### DR. JOE BEATS BONIFACE **DANGEROUS IN TOMORROW'S RACE** ALL PURSE DAY AT LATONIA

**Dr. J. S. Tyree's Colt Scores Run-away Victory in Mile Handicap.**

**Baby Grand Victorious—Oceanna First in Steeplechase—Four Straight for Bridesman.**

LAUREL, Md., October 21.—A mile handicap for three-year-olds and a three-quarters mile handicap for two-year-olds divided interest in the Laurel program this afternoon. Dr. J. S. Tyree's four-year-old King James—Adeline colt Dr. Joe made a runaway race of the mile contest, beating Boniface and Wood Violet. J. K. L. Ross' Baby Grand accounted for the other race, winning in a drive from J. W. McClelland's Despair, with W. T. Grives in third place.

Dr. Joe, by running the mile in 1:39 $\frac{3}{4}$ , showed himself to be a better racer than generally rated. Schuttinger, who rode him today, waited behind Old Dad and Boniface for half a mile, after which he moved up on the outside and drew into an easy lead to win by seven lengths. Boniface easily held second place from Wood Violet.

Baby Grand's victory was not so easily earned. Grunelsen followed the pacemaker closely to the stretch turn, where he brought the Granite colt through on the inside rail as the leader went wide and put up a good finish to keep in front of Despair, which closed fast despite the fact of his bandaging having become loose and flapping about through the latter eighth of the race.

Baby Grand was the first successful favorite of the afternoon. The talent went badly amiss in its judgment in the opening dash, which brought out a field of twelve. Chinnie Walsh and Briganna, both field horses, finished first and second, with Black Top third. The field paid \$25.40. Diffidence, the favorite, finished fifth.

Oceanna, coupled with Free State as the J. Lumsden entry, and well backed as third choice, won the steeplechase, beating Tattle and Nonus.

W. L. S. Martin's Bridesman scored his fourth consecutive victory at this meeting and restored the fortunes of the talent somewhat, although his price was extremely short.

**RUBEN RETIRED FOR YEAR.**

Ruben, the Peter Quince—Belle of Ashland two-year-old colt from the string of Walter J. Salmon, has developed a quarter crack and will be retired from racing for the year. This colt, which has run twice, was originally registered as Fred Ruben, but the forepart of the name was dropped.

Natural Bridge was claimed out of the last race yesterday by Ral Parr for \$3,805. Mrs. R. L. Miller took Lough Red in the opening race for \$3,000, and C. C. Smithson paid \$4,610 for Chasseur.

Jockey Richcreek is an arrival from New York. Ral Parr's Ticket pulled up lame after the running of the Patuxent Steeplechase Handicap.

O. E. Pons ships to Jefferson Park at the conclusion of this meeting. George Brooks has wired the secretary asking for the reservation of eight stalls for his stable of jumpers, which will be shipped here at the conclusion of the Rose Tree meeting.

John Hastings has arrived from New York with the horses of M. L. Schwartz. Audacious and Enfilade are included in the string.

Jockeys Keogh, Kelsay and McAtee, mounted on two-year-olds from the stable of Samuel Ross, today posed for pictures calculated to explain the deceptive angle. These pictures will be enlarged and hung back of the judges' stand for the inspection of the public.

Mike Daly, who has been confined to his home for about a week, is up and about again.

S. P. Harlan is an arrival from New York with L. Waterbury's string, which includes Sennings Park.

Starter James Milton has received a telegram from the Gross Undertaking Co., of Hot Springs, Ark., announcing the death there of Edward Belmont, a former valet, and asking Mr. Milton's aid in locating the relatives of the deceased. #### JOCKEYS BUTWELL AND NOLAN FINED

Laurel Stewards Make Ruling Governing Disposition of All Fines.

LAUREL, Md., October 21.—For disorderly conduct in the jockey room yesterday, the following fines have been imposed: Jockey J. Butwell, \$200; jockey T. Nolan, \$100.

After the above announcement the stewards handed down the following ruling:

Whereas it may be desirable for the stewards to impose fines not exceeding two hundred dollars in any case upon persons under their jurisdiction, found guilty of infractions of minor rules where no question of turpitude is involved, but on the other hand it is not desirable that the power to fine should be exercised directly or indirectly by any one in a position to benefit financially thereby.

