Butch K. Competes In Omaha Feature

Veteran Shultz Campaigner Looms Favorite Over Step Alone, Reno John, Gayview

AK-SAR-BEN, Omaha, Nebr., June 5.—Ak-Sar-Ben made a change of policy for the running of the second twilight racing program at the Omaha oval Thursday. The afternoon's program which begins at 3:30 p.m. (CST), will card the feature race as the seventh on the eight-race program. The sixth race formerly held the spotlight. This new policy which goes into effect Thursday, will be used the remainder of the meeting.

Butch K., the grand "old man" of Ak-Sar-Ben racing, should once again parade to the post in the role of favorite in Thursday's Omaha Traffic Club Purse. The stakes-winning gelding, who carries the green and gold silks of brothers Guy and Walter Shultz, has more followers than any other horse who has raced at Ak-Sar-Ben. "Butch," who has won more than \$110,000 the hard way, gained his many admirers by winning the \$10,000 Ak-Sar-Ben Handicap in 1952 and '55. He also finished second in Ak-Sar-Ben's "Big One" in 1954.

Inactive Last Year Due to Injury

The son of Whisk K. was out of action here last year with an injury, but he served notice in his first trip postward this year that he has returned to top form. He placed in a five and one-half furlongs sprint for his first appearance under silks and came from far back to finish fourth behind Dupatta, Harmony Wise and Laird Star. Butch K. was only beaten two and one-half lengths in the Roseben Purse which was run in 1:04½, which is just one-fifth of a second off the track record. Sonny Ray Williams will be aboard the local favorite in the mile and 70 yards feature. The added distance of his Thursday engagement should give him an excellent chance once again to enter the Ak-Sar-Ben winner's circle.

Step Alone, who turned in such an impressive effort in the Ak-Sar-Ben Governors' Handicap, must be considered as the top contender in the Omaha Traffic Club Purse. The W. G. Alexander gelding led in the Governors' for six furlongs, then was only beaten a length and one-half by Olen Sledge's Jimmy the One. Step Alone seems to favor the Omaha course and has turned in some of his top efforts here. His showing in the Governors' Handicap may have been the best of his career.

Reno John and Gayview have both won over the Omaha oval against cheaper company. The pair have both been racing in extremely good form, neither of them have been out of the money this year at Ak-Sar-Ben.

The others who are named to go to the post in the full field of 12 are Frontier Saga, Nocturno, Sir Shannon, Calloway K., O. Gay, Endon, Tin Twist and Eternal Town.

This Could Be the Season For Two-Year-Olds—Kilroe

BELMONT PARK, Elmont, L. I., N. Y., June 5.—"This could be the year, the year for two-year-olds, that is," mused Jimmy Kilroe this morning. He was studying the nomination list for the New York series for two-year-olds which comprise the Juvenile, Great American, Grand Union Hotel and the Cowdin. The series closed with 277 nominations and a quick glance at the parentage of some of the nominees leaves nothing to be desired. The New York series, as the four events are styled, is for foals of 1955 and a subscription of \$100 each is exacted from each nomination. If nominated Friday, Feb. 1, 1957, this fee to provide eligibility for all four stakes named thereon. The original subscription fees to be divided equally among the winners of the four stakes.

Supplementary nominations may be made to each stakes 10 days before its running by the payment of the following fees: to the Juvenile, \$200; Great American, \$300; Grand Union Hotel, \$400, and Cowdin, \$500. In discussing the New York series, Kilroe pointed out that the original idea was proffered by A. G. Vanderbilt but that the supplementary nominations came later. Supplementary nominations are considered a recent innovation although they have been in use for several decades. In the past a supplementary nomination to a stakes on a New York track was taboo, although in other centers it was an accepted practice. This year the pendulum swung the other way and supplements are the order.

Anyway, today's field in the Juvenile represents a good cross section of the youngsters. The work watchers point out that in today's dash some real good ones will be watched with interest. They state that it is one of the hardest two-year-old renewals of the Juvenile to separate and that the winner could come from any one of the overnight nominees. The same work watchers also state that a dozen colts and fillies, still to be shown under colors, are displaying their prowess in the mornings and are ready for their respective debuts. Anyway, this could be the two-year-old year that every racing man has been waiting for for years. Kilroe is sanguine of that and when reminded that the Experimental weights will be due this winter, grimaced and quipped, "Why bring that up?"

