## BEST PAL'S FINE VICTORY

**Defeats Mad Hatter in a Fast Mile and a Quarter.**

**Big Coups Effected in the Races for Two-Year-Olds—Dunboyne in Good Form.**

SARATOGA, N. Y., August 27.—E. R. Bradley's Best Pal, which has been unlucky in his last two starts here, had opportunity as a result of the small field in the Glens Falls Handicap, at a mile and a quarter, featuring this afternoon's program, to display his best ability and it landed him the winner, but only after a hard and well-sustained drive to outstay the fast coming but lightly weighted Bellsolar. Mad Hatter was the favorite, but at no point was he equal to downing the Bradley representative, and after racing forwardly for three-quarters he retired despite the energetic persuasion of jockey Kummer, who returned to the saddle this afternoon and had the mount on him. The Hildreth-Sinclair starter attempted to concede ten pounds in actual weight to Best Pal and twenty-two pounds to Bellsolar, and he found his task a hopeless one from the barrier's rise. Best Pal took the lead immediately, and while making a fast pace was under restraint until reaching the last eighth, where suddenly Bellsolar came swiftly and steadily began wearing Best Pal down, but the finish still found them separated by a neck. It was the first time that Best Pal had covered the mile and a quarter route and some misgiving was felt, even by his owner, as to his ability to go the distance successfully. The time of the race, 2:03, marked an extra creditable effort.

Small fields were again the order throughout the afternoon, but good sport came in nearly all the dashes, including the steeplechase, and in some instances the winners were in doubt until the judicial placing.

The worst upset of the afternoon came with the running of the steeplechase, in which Queen of the Sea was in prohibitive odds, but fenced blunderingly and tired so badly in the stretch that she barely saved third place from Vigilante. The finish and hard duel through the last quarter was between King Terry and Surf, the former winning in the final stride.

### SAILING B. MEDIUM OF BIG COUP.

This was a day of tribute to Arnold Rothstein, for that well-known operator engineered a coup that is said to have netted him hundreds of thousands and he used his own colt Sailing B. as the medium through which to mulct the layers. Sailing B. was in with an ordinary band of platers, individually entered at \$1,500, and Sailing B. spreadeagled his opponents to win as Kelsay, his rider, pleased and the class of the horse was further disclosed when he was bid to \$6,000, at which figure he was bought by E. Herz. The latter was offered a profit of \$500 for the youngster by R. Miller, but it was turned down.

Rothstein's second stunning blow for the layers came with the victory of G. W. Loft's Tamarisk in the final race, a dash for fillies and contested by a somewhat ordinary band. It, however, developed a rousing duel between Tamarisk and Mavelona, the former just managing to last long enough to win by a nose.

The uncertain Frederick the Great, which ran a surprisingly poor race in his last start, was again made an outstanding favorite over those he met in the fifth race, but this time he raced well and won in easy style from Paddy Dear and Great Gull. He was entered for \$800 and was bid up to \$2,005 by J. J. Murphy and bought in by his stable.

The opening race brought to the post a crack band of sprinters and it enabled Dunboyne to score easily from Star Master and Crank in the fast time of 1:11. It marked Dunboyne's first start since the running of the Toboggan Handicap at Belmont Park last spring. He had to be in retirement on account of a quarter crack and trainer John McCormack, by his good administration, has succeeded in causing a new hoof to grow on the colt.

The stewards reprimanded trainer T. J. Harmon for having the extra equipment of a yoke martingale on Frederick the Great, resulting in the horse coming back with a pound overweight than he weighed out with.

The claiming brigade was active in the third race, no less than five claims being in for Squaw Man and three for Rancocas. The former went to the Kedgewick Stable for \$3,105 and Sam Louis secured Rancocas for \$2,685.

Paddy Dear was claimed by J. J. Murphy for \$2,150.

### CERAMIC TO BREEDING BUREAU.

C. K. Moore has presented to the Breeding Bureau of the Jockey Club the four-year-old Ceramic, by Ballot—Majolica. Ceramic appears a fine type and should sire splendid hunters and cavalry remounts.

Lion d'Or came back after his race bleeding slightly as a result of having caught the barrier in his mouth during one of his breakaways. He acted sourly at the barrier and showed a general disinclination to race, but did display great speed in the running before giving away completely in the last sixteenth.

