RANOCAS DAY OF GLORY

Four of the White and Green Standard Bearers Triumph.

Grey Lag Wins Dwyer Stakes—Mad Hatter the Caughnawaga Handicap.

NEW YORK, N. Y., July 7.—Ranocas luck surely changed when Valor won his race Tuesday.

No stable ever had more racing glory. In less than three hours of action its horses had won four races—two of importance—its two best horses had broken track records and virtually set a mark for the racing world at a mile and an eighth.

It was in the Caughnawaga Handicap at a mile and a sixteenth that Mad Hatter, with 132 pounds, led Royce Rools a merry chase.

Then the best American three-year-old, Grey Lag, illustrious son of the dead Star Shoot and Meddler's daughter, Miss Minnie, came out and did a greater racing thing than his stable companion, for in winning the Dwyer Stakes Grey Lag equaled Goaler's American record of 1:49, made last month at Belmont Park, under 94 1/2 pounds, and beat the better Man o' War's Aqueduct mark of 1:49 1/2, under 126 pounds, made July 10, 1920, in the same race—for the Dwyer Stakes. The English and French records are some two seconds slower.

GREY LAG THE FAVORITE.

Grey Lag was the favorite for the Dwyer Stakes, named for one of the bulwarks of American racing, the late Phillip Dwyer.

The stakes is one of Gravesend's bequests, with a mile and an eighth of a route and worth while winning. Upon its roll are many notable American horses from Hanover down and through turf history around Emperor of Norfolk, Dobbin, Omar Khayyam, Purchase and Man o' War.

Sam Hildreth had won one Dwyer for himself before Grey Lag's victory. That was in 1919, with Purchase, which is in the Ranocas barn and must have told Grey Lag tales to spur him on.

A well-balanced field of six came out for the Dwyer. Here it is:

BEST OF THE THREE-YEAR-OLDS.

The race itself was an easy one and stamped Grey Lag as the best of his age. The start was perfect, with Copper Demon's head in front of Idle Dell's and Bankasia. Smoke Screen's speed was put to use at once by Keogh and he rushed the Cochran sprinter to the front.

To complete the story of the Ranocas-Hildreth-Sande day the stable's Little Chief came out for the last race, the Campfire two-year-old handicap, over the chute five-eighths, and as a stout favorite, won it as Budana, Mad Hatter and Grey Lag had won before him.

Merciful pencils kept out of the way half of the twenty second-class two-year-olds in the opening claiming race, out of the chute at five-eighths. Thanks to Sam Louis' recent horse-seeking the purse was \$2,601 strong.

DELLAHM'S CANADIAN DERBY

Kenton Stable Color Bearer Takes Fort Erie's Big Feature Race—Two for E. F. Whitney.

FORT ERIE, Ont., July 7.—The Kenton Stable's Dellahm, trained by Joe Tevis and ridden by T. Parrington, was returned the winner of the Canadian Derby at Fort Erie this afternoon over a representative band of Canadian three-year-olds.

A new departure was made in the race this year, the conditions calling for horses foaled in Canada. The Niagara Racing Association offered an incentive by offering \$7,500 in added money and it was worth \$5,000 to the winner.

The running of the Derby this afternoon served as the magnet to attract another crowd of record proportions. There was a slight moderation of the sweltering heat which prevailed for the past few days.

The substitution from Simpson to Claver was productive of an excellent race on Eddie Rickenbacher's part today. From a quick beginning Claver allowed him to set a fast pace for his opponents to follow and when he was straightened away in the stretch the race was never in doubt.

DISPLEASED WITH LANCASTER'S RIDING.

It was reported today that the Seagram Stable has dispensed with the services of jockey Lancaster. Trainer Bringle, it is said, has on several occasions been displeased with the lad's efforts.

When the present meeting comes to an end Saturday Edward W. Mills, who has been connected with the Fort Erie track since it was built, will sever his relations with the Niagara Racing Association as he recently resigned as sporting editor of the Buffalo Times after thirty years of service and intends moving to California.

Lady Meave, one of the imported mares in the Seagram Stable, came out of her last race with a bad leg caused by being kicked at the post. The leg filled and will keep her on the shelf for some time.

Albert Simons and J. A. Coburn will ship from here to Empire City tomorrow to participate in racing at that point.

At private terms this morning J. A. Coburn disposed of Leading Star and Dixie Carroll to Clarence Buxton.

ENGLISH RACING OF 1922

Epsom Derby of Next Year Will Be Run on Decoration Day, May 30.

