## GREAT CROWD AT HAVANA

### First Sunday's Attendance of Record-Breaking Proportions.

### More Rain Falls and Races Are Run Over Heavy Track—No Racing on Mondays.

HAVANA, Cuba, November 28.—This was a gala day at Oriental Park and the attendance was one of the largest that ever visited the Mariano course. The huge grandstand was crowded as was also the field enclosure. Havana society turned out in force. The president's box was occupied by several members of the president's family, including his mother and two children, who had as their guests a number of intimate friends.

Today's races were run over a deep, heavy track. A steady downpour set in after the races yesterday and continued for several hours.

Doublet II and The Pirate were backed to the exclusion of everything else in the first race. The first mentioned never left the result in doubt, sprinting into a long lead in the first eighth and easily holding sway throughout. The Pirate ran well, but never had a chance to overtake the flying leader.

A. L. Taylor's Spugs found the track to his liking in the second race and, although making a wide turn in the stretch, easily drew away from Vic Munoz when straightened out. Aunt Deda, the favorite, appeared short after a brief display of speed.

Count Boris won the third race. He easily raced Dixie Flyer into defeat after the latter's lead from his "pacemaker" efforts and then assumed a safe lead to score by a comfortable margin.

Keen disappointment was expressed over the defeat of Blazeaway in the fourth, the Armonia Stable's color bearer being an even money favorite. He flattered his backers by leading to the stretch turn, where he tired, leaving Lady Ionia and Kewassa to fight it out for first place. The former held the old Oliver gelding safe in the final strides.

Brother Maclean provided another upset in the following race, quitting all over in the stretch after setting the early pace. Black Prince was returned the winner, with Buck Nail second and Sain Rose third.

There will be no racing Monday afternoon at Oriental Park, this day being observed as a day of rest by horsemen and track employees. The sport will be resumed on Tuesday, with the running of six races. By Tuesday the track may possibly be dried out considerably and after much rolling and harrowing ought to be in pretty good condition.

## MAN AND BEAST THRIVE IN CUBA.

That the Cuban climate is conducive to health and long life is strikingly emphasized by the case of Thomas Cheek, owner and trainer, who has resided continuously near Oriental Park for the last five years. Mr. Cheek has almost reached the century mark, having been born ninety-four years ago. He has not had a sick day during his residence on the island and is just as active and spry as many men of thirty and forty. It is only natural that among the horses he has been training there should be the oldest thoroughbreds on the grounds. This horse is Sureget, gelding by Woolsthorpe—Luzelle, and was bred by the late William Gerst of Nashville, Tenn. He is now thirteen years of age. Sureget is still in training. Mr. Cheek believes the gelding still good enough to win a purse or two among the older class of horses and he also seems to thrive wonderfully in Cuba's genial climate. In former years many horses that have passed the tenth year have been raced successfully. This year the old campaigners are showing ability to win. The eleven-year-old Presumption, which won many races in the United States for Jim MacManus, showed a clean pair of heels to the younger competitors and did the same again today. Marty Lou, the nine-year-old mare which has produced several foals, and Doctor D., eight-year-old, won respective races.

Tommy Burns was not permitted to ride Donna Grafton owing to the fact that there was some misunderstanding regarding his contract and the lad will start riding shortly when the tangle is straightened out.

E. L. Alvarez' Cuban Derby winner Herron, which has been ailing for the last several days, is fast recovering and is expected to be back in training shortly.

Jockey Walter Dodd signaled his return to the saddle by winning on Spugs in the second race. Dodd formerly rode in England and was at the local track last winter, employed as assistant to Thomas K. Lynch, compiler of Racing Form charts.

Every day many new arrivals from the States come in and this season promises to be a banner one in the history of racing in Cuba.

## HOT SPRINGS RACING RUMORS.

### E. F. Simms and Arkansas Business Men Said to Have Purchased Oaklawn Park.

NEW YORK, N. Y., November 28.—Hot Springs racing rumors persist. They take the form of purchase of Oaklawn Park from the Cella and Condon estates by a syndicate headed by Edward F. Simms, and including Arkansas men of influence, some of them business leaders of Hot Springs. Such a sale would clear the way for the opening of one of the best natural spring race courses in the world. Opposition to former ownership and politics stopped Hot Springs racing. It increased with the death of Louis Cella, who was always able to handle the influence.

Oaklawn Park will be thronged with high-class horses next spring. The Hildreth, Simms, Camden and Madden horses are all going to winter at Oaklawn and would form a full nucleus for 1921 spring racing when added to the stables on their way north from the New Orleans courses.

