GREAT PRICES FOR YEARLINGS

Analysis of Newmarket October Sales Prices and Averages.

Youngsters by The Tetrarch and Charles O'Malley Fetch Record Sums in England.

LONDON, England, October 20.—Last year the October Newmarket sales were abandoned owing to the railroad strike. This year it looked as though a coal strike would interfere, but this was postponed. Prices were by no means to be compared with those at Doncaster. After the first day's sale there was a steady decline in the average. Of the forty-three yearlings catalogued on Friday only fifteen found buyers. Naturally, there were some noteworthy exceptions and one or two would have sold for big prices if their owners had not possessed inflated ideas. For instance, a genuine bid of \$20,000 was refused for a colt by Cecyra, sire of your Cleopatra. It was generally understood the breeder expected him to make \$35,000.

Mr. John Sanford gave the second highest price of the week for a handsome daughter of Sunder and Snow Marten, which comes of the same immediate family as Spion Kop, Comrade and Orpheus, which has by this time arrived in the United States. The most notable feature of the sales was the firm demand for the offspring of Charles O'Malley. Six colts by him sold for \$62,750, an average of almost \$10,500. The lowest priced one made \$5,500.

At Doncaster several yearlings by him averaged \$13,905, and at the July sales two averaged \$8,800. So far this year fifteen Charles O'Malley yearlings have realized \$109,200, an average of \$11,280.

By the way, last week the syndicate owning Charles O'Malley sold a share to Lady Sykes, so Sledmere is now included. Two or three breeders only outside the syndicate will have the chance to secure nominations to the horse and these will cost not less than \$2,500. Yet a few years ago Charles O'Malley was refused by an American breeder who could have got him for less than \$100,000.

Sunstar lost his record of every yearling by him selling for over \$5,000. Four of them last week made less than that amount. Altogether nineteen Sunstar yearlings have sold for \$245,500, an average of \$12,920. These are remarkable figures for such a number. The highest priced yearling of the week was a Sunstar. One colt by The Tetrarch unexpectedly came in the sales and made \$19,000. At Doncaster he would have realized considerably more than that amount, though his dam's pedigree is not of particular merit. The four The Tetrarch yearlings sold this season have brought \$72,500, \$48,000, \$25,500 and \$19,000; total, \$185,000; average, \$41,250.

RAIN FALLS AT LAUREL

Mud Runners Have First Opportunity of Meeting—Four Straight for Goldine.

LAUREL, Md., October 28.—Soft going prevailed at Laurel Park this afternoon for the first time during the meeting. Rain which fell last night left the course sloppy, and lowering clouds kept down the attendance somewhat, but the crowd on hand had better success in battling the "iron men" than is usually the case when track conditions change.

Camouffeur, the four-year-old Astronomer colt from the stable of W. L. S. Martin, led home the best band of horses brought together this afternoon, winning by five lengths from Herd Girl and Wood Violet.

Black Top, F. Hunt up, won the first race in the colors of D. S. Fountain. He won going away from Wild Thoughts, an even money favorite, and Kinetic. Black Top paid \$69.50 for \$2.

J. E. Widener's Duettiste, running through the field in public for the first time since his successes of last spring at Pimlico, picked up 167 pounds and scored an impressive victory over Debadou and his own stablemate, Joyful.

Goldine, the Golden Maxim—Miss Bodine filly recently claimed from A. L. Austin by Mrs. R. I. Miller, was sent to the post by her former owner and scored her fourth consecutive victory of the meeting. Widow Bedotte and Frank Monroe divided the remainder of the purse.

Frank J. Bruen, general manager of Oriental Park, will leave for Kentucky tomorrow to take in the Latonia closing day's program on Saturday.

J. B. Dunn shipped Ida Dunn and Pleasing Pictures to the Eastern Shore Farm this morning. Mr. Dunn will campaign St. Quentin, Madeline Lillian, Louise V. and Phantom Fair and five or six others at New Orleans during the winter.

G. R. Allen ships Kentucky Boy and Vera Wood to Tijuana Monday. Jockey Yeargin, under contract to Mr. Allen, will accompany the shipment.

