LATONIA CHAMPIONSHIP DAY

Vast Assemblage Views the Brilliant Triumph of Cleopatra.

Outstays Some Splendid Colts and Wins in a Canter in New Track Record Time.

LATONIA, Ky., October 23.—W. R. Coe's sterling filly Cleopatra, daughter of Corcyra—Gallice, triumphed over the most highly-rated three-year-old colts in this country, excepting Man o' War, and scored in such fashion as to leave no room for doubt as to her superiority, particularly over a long distance. Her achievement was a noteworthy one, for in addition to scoring in hollow fashion she clipped two and four-fifths seconds from the former track record and came within two-fifths of a second of equaling the American record for the distance. On Watch, carrying the silks of George W. Loft, landed in second place and Damask, carrying the Harry Payne Whitney colors, landed in advance of his stablemate, John P. Grier, with Best Pal, the other starter, last. The net value to the winner was \$22,815 and the gold cup in excess of \$1,000 value. On Watch's share of the money was \$3,000, Damask \$2,000 and John P. Grier \$1,000. Mr. Coe also took down \$1,000 for being the nominator of the winner and Corrigan & McKinney, the nominators of On Watch, received \$500. Harry Payne Whitney secured \$500 for being the nominator of Damask and John P. Grier.

Cleopatra's victory was not of the fluky order. It was decisive and clear cut. Fairbrother had her under sharp restraint for the first mile and when he called on her she sprinted into the lead with a dash and, once in command, it was no difficulty for her to stay there and she ultimately won in a canter. She indicated thoroughly that she was mistress at a long route, for On Watch tired in the stretch drive, though given promise on the last turn.

The early running was dominated by John P. Grier, with Best Pal closest in pursuit, and Cleopatra in last place. There was no relative change in the running for the first mile and it was only when Fairbrother rushed Cleopatra through that Ensor also moved up and the next eighth found the entire field in changed running order.

Owner Coe was not present to witness the victory, but trainer Karrick, representing him, received the gold cup and congratulations of the Kentucky Jockey Club on the filly's splendid performance. It marks her last racing attempt, for trainer Karrick announced that in the event of her victory she would be retired to the stud at once.

A solid mass of people covering an area of a quarter of a mile witnessed the decision of today's racing, many having come from afar to view the decision of the Championship Stakes. The New York delegation was particularly large, they regarding the feature race as more or less their property, with the setting for its running simply removed from Broadway's vicinity. This was due to the fact that all the starters with the exception of Best Pal are eastern owned.

In a betting way there was little to choose between the Whitney pair and On Watch, the latter finally taking the post of honor. Owner Loft, who brought a big party here to view the performance, while modestly confident of the result, still had a doubt as to On Watch's ability to stay the route in successful fashion. He expressed this belief to trainer Karrick and the latter frankly stated that his charge would be the winner, but hoped that, in the event of this being a mistake in judgment, On Watch would land in front.

LATEST LEXINGTON TURF GOSSIP

LEXINGTON, Ky., October 23.—A number of horsemen are expected here tomorrow from Latonia, to observe the yearling trials at the Kentucky Jockey Club track. Track conditions will be perfect unless there should be rain.

There is a rumor afloat here to the effect that Man o' War may make his first season in the stud at Miss Elizabeth Daingerfield's Haylands farm.

Joseph E. Widener and Mrs. Widener and party of friends who today are at Latonia, to witness the Latonia Championship, spent yesterday at the Widener farm here. Mr. Widener stated that the report that he had purchased Green Hills from the James B. Haggins estate is untrue.

The mares Sanberia, Sun Glow II., Phenicia, Farce Feminists, Martigold Joannina and Duckshot, owned by George D. Widener, have arrived at Haylands farm from Pennsylvania.

George M. Hendrie's Great Britain is to make the 1921 season at Harry Morrissey's Kempland farm.

W. L. Young has claimed names as follows for three yearlings now in charge of June Collins and to carry his colors next season: North Tower, for bay colt, by North Star III.—Tower of Candles; Peace Pal, for chestnut colt, by Dick Fennell—Peace, and Evening Stories, for bay filly, by Helmet—Bedtime Stories.

Star Flight, dam of Sun Yat, with her brown colt by Black Jester and bred back to that horse, the property of Admiral Cary Grayson, arrived at Haylands Farm this week.

H. C. Ragan has left a yearling filly, by Ormondale—Magna Stella, with R. C. Frakes to be broken at the Kentucky Jockey Club track, while the mares he purchased last February from John E. Madden and the foals they since have dropped have been sent to his farm near Mt. Sterling.

