**GALLANT EXTERMINATOR**

Adds George Hendrie Memorial Handicap to His Successes.

Carries 131 Pounds to an Impressive Victory Over Wildair and Other Crack Racers.

WINDSOR, Ont., August 28.—Gallant Exterminator added to his fame and long list of victories by capturing the George M. Hendrie Memorial Handicap, the feature of the closing day at Windsor. Wildair was second. My Dear, the lightly weighted filly from the stable of F. Musante, outlasted the tiring Dr. Clark for the third portion of the stakes. Irish Kiss and Estero completed the field. Jockey Fairbrother rode a perfect race on the victorious son of McGee—Fair Empress and won by a length, going away after having out-generaled both Cottiletti on Wildair and Buxton on Dr. Clark. Dr. Clark was first to leave the barrier on the mile and a sixteenth journey and raced in command to the first turn under restraint. Exterminator raced to the first turn in third position in a pocket behind Dr. Clark and on the inside of Wildair. In the backstretch Dr. Clark was taken back from the lead, surrendering it to his stable-mate, while Exterminator galloped along with Fairbrother standing up in his stirrups. After rounding into the stretch Exterminator was called upon and responding gamely under his impost of 131 pounds drew away to win in the time of 1:44 1/2, two-fifths of a second slower than the track record made by Great Britain as a four-year-old with 112 pounds up.

Exterminator was made favorite by an immense gathering which assembled for the closing of the Windsor Jockey Club meeting. The value of the event to the winner was \$6,490 and the winning carried with it for one year the possession of the challenge cup presented in memory of the late George Hendrie by his nephew, Col. William Hendrie.

Dr. Hickman defeated a fast band in the handicap for all ages, the secondary attraction of the afternoon, leading home Carmandale and War Mask in a fast run race.

Yorkist was the victor in the race for Canadian-bred horses, scoring in easy fashion.

Books for the Havre de Grace meeting were distributed among the horsemen today. There will be seventeen days of racing at the Maryland course, beginning September 11 and ending September 30. C. J. Fitz Gerald and Captain Ral Parr will serve as stewards. James Milton will do the starting and M. Nathanson is racing secretary.

Samuel N. Holman is an arrival in the interests of the thirteen days' running race meeting carded for Chagrin Falls, Cleveland, Ohio, September 18 to October 2.

Charles F. Price, presiding steward of the Windsor meeting, leaves for Louisville tonight. J. B. Campbell, associate steward, goes to Ottawa to serve in an official capacity in the stand there and Francis Nelson, steward representing the Canadian Racing Associations, also acts at Ottawa.

**END OF VANDERBILT STABLE**

Will of Late Sportsman Directs Sale of All His Horses and Breeding Stud in France.

NEW YORK, N. Y., August 28.—Under the will of the late W. K. Vanderbilt, it is directed that his executors sell "as soon as convenient and possible" all his race horses and racing equipment wherever found in France, together with his property known as La Chaumiere, at Deauville, France, and his estate at Poissy in Seine-et-Oise, and turn the proceeds over to the residuary estate.

It will be a great disappointment to followers of the turf, who have been watching the famous black and white colors of the Vanderbilt stable on the French race courses for years, to find that his colors are to disappear from racing after his death.

A recent dispatch from France quoted Mrs. Vanderbilt as announcing to William Duke, trainer of the Vanderbilt horses, on the day she sailed for this country with her husband's body, that she would continue the racing stable and retain the Vanderbilt colors, black and white.

Mr. Vanderbilt had for years campaigned one of the best stables of horses on the French turf and had met with great success under the training of William Duke and riding of jockey Frank O'Neill. In addition to forty horses in training, he had a \$2,000,000 establishment at Poissy, where three stallions and fifty brood mares are in the stud.

**RICH HOPEFUL STAKES CANDIDATES**

TWENTY OF THE MOST PROMINENT ELIGIBLES TO THE MOST VALUABLE OF ALL OF SARATOGA'S STAKES TO BE RUN NEXT TUESDAY

The Hopeful Stakes, the most valuable of Saratoga's great array of turf prizes, will be run Tuesday, the closing day of the meeting. It will be worth about \$32,000 to the winner this year, the largest monetary return in the history of the race. There were originally 231 entries for the 1920 running of the Hopeful, six of which were void, owing to the death of their nominators, and eighty declared, leaving 145 still eligible. The unbeaten Tryster is ineligible and Incheape, S. C. Hildreth's costly Friar Rock—Rose of Gold colt, is out of it because of an injured foot, but all the other topnotchers in the two-year-old division are among the remaining eligibles, assuring a formidable and high-class field for the race Tuesday.