Harry Knight, for whom a subscription was taken up here, has been sent to El Paso, Texas, for the relief of the war.

Mrs. F. Ambrose Clark possibly will have three starters in the Manly Memorial Steeplechase at Pimlico. Her horses are in excellent form just now and are schooling well.

Tomorrow will be schooling day at Pimlico. There are more jumpers on hand this year than any previous one in the club's history.

Mrs. Wilfred Viau's good two-year-old Celt—Network filly Ten-Lec arrived at Pimlico this morning from New York.

L. Cheyne, the steeplechase rider who broke a collar-bone in a fall recently, has been subjected to a wiring operation. P. Brady, another of the jumping riders, is nursing a like dismemberment.

Simpson Boyle, under contract to E. R. Bradley, appeared with the colors up today for the first time since his injury in Kentucky last spring.

Before leaving here for New York to do missionary work in the interest of the Business Men's Racing Association meeting R. S. Eddy, general manager of the Fair Grounds track, expressed the opinion that a settlement would be reached with the horsemen in the matter of purse disputes so that there will be no difficulty of holding the meeting as scheduled.

MARYLAND'S RICH FUTURITY

English Critic Likes the Mare Failure Clause of the New Two-Year-Old Stake.

The Pimlico Futurity, entries for which close November 8, continues to attract attention abroad, as the following article in the London Sportsman from the pen of "Special Commissioner" will be of particular interest on this side of the water:

It will be noted that the criticism of making barren mares liable for entrance fee has been met by a ruling of the Maryland Jockey Club that "should a mare entered in the Pimlico Futurity of 1923 prove barren, slip foal, or not produce a live foal, fees paid on such entry will be refunded, provided proper notice is sent to the Maryland Jockey Club."

Commenting on the clause, Mr. Allison says: "Writing of yearlings and foals, I am reminded that an attractive race in the United States of America is advertised by the Maryland Jockey Club. This is the Pimlico Futurity Stakes, with \$40,000 added, to be run in the autumn of 1921. This is for now yearlings to enter by November 1. For the corresponding races in 1922 and 1923 entries can be made for now foals, and for mares in foal, the latter being entered, of course, as for a Produce Stake."

"The entrance fee is \$10, the only charge except the starting fee. American buyers of young stock have been much in evidence during the last few years and only the other day Mr. John Sanford bought two high-priced yearlings, so that it may be good policy for breeders to make entries for this race. The conditions are interesting, involving as they do a triennial scheme, but always for two-year-olds; whereas our old-fashioned triennials rarely, if ever, work out satisfactorily, the third year being only too apt to result in a walk-over or a mere semblance of a race between two or three runners. I commend this American scheme to the attention of clerks of the course in this country. If I may criticize the American conditions of the race, it would be to suggest that, so far as brood mares go, the entry fee of \$10 for the third rotation of the race is a mistake. They should not be liable for any payment unless they prove to be in foal, that being the invariable rule in our produce stakes. If it is possible, in the time, this part of the scheme ought to be altered, as I feel sure that so far as entries of mares in England go the third year of the race will be a failure. Ten dollars is not a large sum to pay, it is true, but as Angus McAllister says in 'Engaged,' 'Two pound is two pound'—especially when paid out for a mare which may prove to be barren. The average breeder likes to have a foal in existence before he pays for having entered him."

JUMPER KINLARK GOES TO ENGLAND

Kinlark, winner of the Australian Steeplechase at Caulfield, was presented by Mr. J. M. Niall to the Prince of Wales after that race. Kinlark will be shipped to England at the earliest opportunity, and it might be safe to bet that if the prince has his way he will yet ride him in a steeplechase.

FAVORITES FARE WELL TODAY

Despite Changed Track Conditions Four First Choices Are Victorious.

NEW YORK, N. Y., October 28.—Changed track conditions failed to deter the favorites at Empire City today. While the heavy rains of the night and morning reduced the size of the fields, the talent fared well after the first two races. Gueland, which was selected in the opening dash, failed, the race going to the well-backed Marie Antoinette. In the second race the filly Ragazza was the medium of a heavy plunge. Ragazza, opening 7 to 1, was quickly backed to a closing of 5 to 1 and won as her rider pleased, leading her opponents all the way. Largetto, the favorite, was second and American Boy third.

