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THORNDALE QUALIFIES

Proves Likely Candidate for the \$15,000 Louisiana Derby.

Decisively Triumphs Over His Rivals in Fast Run Race—Jockey L. Lang to Fore.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Jan. 29.—Benjamin Block's Thorndale qualified handsomely this afternoon for the \$15,000 Louisiana Derby to be run at Jefferson Park by triumphing decisively over five of the best three-year-olds that could be mustered in these parts. He won at a mile, carrying 116 pounds and circled the course in 1:39 3/4, the fastest that the mile distance has been covered in many weeks. He won with consummate ease from Henry M. Dietz, an outsider, King O'Neill II. finished third. The latter's showing was ordinary and below Derby standard.

There were five starters, Thorndale conceding weight to all of them. Deronda, with his light impost, moved at once into the lead accompanied by Polvo, on which Heupel applied the whip in diligent fashion and it roused him to his utmost, but it also left him exhausted before three-quarters of the way had been covered.

Deronda, after shaking off Polvo, moved into a good lead, but was challenged simultaneously by Thorndale and King O'Neill II. when about to round into the stretch. Both passed him in the next sixteenth, but Thorndale was always master of the situation and drew away decisively. King O'Neill II. gave way badly in the last sixteenth and Henry M. Dietz, coming from last place, passed him for second place.

THORNDALE STANDS OUT.

If any line can be taken from the race, Thorndale stands out over the three-year-olds shown here so far, long-distance racing considered. There are several three-year-olds that have not made their debut for the season. Among them is Black Gold, the sturdy youngster that was rated high last year.

Summerlike weather was the order here this afternoon and it contributed to bringing out the full strength of racing enthusiasts to the Fair Grounds. Track conditions were superb. The three-quarters handicap, serving as the secondary feature, furnished the outstanding upset of the afternoon. Translate, recently acquired by I. G. Ruth, won after a sharp drive from the non-staying Moonraker. The latter was an overwhelming favorite and started out as if he would make a runaway race of it, but Translate challenged him stoutly in the stretch and the Greentree Stable representative succumbed readily in the last few strides. Bradley's Toney, under a weak ride, finished in third place.

RIDES THREE WINNERS.

The diminutive apprentice L. Lang, under contract to James Arthur, displaced Parke in the limelight during the afternoon by riding three of the winners. All his winning mounts were at long odds.

He began his success in the second race, bringing together platers of the cheaper variety. He had the mount on Coral Reef and he beat home Guv'nor and Daydue. The latter was favorite in the race and after flattering extensively to the stretch gave way fast.

Lang's next successful mount was Bendita, which had for opponents some of the poorest at the track. She led them from the start and beat out under urging the decrepit Kimpalong, which made a game battle for the purse during the stretch, but failed to wear the winner down by a margin of a length.

Duelma, weighted with 84 pounds, was Lang's concluding mount. She came fast in the stretch and caught the tiring leaders to win by a length from High Gear, with Haideo in third place. Georgette was an odds-on favorite in the race, but quit fast after going three-quarters.

The opener brought to the post a band of maidens and it resulted in a victory for Exchange, which showed high speed for the entire way and won well in hand over Billy Klair and McIntosh. Royal Purple was backed into favoritism in the race, but the poor start she had, coupled with a bad ride, caused her to be far out of it for the entire way.

Favorites had a rough time during the afternoon. Good Night, on which Parke had the mount in the third race, was the only winning choice outside of Thorndale, to score.

LEADING SIRE OF 1923

The Finn, Through Prowess of Zev, Establishes Great Record.

Ballot's Large Family Wins Most Races and Finishes Second in Money Earned—Man o' War's Daddy, Fair Play, Third.

The extraordinary influence one great money-winning representative may exert on the standing of a sire is vividly illustrated in the case of The Finn and his son, Zev. The Finn is now in the greatly coveted position of leader of the twenty most successful sires of 1923. His exalted place is due entirely to Zev. This colt alone won more money in the campaign of 1923 than did the combined progeny of any other stallion which gained a place in the exclusive twenty list. Without his service The Finn would not have been in the list. With him, The Finn did not need the aid of any others of his progeny in racing to gain the pinnacle that now is his. However, this potent young sire had already shown in Kai-Sang and Oceanic his ability to beget high class racers, before the arrival of Zev's days of glory, and should continue in the list.

