OWNER AND TRAINER

Suspended Pending Investigation of Tan Son's Poor Showing.

Veterinary Examination Discloses Sponge Concealed in Each Nostril of the Horse.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Dec. 27.—The investigation by the stewards with regard to Tan Son's running in the fourth race and his subsequent pulling up by his jockey, disclosed the fact, after the track veterinarians, sent to Mrs. A. Swenke's stable to examine the horse, after he had been claimed by her, that his heavy breathing was due to a sponge concealed in each nostril.

W. M. Cain, in whose colors and interest he ran, was questioned at length by the officials with regards to the nose stuffing and the stewards decided that pending further investigation, W. M. Cain and his trainer, D. McDermid, be suspended. The entry of all horses owned by W. M. Cain was ordered refused.

NEW ORLEANS, La., Dec. 27.—Track conditions were responsible for a program at Jefferson Park today much below the usual Saturday standards and devoid of any outstanding feature. The entire program was made up of the claiming variety of races, with a cheap grade of starters.

Improved weather conditions and clear skies contributed toward the good attendance. The racing was spirited on the whole and several of the finishes close enough to suit the most exacting.

Backers of favorites were again badly astray in their judgment, the first five meeting defeat. Two stables furnished the five favorites. S. N. Holman's trio consisting of Carnarvon, Rubien and Pete the Scribe, the other pair, C. T. Worthington and Tan Son, represented W. M. Cain.

Tan Son's showing was particularly poor and his rider pulled him up before going half a mile. The jockey's explanation for his action was that he was afraid the horse was going to fall. The stewards began an inquiry after the race in regard to the horse's poor showing.

CÔTE D'OR AT LONG ODDS.

Tan Son was in with a somewhat poor aggregation to race at a mile and seventy yards and H. G. Bedwell's Cote d'Or, at long odds, was the victor, winning from Cimarron, with Sea Court in third place. It was a lucky victory for Cote d'Or, as Cimarron raced as if pounds the best. She was one of the laggards caused by a poor start and at one stage seemed hopelessly out of it. She closed an immense gap, however, and was going faster than the winner at the end. Tan Son dropped completely out of it after the start and continued to fall back. He was claimed for \$1,000 by Mrs. A. Swenke.

The first favorite to lead his opponents home was Yoshimi in the sixth race. He was accorded confident support and he made good decisively, wearing down Smart Guy to win with much in reserve. Little Annie finished third.

The disappointment of the race was Richelieu. He was favorite in the opening betting, but receded steadily thereafter. He was eliminated as a contender after going half a mile and finished the whipper-in of the field.

The first three favorites were failures, the first two, Carnarvon and Rubien, coming out of the S. N. Holman Stable. Carnarvon landed in second place and Rubien finished third.

The sport began with a short dash, in which C. T. Worthington, with Gerrity riding, was a favored one. He was never a factor, Shanghai racing in his best form and away forwardly, winning as his rider pleased from Valentino, with Charlnat in third place. Peter Decoy alternated with Charlnat as the pacer, but Shanghai, coming with a rush at the stretch turn, moved by the pair fast and won as his rider pleased.

CARNARVON DISAPPOINTS.

Carnarvon seemed to have his race won after he headed Proceeds, for he took a long lead and straightened in the stretch, he was still much to the good, but he suddenly began shortening his stride, and it was no effort near the end for Prima Donna to pass him and be winner in handy style. Carnarvon, under hard urging, succeeded in outstaying Warren Lynch for second place. Proceeds tired badly in the last sixteenth.

The third race found Rubien and Peter Piper taking a long lead over the others in the first half mile, but when it came to the actual hard racing both began tiring steadily, and it left Remnant to come on and win with much in reserve, over Maude Harzey. Rubien, though tiring badly, had just enough

REACH KENTUCKY SAFELY FAST RACING AT HAVANA

Thoroughbred Importations From England Arrive at Lexington Without Mishap.