After the second race the favorites, Sweet Music, Dry Moon, Sea Sinner and Aida McGee, all won. Sweet Music's victory in the Larchmont Purse, in which only three faced the starter, brought with it one of the closest finishes of the meeting. Sweet Music just getting up in the last stride to beat Kashmir, the pacesetter. Goaler also was coming fast at the end and appeared to have beaten Kashmir for second place.

The feature of the day's racing, the Ardsley Handicap, also brought three to the post in Dry Moon, Quercreek and Dernier Sou. Dry Moon was the odds-on favorite and he ran up to expectations. Dry Moon, carrying 113 pounds, five pounds more than the official entries gave him, got up quickly and was never in trouble thereafter. The Wilson colt was a length and a half in front of Quercreek at the finish. Dernier Sou was last all the way.

Backers of Ting-a-Ling were peeved when that gelding wheeled just as starter Cassidy sprung the barrier in the fifth race. He did not even attempt to run. Sea Sinner, the heavily-backed favorite, took the lead at the start and, reveling in the going, won practically pulled up by three lengths.

Marie Antoinette, with a great turn of speed in the soft going, led her opponents in the opening dash at one mile and had a length margin over Gueland, the favorite at the finish. Joe Joe, second choice was third.

J. W. McClelland's McGee—Ida Harrison filly, Aida McGee made a runaway of the final dash. The filly was heavily backed by her stable connections and she ran as if the confidence placed in her ability to negotiate the going was justifiable. Getting off in front, she led by a big margin all the way, having several lengths to spare at the finish.

It is the unanimous opinion of all the turf critics who had the good fortune to inspect Prince Palatine during his stay at Belmont Park that he is one of the grandest looking thoroughbreds that have ever been seen in this country. A certain success in the stud is being predicted for him by the breeding experts.

Thomas Hodge bought yesterday from W. J. Salmon the filly Betty J. and Diffidence. According to the agreement, Mr. Salmon has the option of purchasing the fillies for breeding purposes when their racing days are over. Mr. Hodge will race them and twelve others in Cuba.

Isette, the dam of Sweet Music, is by Isinglass, and like all the progeny of that horse, even in the second and third generations, the ability to run in the mud was transmitted to her.

T. J. Healy, acting for R. T. Wilson, sold Sunny Days and Light Fantastic to J. W. P. Raugle. They will be shipped Monday with the big consignment of racers destined for Havana.

W. H. Karrick, trainer for W. R. Coe, will send a few horses to Havana to campaign during the winter in charge of K. K. Karrick. The Oneck Stable also will send several horses. The first shipment of horses will leave the metropolitan tracks Monday for Havana. It was the largest consignment of racers from these parts to leave since the Mariano course was built. Many owners who formerly raced at New Orleans will go to Cuba on account of the contention over the size of the purses at the Fair Grounds between the track management and the Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association.

W. M. Farnum, the moving picture star, has purchased Black Knight from Frederick Johnson for \$7,000 and turned the colt over to W. H. Fizer to train.

SOME SOUTH AFRICAN WINNING SIRES

It is interesting to see the success of the various male lines in different parts of the world. In South Africa, for instance, Greatorex, by Carbine—Mrs. Butterwick, is far away ahead of all competitors for the racing season, which ended July 31 last. He had thirty-eight winners of \$74,405 in stakes. Second comes William Rufus with ten winners of \$45,860. Third is Minor Forfeit, by Minting—Malbaum, with twenty-five winners of \$39,475. Fourth is Perseus, by Persimmon—Orania, with ten winners of \$25,650. Fifth comes Galeas, by Sir Visto—Galanthis, with fifteen winners of \$22,400. Then Pietri, by St. Frusquin—Pie Powder, eight winners of \$21,545. The above brief details will suffice to show the strange vicissitudes of blood lines. William Rufus has never made much of a hit in England, and there is no male representative of Minting or Sir Visto to continue those lines in this country. Glancing a little lower down the list I see that Nobleman, a son of Greatorex, is well up with thirteen winners of \$19,510. Vril, son of Vitez, by Melton, had nineteen winners of \$18,165, and there were no fewer than six winners of \$16,635 by Phaleron, which is in England, and, like Greatorex, is a son of Mrs. Butterwick. Duns, another Carbine horse, was represented by fourteen winners of \$15,210. It is clear that bloodstock breeding is carried on much more extensively now in South Africa than it used to be when imported stock was mainly relied on.—W. Allison in London Sportsman.