RACE TRACK OWNERS' CASES DISMISSED

WINDSOR, Ontario, October 23.—The cases against the Western Racing Association, owners of the Devonshire race track and the Windsor Jockey Club, owners of the Windsor track, were dismissed in police court by Magistrate Miers. The charges were that the owners were conducting a common gambling house, and were based on the allegation that the charters under which the tracks were operated are illegal. The cases were started in an attempt by the government to close the tracks.

PROSPERITY IN AUSTRALIA IMMENSE CROWD AT EMPIRE

Attendance of Last Racing Year Exceeds All Previous Records—Leading Winning Sires.

The Australian racing year finishes on July 31, and in many ways it has been a record one, and particularly in the matter of attendances. This has especially been the case in Sydney, and the turf writer of the Australasian attributes this to the introduction of the totalizator. Since then it is stated racing has gone ahead by leaps and bounds.

"A new class of racegoers was attracted," states the writer, "when, with the establishment of the totalizator, more of an air of respectability was supposed to be given to betting than under the old system. In Sydney bookmaker and totalizator work side by side, and despite the enormous investments made through the machine—they reached \$157,915 for one race, the Sydney Cup, last Easter Monday, and \$527,295 for the day—the bookmaker's business shows no sign of a decline."

The attendance on the day mentioned was estimated at 83,000, which beat any previous one-day attendance at Randwick by 10,000. Not so many years ago 25,000 was considered a large attendance on a Sydney Cup day. This gives an idea of the way in which the popularity of racing has increased in the New South Wales capital."

The list of winning owners is headed by Sir Samuel Hordern of New South Wales and Mr. A. D. Murphy of Victoria, who race in partnership, and they won nine and one-half races of the value of \$83,980, but the curious thing is that the whole of that money was won through Artilleryman, which, among other successes, carried off the Melbourne Cup and the Caulfield Guineas.

For the first time in his career Comedy King heads the list of winning stallions, and Mr. Norman Falkiner made a lucky purchase when he paid 7,300 guineas for him at the break-up of the Shipton Stud. Comedy King had thirty-two winning horses, which among them won seventy-five races of the aggregate value of \$154,015, of which Artilleryman contributed more than half.

ASK OWNERS TO CO-OPERATE

American Remount Association After Membership Subscriptions at Latonia Track.

LATONIA, Ky., October 23.—Prior to the racing, officers of the American Remount Association, including Col. Scott, Col. Whitehouse and Maj. Stanley Koch, the latter rider of Mile Denys, winner of the recent 300-mile endurance test, made known to the horsemen the immense value the thoroughbred horse is to the army and in the production of the necessary type of light cavalry mount. They made a plea for co-operation on the part of the horsemen to assist in building the Remount Association to national scope. They also made it plain that the Remount Service was solidly in back of racing, for without racing the thoroughbred industry would languish and the result would be that in five years there would be a scarcity of cavalry mounts and in twenty years it would leave the army without adequate cavalry. Maj. Koch dwelt on what he accomplished in the recent test with a grade thoroughbred and that already the army people are planning to ride full blooded thoroughbreds exclusively in the 300-mile test and have already made preliminary preparations with the horses intended to go, to insure the capturing of all prizes.

The horsemen and many of the persons composing the large assembly that heard the talk of the army officers were liberal with their membership subscriptions. The entire Kentucky Jockey Club directorate took life membership subscriptions, as did many of the owners, including J. O. Keene, A. B. Hancock, J. S. Owenby, G. H. Keene, James Arthur and others.

PASSING OF OLD RACING LANDMARKS

NEW YORK, N. Y., October 23.—The old clubhouse, the last landmark of the picturesque old Morris Park course, is being dismantled. Morris Park came after Jerome Park in the district above Manhattan and in its day was one of the most popular metropolitan tracks. Empire City is now the only course in the immediate vicinity of Jerome Park and Morris Park.

Every vestige of the old Jerome Park track has been effaced, except part of one of the stables, which can be seen from Jerome avenue, still in use, probably for a garage. The site of the course is part of the city's reservoir system, but the famous knoll or hill still remains. This obstruction caused anxious speculators on their favorite steeds so many thrills in former days. It was in the field inclosure and prevented a full view of the longer distance races. It is related that many a horse which was in the lead when the field went behind the hill emerged far in the ruck.

Witness Unexpected Defeat of Outstanding Favorites Cirrus and Ten-Lec.

NEW YORK, N. Y., October 23.—One of the largest crowds of the fall season saw the racing at Empire City this afternoon and, while the program was not up to the metropolitan standard, the fields being small, the running of the races brought about some real surprises. While three favorites and three outsiders won, it is seldom that such outstanding choices as Ten-Lec and Cirrus fail in a single day. Both appeared to outclass their opponents, but in the running of their respective races they proved disappointing.

