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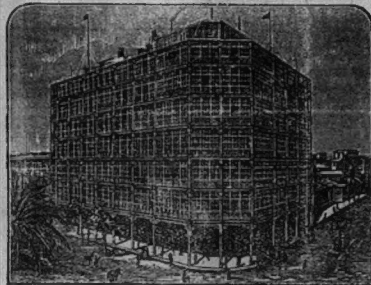

"PEACE WITH HONOUR."

Within the last day or so we have been on the very brink of war with Russia. Had such a dastardly outrage upon our fishing fleet been perpetrated in the good old days, admirals of the Nelson type would have sent the remnant of the Russian navy to the bottom long before it had reached the coast of Spain. Now-a-days, however, with the facilities for rapid communication furnished by telegraphs and telephones, such terrible crises can be happily averted without bloodshed. Protests are launched, explanations interchanged, sovereigns throw their personal influence into the scale, and diplomacy is called into play, with the combined result of pouring oil on troubled waters and easing a tension which in earlier times must inevitably have led to hostilities. We should be sorry to think that the old spirit, which would not brook an insult to England on the part of a foreigner, has become softened by a higher state of culture, and that we would to-day calmly submit to see the honour of our nation outraged one whit more than our forefathers would have done. This feeling still lives, and our telegrams have shown that the entire nation is at one in demanding reparation for what was not only a blunder but a dastardly crime. The general consensus of opinion, as evinced by the great London daily newspapers, show that the solution of this difficulty has been received with satisfaction. It is to be hoped, therefore, that the wrong will be fully recognised by the arbitrators and that the cause of international comity will be served by the righteousness of their award.

AGRICULTURAL DEPARTMENT WANTED.

A short time ago a rumour was started to the effect that the Egyptian Government was about to form an Agricultural Department, but the report was found to have been merely based on the fact that an increased grant was to be made to the Khedivial Agricultural Society. It is much to be regretted that the Government should have failed to have boldly faced the pressing necessities of the situation, in view of the very large amount of funds now placed at its disposal. We could have wished that agriculture should have received a larger share of administrative attention than heretofore, as for years past we have persistently advocated in these columns the expediency of giving effect to its claims. After all, husbandry in Egypt is an industry which in magnitude and importance immeasurably transcends all others. The expenditure, therefore, connected with the establishment of a department exclusively devoted to the fostering and development of its interests would be money profitably employed. "Agriculture" in its purely technical sense is restrict-

ed to the cultivator of the fields, whereas in its loose popular sense it covers every kind of farming and includes, therefore, land development on its pastoral side, e.g., sheep, dairy and ostrich farming, poultry rearing, and horse breeding, as well as the raising of special crops. We trust there is no disrespect in suggesting that the heads of the Public Works Department, though they be eminent authorities on irrigation, dam construction, and the soil of the Nile Valley, have not had occasion in a professional capacity to grow so much as a cabbage, and are therefore lacking that experience which alone can form a true foundation for the special knowledge required by an agriculturist. We must confess to our inability to fathom the reasons for such speculative daring being manifested by the Government in embarking on gigantic schemes for irrigation whilst the one and only purpose for which such schemes are undertaken is utterly neglected. Even in England, where, unfortunately, in our days, agriculture holds quite a secondary place, there is a full-pledged Board uncontrolled by any Department save the Treasury, and capable of taking independent action. Why then should Egypt wait?

"HONOUR TO WHOM," ETC.

Considerable indignation is expressed by the public at the unwarrantable attack on the Alexandria Fire Brigade which appeared in Saturday's *La Reforme* in connection with Friday's fire at that newspaper's printing establishment. We can only surmise that our usually sober contemporary had lost its head in the excitement engendered by the regrettable conflagration. The *Reforme* not only makes an utterly gratuitous and uncalled-for attack on the Brigade, but indulges in distasteful personalities concerning its chief, Superintendent Lynn, which should never have appeared in its columns. We think that few, if any, of the spectators of the work done by the Fire Brigade in extinguishing the conflagration will begrudge giving it the credit which is its due. To have completely mastered the outbreak, when it had already assumed considerable proportions, within the space of half-an-hour, redounds to the credit of the Brigade and its chief. Our contemporary makes the astounding assertion that the Brigade arrived only 43 minutes after having received notice of the fire. This statement we can only characterise as baseless. We were ourselves witnesses of the arrival of the engines and the firemen, and cannot bear out our contemporary's assertion, which moreover is disproved entirely by the official records kept by the Fire Brigade and the Municipality. It is to be regretted that *La Reforme* should have gone out of its way to cast a slur on the efficiency of our Fire Brigade, which is generally recognised as being of a high order.

