

One of the most remarkable horses that ever rar was Isaac, on which Sam Darling's grandfather won so many races in the early half of the last y. He was a gray horse, bred by the Hon Powlett in 1831, by Figaro—Jack Spigot' T. O. He ran first as a four-year-old in 1835, and he continued campaigning until 1846, running 101 times and winning forty-cight times. This career is even more remarkable than may be at first thought, for many of the races were run in heats needing two and often three struggles, so that in reality Isaac's life on the turf was even more strenuous than that of Fisherman. His great year was 1839, when he started twenty-three times and won nineteen races.—London Sportsman.

Delegations From Maryland and New York Reach Crescent City.

Work of Registering the Horses Begun—Old Campaigner Bringhurst Dead.

NEW ORLEANS, La., November 22.—Racing people fairly poured into this city from all parts of the country today. The largest delegation was from Baltimore, and it required several extra Pullman cars on the regular trains to accommodate the crowd from there. Hundreds more are coming on as as fast as they can get reservations, the Marylanders report. Quite a few came in from New York also, while the trains from Cincinnati and Louisville brought their share. There was plenty of life at both Jefferson Park and the Fair Grounds this morning, especially the former, where racing secretary J. L. Campbell opened his office for the registration of horses and issuing of badges for the meeting. There was a rush on the part of the horsemen to get their thoroughbreds listed and indications point to more horses being available than in any previous year.

Applications for trainers' and jockeys' licenses for the Jefferson Park meeting came in rapidly and they will be acted upon by stewards Joseph A. Murphy, Herman P. Conkling and Judge J. F. Monck immediately upon their arrival here. The riding colony is larger than ever and it comprises some of the leading jockeys of the country.

The Jefferson Park track was in much better condition than the Fair Grounds for work-outs this morning and an unusually large number of horses were exercised over it. There were quite a few out at the Fair Grounds, too, with the yearlings having their innings after the older horses were dispensed with. A number of stables moved either entirely or in part from the Fair Grounds to the Shrewsbury track today.

The second special horse train got in from Kentucky with the stables of Milo Shields. J. C. Brockmiller, Cain & Sanford, Mrs. M. Dattner, Paul Miles, Dan Miller, Joseph Tigne, S. M. Henderson, R. L. Baker and several others. Most of these will be stabled at the Fair Grounds.

TO RESTORE RACING IN MIDDLE WEST

There is a healthy movement in Chicago and St. Louis to revive racing in the right way. The Chicago men of high class who proposed in 1918 to establish a country club, with a racing and steeplechasing course as a side issue, on the edge of the northern suburb of Evanston, are now said to be ready to take the project up again. Labor shortage and general unrest checked the scheme two years ago. The Chicago and Illinois authorities are not against the right kind of racing. Proprietary tracks will never be tolerated in or near Chicago again. There is even a good chance in Illinois for a racing law with a racing commission and a law allowing mutuel betting on the Maryland and Kentucky plan. The Missouri movement is centered in St. Louis, where a strong preliminary organization has already been formed. From its members, when the time comes, will be organized the new St. Louis Jockey Club. which will control limited racing either under new legal permission or within the Missouri law as it now stands, only members being allowed to speculate among themselves on the oral plan, as used upon the New York race courses.

ENGLISH SIRE RECENTLY BOUGHT IN ENGLAND WAS A FINE RACE HORSE AND BRED ON LINES THAT WILL AID AMERICAN BLOOD STOCK GREATLY



The purchase of the stallion Brown Prince by Messrs. Miller, Headley and Johnson having been confirmed, it may prove of interest to readers of Daily Racing Form and breeders of bloodstock generally to know something of his turf career and the manner of his breeding.

Starting four times as a two-year-old, Brown Prince failed to win, though once placed second and three times third, always, however, running in good company. As a three-year-old the son of Dark Ronald was at his best, winning at the first time of asking the Spring Three-year-old Stakes at Newmarket so early in the season as April 17. Next came a string of five defeats, including a start in the New Derby, and it was not until the Newmarket Houghton meeting that Brown Prince found his racing legs and at this meeting won the Cambridgeshire from Planet and Grand Fleet, and followed this up by a win of the two and one-quarter miles Jockey Club Cup, beating St. Eloi, Danellon, Mr. Sanford's Nassovian and the Cesarewitch winner of the year, Furore, winning easily by three lengths, and the following season had a couple of outings, falling in each instance to gain a situation.

