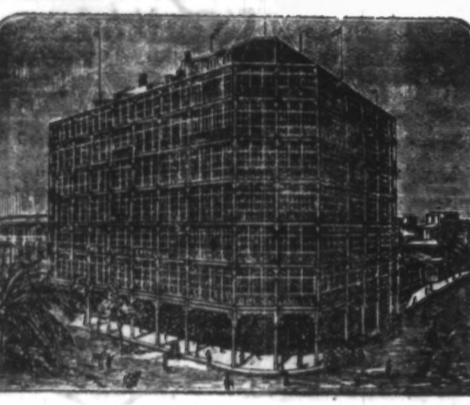

THE WAR.

JAPS OCCUPY NEW POSITIONS. RUSSIANS RETREAT IN DISORDER.

TOKIO, April 16. Oyama reports that a force, advancing north from Hsingching and driving the enemy before them, occupied Ying-cheng, which is situated 38 miles to the north of Hsingching, on the 14th inst.

STATE OF RUSSIA.

PEASANT MOVEMENT CAUSING ANXIETY. ST. PETERSBURG, April 15.

In view of the feared renewal of demonstrations, the garrison of the city has been strengthened by several sotnias of Don Cossacks.

The Russian peasant movement is causing serious apprehension again. Large numbers of landowners and their families are taking refuge in Moscow.

MOSCOW, April 15. The agrarian movement is spreading. Disturbances are reported from Tiflis.

CAPTAIN KLADO.

St. PETERSBURG, April 15. Captain Klado, who was severely reprimanded for his criticisms regarding the naval administration, has been given an opportunity of rehabilitation by the command of the river steamers in Manchuria.

CHURCH AND STATE IN FRANCE.

PARIS, April 15. The Chamber of Deputies has passed Article 2 of the Bill for the separation of the Churches from the State, which lays down that the Republic neither recognises nor salaries nor subventions any cult.

THE ROYAL CRUISE.

ALGIERS, April 15. The English Sovereigns have arrived and were greatly cheered. ALGIERS, April 14. The King of England has arrived.

THE BALTIC FLEET.

SIGHTED IN KAMARANH BAY

FIRING HEARD.

SAIGON, April 15.

The hospital ship "Orel" remained 36 hours here. She took on board 900 tons of coal besides food and medical supplies.

SINGAPORE, April 13.

Eighteen Russian ships were sighted on the 14th inst. in the Kamaranh Bay.

HONG-KONG, April 16.

The British S.S. "Telenachus" reports having heard firing 150 miles from the North Natuna Islands at 3.20 p.m. on the 12th inst.

SINGAPORE, April 16.

The Norddeutscher Lloyd S.S. "Prinz Heinrich" sighted 18 ships belonging to the Baltic Fleet in Kamaranh Bay at Annam at noon on Friday. She did not see the Japanese.

P. & O. STEAMER STOPPED.

HONG-KONG, April 15.

The P. & O. "Poonah" arrived here yesterday evening. She was stopped between Singapore and Saigon. After being overhauled she was allowed to proceed.

Many colliers are arriving here from Durban and Cardiff, apparently awaiting orders.

DUTCH PRECAUTIONS.

BATAVIA, April 16.

Seven Dutch cruisers, which are now at Rho, will return here to-morrow.

NAVIGATION RESTRICTIONS.

TOKIO, April 16.

The naval authorities have proclaimed the defence of the zones surrounding the Pescadore Islands and Okinawa in Liu-Kiu and the Islands of O-Shima and Emi off the Osuma Province. The usual navigation restrictions will be applied.

THE MOROCCAN QUESTION.

RELAXATION OF TENSION.

LONDON, April 15.

A relaxation of tension between Germany and France, concerning Morocco, is noticeable during the last few days.

PARIS, April 15.

M. Delcasse and M. Radolin have had an interview on the Moroccan question.

ROME, April 16.

The railway employes have decided to go out on strike.

LOCAL AND GENERAL

SAN STEFANO CASINO was crowded on Saturday and yesterday, on the occasion of the Flower Show.

