Maria West and Aerolite Families Supreme in Our Breeding.

Much Quality in Several Collateral Branches of the Bellair Mare's Descendants.

(BY EXILE.)

As racing of significance and importance for the time being has ceased and the presidential heat definitely decided, there is nothing, bar the belligerence of the Bolshevik and the schemes of the Sinn Feiner, to absorb your attention, therefore those of you who are interested in the best development of the thoroughbred horse, turfmen and breeders alike, may perhaps have a little more time at your disposal these long winter evenings to devote to the study of the manner in which the best of the horses are bred.

In the first place I may write that all that I have to put before you is founded on facts gleaned from a study of turf history and of the bloodstock breeding industry of the world.

It seems as if the breeders of the United States have at last come to appreciate the value and necessity of pedigree. The value and necessity of breeding is just as essential in mares as it is in sires. The latter, however, can be more or less left to take care of themselves. Without breeding, sire success is not possible, as witness the fact that only one sire, Ben Brush, since before Lexington's day to head the American winning sire list but what is a member of a Bruce Love family. Ben Brush is a member of the best American family there is, that of Maria West.

One reads a deal nowadays concerning the good old American families, but the truth of the matter is that there are only two really worth while, the Maria West and Aerolite families, which trace to an American source. These two families have proved their worth, not only because of the race course success of their members, but also because of the sire success of their sons. The Maria West horse Ben Brush in 1909 headed the American winning sire list, and it is because of Ben Brush that the horse of Bonnie Scotland best carries on. Man o' War's ancestor, Spendthrift, is a member of the Aerolite family and Aerolite's maternal ancestress, a daughter of Medley, dam of the Bellair mare, which was certified by Mr. T. D. Owings to be thoroughbred.

Some years ago, in a fit of amazing energy, I numbered all of the Bruce Love family mares, which make their appearance in the first four volumes of the American Stud Book, also designating by a special mark those which are without that distinction, only to find a huge number of mares which trace to an obscure tap root. As time progressed and other volumes of the Stud Book made their appearance I continued to add these signs, with the result that I found the non-figure mares, on account of inability to produce either many race horses or sires of ability, are fast eliminating themselves.

MARIA WEST AND AEROLITE FAMILIES.

Success succeeds in bloodstock breeding as in everything else, and the success of the figure mare is the cause of this gradual extirpation. Mind you, I am not writing of special cases in contradistinction to the failure of the non-figure mares. I have no desire to laud the horse of any one particular breed at the expense of another, but only to inform both buyers and breeders that the odds are against them in their attempt to either race or breed with success horses which do not trace, with but few exceptions, to a figure tap root.

As before written, the two really good families, supposedly of American origin, are those of Maria West and Aerolite. Another good racing family, however, is the family which, for convenience sake, may be termed the Julia by Glencoe family. To Julia trace such as Wanda, and her descendants, Urania and Armenia, whose son, Durbar II., won in 1913 the Epson Derby. All this is good, but so far no member of the Julia family has attained to lasting success as a sire. The eyes of the turf world are now turned toward Durbar II. to note his success or failure as a sire. The sire ability of this family is in question, and if found wanting the reckoning of the Julia family as a sire line cannot be highly classed.

Members of the Maria West family have proved their worth, not only on the race course, but also as sires. Ben Brush led the way, and is now followed by The Manager, which stands thirtieth on the winning sire list. Maria West, a chestnut mare, was foaled as far back as 1827 and was a daughter of Marion, and traces in the female line to a daughter of imported Janus. Maria West became the dam of the celebrated four-mile Wagner, but Wagner, good race horse though he admittedly was, failed to set up a house of his own. Maria West also bred two good producing daughters of the Fleur de Lis and Heraldry. The Fleur de Lis branch of the family has never, until quite recently, been so productive of high class horses as the Heraldry branch. This season, however, the Fleur de Lis branch has sprung into special prominence on account of the performance of two of the best two-year-olds of the season, Leonardo II. and Bangzon. Democrat, too, some years back created quite a stir as a two-year-old in England. Maria West's daughter, Heraldry, bred to imported Yorkshire, the sisters Balloon and Parachute, ancestress of Ben Brush. Balloon foaled the famous Ballet, and to Ballet trace by far the greater number of the best of Maria West horses.

That sound, hardy and genuine campaigner, Exterminator, traces to Ballet, as do David Garrick, Regret, Thunderer and The Manager. So it goes. No mistake can possibly be made in purchasing either stallions, mares or yearlings which trace in the female line either to Fleur de Lis, Balloon or Parachute.

