BETTER RACING CONDITIONS

Warm Weather Brings a Good Track and Attendance.

Jefferson Park's Main Race Disastrous to a Hot Favorite—Ponce on Three Winners.

NEW ORLEANS, La., November 30.—An outstanding upset of the present meeting came with the running of the feature race, in which Rapid Traveler, a winner here over practically the same horses, was at prohibitive odds and was beaten decisively by Fizer, an outsider and lightly regarded. Coltletti rode the favorite in faulty fashion, for when he attempted to move up into the lead when about a quarter from home he was frustrated in the attempt by Fizer and Redmon coming over, forced him back and later to come wide. Meantime Fizer had raced into a long lead and the final sixteenth found him increasing his margin as his rider pleased. Rapid Traveler, under hard riding, managed to outstay Redmon.

Jockey Ponce again played a prominent part in the racing and, due mainly to his good riding, he landed three of his mounts first. He began auspiciously with American Rose, which succeeded in overhauling Normandie in the last few strides. Had Stack been a bit more vigilant with Normandie he would have reversed the decision.

Ina Kay, like American Rose, was favorite and Ponce only had to sit steady for the entire race to land her the winner. By Heck beating the others, David Craig, a relic of the recent 300-mile endurance test, made his reappearance in racing in this dash, but he cut a sorry figure.

Ponce had the mount on Mary Erb in the third race, but the best he could do with her was to land in third place, Mary Head, locally owned, graduating from the maiden ranks when she beat Dr. Howard home.

On Fizer Ponce won with consummate ease and he was then inactive until the final dash, when he was astride Tom Brooks.

The backers of favorites again scored heavily over the layers, for choices again figured in a majority of the victories. The success of Bombast and Ground-Swell was particularly costly to the odds purveyors. Both scored easily.

Today's improvement in weather and track conditions was responsible for an increased attendance, but the card, with the exception of the feature race, was of the half mile racing variety. With over a thousand horses in these parts it seems decidedly strange that better horses have not been among the entries, considering the liberal purses that are offered.

Jockey McAtee sustained a bad foot injury by being forced against the fence while riding Brisk. Comme Cl, which was reported as having died on arrival here, as a result of spring fever, is taking daily exercise at the Fair Grounds.

American Rose was badly kicked while at the post for the first race and came back bleeding.

AU REVOIR IN MARYLAND

Racing Season in the East Comes to an End at Bowie.

Recount and Jadda Take Principal Races of Closing Day's Good Program.

BOWIE, Md., November 30.—The Maryland racing season of 1920 came to an end today with the conclusion of the Southern Maryland Agricultural Association's fall meeting at Prince George Park. Despite unfavorable weather conditions a crowd of goodly proportions was present to see the final day's racing. The track was heavy and only the sturdiest kind of a mud runner was at home in the difficult going.

The Au Revoir Handicap for all ages at one mile and a sixteenth was the farewell feature and C. A. Stoneham, president of the Cuba-American Jockey and Auto Club, furnished the winner of it in the Ballot horse Recount. The latter simply revelled in the going, set a fast pace from the start and drew away into a lead entering the stretch to win as his rider pleased. Sandy Beal was second, only a small margin ahead of Clean Gone with the R. T. Wilson entry Yellow Hand and Dry Moon following in order named. Yellow Hand found 122 pounds too much in the deep going.

The companion piece to the feature was the Century Handicap at six and a half furlongs for all ages. Here J. W. Bean's good Marathon gelding Jadda ran a remarkable race. He picked up 122 pounds and conceding much weight to all his opponents led all the way, displaying extreme speed in the going to win by a safe margin, although tiring at the end. Fruit Cake was second after strenuous efforts to overtake the flying leader. Wyoming, after being outrun in the early stages, finished with great speed and courage to secure the short end of the purse.

The first two races of the afternoon were run in a dense fog. The Foreigner, one of the field horses, capturing the opening dash, while Huonec was successful in the second race. Neither was extended to win.

The mile and a quarter race fell to Jack Reeves, the Forman racer scoring in sensational style. After racing in the rear for over half the race Jack Reeves closed an immense gap and finished with remarkable speed, caught and passed the leader in the last eighth, drawing clear in the final strides.

Goaler and Widow Bedotte were home first in the sixth and seventh races respectively, both having a safe margin over their nearest opponents.

Several horses changed hands by the claiming route yesterday. C. Knight took Deckmate for \$2,100; E. P. Summerfield claimed Explosive for \$1,700; George W. Forman claimed Nebulous for \$1,515; James Arthur took Tingling for \$3,550; Runecraft went to P. L. Short for \$1,305 and Waukeag to A. Svenke for \$1,875.

