



EDDIE RICKENBACHER WINS SUNNYLAND STABLE'S FINE RECORD GOOD SPORT AT HAVANA

Defeats the Favorite Sterling in a Fast Run Race.

Jefferson Park Track Nearly at Its Best, with Excellent Racing Resulting.

NEW ORLEANS, La., December 16.—The speedy Eddie Rickenbacher, carrying the colors of J. R. Skinner, carried off honors in his initial appearance here and incidentally stamped himself a sprinter of no mean ability to carry 120 pounds and beat a good band of sprinters including Sterling. The latter, with his weight advantage, was considered to have the race, a handicap for all ages at three-quarters of a mile, at his mercy and was given confident support. The Rickenbacher supporters, however, by no means conceded defeat for their champion, as they unstintedly wagered on him. The others in the race were practically neglected. Eddie Rickenbacher at once displayed sensational speed and in the first quarter had a five lengths' lead, but Sterling, which had followed him closest, moved up just before reaching the stretch as if he would shoot by the leader without any great effort, but at this juncture Murray either lost control, or through over-confidence, Sterling began coming wide, costing him considerable ground and enabling Eddie Rickenbacher to retain the lead and eventually win by a scant half length. A half dozen lengths back came Smart Guy, third place going to him by virtue of staying close to the inner rail while the others were coming extremely wide. Richereek, on Charlie Leydecker, being responsible for this by his action in forcing Bunga Buck and Vice-Chairman out on the stretch turn.

Clear weather and a fast improving track were again contributing factors toward good racing, several of the dashes being marked by particularly close finishes after hard drives. Jockey Lyke again figured prominently and to his superior saddle skill was due the victory of Fantoche in the mile dash, contested by two-year-olds. Fantoche was seemingly beaten on the stretch turn, where he was forced back, but under the energetic riding he received in the stretch he wore Day Lilly and Huen down to win going away.

Mary Head scored her third consecutive success when she took the first race from Seguro, her victory coming in the last few strides.

Ablass followed in the wake of Mary Head and gave the backers of favorites cause for rejoicing when she won the second race.

Kirstle's Cub showed improved form when he won the third race, for which Amackassin was favorite and finished far in the rear.

Barry Shannon furnished an upset when he just lasted long enough to beat Dancing Spray. Roberts, who had the mount on the winner, was suspended for six days by the stewards for his rough riding.

E. R. Bradley, accompanied by Mrs. Bradley, was an arrival today and will remain until after January 1.

R. L. Baker was among the arrivals. He came from Hot Springs, Ark., and reports that the extensive band of thirty-five horses owned by John Sanford and in charge of Preston Burch are wintering at Oaklawn.

E. F. Simms has eleven horses there, including Eternal and Leonardo II., winner of the Hopeful Stakes. James McClelland is in charge.

W. Martin has ten horses at the Hot Springs track and S. C. Hildreth is expected soon with a large division of the Sinclair-owned horses.

Jockey Erickson was fined \$25 by the starter for disobedience at the post.

FRENCH NATIONAL MUTUELS

Bill Before Chamber of Deputies to Increase Enormous Betting Revenues.

The existence of the mutual system of betting in France was never more secure than at the present day. The phenomenal increase in the volume of turf speculation has resulted in such an increase of revenue to the government that any attempt to revive bookmaking would be wasted effort. As a matter of fact, there is now in prospect an elaborate scheme to be laid before the chamber of deputies which, if passed into law, would make the government a national bookmaker on an unprecedented scale. It is nothing more nor less than the legalizing of betting for stop-at-home enthusiasts; or, as it is termed in England, the starting price business. Lately, this has developed to enormous proportions throughout the country. The police are quite unable to cope with the so-called evil. The projected legislation on the subject would institute branch pari-mutuel offices all over the country. The stay-at-home punter would then be able during his lunch hour to call at the nearest pari-mutuel bank and transact his business, much in the same way as at the savings bank. For the backer the scheme is splendid. To back his fancy in an open manner and to have the assurances that true odds and safe payment are guaranteed is an ideal position for the stay-at-home punter. The progress of this bill will be followed with interest. —Paris correspondence of London Sportsman.

