EPIDEMIC OF COUGHING

Trainers at Lexington Busy Combating Spread of Disease.

Two-Year-Olds Affected Most By Illness—Derby and Oaks Candidates in Workouts.

LEXINGTON, Ky., April 11.—Further spread of the epidemic of coughing among the younger horses, together with prevailing adverse track conditions, resulted in diminished training activity at the track of the Kentucky Association this morning.

The sickness, a sort of laryngitis, now is engaging most of the attention of the horse-men who already have launched a concerted attack against its further spread. While it is not regarded as a serious disorder, it is sufficiently severe to cause a temperature and horse-men are experiencing success in combating it by suspending the entire exercise and training programs of the afflicted.

Although some older thoroughbreds are reported down with the same ailment, two-year-olds have proven decidedly more susceptible to the germ and the past few days have witnessed an enormous reduction in the number of youngsters put through training paces. All of the larger stables report a large percentage of the two-year-olds suffering from the sickness.

Horsemen and veterinarians, however, are confident that the full force of the epidemic will be over in a day or two and that the afflicted will mend rapidly, particularly so, if the fair weather that developed this afternoon prevails for the coming few days.

This morning's training featured some useful trials by three-year-olds and older performers over the mud soaked track. Derby and Oaks candidates were prominent among the racers that figured in the better trials.

HERRICK IMPRESSES.

R. S. Clark's Herrick, which is taking his preparation most impressively, was given another gallop of three-quarters by trainer Jack Bauer and appears a very likely Derby starter, and was timed in 1:25 and breezed throughout under extremely stout restraint. He finished the quarter in :28 and the half in :56.

J. C. Milam's Scarlet Brigade, a Derby eligible and winner of two of his five races as a two-year-old, was breezed a very slow three-eighths in :45 and may do something more strenuous later. Lucky Hit, his older stable companion, breezed three-quarters in 1:28% and gave further evidence that he is coming back to competition in fine fashion. Milam also indulged the numerous others in his stable and several of them, including Our Anniversary, a half sister to Pretty Run, displayed no little ability in the mud.

Last Thought and Ben Machree, both Derby eligibles, did a five-eighths move in 1:10, in company with Lancer and Minette, others in the Heatt Brothers string.

Gallaher and Combs' Oaks filly Voteres went three-quarters in 1:20, a very good move under the conditions, and C. W. Moore's Fair Lily and Confidential, working together traversed the same distance in 1:23. Lucky Xenora, another three-year-old filly was timed in 1:22% for three-quarters, and, like the former trio, went easily in hand.

READY FOR CAMDEN HANDICAP.

Brown Flash, which is expected to start in the Camden Handicap on opening day of the local meeting, under the colors of Frederick Johnson, negotiated one mile easily in 1:54. He was accompanied by Brown Brutus.

The Camden Handicap, for three-year-olds and upward, will be run over a distance of one mile and a sixteenth. It closed with fifty-seven nominations and weights for the race are due to be announced next Wednesday. William Shelley, racing secretary and handicapper is expected here Monday, when he will open his office for the registration of the horses of the numerous stables that will participate in the meeting of thirteen days.

Under the direction of S. S. Combs and T. S. Scott, vice-president and general manager, preparations for the meeting have been well advanced and they and their associates are extremely confident that with good weather the season will prove one of the best in several years.

DEPARTS FOR CHICAGO

LEXINGTON, Ky., April 11.—Leo J. Marks, owner of Le Mar Stock Farm, left today for Chicago. He is stopping off at Louisville to see the horses, including Misstep, that Mose Lowenstein is training for him at Louisville. The two-year-olds Medium and Most Unruly were returned to the farm from Louisville last week and have been gelded. When they have recovered they will be put back into training.

ADDED TO SCHOOLING LIST

DENIED TRAINING LICENSE

W. A. Crawford's Application Turned Down by Stewards of Jockey Club.

NEW YORK, N. Y., April 11.—At a meeting of the stewards of The Jockey Club held this afternoon with F. K. Sturgis in the chair, applications for trainers and jockeys' licenses, which had been passed by the license committee, were granted. The application of W. A. Crawford for a trainer's license was denied and that of George Schreiner for a jockey's license was also denied. The applications of six trainers, P. B. Codd, Frank K. Hastings, T. D. Grimes, Frank K. Matson, W. B. Mitchell, Peter Pelletieri and Joe Stern were laid on the table.

The application of James Burke for a jockey's license was also laid on the table. Tom McTaggart, who applied for a jockey's license, was tabled pending his securing satisfactory employment and the endorsement of such employer.

Earl Sande did not apply for a jockey's license to ride his own horses in New York. He was granted a trainer's license.

T. D. Grimes' application, which was tabled, was pointed out by Algernon Daingerfield as not the man who, it was said, trained for W. T. Anderson. Grimes worked for Anderson some time back, but not recently. No application was received from any one stating that they were to train for Anderson.

The applications of numerous jockeys and trainers were passed upon, and the list will be made public later. Various applications to register names were also approved.

There were present at the meeting F. K. Sturgis, William Woodward, John E. Cowdin, Joseph E. Davis, A. H. Morris, Joseph E. Widener and R. T. Wilson.

HAWTHORNE TRACK PLANS

Directors Order Number of Improvements Including Extension of Club House.

At a meeting of the Hawthorne directors, plans for this year's racing were discussed. Work on the extension of the club house will be started in the next few days. The addition will follow the line of the track to the west so that the view of the races will be unobstructed from any part of the enclosure. An additional approximate board will be built opposite the club house.

A chute at the mile and a quarter will also be installed and a permanent stall gate built. The Hawthorne Cup will be started from this chute. The chute at the three-quarters post will also be lengthened and the stalls made longer. Judge Murphy believes that a walk up start is possible from a stall gate if the approaches are long enough. This will save time. He will also watch with considerable interest the experiment of the eastern jockey clubs with the Australian webbing. A stall gate rigged with it might be the proper solution of the starting. Horses breaking through the webbing cause tedious delays. If this can be discouraged without danger to riders and horses there will be no delays at the post.

Superintendent Miller also made his first check of stall reservations. Hawthorne can now take care of 1,200 horses, not counting necessary tack and feed rooms. From present indications this will be inadequate.