MARSA MATRUH.—The new regulations relative to Matruh will be discussed by the Council of Ministers on the 24th inst.

BRAWL.—A serious brawl took place yesterday in the Custom-house quarter of Alexandria among some natives, five of whom were injured. Several arrests were made.

SALE OF PROPERTY.—The property of Mrs. Bittar, under which the Opera Bar opposite the Khedivial Opera House is located, has been purchased by a syndicate for £180,000.

EGYPTIAN MARKETS.—The recent rumour on the Bourse to the effect that the Egyptian Markets, Limited, had obtained the concession of the Cairo slaughter-houses is totally devoid of foundation.

HELLENIC ASSIZES.—The election of juries for the sittings of the Hellenic Assize Court, which will be held on the 14th proximo, took place at the Greek Consulate General, Alexandria, this morning.

ALDERSON'S GARDEN.—In consequence of alterations and enlargements to Alderson's Garden theatre, the usual performance will not take place there next Saturday. The gardens, however, will be open as usual to ticket holders.

SUEZ CANAL.—11 vessels passed through the Canal on the 13th inst., 6 of which were British, 1 German, 1 Dutch, 1 Austrian, 1 Egyptian, 1 Swedish. The day's receipts were frs. 281,095.15, making the total from the 1st inst., frs. 4,178,557.67.

AN EXECUTION took place at Cairo on Saturday at the prison of the Native Court. The criminal executed was Hassan el Iskanderani, one of the Zagazig murderers. The condemned man appears to have met his death with a good deal of composure, quoting verses and asking for a cigarette before mounting the gallows.

BANDMANN-DALLAS OPERA COMPANY.—In addition to the principals already announced for the Cairo season, Mr. Bandmann has specially engaged Miss Marie Elba, the well-known prima donna. Miss Marie Elba, it will be remembered, was the original Elba in Hanzel and Gretel, which character she played during its entire run, and for several seasons at the Grand Opera, Covent Garden, playing the principal roles. The advance booking for the season continues very satisfactorily.

PRINCE COLIBRI.—This extraordinary little man continues to attract a large number of visitors at his daily receptions held from 5 till 10 p.m. in a nicely got-up drawing room next the Alhambra Theatre. He certainly is the most wonderful midget we have yet seen, and his memory for English and French songs seems unlimited. Our local medical men have pronounced him "perfect in all respects" and a great success undoubtedly awaits this unique specimen of mankind on his arrival at the London Hippodrome. He will shortly be leaving for England, via Brindisi.

STEAMER MOVEMENTS.

The Messageries Maritimes S.S. "Congo," from Marseilles, passed the Straits of Messina on Saturday, and is due here to-morrow.

The S.S. "Tuscan Prince," from Manchester, left Malta on Saturday, and is due here on Wednesday next, with passengers and general cargo.

The S.S. "Spartan Prince" left Alexandria for Mallerstham on Sunday morning last.

The Ellerman S.S. "Britannia" sailed from Liverpool on Thursday for Malta and Alexandria with general cargo.

The Ellerman S.S. "Fabian" sailed hence on Saturday direct for Liverpool with general cargo, including 1,401 bales cotton and 18,196 bags onions.

The Ellerman S.S. "Sardinia" arrived this morning from Liverpool, Glasgow, and Malta with passengers and general cargo. The Westcott S.S. "Barcelona" is expected here from Port-Said to-day.

EGYPTIAN TRUST AND INVESTMENT.

Considering the enormous quantity of applications received, we must congratulate the management on the rapidity with which the extraordinary amount of work has been carried out, necessitating the staff working day and night, and we feel sure that their efforts will be appreciated by the public in general.

NEW HOTEL COMPANY.

"Al Hayat" hotel-sanatorium is to be floated as an Egyptian limited liability company very shortly. This magnificent establishment at Helouan is at present a German company and is registered at Bremen. The capital of this new flotation is to be £50,000, which is to be taken up by the proprietors.