Now, therefore, it is ordered that all fines imposed and collected shall be disposed as follows:

Fines collected from jockeys shall be credited share and share alike to the winning jockeys of the day upon which the offense was committed, except as noted below. Fines collected from trainers shall be credited share and share alike to the winning trainers of the day upon which the offense was committed except as noted below.

Fines collected from owners or others than jockeys and trainers shall be credited share and share alike to the winning owners of the day upon which the offense was committed except as noted below.

Provided that no jockey, trainer or owner previously fined or suspended at the meeting shall participate in such disposition of money collected by means of fines.

Should a fine be imposed for an offense committed on a day where there may be no racing it shall be credited as if the offense had been committed on the next following racing day.

### ON WATCH NOW AT HIS BEST AND QUALIFIED BY PERFORMANCE AND ANCESTRAL LINES TO STAY WELL OVER A LONG ROUTE

On Watch has struck his winning stride, therefore the Latonia Championship will not be the gift it once appeared for H. P. Whitney's selected. On Watch evidently is a fall style runner. Last year he came out of the East to win Latonia's Queen City Handicap and followed this up by some stylish performances in the land from whence he came. Sent to Kentucky this spring for participation in the Kentucky Derby, On Watch was a bit slow in coming to hand, but of late has been having things all his own way, winning in quick succession the Yonkers, Bay View, Roslyn and Mineola Handicaps. On Watch, therefore, it would appear, has withstood the necessarily hurried preparation for the Kentucky Derby better than his stablemate Donnacona, which latter at Saratoga was off his form completely. The Loft pair are by no means the only ones which were placed hors de combat for the time being. Blazes has only recently proved himself, by their hurried Kentucky Derby preparation, all of which sets some to thinking of the desirability of deferring the running of the Kentucky Derby until the season is more advanced.

On Tuesday last, at Latonia, On Watch made light of his 114 pounds and practically cantered in over the one and one-sixteenth miles course, finishing well ahead of the older ones, Ginger and King Gorin. Can On Watch really stay? This is the all important question.

A big, rather awkward and angular brown is On Watch and one for which time should do much, and one which has inherited much of his sire Colin's great turn of speed and should he also have inherited the staying qualities of St. Simon and Musket there can be no sort of doubt that he will find the one and three-quarters mile distance of the Latonia Championship well within his compass.

Colin, strange to say, has never yet sired anything approaching his own class, and Colin himself, I take it, better at two than at three. On Watch, however, judging from the manner of his this autumn's racing, is one of the improving sort, and when one of this kind really finds his racing legs there is no telling where he will stop.

On Watch, to look at, is more of a Musket than anything, which practically settles the question of his granddam's paternity and Australians can tell you all about the success of the St. Simon-Musket combination.

Rubia Granda, dam of On Watch, is by Greenan, son of St. Simon and Sunrise, a daughter of that good race horse Springfield, which won fifteen out of his seventeen starts, and this Springfield of Sunrise admirably returned to the Springfield of Pastorella, dam of Colin. Truly, it is remarkable how often in running out the pedigree of a good horse there is to be found a return of the good blood from dam to dam of sire. As turf history is my guide, this, and always, is one of the most successful plans of mating. Sons of Commando, too, seem to score especially well off mares in whose make-up is found a close-up cross of Musket blood, which, in fact, just the same returning process over again, for Musket's dam was a daughter of West Australian, by Melbourne, and Commando's dam Emma C., by Darebin, son of The Peer, by Melbourne. More stout, staying and moreover sound blood is brought into the pedigree of On Watch by way of Aella, a daughter of the wear-and-tear Glenelg, and this followed by the Herod strains of Lexington and Glenco.

Domino horses, gifted as they are with abundant speed, if success is to come for them as sires, must be bred to mares in whose make-up is found stout, staying blood, such as that of St. Simon, Musket and Glenelg, otherwise the Domino tendency to unsoundness is apt to make itself manifest, and if this, practically the only line to Orlando in existence at the present, is to be saved, soundness must be given every consideration in mating.

#### MAN O' WAR ESCAPES SERIOUS INJURY

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., October 21.—Man o' War had a narrow escape from serious injury yesterday at the Rose Tree Hunt meeting at Media, Pa., where he was exhibited. The great thoroughbred was hauled from the Glen Riddle Farm to Media on a truck. As the gang plank was lowered for the horse to walk down a big crowd rushed forward and some of the more excited persons cheered. Man o' War, excited by the noise, sprang sideways from the gang plank and landed with a jolt on the ground. Before he could bolt a half dozen grooms grabbed the champion. He was not injured.

