CHILHOWEE'S RECORD-BREAKING PERFORMANCE

FEATURELESS RACING

Tuesday's Card at Jamaica Below New York Standard.

Best Offering Ruined by The Delaware II. Beating Barrier and Thereby Winning Race.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Oct. 14.—There was no race at Jamaica for Tuesday sport that was worthy of being called a feature and the entertainment was furnished by about as cheap a group as can be found in New York at this season of the year. The weather was pleasant for the sport, the track was fast, and a goodly crowd was out when the character of the sport is taken into consideration.

Three of the six races were for two-year-olds, and two of these were five and a half furlongs, dashes for platers that had not won at the meeting, while the other was a five-eighths dash for fillies. Then a mile and seventy yards for cheap maidens of all ages did not lend any tone to the show. What might have been the best race, a three-quarters sprint, was sadly marred when The Delaware II. beat the barrier so far as to make his victory possible and the remaining offering was a mile and seventy yards for platers. This is what was served up to follow the holiday card of Monday. The promise is a bit better for Wednesday, the closing day of the Jamaica meeting, with the Claremont Handicap and the Remsen, another handicap for juveniles as the feature offerings.

With the running off of the Wednesday card the scene of racing in New York will change to the Yonkers course of the Empire City Racing association, and that brings the New York season to a close.

SCORES BY A NOSE.

The start virtually decided the three-quarters of the third race. J. L. Holland's The Delaware II., beat the barrier and McAtee, taking every advantage of that fact rushed him into a long lead. He was quitting badly at the end and even with that advantage just lasted to win by a nose from Robert Odom's Sumpter, while Lee Rosenberg's Sun Audience was a close third.

When The Delaware II. was permitted to go at the barrier he was lengths to the good before the others were fairly under way. Nellie Grey was rushed into second place and Sumpter was racing forwardly among the others, while Sun Audience, a bit slow to begin, quickly moved up on the outside. But it was Nellie Grey that drew out from the others to chase after the leader. She gained some ground and was still second after making the turn into the short stretch, but it had taken considerable out of her and she tired badly in the last eighth, while both Sumpter and Sun Audience were gaining with excellent courage. Sumpter had saved ground on the stretch turn, while Sun Audience had gone a bit wide.

Right to the end, they continued to draw up on The Delaware II., but his advantage at the start had told the tale, and he staggered home, winner by a nose.

John E. Madden's Myrtle Belle proved best of the two-year-olds that came together in the opening five and a half furlong dash and at the end she had something to spare, as she led Jefferson Livingston's Confluence and P. S. P. Randolph's Sea Tide home.

Mixture and Myrtle Belle dashed out into a good early lead and when the head of the stretch was reached Myrtle Belle shook Mixture off to go into a good lead. She was tiring right at the end, but had enough left to withstand the belated challenge of Confluence. The latter was going well at the end, while Sea Tide was quitting badly. Mixture was the one to be fourth.

Gertrude D. in this was just a bit slow to be under way and she was forced to race wide all the way. She gained some ground to the head of the stretch but was at no time a contender.

LOCKERBIE EASILY BEST.

Fred Housman's Lockerbie was easily best of the three-year-old fillies that met in the mile and seventy yards of the second race, and never left the result seriously in doubt. At the end she was showing the way to W. V. Dwyer's Lady Audrey by a good margin and Robert H. Shannon's Sophy outstayed Escoba d'Oro and Anne.

From an excellent start Lockerbie at once went into command and she was followed by Anne and Escoba d'Oro with Lady Audrey not far away and Sophy last of the company.

Through the back stretch Lady Audrey moved up on the outside until she had reached second place, but Lockerbie was romping along in front with a safe lead

AGA KHAN REACHES LATONIA

Together With Priscilla Ruley and Flames, Star of Belair Stud Comes for Championship.

LATONIA, Ky., Oct. 14.—Three formidable aspirants for the Latonia Championship Stakes arrived on next Saturday's battleground when Aga Khan, Flames and Priscilla Ruley, the property of the Belair Stud, were unloaded at Latonia, having been shipped from Jamaica. Trainer Jim Fitzsimmons did not come with the horses, but will arrive Wednesday. The horses arrived in good condition, with the exception of Priscilla Ruley, which had a slight car fever. Both Aga Khan and Priscilla Ruley are regarded as strong candidates for next Saturday's stake. They come here with a fine reputation and their success in the Pierpont Handicap at Laurel last Saturday, when they ran one, two, and the winner hung up a new track record of 2:01 1/4 for the mile and a quarter, is still fresh in the memory of local racegoers. Jockey G. Field accompanied the horses here and will have the mount on one of them in the stake.

Only light work was demanded of the Latonia Championship Stakes candidates this morning. Tomorrow they will be asked to extend themselves in ambitious trials to thoroughly fit them for the muscle-straining and nerve-racking journey of a mile and three-quarters, which they will be asked to travel in next Saturday's rich stake. This morning's work included a gallop by August Belmont's Blind Play, which ran three-eighths in :35. Mad Play went a similar distance in :37, and Honor, his stablemate, galloped a half mile in :49.