## RIGHT TYPE OF THE HORSE

### International Expert F. V. Gooch Strong in Praise of the Thoroughbred.

NEW YORK, N. Y., November 28.—An interested spectator at the National Horse Show in Madison Square Garden last week was the international expert, F. Vivian Gooch of London, England, who has always received the credit of establishing the thoroughbred type of saddle horse in the United States when he came over to serve as a judge more than twenty years ago.

Mr. Gooch on that occasion upset traditions and set heads wagging when he selected the thoroughbred gelding Brigand, by Belvedere—Livonia, as the champion saddle horse of the exhibition. He showed that he had the courage of his convictions by purchasing Brigand and taking him back to England, where he was a conspicuous winner for many seasons. Mr. Gooch was in the visitors' box watching a saddle class on Thursday afternoon last when he was asked if there had been any appreciable improvement in the American saddle type since his last visit.

"The change for the better is remarkable," said the British expert. "Your horses all show more quality, and you now have the real riding type. I saw a competition here yesterday afternoon that was surprising for its excellence. It was as good as anything I have witnessed in a long time. If you follow along the lines responsible for these horses your success is certain."

Mr. Gooch was asked if he was still as strong for the thoroughbred as when he was here before. Without a moment's hesitation he replied: "I am keener than ever for that type. Thoroughbreds give you a better ride than any other horse. How about their being hot? They are the same as all other courageous animals. If you hurt one he will fight you back just as a courageous man will battle for his rights. We see temperament in the human family, and the higher the artistic development the greater the display of the elemental force we call temperament. The horse of blood is an aristocrat, and, of course, he won't stand the kicking around that a cold-blooded animal will. I never had one, though, that I could not handle, and my greatest successes have been won with them."

Mr. Gooch was asked if the establishment of the National Stud had exercised a favorable influence on the sportsmen of Great Britain, and if it had led to a better understanding among the people at large as to what the thoroughbred meant to the country.

## RACING ENGLAND'S NATIONAL SPORT.

"The English didn't need anything to stimulate their interest in the thoroughbred," was Mr. Gooch's rejoinder. "They have long been keen for racing and steeplechasing, and, of course, for hunting, which is so closely related to the other sports. Our love for a good horse is centuries old, and there would be a tremendous hue and cry if anybody interfered with what we consider our legitimate pleasures. Racing is a fundamental in the British sport-loving life, and any attempt to restrict it would be met with a determined opposition. Without it we would soon be in a bad way for good horses, and then, too, it keeps alive a spirit which no nation can well afford to be without. It develops the sporting instinct, and works beneficially in many ways."

"Has Ireland maintained her supremacy as the home of the best type of heavy-weight hunter?" Mr. Gooch was asked.

"I am sorry to say," was the reply, "that the high-class hunter in Ireland is not nearly as plentiful as before the war. The best horses were taken when the war broke out, and there was such demand for troopers' mounts at high prices that the breeders became careless in their eagerness to make money. They sent their mares to the nearest available horse, and oftentimes this was a half-bred, and as a result there was a deterioration. We look for a return to the old conditions in time, however. The demand with us for hunters is as strong as ever, but I am sorry to have to say that the riding horse does not enjoy the degree of favor he formerly did. The cause is due to the specially built roads for motor cars. There are few places where the horse may be ridden with comfort, and there is not much being done to bring about a movement for relief."

When asked what he regarded as the greatest educational factor in the work of horse improvement, Mr. Gooch said: "Unquestionably the horse show. These should be a part of the life of every community. They establish type and are a guide to those who want to progress. They produce healthy rivalries, too, and that is what we want in all our undertakings, whether business or pleasure is the consideration."

"I have just learned of your Remount Association, and the work it is doing, and I cannot praise it too highly. Such co-operation is what has evolved France's splendid system of horse breeding. You have the ideal combination of a civil and military organization, and I shall look for great results, when I next return to the United States as a result of its establishment."

## CURRENT NOTES OF THE TURF

J. Simon Healy has got back from Cuba and is at Belmont Park with his solitary colt and pony.

William Booth, trainer for the Redstone Stable, is dangerously ill with pneumonia at Baltimore.

Pat Dunne's good horse Under Fire and S. L. Kirby's Blackie Daw were left in Kentucky to rest during the winter. Both need it.

Joe Notter will train what is left of the M. L. Schwartz stable next year in connection with the few horses in Frederick Johnson's stable.

Grand Slam, which died at Key West en route to Cuba, was insured for \$5,000. He was twice unplaced as a two-year-old and won but one race, was second and third once this year.

The successful stallion Zria, by Cyllene—Perce Neige, died in Ireland lately from an injury accidentally received. He sired numerous winners, the most prominent being the Liverpool Grand National winner Troytown, which was subsequently killed in a French jumping race.

