If any lingering doubt remains concerning the Bruce Lowe conclusion, that certain thoroughbred families are more productive of sires and sires capable of transmitting sire excellence to their descendants...

No. 8 family sires capable of transmitting sire excellence include such as Glencoe's sire, Sultan, which was also the sire of Bay Middleton, Ion, sire of Wild Dayrell and Tadmore...

Newminster was, of course, a son of that good race mare Beeswing and to Beeswing also trace Melton, St. Serf, Ayrshire, Perth, the recent Australian sire success Linacre; Transvaal, which sires so many hardy horses for the Domino line, Sweep, sire of Eternal, Bon Homme and Leonardo II, and the coming success as a sire—mark the prediction—Sun Briar...

To that good foundation No. 8 mare Apollonia by The Colonel, through Zeila by Emilis, traces that good Australian sire Chester, and to Ecolone, her sister, a number of good ones abroad. The Ecolone branch is best brought forward by way of Ethel by Ethelbert. Better, I think, or rather more influential, are members of the Apollonia branch as sires than as race horses, but even this branch of the No. 8 family is nothing like so good, either for race horses or sires, as the Beeswing. Herein, I take it, is Bruce Lowe's great oversight, in that he rather lumped his families as a whole, instead of drawing particular attention to the special excellence of their different branches.

LESSER LIGHTS OF NO. 8 FAMILY.

Winners tracing to Legacy, by King Fergus, are few and far between. Powell, by Tandem, however, bred two good daughters in Chinkerna and Pauline, Chinkerna, the dam of Humphrey Clinker and Pauline, ancestress of Cathedral, Vanderdecken, Castlerough, The Rush, Andover and Pirate of Penance. The Clinker branch, however, since Humphrey Clinker's day has not been productive of any really influential horse. Top Gallant was good, but not great, and he a good winner in England. Powell's half-sister Evelyn was the dam of Orville, and this branch is also rather unproductive of high-class horses of late years.

The Gentle Kitty branch of the No. 8 family is also good. Gentle Kitty foaled the sisters Catherine and Mary. To Catherine trace the sire of St. Gatten's dam St. Editha, Kingly Vale, Munden, Rapid Rhone, Brother to Strafford, etc. But the best line to Catherine lives on in France, where Balaire's granddaughter Pergola, by The Baron, is ancestress of many. In fact, the best of Catherine is brought forward by Pergola, whose daughters, Perla, Pristina and Pensacola, all by the Herod horse Dollar, are the foundation stones of many a French winning combination.

To Mary, by way of Scotch Kate, trace the Two Thousand Guineas winner Sweeper and Frank Gill, as well as Pradella, but the best of this line I rather think is handed on by Miss Wilkes, ancestress of British Queen, and to her trace such as Miss Jennima, Titonus, Mend and Fugleman.

When all is said, however, the Beeswing branch of the No. 8 family is best, best for race horses as it is for sires, and any breeder who has a couple of Beeswing mares on his estate can count himself lucky, indeed.

CURRENT NOTES OF THE TURF

On January 11 the masters of fox hounds of the several clubs throughout the United States will meet in their respective states to elect representatives to the Hunts Committee for 1921.

The new South Australian bill dealing with book-makers and the totalizer provides for the payment to the government of all unclaimed tote dividends. The old act did not stipulate for any such payments by clubs.

Ex-jockey James McIntyre is getting Sailor ready for the big stake races at Tijuana. This is the son of All Gold—Holsterous, for which J. W. McClelland paid a big price, but never amounted to much.

King Daly, the champion heavy-weight hunter of the National Horse Show of 1920, is now hunting his third year with the Radnor homds near Philadelphia, thus refuting the common opinion that winning show horses are not used in the field. King Daly is a half-bred by Sea King, a son of the famous English stallion Persimmon, his dam being an unregistered Irish mare named Miss Daly, of unknown breeding. King Daly was bred at T. F. Ryan's Oakridge Stud in Virginia.

