DISAGREEABLE AT LATONIA HIGHEST PRICED YEARLINGS OF 1920 BUTWELL AND LEOCHARES

Cold Weather and Muddy Track Bring Discomfort to Big Crowd.

Minute Man Proves Himself an Excellent Mud Runner—Colonel Baker Wins.

LATONIA, Ky., October 27.—Cold weather, coupled with a prospect of more rain, did not seem to have any marked effect in causing a reduction in the attendance, despite the fact that as a whole was in keeping with conditions and lacked any outstanding feature. The racing developed better sport than was expected and some of the finishes were close and interesting.

Few surprises developed, though favorites were beaten in a majority of the races, the longest-priced winner coming with the decision of the fourth race, in which Colonel Baker scored by a margin of inches over Sir Thomas Kean after a strenuous last sixteenth drive. Rising Rock and Coyne were given the preference here, but after they had raced in the van until reaching the stretch they both gave way, Rising Rock barely lasting for third place.

The three-quarters dash, in which some highly regarded sprinters met, proved no contest, for Minute Man raced into a long lead at the start and increased his advantage with every stride, ultimately to win away off as his rider pleased. Redmon just managed to hold on to second place, with Dresden getting up in time to land third place from High Cloud.

Sweeping Glance furnished a surprise when she got up in time to overhaul Currency and Lancelot in the first race. The latter was favorite and might have been the victor with a better judged ride.

Miss Fontaine upset calculations when she overhauled Golden Quince, the favored one in the second race, to win.

Serbian was the next victim from the favorite ranks. He was beaten by Simonite after a grueling struggle.

Blowing Bubbles and Gloomy Gus were a pair of offending favorites in the last two dashes, Brother Batch and Prunes being the respective victors here.

J. L. Knight, represented in the opener by Opportunity, claimed Iwiniwin at a cost of \$2,500.

F. Gaylor, who has had charge of the Montfort Jones horses since Edward Garrison was stricken at Saratoga, has arrived with the horses at Latonia, where they will be raced and wintered. Garrison, according to report, is still in a bad way.

Dr. Cahn will leave for Shreveport, La., shortly to do some veterinary work on the seventeen yearlings there owned by W. H. Rowe. Most of the youngsters will have the firing irons applied to their legs and are intended for racing over the New Orleans tracks.

Trainer Max Hiseh announced today that Donnacoma would be a starter in the \$7,500 added Latonia Cup next Saturday, regardless of track conditions.

Jack Atkin was among the arrivals this morning to do missionary work on behalf of the Tjanna Racing Association.

Kathleen K. and Josephine K. were bought privately this morning by J. E. Hoffer.

JOCKEY C. H. MILLER "COME-BACK" BEGAN RIDING HORSES IN 1909

The veteran jockey C. H. Miller is a real "come-back." He has been riding great guns during the Empire City meeting. He first began riding in 1909 and lost his apprentice allowance in 1910. His first winning mount was on Kenite, which he rode for Edward Heffner. In 1913 he got into trouble at Havre de Grace, but was reinstated the next year. Miller was incapacitated from riding for two years thereafter by sickness. He was a member of Uncle Sam's forces during the World War and returned to the saddle in 1919, when he rode his first mount at Saratoga. Since then Miller has been fairly busy in the saddle. He rode for Anthony Aste during the spring and summer months, but recently signed a contract to ride for C. A. Stoneham. He will pilot the Stoneham horses during the winter meeting at Havana. Miller was taught the rudiments of riding by W. T. Anderson.

DRAW FINES FOR "DOPING" HORSES

French racing officials are taking sharp action about the recent growth of doping horses for races. Baron de Rothschild's trainer, D'Okhuysen, was recently fined \$800 and a second trainer, Jules Wagoneau, has been ruled off for life. Both men were convicted by an analysis of the saliva of suspected animals immediately after each race, in accordance with the process developed by an Austrian scientist a year or two before the war.

