## MAD HATTER'S GRAND RACE

### Defeats Boniface in Grueling Finish in the Bowie Handicap.

### His Seventh Straight Success Achieved After a Wonderful and Game Performance.

BALTIMORE, Md., November 8.—Some great horses have won the Bowie Handicap, but none ever showed a better performance than did Mad Hatter when he beat Boniface by a nose in a grueling finish in this famous old Maryland race at Pimlico this afternoon. Mad Hatter carried 120 pounds, made all the pace and, displaying great speed and rare courage, managed to outstay J. K. L. Ross' gallant Boniface. The pace was fast from the start and the winner raced into defeat The Porter and Yellow Hand in the first mile, then proved too much for Paul Jones when the Kentucky Derby winner threatened on the far turn. In the stretch run Boniface came through next to the inside rail and was gradually wearing down the gap which separated him from the leader. He could not quite make it, however, and Mad Hatter won by the smallest of margins after a great finish. Exterminator, the top weight, had a rough race, being cut off whenever Fairbrother made an effort to get through. He was the principal sufferer of all the starters and with a clear course would undoubtedly have been a more prominent factor. The mile and a half was run in 2:31 1/2 and today's victory was the seventh straight scored by Mad Hatter.

The running of the Lawson Steeplechase, the conditions of which called for jockeys who had never ridden a winner in a steeplechase, resulted in quite a spectacular finish. Going to the last jump near the head of the homestretch, Jarboe, who had the mount on Stucco, caught hold of the leader Fair Mac's tall and when the pair took the last fence he had hold of Fair Mac's bridle. He clung to it until the last hundred yards and, instead of going to the left of the rail which marks the course at the finish, he elected to go to the right and took the water jump in front of the stand. Fair Mac was kept in the proper course and finished off by himself.

After the race the stewards issued a ruling as follows: "Jockey R. Jarboe has been suspended for the remainder of the meeting by the stewards for foul riding in the second race. His badge is to be taken up and he is to be denied the privilege of the grounds for the remainder of the meeting. His case will be referred to the stewards of the National Steeplechase and Hunt Association.

### TEN-LEC TO WINTER QUARTERS.

S. A. McNaughton decided to retire Ten-Lec after her race in the Walden on Saturday last and the filly was shipped back to Belmont Park this morning, where she will join the remainder of the Foreign stable racers, which have gone into winter quarters at the Long Island track. Mr. McNaughton will leave for New York tomorrow.

Entries for the Pimlico Futurities, which closed today, simply poured in, and it looks as if the produce of every good mare in the country has been nominated. A number of entries were also received from abroad. H. G. Bedwell made ninety-eight entries for Commander Ross, fourteen of which were for next year's running of the stake.

W. J. Beyer has decided to make a steeplechaser of Dumandel and the horse will be sent to Benning to get his early education.

Verity was claimed after her victory on Saturday by S. Louis for \$2,207. This mare has changed hands over a dozen times since last spring.

E. K. Bryson has decided to retire Bellingher and Haran until next spring and the pair will be sent to the Devers Farm, near Perryville, Md., where they will join the steeplechaser Jack of Spades, which has been there for a couple of months.

G. Bryan, who left for New Orleans a few weeks back to inspect the Jefferson Park plant, was an arrival. He reports everything ready for the opening in New Orleans and predicts a great meeting there.

The conditions of the Monkton Steeplechase, to be run Thursday, November 11, have been changed as follows: \$5,000 handicap for four-year-olds and over, the winner to receive \$3,250, the second horse \$1,000 and sixty per cent of any penalties, the third horse \$500 and forty per cent of any penalties, and the fourth horse \$250.

Three claims were made during the afternoon, which were as follows: Sobrigade was taken by the Morris stable for \$2,525; My Friend Pat was claimed by R. P. Shaner for \$1,550, and Deckmate went to E. P. Summerfield for \$2,020.

## NINETY-SEVEN RACING DAYS

### New Orleans Meeting to Be Run from Thanksgiving to St. Patrick's Day.

NEW ORLEANS, La., November 8.—Horsemen and tourists are beginning to arrive in New Orleans preparatory to the inauguration of the winter racing season, which formally opens at Jefferson Park Thanksgiving Day, November 25. With crews of laborers working on both the Jefferson and Fair Grounds tracks, and the daily work-outs of the horses already quartered here, a racing atmosphere is already discernible.

Although there has been no definite announcement made, it is generally understood here that New Orleans will have a run of ninety-seven days of racing. It was at first hinted that there would be no spring meeting at the Jefferson Park track, but things have taken a sudden turn and it looks now as if there will be thirty-two days of racing at this track following the conclusion of activities at the Fair Grounds.

Jefferson Park opens Thanksgiving Day and will continue until January 1, when the Fair Grounds will usher in its annual meeting. The Fair Grounds will run for thirty-three days, ending February 8, Mardi Gras day, when the Jefferson Park meeting will be resumed until St. Patrick's day, March 17.