CURRENT NOTES OF THE TURF

Jockey B. Kennedy rode his one hundredth winner of this year when he scored with Candle Light in the fifth race at Havana Tuesday.

The victory of Bobbydazzler in the Burton Handicap Hurdle Race at Birmingham, England, November 30, occasioned a greater amount of enthusiasm than is usually associated with a jumping race. Mr. Hatry's horse provided Frank Wootton with his first winner over the sticks, and the jockey received quite an ovation when it was seen that he had the victory in safe keeping after jumping the last hurdle.

EXCELLENT MONEY-EARNING RACING OF THE GOOD HANDICAP HORSES IRISH KISS AND SLIPPERY ELM IN THE CAMPAIGN OF THE PRESENT YEAR

R. A. Smith's Sunnyland Stable was raced for by thirteen horses this year. Two of them were good enough to ornament any stable in the land, being the noted handicap horses Irish Kiss and Slippery Elm. Between them they won \$43,058 of the \$62,410 gathered by the stable in 1920. The English-bred Irish Kiss seemed to have trained off in the fall, but when at his best in the summer was a hard horse to beat, his victories, among others, in the National Handicap at Hamilton, Independence Handicap at Devonshire and Detroit City Handicap at Kenilworth being high-class demonstrations of his ability to run fast while carrying high weight. Slippery Elm is getting along in years, but is still an effective racer, as he showed when he won the \$10,000 Frontier Handicap at Windsor and had such formidable antagonists as The Porter, Exterminator, Regalo and Paul Weidel among those behind him at the finish. In comparison with these two real cracks, the other horses in the stable did not amount to much, still were good enough to race usefully when placed right, and such as Ragnarok, Madrono, Ultra Gold, Dottie Vandiver, Mark West, Jean Bullant and Benevolent won quite enough money to pay their share of stable expenses. TRAVELING THEIR OWN ROADS

Orleans Parish District Attorney to Ignore Action in Jefferson Parish Case.

NEW ORLEANS, La., December 16.—Regardless of the decision in the Jefferson Parish case on the system of betting at the Jefferson Park race track, District Attorney Marr of Orleans says he will prosecute persons using the same system at the Business Men's Racing Association's Fair Grounds race track, which is scheduled to open January 1. "I have nothing to do with Jefferson Parish," said District Attorney Marr. "If the same system is used at the Fair Grounds as is used at Jefferson Park, which I believe to be a violation of the Locke law, I will prosecute.

"It will make no difference to me if any appeal in the Jefferson Parish case is pending before the Supreme Court, or not, I will proceed in the Parish of Orleans just as if the Jefferson case did not exist. I do not recognize anything as a 'test' case."

At the time judge Marr visited the Jefferson Park track two weeks ago and announced he would prosecute if the same system of betting is used in Orleans as is used in Jefferson Parish, Walter Gleason, attorney for the Business Men's Racing Association, declared that his association "will operate and operate within all the provisions of all laws."

T. E. McBride, "oralizer" at the Jefferson Park track, who was arrested on orders from District Attorney Buchler, was arraigned in Jefferson court Wednesday morning. He pleaded not guilty of violating the Locke law and was released by Judge Gautier under \$100 bond. The trial was set for December 23.

At the time of entering the plea of not guilty F. C. Middleton, attorney for the Jefferson Racing Association, who represented McBride, reserved the right to withdraw the plea at any time and file a demurrer, alleging that the action of McBride did not violate any law.

District Attorney Buchler, according to his statement Wednesday, is anxious to bring the case to a speedy conclusion.

"If the defense is ready to go to trial Thursday," said Mr. Buchler, "I believe we can finish the trial in a day. Practically all of the facts charged in the information are admitted by the defense, the contention being, I believe, on the interpretation of the Locke law."

If the Supreme Court docket is not badly crowded a decision in the case could be speedily expected.

