1920 CHAMPIONSHIP LESSON

Breeding Critic Says Cleopatra's Victory Emphasizes the Old Saying: "Blood Will Tell."

(BY EXILE.)

LEXINGTON, Ky., November 2.—More than one lesson is to be learned from Cleopatra's decisive win of the Latonia Championship Stakes, which was done on her carrying scale weight in the record time for the distance of 2:56 1/2, or three full seconds faster than the record previously held by the four-year-old Short Order...

Judging from the result of Latonia's big race, the standing of the winning sires and winning brood mare sires, it does not pay, with but few exceptions, to breed to and from horses which do not trace in every line of their pedigrees to the English General Stud Book.

Standing in the center field, when the horses were at the post for the big race, the question was put, "Which one do you fancy?"

My answer, "There is only one real thoroughbred in the lot—Cleopatra—and as this is a scale weight race over the St. Leger course, her chance must not be overlooked."

"What about John P. Grier and On Watch?" came next. I was forced to tell my interlocutor that I was fearful of the double dose of Domino in John P. Grier's dam, Wonder, and also of On Watch's Domino descent.

John P. Grier set a great pace for over one mile, but at the half-mile ground the second time around retired ignominiously. Best Pal, after the first mile, was absolutely incapable of living the pace and On Watch was as a man swimming.

Verily the result of the Latonia Championship is ample and sufficient evidence of the truth of the old-time saying, "blood will tell."

As the years pass there is to be noticed a strong tendency on the part of racing men to breed their own horses. The meaning of this is nothing else but a desire for better class racing. The day of the sprinter and big money-earning two-year-old is fast drawing to a close, and it is well that it is so, for the public is insistent in its demand for more long-distance racing, and this the only means by which the thoroughbred horse as bred in this country is to receive better recognition elsewhere...

Easterners finished one, two and three in the Latonia Championship, and for this there must be cause. Last year the race was won by the eastern-owned Mad Hatter; in fact, the wise men of the East seem most content to come and browse upon the rich and succulent racing grass as provided by the enterprising executive of Latonia. It is not my desire to exploit the merit of any one particular breed of thoroughbred horse if there be any such thing as an American, French or Australian thoroughbred horse, but rather to enlighten breeders as to facts which in this case is the outstanding and incontrovertible fact that members of the obscure families have outlived, in toto, their usefulness as progenitors and in great part as performers.

THIRTY LEADING AMERICAN JOCKEYS

Last week's racing gave "Buddy" Ensor eight winning mounts, third place in the list of thirty most successful riders of 1920, and made him the third to place more than 100 victories to his credit. He is likely to progress to second place this week, but from the way Butwell is riding the latter expert means to maintain his pride of place as the leader. He won six races himself last week. AUSTRALASIAN CHAMPION GLOAMING PROBABLY GONE FROM RACING

The Australian middle distance champion Gloaming has probably done with racing. The Sydney (N. S. W.) Referee of September 10 says:

"One of the regrettable happenings of last week was that Gloaming, after doing a fast three-quarters at Randwick, bled so freely that his withdrawal from the Chelmsford Stakes was necessitated, and there is no chance of his competing at the Australian Jockey Club spring meeting. Of course, he is now out of work, and, until he recovers, it is impossible to say whether the trouble is likely to have lasting effects. It is unfortunate for owner and trainer that anything should have gone wrong with Gloaming, as he never looked better than this time, and his track form at Randwick suggested that he was an even greater galloper than last season. It was thought he might be sent back to New Zealand immediately, but he is to remain here until trainer Mason returns home with Mr. Greenwood's other horses."

PROMINENT AMATEUR RIDERS INJURED

F. Ambrose Clark of New York and A. J. Devereaux of Philadelphia, two of the best amateur cross-country riders in the country, were injured when their mounts fell during the running of the Foxhall Farm Cup Race at Foxhall Keene's estate in Maryland last Saturday. CHURCHILL DOWNS RACING

Weather Conditions Unpropitious, but Good Sport Is Provided.

Falls City Handicap Falls Prey to Woodtrap's Gameness—Jack Hare Jr. Wins Easily.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., November 2.—The Churchill Downs fall meeting opened today with a big attendance, but under unfavorable weather and track conditions. The star race of the day was the Falls City Handicap, with \$5,000 added. There was considerable scratching from this, but that did not prevent a capital race and a highly exciting finish in which Woodtrap prevailed over Sands of Pleasure by a narrow margin, largely because King rode Sands of Pleasure with bad judgment in having him in the worst going most all the way. Sterling finished a distant third.