Jovial Jove Remains in East

Trainer Charlie Sanford decided to leave Jovial Jove, owned by the Bwamazon Farm of M. E. Waldheim of Chicago, at Belmont Park. The colt is eligible for a series of sprint races in New York, Delaware and New Jersey. Jovial Jove in the past showed a dislike for the racing strips in the Chicago area, hence the switch in plans. Sanford will do some commuting between Chicago and New York during the summer months. . . . Jockey Edward Manacelli, under call to trainer Hirsch Jacobs, accepted his first mount of the New York season. The boy recently arrived from Maryland.

Trainer Jimmy Jones this morning in telephonic conversations with Jimmy Kilroe was undecided about shipping Fabius here for the Metropolitan. Scores in Stakes Bow at Delaware

Carolyn K Filly Holds Lead Practically Throughout for Easy Win Over Stay Smoochie

DELAWARE PARK, Stanton, Del., June 5.—Winning the 20th running of the \$14,400 Polly Drummond was just a little exercise in plain and fancy front-running for the Carolyn K. Stable's favored Dance Card. While a majority of the crowd of 13,196 cheered her on, jockey Howard Grant guided her to an easy two and one-half lengths success at the direct expense of the Dorchester Farm Stable's Stay Smoochie. The latter, in turn, had two lengths to spare over Circle M Farm's Meant Well as that one finished third before Have and Hold and the others of a field of nine two-year-old fillies assembled for this rather sloppy five furlongs.

Dance Card, an undistinguished looking but clever daughter of Occupy and Junior Prom, earned a gross prize of \$10,900, of which \$10,675 was net to owner Irving Kirschbaum, Deal, N. J., and rewarded her backers at the rate of \$5.60 for \$2. She skipped the five furlongs in a highly commendable :58½, time just four-fifths behind Beaugay's long standing course record.

Alfred Dent Makes Presentation

Following the running of the rainy day stakes, Alfred Dent, of Greenville, Del., presented Dance Card's people the trophy as a memento of the occasion. It was the filly's first stakes appearance, though she had not been worse than second in four previous starts. Dance Card was bred in Maryland, at the Ponses' Country Life Farm. This was incidentally the third time since the Polly Drummond's inception that a product of the stud had won it, as Raise You and Glen Arvis also first saw the light of day there.

Dance Card left little to the imagination in the Polly Drummond. Grant broke her away alertly and she quickly subdued the presumptuous Ste. Joan, then went to the front and simply improved her position from there. Lovita H. was "the chaser" for a few furlongs, but this diminutive filly finally tired of her efforts and drifted rearward through the stretch. Stay Smoochie, for whom some play developed, then took up the chase in the run past the stands, but still Dance Card was unimpressed, finally winning quite comfortably by two and one-half lengths. Meant Well was not very clever out of the gate, but worked her way forward and was clearly third best without ever looking like beating the first two.

Jockey Steve Brooks, plying his trade here for the first time, rounded out a saddle triple astride Cedar Farm's Our Dance in the secondary attraction. In a three-horse photo, Joseph F. O'Connell's Combustion II, was a head behind the winner and a nose before Melvin H. Schlosberg's Remand. The winner, the tenth of the meeting for Brooks, was timed in 1:44¾ for a mile and a sixteenth over the sloppy track and paid \$12.20.

Jockey Lyman Richards Suffers Broken Collarbone in Spill

HENDERSON, Ky., June 5.—Jockey Lyman Richards was resting comfortably at the Methodist Hospital here today after undergoing treatment for a broken collarbone and lacerations suffered in a spill during the running of the fifth race at Audubon Park yesterday. L. Alatorre, the other rider involved in the accident, escaped with a severe shaking-up and minor lacerations.

Richards suffered his injuries when H. Hoffman's Foxley Lass stumbled and fell during the running of the event. The rider was thrown heavily but was fortunate to land clear of Mrs. Francis Alvey's Charlie Bowman with Jockey L. Alatorre aboard who crashed into the fallen horse and floundered about without going down. Alatorre was also pitched to the track and both boys were unconscious when placed in the ambulance.