LEXINGTON, Ky., Dec. 27.—Along with the imported thoroughbreds from England which arrived yesterday from New York for Senator J. N. Camden, Walter J. Salmon, E. R. Bradley, Leslie Combs and Joseph E. Widener, George Miller brought the young Sun Briar horse, Sun Flag and the young mare, Follies, both the property of Gifford A. Cochran. They went to Cochran's Shandon farm, where Under Fire and His Majesty are to make the season of 1925. Plans for Sun Flag have not been announced. All of the horses from the other side arrived at their destination in good condition with the exception of Own Sister, the bay mare by Dark Ronald—Mother-in-Law, the property of Walter J. Salmon. She was running a high temperature and had to have veterinary attention.

JOCKEYS POOL FATHER DEAD

CINCINNATI, Ohio, Dec. 27.—Funeral services for William Pool of 2323 Washington Ave., Norwood, father of Earl and Willie Pool, jockeys, who died while attending the winter racing meeting at New Orleans Friday, will be held at his home on Tuesday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock. The Rev. Frederick N. McMillin, pastor of the Walnut Hill Presbyterian Church, will preach the funeral sermon, and burial will be in Spring Grove cemetery.

CHILHOWEE IN COLLISION

NEW ORLEANS, La., Dec. 27.—While being galloped at the Fair Grounds Saturday morning Chilhowee collided with another horse near the half-mile post, but, fortunately, received no serious injury.

SEQUEL ON RETIRED LIST

NEW ORLEANS, La., Dec. 27.—Art Goldblatt has been forced to retire Sequel from racing. The gray mare broke down in her race last Monday.

Annie Lyle Displays High Speed in Winning Saturday—Nimrod Finally Meets Defeat.

HAVANA, Cuba, Dec. 27.—One of the fastest races run at the present Oriental Park meeting was the concluding contest of Saturday's program, Annie Lyle running the mile and fifty yards in 1:42½, the mile being covered in 1:38½. Annie Lyle displayed a high flight of speed, and setting the pace throughout, maintained a safe advantage from start to finish. Muskallonge was second, with Bounce, the favorite, third, but seven lengths back of the second horse. Bounce was practically eliminated by getting off slowly and racing far back in the early part of the contest.

Pat Stanton's Under Fire gelding, Nimrod, broke his streak of winning races when he was soundly beaten in the three-quarters handicap this afternoon. Nimrod was asked to concede lumps of weight to his opponents, and failed. In the early stages he showed keen speed, but after he had gone a half mile collapsed, and was beaten off by Variation. Danger Cross finished three lengths in front of Nimrod, which just managed to last long enough to beat Rough and Ready a head for third. The pace was a fast one from the start, the three-quarters being run in 1:12, the fastest time of the meeting.

Racing conditions were ideal and a large crowd turned out to witness the sport. Many new arrivals were noticeable.

Eleven well-matched horses made up the field that went to the post in the first and a stirring contest resulted. The winner turned up in Blue Dale, which beat out Gold Crump by a neck after a long, hard stretch drive. St. Faust, the favorite, began slowly and was shuffled back in the scramble for positions which came after the start, but closed a big gap and was going much the fastest at the finish.

Louise Wagner made a runaway of the second race. Eames sent her to the front when the start came and after opening up an easy lead took her in hand and raced her under slight restraint the remainder of the way.

Little Smile was an easy winner in the third race and made all the pace. He led Tom Saunders two lengths and a half at the end. The latter just managed to get up in time to beat Richard Murray by a nose for second place.

RECALLS FAMOUS SALE

Speculation as to Probable Disposition of Belmont Horses.

Revives Memories of Record-Breaking Dispersal of His Father's Thoroughbreds.

NEW YORK, N. Y., Dec. 27.—Speculation as to the probable disposition of the breeding stud and racing stable of the late Major August Belmont revives memories of the dispersal sale of his father's bloodstock in 1890 and 1891 when 131 head brought a total of \$630,450, of which the brood mares and weanlings were responsible for \$270,000; the yearlings, \$119,450; the stallions, \$117,400, and the horses in training, \$123,600.

