PIMLICO'S BRILLIANT FALL MEETING

GREAT CROWDS SEE STARS OF THE TURF COMPETE FOR RICH PRIZES OFFERED BY MARYLAND JOCKEY CLUB

Marked by racing of a quality not excelled anywhere, the fall meeting of the Maryland Jockey Club came to an end Friday, November 12. Eleven days of diversified sport delighted and thrilled the patrons of the ever-popular Pimlico course, who turned out in large numbers to see the stars of the turf compete in the Manly Memorial Steeplechase, the most valuable jumping race run in this country; the Walden and Bowie Handicaps, the Pimlico Cup and many other attractive features. Seventy-seven races were run and \$177,492 distributed among the successful horsemen, the daily average distribution reaching the goodly sum of \$16,135.

MONARCH'S GREAT QUALITY
Tracery's Good Son and His Convincing Victory in the Middle Park Plate.

LONDON, England, October 26.—The Middle Park Plate was really the most interesting race of the Cesarewitch week. We had to guess which was the best of the two-year-olds. Still we are not now thoroughly clear because Alan Breck did not run, and Leighton, which is unbeaten, was not nominated.

There were 14 entries for the Middle Park Plate, which closed in November last year. In the future it is to be a stake with an added value of \$5,000. The \$25 entry is to be abolished. This year that source contributed over \$3,500 toward the \$5,000 given to the race. This year the owner of Monarch received \$18,125.

The eight runners for the race included the remainder of the two-year-olds of high class and brilliance. Lemonora started favorite owing to his defeat of Humorist and Alan Breck at Doncaster when the last named was a shadow of himself.

Monarch was a popular tip. He was confidently expected to win by all who knew most about him. Yet the public, as there was no mystery, would not have him. One might have asked the question, Why should not Monarch win? He had run six times. He won four good races, was unlucky at Ascot and was slain soon when Alan Breck beat him in July.

At a half mile it looked as though Monarch would win by two or three lengths. His jockey was riding so confidently that Humorist was able to reduce his lead. In the last eighth Monarch pecked twice, which no doubt enabled Mr Joel's second string to run to a head with Polemarch a length and a half away third.

Teofani is by Black Duck, an obscure son of Galopin-Cigarette, a mare by Marco, which Mr. Stevier bought as a yearling and raced unsuccessfully for two seasons. Teofani was her first foal.