NEW HOTEL FOR CAIRO.

Among the most important hotel schemes for Cairo, which are shortly to be realised, is the project of the great Swiss hotel capitalist, Mr. Bucher-Durrer. This gentleman has had some experience of hotel management in Egypt, and he has undertaken the management for one season of the New Hotel, on the site of the present Grand Continental Hotel at Cairo. He has bought a fine plot of land in Kasr-el-Doubara, and intends erecting a palatial hotel in the neighbourhood of the British Agency. Mr. Bucher-Durrer is the proprietor of the Hotel Quirinal in Rome, and is also interested in the Hotel Burgenstock near Lucerne, the hotel and railway on the Stanserhorn on the Lake of Lucerne, the Grand Hotel Mediterranée Pegli on the Italian Riviera, the Palazzo Hotel at Milan, and the Hotel Euler at Basle.

UPPER EGYPT HOTELS.

The decree authorising the Upper Egypt Hotels Company, Limited, will appear in the "Journal officiel" on Wednesday. The public issue will be out in a few days. It has already been largely over-subscribed.

THE MATARIEH SCHEME.

The project of the great Belgian capitalist, M. Empain, for a new line to Matarieh has been practically approved by the Egyptian Government. This new electric line will start from the Djellal Buildings, at the corner of the Boulac road, and will follow the Abbas boulevard and then branch off to Matarieh and the new Oasis.

The scheme for the establishment of a Casino has not yet been settled.

DELTA LIGHT RAILWAYS.

The Delta Light Railway Company intend to greatly improve the Helouan Casino, and to have a good orchestra there next season. The line from Cairo is to be doubled as far as Tourah.

A number of large first-class bogie carriages, fitted with electric light, will arrive for the Helouan line before next season. The line is to be ballasted, which will considerably lessen the dust nuisance.

HELOUAN.

Since the Municipal Commission at Helouan has been abolished the Government has been taking some steps to ameliorate the condition of that town. The Sanitary Department, on the initiative of Mr. Arnold H. Perry, Under Secretary of State, has already begun the embellishing of the town by planting trees, extending the electric light installation, and laying down new roads. We understand that some of the so-called squares, which are now in their primitive state of desert, are to be laid out. Now that Helouan is under the direct protection of the Ministry of Public Works, the inhabitants are in hopes that the water supply will be improved by the long-desired filter beds, and it is believed that by next season Helouan will have an excellent supply of pure filtered water.

THE KHEDIVÉ.

H.H. the Khedive left Montazah for Cairo on Saturday by special train at 5.10 p.m.

This morning, a Council of Ministers was held at the Helouan Palace, under the presidency of H. H. the Khedive, who afterwards gave audience to H. H. Prince Osman Pasha Fadel, Dr. Arloing, and Sir Edward Zohrab Pasha, who took leave of his Highness.

This afternoon, his Highness will give audience to Count Gabriel Zohrab, Idris Bey Ragheb, Mohamed Pasha Suleiman and his son. The Khedive and Khedivah leave Cairo definitely for Alexandria on the 4th May.

THE MIXED COURTS.

ADMISSION OF ENGLISH.

A very important decree will be promulgated in the course of a few days, authorising the admission of English as one of the officially recognised languages in the Mixed Tribunals.

THE MAHMAL.

The Ministry of the Interior has received a telegram from the Emir el Hag, stating that the Mahmali, the escort, and the pilgrims accompanying it, left Medina for Yambou on Saturday by the Sultan road.

THE BALTIC FLEET.

A fourth Russian squadron under the command of Vice-Admiral Wesserao is expected to arrive at Port-Said about the end of July. The squadron is composed of the battleships "Imperator Alexandre II.," "Slava," and the cruisers "Pamyat Azova," "Amiral Korniloff," and "Pan I."

NATIVE TRIBUNALS.

Ahmed Talant Bey, has been appointed counsellor of the Native Court of Appeal. He was formerly Chef du Parquet of the Native Tribunals.