Brown Prince was bred in 1914 by Mr. Donald Fraser and is a brown son of Dark Ronald and Excellenza, by Haut Brion, and therefore, brother to Constancy's sire, imported Ambassador.

Here is his pedigree:



Dark Ronald, as winner of the Royal Hunt Cup and Princess of Wales Stakes, I take to be one of the best horses I ever saw race, and as long as he remained in England he proved himself an unqualified success as a sire, sending out such good winners as the One Thousand Guineas winner Vaucleuse, that nailing good horse Son-in-Law, Brown Ronald, My Ronald and the above-mentioned brothers. The European continental buyers, however, absorbed Dark Ronald and but little has been heard of him for some years past.

Bay Ronald, though not by any means the best racing son of Hampton, is, nevertheless, the strongest connecting link as the sire of Bayardo, Macdonald II. and Dark Ronald in the Hampton-Newminster-Lord Clifden chain.

Darkie, dam of Dark Ronald, is a member of a rather unusual branch of the No. 9 family, but, unusual or not, Dark Ronald is bred according to the blending of the blood plan of mating, his sire, Bay Ronald, being of Eclipse descent, and Darkie, his dam, tracing back in the male line to Herod.

Excelenza, dam of Brown Prince, is by St. Simon's son, Haut Brion, which was sent away to Australia, there to become a genuine success as a sire, and his dam, Bonnie Lassie, a daughter of the Matchem sire, Brother to Strafford. Oh, yes' after so long a time I believe all of you will agree that the blood of St. Simon has affinity for that of Melbourne.

Guibeyaz, dam of Excellenza, is by the Derby winner and good brood mare sire, Bend Or, and half-sister to imported Eothen, which during his somewhat abbreviated stud career sired such racing celebrities as Ethelbert and Requital. Sultana, which comes after, is by Oxford, from Besika, by Sultan's sire, Beiram, and so runs the pedigree to Merope, granddam of Galopin.

On account, then, of both his pedigree and performances, Brown Prince has much to recommend him as a sire, his Hampton descent being a big point in his favor, as also is the fact that his dam, Excellenza, hows the St. Simon-Melbourne cross close up. WANTED: A CERTAIN PATH TO SUCCESS

No Breeding Formula Yet Advanced Brings Definitely Established Results.

(BY SALVATOR.)

The series of essays by Exile upon the dams of famous performers and progenitors appearing re-cently in Daily Racing Form contains many inter-esting facts and deductions, but does it really give us any fresh light upon the subject which that writer took as his text—namely, the value of successful race mares as matrons. I confess that the many instances cited seem to me lacking in any systematic arrangement. Presented as they have been, they leave us like the perplexd philosopher, Omar Khayyam, who, in his familiar Rubalyat. recorded the fact that he did "eagerly frequent doctor and sage and heard great argument about it, and about," but eventually "came out by the same door where in he went." After all his citations Exile leaves us where we started. We all knew beforehand that many great runners and many great sires of great runners were out of mares that failed to distinguish themselves upon the race course; whereas, many others were out of mares that did distinguish themselves, and very highly.

If we are "looking for a lesson," how can we derive anything of any particular value from Exile's facts? It doesn't help us at all to tell us that it makes no difference at all whether a brood mare has or has not been a successful race mare—that everything depends upon blood, and blood alone. it makes no difference at all whether a brood mare has or has not been a successful race mare—that everything depends upon blood, and blood alone. This is far from a "counsel of perfection," for the good reason that so much perfectly good blood has produced so many perfectly shocking results. If it all depended upon blood, and blood alone, there would be some reason for hoping that the maze of breeding, while mighty, still was "not without a plan." But, alas, the plans work in so few instances! Ambitious breeders burn the midnight oil thumbing the Stud Books and Racing Calendars and rack their brains over "Mating Competitions" in much the same manner that chess experts do over problems in King's Gambit and other abtruse intricacies of that profound and profoundly fascinating game. And, like the chess player's problems, those of the breeder, in a risheartening number of given examples, produce—a stalemate. Of course it is a part—and a precious and all important part—of the breeder's problems that failure to solve them only spurs the student to further and more strenuous endeavors. Some of these endeavors, crowned with brilliant success, are proclaimed from the housetops and large black type tells the world about them—often right here in the Form itself. But as for the many and far more numerous others, which resulted in dismal failure or an approximation thereof—the mantle of charity, that wide and hospitable garment, which must of necessity always contain room for not one but millions more, is wrapped about them and they are forgotten or buried from sight with all possible expedition and address.