LARGEST RACING CROWD HE EVER SAW

Jockey Ensor, who rode On Watch last Saturday in the Latonia Championship Stakes, on his return to Empire City, said he had never before seen as large a crowd as the one present at Latonia to see the running of the above-mentioned race. Ensor further stated that it would have taken a Man o' War to have beaten Cleopatra last Saturday.

LOUGH FOYLE MAKING HIS MARK

E. B. McLean's Irish sire Lough Foyle, which came over in 1916, is producing winners from his first crop and is a valuable addition to American breeding. His female descendants ought to freshen American thoroughbred strains. Lough Foyle himself is a fine individual. His blood lines are clear and stout and he was a good race horse in his days. Lough Foyle is nine years old, by Lochryan—Canmors, by Senamus.

NO BIDDING SO SENSATIONAL AS THAT OF 1919, BUT TWENTY-TWO BRING FROM \$5,100 UP TO A MAXIMUM SUM OF \$14,000

Possibly the fact that the high-priced yearlings of 1919 had failed to make good, with the exception of Star Voter, dampened the ardor of wealthy buyers this year. At any rate competition was not near so eager and the top price at Saratoga this year was \$14,000, which compared illly with the \$25,000 of 1919. Another comparison is that in 1919 ten yearlings brought an aggregate of \$145,400, while this year the twenty-two high-cost ones only realized a total of \$188,700. However, as a whole the yearling sales of 1920 resulted in a satisfactory average and the market was in a healthy condition. As is always the case, the racing of the highest priced ones will be closely scanned next year. One of the four which sold for \$5,100 would probably have brought at least five times that amount at auction in England, it being the bay colt by Magic—Royal Quest. Magic was a good racer in England and Royal Quest is a sister of the highly fashionable sire The Tetrarch. The twenty-two most costly yearlings sold at Saratoga were these:

CAPT. RAL PARR'S BIG YEAR ONLY ONE FAVORITE WINS

Paul Jones, Blazes and Their Stablemates Have Already Won Over \$100,000.

Capt. Ral Parr is enjoying his most successful year on the turf. To date his horses have won over \$100,000. Paul Jones' Kentucky Derby and Suburban Handicap victories in the spring gave him a good start and now Blazes is racing up to early expectations and turning into the coffers of his owner a goodly share of the golden harvest of fall racing. While the above-mentioned two have contributed over one-half of the large sum to the credit of this stable, there are others of less fame, but of the useful kind, including several good steeplechasers, which have added their bit, as the following tabulation reveals, the figures presented including the records of all the Parr horses up to and including the racing of Tuesday:

FRENCH RACING NEWS NOTES

In consideration of the payment of the sum of \$200 the commissioners of the Societe d'Encouragement of Racing and Breeding, Paris, issued a permit to William Duke to act as trainer and run the horses of A. K. Macomber September 24 and 25 at the Maisons Laffitte and Tremblay courses. This was an emergency permit, Duke having previously trained for the late W. K. Vanderbilt. The Prix de Bonnelles, one and five-sixteenths miles, was run at Tremblay September 25, and was won by Kara Bourouin, b. f., 4, by Throwaway—Kaia, by Ukase II. Mr. A. K. Macomber's br. f. 3, Margaret Ogilvy was second and Leon Mantacheff's br. f. 3, Madeleine, third. Time, 2:20.

YOUNG SUNSTARS IN GREAT DEMAND

Sunstar has made a wonderful record in England this year. Nineteen of his yearlings have sold for \$245,500, an average of \$12,920, remarkable figures, considering the number sold.

Machine Gunner Saves Talent from Complete Rout—"Buddie" Ensor Proud Father.

NEW YORK, N. Y., October 27.—The talent fared badly at Empire City today, but one choice getting down to the winning line in front and in that case it came in the closing race when Machine Gunner just got up in time to defeat Clare Frances the shortest kind of a head. The superior ride the Meelick colt received by Earl Sande saved the day for the talent.