Ballot was represented by the huge family of seventy-eight sons and daughters and so worthily did they do battle for his honor that he landed second to The Finn in the year's record.

Fair Play has become a fixture in the twenty list and finished third in the list of 1923 with Dunlin, Bracadale, How Fair and Grenadier his contributors of \$10,000 or more. Such of his two-year-olds as Bracadale, Larkin and Mad Play significantly gave token that he will have good three-year-olds in the racing of 1924. None questions his greatness as a sire and his progeny is eagerly sought when to be had for a price.

Broomstick, brilliant race horse and thrice premier American sire, had nothing truly great in racing, but scions which could run fast on occasions and did it so efficiently well as to give him fourth place, a considerable advance from his tenth place of 1922.

McGee had little service from his wonderful son Exterminator, but in the emergency the latter's retirement created, his other sons, In Memoriam and Firebrand, raced so valiantly and effectively that he holds the honor of fifth place in the sire list and leads the foreign-bred stallions in the list.

Of the other foreigners, Wrack had a family of seventy in action. They raced to such good effect as to place him next to McGee. Little Chief was his best.

Sam Hildreth's fine racer of years back, King James, had three capital racers to his credit in My Dear, My Own and King Solomon's Seal, which, in combination with lesser lights of his family, placed him in seventh place. Like the Domino—Commando tribe of successful sires, King James is a male line descendant of Himyar and some day it is likely to be discovered that his daughters are priceless brood mares.

It will be observed that of the twenty leaders of 1923, fifteen are American bred. One of the foreign bred is the long dominant and now four-year-old Star Shoot, a wonder in his prime.

GRAND NATIONAL ENTRIES

Seventy-Two Jumpers Named for Great Liverpool Steeplechase.

Race Will Be Run at Aintree Course Friday, March 28—Stephen Sanford Enters Sergeant Murphy and Drifter.

LONDON, England, Jan. 28.—Seventy-two horses have been nominated for the Grand National Steeplechase, the greatest jumping race in the world, which will be run at the Aintree course, Liverpool, Friday, March 28. The American entries include Stephen Sanford's Sergeant Murphy, last year's winner, and Drifter, which was acquired by his present owner last spring. J. W. Corrigan has entered James Pigg.

In the first list of future prices offered here Sergeant Murphy, Silvio and Shaun Spadah are made joint favorites at 16 to 1. James Pigg is at 33 to 1. Drifter is quoted at 25 to 1.

LOUISIANA DERBY ENTRIES

Nominations Pouring in for Jefferson Park's \$15,000 Fixture.

Mrs. A. M. Hoots Expects to Win This Race and Also the Kentucky Derby With Black Gold.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Jan. 29.—Nominations to the Louisiana Derby, to be run March 17 at Jefferson Park and to which \$15,000 is added, are steadily reaching Secretary J. B. Campbell and that official expects a splendid list for the fixture before the closing time for entries February 2.

Among the noted ones whose entry has already been made is Black Gold, which cut such a prominent figure in last year's two-year-old racing. The colt is going along steadily in training for his expected start in the Louisiana Derby.

Black Gold is owned by Mrs. R. M. Hoots of Oklahoma, who is said to have turned down several flattering offers for the black son of Black Toney—Useit, by Bonnie Joe. Mrs. Hoots is planning an ambitious campaign for Black Gold this year. The Louisiana Derby is the first objective, then the colt will be shipped to Churchill Downs and prepared for the Kentucky Derby, entry for that famous race having already been made.

This Oklahoma woman owner is steadfast in her belief that Black Gold will not only win the Louisiana Derby, but will go North to greater fame and capture the Golden Jubilee Kentucky Derby. Surely nothing would be more romantic than for this Indian woman's colors to fly triumphant at Churchill Downs on that eventful day in May.

In the meantime the training of Black Gold will go along slowly and carefully during the month of February with the hope that he will be in prime condition for St. Patrick's Day, when he will start in the Louisiana Derby.

Black Gold will meet opponents worthy of his steel in the big spring fixture of the Jefferson Park meeting, judging from the entries already secured. The Audley Farm Stable will have good representation in the race. Others that intend to make nominations and have starters include such as W. Perkins, Howard Oots and Friars Inn Stable.

SURPRISE AND UPSET

Mark Decision of Juvenile Race at Oriental Park.