LONDON, England, July 7.—The racing of 1922 will begin at Lincoln, as usual, March 29 next, and close November 25. The important meetings of the year have already been scheduled as follows:

Newmarket Crown meeting; 3 days; April 4, 5, 6. Epsom, Spring; two days; April 17, 18. Newmarket, First Spring; four days; April 25, 26, 27, 28. Newmarket, Second Spring; three days; May 9, 10, 11. Epsom, Summer; four days; May 30, 31, June 1, 2. Ascot; four days; June 13, 14, 15, 16. Newmarket, First July; four days; June 27, 28, 29, 30. Newmarket, Second July; three days; July 11, 12, 13. Goodwood; four days; July 25, 26, 27, 28. Newmarket, First October; four days; September 26, 27, 28, 29. Newmarket, Second October; four days; October 10, 11, 12, 13. Newmarket, Houghton; four days; October 24, 25, 26, 27. The Two Thousand Guineas will be run at Newmarket April 26, and the One Thousand April 28, at Newmarket.

The Epsom Derby date is Wednesday, May 30, and that of the Oaks June 2. The Doncaster St. Leger date in September has not yet been chosen.

The three-year-old son of Broomstick—Spun Glass did nothing sensational as a two-year-old, but started his three-year-old career most auspiciously. His first appearance this year was in the Ten Broeck Handicap at Churchill Downs May 9.

BET MOSIE A GOOD COLT

Runs Three-Quarters in Fast Time and Beats Rockminister.

Lady Madcap Takes Another One—Kimpalong Regains Speed—Secret Greetings Wins.

LATONIA, Ky., July 7.—In the three-quarters handicap for two-year-olds, the first of this kind run at this meeting, came a big surprise in the victory of Bet Mosie, which triumphed over Rockminister and Dream of Allah. Considered a good colt, ranking with the best, after a pair of easy wins, Bet Mosie came into disfavor when he succumbed readily to some mediocre ones and he was held to be a failure that had shot its bolt with a pair of winning performances.

Today's racing offering was a well arranged one, though devoid of stake races. The evenly matched starters in the different dashes resulted in close finishes and it also resulted in diversified betting about most of the contestants.

The opener brought the first dead heat of the Kentucky racing season when Col. Taylor and Mellora finished so closely aligned that the judges were unable to separate them. It was the first instance where Col. Taylor showed any semblance of gameness for in the last sixteenth Mellora had him apparently beaten, but he fought it out in game style and finally drew level with her after having given up the lead.

Mild breezes tempered the intense heat prevailing here this afternoon and made for more comfortable conditions than have ruled during the last week. The attendance was again generous, and betting activities on a par with former days.

LADY MADCAP'S GREAT SPEED.

Lady Madcap again figured in a winning race and showed great speed when she won in 1:11 1/2 from Brunswick and Miss Muffins in the \$1,700 three-quarters purse. Lady Madcap was forced to remain under restraint until reaching the stretch, where Howard succeeded in forcing her through between Brunswick and Miss Muffins, which had led to this point, but once in the lead Lady Madcap found her task an easy one.

Kimpalong proved best of those starting in the third race and he came from far back in the stretch to overhaul Whirling Dun and Nelle Yorke. They were so well matched in this race that the favorite ruled at better than 5 to 1.

The Keene Brothers' colors were victorious in the fourth race, a mile and an eighth dash, contested by some fairly good ones, when Secret Greetings outstayed Sea Prince and Marse John. This was the best race of the afternoon from a time standpoint, the distance being covered by the winner in 1:51 1/2.

Dainty Lass, ridden by Howard, proved best of the dozen in the final dash and beat Will of the Wisp and Whippet home.

The horses of George J. Long that have raced here in charge of P. Coyne, will be transferred at the close of the meeting to Churchill Downs to be rested until resumption of the fall racing at Latonia.

The horses owned by R. L. Baker will be taken to Windsor by W. Perkins, who will train them there.

A special train will convey the departures Sunday for Windsor. Jack McCormack will ship the P. A. Clark horses, including Nancy Lee, Flambe and La Rabelle, to Yonkers Sunday to be raced at Empire City.

DELORIMIER FEATURE TO SISTER SUSIE

MONTREAL, Que., July 7.—Closing with a well-timed rush in the stretch, under a good ride by Pauler, W. R. Padgett's Sister Susie just got up to beat Koran by a neck in the La Patrie Handicap, the fourth and feature attraction at Delorimier Park this afternoon. Koran hung on gamely when the final test came. My Gracie could never improve third position at any stage.

Old Pop scored a most decisive victory in the opening dash, for Canadian-bred horses, his second success at this meeting.