On past performances James W. McClelland's Leonardo II. is considered to have an excellent chance to win the rich prize. Leonardo II. is undefeated as yet, having won his three races like a high-class youngster. Mr. McClelland has several other eligibles, the best of the others apparently being Serapis, unless some of those that have not appeared under silks as yet are stars in embryo. Mr. McClelland won the Hopeful with Eternal in 1918.

H. P. Whitney, strangely, did not nominate Tryster for the Hopeful, and declared him in the Futurity, but he has several good colts and fillies eligible, which will have a strong following next Tuesday. Among these may be mentioned the best filly of the year to date—Prudery; Crocus, winner of two races out of three starts, beating Careful in one of them; the colts Broom Spun, Dartmoor (a brother to Upset), Ararat and Moody. Which of these trainer James Rowe will send to the post in the Hopeful is a quandary, but probably Prudery will be the stable's main dependence for the coveted prize.

W. J. Salmon probably will depend on his game little filly Careful, but he also has Step Lightly and Bodanzky as eligibles.

J. H. Rosseter has his two Friar Rock colts Montalvo and Merchant Marine eligible, neither of which has ever started, being delayed from getting to the races on account of a skin disease. Both of these colts are said to be doing nicely now and one or both of them may be sent to the post by trainer Fred Burlew. That they are good ones is shown by the fact that they are both nominated for the Epsom Derby of next year.

Commander J. K. L. Ross' best chance for the Hopeful seems to be Star Voter. Trainer Redwell is said to be pointing the son of Voter for the Hopeful, for he has not started since his victory in the rich Cincinnati Trophy, which he won at Latonia by five lengths. He also has eligible his high-priced Tiarco, a filly by Uncle—Xarco, which has never been to the post.

Senor A. H. Diaz will depend on his good colt General J. M. Gomez. This is a fair colt, but he seems destined to be better in his three-year-old form than in his two, for the reason that he is a bit sluggish and a slow starter.

W. R. Coe probably will send one of his home-bred colts Wapiti or Pahaska to the post. They are both by his Disguise stallion Harmonicon, and were bred at his Shoshone ranch in Wyoming.

G. A. Cochran probably will depend on Smoke Screen, winner of the Grab Bag Stakes. This colt was considered, when in Kentucky, in the early spring, one of the best two-year-old prospects in the Blue Grass state.

E. R. Bradley, if he sends anything to the post, probably will designate his crack filly, Believe Idle Hour, although he has several other eligibles.

W. S. Kilmer has never tried out the brother to Sun Briar, Sun Brae, by Sundridge—Sweet Briar. How good a colt this is has never been determined. Sun Brae, however, is eligible for the Hopeful.

The Greentree Stable's dependence is Touch Me Not, winner of the Great American Stakes. Touch Me Not performed rather dully last Monday in the Albany Stakes, and it is doubtful whether he will wear the silks of Mrs. Payne Whitney in the Hopeful.

The Quincy Stable has three likely chances in Brigadier General, Knobbie and Playfellow, the latter a brother to Man o' War.

Jefferson Livingston has a stanch performer in Oriole, which has been a consistent winner during the year. Oriole is a particularly good colt on a soft course. Should the track be heavy at Saratoga next Tuesday Oriole will be a hard colt to beat.

Honey Girl, S. Lewis' filly, by Friar Rock—Miss Kearney, may prove to be a fast youngster. She has started but twice, finishing third at the first asking and earning brackets August 17 at Saratoga. Honey Girl probably will be sent to the post in the Hopeful.

Another fast filly which is eligible and may be considered as having a royal chance, especially from a time standpoint, is P. A. Clark's Nancy Lee. This filly defeated some of the best colts in the United States Hotel Stakes, running the three-quarters in 1:11 4/5.

A. K. Maconber's representative probably will be the unlucky colt The Bohemian.

**SIR BARTONS GRAND RACE**

Makes a New American Record in Defeating Gnome.

Prudery Proves Herself Queen of the Two-Year-Old Fillies in the Spinaway Stakes.

(BY J. L. DEMPSEY.)

