LONG DISTANCE RACING FINE FIELD FOR HOPEFUL STAKES

THREE HORSES IN A FALL

Belmont Park Meeting Promises Revival of Old-Fashioned Sport.

Fine Array of Entries for Jockey Club Stakes and Autumn Gold Cup.

NEW YORK, N. Y., August 30.—September racing at Belmont Park will be characterized by a brilliant revival of old-fashioned long distance racing of the quality that made Sheephead Bay, Brighton Beach and Morris Park tremendously popular gathering places of lovers of stirring sport in the days that are now but a sweet memory.

The Jockey Club Stakes, a weight-for-age race for three-year-olds and over, at one mile and a half, that was instituted last year and won without opposition by Samuel C. Hildreth's capital three-year-old Purchase, will be renewed; the Autumn Gold Cup, a handicap at two miles for three-year-olds and over, will have its inaugural running. These will be \$5,000 added money affairs. And in addition to the \$5,000 stakes, a splendid golden trophy will be presented to the owner of the winner of the Autumn Gold Cup by the Westchester Racing Association.

In not a quarter of a century have two American races to run over long distances of ground drawn groups of entries more formidable than those named to start in The Jockey Club Stakes and the Autumn Gold Cup. These races bid fair to bring into competition thoroughbreds capable of reviving by the quality of their racing the best traditions of the Annual Champion, the Century, the Brighton Cup, the Municipal Handicap and the Belmont Park autumn weight-for-age race, famous specials at distances ranging from one mile and a half to two miles and a quarter that rarely failed in their successive renewals to bring together America's best long-distance running thoroughbreds and to develop spirited contests. It is early to be attempting a forecast of The Jockey Club Stakes and Autumn Gold Cup fields. But some idea of the possibilities of the two races may be got by an inspection of their rosters of eligibles.

BEST OF YEAR ENTERED.

Foremost among the nominations for The Jockey Club Stakes, which closed last November, are Samuel D. Riddle's champion three-year-old Man o' War and Commander J. K. L. Ross' champion four-year-old Sir Baloo. Other distinguished eligibles are Samuel C. Hildreth's Mad Hatter, winner of the first Latonia Championship; W. R. Cox's three-year-old filly Cleopatra; Harry Payne Whitney's John P. Grier, Upset and Wildair; Montfort Jones' Ethel Gray; William Martin's Bridesman; Captain Ral Parr's Blazes, and Joseph E. Widener's Fair Gain.

John P. Grier excepted, the same horses are in the Autumn Gold Cup, with Mr. Hildreth's Tracery Colt, Cirrus, Willis Sharp Kilmer's Exterminator, George W. Loft's three-year-olds Donnacorn and On Watch, Captain Parr's Kentucky Derby winner, Paul Jones, and Commander J. K. L. Ross' iron horse, Boniface.

Paul Jones, the best horse that has been sired in America by Thomas Fortune Ryan's Persimmon stallion Sea King, which fell lame at Latonia late in June preparing for the Latonia Derby, is training soundly again and Exterminator is at the top of his form. This great McGee gelding and Paul Jones are the only unsexed horses of consequence in the Autumn Gold Cup. They will not start in The Jockey Club Stakes because that race is restricted, and properly, to entire colts and fillies, thoroughbreds physically qualified to improve the breed of horses.

Upset probably is the horse James Rowe will send out under the silks of Harry Payne Whitney in the Autumn Gold Cup. This son of Whisk Broom II, races like an old-fashioned long-distance runner and he is training soundly, none the worse for his attempt to overtake the flying Man o' War in the Travers Stakes. Boniface, which is not in The Jockey Club Stakes because neither Commander Ross nor his trainer, H. G. Bedwell, suspected last fall that the son of Transvaal would improve this year into a high-class handicap horse, will go in the Cup.

Other Cup possibilities are Gladiator, Thunderstorm, Irish Dream, Bell solar, Sandy Beal and La Rablee. Perhaps the most formidable of these is Sandy Beal. Another Supermax colt, Sandy Beal jumped into the spotlight at Havre de Grace last April by beating Paul Jones, Wildair and Blazes in the \$5,000 Chesapeake Stakes. Sandy Beal had a training mishap shortly after accomplishing that feat, but rest and good treatment have restored him to soundness and usefulness. He is going promisingly in his work.

