LATONIA DERBY DAY HERE

Small Field to Contest Over a Probably Heavy Track.

Fast Sprinters to Meet in the Quickstep Stakes—Yesterday's Racing Ordinary.

LATONIA, Ky., June 10.—Only five three-year-olds have been named to start in the thirty-ninth Latonia Derby, which has its decision tomorrow.

So far only one positive rider has been announced for any of the starters, that is Pool on Uncle Velo.

This afternoon Mr. Bradley announced that in case the track is firm Black Servant will be a starter with Behave Yourself and that if both colts are in the lead near the finish he will instruct that Behave Yourself take the victory.

Post positions of those entered are: 1—Black Servant, 2—Uncle Velo, 3—Behave Yourself, 4—Brother Batch, 5—Rangoon.

There is keen disappointment that none of the New York stables sent any of their crack three-year-olds to compete for the \$15,000 race.

FIELD FOR QUICKSTEP HANDICAP. The Quickstep Handicap, which will serve as tomorrow's secondary feature, has some fast sprinters, the best in these parts, named to start and should result in the first time in years when their Fallacy program, after a hard fought struggle with Bettina.

The attendance was considerably augmented by out-of-town visitors, the advance guard to witness the Derby tomorrow. Though sultry and at times threatening a downpour, the full force of regulars were again present.

BROTHER BATCH IN EASY STYLE. Brother Batch earned his first purse this year when he won in easy style in the fourth race, which brought together a band of three-year-olds.

Ruby accounted for the opening race. Scobie rode her well when he refrained from exhausting her, when he found he could not take the lead from Lancelot in the first half.

Honolulu Boy was the third favorite in succession to suffer defeat. His undoing was accomplished

LATONIA DERBY---BELMONT STAKES

TWO IMPORTANT AND VALUABLE STAKE RACES FOR THREE-YEAR-OLDS TO BE DECIDED TODAY---LOOKS LIKE ANOTHER DERBY FOR E. R. BRADLEY

Two great stake races for three-year-olds will be decided today. Both are rich in historical lore, mellowed by age. The Latonia Derby, always run at the true Derby distance of a mile and a half, is Kentucky's offering, while the Belmont Stakes will engage the attention of New York racing devotees.

Only six out of a grand array of ninety-seven nominations have been named to start in the Latonia Derby. Two of these are Behave Yourself and Black Servant, first and second in the Kentucky Derby, and it looks like another Derby for Mr. Bradley.

The Latonia Derby was established in 1883, so today will be its thirty-ninth running. During the first four years it was known as the Hindoo Stakes. Leonatus, ridden by the marvelous colored jockey, Isaac Murphy, was its first winner.

Out of one hundred and thirty-eight nominations for the Belmont Stakes, all but thirty-eight declared and only four are carded to meet in it today. It is a real test for three-year-olds at one mile and three-eighths, a distance that calls for courage and stamina, as well as speed.

The Belmont Stakes is one of the oldest and foremost of American stake races for three-year-olds. Established in 1867, the Belmont will be run for the fifty-third time today.

NEW AMERICAN TIME RECORD

Goaler Reduces Man o' War's Mark for Mile and an Eighth.

Thriller Between Ralco, Royce Rools and Cum Sah in the Richmond Handicap.

NEW YORK, N. Y., June 10.—Humble and lowly Goaler came out of the prison of his mean estate in selling platerdom at Belmont Park this afternoon to make an American thoroughbred racing record for one mile and an eighth and to displace Man o' War from that corner of his speed realm.

Goaler won the Bayside Handicap in 1:49, which beats Man o' War's 1:49 1/2 under 125 pounds at Aqueduct, made July 10 last year for the Dwyer Stakes when he beat John P. Grier in a no-doubt race.

These figures show how easily the champion took things in the last three-eighths and how he discounts Goaler's time. Goaler had only 92 pounds on his back today and was ridden by master Gantner, a most promising boy, by the way.

Goaler's speed may have been one of the flukes of racing which turn up at intervals and are made by the peculiarities of the horses contending course, pace and weights. But it was a sparkling bit of speed, nevertheless.

Goaler is elderly, entire and of stout lineage. Mr. Belmont bred him in England. He is by Duke Michel, a son of Dinna Forget, a good sound horse, from the mare Gallows Hill, by Galashiels. From this dam Goaler—pronounced Jailer in England—gets his name. It is rather far-fetched and "thick."

Man o' War's mark was the old record. The Belmont record was War Cloud's 1:50 1/2, made last September in the Belmont Park Autumn Handicap. The English is slower than ours. Brown Prince, now an American sire at Ellerslie, holds it.

He ran the Newmarket mile and an eighth, November, 1917, in the Cambridgeshire Handicap in 1:50 1/2. Goaler was claimed a day or two ago by S. Lando, in whose violet, green and white he made his record. The horse is destined for Canadian future action and will be sent to Hamilton to take part especially in the \$10,000 National Handicap, to be run June 30.

