

Clamor Has Ten Detroit Opponents

Field Narrowing For Californian

Six or Seven Eye \$100,000 Fixture; Swaps, Determine Seen in Sparkling Trials

HOLLYWOOD PARK, Inglewood, Calif., June 8.—The prospective field for Saturday's \$100,000 Californian, which will feature a meeting between the last two Kentucky Derby winners, Swaps and Determine, is diminishing and where 10 or more earlier in the week were expected to take part in the race, it now appears likely that there will be no more than six or seven.

Swaps, who won this year's Derby for R. C. Ellsworth, and Determine, who took it the year before for A. J. Crevolin, are now expected to be joined at the post for Saturday's run of a mile and a sixteenth by only Llangollen Farm's Mister Gus, King Ranch's Rejected, Joe W. Brown's Gigantic and Neil McCarthy's Novarullah with one or two possible additions.

The nominees for the Californian who have decided to pass up the stake are Abe Hirschberg's Berseem, Mr. and Mrs. John Eyraud's Karim, Mr. and Mrs. J. R. Clark's Spring Count, Llangollen Farm's Porterhouse, Mr. and Mrs. T. M. Kerr's Travertine and the Ellsworth Stable's Correspondent. Most of them are now being prepared for the Lake and Flowers Handicap a week later.

Swaps in Fast Six-Furlong Move

That Swaps and Determine are ready for Saturday's event they demonstrated in sparkling private trials here Tuesday. When Swaps worked three-quarters in 1:11½ during the morning training hours he was as hard held as he was when he breezed to his 12-length victory in the recent mile Will Rogers Stakes. Determine worked between races during the afternoon and he sped six panels in 1:10½, a move that was all the more impressive since he is not especially noted as a work horse.

In announcing that Mister Gus alone would represent Llangollen Farm in the Californian, trainer Charles Whittingham, also said that he has engaged the services of Johnny Longden who thus will be striking for his second win in the \$100,000 race. He took the inaugural running last year with the Crevolin Stable's Imbros who led from flag fall to finish in what then was world's record-equaling time, 1:41. Determine was second to him.

Mister Gus was second in the recent Argonaut Handicap in which Alidon set a new track mark of 1:34½ for a mile and many look for him to either set or force the pace in Saturday's race.

The prospective duel between Swaps and Determine has excited such interest that Hollywood Park anticipates a crowd of close to 60,000 this week end. So far as local turf historians can ascertain, never in the 80-year history of the Kentucky Derby has the current Derby winner met the winner of the previous year at exactly scale weights. Determine will carry 126 pounds to 115 for his younger opponent.

Under the conditions of the Californian Rejected will shoulder 120 pounds and each of the others 117.

Arcaro to Ride Polly's Jet

DELAWARE PARK, Stanton, Del., June 8.—Eddie Arcaro will make one of his annual appearances at Delaware Park to ride Barclay Stable's unbeaten Polly's Jet in the Christiana Stakes. The five furlongs test for two-year-old colts and geldings will be run on June 23.

Burke Belies Poets—Quiet Irishman Who Loves Horses

Shares Enthusiasm With Wife Jan; Fleet Dedicate Darling Of Combined 17-Head String

BELMONT PARK, Elmont, N. Y., June 8.—Ruth McKenney once wrote a charming book about her father called "The Loud Red Patrick." E. B. White, referring to New York's famed St. Patrick Day parade, said, "The Irish are a hard race to tune out." And Doctor Johnson pontificated that the Celts were "a fair people—they never speak well of each other."



There are, however, quiet Irishmen in this world, just as classy as their brother extroverts. Such a one is Edward George Burke, known to his friends as "Eddie," a devoted horseman, a champion athlete in his younger days and a business man who knows the value of many things besides money.

Stockily built, of medium height, with snappy brown eyes and iron grey hair, parted in the middle, Eddie Burke is a gentle (two words, Mr. Printer, please) man, whom golf and the horses have kept young. Most people mistake him for a fellow in his forties but, when you realize that he played basketball for the world's champion Celtics, over 35 years ago, it becomes apparent that he has long since passed the "dangerous age."

Moreover, it is possible to sit with him for a charming hour of conversation and come away feeling that while he is undoubtedly a great guy, he has told you very little about Eddie Burke. He is not a man to be drawn out about his own accomplishments. He's much rather talk about the horses.