Half a dozen of the best sprinters at Empire started in the Kingsbridge Highweight Handicap, the day's feature. Lord Brighton ruled favorite, but the winner turned up in Daydue, the heavily backed second choice. Daydue set a fast pace all the way and, after having withstood challenges from both Lord Brighton and Dunboyno, had enough left at the finish to beat Ticklish.

W. H. Fizer's Dark Hill was much the best in the claiming handicap over the mile and a quarter route. While the son of Flying-pie had stanch support, most of the speculators favored Lord Herbert, which went to the post at 1 to 2. Dark Hill took the lead at the start and led the entire way under stout restraint and was never seriously threatened. Great Gull was third five lengths back of Lord Herbert and American Soldier was beaten off.

S. C. Hildreth's Regal Lodge was the whispered "good thing" in the Highland Purse, but that formerly fast gelding had not been to the races for some time and the talent were a bit skeptical about his chances until they saw the gelding being heavily backed by his stable connections. Then he was heavily backed. In the early running Regal Lodge could not keep pace with Ace of Aces and Youneed and was not able to get into his stride until too late, finishing third, only neck separating him from Ace of Aces, which had been ousted from the lead by Tableaux d'Honneur an eighth out. The latter drew away in the last few strides.

Jockey "Buddie" Ensor is a proud father. That was the cause of his absence from Empire City today, having been called to Baltimore to welcome a little baby girl. He will return to the Hill Top track to finish out the meeting.

X-RAY TO DETERMINE HORSE INJURIES

LAUREL, Md., October 27.—Admiral Cary T. Grayson's Gnome, which injured an ankle recently, has been subjected to X-ray photography to determine the extent of the ailment. It is believed that this is the first time an X-ray has been used in veterinary diagnostics. It is Admiral Grayson's own idea.

JOCKEY MEEHAN KILLED IN ACCIDENT

Word was received here of the death at Battle Creek, Mich., of jockey Willie Meehan. He stopped off there with some horses en route to New Orleans and while riding a livery horse was thrown and trampled on, suffering a fractured skull and internal hemorrhage.

CUDGEL TO RACE AT PIMLICO MEETING

LAUREL, Md., October 27.—Commander J. K. L. Ross' Cudgel, which has been doing stud duty this year, has been entered in some of the Pimlico stakes and is now in training again. He is being prepared for the races at the Canadian sportsman's private training track at Berlin, Md.

Veteran Rider and Racer Triumph in Laurel's Main Race.

Young Adam Upholds His Reputation—Idle Dell Again Displays Winning Form.

LAUREL, Md., October 27.—E. B. McLean's gelding Leochares triumphed by half a length over G. E. Brown's Escarpolette in a rousing drive in the mile and a sixteenth handicap, which featured the racing here this afternoon. Butwell, astride the winner, laid behind the pacemaker Escarpolette to the stretch turn, when he brought the Broomstick gelding up on the outside and engaged the pacemaker in a duel which lasted throughout the stretch. Richcreek put up a good battle on Escarpolette, but let go in the closing strides and the pair of veterans got the decision. A. L. Austin's Belario finished a creditable third.

Heavy clouds hung over the course throughout the day and light sprinkles of rain several times threatened the pleasure of a good-sized crowd. Sam Ross' Cavendish, ridden by Keogh, came from behind to win brackets in the opening dash for two-year-olds at five and a half furlongs, beating Trantula and Actress.

J. W. Hatch's Young Adam, showing here for the first time since his New York success, scored his third straight, beating a good band over the mile course in the second race. Kuklux and Albert A. finished second and third. Callahan rode the winner.

Idle Dell, which races in the colors of L. Waterbury, won her second of the meeting, finishing a length and a half ahead of Sailing E., in the third race, Smoke Screen getting third money.

J. K. L. Ross claimed Cavendish out of the first race from Sam Ross for \$3,310. In the same race J. R. Skinker claimed Trantula from T. Calcina for \$2,610 and later disposed of the Transvaal colt to Milton Smith at private terms.