Mohamed Eff. Mahfouz has been appointed Chef du Parquet of the Native Tribunal of 1st Instance at Alexandria.

NOTES FROM CONSTANTINOPLE.

(FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT.)

Constantinople, April 10. M. Maximoff, Russian Diplomatic Agent at Cairo, is expected to arrive here this week. He intends to spend a few weeks in Constantinople before proceeding to Cettigne, to take up his new post.

M. Poppe, councillor of the French Embassy here, leaves to-day for Paris, where he is to be married to Mlle Prevost, sister of M. Prevost, of the French Diplomatic Service in Egypt. M. Poppe will return here with his bride next month.

The French Embassy here has applied to the Sublime Porte for the exequatur for M. Davouca Takla, appointed French Vice-Consul at Assouan.

A batch of German tourists arrived here last week, on their way to Palestine, whence they will return by way of Egypt.

There was a great run last week on Credit Foncier Egyptian bonds, the old issue going up to 350 frs. and the new issue to 278 frs. The stock of bonds at the Imperial Ottoman Bank was exhausted, and the bank had to telegraph to Alexandria for 1,000 of the new issue.

MR. RONZEVILLE'S CONCERT.

Mr. C. Ronzevalle gave an interesting concert on Saturday night at the Grand Continental Hotel. He was ably assisted by Mr. Léon Ronzevalle, whose two performances on the cello were much appreciated, and by Mrs. Nolan, whose harp solos, "Autumn" and "Watching the Wheat," were most enthusiastically received. Mr. Ronzevalle gave us no less than 11 songs and met with considerable success: his voice, if not very powerful, is clear and of a very agreeable timbre, and in the mezza-voce and piano passages he showed admirable technique and finish. We only wish to criticise one point, viz., the arrangement of the programme. The transition from "Some Day," with its religious sentiment, to one of Planquette's songs, and from the fine "Ave Maria" composed by the singer to his Turkish love song "Bénum halym," struck us as being a little too abrupt. The arrangement of the Cancion Espanola also struck us as being less successful, more commonplace in fact than that of "Bafnah Hindi" and "Bénum halym," where the composer shows a thorough knowledge of how to introduce the Oriental colour into European music without in any way exaggerating it.

ENTERTAINMENT AT PORT SAID.

Port Said, Saturday. Mr. and Mrs. Terence Ramsdale, who have come from Alexandria and Cairo and are on their way to Bombay, gave a variety entertainment at the Eldorado Theatre last night. Unfortunately, the entertainment had not been sufficiently advertised, and many people were unaware that these well-known artistes were in the town. The hall was in consequence not so crowded as it would otherwise have been, but those who were present fully appreciated Mr. and Mrs. Ramsdale's efforts to amuse them. For a space of more than two hours they kept the ball rolling with barely a minute's interval between the pieces, and never once got out of touch with their audience. Mrs. Ramsdale, who has a remarkably pure and clear voice, charmed the audience with her excellent rendering of "The Star of Bethlehem," and was no less successful in her lighter efforts, namely, "Little Mary," "She reads the London papers every day," and "Keep off the Grass." Mr. Ramsdale evoked great admiration by his versatility, and kept the audience convulsed with laughter at the original patter which he introduced into his songs. His American top boot dance drew forth rounds of applause. The entertainment included a sketch entitled "The Wild Hussars" or "A Love Stratagem," in which Mrs. Ramsdale took the rôle of Nancy, the mistress of the inn, who, although she loved Samuel Stammers, did not wish to be too easily won. Mr. Ramsdale played the dual part of Samuel Stammers and Sergeant Major Blunt, and it was difficult to imagine that these two parts were being played by the same man, so expert was he in the make-up and so perfect his portrayal of the two widely different characters.

PERSONAL AND SOCIAL.

Sir R. Wingate Pasha, Governor-General of the Sudan, has left Khartoum for Berber to open the fifth agricultural show there.

Lady Cromer left Port Said to-day for England. A number of members of the British Colony were present at Cairo railway station yesterday to see her ladyship off.