Among the reservations is the stable of Earl Sande. He is going to bring twenty-two horses to Hawthorne.

TANNERY UNLUCKY COLT

LEXINGTON, Ky., April 11.—E. F. Pritchard's highly regarded two-year-old colt Tannery, continues to experience adverse luck here. Some few days ago he suffered an injury to his left foreleg while in his stall and last night sustained one to a hind leg. The injuries, however, are not regarded as serious, although the colt will not get back into competition for a few weeks at the earliest.

ANNOUNCE OHIO MEETINGS

CINCINNATI, Ohio, April 11.—According to word from E. A. Polman, a fifteen-day spring meeting will be held at Ravenna, Ohio, beginning April 18. Akron will follow with eighteen days commencing May 6, and then the plan is to move over to Wheeling, W. Va., for a sixteen-day meeting, opening on May 29.

FIRST CALL ON BARNES

BOWIE, Md., April 11.—The R. E. Potts stable has taken first call on jockey Eddie Barnes' services for the Havre de Grace meeting. His outside engagements will be made by Frank Capra.

WORKOUTS AT LOUISVILLE

Peboney and Bonoby Show Most Speed of Derby Candidates at Churchill Downs.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 11.—Trainer C. N. Lewis showed the best Derby trial of the morning over a heavy and holding track at Churchill Downs with Mrs. James B. Brown's Peboney and his own colt, Bonoby, which negotiated a mile in 1:54. The pair began at the three-quarters post after one turn of the track, jockey Froggatte being on Peboney and C. Bender on Bonoby. Peboney showed the most speed, but was restrained in the early stages to his workmate for the first three-eighths, after which he was able to keep on even terms and the pair finished out together.

The first three-eighths was covered in :38%, half in :52%, five-eighths in 1:06, and three-quarters in 1:20% and seven-eighths in 1:36%. Both colts showed a splendid trial and satisfied their trainer by their showing.

Windy-City, F. M. Grabner's Derby hope, was sent a mile in 1:55, which he negotiated handsily. George Weber was in the saddle and trainer Jake Lowenstein timed him for the first seven-eighths in the following fractions: :25%, :40%, :53%, 1:07%, 1:22%, 1:37%. This colt shows steady improvement in his trials and is not far off of showing an ambitious move.

Highway, C. C. Wright's Derby candidate, with O. Clelland in the saddle, breezed three-quarters for trainer Griner in 1:22.

Frances Milward, an Oaks candidate, went a mile in 1:57.

Roguish Eye, Karl Eitel, Amyvale, Lee Cooper, St. Ignatius, Hiram Kelly and other eligibles for the Derby were given long canters.

Uptime was sprinted three-eighths in :39% and will be given a longer trial Friday.

Mose Goldblatt was at his stable after a visit to his home in Cincinnati.

Thomas and R. J. Nash of Chicago, part owners of the Valley Lake Stable, were at the Downs to look over the horses which arrived in Louisville from New Orleans Wednesday in charge of W. Patton.

Fred Shelton purchased the three-year-old son of Omond, Junior C., from C. R. Miller, which joined the two-year-old fillies being handled by Kirby Ramsay for the Louisville turfman.

W. C. Weant reports the foaling of a chestnut colt by Sir Clarence—Virginia, at his Oakland Farm near Louisville.

PLAY FOR BLUE LARKSPUR

Tom Shaw Reports Derby Favorite Has Many Admirers—My Sis in Demand.

NEW YORK, N. Y., April 11.—The play in the future book for the Kentucky Derby is good, according to the noted club house commissioner Tom Shaw. The popular choice, Blue Larkspur, and Roguish Eye, owned by Alderman John Coughlin of Chicago, are well supported, while the flow of money for several of the outsiders caused a downward revision in the prices. Naishapur, winner of the Tijuana Derby, which opened at 25, is now 20, while Calwick, Hermitage, Lord Braedalbane, Herrick and Yam Toy have also been cut twenty points from the opening quotations.

My Sis, which has won her last two races at Bowie, attracted quite a play and her price has been cut to 200 to 1. She was quoted in the opening line at 1,000. Yam Toy is another that was cut from 1,000 to 1. Shaw took a \$1,000 commission on this one through the board at the opening quotations. He is now 200 to 1.

That this year's Derby will be monopolized by the western owned horses and those that raced in that section during the past year, is the general opinion of horsemen on the Long Island tracks. High Strung will more than likely be an absentee, while the other candidates training on Long Island tracks are not being pointed exclusively for that race. Twink, which races for Mrs. L. G. Kauffman, appears to be the main reliance of the East at present.

MORE ARRIVALS AT AURORA

AURORA, Ill., April 11.—E. E. Moar, who raced quite an extensive stable in the Chicago district last year, was an arrival from New Orleans.

Two carloads arrived from New Orleans containing the horses of B. A. Jones, twelve; J. B. Partridge, nine; E. E. Moar, four; G. P. Sherman, three; J. Bailyon, one, and O. Viau, two. All unloaded in first class condition with the exception of the useful old plater Bolton.

Ex-jockey J. J. Roberts motored in from Tijuana. He reports his horses to be on the way and expected them to arrive in a day or so.

UNBLEMISHED RECORD

Sand Fiddler Adds Bowie Kindergarten Stakes to Victories.

Portsur Second and Wild Apple Third—Cold Weather Fails to Affect Attendance.

BOWIE, Md., April 11.—I. B. Bradford's unbeaten juvenile, Sand Fiddler, added the Bowie Kindergarten Stakes to his score when he was winner over L. Bennett's Portsur, with R. W. Carter's Wild Apple beating Mrs. E. Trueman's Kai-Lo, a stablemate for third. The race had a net value of \$1,900 to the winner and the son of Dunlin gave an excellent exhibition of speed when he ran the distance in :48%.

There was the bite of winter in the air, but this did not prevent a surprisingly large attendance and the sport furnished was excellent. In the Kindergarten Stakes, H. P. Whitney's Swatter was withdrawn, leaving nine to start and it was generally agreed that Sand Fiddler was best of the lot.

Though leaving from the inside stall, the least desirable at the half mile start, Legere was so alert with Sand Fiddler that he quickly had him in command. It seemed that he could go away from the others but he was content to hold that lead. Portsur ran alongside and early in the racing Ambrose had Wild Apple in third place, and going well. The Carter colt had raced outside of both Sand Fiddler and Portsur, but he was in a good position and galloping well.