Have Different Racing Colors

As you know, his wife, Mrs. Jan Winfrey Burke, owns and bred an exceptionally fine thoroughbred named Dedicate, winner of his last five three-year-old races. I don't know if the horse blankets in the Burke stables are marked "his" and "hers," although they do have different racing colors (Mrs. Burke's are ice blue and yellow; Eddie's are green with white diamonds), but you can bet they both have a deep proprietary interest in Dedicate.

There are 17 horses in the combined Burke strings. There are also nine more broodmares down at Bull Hancock's Claiborne Farm and Joe Metz's Mare's Rest Farm in the Kentucky Blue Grass country.

Dedicate, however, is the darling of the lot. Moreover, he really does belong to Mrs. Burke. Her brother, Bill Winfrey, trainer of the great Native Dancer, gave a mare named Dini to Mrs. Burke, when he went off to the Pacific with the United States Marines in War II. She bred him to Princequillo and Dedicate was the result.

Eddie Burke's sincere love of horses comes out when you get him talking about Dedicate. As you know, after setting a terrific three-year-old pace, the horse was suddenly scratched out of the Preakness and Belmont Stakes. Eddie shakes his head in deep gratitude when he says, in hushed tones:

Tracks Seem Too Hard

"Boy! Am I glad we scratched that horse! Tracks today seem just too hard for a horse's feet. Thoroughbreds, doggone 'em, have hearts so big they'll run until their legs break off. I've actually seen it happen. Remember Dark Secret and Chase Me? It's remarkable how hard a thoroughbred will try for a man."

"Well, we were worried about Dedicate. He had given us everything in five fine races. He'd had plenty of work. We knew that in a race like the Preakness he would do his best all over again and we were afraid he'd hurt himself. So we scratched him and then we took off his shoes for a look at those feet. It was murder. They were all beaten up. If we had run him in the Preakness, it would have been the end. Now he is taking it easy. We work him, of course, but his feet are well padded and fixed up so that he can't hurt himself. He'll be back to the races when he has fully recovered from those hard poundings. Tracks today, in my opinion, are just too hard for the average thoroughbred's feet."

When Eddie says "we took his shoes off," he means Mrs. Burke, himself and Carey Winfrey, her father, who trains the Burke string. Joe Williams once wrote that if you were to poll all the trainers on the thoroughbred tracks as to which conditioner they admired most, you would be surprised

Introduce Bill to Aid Southern Illinois Racing

Calls for One-Third Cut in State 'Take' if Handle Is Under \$300,000

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., June 8.—A bill designed to aid Fairmount Park, at Collinsville, where wagering and attendance are down sharply this spring, was introduced in the Illinois Senate Tuesday. The measure introduced by Senators George Drach, majority whip from Springfield; Arthur Bidwill, president pro tem from River Forest and Everett Peters, St. Joseph, all Republicans, provides for a one-third reduction in the state's usual 6 per cent "take" whenever the day's mutuel handle at any thoroughbred track falls below \$300,000.

The measure was reported recommended by the Illinois Racing Board. Gov. William Stratton's office said the bill was aimed to aid Fairmount where wagering is down 21 per cent from last year's comparative figures. Fairmount has encountered an unusual amount of rain this spring and also opened at the earliest date in years. The measure likewise will aid Cahokia Downs which will follow the Fairmount session.

Rep. Joseph Kohout, Chicago, president of the central division of the Horsemen's Benevolent and Protective Association, is supporting the measure.

Peters said that Fairmount and Cahokia probably wouldn't be able to reopen next year if the present 6 per cent state "take" was not reduced. Drach pointed out that many states permit a "graduated tax" on track wagers so that small tracks would not be forced out of business. This bill follows the same principle, he said.

Drach added that the bill probably would be amended, saying that it was "badly drawn." As it was introduced, it applies to all tracks in the state, which Drach said was not the intention of the sponsors. Under the provisions of the bill, the larger tracks also would be permitted the 2 per cent reduction if total wagers fell to \$300,000 or less.

On Tuesday, Ray C. Bennigsen, general manager of Fairmount, announced that the track would revert to a five-night a week schedule, with Mondays being dark for the rest of the meeting with the exception of July 4. As a result, the meeting will run through July 22 instead of closing on July 16 as would have been the case with a six-night a week operation.