The Sunnysland Stable is not going to California this winter. It has been press-agented for Tijuana, but what horses Bob Smith intends to race will go to New Orleans. Slippery Elm and Irish Kiss have been turned out at the Newark, Del., farm which Smith recently bought.

## FRENCH RAIDS ON RIDERS

### Why O'Neill Was Suspended—Matt McGee Also Punished—Others Suffer.

The Paris correspondent of the London Sportsman, referring to the recent raid of the French racing officials on jockeys, writes as follows:

Some of our jockeys are just now passing through an anxious period. They are haunted with fears of warnings, fines and suspensions. Scarcely a day passes without one or other of them being brought before the stewards. Recently it was the turn of Matthew McGee, the American rider, and first jockey to Baron E. de Rothschild. For taking matters too easily on a horse which finished second McGee was ordered by the stewards not to ride at three subsequent meetings. The other day, at St. Cloud, our crack jockey O'Neill got into serious trouble. Being left at the post on Le Chatelet, a hot favorite, and taking no part in the race, he was called before the stewards for an explanation. As a result of the interview it was decided to institute a further inquiry into the matter, pending which O'Neill was suspended from riding until further orders.

An apprentice jockey, M. Allemmand, has had his license withdrawn and been warned off the French turf for dishonest riding in public. This is the second instance of an apprentice being severely punished this season, the previous victim being a youngster named Brethes, who was suspended for the year last spring. Both the jockeys are most capable riders, and in both cases their guilty conduct was similar—deliberately trying not to win at the instigation of "big financial men" in the ring. The exposure of Allemmand's case would probably not have taken place had not a dispute between two trainers arisen and provided some washing of dirty linen. The incident which cost Allemmand his license occurred at Longchamps October 14. Riding his employer's horse Landman, which started an odds-on favorite, the pockey rode contrary to his orders, and was defeated by a horse named A l'Ordre. The trainer of A l'Ordre held a second claim to Allemmand's services, and it was subsequently established that the young apprentice had been bribed—hence his warning off.

## THIRTY LEADING AMERICAN JOCKEYS

Jockey J. Mooney was the riding star in last week's racing, his creditable achievement in guiding eleven winners past the judges earning him that measure of distinction. Next to him L. Morris scored six wins and James Butwell followed with five. It now seems practically an impossibility for any of his competitors to dislodge Butwell from his well-earned position as the leading jockey of 1920. He has been a long time in achieving the honor dear to any rider. An incident of the week was the return of J. Carmody to riding in Cuba. What remains of the campaign of the year should suffice to put him, Lyke, Kennedy, Duggan and possibly several others in the list of riders of over 100 winners. ## HAMILTON AND DEVONSHIRE RETURNS

TORONTO, Ontario, November 28.—Reports upon the operations of two additional race tracks, the Western Racing Association, operating the Devonshire track at Windsor, spring and fall meetings, and the Hamilton Jockey Club Fall meeting—the spring meeting figures having already been given—have been made public by the treasury department.

The Hamilton Jockey Club took in wagers of \$2,080,509 at its fall meeting, its commissions amounting to \$226,231. After allowing for depreciation for the half-year, business profits, war taxes and all other expenses, the club had a net profit of \$78,888.

The Western Association had receipts of \$292,339 at its spring meeting and expenditures of \$238,093, or a profit of \$54,246. Betting amounted to \$2,026,102, on which the association collected 10 per cent and "odd cents." At the fall meeting the association collected \$360,777 plus the "odd cents" on the mutuels and took in \$109,367. From this total it paid out \$100,100 in purses. Its net profit after meeting all charges was, roughly, \$200,000.

## BEAUTIFYING SARATOGA RACE TRACK

NEW YORK, N. Y., November 28.—The Saratoga Racing Association has a force of men at work beautifying the infield of the main track. Last year an excavation was made with the idea of constructing an artificial lake, in the center of which was placed a large fountain, but on account of the nature of the soil at this point all the water soaked in the ground, and the lake proposition had to be abandoned temporarily. Now, however, the excavation has been greatly enlarged and later will be lined with clay or cement and flooded so that visitors to the track next season will find a beautiful lake instead of the flower garden. Numerous fountains will be erected in the lake and the banks will be lined with flowers.

## FAVORITES BRING DISTRESS

### Success of First Choice at Jefferson Park a Feature.

### Hundreds of Bowie Horses Due to Arrive This Week—Good Weather Prevails.

NEW ORLEANS, La., November 28.—Relief from the cold weather of yesterday came today and the sunshine not only improved climatic conditions considerably, but it also dried out the Jefferson Park race track to such an extent that it will probably be fast Monday. The "dogs" were up at both Jefferson Park and the Fair Grounds this morning, but the two courses were crowded with horses until well along toward noon. At the close of the exercising period harrows were put on the Shrewsbury course and kept there until dark.

