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## SUCCESSFUL MEETING

Sunday Sixty-Fifth Day of Racing at Oriental Park.

Nearly \$250,000 Already Distributed Among Horsemen—Principal Winners.

HAVANA, Cuba, February 12.—Sunday marked the sixty-fifth day of the present successful winter season of racing at Oriental Park and during that period 404 races were run. Favorites were successful in 155, while second choices accounted for 81. Third choices or outsiders scored in 163. Odds-on favorites have won in 27 races, while in 32 other contests they have suffered defeat. The total purse distribution during the period amounted to \$245,025, which was shared by no less than 188 stables. Two hundred and thirty-five horses have won one or more races. Perhaps, owned by B. B. Rice, tops the list of winning horses with seven winning purses to his credit. Belle of Elizabethtown and Chief Sponsor are the only ones which have won six races. The five-time winners are The Pirate, Marionette and Cock of the Roost. Six horses have been successful on four occasions, these being Mountain Lassie, Buddie Kean, Margaret Ware, Susiana, Golden Chance and Mallowmot. Quite a few have won three races.

One hundred and seventeen trainers have succeeded in saddling one or more winners. Chief honors are shared by W. B. Finnegan, J. A. Parson and K. K. Karrick, who each have sent fifteen winners to the post. Following are the other successful trainers, with the number of their winners: P. J. Williams, 15; F. M. Bray, 12; U. J. Hak, 11; W. R. Padgett, 11; W. A. McKinney, 9; W. Coll, 8; B. B. Rice, 8; S. T. Baxter, 9; J. M. Hizar, 9; J. H. Moody, 7; W. A. Carter, 8, and R. D. Carter, 8.

**T. BROTHERS LEADING RIDER.**

T. Brothers is the leader of the jockeys to date, with 45 victories to his credit. H. Stutts is a close second with 42. Others who have figured prominently are T. Burns, 29; G. Williams, 21; J. Callahan, 20; A. Pickens, 20; G. Fields, 16; P. Groos, 14; L. McDermott, 13; H. Glick, 13, and G. Walls, 12.

One of the outstanding features of the meeting has been the remarkable success attained by Perhaps, a five-year-old gelding by Luke McLuke—Miss Georgia, which has scored in seven races for total winnings of \$3,225. This gelding, which is the property of B. B. Rice, has started eleven times, has been second twice and unplaced in only two of his races. In a recent race he ran three-quarters in 1:11 3/4, not far from the track record, and equal to the best time for the distance made at this meeting. Perhaps seems to improve with age and in his present splendid form seems destined to eclipse all records for the number of winning purses at the Cuban track. Already he has equaled the record made by Belle of Elizabethtown in winning seven races last year. Perhaps did not race at Oriental Park last year, but two years ago he displayed good form at the local track by scoring in five races. Owner Rice possesses a fine racing tool in this gelding and a bread winner of which he may well be proud.

### SUCCESSFUL TWO-YEAR-OLDS.

Williams Brothers young stallion Iron Cross II, is making a flying start for the leading sire honors of the two-year-old winners at Oriental Park. He is the first to send two juvenile winners to the post, namely, Quail and Quash. The first named has already won two races, so that Iron Cross II, actually is represented by three winners to date, and he is likely to have more winners before the meeting closes. Quail is regarded as the better one of the progeny of Iron Cross II, having won his two last races. In his other start, which was his first, he finished third. Quail is from the good mare Chantouse, which has produced a number of winners in recent years. Quash, the other youngster that has also helped to bring Iron Cross II into the limelight, is from the mare Erma, which also has been successful in producing winning horses. Both youngsters were bred at the Williams farm, near Blackwell, Okla., and Pete Williams, their trainer, is of the opinion that both will make good when they clash with other more fashionable youngsters on the Kentucky tracks during the coming spring season.

Opera Glass, Seth and Hell's Bells are other sires that have had winning representatives in the two-year-old races this year. Opera Glass is the sire of Randall's Royal, winner of the first juvenile race of the year. His sire is a young stallion recently acquired by B. A. Jones, and Randall's Royal is the first colt he has sent to racing. Randall's Royal is from Ferrona. Seth, which produced many winners in the racing of 1922, is the sire of Seth's Dream, another juvenile winner this year. Seth's Dream is from

## METROPOLITAN ELIGIBLES

Seventy-Five Horses Named for Belmont Park Spring Fixture.

Horses Three and Four Years Old Predominate in Entry List—Rancocas Stable Nominates Nine Thoroughbreds.