SARATOGA, N. Y., August 28.—Sir Barton, the sturdy J. K. L. Ross champion, further demonstrated his greatness this afternoon when he won the Merchants and Citizens' Handicap, worth \$5,200 net, at a mile and three-sixteenths, established a new American record and defeated Gnome, to which he was conceding eighteen pounds, after one of the most grueling drives witnessed at this track. The finish between Sir Barton and Gnome was of the thrilling order, with victory in doubt until in the last stride, and the immense throng of spectators was in a frenzy of excitement. Partisan-ship was manifested when the judges' award came, for the Gnome supporters disagreed and voiced their opinions, but the Sir Barton followers quickly drowned the discordant notes by their shouts of jubilation and cheers for the winner on his return to the scales.

The absence of Boniface and The Porter left only three to start in the race and Sir Barton always ruled favorite, but his somewhat disappointing warm-up, coupled with rumors that he had shipped badly in returning from Windsor, reduced support for him considerably. The Gnome connections felt confident of the outcome and made no secret of their expectations, resulting in a liberal price for the Ross representative. Jack Stuart was by no means neglected, and the Gnome following can directly charge the Martin representative for the defeat of their horse. The latter suffered as a result of Jack Stuart's waving in and out during the running, and on the stretch turn Gnome lost considerable ground as a result of being on the outside of him, which made none too close a turn. Sir Barton was rushed into the lead soon after the start and as a result had a clear course for the entire race. Some were inclined to censure Sande for making the great use he did of his mount, but the result justified it. The pace was a heart-breaker from the start and the final time of the race, 1:55 1/2, displaces the former figures, held jointly by Cudgel and Cleopatra. The former, as a four-year-old and carrying 131 pounds, ran the distance over this track in 1:56.

Cleopatra's performance in equalling Cudgel's mark occurred last Thursday when she carried 114 pounds. Sir Barton's race this afternoon was the more outstanding from the fact that he carried 133 pounds. His grand race this afternoon intensified the clamor for a meeting between him and Man o' War.

**FINE RACE FOR SPINAWAY STAKES.**

While the Merchants and Citizens' Handicap held stellar interest to the big throng, the decision of the Spinaway Stakes, bringing together as it did all the stars of the two-year-old filly division, was of equal moment, for it meant the crowning of the two-year-old queen. The result demonstrated Harry Payne Whitney's Prudery's right to the laurels, for she won from Step Lightly, with Nancy Lee following. A surprisingly big field tried conclusions for the \$5,500 net that went to the winner and the Whitney pair, consisting of Crocus and Prudery, were the pronounced favorites. The latter was rumored the best of the pair, but a faulty beginning caused Prudery to be far back in the early running. But the backers of the Whitney stable had consolation in the fact that Crocus was showing the way to the others, with Careful and Muttikins her closest followers, and Nancy Lee in their wake. There was little change in the running order until the stretch turn was reached, where a wide turn on the part of Crocus caused most of the others also to come wide and at this juncture Ambrose brought Prudery up with a rush next to the inner rail. Soon after she displaced her stable mate from the lead to retain it for the remainder of the race, although near the end Step Lightly, which had closed a big gap, came with a rush. Nancy Lee also finished well and headed the others for third place. Muttikins fell back in the last sixteenth, probably due to the hard punishment Sande subjected her to. Careful was done after going a fast half mile. The Kentucky mainstays Believe Idle Hour and Miss Keuffen were never prominent. The Bradley filly was eliminated early as a result of her slow start, and Miss Muffins was always outrun.

The Saratoga Steeplechase was one of the best races through the field of its kind, with the winner turning up in Mrs. F. Ambrose Clark's Minata, which triumphed by a scant length over Barklie, with Minata's stablemate Blighty II. following. Robert Oliver, the only other starter in the race, fenced well until he blundered at one of the hedges during the last round of the course and it practically disposed of his winning chances. The return in this race was \$2,650 net to the winner.

**DOUBLE VICTORY FOR R. T. WILSON.**

R. T. Wilson's colors were carried to a double victory during the afternoon, inaugurated with Thunderstorm's success in the opening dash and winding up with Yellow Hand's excellent performance in the final race. Both were ridden by Turner and were favorites.

In addition to winning with Sir Barton, J. K. L. Ross made it a double for the afternoon by the victory of Dancing Maid, which triumphed over the other maiden fillies starting in the fifth race.

Today's attendance, while not approaching the record throng of last Saturday when Man o' War was seen in action, was sufficiently large to crowd the spacious plant. Many of the visitors made it their farewell visit and a general exodus of the crowd that has been on hand for this meeting departed tonight.

Following Dancing Maid's victory she was bid up from an entered price of \$1,000 to \$1,600 and bought by Sam-Louis.

