RACING IS WELL GOVERNED

Governor Miller's Sensible Ideas About New York Turf.

Holds Conference at Albany About Proposed Combined Sporting Commission.

ALBANY, N. Y., April 10.—About a score of writers on sporting topics in this state came to Albany in response to an invitation of V. Ward Smith, secretary to Governor Miller, in the belief that their opinions were sought in connection with the governing of sports by commission. The governor conveyed the impression that the summons had been issued because of the belief that the writers had some questions to ask him. He declared that there was no legislation pending before him, but that he would be glad to hear from anybody present.

Out of the discussion which followed and which was confined largely to the fallacy of placing racing, boxing and wrestling under a single commission came the following opinion by the governor, when his attention was called to the fact that racing and baseball had been well handled: "I am frank to say that while many people think otherwise, I do not think that the state ought to attempt any regulation of people who can regulate themselves. We have got enough to do to look after the things that need regulating."

Later, when racing and its handling by a commission was being touched upon, the governor interjected the remark: "It seems to be well governed."

NEW YORK RACING COMMISSION HISTORY.

The original State Racing Commission was appointed by Governor Levi P. Morton when he signed the Percy-Gray law in 1897. It was composed of Messrs. August Belmont, New York, E. D. Morgan of Wheatley Hills, L. I., and John Sanford of Amsterdam, N. Y. This commission was clothed with a certain and well-defined authority. They were empowered to license all running race meetings in the state of New York conducted under the reasonable rules and regulations of the Jockey Club, and they were enjoined to make in their annual report such suggestions to the legislature as they thought would be helpful to the breeding industry and racing, which are so dovetailed that they cannot be separated, the one depending absolutely upon the other.

Prior to the appointment of this commission racing was in disrepute. Evils had crept into the sport which threatened to destroy it. A strong hand was needed at the helm. Among the sinister influences overcome were the poolroom ring, racing at night by electric light and collusive litigation, whose object was to destroy all racing authority. The light was let into dark places and the turf was finally rid of many disreputables.

A period of regeneration followed. Racing was re-established as a popular sport. It engaged the attention of men of stability and influence throughout the country. Horse breeding was greatly stimulated. Many new importations of blood stock were made from England and France to enrich our own thoroughbred families. Through the initiative of the commission racing was practically subordinated to the welfare of the breeding industry and special events were framed with a view to stimulating interest everywhere in the thoroughbred horse.

INFLUENCE OF BREEDING BUREAU.

One of the best influences employed was through the medium of the Bureau of Breeding of the Jockey Club, which was established for the benefit of the farmers of this state at the suggestion of the commission.

Legislation hostile to racing in 1908 and 1910, however, drove some of the largest studs out of existence—American stallions and mares were sent to Argentina, Australasia, England, France and Germany. The industry was so crippled that the state racing commission, which at that time was composed of Messrs. James W. Wadsworth of Genesee, N. Y.; H. K. Knapp of New York and Hon. John Sanford of Amsterdam, N. Y., employed the following language in their report to the legislature of 1912: "The existing statutes have terminated running races in this state and if the present condition of affairs be long continued the breeding and development of thoroughbred horses will entirely cease, and the type will disappear from the United States."

In 1908 there were 11,000 mares and 900 thoroughbred stallions in the United States and 4,400 foals were registered with the Jockey Club. In 1913 there were but 7,500. Some idea of the loss sustained by the breeding industry may be gleaned from the fact that it is estimated that the supply today consists of only 4,750 mares and 500 stallions, while the thoroughbred foals registered in 1920 numbered 1,841.

It takes five years to produce a horse and it will be a long time under favorable conditions before former records will be equaled. An established policy in connection with breeding and racing is imperative. Racing depends entirely upon thoroughbred horses passing in a steady yearly stream of two, three and four-year olds; in the stakes and purses offered by the racing associations in regulated and defined sequence like the curriculum of an educational institution. A break brings production to a standstill and resumption later is a matter of slow growth.

Racing is the only sport that can be injured to such an extent as the figures given above indicate. Baseball, boxing and all athletic sports of other character have but to possess the patronage of the public and an organization. The material required is ready overnight.

It is apparent that the conservation of racing and breeding calls for special knowledge, and that a commission eminently qualified to govern and safeguard other sports would be at sea in handling problems in connection with them. It is an error to rate racing as a spectacle—an amusement for the public only—and, therefore, that it is a luxury, for this feature is but an incident to a great and highly important industry and should be treated as such.