FIELD HORSE WINS.

Field horses were first and second in the running of the three-quarters race for platers when E. P. Summerfield's Linen King and G. S. Harrison, Jr.'s Crasher fought it out in the order named, four lengths before Mrs. W. J. Giblin's Runanelf, with Margate a close fourth.

Runanelf was the one to set the pace and Barnes stole away into a good lead with her in the early racing. Master Sweep, from an inside position, was going well with the filly, but he did not last long and in the first quarter he began to drop back badly until he was completely out of contention.

Runanelf was still showing the way when the stretch was reached, but an eighth from home she was tiring badly and there Linen King and Crasher finished with the rush and staged a driving finish. Margate was gaining with good courage to be fourth.

Old Tester, which began his racing career under the silks of Harry F. Sinclair's Ranococas Stable, and which now performs for G. C. Winfrey, led a big field of cheap ones home in the second race. Mrs. M. Miller's Paulina L. raced to second place, with H. G. Bedwell's Cudgeller closing a big gap to save third from the Ascot Stable's Fire Watch.

It was a good start and Clock Golf was more alert than the others, rushing into a long early lead and Kaffa and Reigh Shot were leading the others. Tester raced along in the middle of the dozen which started, while Cudgeller was slow to find his racing legs and was far back.

CLOCK GOLF TIRES.

Clock Golf held his command until well into the stretch, where he began to tire badly and there was a general closing up back of him. Tester had been steadily working his way up and in that last eighth drew away readily to be home the winner by something more than two lengths. Paulina L. also finished well to be second, while Cudgeller resolutely fought his way through, after meeting considerable interference, to save the short end of the purse.

Fire Watch was right at the heels of the Bedwell plater and then came Clock Golf, which had quit after his flash of early speed that carried him along so impressively for five of the six furlongs.

G. Gross' useful old mare Fair Rowena, was winner of the one mile and an eighth race, for platers, that was the third offering, but it was largely because of the senseless ride of Quattlebaum, on Mrs. J. B. Boyle's Red Spider, that she was winner instead of being second.

With no idea of pace, Quattlebaum rushed Red Spider along all the way and never giving him a chance to take a long breath, had him beaten a head by the mare. Third went to C. R. Fleischmann's Yachtsman. From a good start Quattlebaum went away with Red Spider as though in a five-eighths dash. Merida went after him and when she showed a good flight of speed, the result was that the pair of them drew many lengths away in the run down the back stretch.

In the meantime, Fair Rowena was being rated along with intelligence by Robertson, and she was gradually making up ground. Erin Go Bragh had been running along in third place, but he soon tired, as did Merida, and then it was that Fair Rowena loomed up as a menace. Quattlebaum, after having disposed of the sprinting opposition, continued to send Red Spider along, for no good reason,

Kentucky Derby Thirty-Fifth Running 1909

Wintergreen.

The winner of the thirty-fifth running of the Kentucky Derby was Wintergreen, ridden by Vincent Powers, now a successful trainer of steeplechasers. Wintergreen was owned by Rome Respass. He was bred in Ohio, being a son of the great Dick Welles, and the only horse foaled in the Buckeye state to win the coveted race.

EPIDEMIC OF COUGHING

Trainers at Lexington Busy Combating Spread of Disease.

Two-Year-Olds Affected Most By Illness—Derby and Oaks Candidates in Workouts.

LEXINGTON, Ky., April 11.—Further spread of the epidemic of coughing among the younger horses, together with prevailing adverse track conditions, resulted in diminished training activity at the track of the Kentucky Association this morning.

The sickness, a sort of laryngitis, now is engaging most of the attention of the horse-men who already have launched a concerted attack against its further spread. While it is not regarded as a serious disorder, it is sufficiently severe to cause a temperature and horse-men are experiencing success in combating it by suspending the entire exercise and training programs of the afflicted.

Although some older thoroughbreds are reported down with the same ailment, two-year-olds have proven decidedly more susceptible to the germ and the past few days have witnessed an enormous reduction in the number of youngsters put through training paces. All of the larger stables report a large percentage of the two-year-olds suffering from the sickness.

Horsemen and veterinarians, however, are confident that the full force of the epidemic will be over in a day or two and that the afflicted will mend rapidly, particularly so, if the fair weather that developed this afternoon prevails for the coming few days.

This morning's training featured some useful trials by three-year-olds and older performers over the mud soaked track. Derby and Oaks candidates were prominent among the racers that figured in the better trials.

HERRICK IMPRESSES.

R. S. Clark's Herrick, which is taking his preparation most impressively, was given another gallop of three-quarters by trainer Jack Bauer and appears a very likely Derby starter, and was timed in 1:25 and breezed throughout under extremely stout restraint. He finished the quarter in :28 and the half in :56.

J. C. Milam's Scarlet Brigade, a Derby eligible and winner of two of his five races as a two-year-old, was breezed a very slow three-eighths in :45 and may do something more strenuous later. Lucky Hit, his older stable companion, breezed three-quarters in 1:28% and gave further evidence that he is coming back to competition in fine fashion. Milam also indulged the numerous others in his stable and several of them, including Our Anniversary, a half sister to Pretty Run, displayed no little ability in the mud.

Last Thought and Ben Machree, both Derby eligibles, did a five-eighths move in 1:10, in company with Lancer and Minette, others in the Heatt Brothers string.

Gallaher and Combs' Oaks filly Voteres went three-quarters in 1:20, a very good move under the conditions, and C. W. Moore's Fair Lily and Confidential, working together traversed the same distance in 1:23. Lucky Xenora, another three-year-old filly was timed in 1:22% for three-quarters, and, like the former trio, went easily in hand.

READY FOR CAMDEN HANDICAP.

Brown Flash, which is expected to start in the Camden Handicap on opening day of the local meeting, under the colors of Frederick Johnson, negotiated one mile easily in 1:54. He was accompanied by Brown Brutus.

The Camden Handicap, for three-year-olds and upward, will be run over a distance of one mile and a sixteenth. It closed with fifty-seven nominations and weights for the race are due to be announced next Wednesday. William Shelley, racing secretary and handicapper is expected here Monday, when he will open his office for the registration of the horses of the numerous stables that will participate in the meeting of thirteen days.