BACK TO THE METROPOLIS

Patrons of Racing Eager for the Return of Thoroughbreds.

Futurity and Lawrence Realization Features of Meeting Beginning Next Thursday.

NEW YORK, N. Y., August 28.—Metropolitan racing patrons are eagerly awaiting the return of the thoroughbreds from Saratoga, and every indication points to successful racing at Belmont Park, where the autumn meeting of the Westchester Racing Association will be inaugurated on Thursday next.

The program for the twelve days' sport is studded with attractions, but the Futurity and Lawrence Realization for two and three-year-olds, respectively, inherited from the Coney Island Jockey Club, are the outstanding features, not only for their monetary value, but because of the historic interest attached to them.

It was the first of the great produce races framed, and with its bonuses to breeders and its weight allowances for non-producing dams, thus encouraging the mating of young mares, it was a success from the outset. The race held the attention of every lover of the thoroughbred east, west, north and south. Everybody with a mare in the Futurity held the produce in greater regard because of that fact, and at the yearling sales there was magic in the announcement that an offering was eligible for the prize.

There have been thousands in the same class as Charles Reed since 1886, when the first nominations for the Futurity were solicited. When Sam Bryant won the initial race in 1888 with his white-legged, white-faced gelding Proctor Knott, ridden by the diminutive colored boy, "Pike" Barnes, and carried away to Kentucky what constituted for him a fortune in the shape of \$40,000, it gave the event Belmont's Potomac and Masher ran first and second, the stake was worth to the winner \$67,675, the highest in its history.

There have been many phenomenal struggles for this most coveted prize in the thirty years of its running, and out of it has come rivalries which were at times so keen that they bordered on the acrimonious. The rivalries of today are more friendly than those of other times. That spirit, however, which makes for progress in the sport was never stronger than it is today and the Futurity of 1920 bids fair to be a sensational contest, keenly fought from start to finish.

There is no Man o' War to rob the race of its interest as in 1919, and from present indications the field will be one of the largest in recent years, though not the equal of some of those in the early days when twenty or more contestants went to the post. It was hoped that nothing would prevent the Futurity from establishing the two-year-old championship of the year. Unfortunately, however, several of the best youngsters will not go to the post. Inchepe, a colt of the highest quality, and a rival of Tryster, Leonardo II, Prudery, Careful, Star Votter, Pluribus and others that have shown their quality, will not go to the post again this year, as he struck one of his ankles during a slow work on Monday last and pulled up lame. Tryster, which was slow to come to hand, was declared, while the dams of Leonardo II, and Pluribus were not nominated.

All of this is to the advantage of the owners of other candidates and the matter of supremacy among the juveniles must be postponed until a later date, although if the crack fillies Prudery and Careful are both fit, the queen of the turf should be crowned. Unquestionably the best of the probable starters, taking public form to date, are: Prudery, Careful, The Bohemian, General J. M. Gomez, Broom Spider, Star Votter, Bismarck, Torch Me Not and Brigadier General. Other which have either shown well in public or worked fast enough to warrant being sent to the post are: Kirklevington, Exodus, Eternity, Halu, Our Flag, Dartmoor, Snake Screen, St. Michael, Montalvo, Playfellow, Registrar, Crocus, Ararat, Roscomon, Pagan Pan, Honey Girl, Advocate, Pabaska, Sporting Blood, Believe Idle Hour and United Verde. Of the dark horses, Playfellow is a brother to Man o' War, Smoke Screen is a fine son of His Majesty, bred by Gifford A. Cochran in this state, and Montalvo is the colt from the stable of J. H. Rosseter of California which has been said to be the equal of Inchepe early in the season.

All in all, the Futurity of 1920, which should be worth \$30,000 or more, is an open race. There is an abundance of good material in the dark division and the winner may come from an unexpected quarter. It is this glorious uncertainty which is racing's greatest attraction and makes optimists of all those engaged in it.

As far as the Realization is concerned it would seem that this prize belongs to Man o' War if nothing happens to him in the meantime. Under the conditions there are no penalties, and the big three-year-old will only have to pack his scale weight. It would be a brave man who would contend that any other eligible had a chance to finish in front of the son of Fair Play. There are allowances for non-winners, but those with a chance of sharing in any but the minor portions of the stake have substantial amounts to their credit already and must meet Man o' War on even terms. In this class are John P. Grier, Wildair, Dr. Clark and On Watch. Fair Gain and Rouleau, by Vulcan and Tracery, respectively, are the pick of those that may come to the race entitled to allowances. While both are bred to run all day it would be idle to entertain the idea that they have sufficient quality to make the champion extend himself. Man o' War towers above his competitors like a colossus, and the Realization should be one more stepping stone toward the culmination of Mr. Riddle's hope to have the colt win more money than any other American thoroughbred.

