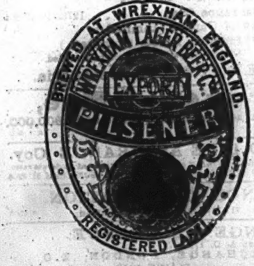

THE RUSSIAN STRIKES.

THE RUSSIAN STRIKES. COLLISIONS WITH RUSSIA. SUNDAY QUIET AT ST. PETERSBURG. A mob of strikers, armed at the point of the manufacturers to pay out more wages until work is resumed, assembled outside a factory demanding money. The strikers began firing at the troops from the windows of adjoining houses. The troops then fired into the crowd, and it is estimated that 20 persons were killed and 50 wounded.

WARSAW, February 11.

The Russian ironmasters have memorialized M. Witte demanding an improvement in the conditions of the workers, on the equality of the iron in the eyes of the law, the right for the workmen and masters alike to cease work, freedom of speech and press, and universal compulsory education.

WARSAW, February 11.

A general strike has been resumed here. The strikes are being resumed. There are 16,000 strikers in the city, but they are keeping quiet. The garrison has been reinforced.

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WARSAW, February 12.

A decree of the Tsar orders the formation of a committee to ascertain the causes of the workers' discontent, and to devise measures for preventing the same in the future.

WARSAW, February 12.

The fears of widespread disturbances here so far proved to be unfounded. The day passed quietly, the strikers being overawed by the imposing display of military force.

JAPS CAPTURE FMINENCE.

G.N. KAWIMURA'S PLANS.

Tokio, February 11. The Japanese captured an eminence to the south of Chang-Chieh last Thursday, driving out two Russian companies.

The Russians are continuously shelling Opena's centre and left. (Hester.)

London, February 11. It is thought that when the severity of the winters sets in General Kozlovna, whose new army of lightly equipped and has immense field guns, will endeavour to cut the Russian communications north of Vladivostok. (H.)

THE BALTIC FLEET.

SAILING OF THIRD SQUADRON.

St. Petersburg, February 12. The third Baltic Fleet has received orders to be ready to sail immediately. (H.)

Port Louis, February 11. Arrivals from St. Petersburg report that the Baltic Fleet is 2-3 weeks late, and that differences have arisen between Admiral Rodziewicz and the German companies who are supplying him with coal. The Admiral wishes the coaling to follow the fleet. This, however, refuse to do so on account of the Japanese being in too close proximity. (Hester.)

GERMAN NEUTRALITY.

Zanzibar, February 12. The Governor, Herr Goetze, requested five Russian cruisers which had anchored in German waters near Zanzibar to leave. The Kaiser has complied with the request. (Hester.)

JAP BATTLESHIPS ORDERED.

London, February 11. The "Daily Telegraph" learns from Tokyo that orders for four battleships have been placed in England, and also contracts for guns to the extent of £2,000,000. (Hester.)

H.M.S. "PYLADES" REFOLOATED.

London, February 11. H.M.S. "Pyrales" has been refloated. (H.)

JAPANESE-AMERICAN ARBITRATION.

Washington, February 11. A Japanese-American Arbitration Treaty has been signed here. (Hester.)

THE CHINESE LOAN.

London, February 11. There was a great rush at the Hong Kong and Shanghai Bank of subscribers to the Chinese Loan mentioned on the 9th inst. The crowds were controlled by police and the loans, which closed immediately instead of on Monday, was largely over-subscribed. (Hester.)

AUSTRIA AND HUNGARY.

Vienna, February 11. The Emperor will receive Herr Kossuth to-morrow. (Hester.)

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THE NILE IN 1904.

Lake Tana is well described and a plan with much interesting information is given showing its outlet.

Chapter 3 deals at considerable length with the utilization of the Nile from which the following interesting passage on the peculiar phenomenon of the "green water" —

"The colour of Nile water is generally a pale yellow, but in June, when the first indications of the coming flood are given by a continuous gentle rise of the river, the water changes, the water changes to green and remains so for two or three weeks. This green water has a very disagreeable taste and odour, and is especially objectionable when the Nile has been very low and the rise is a slow one. In June 1904 it was extraordinarily bad, and the river water was so poor in oxygen that standing on Kasr el Nil bridge at Cairo one could see the surface of the water covered with fish which apparently could only live near the surface. In the deep reaches near Kamboula, in Nubia, the fish died in myriads. This green water is attributed by some to the immense amount of vegetable matter brought down by the White Nile from the Sudd region. Some say that it comes principally with the first rise of the Sobat river. But the generally accepted theory today is that the green water is the result of vegetable matter from germs in the water itself, and that wherever or whenever the current becomes exceedingly slow it multiplies greatly. Upstream of the Assuan dam in June, 1903, the water was extraordinarily green and exceedingly objectionable. As it was about the upper sluices of the dam and broken up into spray on the downstream side of the dam it became so purified that I found it difficult to understand that the water flowing past Elephantine Island was what I had seen at Shendi."

