GOOD CARD AT DEVONSHIRE

Polythia Victress in Border Chamber of Commerce Handicap.

Eddie Rickenbacher Wins Secondary Feature and Breaks the Track Record Doing So.

WINDSOR, Ont., September 2.—An excellent card was provided for the second day's racing at Devonshire Park today, which was run under ideal conditions and another large crowd was in attendance. The Border Chamber of Commerce Handicap for two-year-olds at three-quarters of a mile, with \$3,500 added, served as the feature and resulted in a thrilling finish with the three placed horses finishing heads apart. The winner turned up in F. Dahnken's Polythia, a speedy daughter of Polymellian. She raced in third position until after rounding the far turn, then moved up to the leaders and, taking the lead in the stretch, appeared an easy winner. The final sixteenth found Polythia tiring and she was forced to a hard drive to earn the verdict by a head margin. Loveliness made a game effort after contesting the early leadership with Ina Wood.

The secondary feature, a three-quarter mile handicap, run as the fourth race, aroused equally as much interest. J. R. Skinker's Eddie Rickenbacher showed the way to his opponents all the way and set such a dizzy pace that he reduced the track record for the distance to 1:11 1/4, a most creditable effort for a three-year-old with 120 pounds up.

Closing with good courage in the stretch, Glastoff scored an easy victory over a band of ordinary performers in the curtain-raiser. Alf Vesina finally graduated from the maiden ranks when he accounted for the second, a three-quarter mile dash for maidens. While en route to the post for this race Tom Logan ran away a mile before jockey Mangin succeeded in pulling him up.

War Zone took the measure of some good horses when he beat Lord Herbert and Vulcanite after a mild drive in the third race.

For insouciance while at the post for the fourth race jockey Kennedy was set down for two days by starter Tribe.

Trainer Fred Fox reports Ed Glasco's Miss Edwards to be threatened with a bow and will be out of commission for the remainder of the year. Rex Gaiety is temporarily on the shelf, but may race later on.

C. Buxton will ship his string of eleven head to Jamaica at the conclusion of this meeting. Jockey M. Buxton will accompany the stable.

Jockey J. Brown, who is under contract to Ed Moore, made his debut in the saddle at this course today.

W. C. Weant will ship his stable to Toronto following the close here and jockey Chivavetta will also go along.

The books of the Thorncliffe Park meeting, which opens at Toronto on September 17, are now in the printer's hands. No purse will be of less value than \$1,200 and the majority of the overnight races call for \$1,500 added money.

S. N. Holman was a visitor here today interesting horsemen in a thirteen days' running meeting that he is promoting at Chargin Falls, near Cleveland, Ohio, from September 18 to October 2.

Jockey J. Heupel, at the close of this meeting, will depart for Havre de Grace, where he will ride for Owen Pons.

La Chevense was ordered scratched from the sixth race for lack of sufficient identification. The horse was bred in France and is owned by Dr. W. P. Harlos and trained by O. Ryerson.

Jockey Yeargin was unseated from Archie Alexander after the field had run an eighth in the sixth race, but the rider escaped unhurt.

JOCKEY CARMODY'S ENGLISH CAMPAIGN

Here is a note from Newmarket, England, dated August 6, from young Carmody, the American rider, who is there trying his fortune in English racing, and seeking to follow the footsteps of Tod Sloan, Danny Maher, Winnie O'Connor, the Reiffs and other American riders:

"I am here at Newmarket and will begin riding at the September meetings and shall probably be given mounts from the stables of Baron de Kotschuld, Lord Derby, Lord Jersey, Lord Lonsdale and others until the season for flat racing closes, near the end of November.

"The training grounds at Newmarket are much different from those of American racing centers. One can see 2,000 horses in training here of the highest type. Then they have different ways of shipping horses here from the methods in America. Greater care is exercised, as the races are only from two to four days at each track and it requires that the racers be moved often. It would be a revelation to some American trainers and stable attaches to see how the stables and racing quarters are kept. All the stables are of brick, large, clean, and with every convenience. Owners have great respect for trainers and the men who take care of their horses and the boys also show due respect for their employers. I have seen several men around seventy-five years old galloping horses in the morning along with young apprentices of sixteen. I have seen, at times, as many as thirty-five horses sent on the course in one set and all in the pink of condition."

Pimlico System of Free Entrance Common Feature of Rich Races—Melbourne Cup Most Valuable.

