## ON WATCH IN GREAT FORM

**Wins the Bayview Handicap from Cirrus in Track Record Time.**

**Capt. Alcock Runs Another Fast Mile—Sea Mint Defeats Sennings Park.**

NEW YORK, N. Y., September 22.—G. W. Loft's On Watch loomed up today as a dangerous contender for the Latonia Championship Stakes when he rushed to the front at the rise of the barrier in the Bayview Handicap, at one mile and a sixteenth, the feature of the Aqueduct card, and held sway throughout, defeating Cirrus, the odds-on favorite, by three lengths. Also On Watch broke the track record for the distance by one-fifth of a second. It was made by Exterminator on June 29 of this year and stood at 1:44. Cirrus was under restraint in the early running, but when Ensor called on the Hildreth colt in the stretch he was easily held safe, although he easily took second place from Damask. Fair Gain, which had endeavored to head the leaders at a time, was a tired last. The talent had it right again in the third race, when it selected Great Gull, after Frederick the Great had been withdrawn. The Bryn Mawr gelding, after being restrained in the early running, came fast when straightened out in the stretch and won by three lengths, going away. Tarascon was the early pacemaker, but he tired badly when the real racing began. Lottery showed a good performance when he came with a rush in the last fifty yards and beat Annum by a length for second money.

Jockey Ensor's skill again brought a winner in the Glorifier, a high-weight handicap, when he landed Sea Mint the winner, a length in front of the favorite Sennings Park. The latter was off slowly and his effort to get to a contending position told on him. He seemed the winner fifty yards out, but tired near the end and just saved second place from Major Parke, which was running fastest of all at the finish. Major Parke ran probably the best race of all, for he was the victim of interference at several times in the race. Due to another energetic ride on the part of Ensor, Light Fantastic got up in the last strides to defeat the favorite Silence in the opening dash, a race for two-year-olds at five-eighths of a mile. Episode came from far back to take third money. Ross R., one of the highly considered ones, showed a flash of early speed, but tired in the stretch. Wise Dove and Tout Or, coupled as the Widener entry, were prominent in the early running. Captain Alcock demonstrated conclusively that his recent surprisingly good race was no fluke by taking up 115 pounds in the fifth race of the day and running its mile in the good time of 1:37, defeating such useful racers as Sweet Music, La Rablee, Whisk and Yung Ching with great ease. John E. Madden considered Captain Alcock highly promising when he brought him East as a two-year-old and his opinion seems to be vindicated by this slowly developing young horse. He may be capable of better things shortly. Episode, owned by J. A. Coburn, was claimed out of the first race for \$2,500 by J. Byer. Silence was claimed out of the same race for \$2,265 by G. W. Atkinson.

## GOOD SPORT AT DORVAL PARK

MONTREAL, Que., September 22.—The running of the fifth race was productive of a spirited contest in which Broom Peddler was returned a winner from Salvatelle and Hondo. Broom Peddler, ridden by Stearns, came on the outside of his opponents at the top of the stretch and raced Salvatelle into defeat in the final eighth. Spirited racing prevailed during the day and several previous winners at the meeting were again victorious. Marjorie Mignon graduated from the maiden ranks, when she led home a poor hand in the opening dash. Hayward had the mount on the winner and also scored with Sevillian in the fourth race.

The track was at its best and fine weather conditions brought out a big crowd. The majority of the winners were well supported by the talent. E. T. Zollicoffer's old cripple Highland Lad scored another victory when he defeated a number of fair sprinters in the third race. The filly Orchestra was excused by the stewards from starting in the second race. An abscess broke out in her head after being galloped. Joseph McLennan will receive entries here for the opening day's racing at Woodbine Park. The following notice was given to Presiding Steward F. Nelson this morning: "We, the stewards of the meeting of the Kempton Park Jockey Club, held at Kempton Park, La Prairie, from July 17 to 24, being of the opinion that trainer Walsh and jockey J. Smith have been sufficiently punished for the unsatisfactory ride and the sudden reversal of the horse Red Post, owned by W. T. Trenholme, have this day lifted the suspension and have placed them both in good standing." Smith will resume riding today.

