarters of a mile and horses of all ages are eligible. In addition to the \$5,000 prize a silver cup goes to the owner of the winner. A remarkable coincidence of the stake is that nearly every renewal has been decided over a muddy or wet track.

"This may be singularly appropriate for a fixture named in honor of the D. & C. Navigation Line," says President A. A. Schantz of that corporation, "but for a change I am agreeable to a day that will be fair and warm, and a track lightning fast for the big race."

"I also would like to find in the list of entries at least one with a lake or steamboat name. Then I might make my selection with comfort and confidence. The closest to the nomenclature I desire in the D. & C. was in 1915, when the winner turned up in Fountain Fay. I was aboard Fountain Fay that day because his name was the nearest approach to the water idea of any performer in the field."

"Again, I have another reason for wishing it 'fair and warm' on the day the D. & C. is run. I have purchased a brand new white suit for that day and some of my closest friends have gone and done likewise, and rain and mud do not blend harmoniously with light fluffy summer attire."

KENTUCKY FALL STAKES CLOSE TODAY

Kentucky Jockey Club stakes, to be run on the three Kentucky tracks in the fall, will close today, August 17. Starting with Lexington September 18, racing in Kentucky will continue until November 13. The stakes closing today, to be run during the Lexington meeting, are: The Lexington Cup Handicap, \$5,000 added, for three-year-olds and over, one and one-half mile; the Breeders' Futurity Stakes, for two-year-olds, also will be run at Lexington, it having been closed last year.

A great array of stakes will be run at Latonia, including the Covington Handicap, \$5,000 added, for three-year-olds, one mile and three-sixteenths; Fort Thomas Handicap, \$5,000 added, for two-year-olds, three-quarters of a mile; Autumn Handicap, \$5,000 added, three-year-olds and over, three-quarters of a mile; Latonia Handicap, \$5,000 added, three-year-olds and over, one mile and sixteenths; Twin City Handicap, \$5,000 added, three-year-olds and over, one mile and five-eighths; Latonia Cup, \$7,500 added, three-year-olds and over, two miles and a quarter. The Latonia Championship Stakes for three-year-olds at one mile and three-quarters has closed, as well as the Queen City Handicap, for two-year-olds at one mile.

The Churchill Downs stakes to be decided are the Golden Rod Handicap, \$5,000 added, for two-year-olds, seven-eighths of a mile; Falls City Handicap, \$5,000 added, three-year-olds and over, one and one-eighth miles, and the Louisville Cup, \$5,000 added, three-year-olds and over, two miles. The Kentucky Jockey Club Stakes, closed, will be run at Churchill Downs.

RICH TURF PRIZES IN CUBA

Oriental Park Stakes to Have \$100,000 in Added Money.

\$15,000 Added Each for Cuban Derby and Grand Prize—Other Features of \$10,000 Added.

SARATOGA, N. Y., August 16.—Frank J. Bruen, who succeeded H. D. Brown as manager of the Oriental Park track in Havana, was an arrival today and will remain here for about a week to do missionary work for his association. Mr. Bruen spoke optimistically of the prospects of Havana racing next winter. "It will eclipse anything formerly attempted in Cuba," said Mr. Bruen. "We have arranged an attractive stake program to which the added money will aggregate \$100,000. The Cuban Derby is the headliner because of the fact that derbies always are popular, and during our coming meeting the added money to it will be \$15,000. This sum is not the outstanding one in the stake list, for the Grand Prize also has an added value of \$15,000. This stake and a \$10,000 stake exclusively for Cuban-bred horses are appropriations of the Cuban government. Another big stake that will be decided next winter will be the Grand National Handicap of \$10,000 added and two stakes having an added value of \$5,000 each. There will be numerous other fixtures, with none of less than \$2,000 added value. Our racing will be inaugurated Thanksgiving Day and continue for one hundred or more days."

Mr. Bruen just came from Havana, having stopped off in New York for a brief period to consult with Charles A. Stoneham, the principal owner of the palatial Havana track. Mr. Bruen also announced that many notable improvements in connection with the track have been completed since the last season of racing there. Chief of these is the enlargement of the recently constructed club house by the construction of another story to the building, on top of which has been arranged a modern roof garden. The enlarged structure now contains eighteen bedrooms, each with a private bath. The buildings at the main entrance, that contained the secretary's office, printing plant and pressroom, together with the paddock building adjoining, have been razed and a handsome new entrance gate substituted. To the left of the club house and at a more advantageous location, close to the track, a new paddock and building to replace the ones formerly used for the racing secretary's office and printing establishment have been constructed. Mr. Bruen states that the design of the new structures is fully in keeping with the handsome club house. The new printing plant is fully equipped to print the daily programs, condition books and other work necessary for the conduct of an extended meeting. Havana will have the distinction of being the only track to print its programs on the grounds, which will be a distinct advantage.

NEW PADDOCK CONSTRUCTED.

The new paddock lawn will contain abundant space, and from its long sweep and elevation one will be able to watch the races from start to finish. The wooden stairways leading to the grandstand have been replaced by more substantial ones of concrete. The promenade back of the grandstand has been widened and arranged so that patrons will be afforded an unobstructed view of the betting inclosure from the main floor of the big structure.

Mr. Bruen also stated that water pipes used for sprinkling purposes, which formerly extended only halfway around the track, have been extended around the entire course of one mile. Last season it was found that the six hundred stalls were inadequate to meet the growing demand, and buildings for one hundred new stalls are now in course of construction, and will be completed before the next season opens next Thanksgiving Day. Other improvements that will add much to the beauty of the already picturesque grounds are being given attention.

In the course of a short time, and previous to his return to Havana, Mr. Bruen will announce his plans for stake offerings and purse offerings. The list of thirteen stakes, including the Grand National Handicap and Cuban Derby, both with an endowment of \$10,000, will receive several additions, and the combined amount of added money to stakes will be the greatest offered at any winter meeting, and almost equal to many of the more important summer meetings. Manager Bruen also made the important announcement that there would be a substantial increase in the daily purse offerings, which news will be most gratifying to horsemen who intend to race in Cuba the coming winter.

Manager Bruen is most optimistic regarding the outlook for the meeting, and declares it will be the greatest in the history of Cuban racing. Interest in the sport on the island by the Cuban people is keener than ever, while racing is now on a more substantial basis since representative citizens and business men of Havana have become closely identified with the club's affairs as stockholders. Among the more notable ones are J. Z. Horter and L. Quesada, two prominent men, who have recently been elected to the board of directors of the club.