Under the direction of S. S. Combs and T. S. Scott, vice-president and general manager, preparations for the meeting have been well advanced and they and their associates are extremely confident that with good weather the season will prove one of the best in several years.

DEPARTS FOR CHICAGO

LEXINGTON, Ky., April 11.—Leo J. Marks, owner of Le Mar Stock Farm, left today for Chicago. He is stopping off at Louisville to see the horses, including Misstep, that Mose Lowenstein is training for him at Louisville. The two-year-olds Medium and Most Unruly were returned to the farm from Louisville last week and have been gelded. When they have recovered they will be put back into training.

ADDED TO SCHOOLING LIST

BOWIE, Md., April 11.—False Colors and Nellie Basil have been added to starter Milton's schooling list.

DENIED TRAINING LICENSE

W. A. Crawford's Application Turned Down by Stewards of Jockey Club.

NEW YORK, N. Y., April 11.—At a meeting of the stewards of The Jockey Club held this afternoon with F. K. Sturgis in the chair, applications for trainers and jockeys' licenses, which had been passed by the license committee, were granted. The application of W. A. Crawford for a trainer's license was denied and that of George Schreiner for a jockey's license was also denied. The applications of six trainers, P. B. Codd, Frank K. Hastings, T. D. Grimes, Frank K. Matson, W. E. Mitchell, Peter Pelletieri and Joe Stern were laid on the table.

The application of James Burke for a jockey's license was also laid on the table. Tom McTaggart, who applied for a jockey's license, was tabled pending his securing satisfactory employment and the endorsement of such employer.

Earl Sande did not apply for a jockey's license to ride his own horses in New York. He was granted a trainer's license.

T. D. Grimes' application, which was tabled, was pointed out by Algernon Daingerfield as not the man who, it was said, trained for W. T. Anderson. Grimes worked for Anderson some time back, but not recently. No application was received from any one stating that they were to train for Anderson.

The applications of numerous jockeys and trainers were passed upon, and the list will be made public later. Various applications to register names were also approved.

There were present at the meeting F. K. Sturgis, William Woodward, John E. Cowdin, Joseph E. Davis, A. H. Morris, Joseph E. Widener and R. T. Wilson.

HAWTHORNE TRACK PLANS

Directors Order Number of Improvements Including Extension of Club House.

At a meeting of the Hawthorne directors, plans for this year's racing were discussed. Work on the extension of the club house will be started in the next few days. The addition will follow the line of the track to the west so that the view of the races will be unobstructed from any part of the enclosure. An additional approximate board will be built opposite the club house.

A chute at the mile and a quarter will also be installed and a permanent stall gate built. The Hawthorne Cup will be started from this chute. The chute at the three-quarters post will also be lengthened and the stalls made longer. Judge Murphy believes that a walk up start is possible from a stall gate if the approaches are long enough. This will save time. He will also watch with considerable interest the experiment of the eastern jockey clubs with the Australian webbing. A stall gate rigged with it might be the proper solution of the starting. Horses breaking through the webbing cause tedious delays. If this can be discouraged without danger to riders and horses there will be no delays at the post.

Superintendent Miller also made his first check of stall reservations. Hawthorne can now take care of 1,200 horses, not counting necessary tack and feed rooms. From present indications this will be inadequate.

Among the reservations is the stable of Earl Sande. He is going to bring twenty-two horses to Hawthorne.

TANNERY UNLUCKY COLT

LEXINGTON, Ky., April 11.—E. F. Pritchard's highly regarded two-year-old colt Tannery, continues to experience adverse luck here. Some few days ago he suffered an injury to his left foreleg while in his stall and last night sustained one to a hind leg. The injuries, however, are not regarded as serious, although the colt will not get back into competition for a few weeks at the earliest.

ANNOUNCE OHIO MEETINGS

CINCINNATI, Ohio, April 11.—According to word from E. A. Polman, a fifteen-day spring meeting will be held at Ravenna, Ohio, beginning April 18. Akron will follow with eighteen days commencing May 6, and then the plan is to move over to Wheeling, W. Va., for a sixteen-day meeting, opening on May 29.

FIRST CALL ON BARNES

BOWIE, Md., April 11.—The R. E. Potts stable has taken first call on jockey Eddie Barnes' services for the Havre de Grace meeting. His outside engagements will be made by Frank Capra.

WORKOUTS AT LOUISVILLE

Peboney and Bonoby Show Most Speed of Derby Candidates at Churchill Downs.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., April 11.—Trainer C. N. Lewis showed the best Derby trial of the morning over a heavy and holding track at Churchill Downs with Mrs. James B. Brown's Peboney and his own colt, Bonoby, which negotiated a mile in 1:54. The pair began at the three-quarters post after one turn of the track, jockey Froggatte being on Peboney and C. Bender on Bonoby. Peboney showed the most speed, but was restrained in the early stages to his workmate for the first three-eighths, after which he was able to keep on even terms and the pair finished out together.

The first three-eighths was covered in :38%, half in :52%, five-eighths in 1:06, and three-quarters in 1:20% and seven-eighths in 1:36%. Both colts showed a splendid trial and satisfied their trainer by their showing.

Windy-City, F. M. Grabner's Derby hope, was sent a mile in 1:55, which he negotiated handsly. George Weber was in the saddle and trainer Jake Lowenstein timed him for the first seven-eighths in the following fractions: :25%, :40%, :53%, 1:07%, 1:22%, 1:37%. This colt shows steady improvement in his trials and is not far off of showing an ambitious move.

Highway, C. C. Wright's Derby candidate, with O. Clelland in the saddle, breezed three-quarters for trainer Griner in 1:22.

Frances Milward, an Oaks candidate, went a mile in 1:57.

Roguish Eye, Karl Eitel, Amyvale, Lee Cooper, St. Ignatius, Hiram Kelly and other eligibles for the Derby were given long canter.

Uptime was sprinted three-eighths in :39% and will be given a longer trial Friday.

Mose Goldblatt was at his stable after a visit to his home in Cincinnati.

