Predictions in horse breeding are frequently fraught with danger. However, I am willing to chance the prognostication that the star of Light Brigade is in the ascendant.

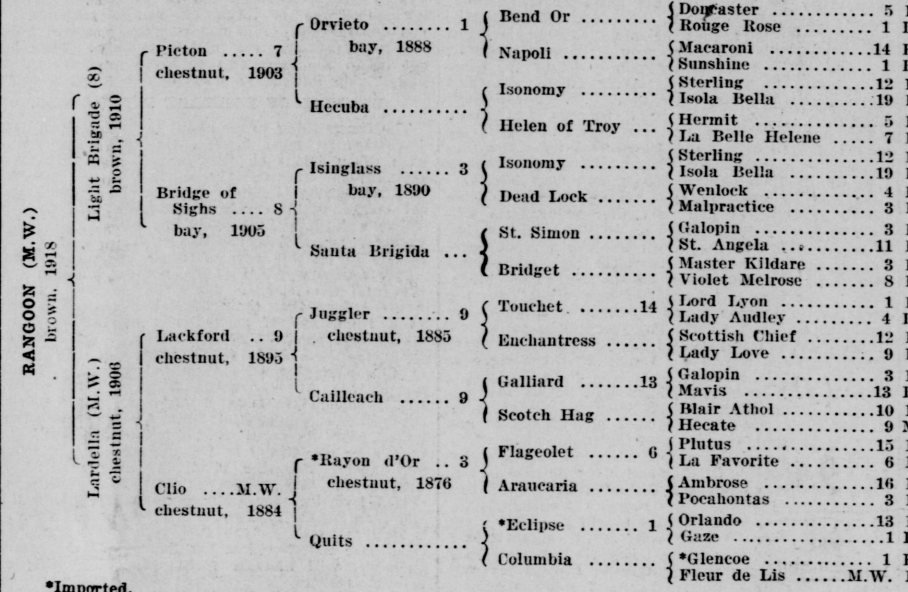

Back of Lardella come crosses of Rayon d'Or, Eclipse, Glencoe and Sovereign, truly a goodly array of race horses of high class and breeding, and Rangoon, a member of the best native family there is, that of Maria West.

Constantly I see reference in newspapers which devote a certain amount of space to the breeding of the thoroughbred horse to the worth of the old-fashioned American families.

Strange to say, both Rangoon and Leonardo II, trace back to Maria West, by way of Fleur de Lis, by Sovereign, for not since the days of Democrat has anything of real merit come from this branch of the family, but now in this year of grace, both East and West, is there a two-year-old shining light.

POURING INTO NEW ORLEANS

Delegations From Maryland and New York Reach Crescent City.

Work of Registering the Horses Begun—Old Campaigner Bringhurst Dead.

NEW ORLEANS, La., November 22.—Racing people fairly poured into this city from all parts of the country today. The largest delegation was from Baltimore, and it required several extra Pullman cars on the regular trains to accommodate the crowd from there.

Applications for trainers' and jockeys' licenses for the Jefferson Park meeting came in rapidly and they will be acted upon by stewards Joseph A. Murphy, Herman P. Conkling and Judge J. F. Monk immediately upon their arrival here.

The Jefferson Park track was in much better condition than the Fair Grounds for work-outs this morning and an unusually large number of horses were exercised over it.

The second special horse train got in from Kentucky with the stables of Milo Shields, J. C. Brockmiller, Cain & Sanford, Mrs. M. Dattner, Paul Miles, Dan Miller, Joseph Tighe, S. M. Henderson, R. L. Baker and several others.

The horses of Masterson & Rogers and J. H. Baker came down on one of the regular trains from Louisville. J. J. Troxler brought only two horses here, Hidden Talent and Captain Tom.

"Puddin'" McDaniel has ten horses of his own here to race during the winter.

The veteran Bringhurst, owned by C. W. Clark, died yesterday at the Fair Grounds of fever contracted while being shipped here from Louisville.

AL KIRBY LOSES SLEEPY SIDNEY.

Sleepy Sidney, a two-year-old in Al Kirby's stable, succumbed from the same cause. Minute Man, which raced with much success in Kentucky and which was at the top of his form recently, was taken off the cars in a bad way and will probably be out of commission for a month or more.

Arrivals of jockeys included J. H. Burke, H. Erickson, H. B. Stearns, C. Hunt, R. Davies, W. Warrington, T. Parrington and C. Ponce. Terry Farley, custodian of the jockeys' quarters at the New York tracks and who was employed in a similar capacity at Jefferson Park and the Fair Grounds, came in this morning from Baltimore.

H. Neustetter, whose horses have been here for several days, also got in from the same place. Frank Forney, former jockey, brought Turf and two other horses from Maryland.

In order to save the horsemen stabled at the Fair Grounds a journey over to Jefferson Park in the afternoon entries for the latter course will be taken each morning at the former track by Wash Norwell.

An improvement of the motor truck service to transport the horses from one track to the other is in sight this year, there being more trucks available and the roads have been considerably improved. Practically all of the best known layers in this country will operate here, among them being Tom Shaw, "Whitey" Beck, Peter Blong and numerous others.

Deer Skin, a two-year-old filly, by Meelick—Pascal, locally owned, was instantly killed today while at exercise. She crashed into a motor truck being used to work the track. Her rider suffered a broken leg.

Word reached here today of the death of starter Frank McGinty, who died suddenly at Key West, Fla., this morning. He was well known among the horsemen here.

TO RESTORE RACING IN MIDDLE WEST

There is a healthy movement in Chicago and St. Louis to revive racing in the right way. The Chicago men of high class who proposed in 1918 to establish a country club, with a racing and steeple-chasing course as a side issue, on the edge of the northern suburb of Evanston, are now said to be ready to take the project up again.

