



A. K. MACOMBER RETURNS

Will Retain His American Stable as Well as One in France.

Tells of Vanderbilt Establishment. Stallions Negofol and Nassovian Arrive Safely.

NEW YORK, N. Y., October 4.—A. K. Macomber, who has recently bought the various breeding and racing establishments of the late W. K. Vanderbilt in France, was a visitor at Jamaica today.

"The fact that I have taken over the establishment of the late Mr. Vanderbilt does not mean that I have deserted the United States. I have twenty or more promising youngsters in California by such horses as Star Hawk, Dodge and War Star and these are destined for racing in the East.

When asked about his French purchases Mr. Macomber said the Vanderbilt stable was not secured to fortify his own establishment, which was already almost as extensive as that of the late New York sportsman. In all, about one hundred and twenty-five head were acquired.

It is Mr. Macomber's intention to visit California before returning to France. The steamer Mohegan, which arrived in New York this morning, had the thoroughbred stallions Negofol, the property of Edward F. Simms, and Nassovian, owned by John Sanford, aboard.

Nassovian is a young and untried sire that was reared with considerable success in England by Mr. Sanford. He will be sent to the Hurriana Stud of his owner at Amsterdam in this state, where he will have the company of the Spearpoint sire The Curragh.

PIMLICO STAKES FILL WELL

BALTIMORE, Md., October 4.—A total of 893 nominations have been received for the Maryland Jockey Club Stakes, to be run at Pimlico during the autumn meeting, from November 1 to November 11.

The Walden, a mile handicap for two-year-olds, brought out 149 nominations; the Pimlico Autumn Handicap, for three-year-olds, at a mile and a quarter, has 53; the Bowie Handicap, for three-year-olds and over, at a mile and a half, 92; the Pimlico Cup Handicap, for three-year-olds and over, at two miles and a quarter, 78; Serial No. 1, for all ages, at three-quarters mile, 148; Serial No. 2, for all ages, at a mile, 145, and Serial No. 3, for all ages, at a mile and an eighth, 122.

The Many Memorial Steeplechase, for four-year-olds and over, at two and a half miles, brought 79 nominations, while the Elkridge Steeplechase, for three-year-olds, at two miles, attracted 26.

ONLY CANTER FOR DR. CLARK

Romps Home Easy Winner in Main Race at Laurel—Rodriguez Rides Well.

LAUREL, Md., October 4.—The Palatine Handicap at a mile for three-year-olds, about which the Maryland State Fair Association built its program for this afternoon, proved only a canter for H. P. Whitney's Dr. Clark, which won by a length from Herron, the Cuban Derby winner, flying the colors of E. Alvarez. J. R. Skinner's Cock o' the Roost, the only other starter, was beaten off.

Eddie Ambrose, who had the leg on Dr. Clark, rushed him into the lead at the first turn, cutting across in front of the others from the outside position. He rated the Broomstick colt along under a stout pull all the way in spite of the fact that Herron forced a fast pace, although never seriously menacing the winner.

Joe Rodriguez displayed good horsemanship in winning the first two flat races on the card with Chevalier and Chasseur, an outsider and a favorite. Chevalier won brackets in competition with a large band of two-year-olds over the three-quarters of a mile course. Rodriguez took the Uncle—Lottie Darr colt to the front and made him stick it out to win by a nose from J. E. Griffith's Pimlico, which closed with a rush. Sea Court was third.

Chasseur won handily at a mile from a shifty band asked to go a mile and a sixteenth. Rodriguez made all the pace with the Light Brigade—Pawnee colt and brought the M. J. Murphy colors home three lengths in front of Rubidium, which preceded Tantalus by two lengths. It was the third straight win for Chasseur.

Eugene Wayland graduated another maiden for W. J. Salmon in the fifth race, at a mile and seventy yards for three-year-olds and over. The pink silks were carried by Johnny Overton, a good-looking three-year-old black gelding, son of Celt—His Sister Anna, which was making the second start of his career. Well ridden by Jockey E. Fator, Johnny Overton came from behind and drew away from Pitter Patter and King George. The winner paid \$31.50 for \$2. Trench Mortar, a three-year-old Flintrock—Topiary colt, from the J. K. L. Ross string, sporting colors for the first time, drew the bulk of the backing and finished last after being a long way back at the start.

O. E. Pans' promising fencer Betsy was schooled through the field between races by Major Roberts and displayed excellent form.

Fire, which originated behind a coffee urn in one of the sandwich stands after the last race today, for a time threatened the destruction of the grandstand, but volunteer hands quickly extinguished the flame and averted serious damage. Lucky Cassidy and William P. Riggs took charge of the fire brigade.

Joe Rodriguez returned from Toronto, where he went to ride L. Garth's Irish Jig in the Grey Stakes. Jockey Crawford also returned from the Dominion city.

Jockey A. Claver has recovered from the injuries sustained in a fall at Port Erie and reported to H. G. Bedwell today, coming from Toronto.

Fred Musante got in from Canada with his horses. Jockey E. Morris was suspended for five days by the stewards for altering his weight Saturday after passing the scales to ride King George in the sixth race.