SUDAN EXPERIMENTAL PLANTATION SYNDICATE

Mr. Leigh Hunt, the American millionaire, who is the moving spirit of the Sudan Experimental Plantation Syndicate, is expected to arrive at Cairo to-day from Europe. He will make a short stay in the Capital and will then proceed South to the site of his concession, near the river Atbara. A number of experienced men have been there organising the various departments of the syndicate's sphere of operations for the last three months, and a good deal of the preliminary work of organisation has been already got through.

NEW BANK IN EGYPT.

Mr. Pacelli, manager of the Banco di Roma, along with Com. Tittoni, a cousin of the Italian Minister for Foreign Affairs, and Mr. Benucci, recently arrived at Alexandria in order to consider the advisability of establishing a branch of the bank in Egypt. We understand that the opinion formed by these gentlemen of the prospects of a branch here is favourable to its establishment, and there is every likelihood of the proposal being carried through.

IRRIGATION PUMPS.

Gwynne's (Limited) have obtained an important contract for the supply of irrigation pumping machinery for the great syndicate, of which Mr. Leigh Hunt is the moving spirit, for cotton growing in the Sudan. This firm have over half a century's experience as hydraulic engineers, and have turned out centrifugal pumping machinery capable of discharging 363,636 cubic metres per minute, which is equal to the discharge of 363 rivers as large as the Thames, or 72 rivers as large as the Nile.

Mr. A. L. Webb, of the Irrigation Department, when in Holland in 1897, on behalf of the Egyptian Government, gave an excellent report as to the working of Gwynne's machinery in that country. In his work on Egyptian Irrigation Sir William Willcocks remarks:—"Indeed if it were not that the quality of English engines is so high and the Gwynne's pumps themselves nearly indestructible, pumping machinery would have succumbed to the Persian wheels." (See page 246 "Egyptian Irrigation, 1889"). Some of these machines have been at work for over fifty years.

NORTH SEA OUTRAGE.

THE COMING ENQUIRY.

TSAR AND THE CRISIS.

LONDON, October 29. Mr. Balfour stated that the Russian naval authorities would ascertain which officers were responsible, and the same will not proceed to the Far East. An International Court of Enquiry, as provided for by the Hague Convention, and not a court of arbitration, will enquire into the facts. There will also be a special Board of Trade enquiry at Hull at which it is hoped Russia will be represented.

PRESS OPINIONS.

The Standard and Morning Post are dissatisfied, and consider that the settlement does not redound to the credit and dignity of Great Britain. The Standard is of the opinion that no guarantee has been given that the Baltic Fleet will be kept out of mischief, since the Russians have not acknowledged their error. The Morning Post says we should like to know more about the proportion of the Fleet, and the rank and number of officers detained at Vigo.

LONDON, October 30.

The whole Continental Press rejoices with reference to the international enquiry, which is greatly strengthening the cause of peace throughout the world. Admiral Sir C. Bridge and Mr. Aspinall, K.C., have been appointed to report upon the damage and compensation in connection with the outrage to the trawlers. The Home Fleet is concentrating at Portland.

LONDON, October 29.

There will, apparently, be a British Board of Trade enquiry at Hull, a Russian naval enquiry at Vigo, and an international enquiry at The Hague or elsewhere.

RUSSIAN SHIPS AT TANGIER.

TANGIER, October 29. The battleships Ostyabya, Sivoi-Veliki, and Navarin, the cruisers Admiral Nakhimoff, Aurora, Seydlana, Dimitri Donskoi, Kamotchatka, Zhenchug, and Almaz, 7 torpedo-boats, and five colliers have arrived here. The rest of the fleet will remain at Vigo, where the British cruiser Lancaster has arrived.

Four Russian battleships and seven torpedo-boats have arrived.

Four Russian destroyers have passed here travelling eastwards.

VISITS EXCHANGED AT VIGO.