In Australia June 1 is generally known as Nomination Day, because a large number of the most important races given by the big clubs close for entries on that day. Owners are generously treated in the matter of the initial cost of making nominations, as the following list of richly endowed stake races, which closed last June 1, will serve to show:

The stake races for spring meetings of 1920 are yet to be run, the Australian spring being our autumn. The famous Melbourne Cups, a spring fixture, and run over the Flemington track at Melbourne in the first week of November.

Commenting on this, the Australasian says: "There is no fee required at the time of nomination for such rich events as the A. J. C. Derby (\$30,000 added) and Victoria Derby (\$15,000 added), while the first forfeit in each case (not due until more than fifteen months hence) is only \$5. What owner would, with conditions so easy, deliberately miss the chance of posing as the possessor of a Derby candidate? There are no such easy conditions attached to the English 'classics.' Take this year's Epsom Derby. The lowest cost at which a nomination could have 'got out' was \$25, and then only seven months after the nomination."

NO PROFITEERING.

There is no "profiteering" spirit shown by the leading clubs of Australia. On the contrary, they have put up prizes, but, speaking generally, not prices. Owners who have so many burdens to shoulder in the way of increased wages, increased cost of horse feed, and increased charges in many other directions should at least be grateful for this consideration. The breeding of thoroughbred horses shows no decline in Australia, and it is likely that all the "young" races will fill well, and the same remark applies to such important handicaps as the Melbourne Cup, Caulfield Cup and Metropolitan. The entry fee in the case of these three events is only \$10 each horse, and weights can be seen for that comparatively small sum.

The V. R. C. authorities have put up the value of such events as the Maribyrnong Plate, Sires' Produce Stakes, St. Leger and Oaks, but the Melbourne Cup and Victoria Derby have not been touched. The amount added to the Melbourne Cup is \$35,000, and the usual trophy, of the value of \$150, goes to the owner of the winner. It is still the richest race in Australia. The sweepstake is \$250, which will help to further swell the prize money.

A new race, the Cantala Stakes, was instituted last year by the V. R. C., and it at once "caught on." It is run in place of the Coburg Stakes on the first day of the spring meeting, the distance being a mile. The club adds \$12,500. It is a race on the lines of the A. J. C. Epsom Handicap, and it is hoped that the Cantala Stakes and the Melbourne Cup will in time become a popular double.

The V. A. T. C. kept up stakes during the continuance of the war, and now increases are announced. The stakes of the Caulfield Cup has gone up to \$32,500, and there is also a \$500 gold cup for the owner of the winning horse. The value of the race does not so nearly approach the value of the Melbourne Cup, as the figures suggest, as owners' contributions (and they have been raised) are retained by the club, whereas they are in the case of all Flemington events added to the prize money. Still, the inducement to enter for an event like the Caulfield Cup is strong.

The stakes of the Australian Hurdle Race, Australian Steeplechase and Caulfield Guineas have all gone up. Already an important event, the Caulfield Guineas promises to reach a still higher level. An additional 1,000 guineas has been put on the prize money, and the cost of starting has been made no higher. Run over an easier distance than the Derby, the popularity of the event will go on increasing.

The Australian Jockey Club is financially the strongest club in Australia. It has made immense strides during the past twenty years and now the Australian Jockey Club Derby is by general consent the leading classic race, as the Melbourne Cup is the leading handicap, of the Commonwealth. The club has raised its subsidy from \$25,000 to \$30,000, and the liberal conditions in regard to payments remain as last year. The sweepstakes is \$100.

LADDER OF LIGHT WINNER

Takes Ottawa's Main Race, Aided by Butwell's Good Riding—E. T. Zollicoffer Scores a Double.

OTTAWA, Ontario, September 2.—G. W. Beardmore's Stanhope II.—Missing Link mare Ladder of Light, favored by a concession in the weight scale and an excellent ride by jockey Butwell, accounted for the Sovereign Handicap at a mile for Canadian-bred three-year-olds and over this afternoon, winning by a length from St. Paul, with Azrael in third place. Butwell saved the Beardmore mare in behind Flame to the far turn and took the lead, after which he withstood a challenge from St. Paul just after the leaders straightened out in the stretch and drew away again under a vigorous ride. St. Paul, away in a tangle, worked his way to the leader on the outside, but tired in the final eighth.

E. T. Zollicoffer scored a double, winning the third race, a purse race for maidens at a mile with Elmout, and the fourth at three-quarters with Hindoostan. Jockey Thurber rode both of the Zollicoffer horses.