The author pays a tribute to the memory of the great hydraulic engineer Lombardini, who predicted many years ago that more careful gaugings would astonish engineers as to the amount of sub-sil water which filters into the Nile, to be given back to the river in the months of deficit; he predicted that this would be found to constitute the heavy evaporation of April, May, and June, and recent research has substantiated his opinion.

The author sums up his opinion of basin irrigation as follows: "Considering the times of flood and low supply, the climate of Egypt, the turbidity of the Nile flood, and the delicate formation of the Nile valley, no better system than basin irrigation as practised in Egypt could possibly have been devised. Both to the general observer and to students of hydrology, we strongly recommend the study of this book; even to those comparatively few who have time and opportunity for the study of all that has been published on the Nile, it will be found valuable; while to the larger number, who are glad to find within a small compass all they require to know, it will be of the greatest service both as a book to read, and as an easy book of reference, for it brings up to date, in a condensed form, what has resulted from many years of patient study and research.

No doubt the author is correct in saying that the mystery of the Nile is far from being solved. Still it must be admitted that the Irrigation Department, of which he was himself for many years a distinguished member, has within the last twenty years done an immense deal of the work of scientific research, culminating with Sir William Garstin's monumental report of 1897 on the basin of the Upper Nile. His tributaries have been explored, the lakes at its head waters examined, their water sheds have been estimated and measured; and even the effect on them of the monsoons of the great Indian Ocean has been taken into consideration. When all this work has been done, and so it probably will be with the information that human skill and perseverance can give us, we shall still be in presence of the fact noted by a wise man, ages ago, that "the wind bloweth where it listeth and thou hearest the sound thereof, but thou canst not tell whence it cometh, nor whither it goeth," and so it probably will be with the Nile.

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LETTERS TO THE EDITOR. To the Editor of the Egyptian Gazette. Dear Sir,—I have read with astonishment your leading article in the "Egyptian Gazette" of 7th inst., on "Missions to Mohamedans," in which you conclude that Egypt's great need is not religion but sanitation. I don't want to enter into a controversy with you, but would like to tell you in a few words my own experience as a Moslem. I was a strict follower of the religion of Islam and was educated thoroughly in all its precepts, and that in lands where no other religion is known or taught, the Hadramout and the Yemen. Eventually I became Kahlil Islam, and so zealous was I that not only did I observe all that was imposed upon me by the Koran, but many things in addition, such as the pilgrimage to Medina, the opening of my house to all Moslem strangers, the spending of many of the nights of Ramadan in prayer and reading of the Koran, and the supplying of the wants of the poor to the utmost of my ability. All this I did in order to find peace with God and rest for my soul, but the only result was increased fear and trouble of conscience, till I could find no pleasure in anything. I thought that this state must arise from our neglecting as Moslems the sacred duty imposed upon us by our religion, of waging war against the unbelievers, and as I had not the power to do that, I tried to make amends for it by hating them with all my heart, till I could hardly bear the sight of a Christian. And so I remained without hope and without rest, until coming to a doctor, who told me that I was suffering from a very distressing disease, and my fellow-Moslems from what you have having tasted the joy and blessing of a living saviour, he was anxious that all the world should know him too; for the Christian religion differs from all the other religions in the world in this, that it consists in the knowledge of a person, a living person, and not in the holding of dogmas and beliefs. He preached to me Jesus, and I believed in Him as my saviour and found peace. It meant that I lost everything, that my name was defamed, my life attempted, and I became a poor outcast and wanderer from my native land; I very soon met, and I have been 2 times without bread to eat, and in the midst of it all my heart has been full of joy and love to God and all men, especially my own people.

I am afraid, dear sir, from your article that you know not yet to your heart the presence of this saviour, or you would have a better Gospel to preach than the Gospel of sanitation. It is possible that I, the poor Moslem, have entered into the Kingdom of Heaven before you the learned citizen of a Christian nation; even as He said of old to the Pharisees, "the publicans and harlots shall enter into the Kingdom of Heaven before you."—Yours sincerely, SALIM EL KHEMAYI.