PAYMENTS DUE ON KENTUCKY STAKES

To horsemen who have made nominations to Kentucky stakes attention is called that payments in the following stakes are due and must be paid on or before January 1, 1921, in order that the entries may remain eligible: Breeders' Futurity of 1921, \$20 for each entry; Breeders' Futurity of 1922, \$10 for each entry; Latonia Championship of 1921, \$50 for each entry; Latonia Championship of 1922, \$25 for each entry; Kentucky Jockey Club of 1921, \$25 for each entry.

BIG PURSES AT FAIR GROUNDS

None Less Than \$1,000 Will Be Given During Meeting Opening Saturday.

NEW ORLEANS, La., December 28.—Next Saturday will bring a change in the racing scene here, from Jefferson Park to the Fair Grounds, where a thirty-three days' meeting will be inaugurated, with the \$3,000 added New Year's Handicap as the headline attraction for the opening day. The Fair Grounds meeting will be the greatest in purses ever attempted by a winter race track, as no race there will have a lesser value than \$1,000, while each day will find one race on the program worth \$1,500, bringing the total daily purse distribution to \$7,500. In addition to this, \$10,000 added to stakes will be offered the horsemen.

The plan whereby twenty-five per cent of the purse earnings of the owners was to be held in escrow until the Business Men's Racing Association was assured of a certain amount of profit, which would justify the offering of \$4,000 as a minimum for each race, has been abandoned. The racing promoters have announced that they will assume all risks of failure to profit by the coming meeting and the \$7,500 proposition will be gone through with just the same. Taking the Jefferson Park meeting as a criterion, the Fair Grounds people will have little to worry over from a profit-making standpoint, as the Shrewsbury track is enjoying a banner season in the face of much inclement weather.

With the dawn of the new year will come the introduction of many new two-year-olds and the Fair Grounds management will provide liberally for the youngsters, as one race each day will be given over to them. It has been a trying task on trainers in getting their young racers ready for the coming season, because of the bad weather and muddy track, but most of them were fairly well conditioned upon their arrival here from the North and East and schooling from at the barrier has been the greatest drawback. Assistant starters James Osborne and Will Hamilton have put in every day possible in educating them in post habits, but the rain seriously interfered with this work.

The holiday season is responsible for a big addition to the ranks of the turf followers here, the New York delegation being especially swelled. The late comers from that section report that many more racing enthusiasts plan to head this way as soon as the Fair Grounds meeting gets under way.

E. R. Bradley, master of Idle Hour Farm, near Lexington, Ky., whose extensive stable enjoyed the best year in its history this year, is spending a vacation here preparatory to departing for his winter home at Palm Beach, Fla. Mr. Bradley reports that his horses at the farm, under the care of trainer H. J. Thompson, are wintering in splendid fashion and, if they continue to do well, he will be especially well fortified for the rich stakes on the Kentucky racing circuit and at Saratoga next year. The arrival of Mr. Bradley evidently brought back to the division of his stable racing here in charge of William Hurley, as Brotherly Love won the first purse of the meeting for this establishment the day after his owner got here.

L. LYKE'S FINE HORSEMANSHIP.

One of the most pleasing features of the Jefferson Park meeting is the excellent riding of jockey Lawrence Lyke, weighing 113 pounds. Lyke does not get many mounts, but he invariably demonstrates his superior horsemanship on most of those that he does get. Contrary to the general supposition, Lyke is only twenty years of age, and he has many years of usefulness left in him yet. He makes no effort to reduce his weight, and this contributes to his efficiency and will serve to prolong his riding days.

Many horsemen here are fortifying their stables for the big purses at the Fair Grounds through the claiming process and, unlike the first part of the meeting when claims were few and far between, every day now finds one or more horses changing hands. Any kind of a thoroughbred that can win is in demand, and several horses have had as many as three different owners since the meeting opened.

Jockey H. King, who is under contract to Joan M. Goode and who has been riding in brilliant style here, will lose his apprentice allowance of five pounds on next Saturday. He scored his first victory on last New Year's day at the Fair Grounds with Omund, a 40 to 1 chance.

