CONTINUES WINNING WAY

Yellow Hand Runs Sparkling Race to Take Morrisiana Handicap.

Rose Brigade and Sweepy Account for the Juvenile Races — Pickwick Again Beaten.

NEW YORK, N. Y., July 18.—Yellow Hand is a good race horse just now. In the past the Rosedale gelding has been washy and unable to hold his best form long. But Mr. Goldsborough has evidently got his measure for Yellow Hand...

Yellow Hand won decisively, as he should have won, nor was he a short price, as he should have been considering the track—too hard for Royce Rools' best effort. Yellow Hand had plenty of weight up, 122 pounds. Royce Rools was in light, with 109 pounds. Then there was modest Dr. Joe, with 97 pounds, and flashy Dimmesdale, with 165 pounds...

ROSE BRIGADE LEADS ALL THE WAY.

Eight of the dozen two-year-old fillies in the five and a half furlong Sylvan Purse raced for it. The Rancocas Rose Brigade, a fast, generous youngster, with Fator on her back, got away well, took the lead at once and was never caught. Witchwork followed Rose Brigade and was slightly impeded by her—there was no foul—a furlong out. Witchwork didn't stay, even under the whip, and the Whitney filly Carmencita, forced into wide restraint, closed fast under punishment, beat Witchwork home and ran as good a race as the winner. Tulwar had no luck. Matches Mary had a clear path always. Little Mother took the long, wide way home. Only the first two were in the market. The Louis-Hildreth difference over selling prices and weights continued, and it cost Rancocas \$1,505 to keep Rose Brigade within its fold.

ARROW OF GOLD BEST OF PLATERS.

Fourteen most mediocre three-year-olds of the selling plate division contested the Edgecliffe at five and a half furlongs. Arrow of Gold was made favorite, as she should have been on recent racing form. The Whitney stable colors seldom appear in selling races. They did here, as Princess Pandora bore the respected blue and brown. She had Coliletti up and was second choice. Actress got sharp support. So did several others. All were false goods, but Arrow of Gold, Keogh up, was off in front with the Celt filly and hand rode her vigorously all the way and powerfully in the last sixteenth to win by a length from the rank outsider, Blue Belle, which closed stoutly under sharp punishment. With better luck on the turn Blue Belle might have won. Mr. Butler's Ribstone, also an outsider, ran as well as either of the leaders. She was off in a tangle, made up ground entire race and closed fast at the finish to nip Nohant right at the winning post. Nohant had come from nowhere in the stretch. Actress and P. T. Barnum quit. Turnabout had no chance from the start and Celtic Lass was always on the rocks of impediment. Princess Pandora had no luck, but was evidently where she belongs.

KENILWORTH PARK IS READY

Fine Field for Tormie Handicap, \$5,000 Feature of Opening Day Program.

WINDSOR, Ont., July 18.—Kenilworth Park, which gained fame last year as the scene of the great Man o' War-Sir Barton match race, is ready for next Wednesday's opening of what holds out every promise of being the most brilliant meeting in the history of the enterprising and progressive Jockey club whose home is so picturesquely situated not far from this city. The track superintendent has been faithfully carrying into effect the ideas of general manager A. M. Orpen for the further embellishment of the track, and it will present an inviting appearance indeed when the gates are thrown open to the public on Wednesday for the inauguration of the meeting of seven days of the finest brand of sport that it is possible to provide with the lure of rich stakes and valuable overnight purses.

All of the important racing establishments whose horses have been campaigning in Canada this year will be on hand, together with the many notable stables from Kentucky that have been participating in the Windsor meeting. Besides these, there will be a number on hand that have not been figuring in the latter meeting. The problem of providing stabling accommodation for all the horsemen who are desirous of taking part in the Kenilworth meeting became so acute that manager Orpen was forced to the necessity of restricting stall reservations to horses actually ready to race. Fortunately, the adjacent tracks at Windsor and Devonshire will be able to take care of many stables unable to secure stalls at Kenilworth.