Marchioness Salvago-Raggi, wife of the Italian Diplomatic Agent, left for Europe on Saturday by the Austrian Lloyd steamer.

Among others who left by the same steamer were M. Platt, Vice-Consul for Austria-Hungary in Cairo, Commandatore Tittoni and Cavalieri Benucci, directors of the Bank of Rome.

Baron Knoop is leaving Helouan for Europe on the 20th proximo by the Austrian Lloyd steamer from Alexandria.

A luncheon was given at the San Stefano Casino on Saturday by the committee and members of the Alexandria Horticultural Society. Covers were laid for sixty persons.

Lieut. J. G. Devenish, and Lieut. G. M. Jennings, 2nd Royal Inniskilling Fusiliers, have been granted leave of absence on private affairs.

We regret to announce the death of Ahmed Bey el-Baga, the late Omdah of Edfou. Deceased was aged about 90 years, 60 of which were spent in the Government service, as Omdah, on the Assouan Municipal Council, the General Assembly, and the Legislative Council. He died on Friday last, and his funeral was attended by all the local officials, omdehs, merchants, and all the notables of the province.

One of the most important events in the journalistic career of the veteran Mr. Frederick Greenwood, whose seventy-fifth birthday was recognised a few nights ago by the banquet over which Mr. J. Morley presided, was the action he took in connection with the Suez Canal shares. It was in 1875 that, acting on the information which had come to his possession as an editor, he went to Lord Derby, then Foreign Secretary, and warned him that the Khedive's shares, which were private property, were about to pass into the hands of a French syndicate. The Foreign Minister could not believe that an editor, however influential, could have secured information of which the British Consul at Cairo was ignorant.

The difficulties of the situation were obvious. The only way to set the matter at rest was to make direct inquiries of the Khedive. If there was no truth in the story the result of the interrogatory might be to put the idea of selling the shares into the Khedive's head. This position was put to Mr. Greenwood, but he urged the sending of a telegram to our Consul. It was sent. To quote Mr. Greenwood's own modest words: "It instructed Colonel Stanton to go immediately to the Khedive and put the question point-blank. Meanwhile, the Prime Minister would be seen, and Lord Derby's visitor might call next day to hear the reply from Cairo. It is enough to add here that on the receipt of the answer the purchase for England was taken up, and went to a speedy conclusion."

The services of Mr. Percy, the well-known billiard marker at Shepheard's Hotel, have been engaged for the summer season for the Chateau Royal, Ardennes, where he will remain until his return to Egypt next winter.

LA SPECULATION SUR MARCHANDISES ET LE COMMERCE EN EGYPTÉ

Depuis quelques années nous assistons à un développement tellement important de la spéculation sur notre place, que nous considérons qu'il est de circonstance, et même grandement temps, que nous en fissions deux mots. Notre but n'est ni de faire cours de morale publique, ni de discuter la chose au point de vue économique; aussi, nous n'envisagerons la question que dans ses rapports et ses conséquences pour notre commerce.

La spéculation, au sens absolu du mot, a toujours existé, car, en considérant bien les choses, le négociant qui achète une marchandise dans l'espoir de la revendre par la suite, par les aléas qu'il court, fait en somme un peu de spéculation; seulement, en ceci, comme en tout du reste, il y a des distinctions à faire; aussi, la différence est-elle énorme entre la spéculation réfléchie, modérée et limitée aux spéculations de la personne qui s'y engage et celle qui dégénère, devient effrénée et finit en ne laissant que des ruines et des catastrophes derrière elle.