Sweet Bouquet was piloted to an easy victory in the first race, the conditions of which called for maiden jockeys, by J. Grune. He took the Seagram colt to the front and, rating him well, was never seriously menaced.

Steeplechase rider N. Brooks returned to the saddle today after his fall from Rhomb on the opening day of the meeting, and scored with Stucco.

J. W. Healy is pointing J. Lamsden's Free State and J. L. Murphy's Oceanic for the three-year-old steeplechase races at Blue Bonnets. Mr. Healy recently refused an offer of \$3,000 for the Lamsden jumper.

Phil Leydecker is an arrival from Montreal, where his horses have been racing throughout the summer.

C. I. Wilson, represented in the third race yesterday by Charley Boy, claimed Fair Lassie from T. Hodge for \$2,500 and the latter took Sans Peur II. from E. F. Zollicoffer out of the sixth race for \$1,900. T. Hodge had Blazonry in the race.

Due to the generosity of the Connaught Park Jockey Club, Dustin Farnum, third to finish in the steeplechase yesterday, was awarded the show portion of the purse, although not entitled to the division because of consuming more than time allowance in completing the course.

Jockey T. Nolan was suspended by the stewards for the remainder of the meeting for cutting across in front of the others, going to the far turn with Myrtle Crown in the second race yesterday.

Jockey W. Anderson, under contract to Frank Delbario, the Cuban horseman, is an arrival from Saratoga. The Delbario horses are stabled at Dufferin Park.

Sam Nesbitt was among the day's arrivals.

NEAR THE \$100,000 MARK

Exterminator Fast Climbing to Charmed Circle—Now on Threshold of Thoroughbred Hall of Fame.

W. S. Kilmer's Exterminator, twice winner of the Saratoga Cup, in addition to many other notable turf triumphs, is fast approaching the charmed circle of the winners of \$100,000 or more. He has now to his credit the sum of \$94,549, the result of four years of successful campaigning over the different tracks of this country and Canada.

With many valuable stake engagements during the fall meetings in New York, Maryland and Kentucky and racing in the form he displayed in establishing a new American track record of 2:56 1/2 for one mile and three-quarters in winning the Saratoga Cup, it is more than likely that Exterminator will soon pass the coveted \$100,000 mark.

Exterminator justly holds high rank among the best horses of the present day. In him are found the qualities of a truly great horse. Speedy, a capital weight carrier and a stayer of the old-fashioned kind able to run equally as well over a heavy or fast track, Exterminator is well entitled to enter the hall of thoroughbred fame. LEXINGTON PROGRAM BOOK IS OUT

LEXINGTON, Ky., September 2.—The book for the seven days of the Kentucky Jockey Club's fall meeting here, beginning Saturday, September 18, was distributed to horsemen this afternoon by Judge W. H. Shelley, racing secretary. There are forty-nine races to be decided during the meeting, of which two are stakes, the Lexington Cup Handicap of \$5,000 added, to be decided September 22, and the Breeders' Futurity, \$2,500 added, to be run on the closing day. All other days there will be one race for \$1,200 added and six races for \$1,000 each added.

The added money of the Epsom Handicap has been lifted to \$15,000, while the Metropolitan is kept at \$25,000. The Australian Jockey Club Sires' Produce Stakes of 1922 (for which nomination of sires is now required) has \$20,000 of club money attached to it. It is the richest prize for a two-year-old event ever announced by an Australian racing club. The value of the Australian Jockey Club St. Leger of 1922 has also been increased.

There is a sweepstake of \$85 attached to the Williamstown Cup, which will go to swell the value (already substantial) of that important event. There is also a trophy, value \$500, while a trophy value \$125 and \$2,500 constitutes the stake of the Bendigo Cup, the distance of which event has been increased to a mile and three-eighths. There are notable increases in the prize money of the West Australian Derby and Karrakatta Plate, and the Queensland Turf Club has made substantial additions to the Queensland Derby and St. Leger. The Adelaide events announced are on the old lines.

NATURALIST'S GAME FINISH

Brings Him Victory in a Fast Run Manhattan Handicap.

Belmont Park's Auspicious Opening Marked by Excellent Racing Before a Big Crowd.

NEW YORK, N. Y., September 2.—The opening of the fall racing season on the metropolitan circuit brought with it the first tangle of fall weather and a big mid-week crowd. Belmont Park looked spick and span, and while the fields were not large a lively interest was taken in the outcome of the feature races, the Tomboy Handicap, for two-year-olds, and the Manhattan Handicap, for three-year-olds and over.