STORY OF THE RACE.

The Bayside Handicap, in which Goaler outdid himself, was the fourth on the card and for three-year-olds and over. Bellsolar was in it and the national favorite. So were Dream of the Valley, La Rabee and Captain Alcock—all fast horses.

Dream of the Valley, off flying, cracked in the pace and made the quarter in 24 and half in 49 1/2 seconds. He began to come back to his horses on the long turn and La Rabee and Captain Alcock and he were running in a cluster—the mile in 1:36 1/2 at the eighth post. Goaler here began to close.

Bellsolar did not. The pace was too fast for the old lady, though she came home stoutly in the track's center. In the last sixteenth La Rabee and Captain Alcock hung a bit and Goaler got to, beat them past the judicial post by a half length, La Rabee a head before the Captain. Bellsolar ran her race at the weights and was last, beaten four lengths. Young Gantner, who rode the winner, did so astonishingly well at the end, though Goaler is a free runner. The boy has only been riding since April 15 last and is 18 years old. He is a lad of more than ordinary intelligence and ought to develop into a good jockey.

La Rabee kicked a hole through one of the stalls in the paddock and cut one of her legs pretty severely before she was extricated. Her race under the circumstances was a good one.

The other weight adjustment event of the day, by Mr. Vosburgh, the Richmond Selling Handicap, at seven-eighths, on the main course, was another tribute to his fine racing judgment. The Richmond finish was a thriller between Ralco, Royce Rools and Cum Sah. Its speed for three-quarters of a mile outdid Goaler's, but this speed was so great that the sprinters were staggering at the end and the last eighth took them 13 1/2 to accomplish the seven-eighths in 1:24. Georige was the favorite, made so and kept so by her owner. Cum Sah was responsible for the upset which came. He settled things by a sizzling pace with the favorite, the quarter in 23 1/2, half in 46 1/2 and three-quarters in 1:10 1/2. Under pressure to keep up Georige weakened at the eighth post and then came a finish that was most eyeable. First Cum Sah headed Georige. Then Royce Rools, outside Georige and Cum Sah, drew out and looked all over a winner twenty yards out when Ralco, inside of Royce Rools, under Keogh's vigor and some luck to get through, flashed up and won in the last two strides by a nose, necks between Royce Rools and Cum Sah. Royce Rools was bearing out, as is his wont when he tired, and to the stands denizens he seemed to win. The judges were right, it was as pretty a finish as has been seen in many a day—as close as the Scotch race, so to write.

SALMON BUYS RIDENOUR CONTRACT. W. J. Salmon bought the contract on W. Ridenour from A. L. Kirby. The boy had been denied permission to ride here for deserting the employ of Kirby. The transfer of his contract restores him to good standing.

HANDICAP TO SIR CLARENCE

Defeats Chief Sponsor and Sweet Bouquet in Main Race at Blue Bonnets.

MONTREAL, Que., June 10.—Carey Winfrey supplied the winner of the carded feature at the Blue Bonnets when Sir Clarence accounted for the handicappers in hollow fashion over a band of Canadian-breds, at a mile. The winner ran as if much the best, went the distance in 1:40 1/2 and was under restraint at the end. Chief Sponsor finished second, while Sweet Bouquet was third. The winner was ridden by T. Rowan and was strongly supported by the talent.

Maiden jockeys were given an opportunity to graduate into the winner's column this afternoon when a field of seventeen paraded to the post for the running of the second race, a dash of seven-eighths. The winner turned up in The Belgian II., piloted by H. E. Jones.

Stucco, the ten-year-old unsexed son of Filligraine—My Eleanor, accounted for the running of the steeplechase, defeating Phil T. and King Terry. The winner shook off Phil T. going to the closing fences and drew away into a commanding lead. Le Cyprin was the only one which failed to finish the course, unseating his rider at the second obstacle.

The crowd which journeyed to the course today was one of the largest that has passed through the turnstiles on a Friday. They were well rewarded, as interesting racing was furnished. Ideal weather conditions again prevailed.

Guy F. Gray, following the second race, claimed The Belgian II. for \$1,300. Gray was represented by Yukon in the race.

Hon. T. A. Taschereau, the premier of the Province of Quebec, accompanied by Hon. W. G. Mitchell, provincial treasurer, were interested spectators and viewed the running of the races from the clubhouse lawn.

Jockey Romanelli scored his first victory of the year when he brought Padua home in an easy manner. The winner was well supported by the talent. A. L. Kirby disposed of the contract he held on jockey W. Ridenour to W. J. Salmon this morning.

Senator Belcourt, president of the Connaught Park Jockey Club, was an interested spectator this afternoon. Judge Joseph A. Murphy, Messrs. Oliver and Waiten and Ray Bryson left for Mexico City last night in reference to the projected racing plant at that point.