De par son existence commerciale, Alexandria a naturellement, dès le début, connu le premier genre de spéculation, qui a pu donner parfois lieu à des excès isolés, mais qui n'a jamais causé une désorganisation de son commerce; mais malheureusement, avec le développement de sa Bourse, l'autre genre aussi, celui que nous désignons par les mots jeu pur et simple, s'est introduit petit à petit et a pris droit de cité. Et si Paris, Liverpool, New-York, Chicago, etc., etc., ont eu leurs accaparements respectifs des Cuivres, Coton, Blés et autres articles, opérations qu'on a qualifiées jadis d'actes de folie, notre place peut se vanter de n'avoir rien en ce genre, attendu que, avant ou après ces célèbres combinaisons, elle a eu aussi ses syndicats sur les Orges, les Maïs, les Fèves, le Blé et la Graine de Coton, qui, pour être importants qu'ils aient été en eux-mêmes, n'ont pas moins, toute proportion gardée, laissé des souvenirs peu agréables à ceux qui avaient eu la mauvaise idée de les former et aux avides qui avaient eu la malechance de s'y enfoncer.

Ces événements auxquels nous venons de faire allusion sont déjà du domaine du passé, car, pour la plupart, ils datent de 25 ans en moyenne; mais quel est le vieux courtier, l'ancien négociant qui, quand il les évoque, n'en parle pas avec tristesse?

Dans tous les cas, en comparant leurs résultats considérés désastreux en leur temps, avec ce à quoi nous sommes arrivés aujourd'hui, à cause de l'exagération qui précède à presque tous les actes de nos boursiers, on serait pour ainsi dire justifié à regretter leur caractère bérin et restreint. En effet, on dirait que la période d'accalmie relative, que nous avons eue par la suite et qui a été si favorable à notre commerce en général, n'a servi qu'à préparer le terrain à ce formidable réveil de la spéculation qui a commencé vers 1898 et qui n'a fait que s'accroître depuis lors.

A la dite époque et par la suite, de nombreuses agences de courtage, alléchées par le succès de quelques maisons établies depuis plusieurs années et qui s'étaient fait une spécialité du travail avec la Caire et l'Alexandrie, se fondèrent et, avec le plaisir d'Antérior, se suffirent à pas pour fournir tout l'aliment nécessaire à leur fiévreuse activité et pour combler leurs besoins, elles jetèrent, elles aussi, leur dévolu sur la Capitale et sur les villages et y développèrent la spéculation d'une façon intense. Les crédits accordés et les premières réussites, leur attirèrent des affaires colossales et quoique le résultat final ait été, en somme, la ruine de la clientèle, il n'en est pas moins vrai que, dans l'ensemble et malgré les inévitables saignées faites à leurs poches par des défaillants, le plus grand nombre de ceux qui se sont dédiés aux affaires de courtage en contrats se sont enrichis.

Ce profit de reste, les seuls qui aient réellement obtenu des circonstances, car, pour ce qui est de nos exportateurs, ils n'ont eu qu'à souffrir du nouvel état de choses qui a complètement bouleversé le système de travail de la place et qui les a obligés à s'occuper un peu plus de la spéculation et à attendre les revers qui se sont régulièrement produits après chaque manœuvre exagérée, pour se refaire ou pour gagner un peu d'argent.

Il est vrai que les occasions propices ne leur ont pas manqué, car, en récapitulant les faits par ordre chronologique, nous trouvons que la ridicule poussée de 1899-1900, des cotons à \$ 17 1/2 et de la graine à P.T. 85, nous a valu la réaction à 11 1/2 et à P.T. 55; que la campagne absurde entreprise en 1900-1901 pour soutenir les cours au-dessus de \$ 15, nous fit finir la saison aux environs de \$ 9 1/2, et ce malgré une récolte déficitaire; que le prix \$ 26 pratiqué un an ou deux après nous fit assister à une dégringolade de 8 tallaris en peu de jours; que les 22 tallaris de l'année dernière, nous causèrent une liquidation finale dans les 13 1/4 tallaris et que les 16 1/4 tallaris de cette campagne nous firent dégringoler à 11 1/4, sans préjudice de ce qui nous attend plus tard à la suite du soutien tenté. Mais si les plus avisés parmi nos négociants ont pu à leur tour tirer profit de ces fluctuations inouïes, il est de fait, d'autre part, que le commerce légitime s'est trouvé constamment désemparé et ne sachant de quel côté se retourner.