Unlike the Janus mare—Maria West family—there are in existence several collateral branches of the Bellair mare family, which are productive of recent good winners. The Melody—Aerolite branch of the family is, of course, best, because of Spendthrift, ancestor of Man o' War; of Fellowcraft,

LUCKY OWNER OF EXTERMINATOR

WITHOUT THE GALLANT LONG DISTANCE AND NOTED CUP WINNER W. S. KILMER WOULD HAVE FARED POORLY IN 1920

The Willis Sharpe Kilmer stable would have cut but little figure in the racing of 1920 but for the lucky inspiration that led to his purchase of Exterminator in the spring of 1918. With this modern reproduction of the old-time wear-and-tear race horse ready to do valiant battle with all comers and over all distances, he possessed a formidable one-horse stable and reaped his full share of the honors of the year. Exterminator was not the best horse of the year in the four years old and over division, but he was so close to it that even Sir Barton, at his best, could take no liberties with him. As a stayer Exterminator is a wonder and undoubtedly capable of wiping out Sotemia's remarkable record of four miles in 7:10 1/2 did our present-day racing afford him the opportunity. Sound and willing, he is probably destined to do further great things in our racing of 1921. One among the notable things he did this year was to cross the line that put him into the highly exclusive list of winners of \$100,000 or more. Mr. Kilmer had a right good two-year-old in Our Flag. Otherwise his racers did not amount to much, his stable record for the year being:

NEW STEEPLECHASE COURSE

Belmont Park's Jumping Track to Be Changed for Right-Hand Going.

NEW YORK, N. Y., December 7.—At a meeting of the stewards of the National Steeplechase and Hunt Association held last Thursday, William Leavitt and H. I. Pels appeared for the Westchester Racing Association and presented plans and details for a new steeplechase course at Belmont Park which will be thoroughly up to date, the horses to run the same way as at other tracks. This new course, which is to be completed in time for the spring meeting, will be arranged in conjunction with the committee on courses from the National Steeplechase and Hunt Association, the hope being that with the changes and the providing of a suitably equipped schooling course it will bring a revival of local interest, and serve to bring sport of a much better grade. The stewards, several of whom are owners of steeplechase horses, approve most heartily of the effort under way, and pledged their support in every way to the effort being made for their branch of racing.

This only means that with the many changes now going at Belmont Park the steeplechase course will be made a right-hand one as the main racing ground at Belmont Park is to be.

The application for a jockey's license from R. Jarboe was withdrawn.

The appointment of Harry Rites as agent for Thomas Deford was approved.

A. Henry Higginson, J. E. Widener and Henry J. Morris were appointed a committee to receive proxies for the election at the annual meeting of three stewards to succeed H. S. Page, J. E. Davis and F. S. von Stade, their terms as stewards expiring with 1920.

The request of S. J. Bush for a cancellation of his trainer's license so that he would be permitted to ride as a jockey without restriction was granted.

sire of Hamburff's dam, Lady Reel; of Miser, sire of Yorkville Belle; of Macduff, sire of McChesney; and of Queenlike II., dam of King's Daughter. Other branches of the Bellair mare family are this year productive of the Latonia Oaks winner, Busy Signal, and of the Frontier Handicap first, Slippery Elm. Therefore, the members of the Bellair mare family have sufficiently proved their excellence for this family to be classed as good.

As for the sire success of members of the many other top race American families, I fear their case is less hopeful. Norfolk, a member of the Novice by Glencoe family, good race horse and successful sire of winners as he was, failed as a sire of sires, as has Hermis, which traces to Nora, half sister by Sovereign to Novice, although he was afforded every opportunity with the best of the Belgian matrons of France. No really good sire from the Picayune family has come. Enquirer, which traces to a daughter of Tryall, was once a power in the land, but the line of Enquirer has not proved strong enough to carry on and from all of this it must be apparent that the families of obscure American origin are in the main incapable of transmitting their own sire excellence to their sons.

Years ago, when Bruce Love's "Breeding Race Horses by the Figure System" first made its appearance in a fit of energy, I made tabulation of all of the different families in their various branches. This I think was prior to the coming of the Herrmann Goos tables, and I, of course, as did Goos, found that it is only certain branches of the different families that are productive of the best of the sires and winners. For instance, are not the Sunflower, Ellen Horne and Secrat branches worth more than all of the rest of the No. 1 family combined? In succeeding installments, which I trust you will do me the honor to peruse, I propose to set forth, for the benefit of those who are really interested in the better development of the thoroughbred horse, the best producing branches of the various families in an effort to afford both buyer and breeder a better return for their bloodstock investments.

MORE HEAVY TRACK RACING

Jefferson Park Going Still Bad and Weather Chilly.

Long-Priced Horses Carry Off the Spoils in Some of the Dashes.

NEW ORLEANS, La., December 7.—Racers of the most ordinary kind filled the spotlight this afternoon at Jefferson Park, due to the difficult nature of the going. There was improvement in the weather only by virtue of a cessation of rain, but cold continued and it kept the surprisingly large attendance continuously on the move.

The course and vicinity showed traces of the flooded conditions of yesterday, but the approaches to the track had been put in good order. The steady influx of arrivals in the city during the past twenty-four hours swelled the crowd in goodly proportion, and there was also additions to the laying brigade, forty-six odds purveyors quoting prices.

Betting activities were on a par with the best days and favored the layers at the close of the afternoon, as some of the most heavily backed ones failed. There was no outstanding race on the card that could be termed the feature, but some of the dashes were interesting and in some instances attended by close finishes.