A similar fate will befall jockey W. Heinisch on December 31, which will be one year from the date that he rode his first winner. This was Arch Plotter, owned by Pat Knebelkamp, who is Heinisch's contract employer. Heinisch is a New Orleans lad and, while he has met with a fair measure of success in the saddle, he is having a hard battle against increasing weight. It is with difficulty that he scales as low as 108 pounds now, and most of the time he rides at one or two pounds in excess of that figure.

One of the most improved horses of the winter here is Fanteche, Alex R. Gordon's two-year-old son of Fitz Herbert—Fresnay. Coming to New Orleans a maiden he has won three races, two of them over the mile route, and finished second once. In his only other start he lost his rider immediately after the start. Fanteche, which was bred in France by Clarence H. Mackay, did not race until last October 11, making his debut at Latonia. He ran several fair races in Kentucky, but since his arrival here he has been no respecter of horses of his age. He races best when saved for the last quarter and bids fair to make a useful horse over a considerable route of ground as a three-year-old. Jockey J. Mooney, who is under contract to the Quincey Stable and whose brother, jockey J. J. Mooney, is one of the leading riders here, is spending the winter at his home in this city. Both of the Mooney boys got their start in their native section and their rise in their chosen profession has been rapid. J. Mooney, the older of the two, has not ridden here as yet, but his brother is certainly upholding the family reputation.

TROXLER TO RIDE AT FAIR GROUNDS

Jockey Roscoe Troxler, one of the real veterans of his profession, is on hand at New Orleans, but thus far he has not donned silks. The past year found Troxler doing little riding, but he will gain all probability get into action at the Fair Grounds when the new two-year-olds begin racing. Few jockeys are superior to Troxler at leaving the barrier with a two-year-old, and he is a valuable asset to a youngster in the races at three-eighths of a mile. He won the first two-year-old race of the present year with Eye Opener at the Fair Grounds.

GOLDEN HARVEST IN CUBA

Over \$100,000 Already Distributed Among Horsemen—More Rain Falls.

HAVANA, Cuba, December 28.—The constant growth and expansion of Cuban racing is vividly reflected in the amount of money being distributed in stakes and purses among the horsemen racing at Oriental Park this season. The sums given away already are largely in excess of those of the previous season, which in this respect was the most profitable year for the horsemen since racing was first instituted in Cuba.

During the first twenty-two days of the meeting now in progress the club has distributed among the winning stables a total of \$163,800, or a daily average of \$4,718. During a similar period last year the distribution amounted to \$88,300, or an average of \$4,100. This shows a daily increase this year of more than \$600 over that of last. The daily average distribution will show an even greater increase when the time arrives for the valuable stakes to be decided.

The Armonia Stable leads the money winning owners to date, with Señor E. Alvarez, whose horses are in charge of former jockey W. Daly, second. The stable of Williams Bros., which in former years figured extensively in the winning column, has at last gotten into its stride and is now among the largest money winners of the season. Willie Crump, who led the winning riders at Oriental Park three years ago, has a slight lead for the first twenty-two days this season over Bert Kennedy, his closest rival for riding honors. Kennedy was slow in getting started, but he is now going ahead and may displace Crump in the leadership before long.

The mud runners had another opportunity to show their merits at Oriental Park this afternoon when the heavy rains which set in this morning made the going muddy. The changed footing resulted in several withdrawals, but well balanced fields went to the post in most of the races and keen contests resulted.

Burford made an exhibition of his company in the Pan-American Handicap, in which he made all the pace and, after passing the half mile post, drew away into a long lead and was eased up at the finish. Butwell, who had the mount on Burford, also rode the winner of the first race, Gus Scheer, which, after several disappointing attempts, finally won a purse for E. J. Crawford.

Draftsman beat the barrier in the second and made a runaway affair of the race. Fickle Fancy came from behind in the third and got up in the last fifty yards to win going away. The ten days' suspension imposed on jockey E. Barnes has expired and that good rider will be seen in the saddle again tomorrow.