It was a world's record and American breeders and fanciers united in paying a tribute to the ripe judgment responsible for the acquisition of such a superb aggregation of thoroughbreds. The previous record was that of Lord Falmouth in England in 1884, when 79 head brought approximately \$559,400 in our money, when that famous breeder's horses went to the auction block after his death.

The outcome of the Belmont sale, which had occupied three days—the race horses having been sold at Babylon on December 27, 1890, the brood mares and weanlings at the Hunts Point paddocks of Tattersalls of New York and the stallions and yearlings at the city repository of the same company—challenged the attention of bloodstock breeders and turfmen everywhere, giving foreigners a knowledge of the quality of American horses and of the substantiality of the racing fabric of the United States.

While the sale was a success from every standpoint, there is little doubt that the race horses and yearlings, sold at Babylon, would have brought higher prices had the weather been favorable, and William Easton, officiating as auctioneer, as he did at the sales on October 16 and 17, instead of Col. S. D. Bruce. A heavy snowstorm kept many away from the Babylon offering and that sale will always be remembered for the bargains secured by those who braved the stinging blasts of December in order to be present.

NOTED HORSES SOLD.

Among the lots sold on that occasion were Potomac and La Tosca, by St. Blaise, the former out of Susquehanna, by Leamington, and the latter from the French dam Touques, by Monarque. They were the best colt and filly of the year and had given Mr. Belmont great joy in the closing days of his life by winning the richest prizes of the year. Potomac had taken the record Futurity of all time and La Tosca had won the Fashion, Belles, Select, and July Stakes. Raceland had won the Suburban Handicap and other prizes of note in the maroon and scarlet, and the gallant little Prince Royal, so dear to the heart of his owner and breeder, had finished first in five important races.

It is a matter of history that Potomac, bid in for \$25,000 by Michael F. Dwyer, won the Realization Stakes and other great races and retired with \$115,885 to his credit. La Tosca, bought for \$13,000 by the Hough Brothers, won thirteen races for them as a three-year-old and three more for the Rancocas Stable, Mr. Lorillard having acquired her in September. Her earnings exceeded \$20,000. Raceland, sold to M. F. Dwyer for \$7,000, went on to still greater conquests and when he retired had placed \$116,391 opposite his name. Prince Royal, bought by Philip J. Dwyer, won much more than the \$5,600 he cost, and the same is true of practically every one of the horses in training sold on December 27th at the farm.

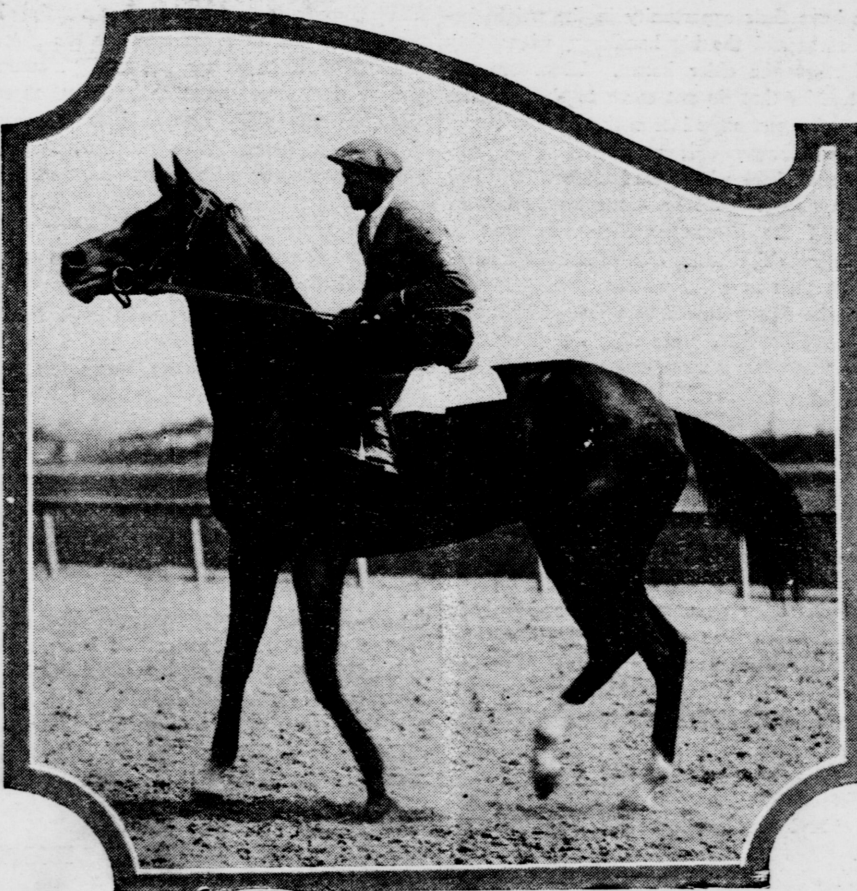
HIS HIGHNESS INCLUDED.

