



OPENING DAY AT BOWIE

Greatest Crowd in Its History Sees Inaugural Program.

Yellow Hand Easily Triumphs in Prince George Handicap—Tippity Witchet Wins.

BOWIE, Md., November 13.—One of the largest crowds ever assembled within the inclosure of the Southern Maryland Agricultural Association course witnessed the hollow victory of R. T. Wilson Jr.'s Yellow Hand, in the Prince George Handicap, at one mile and seventy yards, the inaugural feature of the final meeting of the year in Maryland. The winner was waited with in the early running, moved up rapidly rounding the far turn and drew away with a dazzling display of speed, to win as far as his rider wished. Rabidum kept close up throughout and gamely outstayed Recount for second place. The latter gained much ground in the last eighth.

Improved transportation facilities enabled racegoers to reach Prince George Park without the inconveniences formerly encountered in a trip to the Bowie track. This, together with ideal weather and a splendid racing program, brought out the largest gathering in the history of the course.

Fourteen two-year-olds responded to the bugle call in the opening dash, and those who cast their lot with the field profited handsomely, when Tan Son got up in the final strides to beat the favorite Bunter by a head. The latter was much best, but for having the worst of a rough race would probably have won easily.

J. W. McClelland's Bon Homme, heavily backed favorite in the Capital City Purse, never left the result of the race in doubt for a moment, rushing into a safe lead with the rise of the barrier and easily maintained it all the way, despite the best efforts of Billy McLaughlin and Polythia to overtake him.

The ever popular Tippity Witchet galloped home an easy victor in the six and a half furlongs race, for horses of all ages, running away from Wyoming and Jadda, which finished second and third respectively.

DANGER OF TURF WAR OVER

Jockey Club and Maryland Racing Commission to Meet and Discuss Shilling Case.

NEW YORK, N. Y., November 13.—There will be no turf war over the reinstatement in Maryland of Carroll Shilling. Instead, the Maryland Racing Commission's action over the case will lead to a conference between the commission and the Jockey Club, and probably a better understanding between the two bodies in future. During the conference, probably here early next week, some of the details of the misunderstanding are likely to be uncovered. Some of the political wedges and their users, such as were used in Kentucky and other places from time to time in the past—which, by the way, failed in Shilling's case recently in Kentucky—are likely to be uncovered.

The stewards of the Jockey Club held a meeting at headquarters yesterday afternoon and discussed the case fully, and invited Messrs. Kennedy, Oliver and Tawannus, the members of the Maryland Racing Commission, to meet them at the Jockey Club rooms at a convenient time to them early next week. Assistant Secretary Algernon T. Daingerfield left New York for Baltimore last night bearing the invitation.

Commander Ross will be present at a meeting here at which the Maryland Jockey Club representatives and Shilling will also appear. Ross thinks Shilling has been sufficiently punished, and will urge the Jockey Club to grant him a license.

From the Jockey Club after yesterday afternoon's meeting this statement was issued:

"At a meeting of the Jockey Club Friday, a quorum being present, the secretary presented a letter from the Maryland Jockey Club asking for a hearing for C. H. Shilling at which Commander J. K. L. Ross and a member of the board of directors of the Maryland Jockey Club could be present. On motion duly seconded, the secretary was instructed to notify the Maryland Jockey Club that such a hearing would be granted and to so advise Commander Ross and C. H. Shilling.

"Assistant Secretary Algernon Daingerfield of the Jockey Club was authorized to arrange for such a meeting.

"Assistant Secretary Algernon Daingerfield, representing the Jockey Club, will attend the opening of the meeting of the Southern Maryland Association at Bowie Saturday to consult with that organization."

PLANS OF RIDGLE-JEFFORDS STABLE

The Riddle-Jeffords stable plans for next year include the engagement of Jockey Edward Ambrose, a good rider, especially of two-year-olds. Mr. Riddle's trainer, Louis Feustel, with the care of Man o' War off his stout shoulders, will, in addition to the training of the horses of Mr. Riddle, also pat those of Mr. and Mrs. Walter Jeffords, which "Little Mike" Daly's recent death left without a trainer.

CANADA'S STATISTICS OF RACING

NEARLY DOUBLE AS MUCH MONEY DISTRIBUTED AMONG WINNING OWNERS AS IN THE MOST PRODUCTIVE PREVIOUS YEAR

Racing came back to our northern neighbors this year in such abundant measure as to eclipse all former records and in all departments. Especially was the gain in money distributed among winning owners noteworthy. The total was the huge sum of \$1,809,285, the greatest previous record in that regard being \$906,185 in 1916. This would have been beaten in 1917 but for the Order in Council, which suddenly stopped racing in Canada that year when about half of the scheduled meetings remained to be carried out. The lavish money provision for 1920 was rewarded with such a responsive attendance that the Canadian racing associations enjoyed a high measure of prosperity despite the heavy daily tax levied by the government. The racing was up to a high standard, and from time to time the best horses on their side of the Atlantic were among those seen in action.