Purse offerings at both the local tracks will be the largest in the history of the sport here. No purse will be less than \$600 at Jefferson Park and there will be only two such races a day. Four of the daily races will be of \$700 each and the other race will be a daily overnight handicap valued at \$1,000. Last winter both racing associations fixed up their plants for the comfort of horses and horsemen and both tracks now present some of the best barns to be found anywhere.

More and more horsemen each year are going in for winter racing, it having been learned that winter racing does not spoil horses. On the contrary, many thoroughbreds have gone right from here and held their own on the New York, Kentucky and Maryland tracks. Omar Khayyam went right from here one year and won the Kentucky Derby.

Among the best stables that are coming here will be that of C. W. Clark, whose gelding Victor won two \$5,000 stakes here last winter. Victor will be with the string which trainer Barnes brings down, as will Captain Mac and Sway, both of which have raced exceptionally well this year.

## THIRTY LEADING AMERICAN JOCKEYS

No rider achieved double figures in races won last week. L. Ensor was nearest to it, with six. Next to him came J. Butwell and J. Mooney with five each. Ensor is now second to Butwell in the struggle for the riding premiership of the year, but Butwell has an advantage of sixteen of the most winning mounts and is riding as if grimly determined to hold it. ## TWENTY-EIGHT WHITNEY WEANLINGS

(BY T. B. CROMWELL.)

LEXINGTON, Ky., November 8.—Literally "knee deep in blue grass" at Harry Payne Whitney's Kentucky branch of the Brookdale Stud on the Maysville pike one sunny morning this week the writer saw twenty-eight weanling thoroughbreds and not a scrubby, scrawny-looking one among them. They, as elsewhere in this section this year, seem better grown and more uniform than is usual at this season in the lives of the "baby racers."

Pointing to a robust chestnut colt, the writer inquired as to the breeding of him which had about him, aside from his striking individuality, an air of superiority such as betokens a racing prospect of the first class. "That's the brother to Red Red Rose," replied Jimmy Haynes, who is in charge of the mares and their produce. "He is by Whisk Broom II.—Cardamine, a mare brought over from Europe by Mr. Whitney, she being by Sir Archibald, dam the American mare Alster Cross, by Watercross—Hamburg Belle, by Hamburg." Some pedigree that, and this fellow looks like he will race up to it when he comes into Jimmy Rowe's hands.

The best looking of the get of Broomstick is the bay colt, dam Starling, by Hamburg—Bonnie Star (dam of Vega, Bonnie Witch, Bonnie Broom and Cresson), by Star Shoot. Starling's first is the winner Sticking, also by Broomstick. Running him a close second in appearance, the chestnut filly from Folderol is an admirable daughter of Broomstick. Folderol is by Burgomaster—Jinks, by Albert. The brown colt by All Gold—Rumpus resembles Damask. Rumpus is a daughter of Hamburg—Hurley Burley, by Riley—Elder Skeiter, by the English sire Pell Mell. Another colt from a Hamburg mare that shows up to advantage is the chestnut son of Penant—Rose of Dawn, dam Poetess, by The Bard. A splendid filly is by Sweep—Cafe-au-Lait, a daughter of Meddler, which was in France until last year. These seem to be "the tops," but, of course, there may be some among the twenty-two not mentioned that will outshine them on the track. One cannot always pick the winners at weaning time.

## ROUTINE DAY AT LOUISVILLE

### Day Given Over to Platers in the Main, With Nothing Especially Appealing.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., November 8.—An ordinary racing card was offered patrons of the Churchill Downs course this afternoon and, coupled with threatening weather, caused a decreased attendance to witness the sport. The mile purse featured and it resulted in a victory for Rapid Day, but his backers after the finish were kept in suspense while awaiting to learn the stewards' verdict with respect to the interference the horse was forced to commit as a result of M. Garner's action in guiding him sharply across Dr. Carmen when he was wrestling the lead from the latter while about to round into the stretch. Dr. Carmen was practically eliminated as a result of the interference, the most contention in the stretch to Rapid Day being offered by Legal and Travesty, the first named taking second place by a scant head.

The stewards evidently took into consideration the fact that Dr. Carmen's failure to finish among the placed ones would prevent him from being in any wise benefited in the event of Rapid Day's disqualification, so they left the finish undisturbed, but Garner came in for immediate attention and he will not ride any more for the rest of the meeting.

E. R. Bradley uncovered a speedy youngster in the maiden two-year-old race in his Brown Check, a first-time starter, which won in easy style from Willow Tree and Dark Friar.

High Gear furnished an upset when he won the opener from fourteen other platers.

According to reports, E. C. Smith and M. N. Macfarlan will serve as stewards at the New Orleans Fair Grounds next winter; J. B. Campbell will be racing secretary and Joe McLennan clerk of the scales. Campbell and McLennan will also act as placing judges. A. B. Dade will again serve as starter. The complete list of officials will be made known tomorrow.