Conspicuous among the yearlings offered on the same day was His Highness, by The Ill Used, from the noted English mare, Princess, by Great Tom. James Rowe was his purchaser at \$3,400, but the colt raced as the property of Gideon & Daly. He captured the great stakes of the turf, including the Futurity as a two-year-old and retired with a record of having won \$113,080.

Another juvenile in the same lot to achieve fame was St. Florian, by St. Blaise—Fen Follet, by Kingfisher. He cost Messrs. J. A. and A. H. Morris, \$8,600 and was the highest priced yearling of the sale. His winnings at two and three totaled more than \$50,000. He began the year of 1891 with five straight victories and won five out of six starts at three. Victory, by Frag—Viola, by Kisber, bought by William Lakeland for \$4,600, was a stake colt at two, when he defeated His Highness at even weight in the Double Event, while Fidelio, Regina, Tarantella, Caliph, St. Carolus, St. Mark, Bel Demonio, Schuykill and King Cadmus all won races. Magnolia, by The Ill Used—Magnetism, bought by Baron Leopold de Rothschild for \$5,100, gave the sale a sen-

Here and There
on the Turf

Discussing Prize Money.
Three-Year-Old Dominance.
How Old Horses Failed.
Division a Wise One.

From time to time there has been complaint that in this country there were altogether too many rich prizes for the two-year-olds in comparison with the prizes for the older horses. It was set forth, and with excellent reasoning, that the preponderance of money hung up for the two-year-olds made it well-nigh imperative for trainers to unduly race the young thoroughbreds, frequently to their early undoing. It was given as one of the reasons for the failure of the American thoroughbred being as long wearing a horse as those of some other countries.

In this connection it is interesting to look over the prizes of 1924. This would indicate that the juveniles by no means monopolized the big prizes, though it is admitted that the three International Specials, in which Epinard took part, favored the score for the older divisions in an unusual manner.

Of the thirty-nine prizes that had a net value to the winner of \$10,000 or a greater amount there were eight that were in excess of \$40,000 in value and four of the eight that had a value in excess of \$50,000. The greatest prize of the year was the Futurity at Belmont Park, in which the two-year-old Mother Goose earned \$65,730 for H. P. Whitney, but that was the lone two-year-old fixture that reached a figure in excess of \$50,000. There were two races of the next four, or the \$40,000 races, that were for the young thoroughbreds. These were the Pimlico Futurity, in which Marshall Field III's Stimulus earned \$49,720 (almost \$50,000), and the Hopeful at Saratoga, in which William Daniel's Master Charlie was winner of \$48,700.

In the next list of prizes that exceeded \$20,000 in net value eight are found and only one of them was a juvenile prize. That was the Kentucky Jockey Club Stakes, which was worth \$26,010 and also won by Master Charlie.

On through the list it is found that of the thirty-nine races that were worth \$10,000 or a greater amount, an even dozen of them were for the juveniles; a like number of the three-year-olds and for the remaining fifteen horses of a more mature age were also eligible. This is how the money was divided in the big prizes under discussion: The juveniles received a total of \$289,119; three-year-olds, \$296,655; races in which older horses were eligible, \$326,450.

