SOME RAIN AT LOUISVILLE

Light Showers Affect the Going, but Not Seriously.

High Cloud Wins Feature Race in Which Beaverkill Figures In—Long Shot Day.

(BY J. L. DEMPSEY.)

LOUISVILLE, Ky., November 9.—Showery weather, a deceptive track and ordinary starters in the different dashes were a combination that militated against the sport today and the racing was marked by many upsets as well as surprises in the way of long-priced winners, notably the success of Columbia Tenn in the opening dash and Sandalwood's in the fourth race.

The going, moist in places, firm in others and cuppy in spots, worked to a disadvantage against most of the starters, but on the whole the racing was spirited and finishes interesting.

The only race that had a semblance of being a feature was the mile and a sixteenth dash, in which Beaverkill ruled favorite, but mainly through the fact that there was doubt as to High Cloud's ability to race in the going successfully.

Golden Quince and J. C. Stone, the latter at odds-on, were the only successful choices of the afternoon. Both had to be ridden out to the finish in front of their respective opponents.

In the introductory scramble Rufus Riley had the call and he might have beaten Columbian Tenn but for being brought extremely wide into the stretch.

Connelly's good ride was a factor in Golden Quince's graduation from the maiden ranks. She was hard pressed by Blanche Mac and Corilla.

Julia N., a frequent disappointment this fall, was again an offender when she failed to get a part of the purse in the fourth race, won by Sandalwood. The favorite had no mishaps. Jim Daisy in this, which finished third, was claimed for \$1,700 by G. Denny.

Military Girl and Lancelot were backed to the exclusion of the others in the sixth race, but neither figured in the result. Blaise winning from Currency by virtue of the energetic finish Connelly gave him.

Then Newel W. brought joy to a few who manifested it in hilarious whooping when he galloped home at the big return of \$370.20 for each \$2 invested on his chance. The backers of Stevenson at odds-on did not whoop. He fell badly lame in the race.

MEET HORSEMEN'S DEMANDS

Fair Grounds to Give \$7,500 Daily Purses—E. C. Smith to Succeed Joseph A. Murphy.

NEW ORLEANS, La., November 9.—Granting of a \$7,500 daily purse distribution, under a provisional agreement and appointment of E. C. Smith of New York to succeed Joseph A. Murphy as presiding judge at the Fair Grounds constituted the chief business of the meeting Tuesday afternoon of the Business Men's Racing Association board of directors. The meeting was held at the Fair Grounds offices.

Serving in the judges' stand with E. C. Smith will be Malcolm Macfarlan, who is presiding steward at the Devonshire race track and who has been prominently connected with the thoroughbred sport for many years. President B. C. McClelland, just returned from Kentucky, where he held several meetings with the Thoroughbred Horsemen's Association, laid before the board of directors the provisional proposition, which he had worked up with the horsemen. Briefly, the proposition is this:

There are to be six \$1,000 purses and one \$1,500 purse at the Fair Grounds each day, starting New Year's day and continuing for the thirty-three days' meeting. Twenty-five per cent of all purse money is to be held in escrow by the association until such time as it will be proved the profits of the association will equal or exceed \$75,000 over and above all expenses, including the payment of \$35,000 on the City Park race track and an additional \$13,000 interest. In other words, the association must clear \$123,000 above all usual expenses to go through with the \$7,500 daily purse total. As soon as it is known the association's profits will reach that sum, the horsemen will be paid off in full. If the association's profits show under the stipulated \$75,000, an amount necessary to make up the difference will be deducted from the sum held in escrow. If all the money in escrow is needed, the purses will stand as originally paid in cash and will amount to only \$5,625 per day.

In granting the horsemen's provisional terms, the directors of the Business Men's Racing Association felt they were taking a move for the good of racing and for the good of New Orleans in general. Including the payments on City Park race track will mean one big thing racing can do for the city, it was believed, and, for that reason, the majority of the directors held the proposition a sound, business-like one.

Other racing officials to serve at the coming meeting were chosen as follows: Joseph A. McLennan, racing secretary; J. B. Campbell, clerk of the scales; A. B. Dade, starter; Wash R. Norvell, patrol judge. Present at yesterday's meeting were President McClelland, Frank St. John, A. Burglass, Arturo del Orto and Henry Pedarra.