HAVANA, Cuba, December 16.—Fifty-three nominations have been received for the Christmas Handicap with an added value of \$3,000, to be decided Saturday, December 25. The list of nominees comprises the cream of the older division of horses in training at Oriental Park. The stable of Mose Goldblatt is represented by no fewer than ten eligibles, the Armonia Stable by six, C. K. Moore four and W. R. Coe three. PRINCE WALES JUMPER IN NO HURRY

LONDON, England, December 1.—The private secretary to the Prince of Wales, answering an inquiry regarding the Australian steeplechaser Kinlark, which recently arrived in this country, states that the price has not as yet settled anything with regard to the horse, and is not likely to do so for some time to come, as it will be necessary to wait until Kinlark is fully acclimatized to English conditions before any decision can be taken as to what is to be done with him. The Australian gelding will, therefore, not appear among the entries to the 1921 big hurdle or steeplechases.

WINNING ENGLISH BREEDERS

Eminent Sportsmen Who Raced Horses of Their Own Breeding Successfully This Year.

For the second year in succession Lord Derby holds pride of place in the list of winning breeders with a total of \$85,335, won by eighteen horses in thirty-one races, all with one exception belonging to him. The exception is Talbot, which contributed a minor sum to the aggregate. It should be said that so long as such a good type of sportsman continues to take an active interest in racing it will be all for the benefit of the sport, and none will begrudge the honors that come to him.

Sir Robert Jardine, who headed the list of winning owners, comes second in the breeders with \$34,050, but here, without exception, all the animals that contributed to this sum are still his own property. Cinna, the Oaks winner, was, of course, the chief contributor with the One Thousand Guineas and Coronation Stakes, Ascot, while she was only beaten a neck by Charibelle for the Oaks. Dola won three good handicaps, and other useful ones were Sundart, Seraphic (the filly by Lonawand—Seraph) and Welsh Woman.

Sir William Nelson, who is third with \$38,205, made a big advance from the previous year's total of \$16,860. He had a slice of luck when Tangiers was awarded the Ascot Gold Cup on the disqualification of Buchan, but apart from that won some valuable races, Tangiers and Attilus being responsible for over \$50,000.

Mr. W. Raphael is another gentleman who breeds his own racers, among the most notable contributing to \$55,295 being the disappointing Alenby, La Vulture, Poltava and Bettina. He won over \$40,000 more in stake money than the previous year.

Sir E. Hulton, who was second in the list in 1919, did not have quite so good a year, the total being \$54,615 compared with \$72,365, but the number of races won was thirty-four, the same as last year. Silvern contributed the major portion of the money, \$16,905. Elvera, belonging to Mr. Rhodes, won three races in succession, and so did Corporal, the sensational selling plater.

Mr. J. J. Maher had chiefly to thank Caligula for the high position he holds in the list, for the St. Leger winner contributed altogether \$39,705. Lord Rosebery made a wonderful advance from \$6,100 to \$50,538, winning thirty-three races, each for moderate sums. Lord Astor declined slightly, Buchan being his chief contributor with \$31,070, and Pompadour won \$9,945.

The National Stud had a fairly good year, \$48,815 being realized, well distributed over eighteen horses, and Mr. J. B. Joel was credited with \$47,690 against \$21,340 last year, but Mr. S. B. Joel declined slightly, Racket and Chi-lo-sa being the best winners for him. Tetratema was Major D. M'Calmont's best in a total of \$43,620, while Mr. William Cazale, Lord Zetland, Sir W. Cooke, Sir H. B. Bird, the late Sir M. Sykes and Sir John Robinson all had successful seasons.—Sports Chronicle.

PURSE TAKEN FROM YUKON

Error in Weight Causes Disqualification of Irwin Horse—Trainers and Jockeys Punished.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., December 16.—Because of a technical error in weights the purse won by C. B. Irwin's Yukon at Tijuana last Friday was given to George Muehlebach, which finished second. Yukon carried 102 pounds in the race, whereas according to the conditions he should have carried 105. The disqualification of Yukon places George Muehlebach first, Examiner second and July Fly third, but does not affect the betting.

It was announced by the stewards that pending an investigation of the running of the sixth race of last Thursday, which was won by Ring, the licenses of trainer A. E. Smith, conditioner of Juanita Fredrick, and jockeys W. Taylor and C. Thompson are suspended. Taylor rode Walter Mack, which finished seventh in the field of eight, while Thompson had the mount on Juanita Fredrick, which ran fourth.