George W. Forman purchased Amackassin from J. E. Griffith before the running of the first race and he performed for his new owner.

James O'Hara, with Mrs. O'Hara, will leave for New Orleans Sunday.

Joseph McLennan will leave the latter part of the week for New Orleans.

Starter Edward Tribe will leave for Jefferson Park, New Orleans, tonight.

E. C. Smith, who officiated at Bowie as handicapper and steward, leaves for New York tonight. The stable of E. Arlington leaves tonight for New Orleans.

R. J. Mackenzie's horses will be shipped to Toronto as soon as a car is available.

R. J. Becker returned to his home at Buffalo, where he will remain for a few days then go to New Orleans.

Jockey J. Butwell left Bowie Saturday night for Havana.

Jockey J. Huepel has left Bowie for New Orleans.

THIRTY LEADING AMERICAN OWNERS

In the accounts of money won in the campaign of 1920 by the thirty leading stables of the year there is one peculiar and seldom occurring feature. It is that, with two exceptions, every one of the thirty stables shows an increase in money won in comparison with their returns of 1919. Samuel C. Hildreth and Joseph E. Widener furnish the exceptions. Still they did not fare badly and both have known much worse years in respect to money won by their horses. Another outstanding feature is that four owners have stable returns in excess of \$100,000, something that probably has only once occurred in American racing. Certainly never before did two rival stables win in excess of a quarter of a million dollars, as did those of H. P. Whitney and J. K. L. Ross. It is reflective of the vastly increased aggregate of money raced for in 1920 that the four leading stables gathered the huge sum of \$822,069. The following list of our thirty leading winning owners is not complete for the year, for the reason that a number still have horses in racing and will make additions to their accounts in December. To date their stable records are:

WEALTH OF STAKE ENTRIES

Nominations to Belmont Park Feature Races Show Big Numerical Increase.

NEW YORK, N. Y., November 30.—While it was generally expected that with the increase in the values of the stake races to be run at Belmont Park next spring there would be also an increase in the number of nominations the actual results exceeded the hopes of the Westchester Racing Association. The nominations, which have just closed, totaled 1,640, as against 1,132 for last year. The largest gain was scored in the Belmont Stakes, which, in 1921, will have 134 eligibles and for the following year 178. The Lawrence Realization for 1921 closed with 204 nominations. The association was particularly gratified with the interest shown in the Jockey Club Gold Cup and the Coaching Club American Oaks Handicap. These races were designed to bring out the qualities of courage and endurance which racing seeks to promote, and which is the mainstay of the breeding industry.

The Gold Cup is the successor of The Jockey Club's Weight-for-Age race. It now has an added value of \$10,000 in cash and a gold cup of \$2,500 donated by The Jockey Club. It is the hope of The Jockey Club that this trophy will grow to be the most coveted prize of the turf, marking, as it is intended, the winner as the greatest stayer of his year, and to be considered a high commendation for the stud.

In discussing the number and quality of the entries, August Belmont, chairman of The Jockey Club, was moved to remark:

"It is all most gratifying. Racing with us cannot be counted upon as an institution that can live on a perfectly steady and unalterable basis. The history of racing in the past has shown a periodic shifting of authority and variation in public support and interest. The foundation of the turf must therefore be carefully looked after, so that an institution the sport can go on with fixtures such as these, which can be counted upon as enduring. This stake system is best for the breeding industry, as a definite and prospective engagement attached to a horse carries a vital interest to both the owner and breeder.

"A good deal can be said for the comfort, profit and ease of mind of the owner racing under the Maryland plan of stake offering, in which the obligation of the horseman is reduced to a minimum, and in most cases he has none beyond the naming of his entry for the race. On the other hand, a Maryland association desiring, or being compelled to liquidate, could, and would, go out of business without having any obligations to racing as a deterrent from dropping out of the sport. That system offers no assured prospect for yearlings at our sales, the future depending solely upon the commercial prosperity of the associations in question.

"Under the stake methods we have in New York and in vogue in all countries offering great turf history," resumed Mr. Belmont, "prospects have been built up solidly, giving definite values to the thoroughbred. This carries with it obligations on the part of racing associations which call for the greatest sacrifices in order that those obligations may be fulfilled. They bind the breeder, owner and racing associations together in a bond of common interest. The Maryland system is a stimulant, I admit, but ours is the wholesome and steady diet."

LEADERS OF FRENCH RACING SEASON

The Armenian owner, a war millionaire, M. Eknayan, with nearly sixty horses in training, was the leading owner of the French flat racing season, now over. His stable won over seventy races and some \$85,000. Baron Edouard de Rothschild was second with fifty-four races and about \$80,000.

