



CHANGED JEFFERSON GOING

Rain Brings Mud and Many Scratches From the Races.

Rapid Traveler Scores Easily in the Main Race of the Day—Favorites Succeed.

NEW ORLEANS, La., November 27.—A succession of favorites trooping down in advance of the fields spelled repeated loss for the layers and the windup of the afternoon found bankrolls depleted to an alarming extent.

Heavy rains during the night converted the going into a condition favoring pronounced mud performers and it required a sturdily built racer to race in it with any degree of success.

The fifth race, at a mile, for a purse of \$1,200, was easily the headliner and it brought to the barrier some highly regarded ones, with Rapid Traveler enjoying favoritism over Redmon, and The Wit coming in for substantial support.

Scratches reduced the field to four starters in the sixth dash, with Jago enjoying favoritism and coming in for the attention of the supposedly shrewd brigade.

The many friends of Larry J. Reinheimer here were advised this morning of his death. Reinheimer cut a big figure in local racing last year by the frequent victories scored by the horses in his charge, which included Arnold.

Dominick O'Malley, one-time publisher and owner of some good horses, died at his home here this morning.

Paddy Dear has been sold privately to J. A. Cohen. Albert Simons, who trained the second division of Harry Payne Whitney's racers and had to suspend operations here last year on account of serious illness, was among the arrivals and will remain for the racing season.

The horses of William Farnum and those owned by W. H. Fizer were among the newcomers from Maryland after a tempestuous trip, being seventy-six hours en route.

R. E. Watkins was also among the arrivals this afternoon from Maryland. Jockey Lawrence Lyke was an addition to the riding ranks and will accept mounts beginning Monday.

TRAINER DUKE'S NEW JOB

DORVAL HAS MOST SUCCESSFUL YEAR

MONTREAL, Que., November 27.—According to the figures of provincial government inspector Francis H. Dunn, who represented the government at all provincial race tracks the past season, and supervised the pari-mutuel arrangements, a total amount of \$11,714,733 was wagered by the 246,500 people who paid admission.

The admission averaged about \$1.25, so that admissions totaled over \$300,000 in the season. The figures have been accepted by the provincial government.

HAVANA RACING THRILLING

Close and Interesting Finishes Mark Saturday's Sport at Oriental Park.

HAVANA Cuba, November 27.—Saturday's racing at Oriental Park was replete with thrills and close finishes, the winners being in doubt until the official placing was announced in all but the fourth, in which Brother Maclean was under restraint, after leading throughout by a comfortable margin.

Winall raced to his name and led his opponents throughout in the first race, but was tiring badly and just lasted to score by a neck from the fast closing Boher-Na-Breena.

The second race was practically a repetition of the first, Elga showing the way from the start, only to tire near the end and barely outlasted Count Boris.

Another close finish came in the third race, Mayrose getting up right at the end to snatch victory from Lenora P., which had set the pace from the rise of the barrier.

Marty Lou was a disappointing favorite in the fifth race, finishing third to Pas de Chance and Avion. Only a head separated the last two at the end.

Fickle Fancy wound up a day of exciting finishes by having a half length margin over Doctor D. in the closing dash. The winners had to be ridden out to withstand the closing rush of the favorite.

Joseph Healy has taken over jockey J. Carmody's book and will make his engagements during the remainder of the meeting. Carmody announces that he will return to England next spring.

The Armonia Stable purchased all the remaining horses which Senor A. H. Diaz has had in training. These include Blue Wrack and Graysian, which horses will be fired and turned out on the Fernandez ranch.

General Menocal and Zululand will be kept in training. Senor Fernandez has also completed a deal whereby he acquired all of Senor Diaz' brood mares and also transferred to his breeding establishment, near Santiago, all the principal mares, among which are Suffragist and Comfort, the latter by Broomstick—Slippers, by Meddler, and regarded as the best bred matron on the island.

G. K. Allen, owner of a stable at the local track, was an arrival yesterday from England. His horses, which are in charge of O. Rice, include Manokin, Miss Sweep, Harry H. Stevens, Automatic and Red.

MADDEN YEARLINGS FOR SENOR ALVAREZ.

Cable advices to Oriental Park reported the death of Larry J. Reinheimer by tuberculosis. Mr. Reinheimer's residence was at Sheepshead Bay, and he was a well-known trainer on the American turf. Four years ago he trained a stable of horses at Oriental Park for Samuel Nolan.

Mose Goldblatt was advised by cable that James Rowe was sending him a number of yearlings belonging to Harry Payne Whitney. The youngsters were bred at the Brookland Farm and are due to arrive here early next week.

H. Robinson made a successful debut as a jockey when he piloted Winall to victory in the opening race. This was the youngster's first mount. The entire jockey colony of Oriental Park at present is composed of forty-eight riders and of this number almost half are apprentices and of these latter it is certain some are of budding talent.