The Tormie Handicap, around which racing secretary Wash Norvell has built a card of surpassing brilliancy for the opening day, is a race of great possibilities. It is at a mile and an eighth, and most of the horses that recently met in the running of the rich Frontier Handicap are eligible for this race, and the field will be composed of much the same horses that contended for the older prize at the Windsor track. Best Pal, winner of that stake, is among the eligibles and is regarded as a certain starter. Irish Kiss and Exterminator, which ran second and third in the Frontier, are likely to be contenders at Kenilworth Wednesday, as are also Billy Kelly, The Porter, and other high-class eligibles.

Special arrangements have been made with the transportation companies for the prompt handling of the patrons. Three special trains will leave the Michigan Central station each racing day. The first will depart at 1 o'clock, the second at 1:30 and the third at 2 o'clock. In addition, the interurban line running from Windsor will put on a special service. The first race will be run at 2:45, Detroit time, and it is believed the last race will be run so as to give patrons ample time to reach their homes in seasonable time.

The staff of officials that will serve at the meeting will be almost identical with that of the present Windsor meeting. Presiding judge Charles F. Price, however, will not be among the officials. At the close of the Windsor meeting he will begin his usual summer vacation at Atlantic City.

got along well together after the son of Sweep had been pressed into favoritism. Zennotta and Darc got some support and Reparation was considered as a "good thing" by a wise few. Reparation, with Kelsay on his back, was away with a whirl and ran the first two quarters in 23 3/4 and 24 seconds—fine speed for Yonkers. Zennotta was at him all the way. Fator showed riding wisdom. He kept close, but out of the lickety spiltism in front and closing on, the racing leaders at the rails on the last furlong Sweepy wore both down and won, ridden out to the limit, by a length. Reparation had more stamina than Zennotta and was second. It was a well-spent trio that came back to the scales.

Only Domingo was absent from the field for the Seymour, at a mile and a sixteenth. The race was for maidens. The ten contestants were a drab lot. One wishes—without hope—that the tribe would decrease by a faster method than winning elimination. But they were there and had to race—and for \$1,300, too. There was another failure among ten. It was Smarty, which came from Maryland with a reputation he had mislaid after his entrance to a big city. Tom Welch picked him up cheap and heartened him. Lucky Find was made favorite. He is misnamed. Lucky Find was his moniker's reverse. Five of the ten were backed, Smarty among them. Tom Welch's rider, Turner, was up and got the Tom. Cook colt off in front with elasticity and on his foremost foot. Smarty didn't enjoy his trip much. Gem and Fringe were at him constantly, and he was a busy young horse all the way. He drew clear in the stretch and Turner kept him going to the end to win by a length from Gem, she as far before Lucky Find, which was always a bit too slow to get to the front, though he aided in the business of the leaders. Smarty, though, ran a smart sort of a race. Its first two quarters were in 23 3/4 and 24 1/4—good speed for this sort.

Outside Yellow Hand's sterling performance, today's racing at Yonkers was only passable. The going was fast—it will get faster—and the air ideal, with a nice breeze blowing down the stretch. Breezes are scarce and welcome nowadays—more welcome than bad horses.

A crowd of some 6,000 was at the course. Four favorites believed themselves, and Fator rode two of them.

Benny Leonard, the lightweight pugilistic champion, made his entrance into the ranks of thoroughbred horse owners through the purchase from the Redstone Stable of Noddam. W. Travers, who trains Royce Rools for an interest allied with Leonard, will condition the horses of the lightweight king.

Morvich, the two-year-old son of Runymede—Hymir, again startled work watchers at Empire City this morning and turned in the fastest move ever recorded by local tracks within the observation of the present crop of second splitters. Morvich, with Coliletti astride, broke at the three-quarter start, went an eighth in 10 1/2, a quarter in 21 1/2 and easily rounded out the three furlongs in 34 1/2, running the quarter in 21 1/2. Morvich approached the American record for the distance made in 1890 at Butte, Mont., by Bob Wade, a four-year-old.

SARATOGA BATTLE GROUND

Horses of East and West Assembling at the Spa for Annual August Meeting.