#### RACING IN IRELAND FLOURISHING

Racing is rapidly going ahead in Ireland. A Cne Thousand Guineas has been added to that country's E. C. three-year-old events, and will be run for the first time in 1922. The value of the 1922 derby will be \$25,000, and the entry will be \$250. The advertised value of the recently run Irish Derby was \$20,000, but there was such a considerable surplus after the deduction of second and third moneys, and payment of the bonus to the breeder of the second horse, that the winner's share came to \$22,450.

### Pif Jr. Is Beaten at Odds-On Through a Stupid Ride.

### Luke Dillon Captures the Military Handicap—Texans Uncover a Good Thing in Trust Official.

LATONIA, Ky., October 21.—While the Military Handicap, at one mile, was the outstanding race from a monetary view, the purse in this being \$2,500, several of the other dashes, notably the mile handicap, the closing race, overshadowed it in so far as better class starters were concerned.

John W. Schorr's Luke Dillon accounted for the Military Handicap in somewhat easy fashion, with Grey Eagle following and Rapid Stride, the favorite, third. Luke Dillon's victory gives the government an option on him, and as he has passed the necessary inspection, it is more than probable that he will pass from racing.

An outstanding upset came with the running of the mile and a sixteenth purse, in which Pif Jr. was a pronounced choice and failed to earn a portion of the purse, the winner here turning up in General Glenn, which managed to last just long enough to finish in the van of Legal, with Grand Slam a short distance away. Pif Jr.'s failure was directly due to the incompetent ride he received from Willis. The latter, without any seeming excuse, took him back sharply on the first turn and permitted his mount to wait until on the lower turn, where he moved up into a good position, but in the stretch, beyond striking him twice with his whip, he wasted little energy in any effort to urge his mount strongly. The combination of a slow rider and a loafing old horse proved disastrous, and General Glenn retained command, although his margin of victory was a narrow one, for Legal, coming with a rush after saving much ground on the last turn, almost got up in time. The stewards questioned Willis as to his instructions, being of the opinion that the boy used bad judgment as to pace. Trainer Baker told the stewards that while he thought Willis used bad judgment on the horse, he did not think that he did so purposely. Owner R. L. Baker was none too well pleased with Willis' ride and announced that he would refrain from riding him on any more of his horses.

The Texans uncovered a real good thing in the second race when Trust Official scampered home in advance of a good band of maiden two-year-olds. Trust Official is said to have beaten Muskallonge in private and he ran today as if he was capable of doing it, for he won like a good one after having led for the entire race.

Cheer Leader, backed confidently, won the mile and a quarter dash, but had to be ridden hard near the end to outstay Kimpalong. Ernest B. in this came out of the race in a bad way and will probably not start any more during this meeting.

#### WOODTRAP'S CONSISTENT RACE.

Woodtrap again gave a consistent performance when he won from the good band starting in the final race. He had to be extended to his utmost to overhaul Claymore, but came away in the last eighth. Iwin suffered from considerable interference in the race, but managed to overhaul Pastoureau right at the end for third place.

Social Star showed the way to the two-year-olds starting in the sixth race and won easily from Artisan and Acclaim.

Tim McGee furnished the upset in the fourth race by winning easily from Serbian and Larry B. The favored ones here were never serious factors.

Jockey Jarrell was suspended for five days by the starter for disobedience at the post.

Should the Remount Bureau exercise its option on Luke Dillon, it will cause John W. Schorr's retirement from the turf, as it leaves him without any horses. Jake Holtman having purchased from him on private terms this morning the horses Frank Moody and Joe Mancini. It is Mr. Schorr's intention to retire from the turf for several years and give his attention to business interests in Memphis, Tenn.

Jockey Colletti, who came to ride Damask in the Latonia Championship Stakes, signaled his arrival by landing Luke Dillon in front in the Military Handicap.

Jockey Fairbrother, who will have the mount on Cleopatra, arrived last night from New York. "If Cleopatra should win the Latonia Championship Stakes it will mark her final appearance under colors," said trainer Will Karrick. "At any rate this year will mark her final racing, for she is destined for the stud next year."

Hal Price Headley, president of the Thoroughbred Horse Association, will not be at the meeting of horsemen to be held tonight, as he is present in New York, en route to Europe, where he is going on a business mission.