Thomas and R. J. Nash of Chicago, part owners of the Valley Lake Stable, were at the Downs to look over the horses which arrived in Louisville from New Orleans Wednesday in charge of W. Patton.

Fred Shelton purchased the three-year-old son of Omond, Junior C., from C. R. Miller, which joined the two-year-old fillies being handled by Kirby Ramsay for the Louisville turfman.

W. C. Weant reports the foaling of a chestnut colt by Sir Clarence—Virginia, at his Oakland Farm near Louisville.

PLAY FOR BLUE LARKSPUR

Tom Shaw Reports Derby Favorite Has Many Admirers—My Sis in Demand.

NEW YORK, N. Y., April 11.—The play in the future book for the Kentucky Derby is good, according to the noted club house commissioner Tom Shaw. The popular choice, Blue Larkspur, and Roguish Eye, owned by Alderman John Coughlin of Chicago, are well supported, while the flow of money for several of the outsiders caused a downward revision in the prices. Naishapur, winner of the Tijuana Derby, which opened at 25, is now 20, while Calwick, Hermitage, Lord Braedalbane, Herrick and Yam Toy have also been cut twenty points from the opening quotations.

My Sis, which has won her last two races at Bowie, attracted quite a play and her price has been cut to 200 to 1. She was quoted in the opening line at 1,000. Yam Toy is another that was cut from 1,000 to 1. Shaw took a \$1,000 commission on this one through the board at the opening quotations. He is now 200 to 1.

That this year's Derby will be monopolized by the western owned horses and those that raced in that section during the past year, is the general opinion of horsemen on the Long Island tracks. High Strung will more than likely be an absentee, while the other candidates training on Long Island tracks are not being pointed exclusively for that race. Twink, which races for Mrs. L. G. Kauffman, appears to be the main reliance of the East at present.

MORE ARRIVALS AT AURORA

AURORA, Ill., April 11.—E. E. Moar, who raced quite an extensive stable in the Chicago district last year, was an arrival from New Orleans.

Two carloads arrived from New Orleans containing the horses of B. A. Jones, twelve; J. B. Partridge, nine; E. E. Moar, four; G. P. Sherman, three; J. Bailyon, one, and O. Viau, two. All unloaded in first class condition with the exception of the useful old plater Bolton.

Ex-jockey J. J. Roberts motored in from Tijuana. He reports his horses to be on the way and expected them to arrive in a day or so.

UNBLEMISHED RECORD

Sand Fiddler Adds Bowie Kindergarten Stakes to Victories.

Portsur Second and Wild Apple Third—Cold Weather Fails to Affect Attendance.

BOWIE, Md., April 11.—I. B. Bradford's unbeaten juvenile, Sand Fiddler, added the Bowie Kindergarten Stakes to his score when he was winner over L. Bennett's Portsur, with R. W. Carter's Wild Apple beating Mrs. E. Trueman's Kai-Lo, a stablemate for third. The race had a net value of \$1,900 to the winner and the son of Dunlin gave an excellent exhibition of speed when he ran the distance in :48%.

There was the bite of winter in the air, but this did not prevent a surprisingly large attendance and the sport furnished was excellent. In the Kindergarten Stakes, H. P. Whitney's Swatter was withdrawn, leaving nine to start and it was generally agreed that Sand Fiddler was best of the lot.

Though leaving from the inside stall, the least desirable at the half mile start, Legere was so alert with Sand Fiddler that he quickly had him in command. It seemed that he could go away from the others but he was content to hold that lead. Portsur ran alongside and early in the racing Ambrose had Wild Apple in third place, and going well. The Carter colt had raced outside of both Sand Fiddler and Portsur, but he was in a good position and galloping well.

FIELD HORSE WINS.

Field horses were first and second in the running of the three-quarters race for platers when E. P. Summerfield's Linen King and G. S. Harrison, Jr.'s Crasher fought it out in the order named, four lengths before Mrs. W. J. Giblin's Runanelf, with Margate a close fourth.

Runanelf was the one to set the pace and Barnes stole away into a good lead with her in the early racing. Master Sweep, from an inside position, was going well with the filly, but he did not last long and in the first quarter he began to drop back badly until he was completely out of contention.

Runanelf was still showing the way when the stretch was reached, but an eighth from home she was tiring badly and there Linen King and Crasher finished with the rush and staged a driving finish. Margate was gaining with good courage to be fourth.

Old Tester, which began his racing career under the silks of Harry F. Sinclair's Ranococas Stable, and which now performs for G. C. Winfrey, led a big field of cheap ones home in the second race. Mrs. M. Miller's Paulina L. raced to second place, with H. G. Bedwell's Cudgeller closing a big gap to save third from the Ascot Stable's Fire Watch.

It was a good start and Clock Golf was more alert than the others, rushing into a long early lead and Kaffa and Reigh Shot were leading the others. Tester raced along in the middle of the dozen which started, while Cudgeller was slow to find his racing legs and was far back.

CLOCK GOLF TIRES.

Clock Golf held his command until well into the stretch, where he began to tire badly and there was a general closing up back of him. Tester had been steadily working his way up and in that last eighth drew away readily to be home the winner by something more than two lengths. Paulina L. also finished well to be second, while Cudgeller resolutely fought his way through, after meeting considerable interference, to save the short end of the purse.

Fire Watch was right at the heels of the Bedwell plater and then came Clock Golf, which had quit after his flash of early speed that carried him along so impressively for five of the six furlongs.

G. Gross' useful old mare Fair Rowena, was winner of the one mile and an eighth race, for platers, that was the third offering, but it was largely because of the senseless ride of Quattlebaum, on Mrs. J. B. Boyle's Red Spider, that she was winner instead of being second.

With no idea of pace, Quattlebaum rushed Red Spider along all the way and never giving him a chance to take a long breath, had him beaten a head by the mare. Third went to C. R. Fleischmann's Yachtsman. From a good start Quattlebaum went away with Red Spider as though in a five-eighths dash. Merida went after him and when she showed a good flight of speed, the result was that the pair of them drew many lengths away in the run down the back stretch.