NEW YORK, N. Y., February 12.—One of the really important handicaps to be run at the spring meeting of the Westchester Racing Association at Belmont Park is the Metropolitan Handicap, with \$5,000 added, at one mile. Seventy-five horses have been named for this year's race.

The scarcity of older horses in the list of nominations emphasizes the weakness of last year's handicap division. Three-year-olds and four-year-olds predominate among the entries and there are only three horses more than five years old among the eligibles.

The Rancocas Stable leads the nominators with nine horses named. H. P. Whitney has named seven, while the Greentree Stable and J. S. Cosden have each named five.

## LATE NEWS FROM KENTUCKY BREEDING FARMS

LEXINGTON, Ky., February 12.—Frederick Johnson and Hal Price Headley, the owners of Brown Prince, have purchased from William B. Miller five yearlings by that son of Dark Ronald. They are: Brown Colt from the fast mare Round the World, winner of twenty-five races, by Lackford. Bay colt from Blume, a stake winning half-sister to Blue Laddie and Delft, by Broomstick. Bay filly from Continental, a winner and dam of the winners Realm, King's Champion and Forestall, by Yankee. Bay filly from Event, dam of Yankee Witch and Occasion, by Adam. Brown filly from Blakeslee, dam of Thelma Marie and Starlike, by Yankee. This leaves Miller sixteen yearlings, principally by the dead sire Ultimous, they being the last of the get of the great son of Commando and collectively worth a small fortune.

George H. Keene, fully recovered from his rheumatic trouble after a stay of several weeks at Hot Springs, arrived here this morning and this evening journeyed back to Louisville, where he has ten horses at Churchill Downs. He spent yesterday at the Downs and says his horses are in the best of health and that they have wintered grandly. The string is composed of Alice Blue Gown, Chittagong, Flowers of Love, Jean Bowdre, Miss Muffins, Secret Greeting, Llewellyn and three two-year-olds as yet unnamed, all bay colts by Luke McLuke, they being from Merode, Micaela and Aunt Josie, respectively.

Clem Pearce is here from E. E. Marshall's Huntingdon Valley Farm in Pennsylvania with mares that are to be mated with stallions in this section.

Dan E. Stewart came in from New Orleans this morning to take up eight horses that have been running out, and place them in training at the Kentucky Association track.

Shallow Water has a bay filly by The Manager at Senator J. W. Bailey's Donegal Farm.

Phil T. Chinn has for disposal, for the account of W. R. Coe, two seasons each to Brown Prince and Omar Khayyam. The mares Coe intended to go to these stallions now will go to The Finn.

Tzarina, dam of Southern Gentleman, this morning foaled a bay colt by Troutbeck. The mare is the property of W. V. Thorons and the colt is owned by Leonard Sutcliff.

## TIJUANA'S INVITING CARD

Sunday's Program Made Up of Eight Races at Mile or Over.

Abadane, Well Ridden by Veteran Dugan, Scores Another Triumph—Dominator Proves Best at 1-2 Miles Distance.

SAN DIEGO, Cal., February 12.—There was a time when a horse was not declared good until he had established his ability to run over a long distance of ground. Then they trained horses to go a long route. That was years ago. Sunday's program at Tijuana reminded turf followers of those old days. It can briefly be told—eight races at a mile or more.

As was to be expected this exceptional program drew a great crowd, even though the day was not propitious to make for numbers. It was an in-and-out afternoon, with sun and rain clouds battling for supremacy, with a precipitation coming toward the closing races. Even as early as Saturday afternoon there were many forecasts that the capacity of the spacious plant would be taxed. Hotels are a barometer of attendance at Tijuana. Saturday night the early influx crowded the San Diego hosteleries. Those who arrived today were compelled to take pot luck. They did not complain.

Heavy was the course, but this did not prove to dampen the enthusiasm. Even under lead gray skies there was some brilliance to the parade for the afternoon's feature. This was the sixth race, the Omar Khayyam Handicap, at a mile and a quarter. This was named in honor of Mrs. Wilfrid Viau, whose husband as owner of the Foreign Stable made a great name in his time in the racing world. Mrs. Viau has just arrived from the East for a winter here.

### PUBLIC LUKEWARM.

All thoughts of sprinters were discarded as the talent scanned the program for the headliner. Despite the fact that there was a field of seven and the consistent performances of Abadane since joining the C. B. Irwin string, the public attempted to settle on some horse to beat this son of Maboul. It was futile. Considering the recent feats of this runner it was reported that the books would not hold him too cheaply and although only 6 to 5 figures were quoted the backers did not take to him any too kindly, with the result that Abadane paid the good price of 2 to 1 after winning as a much shorter-priced horse.