Remmon cut the seven-eighths mark from Arrow-smith's 1:25 1/2, made in New Zealand, and Chrysolus displaced Gloaming's 1:52, made at Randwick in September, 1918.

FEATURE RACE TO GINGER

Defeats Frank W. and Dodge in an Interesting Contest.

Latonia Weather Still Cold and the Track Heavy, but the Favorites Win Well.

LATONIA, Ky., October 28.—Cold, dry weather ruled here today, but the difficult track was responsible for an absence of big fields. However, this benefited the racing, for the smaller numbers furnished some interesting sport and it was thoroughly enjoyed by a surprisingly large attendance. Form was well conserved and most of the winners came from the ranks of favorites.

Six good performers started in the feature, a mile dash for a purse of \$2,000. W. E. Applegate's recently acquired \$10,000 Ginger was the winner here, but only after he had to run a sparkling race to dispose of his opponents, which included Frank W. and Dodge, following him home respectively in the above order. Ginger was at home in the going and was rushed into the lead at once, but his leadership was disputed in succession by Atta Boy II., Dodge and Frank W. The latter gave him the most trouble and it was only in the last eighth that he managed to shake him off.

The sport began with an upset when Columbia Tenn won from Harvest King, a pronounced choice. His victory was assisted by the fact that Harvest King got the better of his rider while going to the post and ran away three-eighths at a stiff pace before he could be brought under control. Columbia Tenn's victory makes him ineligible to the race he is entered in tomorrow.

E. R. Bradley's Balance Wheel outclassed those he met in the second race and scored in hollow style, drawing away in the stretch with the utmost ease.

The one-time crack Beaverkill showed a flash of his old-time form when he took into camp some speedy ones in the three-quarters sprint, but his margin of victory was a narrow one, secured only after a game drive to outstay Anticipate.

Accelerate, an overwhelming choice, made good in the fourth race. She was kept in the wake of the others for the first half mile, but rushed into the lead when freed from restraint in a flash and was easing up in the last sixteenth.

C. W. Clark's White Star, so lightly regarded that he was grouped in the field, won the sixth race from good youngsters. Julia N. landed in second place, but through no fault of Wilson, who almost took her up to a standstill at the end. Rama landed in third place.

The racing at Churchill Downs will begin daily at 1:30 p. m.

Jockey S. Wida was suspended for ten racing days by the stewards for rough riding in the sixth race.

Rama was claimed out of the sixth race by Mose Goldblatt at a cost of \$3,900 and Social Star was taken by S. M. Henderson for \$3,400.

Artisan, owned by Henderson, came out of the race badly out.

Horses and equipment used by the Thoroughbred Endurance Test Club were sold in the paddock. The horses sold were: David Craig, to S. T. Baxter, \$450; Majella to Cromwell & Dempsey, \$120; U Twenty-Three to W. Hukill, \$80; Moscow to G. H. Keene, \$100. In addition to the horses, saddles, blankets, boots and an automobile truck were sold. The proceeds will be prorated to the subscribers to the endurance test fund.

Dancing Spray was claimed by Treacy & Walker for \$2,600.

Jack Atkin, who is doing missionary work here on behalf of the Tijuana track, announced today the appointment of Francis Nelson as presiding steward for the meeting there.

S. M. Henderson sold privately this morning to Mrs. M. Merle the horse Rifle, which will be raced next winter.

BIG FRENCH RACE WON BY MACOMBER

Quite a triumph fell to A. K. Macomber at Paris October 10, when his two-year-old colts Plusia, ridden by Frank O'Neill, and Cortland, ridden by Garner, finished first and second in the important Grand Critereum Stakes. This is about the most important French Stake race for two-year-olds and is at a mile, with \$10,000 added.