Wise Margin Being Prepped for Macomber Trainer Satisfied With 126-Pound Impost Opines That Veteran Will Like Turf Course

SUFFOLK DOWNS, East Boston, Mass., June 5.—Gordon W. Morrow has released his weights for the \$25,000 added John R. Macomber Memorial Handicap.

This will afford the potential invading forces ample opportunity to make up their minds whether they are willing to accept the assignments. One of our pet peeves are important races where conditions call for the weights to be announced just a few days before the date of the race. This sort of thing is not fair to the owners, trainers or management, which cards such events in an attempt to stimulate interest and to lure topnotch thoroughbreds from other sectors. The Macomber is slated for Monday, June 17, at a mile and one-half on the turf and it looms as one of the highlights of the Yankeeland season. Of the top weights, Samuel Tufano's Wise Margin is the only one on the grounds. He has trained brilliantly, has had a good six furlong competitive test under his belt, and he gave the clockers a treat yesterday morning.

Sammy Edmundson, his trainer, said he thinks the weights are fair enough, which is an observation that should cause his colleagues to nail him to the proverbial cross, or at least subject him to a mild form of tar and feather. This is the first time we have ever heard a trainer laud being allotted 126 pounds. Obviously, Sammy does not intend to become a member of the "we're weighted out of it, anti-handicappers club." It seems that most trainers are automatically taken into this mythical organization once they find a good horse under their shed. As a Macomber prep, Edmundson's local schedule calls for him to send Wise Margin out after the \$10,000 Plymouth Rock Handicap, to be run on the turf at a mile and one-sixteenth, come this Saturday.

Still a Maiden on the Green

"You know, this horse has never won a race on the turf," Edmundson said this morning. "He ran a big race against Mark-Ye-Well and others in the Stars and Stripes at Arlington Park a few seasons back, but he's still a 'maiden' on the grass. I'm not worrying about the weights. I think they are okay. But I guess this is something of an oddity for a horse to carry 126 pounds who is a 'maiden' at grass running. This doesn't mean he doesn't like the turf. I think he will do fine, even at the weights. Haven't run him much on the grass." A horseman ventured the observation that Edmundson might be shooting for the moon in sending a horse who has not been long out of winter quarters such a searching distance as a mile and one-half. "I expected a number of horsemen to question the feasibility of such a schedule," Sam related. "But this horse has been galloping all winter in heavy sand in New Jersey and he has a lot of three-mile jogs under him. Actually, he is more fit to run a mile and one-half than he is a mile and one-sixteenth. I am trying to sharpen his speed at the moment. I am not worried about his ability to get the distance."

Edmundson says the veteran son of Market Wise—One Ripple, by Isolater was never better, that he is the perfect gentleman around the barn and on the race-track. "You'd think a seven-year-old stud would be a regular hellion," says Sam, "but he doesn't do much as raise an eye when mares walk around the shadrow, nor does he seem concerned when he is on the track with them. His only 'weakness,' it seems, is spotted ponies. So long as he has a spotted pony to take him to the track in the morning and afternoon, he seems satisfied."

Jabneh and Akbar Khan Are Ready

But to get back to the Macomber and the weights, Mrs. E. Eugenia Bankhead has her pride, Jabneh, in at 125, just one pound below Wise Margin, and he is regarded as a possible starter. The stallion was an impressive winner of the Hialeah Turf Handicap and he flashed skill on the greensward while bowing to the tremendously improved Akbar Khan in both the Dixie and the Brandywine at Delaware. Akbar Khan is the one most penalized and this horse will get his most exacting test to date in the Macomber, if he is shipped. He shouldered 113 in the Dixie and 117 in his Brandywine essay, and this time he is moved up "with the men," being asked to handle 120.