E. F. Whitney's Crack Pair, Gymkhana and Parmachenee Belle Beaten by an Outsider.

HAVANA, Cuba, Jan. 29.—The juvenile race, that was the opening attraction at Oriental Park this afternoon, furnished a decided surprise and upset in the victory of the neglected Wanderlust and the defeat of the overwhelming favorites, Gymkhana and Parmachenee Belle, from the stable of E. F. Whitney.

Gymkhana and stablemate were at odds-on in the betting and this pair, which has shown good form in all their starts, was expected to encounter no serious trouble from those opposed to them. Even when the unconsidered Wanderlust, a daughter of Theo. Cook—Gloire de Verdun, dashed away in the lead the admirers of the Whitney color bearers saw no occasion for alarm. There was some concern expressed when Gymkhana was seen to race wide while the Powers filly held to her advantage, close to the inner rail.

It was not until well within the stretch that Majestic succeeded in getting Gymkhana fully in her stride, but once straightened out it did not take her long to gain on the leader. Straight and true she ran with great speed and gradually drew alongside of Wanderlust. The latter, tiring in the last sixteenth, gamely hung on to the lead and, though Gymkhana was going faster and stronger, the distance was too short to wrest the lead from her, Wanderlust earning a well deserved victory. Parmachenee Belle raced close up all the way, but could not get within striking distance of the leading pair, as they fought it out all through the last eighth.

THE ALLY MAKES GOOD.

The Ally has not started in a race since 1922, but there were reports concerning the good form he has been displaying in his morning preparation, so it occasioned no surprise to see him go to the post favorite in the second. He justified the confidence placed in him by winning in good style. He was saved until well inside the final eighth, while Acouchla II. was showing the way. When called on The Ally quickly answered and, with a terrific rush, passed the pace-maker to draw clear and win going away.

The mile and a sixteenth of the fourth race resulted in a sparkling finish with American Soldier the winner in a sensational closing rush that brought victory in the last stride. When the barrier was released American Soldier was away absolutely last and his chances seemed forlorn. Regal Lodge showed the most early speed and showed the way to the far turn, where Cabin Creek, the odds-on favorite, assumed command and looked all over the winner. While all this was transpiring American Soldier was gradually making up ground and when the last eighth was reached challenged so vigorously that Cabin Creek was eliminated, leaving only Little Ed between him and victory. On they fought and in the last stride, as mentioned above, American Soldier was rewarded for his gameness by earning the decision by a neck.

VULCANITE IN CANTER.

Vulcanite in a canter. That tells the story of the third race. He was an odds-on choice and won like a favorite is supposed to win. He permitted The Girl to set the pace for the first half on surffance, then moved into the lead and at the end was cantering five lengths in front of Smart Money, which came from last place to get second money, while Gupton was third.

A well-contested struggle marked the mile and seventy yards of the fifth race, in which the first choice, Randel, beat Hercules by a length. North Wales was the early pace-maker. He was done for at the mile post when Randel moved to the front and, though hard pressed by Hercules all through the last eighth, finally drew clear at the end after a meritorious performance.

WINS WEST INDIES RACE

The four-year-old Horron mare, Pamly, won the Merchants' Handicap, one mile, in the British West Indies on New Year's Day. Baby Smile was second and Camouflage third.

SNYDER OUT OF HOSPITAL

NEW ORLEANS, LA., Jan. 29.—Starter William Snyder, who underwent an operation for appendicitis, has sufficiently recovered to leave the hospital and will take a short period of rest before resuming his duties.

Here and There on the Turf

**Mr. Riddle's Amendment.
Help to the Betting.
Confusion Is Certain.
Scratching the Menace.**

Samuel D. Riddle has never been known to the turf as a betting man, and he would doubtless resent any such implication, but he has, unwittingly probably, suggested an amendment to the rules of racing that is of peculiar benefit to those who are famed for their wagers. It is the prohibition of the added starter.

There are two reasons for the prohibition. One is to make possible the accurate "figuring" of the entries by the handicappers, who handicap for betting purposes and the other is to enable the different associations to obtain the publicity that would come from padded entries and the publication of the names of stars that would not appear at post time.

The Jockey Club has studiously avoided any recognition of betting. In fact, on various occasions it has placed police regulations that made wagering extremely difficult. As for the publicity, it would have doubtful value if the races did not contain the horses the names of which had been carded overnight. It would not take the public long to find out that the published entries for a stake did not in any sense mean that the field would be made up of all of those sent out in the entries.