For the second time during the Kempton Park meeting Jockey Foden rode three winners at that track Saturday.

It has been found necessary to destroy the Flying Fox horse Herode, which was standing at the Haras du Pin stud in France.

G. J. Baker announces that G. W. Mallard, a Toledo man, has bought Hackamore and will turn the colt over to him to train.

E. L. Snyder has decided to convert the Canadian bred Rave On into a jumper and will commence schooling him on his arrival at Connaught Park, Ottawa.

EIGHTEEN HIGH CLASS TWO-YEAR-OLDS NAMED TO STRIVE FOR SARATOGA'S RICHEST PRIZE --- LEONARDO II. AND PRUDERY THE FAVORITES

There are eighteen crack two-year-olds named to start in the rich Hopeful Stakes at Saratoga today. The Harry Payne Whitney and J. K. L. Ross establishments have strong representation in the race, each having a quartet of star youngsters. The Whitney aggregation comprises Prudery, Ararat, Exodus and Dartmoor, while the Ross representatives are Star Voter, Intrigante, Registrar and the newly acquired Sailing B., bought Sunday from E. Herz at private terms. Leonardo II. and Serapis will carry the colors of James W. McClelland. Nancy Lee, Smoke Screen, Oriole and Step Lightly are the more prominent of the other overnight acceptances.

On the eve of the big race it appears as if Leonardo II. will go to the post favorite, but Prudery, queen of the two-year-old fillies of the year, will not lack supporters, her smashing victory in the Spinaway Stakes Saturday confirming the previously held high opinion of her racing prowess and adding to her already long list of admirers.

The field is certainly one of the best ever programmed for this valuable fixture, and a great contest is in prospect, with the possible crowning of the two-year-old champion of the year included in its decision.

OPENING DAY AT OTTAWA AUSTRALIAN BETTING TAXES

Second and Final Meeting of Year at Connaught Park Begins Today With Excellent Program.

Over Two Millions Collected During 1919-1920 Closing July 1 Last—How They Have Grown.

OTTAWA, Ont., August 31.—The stage is set for the opening tomorrow of the second meeting of the year under the auspices of the Connaught Park Jockey Club. The Queen City Purse at a mile, and the Autumn Purse at three-quarters, both for three-year-olds and over, will feature the opening program.

Entries for the inaugural card filled well and early insuring whole-hearted co-operation of the horsemen in filling the attractive races scheduled for the seven days of racing.

A six-car special run from Windsor arrived here this morning bringing about seventy-five horses, including the Canadian division of the J. K. L. Ross establishment in care of Fred Schelke.

A large number of horses have been stabled here at Connaught Park for the last week or more. Included in this number are those of H. Tullett, J. Hope, T. Hodge, J. W. Pangle, C. A. Crew, D. Raymond, W. H. Cissna, J. Phillips, G. Foley, L. Marion, E. T. Zollcofer and M. Gorman.

The mutual department has been altered somewhat since the first meeting. The principal improvement made was the straightening out of the cashiers' windows, part of which formerly were built at right angles to the others. This feature will relieve much of the congestion.

Sam Spencer will supervise the plant and will have as his first assistant Dave Heisman.

Joseph McLeannan, J. B. Campbell and Larry O'Brien were arrivals from Windsor this morning. Steeplechase jockey E. Landry suffered a broken leg this morning when the horse he was schooling bolted into the wing of a jump.

AMERICANS BUY RICHLY IN FRANCE

At the annual sale of thoroughbreds at the Establisments Cheri, Deauville, held August 12, the bay filly, Karlie, 1919, by Prince Palatine—Karmanie, was sold to John Sanford, the American turfman, for \$25,000.

At the same sale A. K. Macomber purchased the chestnut filly, Westminster Bells, 1919, by Fancheur Wedding Bells II., for \$9,600, and the yearling filly, Eudora, by Maintenon—Iсадore II., for \$20,000. Another purchase by Mr. Macomber was Fanatique, a yearling bay filly, by Alcantara II.—Fata Morgana, for \$8,600.