In the meantime, Fair Rowena was being rated along with intelligence by Robertson, and she was gradually making up ground. Erin Go Bragh had been running along in third place, but he soon tired, as did Merida, and then it was that Fair Rowena loomed up as a menace. Quattlebaum, after having disposed of the sprinting opposition, continued to send Red Spider along, for no good reason,

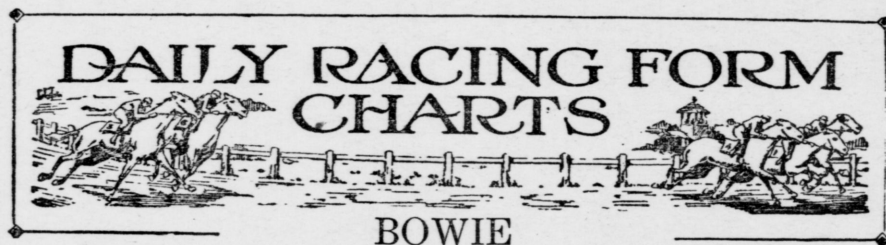

Here and There on the Turf

Many of those who did not see Tutti Frutti perform in Havana, at Miami or at Keeney Park have been inclined to scoff at the idea of his being a good horse after his sound beating in the running of the Inaugural Handicap at Bowie last Tuesday. They have condemned the son of Salpicon on that one showing and it is a bit galling to those who saw the Chilean in Florida. He may not be a great horse, but "Tony" Pascuma, who had the mount in the running of the Inaugural, has offered rather a sound alibi for the outlander. He said after the race that Tutti Frutti was pinched and carried along between horses for a considerable distance in the running and that when he found the horse had no chance, by reason of the interference, he did not persevere with him.

So convinced are those who have seen Tutti Frutti in other races that the Inaugural was not his race that they will be delighted to know that it is intended to send him to the post at Bowie Monday in a trial over a longer route. Tutti Frutti may fail again, but making every allowance for the quality of the horses that opposed him in winter racing it must be admitted that the Inaugural must be forgotten in considering his quality. It matters not the reason he did not run his race Tuesday.

Frequently too much importance is given winter performances. Too often this winter racing gives a horse a false quality, but taking all that into consideration the prediction is hazarded that should Tutti Frutti go to the post Monday, as is intended, he will be more highly considered after its running than he was after the running of the Inaugural Handicap.

It is indeed cheering news that Robert L. Gerry's High Strung was not seriously injured in his recent mishap, when he became cast in his stall. Of course, little would have been thought of such an accident to a colt of lesser importance, but anything that happens to the winner of both the Belmont Park and the Pimlico Futurities is naturally vital news of the turf. The son of High Time and Emotion came out of the accident with nothing in the way of a serious injury and he is expected to be galloping again before many days.

George Odom some time ago announced that there was no intention at this time to make special effort to have High Strung ready for either the Preakness, at Pimlico on May 10, or the Kentucky Derby to follow on May 18. That does not mean that the colt will not keep either one of the engagements, but it does mean that there will be no undue haste in preparing him.

As a matter of fact, Odom named his champion for the Paumonok Handicap of the Metropolitan Jockey Club to be run at Jamaica the opening day, April 23. He is also an eligible for the mile and seventy yards of the Wood Memorial, to be decided at the same meeting April 27. Of course, there is no assurance that High Strung will be shown in either of these engagements, but there is

also an excellent chance for his being seen under silks at Jamaica.

Saturday will see the opening of the Hunt Club season of racing when the Middleburg Hunt will conduct a day of sport at Middleburg, Va. Great preparation has been made for this racing and entries for the various events suggest racing of importance. Then the following Saturday there will come another Virginia meeting of the Deep Run Hunt Club, at Curle's Neck Farm. These two lead up to the racing of the United Hunts Racing Association, to be held at Bowman Park, near Rye, N. Y., April 20. The same day Virginia will be conducting its third meeting at Charlottesville, where the Albermarle County Hunt Club will be the host.

These early meetings give some idea of the many opportunities that will be afforded the amateurs this year. At most of these meetings the programs are arranged for the hunters and gentlemen are required to ride. The races are truly important in the progress of steeplechasing in this country, for it is absolutely essential for good steeplechasing to have good gentlemen riders and numerous chances for them to ride. INCREASE IN NOMINATIONS

Saratoga Stake Races More Popular Than Last Year.

W. R. Coe Makes One Hundred and Sixty-Three Entries—Whitney Makes One Hundred and Forty-Four.

SARATOGA SPRINGS, N. Y., April 11.—Nominations for stake races the Saratoga Association for the Improvement of the Breed of Horses will revive here next summer, in the course of a meeting that will begin July 29, to continue thirty days, are running considerably ahead of last year. For twenty-four of these stakes which closed March 5, 2,331 entries were received up to last Tuesday. There will be more. Clerk of the course, Victor E. Schaumburg, had not heard then from all sources from which entries are expected and regularly come. Last year these same races drew 2,764 nominations in 155 separate interests. This year there have been 157 nominators with every likelihood of an ultimate count of 170.

These stakes should gross about \$160,000 and pay their winners \$130,000. Ten others to be renewed during the coming meeting closed last year, among them the Hopeful, Grand Union, United States and Spinaway Stakes. Four steeplechases, the Shillelagh, Beverwyck, North American and Saratoga, will remain open until early in April. The thirty-eight should gross about \$360,000 and there will be \$240,000 to \$250,000 in overnight purses and handicaps.

Sande has his promising three-year-old maiden Hermitage, son of Friar Rock, in the Saratoga Cup, with Nearby, a daughter of Friar Rock.

Kentucky Derby Candidates

Review of Their Credentials

HOT SHOT.

This is a son of Tryster, nominated by H. P. Headley. He won two or three races in his juvenile period, the best of which was a three-quarter contest at Latonia, in which he nosed out The Choctaw. He was entered in several important races with one of the topnotchers of his division, but was not a factor with this kind.

HYPOLUXO.

He was one of the busiest of the sons of High Time last year and ran almost all the scales from first to nearly last. He won his first race at Aqueduct in June and then competed in the Tremont Stakes, finishing second to Jack High; the Whirl Stakes, in which he failed dismally; the Flash Stakes, in which he was fourth; the United States Hotel Stakes, in which he was not far out of the money; the Idle Hour Purse, in which he was second to Zoom; Grand Union Hotel Stakes, Champagne Stakes, Dobbin Purse and the Belmont Futurity Stakes. He then dropped back into lower society and won a couple of races. L. Waterbury has him in the Derby.