Dave Heisman and several mutual clerks left the Canadian circuit at Toronto and joined the staff of Mortimer Mahoney here.

E. K. Bryson leaves Friday or Saturday for Windsor to attend a meeting of the directors for the Devonshire Park track on Monday and will remain over to see the Sir Barton Man o' War race.

Jockey Simpson Boyle was here today awaiting instructions from E. R. Bradley, his employer. Boyle has not appeared under colors since breaking a leg in Kentucky last spring, but has been galloping horses for Jack Atkins at Toronto and will be ready to ride on short notice, although he is ten pounds heavier than when he was injured, now weighing 116.

J. Swenke claimed Austral from J. Reidel Saturday for \$1,755.

KENILWORTH MODERN RACE TRACK

WINDSOR, Ont., October 4.—Kenilworth Park, the course over which Sir Barton and Man o' War will race October 12 for a prize of \$75,000 and a \$5,000 gold cup, is one of the new Canadian tracks. Kenilworth Park racing, like the racing of the Windsor Jockey Club, the oldest racing organization in this part of Ontario, is supported mainly by the people of Detroit, now a city, counting its suburbs, of something more than 1,000,000 inhabitants. The Kenilworth Park Jockey Club has A. M. Orpen, of Toronto, for president. It was Mr. Orpen's enterprise that secured for the greatest two-horse race that will have been staged on the North American continent, as it is sure to be the richest in money value.

The appointments at Kenilworth are modern in every respect. The grandstand is of steel and concrete, large and commodious. The track is safe and fast. Preparations are well under way to entertain the largest crowd that ever witnessed a horse race in Canada.

FEE OF \$5,000 FOR JOCKEY KUMMER

It is reported that jockey C. Kummer will receive a fee of \$5,000 for riding Man o' War in the special race against Sir Barton at Kenilworth Park October 12. While it is a good round sum it is not more than Frank Keogh received from W. J. Salmon for riding Step Lightly to victory in the Futurity. Ted Rice was also reported to have received \$5,000 for bringing home Paul Jones triumphant in the Kentucky Derby. It has not been intimated what fee Earl Sand will receive in the event that Sir Barton defeats the great Man o' War, but it is certain that Commander Ross will not be less generous than his rival. One of the largest fees ever paid a jockey in this country was the \$10,000 and his passage from England and return paid to Tod Sloan by the late W. C. Whitney for riding Ballyhoo Bey in the Futurity of 1900.

The victory of Exterminator in the Ontario Jockey Club Cup at Woodbine Park Saturday places that sterling campaigner in the charmed list of winners of \$100,000 or more.

SMALL FIELDS AT JAMAICA

Vibrate First in the Lynbrook Selling Stakes—Natural Bridge Defeats Albert A.

JAMAICA, N. Y., October 4.—The Lynbrook Selling Stakes, for two-year-olds, at five and a half furlongs, at Jamaica this afternoon had only three starters, with R. T. Wilson's Dry Moon ruling a strong favorite, and was the feature race. The winner, however, turned up in Vibrate, the second choice. Vibrate followed Sea Cove closely in the early running and, taking the lead, came on to win by two lengths. Dry Moon began slowly and moved up rapidly in the stretch, but was not good enough to overhaul the winner.

The third was another three-horse affair for the better class of platers, at one mile and a quarter. The talent had it right when Natural Bridge was made the choice over Albert A. after that horse had decisively won from Natural Bridge in his previous race. Albert A. showed the way to the stretch, where Natural Bridge challenged and won going away by two lengths. Albert A. was ten lengths in advance of War Plume.

Only three platers started in the second race at one mile and seventy yards. Dorcas was a 11-to-2 shot and she ran like one, following Marie Antoinette until in the stretch, then came away to win by five lengths. Marie Antoinette was a like distance in front of Alma B.

Flambette, a good looking filly, earned brackets in the opening dash for maiden two-year-olds. Turnabout was second, three lengths back and Dewey Eve, the favorite, third. Flambette followed Winds of Chance to the stretch bend, where she took the lead and won easily. Turnabout made a game effort in the stretch drive, but was held safe. Dewey Eve began slowly, but closed a gap. Atala, one of the well backed ones, ran well.

J. Coburn, on account of illness, has disposed of all his stable but four and will go to his home in California to recuperate. He traded Bon Trom to C. Buxton for Le Glorieux. He also bought Hope Princess from H. C. Epperly. In addition he will retain Celtic Lass and Poultney. G. Coburn, his brother, will train the stable.

Stall reservations has been made at Jamaica for James Arthur's stable, which is due Wednesday from Canada. Jockey Richcreek will arrive at Jamaica today from Canada to accept mounts.