Program Scribbings: "In an attempt to get the Brooklyn Dodgers' minds back on baseball, manager Walt Alston has ordered them to stay away from race tracks, etc., etc. . ." Such trash. To Talk Rule Changes at HBPA Dinner Groom Speaks Up for Dignity of Job Split Distaff Stakes Prove Thrillers

HOLLYWOOD PARK, Inglewood, Calif., June 5.—The California division of the HBPA meets Thursday after the races in Hollywood Park clubhouse for a "routine" meeting to nominate officers, but from all sides we hear that the meeting, in addition to the nomination of officers, will become an open forum for the hearing of any member suggestions as to how stimulation may be either completely eradicated, or as to how Rule 1871, which holds the trainer as the insurer of his horse regardless of the acts of the third parties, might be changed for the better and still provide

adequate protection to the public. Opinion on this latter subject is sharply divided, with the majority (according to our own spot check) favoring a switch to the New York rule, while others insist that the present rule is okay, and with still a third segment in favor of absolving the trainer of all responsibility where personal guilt is not shown, and putting this responsibility upon the groom alone. This latter proposal is not news to the backstretch, where the grooms themselves are somewhat divided, but with two major alternatives discernible. One would be that many of the top, and old-time grooms, would move from California to other jurisdictions, feeling they have a career at stake, and to jeopardize that career without the trainer being responsible would be sheer foolishness. Another group of grooms feel that if the grooms are to be held solely responsible, then the grooms should share in the emoluments of the trainer to compensate them for the risk, and we understand they are ready to organize to force this plan through should a trainer be absolved of prima facie responsibility.

Most Trainers Accept Responsibility

To the credit of most trainers to whom we have talked, they make no bones about their own responsibility in the care and condition of their horses, realizing that someone in authority has to be responsible, and that that someone is them. They are not in favor of holding the groom alone responsible and are willing to shoulder their own problems which are a part and parcel of training. Certainly if a horse does well, they are willing to accept the public acclaim that accrues to the successful trainer. An example is Charlie Whittingham, of Llangollen Farm, who tells me: "Anyone connected with a horse, including myself and the groom, has a degree of responsibility and to which we are accountable."

One of our old friends on the backstretch remarks: "There can be no real secrets between trainer and groom. The success of a horse in racing depends upon their teamwork. As a groom, I can say there are what might be described as cliques on the backstretch. Some of us are college graduates. While I am not myself, I have put two children through college on my wages and stakes, which have never been too high. Why would a degree man from college stay in this profession? Well, there are as many reasons as there are people in it, but I can cite many good reasons. Some have been disabled in the wars, but they won't say anything about it and keep up their share of the work. I fought in two wars myself and it was okay when there was fighting, but by now you can't plead war disability because people have forgotten all about the man in uniform. Others just plain like the stable life and are content. Are they any different in principle from the man who would like to get away from it all and go and live on a south sea island as an indolent dreamer? At the same time, we do not condone the groom who is really shiftless. Nor are we completely happy with some of the people that the racing board has seen fit to grant licenses to. But that is beyond our province and we take conditions as we find them."

Great Pride Finally Connects

Great Pride and Fanciful Miss shared the honors in the split Honeymoon Stakes here Tuesday, and both winners turned in efforts that were at the very least "impressive." Great Pride, a \$5,000 claimer only a little more than a year ago, but who was well backed in the Kentucky Oaks only to fail to rally in that race, came with a rush from behind to humble the favored Tourbillonte in the first division, while Inquisitive, a stablemate of the winner, was third, after encountering some trouble. Fanciful Miss was up in a furious drive to beat out Royal Rasher, and Irish-bred daughter of Royal Charger, and Pamper Me in the second division. Fanciful Miss raced her mile in 1:36 flat, Great Pride scored in 1:36 1/2. Each division was worth \$12,450 to the winner and for Great Pride, it was her first stakes victory after knocking at the door in some of the more important stakes in the East.

Great Pride continued the winner's circle rampage of the Mrs. Ada L. Rice horses and trainer Jimmy Conway, a combination that is enjoying exceptional success in the West this summer. All the Rice horses, it seems, run corkers their first outings, and hold their form once in action. Great Pride had one previous outing here, a seven furlonger in which she made up much ground to be sixth. But over the longer distance, her tenacious qualities paid richer dividends. Willie Shoemaker guided Great Pride, while Johnny Longden hung up his fiftieth stakes win at Hollywood with Fanciful Miss. A while back this corner commented that fillies

Breeding Industry Hails Humphrey's Move Resigned Cabinet Officer Buys Whileaway Eddie Schmidt Boosts Count Speed's Stock

LEXINGTON, Ky., June 5.—The purchase by George M. Humphrey, recently resigned Secretary of the Treasury, of Jack Welch's Whileaway Farm on the Iron Pike here, is the kind of news that is welcome in the industry. Humphrey has had mares quartered at Harrie B. Scott's Shandon Farm and will continue this relationship as his purchase was of 120 acres with accommodation for some 40 horses. Harry Scott Jr. will serve as manager of the new Humphrey property. It is the actual investment in Blue Grass land that is significant, carrying as it does, the promise of continuing interest coupled with solidity. The Humphrey mares are definitely top-bracket and can have a lasting effect on thoroughbred production.