Although the meeting is only three days old the organizers are beginning to fly the distress signal already, as they have been subjected to an awful drubbing thus far. On the first day five pronounced favorites and two equal choices won. The next day two of the most favored ones and a couple of well-backed "good things" came home in front and, to cap the climax, on Saturday all choices scored. As a result of this display of form quite a number of bank rolls have been shot to pieces and a few of the odds backers have been forced to take the count.

Stalls are reserved at the two local tracks for several hundred horses, which are due from Bowie the latter part of the week. Starter Edward Tribe, whose place is being filled at Jefferson Park by James Osborn, plans to leave Baltimore Tuesday night and he will take up his duties at Jefferson Park on Thursday.

The task of schooling the yearlings at the barrier will begin Wednesday morning at the Fair Grounds by Osborn and Hamilton, both of whom are assistants to starter A. B. Dade. There are more yearlings here than ever before. Trainer C. F. Clark has seven youngsters here for J. H. Loucheim, a well-known eastern sportsman, and all of them are the progeny of Granite and were bred by their owner. Five fillies and two colts comprise the Loucheim outfit and their dams are Devonshire Dolly, Corn Broom, Galloping Queen, Ursula Emma, Amagh, Sly Wink and Kozpie.

E. W. Moore has sixteen horses in his charge at the Fair Grounds and half of the number are yearlings.

A. G. Blakely's stable comprises seventeen horses, the property of five owners, including a few of his own. In this band are six yearlings. Two of the youngsters were sired by Towton Field, which raced with much success for Blakely a few years back. The other four are the progeny of His Majesty. The names Frederick Kinney and Baby Vamp have been selected for the Towton Field juveniles, the former being a bay gelding and the latter a filly of the same color.

In addition to Pluribus, which gave promise of developing into one of the best two-year-olds of the year until he went amiss, trainer Tom Shannon has three yearlings in the T. W. O'Brien stable at Jefferson Park. Pluribus is training soundly again and Shannon has high hopes for him as a racer. Trainer Archie Zimmer again will race a small section of the vast J. W. McClelland stable here this winter. English Boy, Coggle, Shamrock Flower, Wild Thoughts, Light Rose, Irish Abbe and West Indies will comprise his outfit for the win-or racing.

Jockeys Clifford Robinson and T. Jarvis, both under contract to J. W. McClelland, will report to A. Zimmer here at the end of the eastern season.

## J. E. WIDENER INCREASES FINANCIAL HOLDINGS IN BELMONT PARK

NEW YORK, N. Y., November 28.—It is said that Joseph E. Widener of Philadelphia has bought the Miller estate holding of the Westchester Racing Association stock as well as the \$50,000 block of Metropolitan Turf Association, thus materially increasing his financial holdings in Belmont Park.

John E. Madden left yesterday for Lexington, Ky. One car of his horses was shipped a few days ago to Douglas Park, Louisville, in charge of "Chuck" Walker. A second car with Mat Dooley in charge goes to Louisville, Ky., next.

## BE FRANK ON WAY TO TIJUANA

NEW YORK, N. Y., November 28.—Be Frank is on his way to Tijuana. He will be the best handicap horse at that course when he gets to his best form. He is said to have cost George Fuller, the paint man of San Francisco, some \$10,000. His purchase was suggested by Henry Forsland, once the well-known correspondent of Daily Racing Form, but now a prosperous paint purveyor in California.

Be Frank cost \$1,500 as a yearling and in 1919 C. M. Garrison of New York refused \$15,000 and asked \$20,000 for the homely gelding. Be Frank was not sold and won \$27,315 in three races that year for Mr. Garrison. Among Be Frank's 1919 winnings were the Latonia Derby and Latonia Cup.

## MORE OF SENOR DIAZ' HORSES SOLD

HAVANA, Cuba, November 28.—Senor A. H. Diaz further reduced his stable by transferring eight of his horses in training to Senor L. M. Iribarren at private terms. Senor Iribarren is a newcomer to racing. This is his first venture in the sport as an owner. He is a well-known resident of Havana. The horses were turned over to G. B. Foley to be trained. The horses acquired by Senor Iribarren are Azurita, Chefa, Big Bill, Maricusa, Raven Sea, Just Fancy, Douglas Fairbanks, Don Manuel, the latter a yearling colt by Don Thrush—Paulson, and is a product of the Diaz breeding establishment.