Just where there is any menace in the added starter is hard to conceive, unless one looks at it from a betting angle. Of course, the adding of a horse to a stake rather upsets the "figures" of the handicappers, and should they be barred under the rule suggested by Mr. Riddle it would be possible overnight to arrive at some conclusion that would be impossible if there were horses added just before post time.

It is an excellent amendment to the rules if it was framed for the purpose of assisting in betting.

Of course, Mr. Riddle did not consider this side of the question or he surely would not have offered the amendment.

Then the question of publicity is hardly worth considering. Many of the racing secretaries have frequently been guilty of padding their stakes with the names of horses they knew were not to start. With the amendment the trainers will do the padding for them.

It costs nothing to drop the name of a horse through the entry box in a stake. There is a starting fee, but the naming of the horse through the entry box does not mean that he is a starter. With added starters barred it is easy to see a vast number of horses named for every stake that will not go to the post.

What a spectacle it would be to have fifty or more horses programmed for the Metropolitan Handicap. That is more than possible—it is probable if the amendment should prevail.

Is there as much to condemn in the adding of Zev to a race before post time as there

would be to send out his name overnight and then not send him to the post?

When an understudy has to jump into the role of a star it is usual for an announcement to be made from the stage offering a refund of admission to those who are not satisfied with the makeshift. Would the racing associations agree to refund the admission to those who had journeyed to the track to see Zev in action, only to see him withdrawn?

It certainly is hard to see just why there should be a change in the rules unless it is made for one of these two reasons—to help the betting or to add to the publicity. It is agreed that it might help the betting materially, but as far as the publicity is concerned, it would be sure to result in the public losing all confidence in racing publicity.

The Jockey Club will go contrary to all its precedents if it enacts a rule to aid betting.

It would be interesting to hear of some other good sound reasons for the rule to prohibit added starters.

The governors of racing might better occupy their time in formulating some rule looking to the prohibition of entering horses with no intention of sending them to the post. That is a pernicious practice and one that is done for betting purposes. There is no evil in the occasional adding of a starter in a stake race, but there is real evil in the naming of horses that are not intended as starters.

The practice is well known to many, but it is worth explaining to those who are not familiar with its workings. Trainers, in collusion, will name horses for the protection of one another, and it is usually done in the claiming or selling races.

When the entries appear it is found that one stable may have as many as three horses entered in one race. Each is of a class above the race, and it is natural that they will scare out some of the bona fide platers that are engaged. As these are scratched and the field comes down to just where the conspirators expect, these good horses, that would not have started in any event, are withdrawn in the

interest of the fellow conspirator. The good horses have done their bit in scaring away the contention and making the race well nigh a certainty for the elected horse.

There have been numerous cases of this kind in every racing season, and it is entirely within the rules of racing. There is nothing the matter with the rules, but there are too many schemers who lie awake nights studying out ways to nullify the rules. They are shrewd men and possibly they will always find a loophole, but just now what is wanted is a prohibition against scratching rather than a prohibition against added starters. It is there lies the real reason for reform.

It is not seriously thought that the amendment proposed by Mr. Riddle will prevail when it is carefully considered by the governors of racing. There is no reason for the prohibition that the Jockey Club could afford to see and it is an amendment that could readily be far-reaching in the harm done of advertising what will not take place.

The entering of horses with no intention of sending them to the post is infinitely more pernicious, and if a rule can be promulgated that would stamp out that practice much would be accomplished for the betterment of the turf. Any trainer who sends an added starter to the post does so with the idea that he might be a winner. Horses are not added at the eleventh hour to lose.

It is not meant by all this that there is anything praiseworthy in the adding of a horse after the regular hour for the naming of starters has passed. It is well if the field is known the night before, but there must be no prohibition against the adding of a horse when conditions arise that warrant its being added.

There can never be an absolute prohibition against scratching. If there was such a prohibition there would be many an unfit horse sent to the post. What there should be is a good and sufficient reason for the withdrawal of a horse, just as there is a good and sufficient reason for the adding of a starter.

Of course, Mr. Riddle has not suggested his

amendment without a good reason. He is seeking to do something for the betterment of racing, but he surely could not have considered the harm that could come from such an amendment when it was offered.

Mr. Riddle doubtless has a good argument in support of his proposed reform, but in all the long years of the agitation against the added starter there has not been one advanced that could begin to offset the confusion and the menace that would come from a prohibition.