The Tomboy Handicap brought a head finish between E. R. Bradley's chestnut filly Believe Idle Hour and E. F. Whitney's bay filly By Jimmy. It was a duel between the two for the last sixteenth, the Bradley filly getting the decision in the last few strides. Believe Idle Hour and By Jimmy both began slowly, but seemed to out-class the others when the real racing began. By Jimmy's defeat probably came about from her strenuous racing with the early leader, Tamarisk, although she kept at her task gamely when challenged by Believe Idle Hour. S. Lewis' Honey Girl was an added starter, but she did not cut much figure in the running.

Withdrawals of Sir Barton, Boniface and Lord Brighton left only four to contest for the Manhattan Handicap. Naturalist was the public choice of the quartet around 7 to 5. Naturalist proved the winner, running the mile in 1:36, within one-fifth of a second of Man o' War's time of 1:35 1/2, made in the Withers Stakes last May. Jack Stuart also ran a capital race when he finished second. Naturalist led from the start, while Jack Stuart was last until the field was straightened out in the stretch when the Valens horse made a menacing challenge, but the pace had proved a bit too fast for the lightweighted Martin racer. Audacious and Mad Hatter took it turnabout in following Naturalist most of the way, but at the end they were both tired horses, with Audacious third. For a mile run in such time it was quite a remarkable finish, no daylight showing between the four.

DISQUALIFICATION OF CARE FREE.

The second race brought about the disqualification of Care Free, which had led from the start, but fifty yards out swerved over in front of St. Michael, the odds-on choice. The swerving incident was clear and the stewards promptly took cognizance of it after jockey Kelsay claimed a foul on the part of Ensor who rode Care Free. The latter finished a half length in front of St. Michael. Care Free had some staunch support and was backed from an opening of 10 to 1 down to 8 to 1 at the close of operations.

George Odom, trainer of Oriole and other horses of Jefferson Livingston, was highly elated over the showing of Oriole in the Hopeful Stakes. "If it would have rained twenty minutes longer, Oriole surely would have been returned the winner. The showing of Oriole in his last two races make me believe he is a colt of high class. In any event I am going to give him a chance to prove it. I am going to send him to Havre de Grace to start in the Eastern Shore Handicap there. Later I will send him to Kentucky next fall to try for the rich stakes in the Blue Grass State. I also will point him for the Kentucky Derby next year if he turns out the way he now promises. I don't believe there is a two-year-old in training can beat him in heavy going."

James McClelland will ship fourteen horses to Havre de Grace today, including Leonardo II., which is entered in the \$10,000 Eastern Shore Handicap. "I am not going to sidestep any of the two-year-old stakes to which Leonardo II. is eligible," said Mr. McClelland. "I will prove to the public that Leonardo II.'s winning of the Hopeful was no fluke."

Jockey Frank Keogh was riding at Belmont Park today, but he leaves for Saratoga Saturday, to join the stable of his contract employer, S. Ross, whose horses will race at Laurel, Md.

At a meeting of the stewards of the Jockey Club today the suspension of jockey T. Rice was continued indefinitely.

MAN O' WAR'S GREAT SPEED

Champion Works Mile and a Half in 2:29 2-5—Time Faster Than American Record for Distance.

NEW YORK, N. Y., September 2.—Man o' War gave another startling display of his wonderful speed, which has already placed three American track records to his credit, when at Belmont Park this morning he worked a mile and a half in the astonishing time of 2:29 2-5. This is one-fifth of a second faster than the American record for the distance, made by Thunderclap at Laurel October 11, 1919. The Belmont Park record is 2:32 1-2. The champion was in fine fettle when brought on the track for his trial in preparation for his engagement in the Lawrence Realization next Saturday. He went the quarter in 24 1/2, half in 48, three-quarters in 1:12, mile in 1:38, mile and a quarter in 2:03 1/2 and the mile and a half in 2:29 2-5. He pulled up appearing as fresh as when he started.

BRANNON AND POOL PART COMPANY

LEXINGTON, Ky., September 2.—B. J. Brannon was an arrival today. His horses are at Latonia. He will send six or eight of them here for the fall meeting of the Kentucky Jockey Club. Brannon has parted company with jockey Earl Pool and has jockey Jimmy Burke under engagement for the fall racing.