Foster Embury was claimed out of the third race by J. Koerner for \$1,100. Smite was taken out of the same race by W. H. Hall for \$1,100.

The Morro Castle Handicap, with a valuation of \$2,500, at a distance of three-quarters of a mile, is one of the established fixtures at Oriental Park and will have its renewal next Sunday. It closed with fifty-six nominations, including all the best sprinters in Cuba.

The iron horse Timothy J. Hogan, with a record of nine times in the money out of eleven starts since the meeting, is among those named in the second race tomorrow.

While the horses were at the post in the first race Terrible Susan lunged and brushed jockey E. Hunt off Hindress. The boy sustained a fracture of the middle finger on the left hand, and as a consequence he was unable to ride the mare and it was a long wait while Hindress was returned to the paddock and Lancaster was substituted for Hunt. Lancaster was also put on Hunt's other mounts, Smite and Azarita.

G. L. Peck, vice-president of the Pennsylvania Railroad, accompanied by a party of friends, were among today's visitors.

NATURE OF WESTWARD HO'S TROUBLES

Last year Lord Glanely paid \$59,700 at auction for the yearling colt by Swanford—Blue Tit. This was a new record price for a yearling, displacing the previous record price of \$50,000 paid for Sceptre at that age. The colt was named Westward Ho and curiosity as to what he would do in racing this year was rife in English turf circles, so it was concluded he would not do. However, when Lord Glanely gave the greater price of \$72,500 for his yearling half-brother by The Tetrarch this year it was concluded that Westward Ho must have shown high promise in private after all. All of this led the Newmarket correspondent of the Manchester Sporting Chronicle to write quite recently: "For the information of those interested I can, however, truthfully state that Westward Ho, which went lame on one or both of his hocks in the fore part of this year, and had to be thrown up, was for a lengthy period of the season placed under the charge of a veterinary specialist and treated for thoroughpin and other defects to his hocks. He has been rendered perfectly sound without blemishing the parts which caused the trouble, and by the manner in which the colt moves when trotting or cantering not the slightest sign of lameness can be detected, nor is anything wrong with his action. The son of Swanford—Blue Tit, which in the early part of his two-year-old days presented an unfinished and backward appearance, has since firmed down and is now one of the most commanding and as good looking as any of his age and sex in training here or elsewhere."

"He is not, however, so taking as his half-sister Blue Dun in action, while it is a fact that up to the present time neither the owner nor trainer can possibly know anything of a reliable nature of the capabilities for racing of Westward Ho. The colt until the present time has not done anything in the way of active galloping, and any report to the contrary is incorrect."

ANGON A SUPERIOR MUD RUNNER

Angon, Lloyd Gentry's good three-year-old, has clearly demonstrated here that mud is his "hole card," and it is almost a certainty that he can hold any of the other sprinters at New Orleans safe over a soft track. Bullet Proof and Pickwick are both rated as excellent short distance performers in muddy going, but he made a show of this pair recently. His race against Pickwick was particularly impressive, as he carried 120 pounds, conceding plenty of weight to his rival and easily defeated him. Angon had a few excellent races to his credit in Kentucky over a fast track, but he has shown an aversion for a similar course at Jefferson Park.

IMPROVING AT JEFFERSON

Better Weather and a Drying Track Leads to Good Racing.

Big Holiday Attendance Cheers a Great Finish in the Mile and a Quarter Dash.

NEW ORLEANS, La., December 28.—Rumors about possible happenings at the Fair Grounds with the beginning of the racing there are as thick as snowflakes in a New England village during a winter storm and it is all a matter of the angle that you are located in to obtain its drift. Meantime the present management is going along steadily with its plans for the conducting of a successful meeting, despite frequent mention of District Attorney Marr's possible interference with the betting. Attorneys for the Fair Grounds have announced that there will not be any betting violations of the law and that speculation will be in conformity with the decision of the supreme court in the Austin case.