The sale of Whileaway is particularly wholesome because, unlike many other such vendees, it does not involve the loss to the industry of either the buyer or the seller. Jack Welch has no intention of leaving the ranks of breeders, although his plans for the future are indefinite at this time. Whileaway is excellent land in a good location and that was about all that could be said of it when Welch purchased it 10 years ago. Now it has an ample supply of sulphur water, is quite well fenced and has good roads. Humphrey may make further improvements to the benefit of the entire industry.

Another Winner for Hertz' Stallion

The victory of Eddie Schmidt in the Golden State Breeders' Handicap at Hollywood Park brings to four the number of stakes winners by Count Speed in 1957. The others are Count Chic, Mobile and Jet Speed, while Count Arrow and Major Speed placed in stakes. This record prompted Charles Kenney to remind that Stoner Creek Stud has three yearlings by Count Speed in the Keeneland summer sales and that two of them are out of mares that produced two stakes winners, while the third is from a young mare who is a half sister to two stakes winners. A colt is from Risque Blue, dam of Blue Banner and Risque Rouge; a filly is from Duchess Anita, dam of the Frizette winner Our Fleet, and of Call Over who is now a sire. Another filly is from the Case Ace mare Lovely Child, who is a half sister to Picador and Capeador.

Mention by Oscar Otis recently of the promise shown by the juvenile Rulership, who races without the benefit of a full set of teeth, reminded Kenney that he believed the barn housed another with similar breeding who might excel. You have heard of the better one in the barn. Rulership is by Nasrullah, from the Count Fleet mare Not Afraid. Fleet Nasrullah is by Nasrullah, from Happy Go Fleet, by Count Fleet. Still another of similar breeding in the Hertz ménage is a filly by Nasrullah who is the first foal of the Count Fleet mare Fleet Jackie. This young matron is a full sister to the Frizette winner Our Fleet, and her first foal is named Rules On Air. The emergence of daughters of Count Fleet as successful broodmares has already been established and this trio of two-year-olds by Nasrullah can do much to enhance the record.

Trying Task Has Its Lighter Moments

The committee that selects on pedigree the yearlings that are eligible to the Keeneland summer sales, has a thankless task which was lightened only a little by one consignor who shall be nameless. This consignor made a plea for reconsideration for his colt, whose entry had been denied. In turn, the three members of the committee pointed out to the consignor that his colt would do much better in the fall sales, where his rivals would be less prominent. It was the wrong thing to make him a misfit in the summer sales, where he would be neglected. The smart thing to do was to get a fair price in the fall. Explanations were lengthy and reasonable. When they were finished the consignor said: "You fellows know more about this than I do and what you say sounds right. But just once, couldn't I do it in the dumb way?"

Blades of Blue Grass: Mrs. A. E. Smith, secretary of the National Association of State Racing Commissioners, has completed an attractive biographic roster of current members of the various commissions. . . . Jack Welch, of Whileaway Farm, has had experience with saddle horses, standardbreds and thoroughbreds and intends to stay in the horse business "as long as I am alive." . . . In this space Monday a typo threw some statistics out of line. The Stallion Station records show 381, not 281, mares served. . . . Millard Waldheim is expected to pay a visit to his Bwamazon Farm this week. Six top Bwamazon colts and four engaging fillies are destined for the Saratoga sales in August. . . . The twin infant sons of Mr. and Mrs. Reginald Bradbury are home from their short stay in the hospital after their arrival and buttons are bursting on Bradbury's vest. Bradbury is manager of the Normandy Farm of Mr. and Mrs. E. Barry Ryan, where Grey Miss, dam of Prince Khaled has been reported in foal to Polynesian. Grey Miss was sent on from California for this mating.