NOTED SIRE OF FIFTY YEARS AGO

Interesting Details in the Racing and Stud Career of Adventurer, Son of Newminster.

In the Racing Calendar for 1856 the names of two horses, both of them winners of classic races, appear for the first time as sires; two horses whose successes at the stud were abnormal and the rivalry between whom during the 'sixties was an object of deep interest to those who followed the history of the thoroughbred closely. Eagerly were the returns of the winning sires scanned at the end of each racing season to see whether Stockwell or Newminster headed the list, and it would perhaps not be very easy to say now which of the two has made the greatest mark on the thoroughbred. For if Stockwell was the sire of Lord Lyon, Blair Athol and Doncaster, Newminster has Hermit, Cathedral and Adventurer to set off against them.

ISHMAEL BEST SON OF ADVENTURER.

But in all probability the best of Adventurer's sons was Ishmael. His dam, Lena, by Stockwell—Selina, was stoutly bred, there being two crosses of Alexander and one each of Whiskey, Walton, Whalebone and Master Henry in the pedigree of her dam. Ishmael failed to score as a two-year-old, but in his first appearance the following year he "stretched the neck" of Scobell in the Epsom Grand Prize and the latter only just got home by a half length. He won the Great Yorkshire Stake at York, where he had Cameliard and Tristram behind him. The course was like a bog and the way Ishmael went through the deep ground was worth going a long way to see. He won the Liverpool July Cup and the Ayrshire Handicap in 1881, and in the following year the Ascot Stakes, the Ascot High Weight Plate and the Newcastle Handicap were the principal races that went to him.

ADVENTURER'S CITY AND SUBURBAN.

His next appearance was in the City and Suburban, in which some rather sensational incidents took place. There were twenty-three runners. Gardener and Catch 'Em Alive, the latter of which won the Cambridgeshire later in the season, were first and second favorites, with Adventurer next in demand. Noble, who rode Adventurer, was so anxious to get off that he took no heed of Mr. McGeorge's remonstrances, so was reported to the stewards and suspended from riding for six weeks. But there was trouble at the "other end" as well as at the starting post. He won by a neck from Umpire, and J. Adams, who rode the American horse, lodged an objection for canning. This, however, was overruled and Adventurer won his first important race. He ran five times more that season, his most important wins being the Great Northern Handicap and the Flying Dutchman's Handicap at York, and Her Majesty's Gold Vase at Ascot. The latter race he won by a head from Wingrave, with Atherton third, two lengths off. He only ran once in 1864, viz., in the Fitzwilliam Stakes at Doncaster, where he started the outsider of the party and won in a large field. This was his last appearance on a race course and in 1865 he went to the stud.

SIRE OF GOOD-LOOKING PRETENDER.

It is rather a curious coincidence that as one of the first horses sired by Newminster was Musjid, a Derby winner, so among the first foals his son Adventurer was the winner of the Two Thousand and Derby, the good-looking Pretender. He was the sixteenth foal of Ferina by Venison—Partiality, and was bred by Wm. Sadler. As a two-year-old he had a solitary win in the North of England Biennial at York. But his three-year-old career was full of stirring incidents, of which those who saw them still love to tell. They tell how gamely he wore down his opponents in the Two Thousand, and of the close race for the Derby which Wells thought he had just won on Pero Gomez. "I've just done you, Johnny," said he as they returned to weigh, and Osborne's reply was characteristic: "I think it was a dead heat." On the course many people thought Pero Gomez had won. "Well done, old Tom Dawson," said one of the hangers-on of the race course to that astute trainer. "Well done he did," he replied, with some temper, "I'm only second." "Look at the number board," was the reply. And there it was "plain for all folks to see," and Tom Dawson, equal to the situation, went to lead his horse in. Then Sir Joseph Hawley's curious objection to Messrs. Weatherby not to pay the stakes because Mr. Sadler, who nominated the horse, died before the race, was another sensation, the origin of which is still shrouded in mystery. For Mr. Sadler saw Pretender win the Derby! Then how Osborne had to ride him to get home a neck in front of the moderate Island, which looked like pulling off a good thing for Sir Charles Legard for a few strides in the Great Northern St. Leger. Though he ran well more than once, finally he went wrong in his wind. Privateer, though not a classic horse, was another good son of Adventurer. His dam, La Favorita, by Thormanby, dam Miss Armstrong, had no fewer than six crosses of Sir Peter Teazle and four of Orville. He was a big upstanding horse, measuring 8 1/2 inches below the knee. His best performances as a race horse were at Goodwood, where he won the Drawing Room Stakes and the Racing Stakes. In the former he had good horses behind him in Passaic and Roysterer, and in the latter he beat Passaic and Wandering Nun. In the following year he won the Great Northern Handicap at York, carrying 119 pounds, and beating Ridotto and useful hand. He was fairly successful at the stud, Yard Arm being one of his sons. Borneo's dam was Lady Lucas, by Tynedale—Lady Ripon, second favorite in Caller On's Leg. Borneo's best performance as a two-year-old was in the Clearwell Stakes, in which he ran third to Harvester and Gander. He caught the judge's eyes once, but the opposition was only moderate, and as

STARTER FRANK MCGINTY IS DEAD

LEXINGTON, Ky., November 22.—Starter James F. Milton today wired from Key West, Fla., to the effect that Frank McGinty, better known as Frank McGinty, had died suddenly there this morning, and requested that his relatives here be notified. Morrow was a native of Lexington, but it does not appear that he had any relatives here, his mother and sister both having died. Morrow, or McGinty, as he was known in turf circles, was a starter, presiding at the barrier of a number of the minor tracks in this country and Canada.