It is well to discourage the practice of adding horses after the hour for naming them through the entry box has passed, but there are many reasons against the prohibition. It is seldom indeed that there could be a charge of sharp practice in the adding of a starter to a stake. As a matter of fact, just where could the charge of sharp practice stand up in any case?

With the naming of horses for a race with no intention of sending them to the post it is impossible to dodge the charge of sharp practice.

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IN LITTLE OLD NEWMARKET EXPLOITS OF HAMMERKOP

Happenings in England's Home of Thoroughbred Racers

Aristocracy of Great Britain to be Found at Club Headquarters With Good Company Close By.

The special commissioner for All Sports Weekly paid a visit to Newmarket, the home of racing in England, and his impressions of the town, the training grounds and the daily life of the people in the quiet days between the big race meetings, are well worth reading.

Little Old Newmarket, as Major Belmont's emissary from New York would call it, seemed to be almost asleep when I arrived. I was told later that the populations of the urban district is not far short of 10,000—it was once 11,500—but none of the 10,000 hurried out to welcome me.

This, by the way, occurred to me to be Newmarket's first lesson to the stranger within her gates—the importance of having a bit on both sides, if any.

"So this is Newmarket," I said to myself, as I went to bed in a room dating almost as far back as the battle of Naseby.

But it wasn't. It wasn't the real Newmarket; it was only one side of it. The town that seemed asleep as I came into it in the evening was very much alive in the morning.

THE OLD AND THE NEW.

There was still an old-world atmosphere about the cobbled courtyard of the modernized hotel. One had an impression that "The Three Musketeers" might at any moment dash in on a carriage-way and out at the other.

It is here, in this early morning work, that you have the key to the purpose and occupation of this great training center—this home of the thoroughbred.

The Newmarket seen by the racegoer—the gay and sporting crowd of the stands and enclosures at the spring or July or October meetings—bears little relation to the Newmarket of the in-between weeks.

Even when the last special train has left for London and the last motor car or charabanc or taxicab is bowling away beyond Six Mile Bottom, there is still, on race meeting days, an air of feverish excitement about the town in the evening.

AFTER THE RACES

Members of the racing aristocracy are assembled at the Jockey Club headquarters in the High Street. Perhaps the King is there for the night. He has his own rooms, and his own private entrance and carriage drive.

That is when races are on, and now and then in the hunting season. But in between the big events Newmarket, after sunset, but for the sober sociability of its few clubs and institutes and the through traffic of the motor car, is a village of the pre-Stuart period again.

Walk across the heath before breakfast any morning or stand near the town end of Cambridge Road, and "squadronettes" of shiny-coated colts and fillies will pass you at intervals, ridden by stable lads and jockeys and apprentices.

There are, for instance, S. H. Darling's first string—Lieutenant and Golden Boss, Courier and Cragsman, among the three-year-olds, and others owned by Lord Blandford, Lord Hillingdon and Sir Samuel Scott.

HOW THE HORSES COME.

Mr. Gilpin has brought Town Guard, Knockando and Greek Bachelor from Clarehaven, a mile away on the other side of the town, and among the Hon. George Lambton's first string on this special Saturday morning visit to the race course.

If you are interested in any of Mr. Frank Curzon's horses follow the Primrose House string, under Mr. Watts. Bellman has just galloped a mile and three-quarters with Sunblair—Challoner up—accompanying him on the last six furlongs.

All the hardest gallops for horses in advanced stages of training must be done before the sun is too high in the sky and too hot. "At four or five or six o'clock on a golden summer morn," the hard-working trainer and his stable staff must be out with "the first string."

Gilpin Recounts History of Good Mare that Won Cesarewitch.

Humor of the American Trainer Huggins—His Instructions to "Skeets" Martin Caused Mare to Lose the Oaks.

Although Pretty Polly was really the star of P. P. Gilpin's stable in the early years of the present century, the English trainer also held a great admiration for Hammerkop, whose racing career he reviews in the following article from the London Weekly Dispatch:

Pretty Polly was not the only grand mare that Clarehaven sheltered nearly twenty years ago. I have already referred to a remarkable animal called Hammerkop, which, taking a dislike to Pretty Polly on the morning the peerless mare won the One Thousand, shied and only missed Pretty Polly's hocks by the thickness of a sheet of notepaper.

It was as late as the autumn of the third year of Hammerkop's career that she first walked into a stall at Clarehaven. Until that time she had been trained, with other of Major Eustace Loder's horses, by Huggins at Heath House, Newmarket.