YOUNGSTOWN OPENS TODAY

Everything Ready for a Banner Fall Meeting—Track in Fine Condition.

YOUNGSTOWN, Ohio, Oct. 14.—Everything is in readiness for the opening of the autumn meeting of the Southern Park Recreation Association here tomorrow. Upwards of four hundred head of horses are already quartered at the track and more are expected to arrive this afternoon. It is a certain thing that there will not be a shortage of good riding material as all the jockeys, who rode at the recent Akron meeting are on hand and a few now riding at other points have announced their intention of coming here.

The inaugural purse, feature of tomorrow's program, brings together a small but select field, while the majority of the other races are filled to capacity, and if the delightful autumn weather continues, some fine racing is in store for the patrons.

Manager Eyster has had a staff of workmen busy working on the track proper all week and as a result it is now in lightning fast condition and in addition many improvements have been made throughout the grounds.

Andrew G. Leonard, who will serve as presiding steward, was an arrival from Lexington, Ky., today, while the other officials, including William Harris, starter, and S. S. Bender, racing secretary, are already on the grounds. The first race will go to the post promptly at 2:30 p. m.

NOTED SIRE'S TRAGIC END

Prince Palatine, a Wonderful Racer, Burned to Death in Fire at Xalapa Farm.

Word was received from Kentucky this morning that Prince Palatine, which stood at the head of Edward F. Sim's Xalapa Farm breeding establishment at Paris, Kentucky, was cremated in a fire which destroyed the stallion barn last night. Prince Palatine was imported from France by Mr. Sims and his addition to the ranks of American stallions was looked upon with great favor by American breeders. Foaled in 1908, a bay son of Persimmon from Lady Lightfoot by Isinglass, he raced with great distinction and has to his credit such important events as the Imperial Produce Plate, St. Leger, Gordon Stakes, the Ascot Gold Cup, Eclipse Stakes, Doncaster Cup, Jockey Club Stakes, the Coronation Cup and others. His winning moneys totaled over \$181,000. He was then sold to the French government for \$200,000. According to advices here he was fully insured.

Smashes All Known Records for the Mile and an Eighth Distance

Hangs Up the Fast Time of 1:48 4-5 in Sensational Race and Regains Favor as Formidable Candidate for the Latonia Championship Stakes

LATONIA, Ky., Oct. 14.—Gallaher Brothers' Chilhowee, which failed so decisively in the running of the International Special last Saturday, astounded the big attendance at Latonia Tuesday by a wonderful performance in winning with the greatest ease and running the mile and an eighth distance in 1:48 4/5, reducing all known records for the distance. Formerly it had been held by Grey Lag and Goaler, both having raced the distance in 1:49.

Chilhowee did not appear to race at more than a fast gallop for at least that part of the race through the homestretch. His jockey had him under stout restraint, observing over his shoulder the game but futile effort of Graeme to wear him down. He passed the finish four lengths in advance and continued an additional three-eighths, completing the full mile and a half journey in 2:27 3/4.

At no time during the journey did Chilhowee indicate that he was tiring; on the contrary, his stride was a bold one and unflinching. Garner kept him about four lengths before

SPECIAL RACE ABANDONED

Epinard, Sarazen and Other Stars Will Not Meet in Proposed Churchill Downs Race.

LATONIA, Ky., Oct. 14.—Any chance that there might have been of bringing Sarazen, Epinard and other crack horses together in a special race at the forthcoming Churchill Downs meeting was dispelled today when Gene Leigh, trainer of Epinard, announced that he had arranged to ship the French champion to Laurel Wednesday noon, where he will start in the two stakes for which he was nominated some time ago. Col. Winn, who was engineering the contemplated race at the Louisville track, abandoned the project when he found that Sarazen would not be returned west for the race.

Epinard's two engagements at Laurel will be in the Laurel Handicap at one mile and with an added money value of \$10,000, which will be run next Saturday, and the Washington Handicap, at one mile and a quarter and with an added money value of \$25,000, to be decided November 1. The horse will also be seen under colors at the Pimlico meeting later on, according to trainer Leigh. In the Laurel stakes Epinard will not clash with Sarazen, as the latter is not eligible to that stake, but the pair will hook up in the Washington Handicap.

Regarding Epinard's future, trainer Leigh stated that the horse will be returned to France some time in November. Owner Wertheimer had received a number of flattering offers for the purchase of the horse, all of which he declined. While E. R. Bradley was not one of the number seeking to secure possession of Epinard, he did make an offer to trainer Leigh to allow the horse to winter at Idle Hour Farm, free of cost to his owner, and for Leigh to take up the horse in the spring without any obligation to Bradley. The latter is of the opinion that if Epinard was permitted to spend the winter in this country and given full opportunity to become acclimated that next spring he would be invincible as a racer.

BEAUTIES OF MIAMI TRACK

LAUREL, Md., Oct. 14.—A photograph setting forth the beauties and convenience of the new race course at Miami, Fla., was hung today in the secretary's office here. It drew favorable comment from horsemen generally. From Miami, Luke Cassidy, general manager of the course, sent word to H. J. Morris that a recent fall of five inches of rain in 72 hours failed to make the track worse than "good" at any time. The drainage is said to be perfect.