Wold Colt's Last Two Were Good

Has Chic Devil, Newate, So Bet Me and Tile King To Beat in Sprint Event

DETROIT RACE COURSE, Livonia, Mich., June 8.—Clamor, one of the top members of the Detroit-owned Mrs. Lottie Wolf stable, heads an overnight field of 11 three-year-olds scheduled to meet here Thursday afternoon in the Marysville Rotary Purse. Under the allowance terms of the six furlongs feature, the Wolf colt, a son of Talon and Shout About, will shoulder 113 pounds. He will have the saddle services of the veteran reinsman, Sammy Williams.

Clamor, a good class winner of two overnight engagements in Florida before his transfer to the Motor City, started twice during the current meeting, finishing second on both occasions. In his latest outing, Clamor gave a good account of himself behind E. Gay Drake's stakes-winning Dogoon in the Ionia Purse and, prior to that, he placed behind Red O'Donnell, Lancaster & White's fine colt, in the Northwest Lions Purse.

Clamor's initial start here was on a fast track, on which Dogoon moved along in 1:10½ but his last appearance came about over a heavy strip, suggesting that he can handle any type footing.

So Bet Me Carries 108

While the Wolf colt undoubtedly will go postward the "tote" favorite, several other second-year racers in the field are capable of upsetting the choice. Waldo D. Andrews' So Bet Me, 108; Ralph A. Parachek's Tile King, 110; C. A. and T. Asbury's Peribook, 105; Grace Kosiba's Rigolade, 100, and O. C. Kroneman & Son's Early Foot, 110 pounds, have shown enough to merit consideration in the Marysville Rotary. Others expected to start are Mr. and Mrs. R. E. Ely's Newate, 105; Edward J. Grosfield's Svidhod, 106; Reiber & Wagner's Ocala Gal, 108, W. F. Salisbury's Col. Con, 110, and Mrs. H. Johnston's Chic Devil, 109 pounds. The apprentice allowance is claimed for Svidhod, Chic Devil and So Bet Me.

Jockey Lois Cook, top rider at the Detroit Race Course, will have the mount on Early Foot in the Thursday headliner. Dudley Vandendorre is engaged for Newate, Joe Gregory will guide Svidhod and little Johnny Sellers, a top apprentice prospect, was named on So Bet Me. Leroy Pierce will be at the reins on Ocala Gal, Evan Jenkins rides Rigolade, Larney Hansman is to pilot Peribook, Emil Roy drew the riding assignment on Tile King, and Charles Paul Clark is named on Col. Con. No jockey had been named late this afternoon for Chic Devil.

Chief supporting attraction on the Thursday card is the Port Huron Rotary Purse, one mile for three-year-olds and older. The Grissom Stable entry, Rico Vino and Alie-ed, along with Mrs. William Zakoor's Holly Bough and Big Cat, are expected to go well in the race. Dorie, the hard-hitting Boss John, Chic Wave, Xippi Pigeon, Sir Chatter and Great Habit complete the probable starting band for the secondary offering.

Nance's Lad to Contest Ohio Derby on June 25

THISTLEDOWN, North Randall, Ohio, June 8.—Word was received here today from Hilton "Rabbit" Dabson, part owner and trainer of the star three-year-old Nance's Lad that the colt would be shipped here for the Ohio Derby following his engagement in the Chicagoan at Washington Park.

The Derby is worth \$40,000 added and will be run on Saturday, June 25.

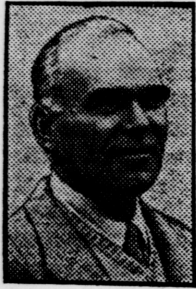

Delaware Policies Sound and Exemplary Breeder and Nominator Awards Unique Stakes' Gross Values Raise Tax Question

DELAWARE PARK, Stanton, Del., June 8.—There are several aspects of Delaware Park's operation which seem to us simultaneously sound, sporting and exemplary.



For example, there are the retroactive breeders' and nominators' awards in the singularly valuable "distaff big three." It provides that if the filly or mare earning a part of the award in the Delaware Handicap also has started in either the '55 Oaks or New Castle, the amount is doubled. If previously she has started in both the Oaks and New Castle, this bonus is trebled. In toto, it could mean \$7,500 for the breeder or nominator, as we understand it. There is also the club's realistic ambition to popularize fact against superstition among horsemen. As we recently noted, many trainers are innately hesitant about starting three-year-old fillies against older mares in the summer. But the fact is that three-year-olds of the sex have won five New Castles. (Consider also the number of Ladies' Handicaps they have predominated.)