There was a delay of only three minutes at the post when starter Morrissey sent the field away on even terms. The lightly weighted Alleden, with only eighty-five pounds on his back, showed the way for more than a mile, with jockey E. Dugan, master of the saddle, a decade back, keeping Abadane within striking distance of the pace. When they turned for home Abadane assumed the lead at the far turn and gamely withstood all challenges to win by half a length. Nearest to him at the finish was

## KELLEY HORSES TO RETURN

String of Eight to Leave California for Kentucky March 20—Six Promising Juveniles.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., February 12.—Trainer C. C. Van Meter of the Frank J. Kelley string plans to leave Tanforan for Kentucky March 20. Van Meter left Louisville with twelve horses last December and will take only eight back. Four died on the way here or shortly after arrival at the peninsular course.

The eight to be prepared on arrival home for the Kentucky season opening in April are the three-year-old Skeezix, the five-year-old Anne Elizabeth and six two-year-olds, as follows:

- The four sons and daughters of Paicines are moving along in a way that will bring some fame to the Sunstar horse, which was purchased by Kelley from A. K. Macomber. Walter B. Jennings, who trained the Macomber horses, often has said Paicines showed much speed in trials, but was kept from the races by accidents.

The four thoroughbreds that died were Ganaway, Elizabeth Irwin, Rencelaw and Bastinado.

Mr. Kelley has been here all winter and has had the pleasure of watching his horses work on the Tanforan track. He is a director of the Pacific Coast Jockey Club and plans to make liberal entries for the stakes to be decided at the twenty-five-day meeting to open November 3.

## MUD HAS NO TERRORS

For Thousands Thronging to the Fair Grounds Race Course.

Calcutta Victorious in the Main Race—Black Gold an Easy Winner—Abel Stars.

NEW ORLEANS, La., February 12.—A mile handicap named for J. S. McCandless, Imperial Potentate of the Shriners in this country, and to which was added an ornate cup as well as a purse of \$1,200, was the feature of today's card and the Shriners here, honoring their leader, made a gala occasion of it and came to the track in force, augmenting the large visiting crowd here for the Mardi Gras festivities. The Imperial Potentate and his escort witnessed the running of the race as guests of the stewards.

Calcutta, favored by light weight and racing in his best form, was returned the winner of the race after a thrilling battle with another three-year-old, Vennie. The favorite, Crack o' Dawn, landed in third place. The latter was in command from the start, attended closely by Calcutta, the pair being a good way in advance of the others during the first half mile. In the last quarter Vennie came with a rush and at this juncture Crack o' Dawn showed signs of weakening. This enabled Calcutta to move up and in the stretch duel that followed Calcutta held to his task gamely and outstayed Vennie by a length. Vennie also beat Crack o' Dawn by a length.

### MUD RUNNERS IN GLORY.

Threatening weather was again present, accompanied by intermittent showers early in the day. The crowd was of holiday proportions and the racing interest evident, though the track was unsuited to any but mud runners. The outer part of the course again had the firmest footing and those attempting to race on the inner strip were at the exhausted stage before half of their respective races were completed.

Withdrawals in several instances reduced the fields and made for better racing.

The cream of the two-year-old division met in the opening dash, and it proved Black Gold best. He won commandingly from Edna V., with Reply in third place. Reply again was green at the barrier, and it resulted in her being last immediately after the start and she was forced to close an immense gap, missing getting second place by a matter of inches. Black Gold, with an outer post position and with his fine early speed, scurried into a good lead before reaching the last sixteenth and won in a canter.

The second race brought to the post an ordinary band and it furnished a surprise in the victory of Sweet Mama, which won from Galeta and Hysteria.

James Arthur's Sagamore proved best in the third and won easily from James F. O'Hara, with Monastery third.

### DEVONITE IN LAST STRIDE.

The finish of the fifth race was of the thrilling variety and had the crowd in a frenzy of excitement. Devonite and Hello Pardner staged the duel, attended closely by War Prize, Devonite, under strong riding, getting the verdict in the last strides. War Prize might have beaten both with a good ride. Day Lilly was favorite, but she ran one of her poor races.

Jockey Abel was the riding star of the afternoon and landed three of his mounts winners. He inaugurated this with a victory on Sagamore and followed in quick succession on Calcutta and Who Cares. The latter was the victor in the sixth race and won by fifteen lengths, with Abel riding him out hard in spite of his big advantage.

The final race fell to Spugs, strongly backed. He wore Rekad down in the last sixteenth. Rep and Ashland, a pair that was backed extensively, showed poor performances and were never prominent in the running.