George W. Loft and party will arrive tomorrow to be present to view the running of his representative, On Watch, in the Latonia Championship Stakes.

A quartet of eastern eligibles for the rich Latonia Championship Stakes, composed of John P. Grier, Damask, Cleopatra and On Watch, were given long trials this morning in preparation for that race. John P. Grier, with jockey Eddie Ambrose in the saddle, worked one and one-half miles in 2:34 $\frac{3}{4}$ ; Damask, with Frank Colletti up, ran the same distance in 2:35; Cleopatra, with C. Fairbrother up, indulged in a work-out of one and a quarter miles in 2:07, while On Watch, under the guidance of jockey J. Pierce, was given a slow gallop of one and one-half miles in 2:42 $\frac{3}{4}$ . The easterners are in the best condition possible, with the exception of Fair Gain, of the J. E. Widener stable. This colt has been ailing since his arrival and will, in all probability, be among the missing in the big race.

The gold cup which will be presented the owner of the winner of the Championship Stakes was received by the Kentucky Jockey Club today and was on exhibition throughout the afternoon in the stewards' stand. The distribution on Saturday will total \$24,000 in added money, the greatest of any day of the fall meeting.

ENSOR RIDES FOUR WINNERS

Is Star of Thursday's Racing at Empire City— Grey Lag Takes Autumn Days Stakes.

NEW YORK, N. Y., October 21.—Jockey Ensor was the bright star of today's racing at Empire City. He rode four winners and one second out of six mounts. While two of his winning mounts were on favorites, he also scored with Elected II, a long shot, and Genie W., a second choice, which defeated Sweet Music, the favorite in the final race.

Grey Lag proved that S. C. Hildreth had bought no "pig in the hole," when he paid a large sum to Max Hirsch for the Star Shoot—Miss Minnie colt. In a true run race in the Autumn Days Stakes, the fetature of the program, he beat Mulciber, both carrying 122 pounds, a half length. The time for the five and a half furlongs was 1:06, within one-fifth of a second of the track record. East View and Hard Guess, coupled as the James Butler entry, were the first to show when starter Cassidy sent the field away. East View displayed a flight of extreme speed and came around the stretch bend three lengths in front. Grey Lag appeared to race sluggishly the first part of the race, but when the field straightened out both he and Mulciber set sail for the flying Butler colt and caught him at eighth out. From there to the finish Grey Lag and Mulciber fought it out, the Hildreth colt coming fast in the last strides and won by a half length going away. Curfew got up in time to beat both Butler colts for third money. The Winsome Handicap, at one mile for mares of all ages, brought the victory of Elected II, ridden by Ensor, with Ballet Dancer II, in second place. Elected II took the lead at the start and maintained a front position all the way, winning by a length and a half. Edwina, the favorite, could do no better than third.

The opening dash was proved easy for the Celt filly Mavourneen. She was held at the short odds of 2 to 7 and in the running of the race she performed as if the oralarizers were even then taking liberties with her. Getting off quickly she took the lead and had plenty left to withstand Gilt Fringe's determined bid near the finish. Gilt Fringe, second choice, was easily second, six lengths in front of Archive. Liberty Girl proved the big surprise of the day

when she won the second race, in which a band of fifteen platers started. Post positions played havoc with the choices, as most of them were on the outside. Valerie West delayed the start for several minutes on account of her fractious actions, but when the field got off she was in front. Her lead was short-lived, however, for Liberty Girl soon ran her into defeat and, saving ground at the stretch turn, came on to beat the heavily-backed Bon Tromp by a length. Prince of Como was the receding favorite, but he had scant chance after his bad start and finished far in the ruck.

Berlin showed he is a fairly good plater right now when he easily defeated a band of ordinary racers in the fifth race. He opened a favorite, but at the close of operations was third choice. Le Gaulois essayed to set the pace, but the Verdun filly was done for after three-quarters of a mile. At this point Berlin went into the lead and held his opponents safe afterward. The Wit, slow to begin, came fast through the stretch and got up to beat American Soldier four lengths for second place. Jack Joyner has purchased from G. B. McDaniel at private terms, C. Repesculc, b. m. 6, by Meddler—Strike-a-Light II.

L. T. Bauer has sold the two-year-old filly Mille Fleurs, which he obtained through the claiming box at Jamaica, back to J. W. McClelland. Mille Fleurs is a half sister to Lord Brighton.

B. A. Lane bought Track Star and The Wit at private terms.