LEONARDO II. AT THE DOWNS

Xalapa Farm Derby Hope and Stablemates Arrive at Louisville Track.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 10.—Freezing weather with intermittent snow flurries prevailed here today, but adverse conditions did not prevent a number of the Kentucky Derby eligibles being given good work-outs at Churchill Downs and Douglas Park. The former course was almost fast, but the Bealmoor track was slow and the gallops there were not much from a time standpoint.

The most interesting event of the morning, however, was the arrival from Hot Springs, Ark., of the Xalapa Farm stable, headed by the Derby candidates Leonardo II. and Bon Homme. A large crowd braved the cold for several hours waiting to get a glimpse of these two horses. They came in for much admiration as a result of their splendid appearance. James W. McClelland brought sixteen thoroughbreds, eleven of them two-year-olds, from the vapor city and the trip was made without mishap. Every horse was unloaded with a normal temperature and the Derby hopes were quite frisky while being led from the train chute to their stalls. Leonardo II. has developed in size and conformation far more than any of the other Derby horses seen here thus far this spring. In addition to Leonardo II. and Bon Homme, McClelland brought Despair, which is also eligible to the Derby; Eternal, The Wanderer and the following two-year-olds: My Play (brother of Man o' War), Good Time (brother to Hourless), Missionary, Ballot Mark, Sweeper, Southern Cross, Poe, Lucky Hour, Swagger, Bengalese and Alex Hamilton.

The entire outfit presented a splendid appearance and the horses evidently put in an excellent winter. Mulciber and a pair of two-year-olds were sent to Havre de Grace. Trainer Kim Patterson, Roy Waldron, one of his assistants, and Jockey T. Jarvis also came on the same train with the Xalapa horses. Jockey Schuttlinger is due tomorrow.

"I am not making a Derby prediction," said McClelland, in discussing the chances of Leonardo II. and Bon Homme in the rich race. "But I will frankly state that I believe that my brown colt (meaning Leonardo II.) will muss things up considerably for the others in the race before he is beaten. He has been training famously at Hot Springs, and I have sent him a mile, one and one-eighth miles, and even a mile and a quarter, quite a few times. Bon Homme is also doing fine and he is an excellent Derby possibility. In my opinion Tryster is undoubtedly the horse that we all have to beat, as he is a rugged thoroughbred and one that will stand hard training and improve fast with it. Dr. Clark's performance at Bowie Saturday is evidence that trainer Jimmy Rowe has the Whitney horses ready now and he still has almost a month to work with Tryster."

CENTIMETER IN PAST WORK-OUT.

Some of the Xalapa horses will be shipped to Lexington, but McClelland said today that he had not decided as yet which ones he will take.

To Centimeter, G. L. Blackford's three-year-old son of Meelick, fell the honor this morning of turning in the best work-out of any of the western Derby eligibles. He ran one and one-eighth miles in 1:55 at Churchill Downs; the first mile in 1:41½. Jockey Sammy McGraw, who rode him, eased him up to almost a canter at the end of the mile. The Meelick colt worked with blinkers on and minus a pacemaker. His work-out was pronounced highly meritorious by trainer Dick Vestal, as he never fully extends himself unless another horse runs with him. He ran the first quarter in 23½, three-eighths in 35½, half mile in 48½, five-eighths in 1:01½, three-quarters in 1:15½ and seven-eighths in 1:29½. McGraw took him up a bit after going five-eighths and then released him again at the three-quarters post. He responded with a great burst of speed when released from restraint.

Coyne and Brother Batch were sent a mile together in 1:42½ and they galloped out an additional eighth in 1:59½. The work-out of Brother Batch clearly demonstrated that it will avail trainer C. C. Van Meter little to continue preparing him for the Derby, as his stablemate beat him off and Jockey Mack Garner, who rode Coyne, had a strong hold on his mount in an effort to keep him alongside of his companion. Brother Batch continued to drop back, however. The opinion was expressed generally by horsemen who witnessed the performance that he will not do for the Derby. The cold weather might have affected his throat ailment some, but at any rate his showing was poor.

Coyne displayed excellent speed throughout. The fractions for the workout were: Quarter in 23½, three-eighths in 35½, half mile in 48½, five-eighths in 1:01½, three-quarters in 1:14½ and seven-eighths in 1:28½.

Bent Bolt was under restraint all the way in a workout of a mile in 1:48½, and he was galloped another eighth, finishing in 2:04½. Jockey Jack Hanover rode him and after letting him run the first half mile in 49½ he eased him up to a slower pace, covering the three-quarters in 1:19½.