The Prix du Conseil Municipal at a mile and a half, for three-year-olds and over, with \$20,000 added, was run on the same day and was won by F. Grumetz' four-year-old colt Le Rapin, by Chulo—Palette, by Fra Angelico, with A. Ekman's four-year-old colt Dolphin second and Charles Leinart's six-year-old horse King's Cross third. In the unplaced division were Mr. Macomber's three-year-olds Bosobel and Meddlesome Maid.

CHEVALIER GENESTRELLI'S IDOL

SIGNORINA HAD NO PRICE

Three years after Signorina's success for the late Chevalier Genestrelli came Signorinetta by Chaleureux, which, to the surprise of almost everybody except her owner, easily won the Derby of 1908, ridden by W. Bullock, and starting at 100 to 1; while two days later she secured the Oaks in the same jockey's hands. After her second victory King Edward sent for the Chevalier to congratulate him, and I can see them now, the Italian with his Panama hat and a rather dirty suit, and His Majesty faultlessly dressed in fashionable London attire, bowing jointly to the cheers of the crowd as they stood in the front of the royal box. It is perhaps not generally known that the mare won the Derby on her owner's seventieth birthday. Signorinetta was never so good either before or after that Epsom week, and the Chevalier, an excitable man, would have it that he could never obtain suitable ground to gallop on, which was also his excuse with regard to other horses he had that failed to do well, and the epithets he applied to heath keeper Marriot concerning the heath must have greatly amused this jockey club official, if they ever came to his ears. December 13, 1911, the Chevalier sold Signorinetta to Lord Rosebery for \$52,500, and soon after this left for his native land. His colors were white and blue hoops, blue sleeves, white cap, and the first success of any importance they gained here was when Raffaello won the Manchester November Handicap of 1885, but this fine old sportsman will always be remembered through Signorina and her offspring. What he thought of St. Simon's daughter may be gauged by the fact that when he was offered the then gigantic and unheard-of price for a filly of \$100,000, as a two-year-old, he replied: "All England could not buy my mare." This was true, as he simply worshipped her.—Auda in Horse and Hound.

MAN O' WAR "PICTURES" SHOWN

At a dinner tendered to Louis Feustel, trainer of Man o' War, at the Police Club, a private showing was given of the Man o' War-Sir Barton race pictures. The Educational Film Co., which made the picture, has handled a difficult subject commendably, and it should prove of interest to both followers of turf affairs and the general public. The usual preliminaries are shown, such as work-outs, loading onto cars, etc. The actual scenes of the race give a good conception of the size of the crowd and a practically continuous view of the race. Sir Barton is shown breaking in front and Man o' War gradually cutting down his lead with every stride, then, when clear of Sir Barton, Kummer taking him under wraps until near the finish, where he let him have his head momentarily and, with a bound, draws away easily. DEATH OF NOTED ENGLISH STALLION

A horse which has left a noble legacy to thoroughbred died in the Argentine last April. It was the English-bred French sire Le Samaritain, the father of Roi Herode and grandfather of The Tetrach. Of his death a Buenos Ayres exchange prints this: "Le Samaritain, which stood for many years at the Haras Reyes, died suddenly at the Haras Ayacucho. At the recent dispersal sale of the Haras Reyes, Le Samaritain was bought by Dario E. Anasagasti for his Ayacucho Stud Farm, the price at which he changed hands being \$75,000. By Le Sancy, by Atlantic-Clementina, by Doncaster, Le Samaritain first saw the light of day in 1885. Thus he had reached the ripe old age of twenty-five years when he died. Le Samaritain furnished the Argentine turf with a large number of good winners, chief of his sons being Grey Fox, the only horse that ever lowered Botafogo's colors and Gran Senor, undoubtedly one of the best products of his year. Le Samaritain's prestige as a sire is well upheld in the old country through his descendants—Roi Herode, The Tetrach and many others. He had only served three mares at the Haras Ayacucho when he died. Le Samaritain's best son, Grey Fox, is to go to England during the coming winter to be established at one of the great studs as a sire.