The International Specials accounted for \$113,250 in the older division, while the Brook Steeplechase, worth \$10,375 and won by Joseph E. Widener's Duettiste, is also included in that list. Taking away the International Specials it would bring that prize money down to \$213,200, which would give the other age divisions a decided advantage. The International Specials are not a part of the regular prizes and in figuring the money division they do not belong.

Thus it will be readily seen that the juveniles did not enjoy as big an advantage as is popularly supposed, even though the Futurity at Belmont Park, with its immense value gave that age division a big lead over the others.

There is no doubt but the best prizes should come for the three-year-old division, but it must also be remembered that the three-year-

olds have their opportunity in the weight-for-age races and the big handicaps, where they will meet the older horses. These are opportunities that do not come to the juveniles except in some cases late in the fall.

The three-year-olds were particularly successful in 1924 when raced against the older horses and it must be remembered that all three of the International Specials went to that age division when Wise Counselor, Ladkin and Sarazen were the winners.

Of the fifteen stakes to which older horses were eligible there were only six older than three years that were returned winners. These were Runstar, Chaclet, My Play, Little Chief, Actuary and Duettiste. Thus it is shown that the three-year-olds dominated that age division.

As a matter of fact, the aggregate of money won in these prizes by horses more than three years old was only \$115,604, leaving the three-year-olds to account for \$210,810 of the \$326,450 total.

It was rather an unusual year and early in the season it was apparent that the three-year-olds would dominate the handicap division, but the opportunity is always there for the three-year-olds and the figures disclose that of the thirty-nine big prizes which reached a total of \$912,224 the three-year-olds accounted for \$507,465. The juveniles earned \$289,119 and the older horses had to be content with \$115,640.

It is well that the three-year-olds should have the best money-earning opportunity, but it must always be kept in mind that they have the older division to which they are eligible, as well as the races that are exclusively for their age.

Whisk Broom II, or some other sturdy old campaigner that bars the way for the three-year-olds in the handicaps, but hardly a season goes by that there is not to be found three-year-olds well qualified to take the measure of the older horses. The season coming to a close was an exception and we may not see another like it in some time. The older division was woefully weak, but the opportunity is always there, and after all that is what is to be desired.

Summing it all up the conviction is forced that it is altogether a wise distribution of the prize money. The older horses had full opportunity, but they were not of a quality to withstand the winning march of the three-year-olds. The juveniles were bountifully treated, but their prizes were not out of proportion with the other age divisions.

The International Specials threw the prizes just a bit out of plumb, but even eliminating those unusual races no fault can be found with the division of the prize money. These Specials gave the older horses their best opportunity to prove their worth against the best, but they lacked the quality. But it was not only there they were lacking in quality, as was shown in the various other prizes in which they were beaten by those of the younger division.

Munro's instructions from the owner were to keep within five feet of the inside rail and save ground all the way. He disobeyed the orders and messed the horse all about during the running of the race and finished third.

