

HARRY ANDREW RHODES (Prepared by Dr. Rhodes)

Born, East Brook, Pennsylvania, September 11, 1875. Resided on farms near Slippery Rock, 1880-1895.

Oldest of 7 children, all living but one. Father died March 7, 1892. Mother died in Grove City, November 15, 1935.

Graduated from Slippery Rock Normal School, 1898. Taught school as follows:

1894-96 -Old Zion School, Worth Township, Butler County

1896-97 -Edinburg, Pennsylvania

1898-1900 - Principal, Linesville, Pennsylvania

1900-1901 -Mathematics, High School, Beaver Falls, Pennsylvania.

Graduated from Grove City College, 1903. Received D.D. degree from there in 1925.

Graduated Princeton Theological Seminary, 1906. Middle year at Western, 1904-05. Received M.A. degree from Princeton University, 1906.

Married Edith Brown of Linesville, Pennsylvania June 6, 1906. She graduated from Slippery Rock in 1900.
1906-08 Pastor of Cross Creek Presbyterian Church in Washington County, Pa. April, 1908, Elected Moderator of Presbytery of Washington.
May 1908, Commissioner from Washington Presbytery to meeting of General Assembly in Kansas City, Missouri. May-September 1905 Home Mission pastor, Whitefish, Montana.

From 1908-1946 Presbyterian Church U.S.A. missionary assigned to Korea until retirement.

1908-1918 -Evangelistic work in North Korea, at Kangkei, Pyengyang and Syenchun. 1918-1932 -On the faculty of the Chosen Christian College, Seoul, Korea Professor of Bible and Director of Religious Activities.

1933-1940 - Evangelist, Literary and Administrative work in Seoul.
Chairman of the Executive Committee, Korea Mission, 1937-39.
Editor of the Korea Mission Field (English) of the Federal Council of Missions and of the Christian Messenger (Korean) of the National Christian Council.
Wrote the History of the Korea Mission, 1884-1934, Presbyterian Church, U.S.A.

Also for the years, 1935-1950.

Wrote books in Korean Travels in Bible Lands, A Brief History of Christianity in Korea, Character Sermons by D.C. Murphy (translated)

Furloughs: in Princeton, New Jersey; 1924-25; 1932-33; 1940-41. From June to Sept., 1924, travelled to the U.S. on furlough with three children via Shanghai, Hong Kong, Saigon, Singapore, Columbo, Djibuti (Fr. E. Africe), Suez, Cairo, Jerusalem, Bethlehem, Hebron, Samaria, Galilee, Damascus, Baalbek, Beirut, Smyrna, Constantinople, Athens, Malta, Naples, Rome, Florence, Venice, Milan, Lucerne, Geneva, Paris, London.

Korea Mission delegate to the Presbyterian Church U.S.A. General Assembly in Columbus, Ohio, 1925, and Chicago, Illinois, 1944. Also attended meetings of the Assembly in Atlantic City, New Jersey, Cincinnati, Ohio and Los Angeles, California.

Interim supply pastorates: Romulus and Canoga, New York, 1942; Smyrna Beach, Florida 1942-45; Pismo Beach, California, 1948; Wildwood, New Jersey, 1945; Ravenwood, West Virginia, 1949-51.

Speaking on Missions: 1941 in Shenango Presbytery; in 1943-44 in Blairsville Presbytery with residence at Latrobe; in 1944-45 in Redstone and Washington Presbyteries with residence at Uniontown.

Present position, Minister of Missions (Assistant Pastor) in the Community Presbyterian Church, San Marino, California.

Children: Helen: A graduate of Beaver College and of Biblical Seminary; pastor's wife, Mrs. Francis M. Scott. Mr. Scott is one of two ministers in the First Presbyterian Church of Lancaster, Pennsylvania. They were missionaries in China, 1937-1944. He also served in Presbyterian churches in Windsor, New York and Montrose, Pennsylvania. He was born in China.

Paul: Graduate of Wooster and Princeton Seminary; Assistant Minister First Presbyterian Church of Pittsburgh, 1938-41; Missionary to China, 1947-48; pastor of First Presbyterian Church, Hayward, California, 1949- . Married Kathryn Napp whose parents were missionaries in India.

Howard: Graduate of Wooster and Princeton Seminary; in Phoenix, Arizona, in home missions, 1948-49, organized the Bethany Presbyterian Church in Strathmore, California, 1948-51 during which the new Sanctuary was erected; in the First Presbyterian Church, Tracy, California 1951-58; now called to St. Paul's Presbyterian, Los Angeles, California. Married Betty Willis, a graduate of the University of California.

RHODES - Harry Andrew Rhodes, D.D. passed away June 16, 1965. A native of East-Brook, Pa., he had been a resident of Monte Vista Grove Homes 15 years. He was a minister for 57 years and spent 39 years as a Missionary in Korea. Survivors are his wife, Edith Brown Rhodes: two sons, the Rev. Paul B. Rhodes of Havward, the Rev. Howard B. Rhodes of Bellflower: his daughter. Mrs. Francis H. Scott of Canonsburg, Pa.; eleven grandchildren; one sister, Mrs. Pearl Bingham of Volant, Pa. Harry Andrew Rhodes took his leave of us on June 16, 1965. And so gentle was his passing. Sitting in his favorite chair, conversing with members of his family, and then he was gone. Sunset and evening star:

Harry Rhodes was born in East Brook, Pennsylvania on September 11, 1875. His college was Grove City. His theological studies were pursued at Western and Princeton seminaries Simultaneously, he earned an M.A. degree from Princeton University.

Following his seminary graduation he married Edith Brown. To them were born three children; Helen, Mrs. Francis M. Scott of Lancaster, Pennsylvania, Paul of Hayward, California and Howard of Bellflower. All three were present for his funeral which was held at the San Marino Presbyterian Church on June 20. He is survived by his wife, his three children and eleven grandchildren.

The Rhodes' career consisted mainly of thirty-eight years as missionaries assigned to Korea. Here he served as an evangelist, a college professor, an administrator, an editor and author. Following ten years in interim postorates here in the States, the Rhodes entered Monte Vista Grove Homes in January of 1951.

Sarah became a member of The Grove family in November of 1948. The rose garden at Apartment 12 B is one of her memorials. Contributions from friends and former associates made the garden possible. In 1958 her health required shebecome a resident of the Health Center. She was ever generous in her expression of appreciation of her care there.

She is survived by two cousins, Mrs. A. R. Hamilton of Montclair, New

Jersey and Mrs. Welch of Newark.