HEALY.

A well regarded Sir Martin colt in the G. A. Cochran stable. He graduated from the maiden class at Saratoga last July by winning the first division of the Modesty Purse, the second division of which started the imported Twink on his winning career. After this, Healy won the Champagne Stakes at Belmont Park. However, his most noteworthy performance as a two-year-old was in the Belmont Futurity in which he finished fourth. It will be recalled that High Strung set a new track record in winning this Futurity. Healy was always well up and was carrying the same weight the winner had up, 122 pounds. Healy was gaining some as the end came.

Healy made his first start of the present year in the Tijuana Derby, after making what appeared to be very satisfactory progress in his training. It was apparent that he needed more racing to fit him for a hard contest, as he tired early and dropped out of all contention after going half a mile.

HIGH STRUNG.

Champion of the two-year-old division of 1928 was he, and one of the early favorites for the Kentucky Derby. Yet High Strung was not an undefeated champion; there is one race against this great son of High Time, which runs in the colors of Marshall Field. It is the Hopeful Stakes, which was won by Jack High, an absentee from the Derby nominations.

High Strung finished seventh in the Hopeful, and these were in front of him: Jack High, Blue Larkspur, Chestnut Oak, Twink, Dr. Freeland and Needle. He was eight lengths away. It was by no means an ignominious defeat, however, as he met with repeated interference in the running of the race.

Every other race he ran he won, five victories in all, the three most important of which were the Belmont Futurity Stakes, the Oceanus Handicap, at Jamaica, and the Pimlico Futurity. His winnings amounted to \$153,590.

In not one of these races, in fact, not in any of his races, other than the Hopeful, was he ever anywhere but at the head of the procession after a few strides from the starting point. He won the Futurity Stakes by only a head, Roguish Eye and Jack High crowding him throughout, but never being able to wear him down. He had up 122 pounds, being conceded several pounds by Roguish Eye, Jack High, Blue Larkspur and several others. The Oceanus Handicap he won by a length from Chatford, and carried 123 pounds. In the Pimlico Futurity he again had up 122 pounds and won by a head from Dr. Freeland, the race being strictly between this pair.

HERRICK.

This colt, by Ambassador IV., distinguished himself by winning the Harold Stakes at Latonia last June. This was only a sprint of five and a half furlongs and gave him a chance to display his very high early speed. He did little else of note as a juvenile and has not raced during the winter.

HOST.

Host is a candidate for the Derby from the far West, being now owned by W. H. Hoffman Jr.'s R. C. Stable, but he is by no means unknown to the East and Middle West. He was bred by J. E. Madden, and it was at Hawthorne that he scored what was probably his most important victory, winning the 5,000 Grant Park Handicap. He was a starter in the Autumn Handicap with some of the best handicap horses which ran on the Illinois tracks, but was unplaced. As a three-year-old he has competed often at Tijuana with some of the best which have raced there.

Host went in the Tijuana Derby, but he never at any time cut the slightest figure in it.

IRISH.

One of W. R. Coe's candidates for the Derby and one about which little will be known until he begins active training and gets into competition in Maryland or New York races. He has started only once, and that in the first division of the Modesty Purse, for maidens—the one in which Healy graduated. Irish was third and ran a good race, though was amateurish in his behavior.

Sun Forward, Hot Toddy, Light Carbine, Le Bey, Recreation, Toro, Jock, Crystal Pennant, Royal Stranger, Distraction, Black Panther, Victorian, Honker, Flycross, Acturus and Sunfire are in the handicap, but not the Cup. Vito, Reign Count, Son o' Battle, Double Pay, Valkyr, Panther and Harry Baker are in the Cup, but not the handicap.

Three-year-olds of promise in both stakes are Jack High, Soul of Honor, Twink, High Strung, Healy, Xylophone, Friar Cliff, Chief Executive, Hustle On, Essare, Cockalorum, The Nut, Bargello, Chatford, Beacon Hill, Chatover, African, etc. Dr. Freeland, Annapolis, Hermitage, Nearby, Charles the First, Jean Valjean, Sunvir and Chicotte are in the Cup, but not the handicap. Ducat, The Worker, Rubicon, Perkins, Comstockery and Cady Hill are in the handicap, but not the Cup.

JACK HASKELL.

He defeated a right nice band of juveniles when he achieved his only victory. This was at Lincoln Fields in July. Since then some that he defeated have grown in prominence as Derby candidates, among them being Naishapur and Virado. He figured in several good races after that and in a contest at Hawthorne was favorite over Windy City and Yam Toy, but was beaten by both. He went at Saratoga in one of the races won by Roguish Eye, but was unplaced.

JEAN VALJEAN.

At the time Derby nominations closed this Stefan the Great colt, entered by J. O. Keene, was a maiden, but this is not to say that he had not shown enough to justify enormous confidence in his future. He was second to Blue Larkspur in the National Stallion Stakes, beaten only a nose and beating out Jack High, afterwards winner of the Hopeful Stakes, and others of some pretensions to class. After that he was second to Needle in the \$10,000 Johnson Stakes, at Laurel. He was shipped to Miami during the winter to be prepped for the Florida Derby, but did not start there. Is now at Bowie.

KARL EITEL.

Nominated to the Derby by J. J. Coughlin, for whom he won several races, as a two-year-old, on the Illinois tracks. His last start as a juvenile was in the Prairie State Handicap, at Lincoln Fields, which he won, defeating War Buddy, Windy City, Host and others, by a wide margin. A previous race he won was an overnight handicap at the same track, in which the good Clyde Van Dusen finished third to him. He was accorded high respect by the handicapper for the Pimlico Futurity and ran in this race with 125 pounds up, giving a good account of himself. He was gradually improving his position in this race after a slow beginning.

LANSQUENET.

His entry in the Derby shows the Paradise Stock Farm Stable very barren of good three-year-old timber. Lansquet has run a great many races, both as a two-year-old and as a three-year-old, but he has accomplished little. He competed in only one or two high-class races and failed to show anything at all. He has been beaten in a large number of ordinary races on the New Orleans tracks this winter.

LA PALOMA.

