

SATURDAY'S BIG TURF PRIZES

H. P. WHITNEY COLORS

First and Second in Valuable Kentucky Jockey Club Stakes.

Enchantment the Victor in Sparkling Race—Louisville Meeting Ends.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., September 9.—For the second time in three years Harry Payne Whitney annexed the rich Kentucky Jockey Club Stakes. In its inaugural running he accomplished the feat with Tryster. This afternoon he went the score better by having Picketer lead in second place to his stablemate Enchantment. Donges finished third.

Kentucky and the West was thoroughly humbled in the fixture and that the smaller portion of the stake went to Donges was due to a break in the racing luck for that colt, as Cartoonist, the "Bud" Fisher owned youngster, suffered all the bad racing luck that could have befallen a horse, and at that was only beaten a short margin for third place. Had Cartoonist been ridden faultlessly and not suffered interference and forced to go wide he would have given the winner a stout argument for the \$25,315 net that went to the victor.

Enchantment's showing was a sparkler—no gainsaying that. He is a youngster of much promise and the only fault to find with him is his lack of ability to get away from the post. The start this afternoon found him a bad laggard—so much so that many regarded him as left at the post, for he was far out of it—but he got going quickly so fast that before the field had traversed half a mile he was close to the leaders, and shortly thereafter was in command, never to relinquish the lead. At one time during the stretch racing McAtee shook him up and he responded gamely to the whip and drew away.

Picketer was benefited by the spread that came in the stretch turn caused by Alice Blue Gown swerving out and taking several of the others, including Cartoonist, with her. The Whitney second string fought it out stubbornly and downed Donges for second place.

WHITNEY'S SHARE TOTALS \$27,615.

In addition to the first money Mr. Whitney received \$1,500 for Picketer finishing second, and a total of \$800 additional for being the nominator of the two colts. Donges took down \$800 for finishing third and A. B. Hancock, the nominator, receives \$100. Cartoonist saved his starting fee and all entrance moneys for finishing in fourth place.

The race brought to the post a field of nine starters with the Whitney pair pronounced favorites. The fact that they succeeded in finishing first and second caused a bigger price to rule against them for place than straight. The time of the race was 1:38%, which marked a creditable performance on the part of the winner.

Enchantment and Picketer will be sent back East tomorrow in charge of James Rowe, Jr., who brought them here and saddled the colts this afternoon.

Racing in Louisville for the year 1922 terminated this afternoon with an enthusiastic and large attendance present to view the sport and incidents of getaway day. There was a cessation from the excessive heat that has prevailed all during the ten day period that racing has been conducted at this track.

The present meeting has shown a reflection of the times—the attendance showed a decrease from former years and the Kentucky Jockey Club booked a deficit here. However, the improvement in patronage of the last four days helped noticeably to lower the deficit figure. The racing has been wholesome, formal and hugely enjoyed.

SURF RIDER IN FAST TIME.

Surf Rider again figured in a winning performance, this time at three-quarters in which he triumphed over Braedalbane and other cracks, running the distance in 1:11%, within one-fifth second of the track record. Surf Rider was benefited by the fast pace that his stablemate, Miss Joy, forced in the earlier stages and it also contributed to Braedalbane's defeat, for the Breckenridge representative was made too much use of to keep the early pace, although he finished gamely.

Miss Bernardine Murphy, the ten-year-old daughter of former jockey Tim Murphy, delighted the grandstand patrons this afternoon between the second and third races with a number of vocal selections.

FEATURE GOES TO FAIR GAIN

Captures Thorncliffe Park's Inaugural Attraction—Three for Kenton Stable.

TORONTO, Ont., September 9.—Closing with speed and courage when straightened out in the stretch the Kenton Stable's Fair Gain scored a head victory from Crack o' Dawn in the \$2,500 Thorncliffe Autumn Purse, the fifth and feature attraction of the opening day's racing at Thorncliffe Park this afternoon. Citizen and Crack o' Dawn set the early running and the latter held on with rare gameness in the final drive. Guy, the favorite, was an easy third, but could never overtake the leaders.

The performance of Fair Gain was all the more creditable considering the fact that he began none too well, but eventually covered the mile in 1:38%, equaling the track record.

Ideal racing conditions prevailed and a crowd of about 6,000 witnessed the sport.

It was a field day for the Kenton Stable, which furnished three of the afternoon's winners. In addition to Fair Gain the stable scored with Elemental and Thorny Way. Elemental took the measure of some shifty sprinters in the Leaside Purse after being outrun to the stretch by Ablaze and Last One.

Thorny Way commenced the proceedings with an easy victory for the stable in the initial dash, after being outpaced until the stretch was reached.