Today's racing was under considerably improved conditions, the weather, though crisp, was clear and a high wind during the night aided materially in drying the track, creating firm footing for the horses. While there was a lack of features, the racing was spirited, due to the even grade of most of the starters. The attendance again caused a jam and was the biggest midweek assemblage of the present meeting. Ring activities were in keeping with these conditions and kept the many layers working at top speed.

The public began badly with the overthrow of Philanderer, a pronounced favorite in the opening race, which succumbed after a drive with Rose-chiff, ridden by Lyke.

An unwelcome band started in the second race, with Marie Maxim given the call and she made good without the semblance of leaving the result in doubt. Plain Bill, at a long price, followed her home and Trackstar just managed to outstay Old Smokey for third place.

The recently acquired Sea Court scored for her new owner, M. F. Hirsch, in commanding style in the third race, with Bit of Green and Hope Princess dividing the smaller portion of the purse. Sea Court showed a good performance under a capable rider and had to race to his best form to win, as he was away poorly and had to close a considerable margin.

A poor start in the fourth race was responsible for the defeat of Title, which finished third. This race was won by Trooper, which beat Port Light, J. Brown, owner of Trooper, claimed Title at a cost of \$3,200.

Waukeag, another favorite, scored his second successive purse since being claimed by C. N. Freeman, when he won the fifth race in somewhat easy fashion over an outsider, Plenty, with Nelle Yorke in third place.

Lad's performance in the sixth race was in keeping with the short price at which he was quoted, for he won in a canter from Sasin, with Ben Hampson in third place.

One of the best finishes ever witnessed came with the running of the mile and a quarter dash, which closed the day's racing. Five of the starters came to the finish in cavalry order, with the sulking Corydon coaxed into doing his best and getting the decision by a nose from the poorly ridden Austral, with Keep in third place a nose farther back and the same margin separating Lottery and Lorena Moss.

A. Swenke, owner of Austral, claimed Keep for \$1,200.

TWO REAL TURF STARS AT TIJUANA

Thunderstorm and Be Frank Attracting Much Attention at Far Western Track.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., December 28.—Tijuana this winter is extremely fortunate in having two horses here which rank high among the leading thoroughbred of this country. They are Thunderstorm, the mighty son of Olambala—Nightfall, and Be Frank, the crack son of Sir John Johnson—Frankness. Both of these toptoppers happen to be four-year-olds, with a fondness to race as far as horses run. In the East they clashed with the aristocrats of the turf and exchanged honors with horses at whose shrine the lovers of good horses worship.

Thunderstorm made a sorrowful debut at Tijuana some ten days ago in a five and a half furlongs handicap and, much to the surprise of his owner, he finished far back in the field. Subsequently, however, he accepted the crushing impost of 125 pounds in a handicap at a mile and seventy yards, which resulted in an easy victory for the big horse, going to the first turn he was fighting for his head, but jockey Callahan held him in reserve close up to the leader until entering the stretch, where he took the lead in a flash. Once in front his rider took a tight hold of him and the horse finished the race under restraint. Behind him were They Shall Not Pass, Franklin, Phedden, the four-time winner Nepperhan, Hubbab and others, but at no time did they ever seriously menace him. He ran the mile in 1:39 1/2, and the entire distance in 1:44 1/2. Considering that he won hard held over a track that is far from fast, it can be truthfully said that had the track been as fast as it was last year, when Breeze ran the distance in 1:43 1/2, a new mark for the distance would have certainly been established.

Be Frank, which was purchased in the East by George P. Fuller, the San Francisco paint magnate, purposely to run in the bountiful long-distance stakes to be decided after the first of the year, is at Imperial Beach, which is but a distance of six miles from Tijuana. Here he is being prepared for his stake campaign, getting long, slow gallops over the hard sands of the Pacific Ocean shore. Be Frank, so trainer Vivell reports, is doing splendidly and is a picture of health. Within a short time he will be taken to Tijuana, where he will be tuned up in readiness to give Thunderstorm battle in the \$20,000 Coffroth, the \$10,000 Baja California and U. S. Grant Hotel Stakes, besides many others of lesser value.