Nous avons souvent entendu dire par des haussiers acharnés que, habitant le pays, ils devaient travailler pour le bien du pays. Ceci est tout simplement la plaisanterie dans la bouche de ceux dont l'unique préoccupation consiste à chercher d'amasser une fortune, même au détriment du voisin si nécessaire; en tout cas, on n'aurait aucune peine à leur démontrer que si leurs manipulations ont pu, au début, être utiles aux cultivateurs, les pauvres fellahs, objet de leurs soucis, n'ont guère su en profiter par la suite, si ce n'est que pour spéculer eux-mêmes. Car, il est acquis que la spéculation a été emparée même du paysan égyptien, lequel, dans son insatiable avidité, a fini,

ALEXANDRIA FLOWER SHOW.

TENTH ANNUAL EXHIBITION.

The tenth annual exhibition of the Alexandria Horticultural Society was held at San Stefano on Saturday and yesterday. The show was opened on Saturday at 4 p.m. by H.H. the Khedive, who arrived at the Casino at 3.50 p.m. accompanied by H.E. the Governor, On His Highness entering the grounds, the band of the 2nd Battalion Royal Berkshire Regiment struck up the Khedivial Anthem, military honours being paid by a detachment of Egyptian troops.

The Khedive was received at the door of the Casino by H. H. Hussein Pasha Kamel, H. H. Prince Omar Pasha Toussoun, Mr. Lionel Sanders, and the other members of the committee. Among others present we noticed Pakry Pasha, Boutros Pasha Ghali, Yacoub Pasha Artin, Harvey Pasha, Mr. and Mrs. Gould, Baron and Baroness von Humboldt, Dabroeden, Dr. Ruffier, Mr. Ambrose Ralli, Mr. P. W. Chataway, Rear Admiral Sir Massie and Lady Blomfield, Baron A. de Menasse and several Municipal Councilors, the Sub-Governor Rev. Canon and Mrs. Ward, several magistrates, and other local notabilities.

The Khedive shook hands with several of these present, exchanging a few words with each, and afterwards went over the exhibition accompanied by Judge Sanders and some other members of the committee, to whom His Highness was pleased to express his great satisfaction at the evident signs of progress realised. He congratulated the committee and the principal exhibitors, and at 4.20, still accompanied by H.E. the Governor, took his leave. By this time a large company had assembled and His Highness shook hands with several who had not been on his arrival. Prince Hussein, Pakry Pasha, Gen. Bullock, Yacoub Pasha Artin, Professor Schweinfurth, and Mr. Foaden came specially from Cairo to attend the show.

To come to the show itself; the centre of the ball-room in which most of the rarest specimens were grouped, was occupied by a large collection of caladiums belonging to Mr. Zervudachi, on which the only criticism one might make would be to say that though the leaves were large they were not sufficiently variegated. Certainly the most difficult exhibit for the judges to decide upon in the groups of pot plants, were the three collections of Begonia Rex. H.H. Prince Toussoun won the silver medal, and Mme Debbane and Hussein Bey Riaz were each awarded a bronze medal. The whole of the east side of the room was taken up by a large group staged by Mr. Zervudachi. This group contained several fine specimens of Anthuriums Dracaenas, and had a magnificent centre of gloxinia plants. This year there was only one group of ferns, belonging to Mr. Zervudachi, but it was so large that it took up the whole of one side of the room. In the first tent there were three large collections of palms, which occupied over 30 metres of space, and in front of them there were three collections of geraniums, each of which must have contained several hundreds of plants. The large groups of annuals, each of about 500 pots, were much admired. That of Judge Sanders was designed in the form of a garden and was noticeable for the inclusion of a number of pots of Lobelia Tenor, which is a novelty in Egypt. There were three groups of show pelargoniums, the first prize being taken by Mr. Benachi, who staged some well-grown plants, especially a white variety named after Lady Cromer. Before leaving the section of pot plants we should like to congratulate the committee upon the order in which the various groups were arranged, and especially upon the grass borders which helped so much to set off the plants. The handsome *objet d'art* offered by Prince Hussein Pasha Kamel was on view close to the exhibit of M. Zervudachi, who won it; Judge Sanders, being second, was awarded a silver medal. The latter also won the prize for the best rose in the show, which was a specimen of Maman Cochet.