Vigo, October 30. Admiral Rodjstvensky and the commander of the British cruiser Lancaster have exchanged visits.

Vigo, October 30. Admiral Rodjstvensky is remaining temporarily here. He has returned the courtesy visit paid him by the commander of the British cruiser Lancaster.

A JAPANESE PROTEST.

MADRID, October 30. The Japanese Minister here has protested against the coaling and provisioning facilities given to the Russian fleet at Vigo. The Spanish Minister replied that other countries had given the same facilities.

TSAR RECEIVES BRITISH AMBASSADOR. St. PETERSBURG, October 30. The Tsar to-day received Sir A. Hardinge in a private audience extending over an hour.

THE WAR.

THE RUSSIAN LOSSES. St. PETERSBURG, October 29. (Official.) The total Russian losses from the 9th to the 19th inst. amount to 45,800. The figures mentioned on the 22nd were due to overlapping reports.

THE GREEK FLEET.

EN ROUTE TO ALEXANDRIA. ALGIERS, October 29. The Greek cruisers have left for Alexandria.

LOCAL AND GENERAL.

THE QUARANTINE BOARD meeting has been postponed to Thursday of next week.

THE GREEK SQUADRON is not now expected to arrive at Alexandria till Saturday next.

FRIDAY'S FIRE.—The amount of damage caused by the fire which broke out in Penasson's printing office on Friday, is estimated at L.E. 4,900.

STRAY AND OWNERLESS DOGS found in the Ghezreh district of Cairo and its neighbourhood during the night of the 3rd inst. will be poisoned by the police.

PUBLIC WORKS CONTRACT.—The construction of intakes of water on the Nagael, Ach moun, and Telwana canals in Menoufeh has been assigned to Mr. A. W. Murdoch.

SLAVE TRADE REPRESSION DEPT.—During the month of September the department granted manumission papers to four Sudanese female slaves, two in Cairo and two on the Red Sea littoral.

"AT HOME" IN MR. ALDERSON'S GARDEN.—To-morrow (Tuesday), at 4.30 p.m., Rev. Canon and Mrs. Ward are "at home" to the members of the congregation of St. Mark's, Alexandria, and All Saints', Ramleh.

TOUKT STATION.—There is no truth in the rumour published by the Cairo native papers, that the Railway Administration intends transferring Toukt station to another site. The station is simply to be enlarged.

ALL SAINTS' CHURCH, RAMLEH.—The services at this church on All Saints' Day (Tuesday), will be: 8.30 a.m., Holy Communion; 11 a.m., morning prayer; 6.30 p.m., evensong and sermon (preacher, Bishop Morley, D.D.)

ACCIDENT.—The right leg of Mohamed Effendi Safwat, mamour at the Alexandria Custom-house, was accidentally broken on Saturday afternoon by the fall of a log of wood from a passing cart. He was removed to the Deaconesses' Hospital for treatment.

SUEZ CANAL.—On the 27th inst. 6 vessels passed through the Suez Canal. Of these, 4 were British and 2 German. The transit and passenger dues for the day amounted to 205,278.18 frs. The total transit and passenger dues collected from the 1st to that date on 336 vessels amounted to 8,854,856.79 frs.

MYSTERIOUS MURDER.—On the night of the 26th inst. the headless body of an unknown man was found close to the bridge at Dahadous village, Mit Ghamr. The body was in a state of decomposition. The sous-chef of the Parquet and the mamour of the Markaz have arrived at the scene of the murder to hold an enquiry.

CHARGE AGAINST POLICE OFFICER.—A council of discipline was held this morning at the Governorate for the trial of Mr. C. Camilleri, officer at the Meshieh police-office, on the charge of having allowed a native prisoner in a state of intoxication to die without receiving attention, and not discovering the fact until a few hours after.

THE KHEDIVIAL YACHT Mahroussa came out of dry-dock yesterday morning, after being inspected by the engineer, specially sent out from England for the purpose. The latter has made out his report on the repairs needed by the yacht and sent it to the Ministry of Finance, for the necessary credit to be opened. The Mahroussa is to be sent to England to be overhauled next summer.

SERIOUS AFFRAY AT ASSOUAN.

FIGHT AMONG BISHAREEN.

(FROM OUR OWN CORRESPONDENT.)