Believe Field Favors Six-Race Program

The cornucopia of the Delaware—world's richest filly-and-mare race—continges on a handicap. And we think that Gil Haus has been eminently fair in his treatment of the younger mares as opposed to their more mature rivals. Left to his own devices, we have a notion that general manager Bryan Field would be inclined to offer cards of seven races only. (We can remember when six were considered adequate). The club would post fully as much money for the seven events as the usual eight. This would enable them to be choosier about eligibility, providing even better sport, and enabling the public to return to Philadelphia, Baltimore, Washington or wherever at an earlier hour. The public is, after all, the first consideration in merchandising the sport successfully anywhere, and Delaware Park is not in any immediate metropolitan area, for all its easy accessibility. The Stanton track also has been wise, we think to correlate its filly-and-mare program. It is a little reminiscent of the United Nations races at Atlantic City, and assures a wholehearted response which might not be forthcoming were they run as just another Saturday feature rather than a series. Individual tracks have a better opportunity of achieving this than courses in disparate areas, reflecting on the recent history of the so-called American Triple Crown. That one held water so long as the three stakes involved were the only \$100,000 added prizes in the spring, and there were none of that value preceding them in the winter.

Warner L. Jones, Jr., who is a director in Churchill Downs, horse owner and breeder, and a former trainer, yesterday asked our position about the proximity of stakes closings in relation to the running date, and the advisability of having supplemental entries. In the end we were agreed that, while stakes may not appear so lush in their advertised gross values as they do today, it would perhaps be better to have fewer futurities, in which horsemen run for a large share of their own money. For example Pimlico does not close its fall stakes early, but the relatively few nominations received are not only intended but currently eligible "on the form" and a good many turn up in the entries, providing interesting racing among the best available performers. So far as concerns supplementary closings, these are understandably unpopular with the horsemen who are among the original nominators, and they represent the vast majority. They feel strongly that it is a little like peeking at the next card in a gin rummy game, nor can one blame them too much. In addition one or two tracks have been questioned, taxationwise, by their states in advertising estimated grosses, their governments failing to understand that a large share of this money comes from the itinerant horsemen. It can be as tedious to explain as "what becomes of the racing dollar."

Saratoga Awaits Leonard Richards Test

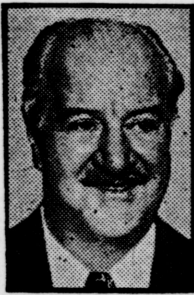
Saratoga seems to be training very well for his engagement in the \$35,000 added Leonard Richards here on the week end, and he must be the public preference, whether or not he is accompanied by the post by Westward Ho. Trainer "Downey" Bonsal, incidentally, denies stories it is necessary to get behind him with a bullwhip. His peculiarity is typical of the Blenheim II's. He is an imaginative colt who is smart enough to know that when he is drawn for a race at 11 o'clock he is in for it and he sometimes commences running it right then. This explains his washiness in the paddock, on the post parade and in the starting machine. He is no such extrovert as his rival Nashua but is simply "spooky." Both Nashua and Saratoga ran their "biggest" races in the recent Preakness, in which the former won in new track record time for the mile and three-sixteenths, amputating a full second and a fifth off a mark established by no less a flier than was Tom Fool. We do not know how that finish appeared on TV, but the veteran chart caller Palmer Heagerty had Nashua winning "ridden out," and we daresay anybody who saw the final sixteenth realized that, once again, he was up to his old trick of playing with his competitor. Though it is patently clear that Saratoga's people want no more of Nashua for the moment, the Blenheim II. colt is distinctly "the class" of the field for the Leonard Richards.