OUR TWENTY BEST TWO-YEAR-OLDS

TRYSTER SELECTED AS THE CHAMPION OF THE YEAR, WITH LEONARDO II. NEXT BEST AND GREY LAG THIRD—THREE CAPITAL FILLIES CLOSE UP

Although quite a large number of races will be won by two-year-olds between now and January 1, 1921, the story of the year is made up, so far as the high-class two-year-olds are concerned. There was no equal to Man o' War abroad this year, nevertheless some highly promising young horses were developed, and there is a cheerful promise of good three-year-olds for next year.

By virtue of his unbeaten career, winding up with his smashing victory in the Kentucky Jockey Club Stakes at a mile last Saturday, Tryster is clearly entitled to take rank as the champion two-year-old of 1920. By the same token of having won all his races, the Hopeful Stakes winner, Leonardo II., is as plainly labeled for second place. Both are splendid two-year-olds which met all that was required of them satisfactorily. It might be said that Incheup won his two races in a way that made a great impression, but he had to be retired early on account of unsoundness, and it is said to be doubtful whether he ever goes to the post again.

It is an open question whether some of the fine fillies of the year do not come next to the stars mentioned. Certainly in Prudery, Careful, Step Lightly, Crocus, Ten-Lec, Nancy Lee, Idle Dell and Believe Idle Hour there is a group unusual in any year, and it may be that the colts are not to have things all their own way in the big stakes for three-year-olds next year. The racing of Careful and Prudery will stand a lot of inspection and dissection.

A number of two-year-olds came out in early racing which were quickly marked to do great things, but they did not. Some of them may make good next year. In the meantime, the twenty that seem best by the test of meritorious racing and their records are the following:

STAR HAWK YEARLINGS ARE SPEEDY

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., November 9.—Trials of highly bred yearlings belonging to A. K. Macomber at the San Jose race track have awakened new interest in the thoroughbred in the picturesque Santa Clara Valley, one of the richest agricultural sections of California. The youngsters are being sent fast eighth and every little while townfolk and visiting horsemen come away with enthusiastic accounts of the exhibitions. Ten "babies" are in training. The race course and adjoining property were purchased last year by Mr. Macomber. The place is run in conjunction with the Elmwood Stock Farm, a few miles away, where the stallions and brood mares of the Macomber American establishment are quartered.

A trim looking bay, by the Sunstar horse Star Hawk—Myrtle Gale, worked an eighth in 11 seconds and a fraction the other morning in the presence of Walter B. Jennings, George W. Berry, W. W. Mendenhall and other well-known horsemen. This fellow is called aptly The Falconer. He is one of three Star Hawks among the yearlings, the other two being a handsome brown colt, dam the Prestige mare Orleans, and a neatly turned brown filly, dam the Cunard mare Cugrail. Mr. Jennings takes special pride in watching these youngsters gallop, as he says he trained few better horses in his long career than Star Hawk, their "daddy."

Myrtle Gale and Cugrail, dams of two of the Star Hawk yearlings, were not shipped to France last year along with other Macomber mares, as their pedigrees are lost in the so-called mists of early American breeding and their produce are not eligible to the English Stud Book. Orleans was shipped with Sunbonnet and the others to "La Belle France," her breeding being acceptable abroad. She is by Prestige—Olive Crag, by Wolf's Crag—Miss Olive, by Grammont.

Europe's loss is America's gain in the cases of Myrtle Gale, which is by Uncle, dam the Star Ruby mare Star Dreamer, and of the Cunard mare Cugrail. Breeders "over here" are ever on the lookout for just such mares, as they come of good old American stock, with the right admixture of blood from England and Australia.

In addition to the three Star Hawk yearlings at San Jose there are youngsters by Uncle, Dodge and Trap Rock.

CURRENT NOTES OF THE TURF

R. L. Rogers has sent John O. to John D. Carr's farm, where he was castrated and turned out.

Sailor, recently acquired by James McIntyre from J. W. McClelland, has been entered for the \$20,000 Coffroth Handicap.