Cirrus, held by the orators at 1 to 8, was easily beaten by Cromwell in the Pelham Bay Handicap. The Hildreth colt, which has been beating everything he met this fall, was considered a veritable certainty for the race, but he was carrying 132 pounds to Cromwell's 96. This was asking a little too much of Cirrus. Experts who had figured that Cromwell had a chance at the weight on the strength of his recent good race with Thunderstorm, took advantage of odd odds offered against the Plaudit gelding and backed him from 15 to 1 down to 8 to 1 at the close of operations. Cromwell took the lead at the rise of the barrier and was never headed. Cirrus made several attempts to pass the lightweighted gelding, but his choppy strides became shorter and shorter the farther he went. Coming into the stretch Sande made a strong effort to get up with the Hildreth colt, but he failed and Cromwell crossed the winning line three and a half lengths to the good.

The talent started off on the wrong foot when it selected Ten-Lec to the exclusion of the two other starters to win the opening dash. Ten-Lec was held by the orators at the short price of 1 to 6 and had much backing even at that figure. Quecreek at 12 to 1 proved the winner. The Huon colt got off in front and never relinquished his advantage, although he was hard pressed by both Dry Moon and Ten-Lec at the finish. Dry Moon beat Ten-Lec by a nose for second money.

Charley Hill of New York has purchased from Kentucky parties the five-year-old horse Eliminator, brother to Sun Bonnet, by Sun Star—Marion Brood. It is said that Mr. Hill will put Eliminator in training again next spring.

Phedoden was claimed by L. T. Bauer for \$2,240 after she won the third race, for which the broken-winded St. Isidore was a false favorite.

The Wit was run up to \$2,400 and bought by J. J. Murphy.

Neddam pulled up lame from a trouble which is said to have been caused through defective plating.

COMRADE BARGAIN YEARLING

Gilpin's English \$250 Colt Wins Two Great French Races and \$111,430.

Comrade, the \$250 yearling, has been a pretty fine racing tool in England and France this year. Trainer P. P. Gilpin bought the black son of Bachelor's Double and Sourabaya, by Spearmint, for that sum at the 1918 yearling sales, sold half of him for \$80,000 to M. E. de Saint-Alary, the French sportsman, and on top of \$5,210 won as a two-year-old in 1919, Comrade has won \$103,760 so far this season. He is probably the best three-year-old on the other side and would have won a great deal more had he been more extensively entered in the futures when a yearling. But it was, as he then stood, considered to be a waste of money. Gilpin found the raw material and made a real race horse of the colt. Comrade has made two trips to France and won the Grand Prix of \$66,090 and the Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe of \$30,000. His two English races won were worth \$7,670 more.

BLAZES AGAIN SURPRISES

Capt. Parr's Speedy Wrack Colt Scores Another Victory.

Defeats The Porter, Sir Barton and Other Stars in Valuable Laurel Stakes.

LAUREL, Md., October 23.—Capt. Ral Parr's Blazes today demonstrated that his recent victory in the Maryland Handicap was no fluke when he met and defeated such stars as Sir Barton, The Porter, Semmings Park and Audacious in the \$10,000 added Laurel Stakes, the feature of a particularly interesting Saturday program at the Maryland State Fair course.

The son of Wrack picked up 120 pounds and made all the pace to win by a length from E. B. McLean's The Porter, which was an equal distance in front of J. K. L. Ross' Sir Barton. L. Waterbury's Semmings Park was beaten a nose by the Ross pride for third money. The race was worth \$7,750 to the winner.

Starting from the inside position, Johnson rushed the Parr colt off to a lead at the first turn, but by the time of the three-quarters post was reached Sir Barton had moved up on the outside and raced through the backstretch almost on even terms with Blazes. At the half Blazes began to draw away as Sir Barton fell back and The Porter, moving around him under Butwell's energetic efforts, closed gamely under punishment, but could never get within a length of the winner. Sir Barton just lasted long enough to withstand the rush of Semmings Park.

CLEAN WAY FRENCH JOCKEYS RIDE

Here is a part of a letter about French riding and riders in races from a good judge who visits and observes doings on the courses about Paris:

"The way the jockeys rode in France left a great impression. A race might have been some mechanical toy, so clean did they all ride, and when rounding a bend the horsemanship was perfect. At some of these points, always at the turn for home, an official is there to watch the riding, and had luck to him who is reported. He stands down, there is no calling of evidence; the official's report is the verdict. The jockeys are aware of this, some from personal experience to their disadvantage, the result being that each rider looks to his horse and his horse alone when rounding for home. He is not screaming at someone else; he swings the bend in one position, and the whole field come into the straight as if mechanically propelled."