The riding of jockey M. Fator was a feature. He piloted three winners, Thorny Way, Little Black Sheep and Yorkist.

Judge Norman Macfarlan was a visitor here today and left tonight for Montreal to officiate at the Dorval meeting.

H. G. Bedwell paid his initial visit to this course today and will remain for the meeting.

Judge F. W. Gerhardt is due to arrive here on Monday from Wheeling, Va., to assume his duties as judge and racing secretary.

DUFFERIN SPORT POPULAR

Second Largest Crowd of Meeting in Attendance—Another Double for W. M. Cain.

TORONTO, Ont., September 9.—Despite the fact that this was opening day at Thorncliffe Park, the second largest crowd of the meeting was on hand to witness the sport at Dufferin Park this afternoon. They were rewarded by some good racing with favorites being successful, four of them being winners.

W. M. Cain scored his second double of the meeting when Arrow Point and Bond, both backed into favoritism, won easily in their respective races. Incidentally jockey Petzoldt, who rode the pair, was one of the day's leading riders. Jockey T. Burns also winning two with Kingling II. and Sister Flo.

Dioctetian accounted for the first race and Assyrian Queen the second. Both were heavily backed and won with something to spare.

Jockey F. Pribble, who has been absent from the saddle for some time, will leave for New Kensington, Pa., at the conclusion of this meeting. It is understood he will resume riding at that point.

Owing to his having won yesterday, Port Light was ineligible to start in the fourth race today.

L. Gentry and Debut are on the ailing list and were excused from starting in the opening race.

Wm. "Red" Walker will serve in the capacity of official timer for the remaining days of the present meeting.

Several jockeys here have announced their intention of leaving Monday night for New Kensington, among them being W. T. Burns, premier rider at this meeting, and jockey R. Rice and H. Chappell.

Jockey Earl Pool has been engaged by Jefferson Livingston to ride for his stable beginning with the Latonia meeting, where the horses owned by Livingston will be shipped at the close of racing here.

DANDY IN LUCKY VICTORY

Wins Bartlett McLennan Steeplechase When Saddle Slips on Courteous.

MONTREAL, Que., September 9.—The Bartlett McLennan Steeplechase over the long two and a half miles course of nineteen jumps, which featured the closing day's racing at Blue Bonnets this afternoon, resulted in a victory for the Foxhead Mews stable, when Dandy was returned the winner from Courteous, while third place was taken by Houyhnhnm. It was a lucky victory for the Foxhead Mews and a distressing accident snatched the victory from the Harrison silks in the final seventy yards of the race, when the saddle on Courteous slipped, and it was with great difficulty that Simpson managed to retain his hold on Courteous and take second place. As it was, the saddle turned completely and was underneath the horse.

It was one of the best fields that could be mustered in these parts that faced the starter and all covered the course successfully.

Courteous, which was one of the three that Silas Veitch sent to the post as the Harrison entry, went to the front right at the start and made the pace for nearly the entire distance, while Houyhnhnm was in closest pursuit, with Dandy third. Minata and the top-weighted Overmatch brought up the rear. Houyhnhnm made several bad jumps and at two different fences almost unseated his rider, while Dandy, under a light impost, was going along in easy fashion and passed Courteous in the last fifty yards. He fenced well, but would not have won but for the mishap to Courteous. The latter had a sufficient lead after taking the last fence, when his saddle slipped.

Courteous, although tiring, cleared the last fence by sufficient margin and probably would have held the fast-closing Dandy safe in the final strides but for the accident, which took place exactly halfway between the last jump and the finishing post.

The Foxhead Mews Stable accounted for a double this afternoon when Carry On lasted long enough to earn a nose victory from War Tank, with Flea third, in a race that was for Canadian-breds at three-quarters. Romanelli, seasoned veteran, was astride Carry On and under energetic riding managed to nose out War Tank. The latter was probably best, but was knocked back and forced to work his way up between horses.

SUMMERY WEATHER CONDITIONS.

Weather conditions this afternoon were of a midsummer sort and the largest crowd of the meeting journeyed to the course to witness the running of the day's program. Racing was of a spirited order and provided several close and exciting finishes.

The secondary feature of the afternoon was a dash of a mile and an eighth under handicap conditions, in which Fairway was installed as the popular choice in the wagering and returned the confidence of the public by scoring in a driving finish, a half length ahead of Martin A. Noonan, while Finery was third.

The winner was restrained from the early pace, which was established by Tailor Maid, which assumed the lead after crossing over sharply right at the start. Fairway went to the front rounding the bend leading to the stretch and drew away into a length advantage while Martin A. Noonan was racing on the outside. Finery forced her way through close quarters, but could not get to the leaders.