Five racing clubs averaged in excess of \$10,000 in the matter of daily distribution, Kenilworth Park leading because of the \$80,000 in money and plate given for the famous clashing of Man o' War and Sir Barton. But for that race Kenilworth would have been third to Windsor and Woodbine. Details of the Monetary side of the remarkable Canadian racing season are provided in the following interesting tables:

Glen Riddle Farm Stable, otherwise Samuel D. Riddle, stands as the leading money winner of the Canadian racing field, solely because of the outcome of the Man o' War-Sir Barton race. J. K. L. Ross would otherwise have been the leader. His Canadian record of \$74,175 for the year shows that his provision of a stable for an exclusively Canadian campaign was a profitable enterprise, as well as helpful in adding to the attractions of racing in the Dominion. The stable of George M. Hendrie was third in money won, with a total greater than ever before fell to his share. A notable feature, outgrowth of the record-breaking total raced for, is that in Canada this year thirty-nine owners won \$10,000 or more, something unheard of in previous Canadian racing statistics. Following Mr. Hendrie in order the stables of H. Giddings, E. T. Zollcoffer, Sunnyland Stable, James Arthur, W. S. Kilmer, W. C. Weant, J. E. Skinker, F. Farrar and T.

RACING IN OLD MISSISSIPPI

Days of Ante Bellum Sport at Pharsalia Course Recalled.

Fatherland Stud Over 100 Years Old Still Nursery of Thoroughbred.

NATCHEZ, Miss., November 13.—In the ante bellum days no city in the United States surpassed Natchez for its population in the devoted interest displayed by its leading citizens in the sport of horse racing. Those were the days of the Pharsalia course, famous for the excellence of the sport seen over it, particularly in races at two and four-mile heats, which were notable for the bitter manner in which they were fought between horses owned by members of the Surget, Bingham and Minor families, which were closely related by ties of blood and marriage.

The Pharsalia antedated the Metairie course at New Orleans and it was the meeting place of the sportsmen of the South long before Lexington and Lecompte had their memorable duel over the Louisiana proving grounds which has long been a cemetery. That was the period when General Wells and Duncan F. Kennor delighted in crossing the Mississippi River from Louisiana to give battle to their fellow sportsmen of that date. Prizes were liberal for these tests and there were always trophies of the greatest beauty in addition to the money award.

MAJ. T. J. CARSON LOCATED THERE.

There is some of the old time sporting spirit alive still, which augurs well for the future of the thoroughbred in the South. For example, they are still breeding thoroughbreds at the Fatherland Stud. Major Thomas J. Carson, who now lives near here, is authority for the statement that the Fatherland is the oldest breeding institution of its kind in the Union that has remained continuously in the possession of one family as a nursery of thoroughbreds for more than a hundred years. This stud was originally established by Adam L. Bingham, who was succeeded by his cousin, James Surget, James Surget, the son of that same James Surget, recently, at the age of 84, and the breeding interest of Fatherland have been assumed by his daughter Carlotta, now Mrs. David L. McKittrick, who has bought the Rock and Stallion Fern Ranch from the Nursery Stud and will mate him with daughters of Cameron, by Medder, dam imported Annet Lyle, by Barcardine, and G. W. Johnson, by Iroquois—Brunette, by Bonnie Scotland.

Mr. Surget's early love was the chestnut horse Rataplan, a noted distance runner in the eighties, which he bought from the estate of Commodore Kitson of St. Paul. He was a son of Alarm or Reform—Lady Lumly, and nearly all of the mares now at Fatherland have some of his blood. For many years Mr. Surget was a constant visitor to Saratoga, but for a long time he took his pleasure with horses at home. He had a fine library of racing literature and the walls of his sitting room were covered with paintings or prints of famous Lexington, Fashion, Iroquois, Rock Sand, St. Simon, Isinglass and other famous American and English thoroughbreds.

For many years Peter Wimmer trained the horses of James Surget and had more than an ordinary run of success with them. In his later years he, however, raced none of the horses he bred and at the time of his death there were fourteen stallions at Fatherland and his second establishment at Cherry Grove.

Mrs. McKittrick, wishing to reduce the stud, has deposit of a number of the stallions and mares. Five of the former Decamerone, by Cameron—Vistala; Jeb Stuart, by G. W. LAUREL MEETING A HUGE SUCCESS

STAKE AND PURSE DISTRIBUTION TOTALS \$337,254--- CAPT. RAL PARR AND HIS COLT BLAZES THE BIGGEST WINNERS

Favored by pleasing weather conditions and with the foremost racing establishments of the East flying their colors at Laurel Park, the October meeting of the Maryland State Fair was, in every respect, the big success everyone expected it to be. During the twenty-six days of racing the imposing total of \$337,254 was distributed in stakes and purses, the daily average distribution amounting to \$12,971. Nine richly-endowed stake races brought into conflict the stars of the respective divisions, while large and well-matched fields of good handicap horses and platers of no mean ability fought for the generous overnight purses offered. Steeplechasing was given a prominent place on the program, a race through the field being provided every day, in addition to three stake features exclusively for the jumpers. Great crowds came to see the racing and the speculatively inclined found keen enjoyment in the battle against the "iron men," with the results, on the whole, entirely satisfactory to the public.

Capt. Ral Parr garnered the lion's share of the prizes distributed at Laurel. His horses won twelve races and \$30,839, giving him a substantial margin over H. P. Whitney, who won eight races and \$22,578, for the leadership of the winning owners. Others who enjoyed a goodly measure of success were E. B. McLean, J. K. L. Ross, S. Ross and W. J.