In the secondary feature Jack Hare Jr. won from Col. Taylor and The Boy with a measure of ease, showing that his recent defeat by The Boy at Latonia was all wrong.

C. H. Lansdale and J. H. Moody, who are making arrangements for the Havana special horse train, are planning to have the special leave the South Louisville yards the day following the close of the Downs meeting. From the number of applications received for space, it is believed over twenty arm cars will be necessary to transport the horses. Recent applicants include: W. Raymond, O. W. Van Winkle and O. Muckenfuss. Applications for passports to Cuba are being received by J. H. Moody, at Churchill Downs.

The stable of Mose Goldblatt will be shipped Wednesday by express from Latonia to Havana, B. Kennedy, who has signed to ride for the Goldblatt stable will go along with the shipment. H. Tullett arrived Tuesday from Canada with Sweet Apple, Ikey T. and three others.

J. W. Dwyer got in at the same time with the two-year-olds Lucky Piece and Chilly Day.

J. S. Ward bought privately this morning the colt Merrimac from S. K. Nichols.

Dave Leary, assistant to Sam C. Hildreth, arrived last night from New York in advance of the two-year-old Grey Lag, which is an intended starter in the Kentucky Jockey Club Stakes. The colt was to have reached here last night, but late this afternoon was still en route and may not reach here until late during the night.

"Sandy" McNaughton, intending to start Ten-Lee in the Jockey Club Stakes, wired here this morning for information when it is to be run.

James Fitzsimmons may send Playfellow, brother to Man o' War, to start in the same race.

Martin Nathanson, secretary of the Havana track, departed for Cuba this morning, to begin preliminary duties attending the opening of the winter meeting in the Cuban capital.

Trainer James Rowe of the Harry Payne Whitney horses wired here today for reservation for four horses that he intends to ship immediately. It is presumed that the band will include an intended starter in the Jockey Club Stakes.

The silks of Bud Fisher, noted cartoonist, was seen on a Kentucky track for the first time when Hold Up started in the second race.

A. B. Letteller, one of the principal directors in the New Orleans Business Men's Association, was among the visitors.

Capt. B. C. Bunbury was an arrival today.

CURRENT NOTES OF THE TURF

One of the recently completed improvements at Pimlico is a covered roadway from the grandstand to the pari-mutuel machines.

Greyhound racing (coarsing) now holds sway at the old Emerysville track in California, where once the noble thoroughbred reigned supreme.

W. C. Weant lost the horse Iolite en route to Tijuana. The horse contracted ear fever and had to be unloaded at Tucson, Arizona, where he died of pneumonia.

Australia doesn't encourage light weight riders. In the Melbourne district only one 96-pound boy, W. Crockett, is licensed and only five of the rest can ride at 100 pounds.

Entries for the National Horse Show, to be held at Madison Square Garden, New York, from November 15 to November 20 inclusive, have exceeded those of any year since 1913, the total number being 1824.

The prize race of the Argentine, the Prix Belgrano, value \$7,500 added, about one and five-eighths miles, was run at Buenos Aires September 26 and was won by Fair Play, b. c. 4, by Your Majesty—Perita, by Pietermaritzburg.

Probably the handsomest thoroughbred ever bred and raised at Napa Stock Farm is a strapping chestnut colt by Runnymede, dam the Salvation mare Salvatrix. He has height, length, noble forehead, bone, substance—in fact, everything a high-class race horse should possess.

English turf critics predict a fine future for a lightweight apprentice rider, G. Speck, who is attached to H. Escott's establishment. He recently rode two winners in one day at Newbury and old-timers consider that he recalls George Fordham to them in that great jockey's youthful days.

Questionnaire, the stallion recently donated by Edward Arlington to the Breeding Bureau of the Jockey Club and in turn passed on to the federal government, was inspected by Major C. L. Scott of the Remount Service and pronounced an ideal type. The big stallion will be sent to Front Royal, Va., within a few days.

The United States government will be represented in the thoroughbred classes at the coming National Horse Show in Madison Square Garden by three of the best stallions in its service. These will be Greek Legend, by Polymelus; Ganadore and Zenith, the latter by Ogden. All are more than sixteen hands in height and weigh more than 1,200 pounds.