THIRTY LEADING AMERICAN JOCKEYS

J. Rodriguez is now the leading rider of the year, displacing J. Carmody, who held that coveted position since last January. Rodriguez rode six winners last week, giving him a lead of one over Carmody, who is now plying his vocation in England. The Spaniard has no singing voice on the leadership, however, as the veteran J. Butwell is close at his heels, with ninety-six winning mounts, three behind the leader. Butwell had an exceptionally good record last week with eight wins to his credit. Good as that record is, it was surpassed by L. Ensor, who piloted twelve winners, an average of two a day. From now it should be an interesting struggle for the leading riding honors of the year. Jockey E. Martin rode his first winner since his reinstatement, when he brought Bradley's Choice home first in the seventh race at Latonia Friday.

T. J. Healey has turned his apprentice rider, F. Burley, over to E. D. Springer, who will make his mounts for the remainder of the fall and winter season.

The Seagram Stable has gone into winter quarters in charge of trainer Bringle. There are said to be some promising yearlings stabled at the farm at Waterloo.

Arrangements have been practically completed for the running of two special trains from Toronto to Kenilworth Park (Windsor) the day of the race between Sir Barton and Man o' War.

It was Ballot day at Jamaica Friday. Three sons of that noted sire won races in succession, Albert A., Vice-Chairman and Recount scoring for their daddy in the third, fourth and fifth races, respectively.

George Walker has shipped the Brookdale Stable to Kenilworth, from where they will go to the farm at Barrie. The yearling crop at the farm gives good promise of developing into good racing material for next year.

Harry Giddings has decided to retire his horses to winter quarters at Oakville, Ont., following the close of the Woodbine meeting. Most of the horses in the string have been on the ailing list for some time and this fact prompted their early retirement.

FAVORITES FOR A CHANGE

Latonia Choices Do Well for the First Time This Fall.

Sway Wins from Iwin in Easy Style—Gossip Avenue Defeats Bettina Luckily.

LATONIA, Ky., October 4.—C. W. Clark's colors scored their initial success of the present meeting when Sway triumphed in the mile handicap, having an added purse value of \$2,200 and featuring today's card. Iwin landed in second place and Woodtrap led the other four starters in third place. The time of the race, 1:38, marked a good performance and indicates that Sway has returned to his best form and henceforth should be formidable in races in which he may start. Woodtrap, showing the most early speed, held command until the stretch turn was reached, where Lunsford, substituting for the regular stable rider, S. Wida, gave Sway free rein and the Clark color-carrier speedily sprinted into a winning lead and it was little effort for him to stay in advance of Iwin. The latter closed a gap after being forced to race wide most of the way. Blackie Daw made a threatening rush on the stretch turn, but the last sixteenth found him giving away steadily.

Summerlike weather was the order here this afternoon and it contributed largely to the immense attendance that witnessed the sport.

In comparison with the recent experience of favorite backers, they fared in excellent fashion during the afternoon, for most of the first choices and sharpest backed ones figured in the results and in a majority of instances were the successful ones.

Their success began with the victory of Legotal in the opening race and was followed in quick succession by Airdrie, My Rose and Sway.

Bettina in the sixth race furnished an upset by her failure, but it was not wholly her fault that she succumbed by a short margin to Gossip Avenue, for, had she had a clear course when moving up on the stretch turn, she would have probably been the victress.

C. H. Knebelkamp, who is gathering an extensive stable for winter racing, added Alberta S. by private purchase this morning from John W. Schorr. The latter does not intend racing next winter.

The second edition program book, embracing seven days from next Thursday, was distributed to owners this morning. There are two military handicaps, designed to aid the remount bureau in securing stallions for government purposes. One is at a mile and the other at three-quarters and each has a purse of \$2,000 added.

Jockey Lyde is spending his enforced vacation at the Idle Hour Farm, near Lexington, and will resume riding as soon as his ten days' suspension expires.

Pat Dunne has disposed of the contract he held on jockey King's services to John Good.

Frank J. Bruen, writing from Havana to Charles Lansdale, stated that he would leave the Cuban capital shortly for New York and Maryland and expected to reach here about October 20, to assist in the shipment of horses intended to take part in the Havana meeting.

Rogers & Masterson shipped Anticipate, Bubbling Louder, Honolulu Boy and Dr. A. to Kenilworth Park, Windsor, where they will be raced during the coming meeting.

Pat Dunne and J. Coffey were both fined nominal sums by the stewards for their failure to name respective riders for Judge David and Old Broom, as the rules require.

Track superintendent Tom Young came over from Louisville this morning to take stall reservations for the Churchill Downs track. He stated that there were many applications for stalls from owners now racing at Laurel, including the Pelican Stable and Montfort Jones. The latter, because of his failure to get the necessary sanction to winter at Oaklawn, Hot Springs, will quarter his horses at Churchill Downs for the next winter.

Nine eligibles have been secured for the Military Handicap, of \$2,000 added, at one mile, to be run here October 7. They have passed the government Remount Bureau inspection and the winner of the race qualifies for a place in one of the various government breeding depots. In addition to the purse, the Remount department will pay to the owner of the winner \$750 for the horse. Those eligible to start and on which assignments of weight will be made are: Waterwood, Sam's Boy, Rameau, Luke Dillon, Sir John Vergne, J. J. Murdock, Duke of Lancaster, Candle Light and Tim McGee.