The condition books for the coming Hamilton meeting arrived this morning and were distributed by Joseph McLennan.

Entries for the opening day at Connaught Park will close in the secretary's office here on Tuesday. Horses which were started by H. Uma today were saddled by H. Tullett. Mr. Uma is suffering from soreness on the stump of his leg, from which the foot had been amputated some time ago.

T. H. Smith will ship from here to Windsor and rest up until the start at that point. The Archer is one of the horses due for a short let up.

Among the stables which will ship from here to Hamilton are those of C. P. Winfrey, J. W. Bean, M. C. Kelly and C. F. Clark.

Henry McDaniel will take a division of the Ross Stable to Ottawa. The main division will be left at Blue Bonnets in charge of F. Scholter. Those that are to be raced over the New York tracks will be selected on the conclusion of the Ottawa meeting.

T. J. Gorman, secretary of the Connaught Park Jockey Club, was an arrival today in the interests of the coming meeting at that point. Mr. Gorman was enthusiastic and stated that there would probably be an overflow of horses.

DUFFERIN PARK RACING IS POPULAR

TORONTO, Ont., June 10.—A crowd of over 6,000 witnessed today's races at Dufferin Park, which were run under summerlike conditions. A series of claiming dashes made up the card, but the sport was decidedly interesting. One of the best finishes of the day came with the running of the fourth race, in which Sedgewood landed long enough to beat Sweet Apple by a neck after a stirring stretch drive.

Chantour came from behind in the stretch to beat Corn Broom a short length in the second. Gandy provided a surprise when he scored a comparatively easy victory in the third, while W. C. Weant's War Winner graduated from the ranks of non-winners when the son of Fitz Herbert annexed the initial dash in commanding style.

Dainty Lady made a show of her opposition in the fifth, which she won pulling up. Dancer also scored just as easily in the sixth.

The books for the meeting at Quebec City, which opens on June 24, were distributed among horsemen here today by Charles Henry. Among those who will ship to the ancient capital is J. S. Baldwin.

E. E. Major will ship his string from here to Connaught Park, Ottawa, as will several others who are racing at this meeting. The promising apprentice jockey D. Fribble will accompany the Major stable.

Jockey H. Gibson was an arrival here today and will ride during the remainder of this meeting. He is also destined for Ottawa at the close here.

STALLION OVERSIGHT SERIOUSLY ILL

NEW YORK, N. Y., June 10.—No exact information has been received from Doctor McCully, who was summoned to Saratoga Springs by the illness of the stallion Oversight, one of the recent Macomber importations, but it was rumored that the horse is in a bad way from shipping fever. It is not believed the others of the band are affected.

Walter Jennings, who is training the American division of Mr. Macomber's stable, is planning to ship the seventeen head in his charge to Saratoga about the middle of July. Included in his stable is the horse Kingdom, the only one of the recent importations that will be retained by the Macomber interests for racing.

Bud Fisher advised E. R. Bradley this afternoon that he had purchased a couple of two-year-olds in the East and that he had dropped negotiations for the purchase of Rangoon.

Black Servant, Behave Yourself and Rangoon were given gallops during the afternoon between the racing. Rangoon covered a mile and the Bradley pair cantered three-eighths. They were all under restraint, no fast work being attempted.

Jockey S. Sneiderman underwent an operation Thursday for the removal of a section of bone over his left ear. The operation was made necessary by the recurrence of trouble resulting from a fall.

POPULARITY OF THE HORSE

Great Crowds Pay Tribute to Thoroughbred at Both Race Course and Show Rings.

NEW YORK, N. Y., June 10.—The popularity of the horse is being demonstrated in no uncertain fashion this spring, not only at the race course but in the show rings throughout the country.

New York's own tribute to the horse has been most generous in character. The vast throng which saw the races at Belmont Park on Memorial Day contained men noted for their achievements in many and varied walks of life.

While New York is doing its part nobly, Washington is giving evidence of renewed and intelligent interest in the thoroughbred and half-bred. At the recent National Capital Horse Show held in Virginia, across the Potomac from the capital, there were a few races each day for officers of the army.

Not the least interested spectator of these races was President Harding, and judging by the enthusiasm he displayed during the contest golf is not the only outdoor sport of which he is fond.

President Harding an admirer. It would not be surprising, therefore, to find the President seeking health and recreation in the saddle, as his predecessor in the White House did before his visit abroad.

There has always been a sentiment for the thoroughbred at Washington. In the late eighties the Benning course was a favorite resort for the biggest men in the nation. On one occasion three United States senators—Hearst of California, Wolcott of Colorado and Wetmore of Rhode Island—served as stewards.

While there are many good races on the program at Belmont Park for the next six days, the Belmont Stakes already referred to overshadow the other events in historical association and importance to the breeding industry.