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N. Y., July 18.—With the opening of the local racing season only two weeks away this town is awakening from its customary quiet. Every day brings arrivals from all parts of the country in the shape of men and horses. Business stops while the natives and early visitors admire the sleek, sinewy thoroughbreds swathed to knees and locks in cotton bandages as they are led through the streets by stable boys, who think that caring for a good racehorse is the topmost limit of human endeavor.

Many of these racers are from Kentucky and Canada, from which proving grounds some of the keenest competition for the horses of the East has come since the days of Longfellow and Harper and Forbes and Bill Bruce. This was the period when racing here was in its infancy and the sport began at 11 o'clock in the forenoon. It was the time of Wheatly, Morrissey, Reed, and Spencer, the first-named a student of racing conditions and a framer of programs that made him a notable figure in the world of sport.

As is usual, the westerners are sending a number of high-class horses here to contest supremacy with the best of the East. The rivalries of former years, when California made it a three-cornered duel, will be rekindled, and much good should come out of it all for the horse of blood. The breeder who is beaten this year will strengthen his forces in the hope of turning the tables later on.

BEST OF EAST AND WEST TO MEET.

While there is always the keenest sort of interest in the contests between the older horses over a long distance of ground at Saratoga, the public wants to see the crack two-year-olds in action. The West will send several crack youngsters to compete with the best of the East in the \$30,000 Hopeful and other prizes. Conspicuous among these will be the sensational fillies Fair Phantom, by Light Brigade, and Miss Joy, by Peter Quince, which Montfort Jones bought from their breeder, Johnson N. Camden. Unfortunately what appears to be one of the best fillies in the East, My Reverie, is not well engaged here. She was not nominated for the Hopeful, Grand Union, or United States Hotel Stakes. The Flash on the opening day, or the Schuylerville later in the meeting, may bring these fine fillies together, otherwise the duty of upholding the honors of the East will devolve upon the colts, of which the most conspicuous are Little Chief, Mustard Seed, Olympus, Broomster, Oceanic, Sweep By, Runstar, Morvich, Pillory, Draft, Kai-Sang and Colum. There are many fine juveniles which have not yet shown their quality, however, and the best of the year may appear at any time in the rich Saratoga stakes.

Grey Lag would appear competent to hold his own with the western cracks, even with the penalties which he will have to assume for his many victories. Westerners a short time ago thought that Black Servant would take the measure of Grey Lag in the Travers, Miller or some of the other stakes here. Later, however, the Rancocas representative has shown form which would warrant the belief that by the end of September he will be able to carry equal weights with any horse in training and win over any distance from a mile to four miles.

EDWARD BRADLEY'S FORMIDABLE STRING.

The stable which Edward Bradley will send to Saratoga to represent the West is the strongest that he has ever had. The Alabama, with its value of \$10,000, will introduce the dainty English filly Bit of White to the East, but Nancy Lee is considered her equal, and with Prudery, Banksia, Careful and other good ones to help out, this stake ought to be worth witnessing. The good filly Flamette, winner of the Latonia Oaks, and the conqueror of Bit of White at a disadvantage of five pounds, is an absentee.

In the handicap division there is a wealth of material and the racing in which its members will take part should equal that of any in the history of the course. A few of the good ones in the Saratoga and Merchants and Citizens' handicaps are Grey Lag, Mad Hatter, Exterminator, Cirrus, Billy Kelly, Boniface, John P. Griener, Upset, Audacious, Donnacona, Yellow Hand, Black Servant, Nancy Lee, Eternal, Tryster, Star Voter, The Porter, Thunderclap, Lanuis, Prudery, Dr. Clark, John Paul Jones, Best Pal, La Rabiee, Roncau, Gnome, Gladiator and Blazes.

WINNER OF RICH HUNGARIAN DERBY

The Hungarian Derby, for three-year-old colts, was run at Budapest, June 19. The distance was one and a half miles, and the net value to the winner \$56,000.

ORIGIN OF GRAND PRIX DE PARIS

It is not generally known that when the Duc de Morny founded the Grand Prix de Paris in 1863 during the second empire, there was a strong inclination to call the race after the Duc, just as the English great race takes its title from the Lord Derby of 1780. The event was finally called the Grand Prix de Paris out of compliment to the Council Municipal, which subscribed \$1,000 to the stake.