Jockey Fator had to cancel his riding engagements for the afternoon on account of illness.

Jockey Ensor will again be back with his former employer when he returns to Belmont Park, as he has engaged to work for Thomas Healy, who is training the R. T. Wilson horses. Ensor is gradually coming to a realization of the error of his ways and has decided on taking a brace and hereafter contemplates attending strictly to his riding business.

Colonels Stanley Koch, Charles L. Scott and R. H. Williams of the Remount Bureau have announced their intention of addressing the horsemen tomorrow in the paddock before the racing and make known to them some pertinent matters concerning the horsemen's interests.

Jockey L. Mink departed this afternoon for Lexington.

## WINDSOR'S ORDINARY CARD

**Napoo Scores Runaway Victory in Ontario Nursery Handicap—Rain Hardly Settles the Dust.**

WINDSOR, Ont., August 27.—Napoo, the Martinet—La Gloria two-year-old from the E. D. Williams string, made a runaway race of the Ontario Nursery Handicap at three-quarters of a mile, which served as the principal attraction of an ordinary card. Rushed away from the barrier by jockey Donahue, the colt led all the way and won easily up. Old Chap and Alberta S. followed closest to him in the order named throughout the race. Irish Jim made a dismal showing.

A heavy shower shortly before the first race wet the track down thoroughly, but hardly more than settled the dust and good time was made in all the races.

George Barnes, trainer for C. W. Clark, the Montana horseman, will send jockey S. Wida to Devonshire Park to ride under the care of G. H. Bryson.

Dillard Hill is an arrival from Kentucky to participate in the Devonshire Park meeting.

Gene Elrod, who has been in charge of the mutual department here, leaves for Cincinnati at the conclusion of the meeting. Mr. Elrod will supervise the mutuels at the Blue Grass Fair at Lexington next week.

H. W. Marsh, well known on the race track in days past as a trainer and stable agent, is a visitor on his way to Kitchener, Ont., from the oil fields of Texas, where he has spent the last three years.

Most of the stables which have been racing on this circuit throughout the Summer will be shipped from here to Ottawa. The Kentucky contingent, however, will race at Devonshire next week and then return home for the Fall racing in their own state.

The G. M. Hendrie stable will be rested up here at the conclusion of this meeting.

Jockey T. Nolan was summoned to Saratoga today by trainer Bequell. Jockey O. Willis rode the only loss starter here today. Nolan will return to the circuit at Ottawa.

Jockey Richerick returned to the saddle today after a lay-off necessitated by his fall at Fort Erie.

The apprentice rider H. Remmert was suspended for the remainder of the meeting by the starter yesterday.

## CHAMPION JUVENILE FILLY

**Spinaway Stakes May Reveal the Best of the Year—Great Program at Saratoga Today.**

Which is the best two-year-old filly of 1920? This question may be answered today at Saratoga with the decision of the Spinaway Stakes. With a field numerically large and of the highest quality, perhaps the best that ever engaged in this long established feature of Saratoga racing, a great contest is promised those fortunate enough to be there to witness it.

H. P. Whitney's Prudery, defeated but once, and that by her stable mate, the unbeaten Tryster, will most likely be the favorite. However, that good daughter of Peter Pan will meet formidable opposition from P. A. Clark's speedy Nancy Lee, W. J. Salmon's Careful, J. W. Parrish's Gossip Avenue, the western cracks Miss Muffins and Believe Idle Hour, not to say anything of her own stable companion, the unbeaten Crocus, and others of more or less known quality. Victory over such opponents will certainly entitle Prudery to the juvenile championship of her sex. On past performances Nancy Lee, which ran three-quarters of a mile in 1:11 in winning the United States Hotel Stakes, is considered to have an excellent chance of taking the Whitney filly's measure.

In addition to the Spinaway, the Saratoga Steeplechase and Merchants and Citizens' Handicap are stellar attractions of today's program at Saratoga. Sir Barton is assigned the difficult task of carrying 133 pounds and concedes much weight to Boniface, The Porter, Gnome and Jack Stuart in the Merchants and Citizens' Handicap, at one mile and three-sixteenths. That he will prove equal to the occasion few doubt, but he has strong opposition and it would not surprise anyone to see the speedy Gnome give the Ross champion the battle of his life.