Has Our Racing Outgrown Triple Crown? Article in Breeding Journal Confusing Spring Events Will Always Be 'Big Three'

NEW YORK, N. Y., June 8.—It has been said, and by our own Bob Horwood: "American racing has outgrown the Triple Crown." We do not believe that, for



it is our thought that the statement was prompted by the fact that neither Determine nor Swaps remained East after their Kentucky Derby victories. In the current issue of The Thoroughbred Record is a story by William Robertson titled, "Three Races Don't Always Make a Triple Crown," and it is based on Horwood's remark. Robertson agrees with Bob, saying: "An examination of the three-year-old picture indicates that if the Triple Crown is supposed to point out the three-year-old champion, Mr. Horwood is right. American racing has outgrown it." In our opinion both Horwood and Robertson are wrong in their assumption and we believe that Robertson contradicts himself, for, while attempting to justify the Horwood remark, he actually makes out a case for the value of Triple Crown victories. He admits that since Sir Barton won the Triple Crown in 1919 every winner has been voted the three-year-old champion. What better proof could be advanced? Had Robertson said that a victory in one of the three races, and we might say even two, he would have been on rather solid ground. But the Triple Crown is still the most prized of three-year-old honors and we will not live to see the day when a winner of all three is not voted the sophomore champion and possibly the Horse of the Year.

Last Six Derby Winners Have Missed

No Kentucky Derby winner of the past six years has been voted the three-year-old champion, but it is something to ponder that eight of the last nine Belmont Stakes winners have earned the honors. Determine was a fine horse, but he was not voted the champion and it is our opinion that if Swaps does not meet Nashua again the latter will be accorded the honors. In 1954, High Gun did not start in the Louisville race of the Preakness, but he was the Belmont winner and at the end of the year he polled 149 points with only 62 for Determine. One Count did not start in the Derby, but was third in the Preakness and he won the Belmont. Not only was he voted the champion, but also Horse of the Year in 1949. Going back to 1920, Man o' War skipped the Derby, but won the Preakness and Belmont and became the American "super horse" of all time. Right or wrong, we have always contended that Citation deserved ranking with "Big Red," for he went far beyond the Triple Crown to establish his greatness. In fact, he went far beyond Man o' War for he continued to race until he was six years old. But the point we make is that while he won 19 of his 20 starts as a three-year-old, his victories in the Triple Crown races definitely proved his quality and indicated what was to come. We could go farther and cite Counterpoint in 1951, but it is hardly necessary.

Robertson states that the Triple Crown events "are not truly designed to point out a champion in the first place." We believe that is rather a shallow observation. He bases it on the fact that England's Triple Crown has the Two Thousand Guineas at one mile, the Epsom Derby at one mile and a half, and the St. Leger at one mile and three-quarters, plus 132 yards. Our Crown races are at one and a quarter miles, one and three-sixteenths miles and one and one-half miles. Robertson does not note that England's three events are run with a greater lapse of time between. That we have no one-mile race such as the Two Thousand Guineas does not give England any the best of it. If an owner or a trainer wants to prove that his horse has both speed and stamina, he does not have to go beyond Belmont Park's spring meeting. It starts with the Swift at seven furlongs and then come the Withers at one mile and the Peter Pan Handicap at one mile and a furlong. Then, of course, comes the Belmont, which will be run at one and one-half miles this Saturday. Right there is enough for a horse to prove that he can sprint and stay and, besides that, there are a number of shorter races before and after the Triple Crown.

Turf's Expansion Has Created a Problem

No one can dispute Robertson's statement: "The expansion of racing into 25 of the 48 states has made it increasingly difficult to get all the best horses together for one specific race, let alone three specific races." There are many \$100,000 events for three-year-olds throughout the year. Horses like Citation are few and far between—horses who can start in February and still be racing in December. The number of top three-year-olds who have gone to the sidelines this season is appalling, but that does not alter the fact that the Kentucky Derby, Preakness and Belmont will always be regarded as the three most important events for sophomores in this country. Our turf has indeed expanded in the past two decades, but we do not believe that the Triple Crown races have lost any of the importance they had back in the year when Sir Barton won all three.

Fair Truckle Sire of Stakes Winners

LOS ANGELES, Calif., June 8.—Peter Strub's sire, Fair Truckle, has had three stakes winners at the Hollywood Park meeting—Focus, Ferke and Fair Molly. The son of Fair Trial, imported by the late Charles S. Howard especially for stud duty after his racing days were over, gets precocious runners. Like the get of his sire in England, however, they do not go a distance. But for as far as they run, they certainly do sizzle, and in the classiest company.