A. B. Gordon, trainer of the extensive Bud Fisher stable, was among the visitors this afternoon in quest of a jockey. He opened negotiations with Sergeant M. Murphy for the services of G. Mein. Gordon stated that the horses wintering at Churchill Downs, where the Fisher horses are, have come out of their long rest in fine style, few cases of sickness having been noticed at either Churchill Downs or Douglas Park. Many of the horses at both tracks have begun training for an early spring campaign. The Fisher horses will soon take up their training and are intended for shipment to Jamaica some time in April. Gordon said that Sporting Blood will do stud duty at Carr and Piatt's farm, near Lexington, and that his book for this spring is complete.

The William Daniel horses will be transferred to Tijuana next Friday. The horses will include Romany, Lighter, Olynthus, Silent King, Dr. T. S. Dabney, Beverwyck, King of the Spa, Ollie Ochs, Blanc Seing and Ray Palmer.

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Here and There on the Turf

May Invade English Turf. Mr. Madden May Take Racers There. Feats of Kilmarnock and David Garrick.

With the announcement of John E. Madden that he is to retire as a public breeder and give more attention to racing, it would not be surprising if he made another invasion of the English turf before long. Mr. Madden has said in all sincerity that he will sell his brood mares until he has Hamburg Place reduced to about thirty-five, from which he will breed horses to race under his own silks. John E. Madden is one American sportsman who is not awed by talk about the excellence of the English horse as compared with the American product. He has contended that the American brood mare is the best in the world and thinks the time will come when this country will become a thoroughbred nursery from which the studs of England, France, Australia and South America will be enriched. In this he points out the success that has attended many of the American mares and the cases of Rhoda B., dam of Orby and Armenia, dam of Durbar II., two Epsom Derby winners, are cited.

Iroquois, son of Leamington and Maggie B. B., showed the English sportsmen the stuff of which the American thoroughbred is made.

In 1901 Madden went to England with a couple of American-bred horses—Kilmarnock and David Garrick. They were both four-year-olds and by no means rated as American champions. In fact, Madden says he knows that Kilmarnock was not an extra good horse, but, racing for W. C. Whitney, he won the Alexandra Plate, at about three miles, under 126 pounds, and ran second to Santoi in the Ascot Gold Cup, while David Garrick, carrying 122 pounds and racing for P. Lorillard, was the winner of the Chester Cup, at two miles and a quarter.

And those were strictly American bred. Kilmarnock was a son of Sir Dixon and Miss Used.

Jaconet, the dam of Sir Dixon, was a sister to Iroquois, being a daughter of Leamington and Maggie B. B.

Miss Used, the dam of Kilmarnock, was a daughter of The Ill-Used and Madcap, a daughter of Matador and Feu Follet.

But David Garrick was more American than his stablemate. He was a son of Hanover and Peg Woffington. Hanover in his male line traced back to Glencoe, being a son of Hindoo, by Virgil, a son of Vandal, by Glencoe. Bourbon Belle, the dam of Hanover, was a daughter of Bonnie Scotland and Ella D., a daughter of Vandal.

Then Peg Woffington was a daughter of Longfellow, son of Leamington, while her dam was Ballot, a daughter of Planet, by Revenue. This was purely American blood on both sides of the house, and it is blood to which the most successful brood mares of the country trace. It would not be at all surprising if Madden

made up his mind to again take a fling at the English turf, and if he does it will be with better horses than either David Garrick or Kilmarnock, but his stock will probably have Maggie B. B. somewhere in its blood lines.

Twenty Years Ago Today

Chief Turf Events of February 13, 1903

Racing at New Orleans, Newport and Ingleside.

Jockeys Odom and Lindsey scored double wins during the afternoon at New Orleans.

Jockey Mountain swept the card from the third race on at Newport. There are only five races daily at this track.

At the Ingleside track the most important race of the day was the fifth, which was an overnight handicap. The bugle call was answered by six of the best horses at the track. Princess Titania, Stuyve, Honiton, Kenilworth, Byron Rose and Sad Sam. Princess Titania, owned by J. D. Millin, was made the favorite and, running in second position for the first half mile, she took command there and won as her rider pleased. In justice to the other contenders in this race, the start was not all that could be desired, for Princess Titania and Sad Sam were off to a lucky start, Honiton and the others being virtually left at the post. Honiton ran a dull race and looked as though a few hard races would do him good.