The American stables of A. K. Macomber and J. R. Leroy (Vanderbilt) were third and fourth in the winning lists with \$75,000 and \$47,000 respectively. The Franco-English Gilpin-St. Alary stable, through the English three-year-old Comrade, which won the Grand Prix de Paris and Arc de Triomphe Stakes, followed the American stables in fifth place.

RACING RESUMED AT HAVANA

Track Deep and Heavy—Jockey Crump Rides Three Winners.

HAVANA, Cuba, November 30.—Racing was resumed today at Oriental Park after the usual Monday layoff. The track was deep and heavy. Mud runners were in their glory and won the majority of the races. The finishes were close enough to be interesting.

The opening dash furnished the best finish of the afternoon when the first three horses fought it all the last eighth and passed the finishing mark heads and noses apart. Crump put up a particularly strong finish on Draftsman, the winner, and mainly through his efforts did this horse win. Crump also rode the winners of the third and sixth races, Henlock and Duke of Shelby respectively.

The attendance was large and speculation brisk. Among the consignment that reached here Monday were the brood mare Golden Ruby and a yearling colt of that mare by Great Britain.

Jockey Kelsay, who came here to ride for A. H. Diaz, has made an agreement with John Lowe to ride for the latter's stable.

S. Burnside arrived this morning from Maryland with the horses Cy Merrick, Plantagenet and Discard.

John B. Fletcher and wife of Newport, Ky., accompanied by Miss Lillian Ryan, also of Newport, Ky., arrived today for an extended visit. Mr. Fletcher has been a stockholder in Oriental Park since the opening year and is an annual visitor. He is well known in Kentucky racing circles.

John Walters brought four horses to Cuba belonging to George M. Hendrie, the well-known Canadian sportsman. They are Rancher, the good long-distance racer, Exhorter and Salvo.

Charles A. Stoneham and John J. McGraw, principal owners of Oriental Park, are planning to leave for New York next Monday on business connected with their baseball interests.

Jockey James Butwell cabled trainer Willie Daly that he would arrive in Havana Wednesday morning. He would have been here sooner but for his engagement to ride Edward B. McLean's Leochares in a stake race last Saturday. Butwell is under engagement to ride for E. Alvarez during the winter.

FEMINE ENGLISH OWNER KILLED

A fatal accident to Mme. Vanapati occurred on Sunday afternoon, November 14, near Thetford England. Accompanied by her husband and two friends she had motored to Newmarket to look over her horses, and on the return journey the car turned a complete somersault, due, it is believed, to one of the wheels coming off.

Mme. Vanapati had only been racing a few years, and at first her horses were in charge of Butchers at Lewes and Thetford, but later she transferred them to Otto Madden at Newmarket. She won her first race in 1918, her chief winner being Pourboire. The following year her winnings amounted to \$16,940, chiefly by means of Glenski and Slippery Anne. This year she had won \$12,940, principally through Ma Poupee, Darklin and Tric-Trac.

HILDRETH HORSES FOR HOT SPRINGS

NEW YORK, N. Y., November 30.—The sixteen yearlings which S. C. Hildreth has are at Belmont Park in charge of Herman Brant. With them are purchase, Lucillite, Dominique and Incheape. The entire band is being made ready for shipment to the Oaklawn Park, Hot Springs, Ark., where they will be wintered.

G. H. STRATE ARRIVES IN LEXINGTON

LEXINGTON, Ky., November 30.—George H. Strate, manager of John H. Rosseter's Wikip ranch in California, arrived here today to attend the December sales.

ROYAL-BRED HORSE SELLS FOR \$20

From London comes word that Pintadeau, a chestnut gelding which belonged to the king at one time and ran a good fourth to Tagalie, Jaeger and Tracery in the Derby of 1912, realized the small price of \$20 at a recent sale at the Rugby market.

With the exception of Minister Bell, which was sold at Newmarket for \$10 a couple of years ago, Pintadeau's price is a record.

The Equine Defense League, which purchased the animal, has presented him to King George V., and the horse will be sent to Sandringham to end his days in comfort in the royal stables.

By the late King Edward's celebrated horse Florizel II.—Guinea Hen, Pintadeau ran in the king's colors for three years and did fairly well. As a three-year-old he won the Mildenhall Plate and the Payne Stakes at Newmarket, 1912, and following that ran fourth in the Derby. Subsequently the horse turned rough and was sold out of the royal stables to J. Baylis, a bookmaker. Baylis tried Pintadeau in selling hurdle races with indifferent success, and ultimately gave the horse away in disgust.