Jockey H. Chappell, who had the mount on Lady Freeman during the running of the second race, suffered a badly scraped leg when he came in contact with the fence. The mishap forced him to cancel his remaining engagements and he will be unable to ride for a few days.

Jockey T. Buckles, who suffered such a bad fall here yesterday, is still in a critical condition in the General Hospital and attending physicians hold out only slight hope for his recovery.

Trackstar pulled up lame after the running of the third race. Jannine O'Brien also cooled out sore. Efficient was nodding when he pulled up after the running of the fifth race.

The track is hard and dry as a result of the continued spell of extreme heat and lack of rain.

EMPIRE CITY PROSPECTUS

Outlook Brightest for Greatest Meeting in History of the Yonkers Course.

NEW YORK, N. Y., July 7.—More than twenty years ago a handsome man of forty, driving a pair of bay trotters to a Brewster wagon, threaded the country roads of Westchester county until he reached an eminence overlooking the city of Mount Vernon and Long Island Sound. The man was William H. Clark, who had been corporation counsel of the City of New York, and he was searching for a site for a race course.

Though the ground was uneven, and much of the surface was covered with boulders, the young lawyer decided upon it as the proper spot for the enterprise he had in mind and bought the property that same day. Thus began the Empire City Race Course, now one of the most popular of the tracks in the Jockey Club circuit, and a resort for the sport loving resident of the Bronx, many for the never patronize racing at any other point.

William H. Clark might have purchased land as cheaply elsewhere in Westchester county at the time—territory to which railroads could have built a spur—but the situation with its beautiful outlook appealed to him, and he set about the work of construction with the same degree of optimism and enterprise that had carried him along from the moment he came to New York a poor boy until he became a recognized power in New York's political and financial life.

Before the gates were opened \$800,000 of his money had been put into the plant. Empire City cost W. H. Clark his entire fortune before he got through, as the course was too far from the railroads and the great, throbbing city of Greater New York had not sought the open reaches of Westchester in its struggle for expansion.

The property passed into the control of James Butler, who, like his predecessor, has no partners. A program of liberal stakes and purses speedily won recognition for the Empire City Racing Association, and the loyal people of his own borough flocked to his support in a way that must have been flattering to Mr. Butler. The coming of the automobile solved the problem of transportation, however, and for many years past all roads lead to Empire City during the last three weeks in July.

Those who come this year will find a plant rehabilitated and rejuvenated to a point where it would not be recognized by those who knew it in an earlier period. Chief among the stake features, which will be decided at the coming meeting, opening on Saturday, July 9, and concluding on Saturday, July 30, are the Empire City Handicap, \$5,000 added, at a mile and an eighth, and the Empire City Derby for three-year-old colts and fillies at a mile and a quarter. There are other races which surpass these events in value at Empire, notably the \$10,000 East View and \$7,500 Whirl stakes for two-year-olds, but for real racing tests which will have a bearing on the future of the thoroughbred in this country the two first named features are outstanding.

This is particularly true of the Empire City Derby, which must now be reckoned as one of the best races of the year, and which, because of its value, will compel the attention of many owners who in former years ignored the Yonkers meeting and shipped from Aqueduct to Saratoga. Should any of the best three-year-olds be sent to the Spa for a period of recuperation among the pines they would unquestionably be returned to Empire City for such an important engagement. With its \$5,000 added value and a large entry it ought to be more valuable than the Empire City Handicap.

EMPIRE CITY DERBY PROBABILITIES.

The race closed with fifty-five nominations. The death of Broomston removed a prominent factor, but in his stead the Whitney confederacy has Tryster, Prudery and Touch Me Not, and it is possible that New Yorkers will get their first view this year of the black colt in this event. Those crack fillies Nancy Lee and Flamette are certain starters if they continue training soundly, while the Rancocas Stable has a wealth of Derby material in Grey Lag, Knobbie and Playfellow. That Grey Lag was a powerful three-year-old in the Belmont and Suburban is conceded by everybody. Whether he can, like Man o' War, take up his penalties and go on beating those of his own age will be demonstrated at Yonkers. Exodus, Smoke Screen, St. Michael, General J. M. Gomez, Pluribus, Careful, Iverman, Dimmesdale, Bon Homme, Mulcheir and John Paul Jones are others that may go to the post. Pluribus showed phenomenal trials early in the spring and he is going sound again. His owner is afraid of no three-year-old in training.