John Lowe will ship his horses to Havana and compete in the winter.

Guy Fortune had to be excused from starting in the third race on account of an ailment.

S. A. Clopton's Maryland string will be shipped to New Orleans Wednesday.

Gruber & Borgman claimed Accelerate for \$2,200 in the last race today.

## LOSE VALUABLE PETER PAN WEANLING

### Only Colt of Year by H. P. Whitney's Noted Stallion Dies of Colic—Latest Kentucky Gossip.

LEXINGTON, Ky., November 8.—Harry Payne Whitney and Al Smith had a piece of bad luck here Sunday afternoon when the weanling black colt by Peter Pan—Dorval, by Dabbin, died of colic. Dorval is owned by Smith and Peter Pan by Whitney. The mare and stallion were mated on shares, the colt resulting being owned in partnership. Since it was the only colt of this year by Peter Pan and a likely individual, there had been some negotiations on the part of Whitney for Smith's interest.

Following Tryster's splendid victory at Louisville Saturday afternoon Smith's father suggested to his son that he should have his interest insured and about 10 o'clock Sunday morning Smith tried to get an insurance agent on the phone. Shortly afterward Charles H. Berryman, representing Whitney, phoned Smith that he would be at his farm Monday morning to see the colt and say whether or not Whitney would take him at \$5,000. Smith then decided that he would not insure the colt pending Berryman's visit. About 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon Smith was called from the dinner table by one of his men with the statement that the colt was sick with colic. Doctors Hagyard and Coover both were called, but were unable to save the colt. The only weanlings by Peter Pan now are three fillies, one at Smith's, one at A. E. Hundley's farm near Danville and one at the Whitney farm here.

## JOCKEY O'NEILL SUSPENDED IN FRANCE

PARIS, France, November 8.—The American rider Frank O'Neill has been suspended indefinitely for being left at the post Friday with Le Chatelet, the favorite for the Royal Oaks Stakes at the St. Cloud course. O'Neill explained to the officials that the horse would not start for him despite all persuasion, but the excuse was not effective. O'Neill rides for the Macomber stable since Mr. W. K. Vanderbilt's death and now leads all the French jockeys with a total of 127 wins. Another American rider, who also is attached to the Macomber stable, Guy Garner, is next to O'Neill with fifty-four races, and still another American, M. McGee, is third with fifty-two victories.

## PHILIPPIC TO BE RETIRED TO STUD

BALTIMORE, Md., November 8.—E. K. Bryson will race Philippic until the middle of February, when he will be retired to the stud. The horse will stand in Maryland, probably at the Devers Farm. He is considered one of the best bred horses in the country, being by Cicero—Quair, by Orme, a mare that Mr. Cochran paid \$25,000 for in England.

## LEADING WINNERS OF 1920

### H. P. Whitney Heads the Owner List—Man o' War the Horses.

### Fair Play Makes Great Record as Premier Stallion—J. Butwell the Foremost Jockey.

The racing season of 1920 is fast approaching its end. Not since the prosperous days of 1906 and 1907 has racing reaped such a golden harvest as it has this year. Even the remarkable figures of those years are likely to be surpassed when the final returns for 1920 are in. The revival of Canadian racing on a greater scale than ever before and the vast increase in the values of stakes and purses in Kentucky, Maryland and New York made this possible.

So great was the general increase in money distribution everywhere that the list of owners who won \$10,000 or more is probably larger than ever before and unfortunate indeed is the owner who did not win at least \$5,000 this year. The victory of Tryster in the Kentucky Jockey Club Stakes last Saturday practically clinched the leadership of the year for his owner, H. P. Whitney, after one of the closest and most sensational contests on record. At the end of Saturday's racing the Whitney total stood at \$267,707, while his nearest and most dangerous rival, J. K. L. Ross, had \$239,436 to his credit. Third in the list is the Glen Riddle Farm, which houses the champion Man o' War. Captain Ral Parr is next, the fourth owner to win over \$100,000. W. J. Salmon and E. R. Bradley are the remaining two of the first six, the records of whom, including the racing of Saturday, November 6, are as follows:

As befitting a champion, Man o' War leads the winning horses and by such a margin that he stands aloft, virtually alone in his pride of place. The unbeaten two-year-old Tryster is second in the list, but there is no certainty that he will retain the exalted position to the end with Exterminator, Paul Jones and Boniface in threatening nearness. Fair Play, the daddy of Man o' War, holds undisputed sway at the head of the American stallion list for 1920, with no chance of being displaced, no matter what the outcome of the remaining racing. Fair Play's total for the year will be greater than that to the credit of any other American stallion in the history of the American turf with the exception of Commando, and he may even surpass his \$270,345, the greater part of which was won by the great Colin.