Mr. Jacot des Combes staged some fine pansies, and Mr. Percy Carver showed a good collection of sweet peas, though perhaps not so fine as has sometimes been seen. Mr. H. Seffer showed a large collection of amarillis and gladiolus, which both obtained first prizes. The silver medal of the Royal Horticultural Society of London was won by M. Zervudachi, and the bronze medal, given by the same society, by Prince Omar Toussoun.

There were no less than eight tables decorated by ladies, consequently the room allotted to them was quite full. Mrs. W. R. Williams, who took the first prize, arranged her table very gracefully with eschscholtzia and white daisies placed in white vases. Miss Hewat came next with a pretty arrangement of yellow roses. There were two equal thirds, Miss G. Atkin, who chose red roses, and Miss G. Allen, who had quite an original idea which represented water with a mirror in the centre surrounded by miniature rockeries and green grasses. Miss Euna Anderson obtained a notice of highly commended for a graceful table of shell pink roses and pink candelshades.

There were only four vases of roses. Miss Allen, who won the first prize, carried out the very effective idea of placing her exhibit in a rough basket. Miss Hewat obtained second prize for some light pink roses. Mrs. John Ross made an effective arrangement of white flowers other than roses, and Miss G. Atkin gained the second prize for an artistic arrangement of palm leaves and nasturtiums. The silver medal for a large collection of potatoes was gained by M. Monfront, but on the whole there were not many amateur exhibits of vegetables, the most worthy of remark being Mrs. Watson's peas and Mrs. Richmond's collection of five distinct kinds.

M. Audré, a landscape gardener from Paris, showed several plans of the gardens which he is designing for the Khedivial family in Cairo, and also plans of what he proposes should be done for the new parks of Alexandria.

The judges were, for the first and second divisions Admiral Blomfield and Mr. Ebell; for division 3 Mr. H. Seffer, Mr. Magnus, Bartau Bey, M. Audré, M. Ebell, and M. Tramontina; for division 4 Mrs. Chataway, Mrs. Percival, and Mr. Michel Sinadino; division 5, Yacoub Pasha Artin, Simond Bey, Mr. Lang Anderson, Mr. Waller, and two natives.

Refreshments were served on the terrace and many of the visitors lingered for some time at the tables listening to the strains of the band of the 2nd Royal Berkshire Regiment, which performed a selection of music on the sea front.

THE POLICE AND CRIME.

To THE EDITOR OF THE EGYPTIAN GAZETTE.
Sir,—In a recent issue of your paper you had an article on the methods employed in Egypt to ensure the diminution of the number of crimes, not of crimes committed, but of crimes reported. I should like to add my testimony to the evidence before you that these methods are not confined to the Moudirieh of Assiout.

By reason of the bridge, Nag-Hamadi is a locality famous for the number of corpses retrieved from the river, for either they get hung up in the pontoons, or at least they are seen by the watch. The other day it appears that the police were notified that a woman had disappeared from Dechna and was asked to watch for the body coming down the river. The police communication was as follows: "If you see a corpse at the bridge, say nothing; if it catches, set it adrift again." Owing to the presence of a European when the corpse did catch, the police programme was not carried out, to the great annoyance of the police officer, who is debited with another undiscovered crime.

The inference drawn in your article that this game of beggar my neighbour played by the police is in part due to the system of fining for untraced crimes seems justifiable. But think what the results would have been had there been instead a bonus for crimes discovered! In the particular case I quote above, I fancy we have not heard the end of the matter, as the P.O. in his distress vented his wrath upon a French lady who was standing by and had been instrumental in (excuse the phrase) "upsetting his apple cart."—I am, etc.,