For rough riding and interference in the fourth race of Friday last, jockey Clements has been suspended for ten days by the stewards.

W. C. Weant claimed Sam Hill for \$1,200 from F. J. O'Rourke.

Interesting Racing at Oriental Park Entertains Large Crowd.

Belle of Elizabethtown Takes Main Race in Fast Time—Close Finishes the Rule.

HAVANA, Cuba, December 16.—Racing at Oriental Park this afternoon showed that the track is nearing its best and should be fast as ever in a day or so. Another crowd of goodly proportions was present and witnessed some good sport. The main attraction from a racing standpoint was the fifth race and Belle of Elizabethtown triumphed here, leading all the way and scoring in fast time, although hard pressed by the favorite, American Ace.

Durella, carrying the colors of J. C. Eaton and ridden by J. Carmody, proved best of the ten that made up the field in the first race. She was waited with until entering the stretch and, finishing fast on the inside, passed the pacemaker in the last eighth and drew clear in the last few strides. Stiletto ran a good race to finish a bang-up second after closing an immense gap from a slow beginning. Even with J. Butwell's assistance the erratic Sinn Felner could not hold on to second place after appearing to have a good chance to win at the half-mile post.

Got 'Em lived up to his name in the second race, getting the jump on his opponents at the start and setting them a merry pace throughout. Butwell was easing him up at the end. Winell was second and Tige third.

A great finished marked the running of the third race. Less than a half length separated the first three horses, Juanita III., Incinerator and Miss Sweep finishing in the order named and the result in doubt until the judges announced their placing. Mose Goldblatt's Legotal was a hot favorite in this race, but he appeared sore going to the post and tired near the end.

Mumbo Jumbo and Discussion engaged in a hard fought duel in the fourth race, claiming handicap for all ages, the former winning in the last strides. Discussion appeared a trifle short or the verdict might have been reversed.

Whatever chance Black Thong may have had in the sixth race went glimmering when he was shut off on the first turn. The winner turned up in Doublet II., with Timothy J. Hogan second and Blazonry third.

John W. Pangel sold Light Fantastic to A. B. Worley for a private consideration.

Owing to the unruly tactics at the post the stewards ordered Libert Bond placed on the outside of the others in the fourth race Friday afternoon, when he is carded to start.

J. Simmons, a Canadian youth from Montreal, started his jockey career when he had a mount on Jack Dawson. He is under contract to George Sherman.

N. J. Barnes, another beginner, has been granted a license to ride.

ENGLISH IDEAS OF "TUBING" HORSES

English horsemen have had much more experience with "tubed" horses than we have. The roarer is a national institution and the English vet. deals with him by and large according to his racing worth. The English racing theorist—the purist who wants to run for anyone's money but his own, but to run for it in purist fashion—thinks that the tubed horse should be barred because he has artificial aid—following the dope evil line of reasoning. Tubed Kerasos' win of the Derby Cup started a lot of comment. The general opinion, professional all around, is that English tubing is efficacious in its early stages, but that when the surrounding cartilages thicken the horse begins to feel the want of a free air-channel. Then it may be that the operation is repeated in a lower part of the windpipe, and all is well for the time being with such practice. But the thickening still goes on and fundamentally tubing is a mere bridge.

It seems that in 1899 Breemount's Pride won the Manchester Steeplechase after being tubed for a week, but two weeks later she was beaten off and roared like a bull. The English know more about roaring and its relief than we do and rather think by and large that tubing is merely a temporary relief.

HANDICAPPER N. S. HAND IS DEAD

Nin S. Hand is dead, his death taking place in his San Francisco home December 4. He was 58 years of age, having been born in 1862 at Bloomington, Ind. His name is known to all who attempt locating the elusive winner by the modern use of figure handicapping, for in that matter he was a recognized authority and the author of several works pertaining to the art. In his early days he was an intimate of "Pittsburg Phil" and was a familiar figure on Chicago and St. Louis tracks when racing flourished in the two cities. For the last twelve years he had resided with his wife at 245 Buchanan street, San Francisco, and from there had published several books of poems.