SIX WINNERS OUT OF SIX MOUNTS

LONDON, England, July 18.—Frank Bullock, the Australian jockey, Saturday equaled the world's record by riding the six winners of the six races in which he had mounts at the Sandown Park racecourse, Esher Surrey.

EDDIE RICKENBACHER FIRST

Captures the Windsor Feature Race in Fast Time.

The Porter Also Wins in Near Track Record Time—Second Thoughts Beats Diadema.

WINDSOR, Ont., July 18.—J. R. Skinner's Eddie Rickenbacher accounted for the Belle Isle Handicap, which was offered as the feature attraction this afternoon, from a speedy band over the three-quarters distance. Besthoff finished in second place, while Sewell Combs was third. The winner was ridden by J. Butwell, set a terrific pace all through the race and covered the distance in 1:11 1/2. Sewell Combs was the one offering closest contention for the first half, but gave way in the final eighth. Besthoff, which had been close up all through the first half, finished with a rush and was closing up on the winner at the end.

The Monday card embraced the usual seven race and brought together well matched fields. The crowd, much below the Saturday mark, was a large one for a Monday and was well rewarded by spirited racing. A dash framed for maiden three-year-olds and over was offered as the opening dash and brought together a field of twelve. Tnscola was supported with rare confidence and rewarded her supporters by getting home in front of Josie Gorman and Black Baby.

Second Thoughts and Diadema, in a dash fashioned for two-year-old fillies, drew the bulk of the betting support, and Second Thoughts was returned an easy winner from the Ross starter, with Helen Rogers third. The two ran head and head for the greater part of the distance, but through the final eighth Second Thoughts was drawing away, to win by a wide margin. She ran the distance in 1:00, which equaled the track record, held jointly by Monerief and Ratina. Helen Rogers was a fast coming third next to the inner rail. When well inside the final sixteenth Diadema swerved over to the inside rail and bothered Helen Rogers. Mooney lodged a complaint of foul, which was not allowed. The race was an expensive one for jockey T. Parrington, as he was suspended for five racing days by the stewards for impeding Diadema during the running.

E. B. McLean's The Porter accounted for an allowance race, which was offered as the fifth, at a mile and a sixteenth. The McLean racer was ridden by Butwell, which gained his second victory of the day and came from behind to pass Jim Daisy and win by less than a length. Bygone days was third. The fractional time for the race was the fastest of the meeting, while the time for the full distance, 1:44 1/2, was but one-fifth of a second slower than the track record, established by Great Britain. The Porter was supported with rare confidence by the favorite backers and was a great favorite.

Trainer Cyrus F. Clark has changed his plans in reference to going to Saratoga and will remain in Canada. The breaking down of My Boots is one of the reasons for the change.

Trainer Wm. McDaniel departed for Saratoga yesterday. Our Flag and Exterminator will follow Wednesday.

B. Harding's two-year-old Fannie Bean was jumped on in her race on Saturday and was slightly cut.

Mrs. H. Dattner's Bunga Buck was accused from starting in the fifth race today by the steward. Bunga Buck is a carded starter in the stake race tomorrow.

J. W. Bean of Washington arrived this morning and will remain for some time.

S. Midow arrived this morning with Lad's Love, and took up quarters at Kenilworth.

GREY LAG TO RACE AT KENILWORTH

NEW YORK, N. Y., July 18.—Windsor, Ont., is to be congratulated on the fruits of the enterprise of its race track managers. Last year A. M. Orpen staged the Man o' War-Sir Barton match at Kenilworth and now through the liberality of the Western Racing Association the decision of the three-year-old championship for the current year seems to have been taken away from Saratoga by the offer of a purse of \$20,000 for the Devonshire International. Black Servant, the premier western claimant of the title, is on the grounds to defend his laurels and Sam Hildreth yesterday announced that Grey Lag will be shipped to Canada to do battle with the son of Black Tony.

Grey Lag will leave here a week from Wednesday in care of David Leary, and Jockey Sande will go to Windsor to ride the son of Star Shoot in the Devonshire International on July 20.

A. K. MACOMBER'S HELLEBORE WINS