Jockey Clarence Kummer, rider of Man o' War in most of his races this year, was given a great ovation when he appeared astride Smoke Screen in the third race.

A. L. Austin bought Coss Cola from H. McDonald, and by Gene from Jack Price. These two two-year-olds will be taken to Havana.

Mrs. Miller claimed Vic out of the fourth race yesterday from J. Lumsden for \$2,205. Gene Wayland reports that the good two-year-old Careful, in the string of W. J. Salmon, has just begun to spread out. The Wrack—Mindful filly made her debut at Havre de Grace April 16 and has won twelve races to date.

R. S. Eddy, general manager of the Fair Grounds, left tonight for New York to continue missionary work there in the interest of the New Orleans meeting. He will spend the remainder of the week there and depart for New Orleans Sunday.

Clarence Kummer arrived from New York and was seen with the colors up today.

The shipment of horses to Pimlico continued today. James Rowe sent all of the Whitney string there with the exception of a pair of juveniles that were held over for Saturday's stake.

Mike Daly is reported low with typhoid fever. J. G. Bussey, acting for E. Graham, bought the good looking chestnut filly Plum Blossom. This juvenile is by Joe Carey—Berrill's Choice and has never started.

J. J. McCafferty bought the mare Huntress from G. Tompkins. She will be shipped to Cuba with the other McCafferty horses.

Sam Louis sold American Eagle to Blair Mock, Good Hope to J. E. Griffith, Dantzig to Norman Smith, Jr., and Miss Rankin to Otto Torrell. Dantzig ran in Mr. Louis' colors today.

Winall, Gladys, Ira Wilson and Waukeag were placed on the schooling list yesterday.

A. D. Harrison claimed Vive McGee from C. I. Whiting yesterday for \$3,800.

OFFER SOLUTION TO PURSE PROBLEM

LATONIA, Ky., October 27.—The Thoroughbred Horse Association, through G. H. Keene, made the New Orleans Business Men's Racing Association a proposition today which may solve the difficulties over the purse question at that point. Mr. Keene offered to give the racing association a net profit of \$75,000 for the Fair Grounds meeting, the horsemen agreeing to subscribe that sum in advance, on condition that the association give \$1,000 purses and a feature race of \$1,500 daily. If the profits run above \$75,000 the amount is to be divided among the charities of New Orleans. B. C. McLellan, president of the association, said that he was ready to accept such a proposition for himself, but could not vouch for the board of directors' action, while believing that they would accept such terms. Already horsemen at Latonia have agreed to subscribe for \$10,000.

CURRENT NOTES OF THE TURF

Fred Taral, a good judge, is quoted as declaring that Domino and Rey del Caredes were the fastest horses he ever rode. Henry of Navarre the best stayer and Hamburg the best individual. Rey del Caredes was sent to Ireland by Richard Croker, renamed Americus and made a mark there, both as racehorse and sire.

In England owners are provided with free stabling and fodder for their horses at some meetings off the regular racing routes. These items cost the Chester management \$2,500 in connection with its two days' meeting in the spring, but it could well afford that amount, seeing that the receipts totaled \$213,295.

While transferring some mares from one Kentucky farm to another, John S. Barbee had the misfortune to have two of them hit by an automobile, one being so badly injured that she had to be destroyed. WHY SPION KOP FAILED

Derby Winner Affected by Peculiar English Bug Disease.

Gilpin's Stable Ravaged by It—Buchan's Doncaster Cup—Astor Horse Goes to Stud.

(BY E. E. COUSSELL.)

LONDON, England, October 13.—Spion Kop, after the Grand Prix, was given an easy time, which was unusually protracted because the colt became affected by a mysterious malady which has attacked more or less all the animals trained by Mr. Gilpin. The trouble first shows itself in the heel and spreads to other parts of the body. It is believed to be caused by a microbe. Mr. Lambton, whose stable was also attacked, and Archaic in particular, describes it as "bug disease." So long as the "bug" is active, the victim must remain idle and to what extent the malady vitiates the constitution no one knows. Many weeks ago Spion Kop was believed fit to go in hard training. He was beaten a head by Abbots Trace at Derby the week before Doncaster and was expected to be all the better for the race. In a trial five days before the St. Leger he showed to advantage, but the Doncaster running proved the other inmates of Gilpin's stable were so out of form as to be unreliable.