The Realization and the Nursery Handicap, the latter for two-year-olds, will be the outstanding features of the program for Saturday next. They will be viewed by a great throng, eager to renew its homage to the thoroughbred after an absence of a month in Saratoga, and while the East has a particular claim on Man o' War there will doubtless be in that vast crowd many from every part of the Union whose acclaim will be as sincere as that of our own people, for all the world loves a great horse.

MAN O' WAR READY FOR CUP RACE

SARATOGA, N. Y., August 28.—S. D. Riddle's champion three-year-old Man o' War was worked a mile and a half in 2:35 1/2 here this morning for his engagement in the Saratoga Cup Tuesday. The great son of Fair Play galloped along with that same grace of motion and dazzling speed that has characterized all his work and racing this year, and it required the best efforts of his rider to restrain him from going faster than his trainer desired. He is in prime condition and ready to meet Sir Barton in the big race Tuesday.

SOURCE OF ARMY REMOUNTS

Without Racing There Would Be No Cavalry Horses Within the Next Ten Years.

SARATOGA, N. Y., August 28.—About 1,500 representative horsemen and persons interested in racing attended the meeting in the paddock at which officers of the National Remount Association were heard in their plan for co-operation in the work of army horse improvement. Colonels Koch and Scott, the latter in active charge of the work at headquarters in Washington, explained at length the aims and hopes of the organization and asked for the co-operation of everybody interested in breeding and racing and also in the matter of national defense, which they said were linked together.

In the course of Colonel Koch's remarks he made it plain that the army depended absolutely upon the race tracks for its supply of thoroughbred sires which would be placed at various breeding centers throughout the United States, and added: "The army stands ready to testify to this fact whenever racing is assailed." Colonel Scott, in a brief outline, sketched the plan under which the \$254,000 appropriation will be distributed, and made an urgent appeal to the spectators to become members of the Remount Association and afterward to canvass their friends and secure their co-operation. He stated that the organization, though in its infancy, was successful beyond the most sanguine expectations of its promoters and that interest in the movement now extended from coast to coast.

An impressive statement and one which carried conviction was made by Colonel Koch to the effect that without racing there would be no cavalry remounts in the United States within the next ten years. There are now some fifty thoroughbred sires at the various breeding centers and remount depots in the United States. Colonel Scott declared that it is imperative that at least one hundred more sires of the proper type should be distributed before next spring. It was hoped that a large number would be secured through the medium of the military races which the various racing associations had planned to give a place upon their programs. The fact that the first one offered at this point on Friday failed to fill is not conclusive evidence that horsemen will fail to realize the importance of entering suitable stallions in such contests at a later date. Under the revised conditions the government will add \$750 to the premium offered by the racing associations, which will give the owner approximately \$1,750 for his animal.

At the conclusion of the addresses a large number of new members were secured, the first to join being George H. Bull, secretary and treasurer of the Saratoga Association for the Improvement of the Breeding of Horses, who became a life member.

BLUE GRASS FAIR MONDAY

Good Card of Running Races Provided—W. R. Coe's Stallions and Mares Shipped West.

LEXINGTON, Ky., August 28.—The Blue Grass Fair will open here Monday and the racing program includes a good card of five races. The mile race, for three-year-olds and over, which was programmed as the fourth race, failed to fill; and the fifth, which drew sixteen entries, was split to make up the card. The opening race is one of more promise than usually is found on a card at any fair.

Sewell Combs, chairman of the committee in charge of the racing, expressed himself as highly pleased with the program. The track will be in good condition by Monday providing there is no more rain.

Cyrus Field Clark, trainer for J. H. Loucheim, is here with Tenite and Colonel Lit. The former is to be operated on by Dr. Finch for an affection of the wind and Colonel Lit is to be turned out as soon as the fall racing is over. At the Kentucky Jockey Club's track Clark will take up seven yearlings by Granite belonging to Mr. Loucheim and will break them.

John Miller left here this week for W. R. Coe's Shoshone ranch, Cody, Wyo., with the stallions Polymelian and Over There and the mares Athlete, Bet, Cushion, Porfar, Masked Dancer, Herodias and Pasquita. They have been at Hinyar Stud, where Swaeon, also owned by Mr. Coe, is to remain for the season of 1921.