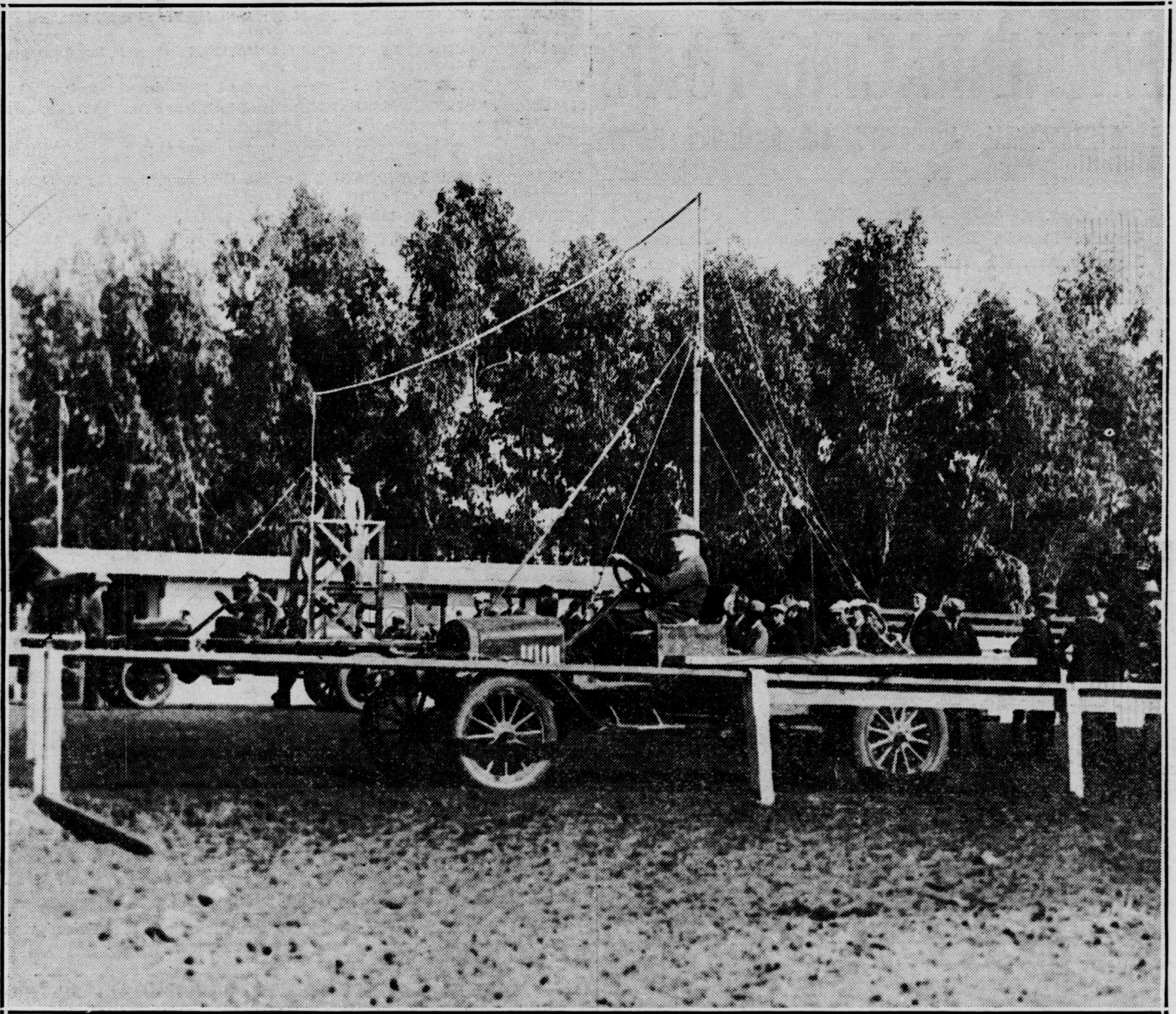

MARSHALL CASSIDY'S NEW STARTING DEVICE



The gate and trucks on which it is mounted in position. The starter's platform is mounted on the outside truck. Starter controls the speed, stopping and starting of trucks, chauffeurs only guiding them. Gate itself is same as gates now in use. Outside truck may be speeded up rounding turns. Horses line up just after post parade and walk behind the webbing to the starting point and are started without pausing for a standing break. Starter uses his own judgment as to how close to actual starting point horses shall be started, but within forty to twenty-five feet of the post.

W. M. Cain's Elemental furnished the upset of the fifth race in which she beat Julia M. in handy fashion, with the J. Arthur filly having no difficulty leading Lady Boss in second place and Pete the Scribe following. Pete the Scribe was accorded heavy backing just before post-time, but he showed poor form after a slow send-off and a weak ride.

A somewhat better class of platers met in the final race and it furnished a spectacular contest, the field of six starters racing compactly for most of the way and in the drive that followed, Colored Boy managed to outstay Llewellyn. Dorius, after appearing to have a winning chance, began tiring in the last eighth, but retained third place. Colored Boy was an equal favorite with Llewellyn and both absorbed most of the betting attention of the race. Dorius was claimed by M. J. Cooke at a cost of \$2,000

timental touch as Mr. Belmont had made importations from the Rothschild stud at frequent intervals.