Eastern turfmen are manifesting unusual interest in the entry list for the American Derby, made public yesterday, for the reason that it promises to be a greater race than ever before inasmuch as the best three-year-olds in the country have been named, including those owned by August Belmont, R. T. Wilson, Jr., Whitney & Duryea, P. J. Dwyer, P. H. McCarren, F. R. Hitchcock and J. E. Madden, and all of whom race here year after year in preference to other parts of the land. Mr. Belmont has entered his promising Hastings colt, Lord of the Vale, which ran second to Savable in the Futurity and defeated Sergeant in the Consolation Stakes at Benning last fall. Mr. Wilson, who tried to win the Derby year before last with The Parader, has entered the Mirthful colt Mexican, which won the Produce Stakes and other rich fixtures last year in the colors of C. H. Mackay. Mr. Wilson has also named Grantsdale, a colt which did not do much racing last year. Whitney & Duryea, who will race in the future under the name of the Westbury Stable, have entered Irish Lad, the son of Candlemas—Arrowgrass, which won, among other important events last year, the rich Saratoga Special, and which recently received the highest recognition as a three-year-old in W. S. Vosburgh's allotment of weights for the big eastern handicaps. Mr. Dwyer has entered his Hand-spring colt, Merry Acrobat, which developed rapidly last fall, winning the White Plains Handicap, and is believed by his owner to be a second Major Daingerfield. Senator McCarren's representative is the colt Mackey Dwyer, which showed an ability to go over a long route last fall so successfully that great things are expected of him this year. F. R. Hitchcock has nominated his speedy gelding Grey Friar, which took the measure of Acefull in the Matron Stakes at Morris Park last fall and also won the Albany Handicap at Saratoga, performances which, with others, convinced many turfmen that the son of St. George—Una B., was pretty nearly the best two-year-old of the year. John E. Madden, though Pentecost could not get a slice of the money a year ago, has again set his cap for the Derby and has named Yardarm, Onatas and Dauphin. With this array of talent the East appears to be well represented, in fact more formidable than ever before.

CONTRIBUTE TO AYLIN FUND

A London dispatch says that the patrons of R. H. Walker's stable at Rathvale, Athboy, for which the late C. Aylin rode, have contributed \$3,300 to the fund which is being collected for the benefit of his widow and children.

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FIRST LAUGH WAS THE BEST

When Timoleon Beat Suwarrow in Old Virginia Match Race.

Colonel Tyler's Confident Joking Repaid Interest When William Johnson's Horse Defeats Rival in the Mud.

Following is the story of an historic match race between Timoleon and Suwarrow as recorded by Auld Lang Syne under date of April 28, 1833, and published in the American Turf Register of that year.

It was Medley against Medley again, says the writer, but not so closely contested as the match I gave you an account of some time since.

The colonel, believing his horse vastly superior to the others which were to contend with him, was in high spirits the night before the race.

JOHNSON PRAYS FOR RAIN.

The colonel told Johnson that the race would only be exercise for his horse—that Timoleon would not make him straighten his neck.

The customary mode of preparing race courses in that part of Virginia at that time was to plow deep (and most likely a stubble field), then harrow well, and if the weather proved dry it did tolerably well.

Colonel Tyler's horse took at least twenty-two or three feet to the stride. Timoleon went clipping along like a little dipping duck in the water—pretty much up and down in the same place, about eighteen feet to a stride.

TIMOLEON TAKES THE TRACK.

The Bellair was a beauty and much the larger of the two. At the word Timoleon took the track, determined to make play, and kept at it.

All this the colonel bore as a man should who had previously had his share in the joke, and was beaten handily, owing to the mud.

FRENCH WRITER ON NAMES

Viator Discusses Origins of Horse Cognomens in Naming of Royal Colt.

"Viator," veteran turf commentator of Le Jockey, is deeply interested in the subject of horse nomenclature and from time to time has something to say in this connection which is of interest in other countries than his own.

The King of England has just named one of his two-year-olds Runnymede. This is the name of the sire of Morvich, the fallen idol of the American turf.

The new Runnymede is a son of Hurry On and Saints' Mead and he seems to owe his name to a more or less ingenious adaptation of the consonantal sounds in the names of his sire and dam.

In the same number of the English calendar which records the naming of this colt another royal youngster is given a cognomen. This is King Alfonso's Mail Coach, a son of Great Sport and Vanish.

Mail Coach lived in the age of vehicles at Senefce. Some of his contemporaries were Tapeau, Troika and Fiacre. (All names for horse-drawn vehicles in different languages.)

A recent name bestowed on a colt in England is Valclar. You do not know what that means and neither do I. But the colt is by Clarissimus and Valkyr.

Pot-8-o, the early forerunner of Pomme de Terre, owed the bizarre orthography of his name to a stable boy who wrote it thus on the door of his stall the day the owner christened him.