I wish somebody—could "Exile" do it?—would furnish us with some statistics on the number of stake winners, beginning with Derby winners and gradually descending to ordinary races of that genus, that "Mating Competitions" have produced. I suppose, in my ignorance, that there must be scads and shoals of 'em, but my doubt, or, rather, my lack of information on the subject, is encyclopedic. "Mating Competitions" are simply a welter of blood, and the very best blood at that. So bloody are they, indeed, that somehow I have found it difficult to come to grips with them. So much "pur sang" was more than my plain American system was able successfully to assimilate, as a matter of fact. But, boiled down to their residuum of stake winners, I think I could successfully get away with the pabulum.

But to return to the great question, Is it neces-

But to return to the great question, Is it necessary to use the blood of successful race mares in order to breed successfully? There is one feature of this discussion, which "Extle," probably from pure inadvertency, overlooked, that seems to me worth some attention. And this is the fact that,

unless my researches have misled me, it is practically impossible to tabulate the pedigree of any very great progenitor, or performer or family which has been prolific in producing them, without encountering the presence of mares that have highly distinguished themselves on the course. "Exile" says it makes no difference whether a brood mare has raced well or not. But if he can clinch this argument by tabulating the pedigree of any great performer or progenitor (or progenitrix) in which NO successful race mares can be found, he will, I humbly venture to think, have offered us something more luminous, in our search for "causes and consequences," than thus far he has presented.

resented.

I think it will surprise "Exile"—or anybody se who has never taken thought about the matter—when they attempt to do what I have requested, e., tabulate the pedigree of a great—preferably very great—thoroughbred in which the performing ancestress is totally a minus quantity. If our don't come across one coming, you will going, and most probably you will both ways. They may be in the first two or three generations, but it "keep agoing" and you will "get there."

REVIVAL OF DORMANT INFLUENCES.

The funny thing to me about the "developed dam" discussion is, most hugely, this. We are fed up with disquisitions on "pur sang" and "tap-roots" ad nauseam and colemly warned in the premises that hereditary influences persist for generations not only, but for centuries—there's that dear old d'Arcy's Yellow Turk, you know, and the Bloody Shouldered Arabian and Lady Thingumbob's Pet Maire and all the rest of those ancient and honorable equine worthies of a couple of hundred years ago (and then some). Jury it a might and the Mare and all the rest of those ancient and honorable equine worthies of a couple of hundred years ago (and then some). Isn't it a mighty and momentous fact that their blood goes marching right on and on, and if your Derby candidate did not deliver the goods, the explanation is that he was shy somewhere of a sufficient number of crosses to this hierarchy of saints and heroes. Nobody can dispute this—or would dare to. But when a famous race mare is tried out and doesn't throw a famous race mare is tried out and doesn't throw a triple-crown winner the first two or three times trying, she becomes a "horrible example" and there's no use trying to tell any breeder, or breeding expert, that her blood is valuable, just the same. And, as researches in heredity have revealed how influences lay dormant for generations and then assert themselves with dominant force, it is useless to stress the fact that in nature's own good time the ancestral excellences for the interim quiescent will blossom forth with interesting and valuable results.

No, this is the age of "quick action for your money" and such ideas cannot get across. But the dear old Saffron Turk and Huckleberry Royal Mare keep right on going over the top all the while. How I wish Mark Twain had turned his attention to equine genealogies and the theory of. "pur sang" in the thoroughbred! He could have written a companion volume to his "Connecticut Yankee at King Arthur's Court" that would have become an immortal classic. Yes, it is quite true; the best, the rarest books, are never written!

of Adventurer. Son of Newminster.

In the Racing Calendar for 1856 the names of two horses, both of them winners of classic races, appear for the first time as sires; two horses whose successes at the stud were abnormal and the rivalry between whom during the 'sixties was an object of deep interest to those who followed the history of the thoroughbred closely. Eagerly were the returns of the winning sires scanned at the end of each racing season to see whether Stockwell or Newminster headed the list, and it would perhaps not be very easy to say now which of the two has made the greatest mark on the thoroughbred. For if Stockwell was the sire of Lord Lyon, Blair Athol and Doncaster, Newminster has Hermit, Cathedral and Adventurer to set off against them. Arguments on such a subject are, however, not of much service and may be left for those who delight in them. Adventurer, by Newminster—Palma, by Emilius, her dam Francisca, by Partisan, out of an Orville mare, was foaled in 1859. He was a bright bay with black legs, standing about 15 hands 3 inches; was very speedy and full of quality and showed a great deal of the Newminster stamp. His pedigree is a fine one, for he has three crosses of Orville; one on his sire's side through Banter, the dam of Touchstone, and two on his dam's side, her sire Emilius being by Orville, while her dam was his granddaughter. There is a double cross of Alexander (son of Eclipse) as well, and Whalebone, Whiskey and Walton are also in the pedigree.