There are sixty-three nominations for the Empire City Handicap. They include the pick of the handicap division and include Mad Patter, Grey Lag, Cirrus, John P. Grier, The Porter, Audacious, Tryster, Wildair, Naturalist, Yellow Hand, Upset, Gladiator, On Watch, Blazes and Playfellow. It is bound to produce a great race and ought to crowd the Empire course to the limit on the opening day, for which it is the special feature.

Romer holds the record for the Empire City course at one mile and an eighth and also for the Empire City Handicap, which he landed in 1918 with 128 pounds up, covering the distance in 1:51. Naturalist ran one of his rare good races to win it last year in 1:53 over a course which was not at its best.

There are many other fine stakes and handicaps, as well as a diversified lot of overnight dashes on the card for the nineteen days which precede. That there is great sport in store for the patrons of Empire City is guaranteed before the gates are opened.

ANIMALS' PRESENTMENTS OF DANGER

Some interesting letters have been appearing in the Daily Mail upon the subject of the perplexing attitude of animals toward imminent death, which sometimes they will fear, while at others they will be perfectly indifferent to it. Mr. Walter Winans, for example, gives several instances: "I have known a dog beg not to be taken on a railway journey, when usually he used to dance about with delight when he saw these preparations being made. On the occasion on which he exhibited distress he slipped off the platform, was run over and killed. I have known a horse which was a free jumper refuse obstinately a small fence, and when his rider forced him over it the horse broke his back. A bullfinch—not a pet, but merely one of a caged-of birds—dropped down screaming; I took him out, and so long as he lay in my hand he was quite quiet, but he screamed if I attempted to put him back on some cotton wool. He lay in my hand for a quarter of an hour and died quite quietly. On the other hand, I have seen through the telescope wounded deer, too hard hit to be able to move away, begin to graze quietly. Of course, this was in cases where it was not possible immediately to kill them. I have had a horse refuse to pass under a tree under which he had passed every day for years. It was a perfectly calm day. I drove him around the tree and as I did so a big branch fell upon exactly the spot on which he would have been if I had not let the horse go round." In connection with the instance of the wounded deer, it may be remembered that in the Derby of 1899 Holocoust, ridden by Sloan, broke his leg. Sloan wrote that the animal was a horrible sight with his leg broken off short; in fact the stump was sticking in the ground. When his rider dismounted the horse began munching the grass.—Horse and Hound.

THE WAY OF THE REFORMER

When the New Zealand Racing Commission was taking evidence during its recent tour a prominent clergyman objected to the increase of racing permits on the score that increased drunkenness would be one result. Questioned whether he had ever attended a race meeting he admitted he had not, but had been told about drinking at them.—Sydney, N. S. W., Referee.

NEW BLOOD AT WINDSOR

Many Newcomers to Canadian Racing Will Be Seen at the Meeting Next Week.

DETROIT, Mich., July 7.—The infusion of new blood into the racing at the Windsor Jockey Club meeting beginning July 12 is relished generally by devotees of the sport.

In the Frontier Handicap, as well as in the other stakes and purses to be decided during the seven days, there will be seen colors never before sported at any of the Canadian tracks.

Among the newcomers will be Charles A. Stoneham, president of the New York Giants and head of the Cuban-American Jockey Club in Havana.

Sam Hildreth, trainer of the Ranococas Stable, will make his initial bow at the coming meeting. Mr. Hildreth, who is one of the most astute trainers on the Jockey Club tracks in the east, comes to the Canadian track with a string of ten high-class thoroughbreds, including Grey Lag, Mad Hatter, Thunderclap, Cirrus and Knobbie.

Another Canadian stable that will be worth watching is the Seagram, which has half a dozen freshly imported British thoroughbreds that look most promising to the sharps.

Golden Sphere, which is entered in the Frontier and Tolmie Handicaps, won his first time out in Canada recently when he defeated the excellent band of three-year-olds in the Hamilton Derby.

The Harry Payne Whitney string to be shipped to Windsor includes Dr. Clark, John P. Grier and others, together with some of the crack two-year-olds of that establishment.

In addition to Exterminator, winner of last year's renewal of the Windsor Jockey Club and William Hendrie Memorial Handicaps, Willis Sharp Kilmer, will ship Magic Silence and Our Flag for the meetings across the river.

NEW YORK, N. Y., July 7.—Handicapper W. S. Vosburgh has made public the weights for the Empire City Handicap, \$5,000 added, at one mile and an eighth, to be run next Saturday, the opening day at Empire City. As was to be expected after John P. Grier's splendid race in the Queens County Handicap, the Whitney crack is reckoned equal to Mad Hatter, and these fine representatives of the thoroughbred are asked to carry 132 pounds each.