Firebrand, J. S. Hawkins' Derby hope, went ½ mile in 1:43 at the Downs in easy fashion. His fractions were quarter in 25, half mile in 50½ and three-quarters in 1:16½.

Castlereagh, another Derby eligible, which is in Dan Lehan's stable, galloped one and one-sixteenth miles in 1:54. He was held in check practically all the way.

Over at Douglas Park Muskallonge, from "Bud" Fisher's stable, was sent over the Derby route of one and one-quarter miles in 2:16. This was good work, considering track conditions, and the colt was never allowed to extend himself. He galloped the first quarter in 26½, half mile in 53, three-quarters in 1:20½ and mile in 1:48½.

Fanteche, owned by Alex Gordon, trainer of Muskallonge, ran a mile in 1:47½ and, like his stablemate, was under restraint all the way. He covered the first half in 51½.

Frank McKenna, who was forced to absent himself from winter racing because of illness, was an arrival from his home in St. Louis.

John C. Ferriss came in this morning from visits in Pensacola, Fla., and his old home, Nashville, Tenn. The brood mare Kiva, which failed to foal this year, has been sent to T. Murphy's farm by Joe Umensetter and she again will be mated with Golden Maxim.

Jockey S. McGraw arrived from New Orleans last night after a strenuous trip from the Crescent City by motor. The poor roads in the south practically ruined his machine. Racing Secretary William H. Shelley came from Lexington this morning to confer with the horse-

COFFROTH HANDICAP WINNER

Be Frank Victorious in \$20,000 Stake Feature at Tijuana.

Race Marred by Fall, Edwina, The Desert and Nepperhan Going Down.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., April 10.—Be Frank, carrying the colors of the Bronx Stable and the top weight of 131 pounds, captured the \$20,000 Coffroth Handicap at Tijuana this afternoon before an immense crowd. Rifle was second and Wynnewood third. Rifle at one time had a lead of ten lengths, but tired from his fast early pacemaking and was no match for Be Frank when the final test came. The race was marred by a bad fall, in which Edwina, The Desert and Nepperhan went down. Luckily, horses and riders escaped serious injury.

Fencing in a faultless manner, William ("Red") Walker's Coronado captured first honors in the mile and three-sixteenths hurdle handicap yesterday before a large Saturday attendance. The gelding took the hazards in a manner which left little doubt in the minds of the racing public as to which is the best hurdler here. Coronado took the first obstacle head and head with Bobby Fib and then drew away into a long lead and, galloping along easily in front, won pulled up. Second place provided the contest of the race, as Appletto, Adorock and Certain Point fought it out through the final eighth. Appletto proved the gamest and outstayed Adorock for second money.

William Walker made it a double for the afternoon when his steady going campaigner Nepperhan led past the judges in the seventh race. The King James horse outdistanced his opponents and, racing under stout restraint, won as his rider pleased. Pierrot was an easy second, while Audrey K. was best of the others.

Favorites or second choices accounted for the entire eight races and the form backers enjoyed a profitable afternoon. The sport opened with a two-year-old race in which the filly Polly Wale was backed to the exclusion of all others. Paying 1 to 2 in the machines, she ran past the leaders in the stretch and won going away, with Plover Street and Flotation her closest rivals.

Robert Lee, the old gelding which was shipped here after a season of racing on the Hawaiian Islands, made good for the first time when he won a nose decision over Careen in the second race. The winner was well supported and proved that he was much the best.

Lady Harrigan was the choice of the public in the mile race, but the best she could do was to finish in second place. The mare showed an abundance of speed, but came back to July Fly in the stretch and it was the latter which led her home at the finish. El Rey, running one of his good races, was a bang-up third.

The second nose finish of the day came in the fifth race, at one mile and a sixteenth, when Helman won by inches from Fannie Nail, which was an easy second from Shenandoah. The choices provided a great struggle through the last sixteenth, but Helman got the nod in an extremely close finish.

The speedy mare Hazel Dale made it two in a row when she showed her heels to her opponents in the sixth race, at five-eighths.

With La Bete Noire away badly in the final scramble of the day, Perch found but little contention to force him to do his best and in consequence the consistent sprinter won with speed in reserve, after making the pace fast throughout.

THIRTY LEADING AMERICAN JOCKEYS

Colletti jumped into the limelight at Bowie by riding nine winners during the past week, taking the honors from Marinelli, who was a close second with eight. E.