Hammerkop had done well as a two-year-old. She won four races, including the July Stakes at Newmarket, worth \$3,150. She also won at Goodwood, at Kempton Park and again at Newmarket.

WINS THREE-YEAR-OLD PLATE.

The next three-year-old she won the May Three-Year-Old Plate of \$7,500 at Kempton by three-quarters of a length, starting at 6 to 1. Then she ran in the Oaks, and was ridden by that clever jockey "Skeets" Martin.

Unfortunately Huggins gave orders to "Skeets" Martin which proved fatal to her success in that classic event. Hammerkop's real forte was staying.

With a fair turn of speed she could plod along all day, though she was not in the picture with a mare like Pretty Polly. In this race for the Oaks she was opposed by some speedy animals, including Our Lassie and Skyscraper.

I watched this race carefully and backed Hammerkop, as Huggins had kindly told me he thought she would win, and I was quite satisfied in my own mind that if she had come through she would have won.

After the race was over "Skeets" Martin told Huggins that he ought to have won and that he would have done so but that he was hampered by having been given orders to wait.

HUGGINS A GOOD TRAINER.

Though I considered Huggins to be wrong in regard to the way to ride Hammerkop, he was nevertheless a good trainer indeed. Most painstaking and with a thorough knowledge of his business, he was certainly one of the best of the American trainers who came to England.

To return to Hammerkop. The mare also ran in the Coronation Stakes that year at Ascot, but, as the distance for this event is only a mile, it did not prove long enough to bring out Hammerkop's remarkable staying qualities, and she was beaten.

At times Huggins was amusing, and I remember that in the train one day he made me laugh like fun. Lord William Beresford had been down to Newmarket not long before.

Lord William replied: "The horses have not done enough work!" Huggins thereupon asked how his lordship knew that, and Lord William replied: "I hear you have been giving the horses an easy time. At all events the 'touts' say they haven't done

enough." Whereupon Huggins said: "Oh, I see, you have been listening to those men down in the trees. I guess if you were out shooting smart men you would not cock your gun at one of them."

Hammerkop was a whole-color bay mare of the long and low type, standing on excellent legs and feet, but rather inclined to be hollow-backed. She was a sound, healthy mare of equable temperament, a mare that it was a pleasure to have anything to do with.

Before Doncaster, where Pretty Polly was to compete in the Leger, she was working with her every day, and was in some really good gallops with her. Of course she met with her usual fate when they really went along.

Hammerkop wound up that year by winning the King's Plate at Derby, run over two miles, beating Rondeau, a good mare, and Throwaway, which had won the Gold Cup at Ascot.

No gamer animal has ever been sheltered by Clarehaven than Hammerkop. At Ascot the next year, 1905, she was only beaten a head and a half-length by Bachelor's Button and Mark Time in the race for the Gold Vase.

At the Second October Meeting that year at Newmarket Hammerkop went one better and redeemed her failure of the previous year when, running without having been really trained for so severe a race by winning the Cesarewitch Stakes, staying the two and a quarter miles and beating eighteen other competitors.

I have a large photograph of the race hanging in one of my rooms at Clarehaven, and this shows Merry Andrew leading from Hammerkop at the Bushes and apparently holding the rest—including our mare—at bay. However, Hammerkop, on which B. Dillon rode a remarkably good race, ran on with unfinching courage and, refusing to be denied, fairly worried the other out of the race up the hill from the Abingdon Mile bottom and scored a most meritorious success.

HER LEGS GIVE TROUBLE.

Merry Andrew's pilot was a lad named Howey. We were none too certain of Hammerkop's standing her preparation for this race, as her legs had been giving a great deal of trouble, so much so that there were grave doubts about her being able to run even up to the day before the race.

Can you indicate anything in big race tomorrow. If so will as in duty bound ever pray. TOM.

So that it should not cause too much unnecessary interest when passing through the post office and to show my appreciation of his wire, I prefixed an "H" to the word "ours" in my telegraphic reply, which was as follows: PETER.

I knew that would convey to Tom our opinion that Hammerkop with luck had a fair chance of winning the Cesarewitch. In answer to this we received the following telegram: I will on my knees tonight. Good luck. TOM.

The aforesaid Tom was fond of a bet, and I have reason to believe he had a good race indeed and that he was pleased with life and himself when he despatched the following wire to me after he knew the result of the race: Heartiest congratulations. I prayed all night and being a good Catholic it came off. TOM.