## LATONIA OPENS NEXT WEDNESDAY

CINCINNATI, Ohio, September 22.—Fair Latonia will throw open its gates Wednesday, September 29, for its fall meeting of twenty-eight days. Eight richly endowed stake features and a valuable array of overnight handicaps and purse races make up an attractive program and promise racegoers in this vicinity sport of the highest quality. The second running of the Latonia Championship Stakes is the outstanding attraction of the meeting, with the Queen City Handicap and Latonia Cup also commanding a prominent place on the program. The Latonia Handicap of \$5,000 added, for three-year-olds over, at one mile and a sixteenth, is the opening day special, and a good field of horses of merit is assured from its list of sixty-eight nominations. Altogether, \$14,200 will be distributed on opening day.

## PEN ROSE DEFEATS MILKMAID

**Too Much Weight Brings Downfall of Gallant Ross Filly in Main Race at Havre.**

HAVRE DE GRACE, Md., September 22.—J. K. L. Ross' gallant filly Milkmaid attempted to concede twenty-one pounds to the speedy Pen Rose in the running of the Suffragette Handicap at the Havre track today, but failed after a game effort. Pen Rose rushed to the front soon after the start, with Milkmaid in close pursuit. They maintained that order until passing the mile post, when Milkmaid's heavy impost began to tell. In the last sixteenth Schottinger shook up Pen Rose and the daughter of Sweep, although swerving out, easily drew away from the tiring Milkmaid. The latter barely saved second place from the fast closing Rubidium, the only other starter. Another large crowd was present this afternoon and witnessed some excellent racing under ideal weather and track conditions. E. B. McLean's Flying Welshman scored a popular victory in the fourth race, defeating Phantom Fair after a stubbornly contested struggle, the outcome of which was in doubt until the last few strides. J. H. Shreve furnished the winner of the first race in his King James filly Dolly C., which led home Loughland and Toss Up, the two most favored in the speculation. Corey rode a strong finish on the winner.

Fourteen platers met in the second race and Allah, after practically setting the pace throughout, was returned the winner, with Kirah and Happy Go Lucky second and third respectively. Withdrawals removed several of the more formidable entries to the third race, leaving Mumbo Jumbo the favorite. The old gelding despite his heavy impost made good, but was tiring at the end and his winning margin was but a head. Summer Sigh, with Rodriguez up, won the sixth in a drive, with Franklin second and Master Bill third. Summer Sigh paid \$68.70 for \$2. The stewards were not satisfied with this form reversal and asked trainer W. A. Burttschell for an explanation. The horse had run previously under the handling of Burttschell and shown nothing. In the trainer's defense the stewards announced that he asked permission before the race to be allowed to instruct Rodriguez to wait with the horse, explaining that he had been told that is the manner in which the horse likes to run. Burttschell stated that he had lost on the horse in previous starts and did not back it today.

Mrs. P. I. Maller today sold Lady Emmeline to H. P. Gardner, owner of the Crown Stables. Starfinch's entry will be refused in future because of physical unfitness. J. K. L. Ross will be here Friday to confer with H. G. Bedwell concerning the proposed race between Sir Barton, Man o' War and Exterminator.

## SHILLING SAYS RACE IS SURE

**Feels Certain That Man o' War and Sir Barton Will Meet at Kenilworth Park.**

LEXINGTON, Ky., Sept. 22.—C. H. Shilling arrived this morning in charge of Star Voter, which will carry the J. K. L. Ross colors in the Breeders' Futurity. When asked regarding the report that Sir Barton, Man o' War and Exterminator would meet at Kenilworth Park for a \$50,000 purse, Shilling said that it was his understanding that the race was on and that Commander Ross had gone to New York to discuss with S. D. Riddle, owner of Man o' War, relative to details of the proposed meeting of the two horses. According to Shilling, it matters little if Exterminator is entered, as it was nearly certain that Sir Barton and Man o' War would go. The race will be at a mile and a quarter, according to Shilling, and at a weight arrangement which will set Sir Barton to carry 129 pounds and Man o' War 126. Manager Winn has not entirely given up hope of bringing Man o' War, Sir Barton and Exterminator together in a special race and stands ready to offer a big sum for a meeting of the trio at a mile and a half or a mile and three-quarters. The race is proposed to be held at Latonia some time late in October, which will enable the horses to fully get over the effects of their struggle at Kenilworth.