The Triple Springs Farm is reported planning a winter campaign at Tijuana. Thunderstorm and Pen Rose will go with the shipment if one is sent.

J. E. Madden has consigned thirty mares to the Annual Breeders' Sale, to be held at Lexington from November 29 to December 4.

G. W. Forman is said to be considering dividing his big racing establishment, sending ten to Tijuana and the remainder to New Orleans. Manoeuvre, Columbine and Thrift will be included in the western shipment.

Clarence Buxton will go to New Orleans with a formidable string, including Baydue, Kashmir and War Mask. The latter is the property of Johnny Dundee, the New Orleans lightweight boxer, who also purchased half a dozen yearlings for Buxton to bring south to start in the "baby" races at the Fair Grounds.

IMPROVEMENTS AT CHURCHILL DOWNS

LOUISVILLE, Ky., Nov. 9.—With the close of the racing near the many improvements in contemplation are being worked out by manager Winn and a staff of architects. Among the new features for Churchill Downs next spring is a commodious clubhouse for use by the general public, and it will be located adjacent to the paddock.

Among the features the new clubhouse will combine a dining room and cafeteria, open to the general public. The upper part of the new clubhouse will, however, be private and afford hotel accommodations for the Kentucky Jockey Club's guests from distant points. There will be sixteen rooms installed, each with private bath.

The upper balcony surrounding the clubhouse will afford vantage points from which the guests will have opportunity to view the racing in the afternoon and training activities in the morning. Like at Latonia, where building is already under way, the improvements at Churchill Downs will be started as soon as the racing terminates.

ELKRIDGE TO BULLSEYE

Parr Jumper First in Feature Race Through the Field.

Exodus Defeats Some Fast Racers in Annapolis Handicap and Breaks Track Record.

BALTIMORE, Md., November 9.—The Elkridge Steeplechase of \$3,000 added was the chief offering of the Maryland Jockey Club at Pimlico this afternoon and the finish found Capt. Ral Parr's Bullseye and Ireland first and third, respectively. The race was for three-year-olds and furnished a thrilling contest. The Greentree stable's Tattle threatened to make a runaway race of it, but after opening a big early lead quit suddenly and dropped to the rear. Bullseye then moved to the front and, fencing faultlessly, held sway to the end, gamely and successfully resisting the fast closing rush of J. W. McClelland's The Trout. The latter ran a splendid race and was slowly wearing the winner down at the end. Ireland, the winner's stablemate, was third, but a tired-out horse.

Another one of Harry Payne Whitney's two-year-olds showed a high-class performance when the good-looking Exodus met and defeated a band of all-aged horses in the Annapolis Handicap, the main race on the flat. Incidentally Exodus hung up a new track record for the distance when he ran the three-quarters mile in 1:11 1/2. The pace was fast from the start. Motor Cop going to the front and showing the way at a dazzling clip. He lead until well into the final eighth, where Exodus overhauled him and, at the end, won going away. Motor Cop was driven hard to outstay Audacious for second place. The winner was ridden by Cottifletti, who used excellent judgment. This lad appears to be the lucky rider of the Whitney establishment and has scored in some of the richest stakes which the stable has won this year.

Despite the unpleasant weather a large attendance turned out to witness the sport. Milton Smith has arranged to leave for New Orleans tomorrow with his own horses and a division of the W. A. Burttschell string. Burttschell will remain over with a few to race at Bowie.

F. J. Kearns has purchased of W. J. Salmon the two-year-old filly Diffidence and will send her to Cuba with the shipment that leaves for Havana on Sunday.

Krewer, a three-year-old in the Hildreth stable, is reported to have developed a slight attack of fever, which accounted for his absence in the Annapolis Handicap.

Mr. and Mrs. C. H. Gilroy, in whose colors the speedy Mayor House races, were visitors from Buffalo.

Thirteen appeared a lucky number this afternoon. Thimble, Exodus and Nightstick being number thirteen on the program.

Preston Burch is looking for a farm to be leased to John Sanford with a view to establishing George Smith and a number of the Hurricane mares in Kentucky.