Spion Kop was sweating profusely in the paddock. He got well away and for half a mile lay third. From that point he fell back to finish last but one. His rider said he ran as though there was no life in him. Clearly the "bug disease" has sapped his vitality. There can be no other explanation of the ignominious failure of the colt, which is bred to stay forever. Orpheus was thought to have a good chance, but gave a disappointing display. Before the St. Leger the trainer of Allenby expressed the opinion his colt would win or break down hopelessly. He was a true prophet. The breakdown occurred and the son of Bayardo was pulled up. Caligula and Manton got away last. The former remained in that position for over a mile. He then made a vigorous spurt and was soon leading. Silvern made a gallant effort, but failed to overhaul the gray colt. Caligula started at 16 to 1. The previous night he was at odds of 25 to 1, and two days previously 50 to 1 could be easily obtained.

POOR LUCK OF LORD WILTON.

Until five days before the St. Leger, Caligula was owned by Lord Wilton, who paid 3,100 guineas for him as a yearling. He sold the colt to the well-known Indian owner, Mr. Goudaldas, for 8,000 guineas, plus half the St. Leger Stakes if he won. This meant 3,000 pounds sterling. This must be poor consolation for young Lord Wilton, who expended great sums in bloodstock two or three years ago.

Caligula is a brother to Snow Maiden, the only other one of the Tetrarch's stock to stay over one and one-half miles. Their dam Snoot was a sprinter only and never went more than five-eighths. Snoot was by Perigord (by St. Simon)—N. R. A., who never ran. As a three-year-old she was sent to the Newmarket December sales. In foal to Perigord, she was bought for ninety guineas by Mr. J. J. Maher. Snoot was the produce. The last named is a very small mare, only 14.3 hands high. All her produce to date are winners. The mare returns to The Tetrarch in 1921.

Miss Gunning, the third dam of Caligula, won races over one mile and the next dam did not race. Further back the female line eventually reaches Ellen Middleton, the dam of Wild Dayrell. From this top-root descends Persimmon and Diamond Jubilee.

Naturally, the defeat of Alan Breek in the Champagne Stakes was disappointing except to those who feared the ravages of the malady which had afflicted Mr. Gilpin's horse. The son of Sunstar looked burly in the paddock. He was helpless a long way from the finish and distressed when he returned.

Mr. Joseph Watson's Lemonora, a big far-striding son of Lemberg proved successful. He was unluckily beaten a neck in the Gimcrack Stakes. Some people now describe him as the best youngster. I understand his wind is slightly affected. He was bred at Sledmere and cost 3,300 guineas last year. Lemberg has been a long time making headway at the stud. A few more like Lemonora and his success is assured.

Polemarch, which won the Gimcrack Stakes, was also successful in the Roux Plate at Doncaster. He is a good-looking chestnut colt by The Tetrarch—Pomace, a sister to Corecra and Benevento. He was bred and is owned by Lord Londonderry, whose stud ill fortune continues, for Pomace died a few days before Polemarch won at York. It is cruel luck to lose Corecra, Polumatic and Pomace in the space of three months.

Buchan set the seal on his fame by winning the Doncaster Cup, in which Galloper Light was unplaced. The latter was strongly fancied. Tanager's leg slightly filled a few days before the race and he was withdrawn. Otherwise the Doncaster Cup would have been the race of the year. Galloper Light was badly kicked at the post by Brigand and, as a result, never extended himself. The race, therefore, was a bit inconclusive, but Buchan won like the good horse he undoubtedly is. He now retires to the stud at a fee of 400 guineas and his list for 1921 is full.