## CURRENT NOTES OF THE TURF

There will be no racing in Kentucky next Monday and Tuesday. Lexington closes Saturday and Latonia does not open until Wednesday. Wildair, John P. Grier and Upset are said to be the selections of trainer James Rowe to represent H. P. Whitney in the Latonia Championship Stakes. The next meeting of the Canadian Racing Association will be held at Toronto. All racing matters that were left over at the previous meeting will be acted upon. When racing flourished in Chicago, Harry Lyman was a familiar figure and well known as a painter of the portraits of many of the noted horses of that time. He has recently painted two studies of Man o' War that are well executed and of worth inspection. It is quite evident Mr. Lyman has lost none of the skill of his earlier days in the art of horse portraiture. W. G. Wilson has leased Hearts of Oak from Harry Giddings and has been again schooling him through the field at Woodbine Park in preparation for the cross-country events to be decided there. Hearts of Oak has been entered in the \$10,000 Manley Memorial Steeplechase, to be run at the Pimlico autumn meeting. This son of Basethaw has been in the stud for the past two years, where he gave promise of being a successful sire.

Acting for an eastern horseman Mr. Madden yesterday purchased of John W. Schorr the good colt John S. Reardon for \$10,000.

LEXINGTON CUP HANDICAP

Under Fire Scores a Popular Victory and Makes a New Track Record With Ease.

LEXINGTON, Ky., September 22.—Pat Dunne's sturdy colt Under Fire scored a popular victory in the Lexington Cup Handicap, worth \$4,560 net, the first of the series of long-distance races scheduled for the Kentucky autumn racing.

Under Fire to the finish came Minto II., a tired horse under his steady weight of 120 pounds, with Best Pal in third place. The latter pair had contributed extensively towards the fast pace that ruled in the early running and were responsible for Under Fire's achievement in lowering the track record for a mile and a half by three full seconds.

The former record of 2:32 1/2 was made by Piedra in the same stake race last year. Under Fire's 2:29 1/2 this afternoon is within one-fifth of a second of the Kentucky record made by Minto II. at Latonia in the Daniel Boone Handicap on the closing day of the summer meeting.

Best Pal was evidently out to dispose of his opposition in jig time, judging by the terrific pace he set from the start, but Minto II. stayed with him closely and the mile and a quarter found the Bradley representative exhausted and giving way to Minto II. The latter was by no means a beneficiary in having been subjected to his early effort of keeping pace with the leader and the combination of 120 pounds with his early exhaustive task left him a ready victim to Under Fire in the stretch.

Under Fire was admirably ridden, kept just far enough back to enable him to race at an even stride and his light weight helped him in the final stretch struggle. Though six started in the race, the leading trio at all times dominated. In addition to the money the winner received a handsome silver cup from the association.

By far the biggest attendance of the present meeting was on hand to view the sport this afternoon. The racing offering was on a par with governing conditions and brought to the post some of the best now in these parts.

The three-quarters purse for fillies brought about a rattling finish between Viva America and Cotton Blossom. This pair fought stubbornly in the stretch after having been prominent from the start and Viva America just managed to last long enough to win. Cotton Blossom was in advance of Arrow Point, which headed the others, in third place.

Both two-year-old dashes on the card brought to the post some crack youngsters and both were captured by representatives carrying the silks of former Senator Johnson M. Camden, Bangson, a good-looking son of Light Brigade, triumphed in the first dash and Bettina, also sired by Light Brigade, took into camp the fine band that started in the sixth race.

Meliora and Kennedy proved a strong combination in the opener and came home in advance of Dancing Spray. J. C. Stone, on which Kennedy had the mount in the third race, proved fickle in his failure to land better than third, Cantiever, an extreme outsider, winning after having led for the entire way, with Kimpalong in second place.

J. C. Stone might have won but for Kennedy's faulty judgment in taking him to the inside, which resulted in his being pocketed in the stretch and unable to stride freely.

Frank J. Kelly intends to have two representatives in the Breeders' Futurity here, and the colts Gangway and Greater America will be shipped from Latonia in charge of trainer George Land.

Former Senator Joseph W. Bailey of Texas was among the visitors and will be here for the remainder of the meeting.

Jockey Heinrich was suspended by the starter for the remainder of the meeting for disobedience at the post.

O. L. Foster claimed Iwinwin from the closing race for \$1,500.

E. R. Bradley returned this morning from the East and will remain in Kentucky for the rest of the racing.

News was received this morning of the injury of Harry Holden, prominent in New Orleans racing. He was hurt in an automobile accident.

The interval of three days between the close here and the opening at Latonia will afford ample opportunity to owners to ship their horses to the Milldale track despite the acute shortage of express cars.

Notwithstanding the ravages made by the world war, the breeding of thoroughbreds in France has not only survived, but is in a better position today than ever before.