Gloom, an extreme outsider, started proceedings in the initial dash, when King by a rousing ride succeeded in outstaying Old McKenna, with the favorite Normandie in third place.

Seguro and Ionia had the call in the second race, but both proved dismal failures, Mary Fonso winning comfortably from Walk Up and another outsider, American Maid, landing in third place.

Dr. Campbell just managed to stagger home in the third race a scant head in advance of Miss Kruter, with Beau Brummel II. in third place and had a bell was in the nature of a good thing and had a close call to escape defeat.

Lyke's presence in the saddle on Fantoche gave him a slight call over Huen, but in the running the latter dominated from the start and won easily. Fantoche having difficulty in outstaying The Moor for second place.

Anticipate, favored by the going and helped by a good ride, landed the fourth race from Wild Flower. With a good rider Blaise would possibly have been the winner here.

Another race thrown away by a bad ride came in the sixth when F. Smith's blunders cost Warlike the purse. Spearlene won here by a close margin from Harvey Smarr, with Warlike in third place. The latter was taken all over the track and raced as if best.

S. A. Clopton joined the claiming brigade and took Anticipate out of the fifth race for \$1,700.

L. A. Seregni has bought Le Bleu at private sale.

Tom Shaw will arrive next Monday to remain for the winter racing season.

ROSSETER YEARLINGS AT BELMONT

An Even Dozen Now There in Fred Burlew's Care—Brother to Incheape Still in California.

George H. Strate, manager of J. H. Rosseter's Wikip Ranch in California, passed through Chicago yesterday on his way to California. Mr. Strate came from New York by way of Kentucky after bringing a carload of yearlings to Belmont Park, which he turned over to Fred Burlew, trainer of the Rosseter stable. There were an even dozen in the shipment, six by Friar Rock and six by Disguise. Mr. Strate is particularly sweet on the chestnut colt by Friar Rock—Sweet Marjoram, the dam of Bringham and Ethel Gray. He says he is another Incheape, the colt for which S. C. TROUBLE MAKERS ARE BUSY

Newly Elected Officials to Test Legality of the Betting Methods Used at New Orleans.

NEW ORLEANS, La., December 7.—District Attorney-Elect Conrad A. Buchler of Jefferson Parish will take the oath of office Friday and expects to investigate the system of betting in use at the Jefferson Park race track the same day, he announced Monday evening. Whether he will proceed by filing informations or put the legality of the system up to the grand jury of Jefferson Parish has not been definitely decided by Mr. Buchler.

"I will lose no time in making an investigation of the system of betting in use at the Jefferson Park track. I believe the legality of the system should be determined by a court and I will try to lose no time in bringing it to the court's attention."

"I have not yet decided whether I will file an information if I believe the system to be a violation of the Locke law, or whether I will lay the matter before the grand jury. I will probably decide on the mode of procedure after an investigation at the race track."

New Orleans awaits with great interest the promised investigation of Mr. Buchler, as on it may depend the future of racing in Orleans Parish.

District Attorney R. H. Marr, who took office Monday, visited the Jefferson Park track last week and declared that the system of betting at that track is a violation of the Locke law, also that if the same system is used at the Business Men's Racing Association Fair Grounds track in Orleans Parish he will prosecute.

The system of betting now used at Jefferson Park was used at the Fair Grounds last winter. Walter Gleason, attorney for the Business Men's Racing Association, has no further comment to make on District Attorney Marr's assertion other than that the Business Men's Racing Association will operate and operate within the provisions of all laws.

F. A. Middleton, attorney of the Jefferson Park Racing Association, has taken the stand that the system of betting in use at Jefferson Park is within the terms of the decision of the Supreme Court in the Austin case and therefore legal.

BEST PROGRAM OF MEETING

Improvement in Track Conditions at Havana Brings Out Better Class of Horses.

HAVANA, Cuba, December 7.—Racing will be resumed at Oriental Park tomorrow with what is considered the best program provided since the opening of the meeting. The improvement in the class of horses participating is due to the improved track conditions.

The troubles of the track superintendent seem to be over, for the present at least. The dry season appears to have set in, which means a long, hot dry spell and the track should be fast in a couple of days.

Well balanced fields have been entered in all six races, eleven being named in the second, a dash of five-eighths. Among those named going to the post are a number of first-time starters of the meeting and their presence lends an air of uncertainty as to results. The feature of the program is the fifth race, in which there are some good sprinters. The Armonia Stable entered two in this race, either one of which will be hard to trim. A large staff of men was busy all morning on the track smoothing over the rough spots and spreading sand on the turn into the backstretch.

The track this morning was fairly alive with horses, over 400 being worked. J. D. Healy, brother of Simon Healy, who remained in Cuba after the brother returned to the States, has taken over the horses of Senior J. R. Carvalho. There are four in the string, which includes Bianca and Hands Off. Dr. Healy has opened a public stable and is likely to have several more added to his string in the near future.

GREAT INCREASES IN FRENCH STAKES