The last Saturday's racing at the Spa holds out the promise of the same high caliber sport that has marked the earlier days of the meeting, and it is safe to say that an immense crowd will witness it.

## CRACK COLT INCHCAPE NOT A CRIPPLE

SARATOGA, N. Y., August 27.—The story sent out from Saratoga a few days ago that Incheape, the high-priced Frisco Rock—Rose of Gold colt, owned by S. C. Hildreth, had broken down in his work turns out to be a canard. The facts are that Incheape, while galloping, struck himself above the fetlock and cut himself. Just how long it will take the cut to heal is not known, but Incheape is not a cripple by any means. Mr. Hildreth says the colt is fast regaining his form, but he did not say when he would send him to the races.

Owner Clark is at present in France, but will be on hand for the racing at Latonia.

J. H. McAvoy had intended shipping the Thomas Monahan racers direct to Latonia, but has changed his plans and will take in the Belmont Park meeting before going to Latonia.

Trainer William Karkick announced this morning that Cleopatra would be a certain starter in the Latonia Championship Stakes, barring an accident, and that the filly would be at Latonia at least a week before the running of the race.

ENDURANCE RACE ELIGIBLES

Trainer W. Woodard on Way East With Kentucky's Representatives for the Three Hundred Mile Contest.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., August 27.—William Woodard, who is conditioning five thoroughbred race horses for the three hundred mile endurance race to be run in October from Fort Ethan Allen, Vt., to Camp Devens, Mass., stopped off here yesterday en route to Putney, Vt., with his charges. The horses under his care are David Craig, U Twenty-three, Moscow, Helmet and Majella.

"If ever race horses were thoroughly fit for a grueling test of stamina, these five" said Mr. Woodard, "and I look for them to win the big race without much trouble. They will meet horses of all types and nations, but in my opinion the Kentucky thoroughbreds will show them the value of their blue blood. I have been training them all summer up in Kentucky, where there are plenty of hills, and the quintet stood the gaff remarkably well. The veteran Helmet, sire of numerous winners on the American turf today, acts like a two-year-old, and I am placing a lot of dependence on him. The conditions of the race call for the horses to cover sixty miles a day, and I am not worrying a bit but what those which I am training can accomplish that feat easily."

The five racers which Mr. Woodard is taking east are the property of the Kentucky State Racing Commission, Thoroughbred Horse Association and Kentucky Jockey Club. The Thoroughbred Horse Association is responsible for the Blue Grass State having representation in the endurance contest, and this organization has spent quite a bit of money in an effort to get horses worthy to uphold the name of this state against foreign rivals.

E. R. Bradley tendered the use of Helmet in the race, and he has announced that he will give trainer Woodard a fee of \$5,000 if this horse wins it. David Craig, U Twenty-three and Moscow are well known to local racegoers, all having frequently been seen under colors at Churchill Downs.

IMPORTANT BETTING CASE

Court of Appeals at Edinburgh Upholds the Legality of Betting Credit System in Vogue on Other Side.

Some weeks ago in an important decision the legality of credit betting was affirmed by the justiciary appeal court in Edinburgh, Scotland. At the sheriff court at Greenock there were two cases in which individuals were charged with using an office for the purpose of receiving money as a consideration for a promise to pay on the results of horse races and football matches. It was found in evidence that no bets were made in the premises, except by telephone or telegraph or letter. No one went to the office to bet, and no money was paid by clients before or at the time of making bets. Clients' accounts were rendered daily or weekly, and the winnings or losses were paid or received by the accused. In dismissing the charges the sheriff said evidence showed that clients of the accused made no deposit at their premises before or when the bets were made, or before the sporting event had been determined, and that the accused paid the winnings to their clients without any payment being made by the clients, and trusted to their clients' honor to pay their losses. Consequently the premises were not kept open or used for the purpose of money being received as a consideration for an undertaking to pay thereafter money on events or contingencies of or relating to horse races and football matches. The public prosecutor appealed against this finding, but the justiciary court upheld the sheriff, and dismissed the appeal. The lord justice clerk said the question had been decided in a former case which had affirmed that credit betting was not struck at by the betting act. Lords Dundas and Salvesen concurred.