Next in order comes Cirrus with 127, a pound more than The Porter. Eternal and Gladiator are in well at 125, while last year's winner, Naturalist, must be reckoned as having a chance with 123.

Grey Lag is asked to put up 116, and it is well worth noting that Mr. Vosburgh ranks Leonardo II., whose racing career has unfortunately closed, within a pound of the Ranococas champion, thus putting an estimate on the son of Sweep which is in keeping with the contention of Kimball Patterson, who has always maintained that this three-year-old was the fastest thing in training, but could never be screwed up to concert pitch because of his defective front legs. Tryster is in at 112 pounds and Prudery at 109.

All that is needed is a good day and track and the public will see a race well worth while on the opening day, July 9.

FABLES ABOUT FRENCH BETTING

We are told with much flourish and many cabled words that the Paris market "take" on the Grand Prix race amounted to 13,450,000 francs (\$1,672,885 at present exchange rates), and that 5,000,000 francs (\$621,890) were taken on the other four races of last Sunday at Longchamps. These figures, translated, do not bear out the occasional stories of great French speculation. With such a race as the Grand Prix and five others and mutual betting at an English or American race course in such cities as London or New York the "take" would have been nearer \$5,000,000 than \$2,294,775. Slap dash cable news about racing in these days distorts actual happenings most distantly.

IRISH TWO-YEAR-OLD OF PROMISE

An Irish two-year-old winner worthy of mention is Captain Daly's Miss Brian, which carried off the Leopardstown Produce Stakes of \$3,500, beating seven others by a couple of lengths. She was bred by her owner and is by Lomond, son of Desmond, from Carveon by Laveno. This mare has bred one or two other winners by Lomond.

CANADIAN RACING OF 1921

Reformer Raney and His Agitation Against Turf Sport.

Comment by an Influential Montreal Newspaper and Ideas of Well-Posted Critic.

"Reformer" and Ontario Attorney General Raney is still busy in his work against Canadian racing. The best judge of Canada affairs and Canadian racing in a letter to the Daily Racing Form writes: "The professional reformer we have always with us, and always shall have with us, so long as the task is a profitable one, whether for his finances or for the advancement of his political fortunes. Mr. Raney's revived crusade presents no new features. The canned resolutions which the Canadian conferences, synods and assemblies are passing with monotonous regularity, and lack of information or consideration, at this period of their annual sessions do not deceive anybody, nor do they present any new staff. Mr. Raney has been under strong criticism in the Ontario legislature and in the lay press over his administration of the Ontario temperance act, and it is suggested by opposition newspapers that his latest outbreak is intended to distract attention from him in that respect. A recent editorial from the Montreal Gazette shows that these little tricks are seen through at home, however they may be regarded abroad. The mind of the country as reflected in parliament and the govern-

ment is well settled on the policy of regulation, not prohibition, of betting on Canadian race courses, something that is either legalized or tolerated in every civilized country on the face of the globe. "The half-milers will find some trouble in getting by under the new law limiting the take-off, and enforced by the supervision of the mounted police. They got along—in the Province of Quebec, that is—mainly by devious ways, and when they use them the road is difficult. The legitimate courses are not likely to make any profits under the new law, except those that are able to draw a big and paying gate. The reduction in the mutual take-off is so graded that it creates a tighter situation than was contemplated. The government, of course, will not consent to any immediate relaxation, but the clubs have made their protests as they go along, and eventually there will be some modification. "Attendants seem to be better than ever, and there are so many horses for Canadian racing that the great problem is for track superintendents to find room for them."

MONTREAL GAZETTE'S COMMENT.

The Montreal Gazette's editorial in part ran this way: "It has been contended insistently that horse racing cannot be carried on without betting. If that be so, the question seems to be whether it is worth while abolishing the former in order to get rid of the latter. Horse racing as a sport exercises an extraordinarily powerful appeal upon men and women of all classes and has done so through all the ages of civilization. It is primarily a recreation, and betting, when all is said and done, is a part of it. The evil lies not in the use but in the abuse of horse racing and the privilege of betting. Such abuse is now illegal and if it prevails it is because the law is not being enforced, possibly because it cannot be effectively enforced. In that respect there may be, and doubtless there is, room for improvement and scope for the legislative activity of parliament. Investigations, however, have not disclosed a condition nearly approaching that which moral reformers describe, and no case has been made out for the application of so drastic and sweeping a remedy as would involve the suppression of horse racing by the prohibition of all betting. Moreover, though it has been contended that racing cannot be carried on without betting, it has not yet been demonstrated that betting cannot be carried on without horse racing."