This gelding didn't develop quite up to several others in the Three D's Stable, but he gave a very good account of himself in several winter races. When trainer Durnell took Vermajo to Tijuana to go in the stakes there, he left La Paloma and Calf Roper at New Orleans. La Paloma's best winter race was his victory over Buttered Toast on a heavy track when he had 116 pounds up. He also won his last start of the winter.

LAST THOUGHT.

Was good enough to win one of the two races he ran in Kentucky last fall. This was an event for maidens over the Futurity Course at Lexington. Last Thought is by McGee and he was named for the Derby by C. W. Moore.

LEE COOPER.

A tough spot was chosen for this colt in which to make his bow to racing. It was in the Bashford Manor Stakes at Churchill Downs, a race which was won by Roguish Eye. He even had the temerity to lead this high-class field for about half the distance and, although he did not finish in the money, he beat out more than half the starters. Afterwards he was beaten only a head by High Score at Latonia and shortly thereafter broke out of the maiden class by winning a race with ease. He showed good early speed in nearly all his races.

LEUCITE.

One of the nominations of the Rancocas Stable and one whose record entitles him to some little respect. He was third in the first start he ever made and has been out of the money only twice, one of these races being the Belmont Stakes. He has carried weight up to 122 pounds and had 120 up in his first winning race.

LION HEART.

An imported colt by Gay Crusader, one of the several nominations of R. S. Clark. He made but one start as a two-year-old, this in a maiden race, and was second.

LORD BRAEDALBANE.

Made his debut into racing during the Lexington spring meeting of 1928 and soon won two races in succession. He distinguished himself at Churchill Downs by gaining a nose victory over Clyde Van Dusen when that colt was an odds-on choice and Lord Braedalbane himself was nearly 20 to 1 in the betting. He is owned by Desha Breckinridge and is the only Derby representative of that Kentuckian.

LYNN BARKLEY.

This son of Hamburg Lad has accomplished very little since he first started at Lexington. The only race he ever won, and he started in nearly a dozen as a two-year old, was during the Blue Grass Fair meeting at Lexington, when he managed to defeat a number of maidens. He was beaten far off when he went against a better grade of colts later on.

MAIDEN'S CHOICE.

Will represent a southern stable if he goes in the Derby, that of A. J. Stallings of New Orleans. He is a son of Sporting Blood and was bred by H. C. Fisher. He began his career at New Orleans early in 1928 and ran many races on the Mid-Western tracks during last summer, getting out of the maiden class at Churchill Downs in May. He was returned to New Orleans for winter racing and has been a winner there on several occasions.

MCGONIGLE.

This colt, nominated by C. H. Knebelkamp, is a son of Omar Khayyam. He graduated last July at Lincoln Fields and has been a winner many times since. He was one of the early sensations in winter racing among the candidates for the Louisiana Derby and was the first of the winter racers at New Orleans to win four successive races. This gave the southern race players visions of another Quatrain, an early Louisiana Derby winner, which became a favorite for the Kentucky Derby. McGonigle is by the sire of Quatrain and is named after a jockey who once rode successfully for Mr. Knebelkamp. He ran third in the Louisiana Derby.

OFF-DAY AT BELMONT PARK

Rain and Cold Wind Force Trainers to Confine Activity to Shed Work.

NEW YORK, N. Y., April 11.—A cold, penetrating rain, driven along by a high wind, which swept the Belmont Park course yesterday morning, placed a damper on training conditions, and forced the majority of trainers to confine their exercise operations to indoor work. Very few trials were noted, and those that were brought out, were rushed back to the shelter of the barns following the work. On the whole, they were confined to half mile gallops, and these were over the main track.

The track, which was drenched from a heavy rain during the night, was in good shape, but, as the morning wore on, became muddy and sloppy. Schooling exercise at the barrier was abandoned when no horses showed up.

There were several arrivals during the morning, among which was Andy Blakely, with the W. S. Kilmer horses from the farm at Binghamton, N. Y. Blakely brought down four horses headed by the four-year-old Sun Beau. Dark Ayr, Dark Sea, Dark Herod, Dark Mayne, Sun Scamp, Sun Roit, Sun Memory, Sun Falcon, Dark Polly, Dark Quest and Politen were others in the lot. The Kilmer horses will begin the season at Jamaica. According to reports, they are well advanced in training.

An arrival from Tijuana was George Strate, with the horses owned by R. C. Winmill. Ten were in this lot, the majority of which raced during the winter.

Trainer Earl Linnell with the R. C. Stable division numbering nine head was another arrival. Sankari, Jack Dempsey, Host, Livery, Harry Baker, Flywood, Crystal Pennant, Red Mountain and King at Arms were in the lot.

The Canyon Stable, reported to be owned by Jack Dempsey and trained by George Coburn, arrived from Tijuana and was stabled at Jamaica.

BOWIE TURF NOTES

BOWIE, Md., April 11.

Jockey L. Schaefer and apprentice R. Leischman cancelled their afternoon's engagements because of minor illness.

Linen King evidently favors the Bowie track. His victory in the opening race this afternoon was the first scored since he broke his maiden at Bowie two years ago.

There were two claims in the first race. C. F. Galeandra took Grey of Dawn from H. Hasledon, while C. E. Merritt took North America from E. K. Bryson, the claiming price in both cases was \$2,000.

Harry P. Stoddart, who was associated with the speculative department at the recent Tijuana meeting, made his first appearance of the season, as did Thomas F. Buckley, who was active in Miami racing.

Voltear and Our Sally Ann are among the additional nominations for the Prince Georges Spring Handicap, feature of Saturday's closing day program.

W. Shewbridge saddled Lady Allumeur in the absence of trainer E. Myatt, who was confined to his Baltimore home by illness.

A division of the Mrs. A. Swenke stable will be shipped to Jamaica on Sunday. The remainder are intended for competition at Havre de Grace.

F. M. Barlow, New York sportsman, who disposed of his string at the conclusion of last season's racing, made his first appearance of the meeting. He proposes gathering a stable for a summer campaign.

John McGraw, of the New York Giants, was among the clubhouse contingent.

Captain Ral Parr, the Baltimore sportsman, whose colors cut a wide swath in Maryland racing several years ago, was a spectator. His string will be seen in action at Havre de Grace.

Fred Brue, the Brooklyn turfman, is a recent arrival from Tijuana.