Adventurer made his first appearance on a race course in the Kingston upon Hull Stakes at Beverley. This was a race for all ages over six furlongs, and the two-year-old won easily by four lengths, beating Helenius, which was favorite, Rapparee and five others. It was his only win as a two-year-old, his next best performance being third to Longshot, 3 years, 103 pounds, and Southminister, 2 years, 84 pounds, in the Zetland Handicap at Richmond. This was for all ages over the straight half-mile, an abomination now happily done away with.

He was only out three times as a three-year-old and only showed to poor advantage; but on the following year he began to show the stuff he was made of. He began well by winning the Londesborough Plate at the Doncaster spring meeting, in which he carried the confidence of the public and started favorite.

His next appearance was in the City and Suburban, in which some rather sensational incidents took place. There were twenty-three runners. Gardener and Catch Em Alive, the latter of which won the Cambridgeshire later in the season, were first and second favorites, with Adventurer next in demand.

Noble, who rode Adventurer, was so anxious to get off that he took no heed of Mr. McGeorge's remonstrances, so was reported to the stewards and suspended from riding for six weeks. But there was trouble at the "other end" as well as at the starting post. He won by a neck from Umpire, and J. Adams, who rode the American horse, lodged an objection for cannoning. This, however, was overruled and Adventurer won his first important race. He ran five times more that season, his most important wins being the Great-Northern Handicap and the Flying Dutchman's Handicap at York, and Her Majesty's Gold Vase at Ascot. The latter race he won by a head from Wingrave, with Atherstone third, two lengths off. He only ran once in 1864, viz., in the Fitzwilliam Stakes at Doncaster, where he started the outsider of the party and won in a large field. This was his last appearance on a race course and in 1865 he went to the stud.

He was located at the Sheffield Lane Paddocks, where he stood for many years. It was a famous establishment once in its day was Sheffield Lane, and many good horses were turned out from it. It was entered upon something over sixty years ago by Mr. Andrew Johnstone, then the master of the Dumfriesshire hounds, and in his hands it became famous as the birthplace of the Middleham stables. After a few years had passed Mr. John Johnstone joined his brother, and shortly afterward the late Sir Robert Jardine joined the confederacy, the horses running in the nomination of Mr. J. Johnstone.

But in all probability the best of Adventurer's sons was Ishmael. His dam, Lena, by Stockwell—Selina, was stoutly bred, there being two crosses of Alexander and one each of Whiskey, Walton, Whalebone and Master Henry in the pedigree of her dam. Ishmael failed to score as a two-year-old, but in his first appearance the following year he "stretched the neck" of Scobell in the Epsom Grand Prize and the latter only just got home by a half length. He won the Great Yorkshire Stake at York, where he had Cameliard and Tristan behind him. The course was like a bog and the way Ishmael went through the deep ground was worth going a long way to see. He won the Liverpool July Cup and the Ayrshire Handicap in 1881, and in the following year the Ascot Stakes, the Ascot High Weight Plate and the Newcastle Handicap were the principal races that went to him. He also won several Queen's Plates. Among other horses that finished behind him may be named Fetterless, Limestone, Thebais and Hagioscope. He hit his leg when running in the Duke of Westminster's Plate at Chester and as the injury was a serious one he was at once put to the stud, where, however, he was not a great success.

The fame of Adventurer as a sire will, however, depend more on his daughters than on his sons. Agility, Apology, Polonaise, Wheel of Fortune and Bal Gal were sufficient to make the reputation of any sire. Almost invincible on the race course, they have bred some good winners, to wit: Oberon, Esterling, Aperse, The Devil to Pay, and Fire Damp among others.

It is a curious thing how some horses make their names as the sires of mares rather than of horses, and perhaps Adventurer is one of the most notable instances of it. Ishmael, as has already been stated, was perhaps the best of his sons. He was a good looking horse with great substance. His shoulders were well placed, his ribs well sprung, and his quarters beautifully turned, and so far as anyone could