G. C. CUDAHY HORSES SOLD

LATONIA, Ky., Oct. 14.—To satisfy a judgment that Harned Brothers & Jones held against G. C. Cudahy, of Chicago, Sheriff Thiell, of Kenton County, sold at auction in the Latonia paddock today the Cudahy stable, comprising Glide, My Dream, Cup Bearer and Pacier. Cup Bearer brought the top price of \$6,100 and went to Williams Brothers. Mark Harned secured Glide for \$5,500 and My Dream for \$3,500. Pacier was knocked down to L. Kay for \$1,700.

Thereafter Graeme steadily displaced Diagram, but Chilhowee maintained the same margin of lead over Graeme and they came through the stretch without material change in their positions, except that Chilhowee was well under restraint and Graeme driving hard. Diagram had fallen completely out of it and Hopeless had no difficulty to land in third place. After the finish Graeme continued to follow Chilhowee and they were still four lengths apart after they had concluded the mile and a half distance. The additional workout was preliminary to their starting in the Latonia Championship Stakes next Saturday.

Considering that he held to his task without great effort this afternoon and at the same time displaying the high flight of speed, his poor showing after three-quarters of the mile and a quarter International Special running was decidedly puzzling. It is just possible that Sarazen, staying in the close proximity to him that he did and forcing the pace, caused Chilhowee to become discouraged and give way during the last half mile. He races as if he likes to be out in front and undisturbed.

WINS BACK ADMIRERS.

Chilhowee's race today won back to his standard many friends he had lost in the International Special and he will again be strongly in the limelight when he starts next Saturday in the Latonia mile and three-quarters Championship Stakes.

Another great attendance was on hand to view the sport this afternoon and they witnessed some excellent racing, featured by many close finishes in which the winners and strongest contenders were at top speed, with their jockeys exerting their best efforts.

Ideal weather was again the rule and the track in perfect condition. The defeat of Rothermel in the fifth race was the outstanding disappointment that the public experienced during the afternoon. She was held to be best of those starting, but she was eased back soon after the start to avoid interference and she could never get well into contention thereafter, though she finished in third place. The winner turned up in the frequently disappointing Riviera, which scored for the first time since her arrival from Hawthorne. Deeming ran gamely to finish in second place.

Bo McMillan was again supported with rare confidence and again he succumbed and finished far back. His defeat was registered in the sixth race, in which a good band of platers met and it resulted in victory for Nulli Secundus, which was greatly favored by racing luck and by having saved much ground for the entire way. Georgie was possibly the best in the race but he suffered considerably when the incompetent apprentices on the other starters permitted their mounts to race wild all over the track. Georgie finished gamely during the stretch run and just missed getting up for second place after having closed an immense gap.

MADAM VENNIE SURPRISES.

Madam Vennie, grouped with others in the field of the third race, furnished an upset when she got up to score from Miss Rosedale, another outsider, with Queen Bess in third place. Miss Rosedale had led the other eleven starters until the last twenty yards, where the winner caught her with her timely rush. The opener enabled John Hager to score his second successive victory. He won handsily after having been prominent from the start. Seclusion had to be urged hard to outstay Asaph for the place.

ANOTHER JEFFERSON SALE

Latest Report Says Four New Orleans Men Are Purchasers Instead of Judge Murphy.

LAUREL, Md., Oct. 14.—Controlling interest in the Jefferson Park race track passed this morning to the hands of Robert S. Maestri, James L. Lemarie, R. A. Leigh and H. S. Eddy, Jr., four residents of New Orleans, outside of which the course is located. They acquired the majority portion of the stock of the Jefferson Parish plant by purchase from James F. O'Hara and G. D. Bryan, Jr., who promoted and built the place about eight years ago. This morning's deal involved 5,573 of the 9,000 shares of stock issued by the Jefferson Parish Fair Association.

From New Orleans last Thursday came the report that Joseph A. Murphy and Charles Essig had bought the stock held by Bryan and O'Hara. This story was denied at the time by the holders of the stock, with the announcement that Messrs. Murphy and Essig had allowed an option on the property to lapse on the day they were reported to have bought it. The New Orleans men obtained the property upon an option held by G. R. Bryson. They were represented legally by H. L. Landfried, a Crescent City attorney, who accompanied them here. The five New Orleanians departed tonight for New York on their way back to New Orleans.

Speaking for his associates Mr. Eddy announced that the new Jefferson management would adhere to any commitment made by its predecessors. For instance, the \$17,500 promised last spring as an added stake for the 1925 renewal of the Louisiana Derby will be hung up by the purchasers. They will open Thanksgiving Day and continue until Dec. 31. Following the Fair Grounds meeting, which closes on the day before Ash Wednesday, a spring meeting will be held to close on St. Patrick's Day. J. B. Campbell will be racing secretary for the new association as he was of the old. Joe McLennan will be one of the placing judges. No other officials have been named.