SPION KOP FAVORITE FOR ST. LEGER

Speculation has begun over the St. Leger, last of the English classics, to be run for at Doncaster, September 8. For it Spion Kop, the Derby winner, is favorite at around 2 to 1, with Archicat 5 to 1, Orpheus, Silvern and Black Gauntlet, 10 to 1 each, and Braishfield, 14 to 1.

FLORAL TRIBUTE FOR CUP WINNER

Schenectady Lodge of Elks, No. 480, will contribute a fine floral offering to the winner of the Saratoga Cup to be run today. It is announced by members of the lodge that the offering is in recognition and appreciation of the sport at Saratoga.

SYDNEY, N. S. W., Australia, July 20.—The government of New South Wales, Australia, derived a revenue of \$2,021,882 from betting taxes for the year up to July 1, 1920. In the previous year the taxes amounted to \$1,298,450. Of the former amount, bookmakers, racing clubs and ticket stamp duty gave \$896,732 and the totalizer \$1,115,150. The volume of betting was so much heavier during the recent year that stamp duty was paid on 5,588,193 more tickets than in 1918-19, and the increase in revenue from that source was about \$163,320. If the suggestion of an increased ticket tax is carried out, it will be a big item this year.

The amounts received from bookmakers indicate an increase in their ranks, and the racing clubs have also made much heavier payments from bookmakers' fees than in 1918-19. As compared with 1917-18 the revenue received by the state from betting has more than doubled. For that year the total was \$997,977, of which \$414,010 came from the totalizer. Now the machine is contributing more than all the other sources.

ONLY FOUR RACES AT BLUE GRASS FAIR

Muddy Track Cause of One Race Being Declared Off—Pat Dunne Back from Saratoga.

LEXINGTON, Ky., August 30.—The Blue Grass Fair opened here today. The racing program originally included five races, but owing to changed track conditions the fourth race, at one mile, was declared off and only four races were run.

The track, after a heavy rain yesterday afternoon and last night, was muddy, and although the weather was warm and threatening the attendance was large.

Messrs. Sam C. Nuckles, Jr., and R. L. Baker, who arrived last night from Windsor, and W. H. Shelley, who also is racing secretary, were in the judges' stand. William Snyder is the starter and Gen. Elrod, who arrived last night from Windsor, is in charge of the pari-mutuels.

Pat Dunne, accompanied by Mrs. Dunne and their son Francis, arrived last night from Saratoga. His horses also came. He brought Under Fire, Kate Fraley, Porte Drapenu, Judge David, Old Faithful, Handsweep, Triumphant, Goldie Rose and Convoy. This morning he took into the string Omond, which was fired and turned out and will now be put into condition for winter racing.

In the car with the Dunne horses came Lady Alyg and Rockland, to be retired to brood mare ranks at John E. Madden's Hamburg Place, and Servitor, to be turned out at Phil T. Chin's Hammar Stud.

John B. McLaughlin, supervisor of pari-mutuels on the Kentucky tracks, came in this morning from Windsor.

COSTLY ENGLISH COLT GONE WRONG

Westward Ho, the English two-year-old colt by Swyward—Blue Tit, for which Lord Glanely paid the record price of \$57,500 as a yearling, has been struck out of all engagements in 1920. He is a heavy colt with suspicious legs.

Dunboyne One of Them and Limps After the Accident.

Abadane Easy Winner of Amsterdam Stakes—The Porter Takes His Race.