ASSOUAN, Saturday.—A very serious fight occurred here a few days ago amongst the Bishareen Arabs at their camp outside the town, in the course of which some 20 men were badly injured.

There appears to have been a quarrel between two of the natives, which, from a personal matter, developed into a general scrimmage, both parties gathering together their supporters, with the result that knives and sticks were freely used.

Had it not been for the prompt appearance of what we—for the want of a better (or worse) term—call the police force, it is not improbable that the whole camp, composed of some hundreds of Bishareen, would have been engaged in a hand-to-hand encounter, but before much blood had been shed the police had put a stop to further strife.

About 20 men are now cooling their heads in prison, and a further 17 with broken heads and knife wounds are peacefully reposing in hospital.

ROYAL VISITORS.

Prince George of Hanover has left Gmunden on his way to Cairo, and he will stay in Egypt for about eleven months for the benefit of his health, and will probably be joined in February by the Duke and Duchess of Cumberland.

THE MAHARAJAH'S VISIT.

Lord Cromer called at Shephard's Hotel yesterday afternoon and paid a visit to the Maharajah of Jhalawar. The Maharajah left Cairo this morning at 11 o'clock en route for Port Said and embarks there on the P. and O. S.S. Egypt, which is due at Port Said to-morrow. The Maharajah is returning to India after a long tour in Europe.

EGYPTIAN ARMY.

During the absence on leave of El Lewa St. G. C. Henry Pasha, C.B., Adjutant General, El Kaimakam Palmer Bey, Assistant Adjutant General, Khartoum, will take over the duties of Acting Adjutant General.

El Bimbashi H. E. Dumbell, 11th Sudanese, passed the preliminary Arabic examination held on the 1st August.

Leave of absence, on private affairs, has been granted to El Miralal Gorringe Bey, C.M.G., D.S.O., Moudir, Sennar Province, and El Bimbashi Ahiery, Assistant Director of Intelligence.

Officers commanding Sudanese battalions are now permitted to enlist boys instead of men up to 25% of existing vacancies. The boys enlisted should show signs of being able to bear arms within three years.

Winter clothing will be taken into wear from Saturday next.

ARMY OF OCCUPATION.

Captain Mears, Commanding Army Service Corps, Alexandria, will join at Khartoum for duty on the 7th December next. He will be relieved at this station by Captain Crawley, M.V.O., A.S.C., early next month. Captain Crawley recently arrived from England.

CATTLE PLAGUE.

No fresh localities have been reported infected with cattle plague since the 29th inst. Two fatal cases of plague have occurred among a lot of 30 head of cattle in Mex quarantine park, which arrived from Alexandretta by the S.S. Marion on the 23rd inst.

BUBONIC PLAGUE.

A fresh case of plague was reported from Damietta on Saturday.

PLAGUE CREDIT.

According to the Mokattam, the Ministry of Finance has opened a new credit of L.E. 15,000 for the Sanitary Department to cover the cost of fighting the bubonic and cattle plagues.

CHRYSANTHEMUM SHOWS.

KHEDIVIAL HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY.

The annual Chrysanthemum Show of the Khedivial Horticultural Society was held at Ghezreh on Saturday and Sunday. On Saturday, the Earl and Countess of Cromer, Mustapha Pasha Fahmy, and many of the leading members of the Khedivial Societies of Agriculture and Horticulture were present. The weather was fine and warm, rather too warm for many of the exhibits, which had begun to droop and wither by Sunday afternoon. The exhibition was on the whole a success, though this year has been anything but a good one for chrysanthemums, and though H. H. Prince Hussein Pasha Kamel, who has been in former years one of the most successful exhibitors on a large scale, was unable to compete owing to the sudden death about a fortnight ago of his chief gardener, whose professional skill was well known.

Mrs. Foaden and Ahmed Bey Khouloussi were by far the most successful exhibitors, winning no less than 13 first prizes between them, besides numerous seconds. The following were the awards:—

- Class 1. Group of at least 25 pots of Chrysanthemums.—1st, Ahmed Bey Khouloussi; 2nd, Miss Florence Curtis.