Thomas P. Gorman, popular secretary of the Connaught Park Jockey Club, Ottawa, was a visitor this afternoon. Mr. Gorman was more than pleased with the recent meeting held at that point.

Jockey F. Sharpe was suspended for three days and fined \$25 by the stewards for crossing over sharply in the running of the fifth race.

Jockey Eddie Barnes leads the list of winning riders at the meeting. Barnes is fully recovered from his fall at Toronto and is showing a return to his top form.

J. W. Healy at private terms this morning sold to E. Saunders the two-year-old Veronica.

A special train will be run daily between Blue Bonnets and Dorval Park for the convenience of horsemen stabled at this point.

H. C. Murnan, owner of the Mobile race track, has purchased the contract on jockey H. King.

Steeplechase jockey Norman Kennedy was a visitor at Blue Bonnets this afternoon. He is progressing rapidly from his recent fall.

W. Duran purchased from C. Buxton the filly Mabel Curtis this morning. The consideration was not made public.

T. J. Donohue will ship the members of the Ambrose Clark stable to the Woodbine course Sunday instead of Monday.

KAI-SANG TRIUMPHANT

Defeats Bunting in a Noble Lawrence Realization Finish.

Grand Race in Fast Time Between Fine Colts—Steeplechase a Failure Through Accident.

NEW YORK, N. Y., September 9.—The Rancocas Stable's Kai-Sang, son of The Finn and Kiluna, proved his right to top rank among the three-year-olds by defeating Bunting and Rockminister in the Lawrence Realization at Belmont Park today. He added \$21,400 to the Rancocas Stable winning total by his victory. Kai-Sang's margin of victory was a scant half length and he was fully extended to achieve it. Bunting showed both speed and stamina and set the pace to the last eighth, but he was not equal to the task of withstanding Kai-Sang's challenge.

Rockminister probably had much to do with Bunting's defeat. After Kummer had sent the Whitney colt into the lead while going to the first turn Rockminister moved up and raced lapped on the Whitney colt to the last turn. Then he began to drop back and Sande moved up with Kai-Sang, which had been saved several lengths behind the leaders throughout the early running. Sande was forced to take the colt around the other two when he drew up to them on the stretch turn. He disposed of Rockminister quickly and went on by Bunting to a lead of three parts of a length. Then Kummer called on the son of Pennant and he came again, moving up resolutely under vigorous riding and cutting down his opponent's advantage.

OUT TO THE LAST OUNCE.

That was all he could do, however. Both colts were out to the last ounce, but fighting tenaciously for victory and as they swept across the finish a great cheer burst from the stands, which was not directed at either the victor or the vanquished, but at both, applause for two fine thoroughbreds, which had run a mile and five-eighths honestly, gamely and with a tinge of greatness. Their performance was not record breaking, although the track was fast, but the time of 2:42% was decidedly above the average. The fractions were 24, 48%, 1:14%, 1:40, 2:05%, 2:29%, and 2:42%.

In spite of the fact that the weather was cloudy and rather cool, a big crowd turned out for the fine Saturday program. The Lawrence Realization came fully up to expectations, but the Corinthian Steeplechase, the other stake race on the program, turned out unsatisfactorily.

The Corinthian Steeplechase Handicap, at about two miles and a half, was the secondary stake feature of the day. It was no contest, but the farcical features of the running gave the spectators a chance for some ironical applause. Decisive started off in front and took a good lead in the first turn of the field, with Ards and Sea Skipper rated along some lengths behind. The English jumper was not jumping with his usual ease, and almost went to his knees at several of the jumps. Sea Skipper moved up with Decisive, while Ards was showing marked signs of distress.

WHERE TROUBLE BEGAN.

Decisive threw McNair at the fifteenth obstacle and ran along riderless for a short distance. Ards fell at the same fence, but stood and waited until Brady remounted him.

Sea Skipper without opposition was cantering along the finish to take the \$2,425 that went to the winner. Brady, after remounting Ards, sent the gelding along over the remaining jumps, but he had practically broken down and came to the finish with a marked limp. He took second money. Meanwhile McNair was having his troubles with Decisive. He took the Maxwell gelding over the remaining jumps after remounting him, but fell off as soon as the gelding landed taking the last obstacle. One of the bystanders obligingly caught Decisive near the finish line and McNair remounted him, riding him across the finish to the accompaniment of loud cheers from the crowded stands, to take third money.

E. R. Bradley seems to view the last race at Belmont Park covetously. Friday he captured it with Bunker Brown and today repeated the feat with Betty Beall. The filly had some difficulty in achieving the triumph, but answered the requirements of the situation in gallant fashion.