It was good judgment on the part of the executors of the estate to postpone the sale of the other holdings until the autumn, when the foals had been weaned. The Hunts Point paddocks were thronged when the sale began on the morning of October 17. The Haggin, Sanford, Lorillard, Young, Daly, Ruppert, Reed, Morris, Fleischmann and other breeders from all parts of the Union taking part in a way that made previous records for bloodstock look commonplace. Representatives of the Belmont Brothers—August Perry and O. H. P.—were also after some of the choice mares whose names were linked with the history of the Nursery Stud.

General Stephen Sanford of Amsterdam gave \$20,500 for Viola, by Kisber, dam of Victory; the late Major Belmont bought the nineteen-year-old Princess for \$14,100; O. H. P. Belmont paid \$13,600 for the eighteen-year-old Susquehanna, by Leamington, that had thrown Potomac, while General Sanford secured Lady Primrose, by The Ill Used, for \$13,000. Other sales were \$12,100 for Fides, by The Ill Used, which fell to the bid of August Belmont; \$10,500 for the twenty-three-year-old Touques, by Monarque, dam of La Tosca, which fell to the bid of James Rowe, and \$8,300 for Filette, by Kingfisher, dam of Fides, which was taken by the Messrs. Morris.

The competition for the stallions and yearlings the night of the seventeenth was equally as keen. Those who were present on that occasion will never forget the picture, as the Derby winner St. Blaise, then in his eleventh year, entered the sales ring. The arena resembled a first night at the opera. Men and women in evening dress surrounded the ring in which the animals were paraded, while the gallery was fringed with eager faces. William Easton, than whom there was never a more finished auctioneer, drunk with the success of the previous day, was at his scintillating best.

As the gorgeous horse halted for a moment to give back the admiring glances that were his due as a Derby winner, as a sire

and as a superb individual, the throng broke into a salvo of applause. The horse plunged affrightedly and Mr. Easton begged for silence lest the animal should harm himself. When quiet was restored St. Blaise stood like a statue, the light glistening on the iridescent gold of his coat.

Accounts differ as to the manner of bidding on St. Blaise. Some say the first offer was \$25,000, but \$50,000 was bid in almost the same breath and the echo had not died away when Charlie Reed, noted soldier of fortune and owner of the Fairview Stud, half rose in his chair and called: "One hundred thousand dollars!"

Mr. Reed's course had been carefully planned. He knew that half a dozen breeders wanted the horse and as he subsequently remarked, he "earthquaked" them by going to the limit of what he considered the horse was worth at a single bid. It was characteristic of the man and his calling. Magnetizer, the best of the other sires, went to Thomas W. Shreve for \$16,000.

The order of sale had been personally arranged by the late chairman of the Jockey Club, and he sent the chestnut colt by St. Blaise, out of Lady Primrose, into the ring after the stallions. This youngster sold for \$30,000 to Jacob Ruppert of New York. James Rowe, who had trained the Belmont horses for several years, paid \$11,000 and \$10,000, respectively, for a bay filly by The Ill Used—Lady Rosebery and a bay filly by St. Blaise—Clara. Foxhall P. Keene gave \$10,000 for the chestnut colt by St. Blaise—Bella Donna, that subsequently raced as St. Leonards. There were numerous purchases between \$3,000 and \$7,000, and a distribution of the material to nearly every breeding center in the Union.

Stake and purse awards were much more meagre in 1890 than today. It is a safe prediction that an equally well-bred consignment of blood stock would sell for more at this time.

What the holdings of the late Major Belmont would bring, should the executors decide to offer them en bloc, is a matter of surmise. There is much that is most desirable in the way of racing material, with Ordinance and Ladkin the bright particular stars of the older horses and half a dozen potential luminaries among the juveniles. Most of them carry the blood of those that made history a generation ago in the Nursery Stud.

The decision of the executors will be awaited with interest.