Special prize for Roses.—Dr. Keatinge. The first prize in classes 16, 17, 18, and 19 for baskets and vases of chrysanthemums and other flowers fell in each case to Mrs. Foaden. In classes 20 and 21, for nurseries, no 1st prize was awarded, but both 2nd prizes were won by Mohamed Said El Kebir.

The special medal of the Royal Horticultural Society of England fell to the Tazim Department, Ghizeh Nursery. Special objects d'art for pot and cut chrysanthemums were won by Mr. H. L. Curtis.

ALEXANDRIA HORTICULTURAL SOCIETY.

The Alexandria Horticultural Society's seventh annual Chrysanthemum Show, held at San Stefano on Saturday and yesterday, is the largest exhibition of the kind that has ever been held here. It was so much larger than last year's that there was no room for the cut flowers in the large ball-room of the casino, and they and some of the pot plants had to be accommodated in the reading-room. Great credit is due to Lady Blomfield, Mr. Rolo, and Mme C. Debbane, who, although living in the heart of Alexandria and having consequently very small gardens, were able to stage remarkable exhibits. Perhaps the public of Alexandria has never seen two such beautiful boxes of chrysanthemums as those sent by Mr. Rolo, and amongst his collection was the best chrysanthemum in the show. The feature of the large groups were the masses of white bloom. All the groups showed much better taste than in the earlier exhibitions. THE STATE OF HELOUAN.

PUBLIC INDIGNATION.

There was a meeting yesterday morning of the Helouan Local Commission, but, as is usually the case, there were not sufficient members present to form a quorum, for only three of the commission turned up.

There was an informal discussion on the subject of the railway time-table, and it was agreed that the Delta Railway Company should be approached with a view to having a better time-table when it takes over the line. We hear that the inhabitants of Helouan are so indignant at the little practical use which the Local Commission is to the town, that it is proposed to organise an indignation meeting, at which the many grievances which the inhabitants suffer from, owing to the badness of the roads and the impracticable railway time-table, which is most inconvenient for travellers between Cairo and Helouan, will be aired.

POST OFFICE BUDGET.

Saba Pasha, the Postmaster-General, is at present in Cairo, where he is conferring with the Ministry of Finance on the next year's budget of the Post Office Administration. The budget is to be drawn up on a liberal scale, and many reforms and improvements will consequently be introduced in this administration.

BISHOP MORLEY'S VISIT TO TANTAH.

Bishop Morley leaves Alexandria this afternoon for Tanta, where he will be the guest of Mr. and Mrs. Suter. His lordship holds a service at 7.30 p.m. in the church-room, and on Tuesday morning reads morning prayer and celebrates the Holy Communion, preaching both on Monday evening and at the morning service on the following day. The Bishop returns to Alexandria about midday on Tuesday.

RAMLEH RAILWAY.

NEW CABLE LAID.

The Alexandria and Ramleh Railway Company completed the laying down of the spare electric cable between Bulkeley and Karmous on Saturday night, and last night the necessary tests for trying the insulation resistance were made. This morning, at 5 o'clock, the new cable was taken into service. It may now be reasonably hoped that no further breakdowns will take place in the company's service.

CHILDREN'S SAVINGS BANKS.

A SPLENDID INNOVATION.

An excellent scheme for promoting thrift among the children of this country has been elaborated by the Postmaster-General and will come into force on January 1. On and after that date any children, whose parents are desirous of encouraging thrifty habits in their offspring, will be furnished, on application at the post-offices throughout Egypt, with printed cards on which spaces will be allotted for ten-millime stamps. As soon as the child has filled up such a card with stamps to the value of P.T. 5, he will be able to present it to be deposited in the Post Office Savings Bank.

In order to extend the scope of this beneficial measure all schoolmasters will be authorised to give such cards to any of the pupils under their charge. The scheme is very praiseworthy and it will be interesting to observe how far it will be successful in Egypt.

In the reign of Augustus (says a writer in the Quarterly Review) there were 18,000,000 inhabitants; at the time of the Arab conquest, half that number; at the date of the expedition of Napoleon, 2,460,000; at the first official census in 1846, 4,468,000; at that of 1882, 6,806,000. The census of 1897 shows a population of 9,734,000, or an increase at the rate of about 3 per cent. per annum during the period of British occupation.

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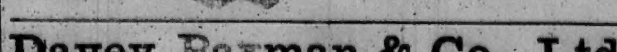
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
