INTRODUCTION

I first got the idea for this bibliography after reading Nathan Hare's article, "Black Ecology" in the April 1970 issue of The Black Scholar. I started to call this work "Black Ecology." After talking to a number of individuals, however, I was persuaded to change the title to "Ecology of Blacks in the Inner-City." By using that title this work will have greater significances and broader dimensions. Furthermore, I am not sure of the definition of "Black Ecology", because I do not know what it means. Nathan Hare, however, has defined it. He surmises that the legitimacy of the concept of Black ecology accrues from the fact that: (1) the Black and white environments not only differ in degree but in nature as well; (2) the causes and solutions to ecological problems are fundamentally different in the suburbs and ghetto (both of which human ecologists regard as "natural or ecological areas"; and (3) the solutions set forth for the "ecological crisis" are reformist and evasive of the social and political revolution which Black environmental correction demands.

Dr. Hare also makes a distinction between "white ecology", and "Black ecology". He believes that "in the realm of white ecology," pollution closes your beaches and prevents your youngsters from wading, swinming, boating, water-skiing, fishing, and other recreation close to home. And, we want clear water, for boating, and swinming, and fishing - and clean water just to look at. Similar involvement includes the planting of redwood trees, saving the American eagle, and redeeming terrestial beauty. Thus it is seen that ecologists aimed at the hearts and purse strings of industrialists and hit the eyeballs of the white bourgeoisie.

Mr. Hare concluded that "the real solution to the environmental crisis is the decolonization of the Black race. Blacks in the United States number more than 25,000,000 people, comprising a kidnapped and captive nation surpassed in size by only twenty other nations in the entire world. It is necessary

for Blacks to achieve self-determination, acquiring a full Black government and a multi-billion dollar budget so that Blacks can better solve the more serious environment crisis of Blacks. To do so Blacks must challenge and confront the very foundations of American society. In so doing we shall correct that majority which appears to believe that the solution lies in decorating the earth's landscape and in shooting at the moon."

It should be pointed out that even though recent authors, both Black and white, are attempting to find out the effects of the physical environment on Blacks in the cities and elsewhere, E. Franklin Frazier, the Black Sociologist, wrote about the effects of the physical environments on Blacks in the cities more than thirty-seven years ago. Writing in the July, 1937 issue of The American Journal of Sociology, Dr. Frazier contrasts Blacks living in New York City with Blacks living in Chicago. The author surmised in his article, "Negro Harlem: An Ecological Study," that: "In contrast to the Black community in Chicago with a spatial pattern determined almost entirely by the ecological organization of the larger community, the radial expansion of the Harlem Black community from its center, the area in which Blacks first settled, can be represented by five zones, similar to the pattern of zones of a selfcontained city. The expansion of the Black population coincides with the degree of ' ysical deterioration in these zones as indicated by the proportion of nonresidential structures and lodging houses, and by the type, age, and condition of residential structures. The ecological organization of the Black community was indicated in the significant increases in the proportion of women, children, and married men and women in the population and in the ratio of children to women of child-bearing age of the successive zones marking the outward expansion of the community. Family desertion and the proportion of families on Home Relief declined in the successive zones. The distribution of crime and delinquency did not reveal significant variations from zone to zone.

While the concentration of economic, political, and cultural institutions in the first zone distinguished this area as the center of community life, the dispersion of recreational institutions revealed the extent to which the main arteries of travel and the "satellite loops' marred the symmetry of the general pattern."

Professor Frazier concluded in his study of Harlem that where a racial or cultural group is stringently segregated and carries on a more or less independent community life, such local communities may develop the same pattern of zones as the larger urban community.

Frazier was apparently influenced by the article written by Robert Ezra Park, "Human Ecology," The American Journal of Sociology, May 1936. Professor Park declares that in human society the natural or ecological social order is limited and modified by institutional and cultural factors. Park believes that: "Society, as ecologists have conceived it, is a population settled and limited to its habitat. The ties that unite its individual units are those of a free and natural economy, based on a natural division of labor. Such a society is territorially organized and the ties which hold it together are physical and vital rather than customary and moral. Human ecology has, however, to reckon with the fact that in human society competition is limited by custom and culture. The cultural superstructure imposes itself as an instrument of direction and control upon the biotic substructure." Moreover, continues the author "reduced to its elements the human community, so conceived, may be said to consist of a population and a culture, including in the term culture (1) a body of customs and beliefs and, (2) a corresponding body of artifacts and technological devices. To these three elements or factors - (1) population, (2) artifact (technological culture), (3) custom and beliefs (non-material culture) into which the social complex resolves itself, one should, perhaps, add a fourth, namely the natural resources of the habitat.

It is the interaction of these four factors - (1) population, (2) artifacts (technological culture), (3) custom and beliefs (non-material culture), and (4) the natural resources that maintain at once the biotic balance and the social equilibrium, when and where they exist, declares Professor Park.

The changes in which ecology is interested are the movements of population and of artifacts (commodities) and changes in location and occupation - any sort of change, in fact, which affects an existing division of labor or the relation of the population to the soil.

Park concludes "Human ecology is, fundamentally, an attempt to investigate the processes by which the biotic balance and the social equilibrium (1) are maintained once they are achieved and (2) the processes by which, when the biotic balance and the social equilibrium are disturbed, the transition is made from one relatively stable order to another."

Even though Professor Park was not speaking directly to (or of) Black people, there are however, certain implications for them; for example, when he stated "Human ecology has, however, to reckon with the fact that in human society competition is limited by custom and culture." Since Blacks have historically been excluded by custom, law, and culture, human ecology does not apply to them the same way as to whites. Conversely, the ties that unite its individual units are NOT those of a ' ee and natural economy, based on a natural division of labor - especially since Blacks are the "last hired and first fired." Furthermore, such a society is NOT altogether territorially organized and the ties which hold it together are NOT ONLY physical and vital, BUT (rather than) customary and moral, as well.

In summary it can be shown that there is such a thing as "Black Ecology" or more specifically, "The Ecology of Blacks in the Inner-City." Since many Blacks do live in the cities, the environment is also important to that segment of the population. Even though Blacks living in the cities, and elsewhere,

are affected by the physical environment, the same as white residents, they have little chance to escape or move from their communities. While whites, and others, are concerned about pollution of recreational areas and home environments, Blacks have the basic things to be concerned with - namely, survival. Many Blacks do not have jobs. Consequently, they can not afford recreational facilities - close or away from their community. In closing, it can be argued that the ecology for Black people has a different and special meaning for them, than for the ecology of whites.

Obviously, any work of this endeavor encompassed the assistance of many people and many hours. Therefore, it would be nearly impossible to name all persons that assisted in this monumental work: however, I must express special acknowledgement to the following: The Ohio State University Library, and the secretaries, Penny Martin, Judie Strain, Yolanda Robinson, and Sylvia Noel of the Department of Black Studies at the Ohio State University. Without their assistance this work would not have been completed. I take full responsibility, however, for all errors. I also welcome any corrections of errors or omissions.