Race of Decision Looms for Determine Hit Highest Peak in Last Californian Madam Jet Game Victress in Sea Breeze

HOLLYWOOD PARK, Inglewood, Calif., June 8.—Saturday's renewal of the \$100,000 Californian, an allowance type stake at a mile and one-sixteenth and



which represents something of an approach to the cause of scale weight racing for three-year-olds and older in the Far West, promises to be a race of decision for Determine. "We have two courses open for us," advises trainer Willie Molter, "with the first being the most obvious, continuing to race in later handicaps, or to take a sporting chance and send the horse to France for the Prix de l'Arc de Triomphe, an idea which at the moment is being given serious consideration by owner Andy Crevolin. Personally, the notion of racing Determine in the Triomphe is rather appealing because Determine is one of the few good horses I have ever trained who can offer his best on any kind of footing, from a plowed field to a pavement. He showed an aptitude for the grass at Santa Anita last winter, and, having seen the Longchamp course two years ago, I see no reason he wouldn't race well over that, too. In any event, we are going to make Determine an eligible for the French classic and gamble the nomination fee of 200,000 francs (about \$660 at present rate of exchange) on the chance that we might fly over for the stake."

Future Races Factor in Stud Career

While Determine unquestionably has a future in the stud, come what may during the remainder of his racing career, what he accomplishes from here on will have a direct and significant bearing on the first, where he will stand, and second, what kind of a book he will be able to muster for his first few seasons. Ironically enough, it was the inaugural running of the Californian last year which proved the high water mark of Determine's career, for although defeated by his own stablemate, Imbros, in then world record-equaling time, this observer at least rates Determine's Californian performance perhaps the best effort in his career, including his decisive defeat of Hasty Road in the Kentucky Derby. Determine simply was unable to give Imbros the weight decreed by the stake, Determine carrying 115 pounds, Imbros, getting some allowances, toting a mere 118. After that, so much was taken out of him that it is possible it accounted for his defeat a little later on in the Westerner.

The three-year-old Swaps, is committed to try his luck against older horses in the Californian, an item which has spiced up interest in the Hundred Grander to a marked degree. If Swaps can step out and beat older horses under the weight setup in the stake, he will make a stronger claim than ever on potential "Horse of the Year" honors, regardless of how Nashua fares in the Belmont Stakes the same afternoon. If both win their respective engagements, and both will be favored by the public, the issue could not be settled until perhaps in the fall.

There is some argument being bandied around the west that a three-year-old takes slightly the worst of it on the scale at this time of the year when facing older, but in the main, there is little to support or gainsay such a theory in the way of facts. Too few three-year-olds have raced against older at this time of the year, as compared with the fall, to make any conclusions even half way valid. To the contrary, the three-year-olds demonstrated their worth so well in the fall that the scale was changed a few seasons back to make the competition more equitable, and the revision of the scale will go down in the books as one of the great contributions made to American racing by the late John B. Campbell. His changes were the most important made regarding scale since Admiral Rous first published his famous comparative poundages about 1850.

Took Final Prep Tuesday Afternoon

Determine, incidentally, got in his final serious prep for the Californian between races Tuesday, a bit of strategy decided upon by trainer Willie Molter as a work inducement. In the morning, Determine is apt to be sluggish on occasion, but in the afternoon, with a crowd for a setting, he usually travels in smart fashion. And so it proved Tuesday. He went a fast quarter in :22½, then slowed up for the asking to a half in :46½, passed the five-furlong pole in :58½, and ran his last furlong in :12, under a hard pull, for a final tab of 1:10½. It was a most impressive drill, and one that proclaimed the gray ready for Swaps or anybody else come the Californian Saturday.

Madam Jet, the class in the Sea Breeze Stakes, won the mile dash for three-year-old fillies as if best, getting up just in time to beat a hard-hitting one-time claimer, Baby Alice, and Auntie Bell. Madam Jet had to be much the best to win, for the daughter of Black Tarquin was in repeated trouble from the far turn to midstretch, having no place to run. It seemed as if one opening after another closed in just as she was about to make her run, but get clear she finally did, wore down Baby Alice with long, sweeping strides. Fair Molly, a strong second choice, found herself in a dilemma early when two or three others elected to race head and head with her, and she could not stand this sustained pressure. It would be superfluous to add, in commenting upon the Sea Breeze, to mention that Johnny Longden was in his top form.