SARATOGA, N. Y., August 30.—A spectacular fall, luckily devoid of any serious results, came in the last thirty yards of the fifth race, and three horses with their jockeys piled in a heap, giving the occupants of the grandstand much concern for the safety of the fallen riders. The fall came as a result of War Marvel, in second place and fighting it out with War God, swerving and interfering with the latter. In his effort to save himself caroming into the fence, Robinson on War God attempted to take him back, and in doing so must have caused the horse to cross his legs and fall. Dunboyne, nearest to him with Schuttinger up, was unable to steer clear of the prostrate horse and somersaulted over him, to be followed soon by Turner on Pilgrim. Schuttinger and Robinson quickly scrambled to their feet and instinctively rolled under the fence. Turner was only semi-conscious for a time, but succeeded after a while in walking to the jockeys' quarters, where examination showed him to have sustained a torn shoulder ligament and shaking up generally. He will be out of the saddle for at least a week. Dunboyne got up limping, but the other horses were seemingly none the worse for their tumble. The stewards immediately began interrogating jockey Rodriguez and later sent for Robinson. After having the statements of the two riders who figured chiefly in bringing about the fall the stewards disqualified War Marvel and gave Salvestra second place and Red Red Rose third. Both had been beaten off, but by virtue of avoiding the fallen ones, coupled with the disqualification, secured a portion of the purse. Lion d'Or, the winner, was in front after displacing Dunboyne on the stretch turn and was winning easily when the fall came.

Probably due to a belief that a muddy track would be the rule this afternoon on account of rains during the night, the different dashes were reduced by withdrawals to small numbers, but, contrary to expectations, the going was firm and fast time came in those dashes where the better grade of horses started.

The Amsterdam Stakes at one mile under selling conditions was intended as the feature, but was overshadowed by several of the other dashes, the mile handicap bringing together The Porter, Lunetta and Bridesman among the starters, displacing the stakes in point of interest.

PURSES OF STAKE PROPORTIONS.

A pro-rata division of the surplus fund accrued from Friday and Saturday's bidding up in selling claiming races caused an increase to this afternoon's purses commensurate to stake proportion. As a matter of fact, the \$1,950 net that the winner of the Amsterdam Stakes received was far less than any of the winners in the other dashes received. The fourth and fifth races had the substantial sums of \$2,907.29 as their respective purse money and \$2,707.20 was allotted in each instance to the first, third and sixth race.

Larry Waterbury's Abadane, an overwhelming favorite, was returned the winner of the Amsterdam Stakes and his success was achieved in easy style, for he drew away from Elected II., the early pace-setter, with ease after rounding into the stretch. Elected II. had little difficulty in leading Mint Cat to the finish, with Manoeuvre following far back.

E. B. McLean's The Porter, which is rated with the best and has been a starter here several times, finally managed to score the first purse he has taken down since his Kentucky victories. He showed fine form in keeping pace with the speedy Lunetta under restraint and drew away in the stretch when Lyke called on him to win as the rider pleased.

Lyke ran a good race to outstay Bridesman with ease for second place.

Our Flag, carrying W. S. Kilmer's silks, showed a crack performance in the final race in taking the purse from Hildur, with Sedgewick in third place. Hildur and Pagan Pan set out as if they would dictate the others, but Pagan Pan soon gave way and Hildur appeared a certain winner after he reached the stretch, but Our Flag, having begun slowly, closed an immense gap and literally ran away from Hildur in the last sixteenth. Hildur stayed off the threatening rush of Sedgewick and landed second place handily.

FAUNUS FURNISHES UPSET.

Joseph Marrone's Faunus furnished an upset in the second race, which he won from Wedgewood and Ingleside. Chevalier and Rancocas absorbed the most betting attention here, but figured scantly in the running. Rancocas' failure might have been due to his quarter mile runaway before the start, for he failed to show much speed. Faunus was entered for \$2,500 and

WINDSOR'S RECORD RACE MEETING

ALL PREVIOUS CANADIAN FIGURES FOR SEVEN DAYS' RACING SURPASSED WHEN \$109,460 WAS DEDUCTED IN STAKES AND PURSES

A record-breaking meeting in every respect. Such was the Windsor Jockey Club's second and final meeting of the present year. All previous Canadian records for a seven-day meeting were smashed when \$109,460 was distributed in stakes and purses, the daily average distribution reaching the high figure of \$15,637. The attractive stake and purse offerings brought to the Windsor track probably the best horses that were ever assembled at that course, including notable representatives from the powerful stables of J. K. L. Ross and H. P. Whitney also figuring conspicuously, the following being those who won over \$1,000 or more each:
