Dr. BARNARDO.

This morning's telegraphic news tells us of the passing away of one of England's, or rather Ireland's, most remarkable sons. Thomas John Barnardo, F.R.O.S., Edinburgh, whose philanthropic efforts on behalf of the waifs and strays, not only of London, but of many of the large cities of the United Kingdom, are known the wide world over, was born in 1845, and completed his 60th year only a month or two since. Whilst a student at the London Hospital in 1866, where he was studying, preparatory to mission work in China, his attention became directed to the terribly neglected state of the homeless boys in the East End of London. So pitiable were their tales, that it was some time before he could realise that he was not being deceived, but the more he enquired into the truth of their stories, the more did he find that the actualities were even worse than the boys' statements. Under their guidance he explored a wilderness of old sheds, tumble-down out-houses and wreckage near Houndsditch and Petticoat-lane by night. Here in one place he saw before him eleven poor boys from 9 to 18 years of age, sleeping in all postures, clad in their rags, and exposed under the open sky to wind and rain. Those who know what this means in London, will readily believe the doctor when he says that the sight followed him and haunted him, causing him to reflect on the hideous actualities and the sorry side

of modern civilisation, and rousing him to action. Possessed of indomitable energy, full of a sympathy that has never weakened, and fired with an enthusiasm that has never failed, spite of great physical weakness at times, Dr. Barnardo gave up his contemplated missionary life abroad, and devoted himself to home mission work among the waifs and strays of London, and no more convincing evidence of the wonderful gifts he possessed of organisation, persuasion, and intuition could possibly be given, than a bare recital of the list of the various institutions established by him, all endowed with a vitality that astonishes the visitor; and even at the present time increasing in number. The bare statement in the Annual Report for 1903, that 12,805 applications were received, and admission granted in 4,078 cases, gives no idea of the true meaning of the figures or of their diverse character, and it is only an intimate acquaintance with the working of the various homes and agencies, that at all enables one to form an idea of the magnitude of the work, and the enormous responsibility that rested upon the shoulders of their now deceased founder and director.

Dr. Barnardo was, undoubtedly, the chosen instrument for carrying out a work of incalculable benefit to the world at large. The impression largely prevails that his work was confined to the helping of waif and destitute children only. These came first undoubtedly, but of the many poor children that owe their chances in life to him, many have been well and tenderly brought-up, have known more of a parent's love than the children of wealthy parents in fashionable life whose one object it is to live a life of pleasure, but, from adverse circumstances of all kinds, have become destitute. The Stepney head-quarters bar in letters of gold, the following motto, "No destitute child ever refused admission," and whatever might be the cause of the destitution the help was given, and in very many cases was not confined to the children themselves. The ramifications of this vast enterprise were enormous, and so well and thoroughly has the work been done by the various heads of departments that there is little or no fear of any disorganisation occurring through the lamented decease of the head of the institutions. Dr. Barnardo was not the man to leave things to chance. For some years he has been warned of the inevitable result of continued work at high pressure, and four years ago he was plainly told that he must give up work or die. But rest to a man of his temperament was simply impossible. He has gone to Naunheim every summer for treatment of the heart disease from which he suffered, only to return to work, lecture, preach, visit branch establishments, and in his spare time consider the huge mass of correspondence placed before him by his secretaries, work that frequently, even of late, occupied him till the small hours of the morning. The end has come at last, and it will not be at all surprising to those who knew Dr. Barnardo, to learn that it came suddenly, and that he died in full harness. We regret that within the limits of this article it is impossible to give more than the hasty and imperfect sketch we have written respecting this truly remarkable man. His work has been monumental, and his memory will be enshrined in the hearts of hundreds of thousands—indeed we may say millions—of those whom in one way or another he has benefited. To those who have come into personal relations with him, and knew the man himself, the loss seems irreparable, and we feel it will be long ere we shall look upon his like again.

**SCANDINAVIAN CRISIS.**

**HOPES OF SETTLEMENT.**

KARISTAD, September 20. The Swedo-Norwegian conference continues. While the main question, regarding the demolition of the Norwegian fortresses and the eventual reference to arbitration of certain other questions, are virtually agreed upon, other knotty points are still unsettled, but it is believed that they will be adjusted satisfactorily. Meanwhile troops are kept in the neighbourhood of the frontiers. (Reuter)

**FRANCE AND GERMANY.**

**HITCH IN NEGOTIATIONS.**

PARIS, September 20. It is stated here that there is a hitch in the negotiations with regard to Morocco, due to the French anxiety for a precise definition of their special rights for policing the frontier. An authoritative German statement declares that further serious difference is impossible. (Reuter)

**GERMAN SOCIALISTIC CONGRESS.**

**THE GOVERNMENT AND MOROCCO.**

JENA, September 20. The Socialistic Congress has refused to censure the attitude of the Government with regards to Parliament's action concerning Morocco. (Havas)

**GERMANY CONVOY CAPTURED.**

**SURPRISED BY HOTTENTOTS.**

CAPE TOWN, September 20. The Hottentots have captured a German convoy near Kietmanshoop. The escort was surprised and practically annihilated. A thousand cattle, 122 waggons, some of which were laden with ammunition, and a number of rifles were captured. (Reuter)

**ITALY AND THE MULLAH.**

**RAIDS OF MIJERTAIN TRIBES.**

ROME, September 20. Advice from Somaliland state that the Mullah has complained to Italy of the raids of certain Mijertain tribes in the Italian sphere. The attempt of the Italian warships to arrange a settlement through the Sultan of the Mijertains has failed. (Reuter)

**RUSSIAN FREEDOM.**

**UKASE TO BE GRANTED.**

LONDON, September 20. The "Times" learns from St. Petersburg that an ukase granting freedom of meeting, of speech, and of the press, and the immunity from arbitrary arrest, will be promulgated as soon as the measures can be drafted. (Reuter)

**EAST-ASIATIC SERVICE.**

**RUSSIAN VOLUNTEER FLEET DELAYS.**

ODESSA, September 20. The departure of the Volunteer steamers and others bound for Vladivostok has been deferred, pending the abrogation of Japan's right of capture. (Reuter)

**RUSSIA'S NAVY.**

LONDON, September 20.

The "Daily News" states that a Russian Government agent in London is negotiating for the construction of the whole new navy in Great Britain. (Reuter)

**GREECE AND ROUMANIA.**

ATHENS, September 20.

The Hellenic Minister at Bucharest and the Roumanian Minister at Athens have gone on leave without being replaced. (Havas)

**M. WITTE VISITS M. LOUBET.**

PARIS, September 20.

M. Witte has gone to Valencia to visit M. Loubet. (Havas)

**DEATH OF DR. BARNARDO.**

LONDON, September 20.

The philanthropist Dr. T. T. Barnardo has died. (Reuter)

**LOCAL AND GENERAL.**

**THE PLAGUE.**—Yesterday's plague bulletin reports one death in hospital at Alexandria.

**SALE OF LAND.**—We are informed that Dr. Varenhorst Pasha has sold a large site at Ramieh to the Egyptian Trust and Investment Company.

**STRAY AND OWNERLESS DOGS** found in the Bonlac district of Cairo during to-morrow night and at dawn of the 23rd inst. will be poisoned by the police.

**SUEZ CANAL.**—10 vessels passed through the Canal on the 18th inst., 8 of which were British, 1 German, 1 French. The day's receipts were frs. 328,966.16, making the total from the 1st inst. frs. 5,055,797.80.

**THE RAILWAYS ADMINISTRATION.**—As a result of the public competitive examination held by the Railways Administration M.M. Ugo Rossetto and Emile Arian have been appointed assistant engineers, the former at Embabeh and the latter at Alexandria.

**SAN STEFANO CASINO.**—We are asked to announce that those who reserve seats for dinner at the San Stefano Casino on Saturday will be admitted to the subscribers' grand ball. Subscribers are asked to note that no invitations will be issued, but that their subscription tickets will gain admittance for them.

**SUDAN GOVERNMENT TRANSFERS.**—El Bimbashi A.A.C. Taylor, junior inspector of the Bahrel Ghazal province has been transferred to a similar post in the Berber province; El Bimbashi H.W. Channer, 3rd Battalion transferred to the Sudan Government, has been appointed junior inspector of the Bahr el Ghazal province, has been re-transferred to the Army; Mr. W.E. Drummond Hay, deputy-inspector in the Finance Department has been appointed junior inspector therein.

**MINISTRY OF FINANCE.**—The following modifications, to date from the 1st October, will take place in the duties of the inspectors and sub-inspectors consequent on the absence on leave of Mr. Etherington-Smith and Barnett Stuart:—Inspector Haines will be in charge of Menoufieh, Galieh and Dakhalieh provinces, inspector Mohamed Effendi Housny will be in charge of the Madiriels of Keneh, Guirgehad Assouan and inspector Dallin will be in charge of the Gharbieh and Behera provinces.

**FOR THE CALABRIAN SUFFERERS.**—We would once more appeal to our Alexandria readers to support a benefit performance for the relief of the victims of the Calabrian earthquake. To-morrow night the Societa Filodrammatica la Margherita will hold a "soiree de gala" at the Eden Theatre for the benefit of the sufferers, and have arranged a programme which cannot fail to please any audience. This society will present the Italian comedy *Infedele*, which will be followed by the farce *Il Cuoco ed il Segretario*, and the Armenian band will play selections during the intervals.

**SOCIETE REUNION DES FAMILLES.**—A grand fete will be given by the Societe Reunion des Familles at the Mex Casino on Saturday, commencing at 9.30 p.m. The programme will include a ball, and a vocal and instrumental concert in which Miles G. Capozzi and M. Tortella, and M.M. G. Sacco, J. Andrei, and E. Chaloub will take part. The Armenian band will provide the music for the dances, of which no fewer than twenty-one appear on the programme, including polkas, waltzes, lancers, barn-door dance, pas des patineurs, a moulinet du pas de quatre, a galop, and the inevitable cake-walk. At 1 a.m. there will be a grand quadrille, as an adieu to the Mex season, and at 2 a.m. a lottery for thirty prizes will be drawn. The casino will be brilliantly illuminated à la Venitienne, and there will also be a firework display. The entertainment will be under the patronage of Baron E. Acton, consul-general for Italy, and the proceeds of the lottery will be given to the relief fund for the victims of the Calabrian earthquake, two circumstances which cannot fail to attract large crowds.

**THE SUCRERIES.**

**FEATURES OF CONCORDAT.**

A reprieve saves a prisoner from being hanged, it does not necessarily carry with it an order of his instant release from gaol. Such is the character of the concordat préventif; it staves off a sudden and reverberating financial crash, but it may only delay a compulsory liquidation. In the case of the Sucreries, we hope for the sake of the country that the respite will enable the company to reorganise and recover, but while we recognise this pleasant possibility, we cannot shut our eyes to the fact that nothing in the decision of the Cairo Mixed Court can be taken as a guarantee that the compulsory winding-up of the company will not eventually become necessary. Article 206 (new) of the Mixed Code gives the terms on which a person or corporation is allowed to enjoy the benefit of the concordat préventif. Its chief features are these. The appointment by the tribunal of one of its members, the "juge commissaire" who takes and goes through the debtor's books and finds his exact financial situation, decides under what conditions if any, the debtor can continue to do business, calls a meeting of the creditors, reads them a report on the situation, on the question of the debtor's good faith and his proposals.

Once the juge commissaire is appointed the debtor ceases payments by right. The names of the administrators under the concordat suggested by Maitre Carton de Wiart have been formally accepted by the Court. M. Dabourg, we understand, will sign for his colleagues, Sir Elwin Palmer and Harari Pasha, during their absence.

**NEW HOTELS IN CAIRO.**

Besides the National and the New Khedivial, the former in the Sharia Soliman Pasha, and the latter in the Sharia Bab-el-Hadid, both of which are announced to open on the 1st November, we learn that a well-known Swiss group are in treaty for the purchase of the Khedivial-Mother's palace in the Kasr-el-Doubara quarter, for the purpose of transforming it into a first-class hotel, whilst the representative of another syndicate just arrived in Cairo has been making enquiries for acquiring a property in the Opera Square, also with the intention of erecting a large up-to-date hotel with a splendid arcade of shops underneath. We shall publish fuller details of both projects as soon as the negotiations now in progress are completed.

**A DRAMA OF THE DESERT.**

In our issue of the 18th instant we mentioned that advice had been received from Assiout by the Ministry of the Interior that two camel-men, accompanied by a policeman, who had left there the previous week, having in their charge some money for the pay of the police at the Oasis, had been murdered, and that the policeman who returned to Assiout with the news was wounded in the head. As the money was found intact it was at once seen that the motive for the crime could not have been robbery. An enquiry was at once instituted by the local Parquet and the mamour of the district, while a force of police was sent in search of the murderers who, the wounded policeman averred, were brigands. As no tracks could be found near the spot where the murders had been committed suspicion was aroused, and the policeman was suspected of having been guilty of the deed himself. It now appears that the latter was accompanied by his wife, and three traders also went with the caravan.

From the evidence of the latter it now transpires that it was the policeman himself who shot the camelman, (not two as originally reported), in consequence of having discovered an intrigue between him and the woman. On hearing the report of a gun one of the traders rushed out of his tent to discover the cause, and was himself also shot dead. The medical man who examined the wounded policeman was of opinion that the wounds he bore in the head were self-inflicted, and such turns out to be the case. This man, who is now in hospital, has been placed under arrest, and will be tried for the murders as soon as he is sufficiently recovered.

Have struck rich ore 200 ft level north; extent at present unknown.—Office note. 1.—A cable has been sent to the manager requesting full information as to the rich strata mentioned in the above cable.

**NOTES FROM PORT SAID.**

**NIGHT NAVIGATION IN THE CANAL.**

(FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT.)

Port Said, Tuesday. Night navigation is now permitted, subject to certain conditions as to the beams of vessels and their power, though it is at their captain's own risk. The Bibby line Lancashire was, I believe, the first ship to avail herself of the permission, and she arrived here safely late on Monday night.

Great interest is felt here in the coming of the members of the commission, some are to arrive to-morrow, but they will await the arrival of the "Chef du Transit" who comes on the M.M. Salasia. Rumours and wild stories are rife in the town regarding the various proposals that have been made about the unfortunate Chatham, but I think I can safely say, that nothing is as yet decided nor will anything be until the gentlemen, whose arrival is so anxiously looked for, have carefully gone into the matter themselves.

**NAVAL NOTES.**

H.M.S. Sirius, the second-class cruiser which is expected at Suez to-morrow, is to transit the Canal at once, provided she does not receive orders there to undertake the investigation and punishment of the offenders in the recent Red Sea piracies. It is currently reported here that her captain is to return south and go into this matter at once.

The Sirius is a vessel of 3,600 tons displacement, having a speed of 19.75 knots and is armed with eight heavy guns.

The Terrible, Powerful and Repown are expected here in a short time, but doubt is expressed as to their ability to pass the Chatham, they all being of immense proportions.

**ARRIVAL OF EXPLOSIVE EXPERTS.**

Messrs. Harris, Thomson and Cunningham experts of Nobell's factory, together with M. Coullant and the various chiefs of the Suez Canal Company, arrived by the Brindisi mail this morning, and proceeded to the wreck of the Chatham, where lengthy deliberations were held, the results of which are unknown.

**NOTABLE PASSENGERS.**

The S.S. Tebe which arrived here yesterday morning had on board Marquis de Sangulians, Prof. Bosco, Conte Deciani, and various other members of a colonial Congress which proceeds to Assiout, close to Maseara. They dined with Conte Mancinelli Scotti at the Eastern Exchange, and proceeded through the Canal in the afternoon.

**GALA PERFORMANCE AT EL DORADO.**

In connection with the recent subscriptions, which have been raised in aid of the sufferers from the Calabrian earthquakes, a gala performance has been arranged for to-night at the Eldorado Theatre. Various members of the Consular staff here have formed themselves into a committee. The whole of the auditorium of the theatre has been taken up and many subscriptions have been collected, among which the Comité de Bienfaisance has subscribed frs. 150.

**ITALIAN NATIONAL FETE.**

The fête in honor of the unification of Italy which was held last night at the Alhambra Theatre was a great success. Baron Acton and most of the principal members of the Italian Colony were present, and the audience was most patriotic. After the opening of the fête with the National hymn, which was loudly applauded, an eloquent speech by Mr. Zucchi aroused the enthusiasm of all present. The pupils of the Conservatoire then gave a pretty rendering of an air by M. Colella, and then came the delightful comedy *Nessuno va al campo* and other historical pieces and recitations. The fireworks and illuminations were capital, the charity bazaar and its lottery for the victims of the Calabrian Earthquake a great financial success, and the Khedive's military band with that of the Greek Philharmonic Society, as well as the orchestra ably directed by Professor Gianni Galetti, were greatly appreciated. A vocal and instrumental concert with selections from *La Poupée*, *Mascotte*, *Tosca*, etc., and the performances of a conjuror-illusionist, finished the evening very pleasantly.

**STEAMER MOVEMENTS.**

The Moss liner *Menes* sailed from Malta yesterday afternoon and is due here on Saturday afternoon, with passengers, mails, and general cargo.

The Khedivial mail steamship Assouan will leave Alexandria at 4 p.m. on Sunday and Port Said at 4 p.m. on Monday for Beyrout, Tripoli, Marsina, Alexandria, Larnaca, Limassol, Caiffa and Jaffa.

The M.M. Niger which left Alexandria on the 15th inst. arrived at Marseilles yesterday morning.

**EGYPTIAN SILVER CURRENCY.**

TO THE EDITOR OF THE EGYPTIAN GAZETTE.

Sir,—With reference to your article of the 21st ult., your leader writer appears to have misunderstood some of the suggestions made by Mr. Roussin as to the rules to be followed in calculating the future currency needs of Egypt, that I should like to be allowed to criticise the critique.

The regulation of a token currency is a comparatively simple matter, and does not give rise to the divergent theories that exist, for instance, in the case of paper currency. This is because a token currency regulates itself, the rôle of the Government being confined in ordinary circumstances to the replenishment of its stock when it is getting low, as is done, for instance, in England.

Something more than this is necessary in Egypt, because, if the government waited till its holding began to get low, the new supplies could not be minted in time to meet the demand. This makes itself felt at one season of the year only, i.e. during the cotton season in October and November, while the silver takes three months to arrive from date of order. The instructions to the Mint must therefore be given not later than July, supposing that it is necessary to make fresh provision. In July and August the Government holding reaches its maximum (i.e. the circulation reaches its minimum) so instead of ordering new supplies when stock is running low, the somewhat paradoxical rule of ordering that just at the moment when there is most in hand has to be adopted.

The data available for determining the amount to be ordered are as follows:  
1. The demand for extra coin for the cotton crop includes and greatly exceeds the amount required to increase the permanent circulation. The public takes what it wants for the cotton crop, retains what it needs for increase in circulation owing to growth of population, etc., and returns the rest, when the marketing of the crop is practically over, into the hands of the Government. This last winter the public took out L.E. 360,000 in silver, of which the Government received back L.E. 200,000 during the spring and summer of this year, the balance of L.E. 160,000 being retained as the permanent addition to the circulation. Hence it is obvious that there is not the slightest necessity to consider any of the points detailed by your leader-writer. The Government by providing for the cotton crop and for that alone, provides *ipso facto* much more than enough for all other contingencies.

2. The figure for peak seasons shows that the demand for the crop varies roughly according to its price, its quantity and the rapidity with which it is brought to market. But at the time it is necessary to order coin, none of these factors can be foretold with any pretension to accuracy, and "keeping in touch with banks and markets" is of very little help. Therefore the only safe course is to prearrange a crop of maximum quantity at a very high price, and provide for that always.

3. To do this it deemes imperative to fix the minimum contingency, below which the Government reserve at the opening of the cotton season must not be allowed to descend. The experience of past years shows that even in a season of record crop and prices, the expansion in the winter circulation has never reached £400,000. That amount has therefore been chosen as the irreducible minimum the Government must have in hand. This rule is not a fixed one, since it does not prevent the Government from providing any amount over the minimum which it may deem advisable.

Had this policy been initiated earlier, there would have been no impediment to the automatic self-regulation of the currency, and no scarcity would have occurred.—I am, Sir, etc.

**(FROM OUR FINANCIAL CORRESPONDENT.)**

London, September 15th.

During the latter part of the week the Stock Exchange has been occupied with the fortnightly settlement, which has been an unusually heavy one, owing to the large increase in business which is now taking place. The directors of the Bank of England decided on Thursday last to make no change in the Bank rate. Pending their decision, prices were heavy, but as soon as it was known that they had made no alteration, buoyancy all round was the order of the day. The Bank returns show that notwithstanding the large withdrawals of gold, the reserve had only fallen £189,000, owing to the reflux of coin and notes from circulation here; and this now stands at £24,506,000. There is still a feeling that the demand for gold for Egypt and South America must increase, and consequently it is thought probable that a higher rate will prevail in the autumn; even a 4% rate should not be detrimental, as the signs of improvement in trade throughout the country are becoming more evident every day. Consols, which were as low as 89½; rose to 89½, and close to day at the latter price. In the foreign market, Japanese bonds were firmer on a good demand, the First Four-and-a-half per cent. rising to 94½ and the Second ½ to 87 premium. They leave off at 94½ and 84½ premium, respectively. Russians remain unchanged, with the exception of a nominal rise of ¼ in the Five.

Home Rails show little change on dealings since last week, with the exception that Southern stocks have advanced slightly. The American market has been active with a reaction in prices, which is considered only natural after the recent advances. Reports from the United States are most optimistic, both as regards the condition of the crops and the trade outlook. Consequently, higher prices are looked for all round during the winter months.

In the Egyptian section, there has been some good buying of the shares of the Anglo-Egyptian Bank. The company, it is stated, has had an exceedingly profitable year. National Banks are firm at 27½ and Agricultural Banks maintain their prices at 14 5/8. A new Franco-Egyptian Bank has been formed under English law, with a capital of £500,000 in 25 shares. The whole of this amount has been placed, and the £5 are now quoted on the Paris Bourse at 45. This bank is connected with the Crédit Mobilier in Paris, and the Credito Mobiliare in Italy. The report which was current in the early part of the week that Sir Ernest Cassel was interested in the promotion with the idea of assisting the reconstruction of the Societa des Banques et Raffinerie d'Egypte is quite incorrect.

Now that most of the parties interested in the above concern are in Cairo, you will probably be obtaining copies of information as to the course of events in connection with the reconstruction of this company; the understanding here, however, is that it will be granted the benefit of the concordat préventif. The shares of the Daira Sugar Company are quoted to-day at 44.

In the mining section the continued interest in Rhodesian shares has had a good effect on the market generally, and if this continues we shall see higher prices in almost all sections. Nile Valley, to which we called attention when they stood at 15½—have been as high as 18, with good buying, due to a belief in the satisfactory settlement of the Robinson interest, and also to the report from the manager that a good crushing of 405 tons yielded 365 ounces of gold. The Egyptian Mines Exploration group are firm as the result of the developments in the Semna mine of the Fatra Company, particulars of which appear elsewhere.

I also enclose for your perusal a reprint of the leading article which appeared in the London "Daily Telegraph" of June 26th last, which deals with the subject in a very succinct form, and if you can draw attention to the appeal in your editorial columns, my Committee would be very grateful.

To THE EDITOR OF THE EGYPTIAN GAZETTE.

Sir,—An organization has been formed to carry out the above-named important object. How important it is can best be realised by a consideration of statistics which Dr. Latham submitted at the last Annual Meeting of the Hospital Saturday Fund. He stated that in London alone 16,000 persons die every year whose valuable lives might be saved with proper treatment, to say nothing of the thousands who are slowly moving to their doom.

Again, taking London by itself, he computes that no less than 80,000 of its population are stricken with one form or another of tuberculosis, and makes the startling deduction that one in every sixty-five will be dead in five years' time from a preventable disease.

The monetary loss to the industrial classes is appalling, and though there are no actual figures to go by, some comparative idea can be formed by the estimate, which Dr. Herman Briggs, the well-known health officer of New York, calculates cost £66,000,000 annually to the United States.

Owing to the work of the Poor Law Unions and the few Consumption Hospitals and the National Association for the Prevention of Consumption, in which His Majesty the King takes a deep personal interest, the death rate from tuberculosis has been reduced during the last sixty years by no less than two-thirds, which means a saving of 75,000 lives a year.

The National Committee, of which Her Royal Highness Princess Christian is President has been established under the auspices of the Hospital Saturday Fund, for the establishment of Sanatoria for workers suffering from tuberculosis; it is an exceptionally representative body, including delegates from practically all the great Friendly Societies and Trades Unions, and the work is receiving enthusiastic support in all directions.

The Special Appeal Committee consists of Her Royal Highness Princess Christian of Schleswig-Holstein, Her Highness Princess Victoria of Schleswig-Holstein, the Duchess of Somerset, the Marchioness of Londonderry, the Earl and Countess Cadogan, the Earl and Countess of Derby, the Bishop of Stepney, the Lady Brassey, the Lady St. Heliers, the Hon. Harry Lawson and Mrs. Lawson, the Hon. Mrs. William West, Lady Duckworth, Sir William Taylor, Captain Balfour, M.P., and Lady Nina Balfour, Mr. Moore Bayley, Mr. Walter Burns, Mrs. James Coats, Mr. Eric Hambro, M.P., and Mrs. Eric Hambro, Mr. Charles and Mrs. Robt. and Mr. Van Alen, and it appeals to the public for £50,000 to provide the building and acquire the site for a first sanatorium for the accommodation of 200 patients. About £5,000 has already been promised, and a suitable site has been secured at Benenden, Kent.

The various Societies and Trades Unions guarantee the cost of maintenance, but under the terms of their constitution, they can only make small donations towards the building and purchase of land. The Sanatorium, therefore, will be self-supporting, and no appeal for funds will ever be made to the public again.

The following extract from Dr. Latham's address is extremely interesting from the economic point of view:—

"Mr. Alfred Chapman and Mr. Russell, of the Ancient Order of Foresters, have made an important investigation into the cost of consumption to a single Court of the Ancient Order of Foresters. The result of this investigation is so striking that there is reason to hope that all the Friendly and Allied Societies will make exhaustive enquiries into the subject. Mr. Russell finds that the average

his Court is three times as great as the pay to any person dying from another disease. A man dying from consumption costs the Society £21, and a man dying from another disease costs £7."

In pressing this appeal, enough has been said to bring home to the public the awful condition of things which this movement is organized to cope with; no words are needed to make it more impressive—the pathos lies in the figures quoted above. In this sense it must appeal personally to every one, but it gains additional force, in that, it is economically sound and its working is based on the principles which govern the great industrial Benefit Societies, and applies the sound principle of thrift to the greatest of all blessings, health. It is a practical movement against one of the worst scourges of our country, and in this sense becomes a truly national one.

The Special Appeal Committee earnestly invite employers of labour, Trades Unions and Friendly Societies who have not yet joined the movement, to do so. The Secretary, Mr. E. Douglas White, will be pleased to give full particulars to any one applying to him.

(Extract from the "Daily Telegraph", June 26, 1905.)

At Chelsea House to-day, with the Princess Christian presiding, the preliminary steps will be taken by the National Committee for the Establishment of Sanatoria for Workers suffering from Tuberculosis towards bringing the project for which it was formed to wider public notice. The benefits of open-air treatment, especially in the earlier stages of this dire scourge, are now fully recognized, though unfortunately at present the means of cure are too limited, and many have to put up with inadequate and incomplete methods of treatment. This Committee, which has Princess Christian as its President, includes a very large number of well-known names in the list of its Vice-Presidents and active supporters, among them being the Archbishop of Canterbury, the Duke and Duchess of Portland, the Duke and Duchess of Westminster, Earl and Countess Cadogan, the Bishop of London, Lord Burnham, Sir Savile Crossley, Mr. A. J. Balfour, M.P., Mr. Joseph Chamberlain, M.P., Lord and Lady Chesham, the Hon. Harry Lawson, M.P., and Mrs. Lawson, Lord and Lady Iveagh, the Chief Rabbi, Sir William Broadbent, and Mr. and Mrs. Leopold de Rothschild. The co-operation of the great Provident and Friendly Societies has been secured, as it is the primary aim of the effort to be entirely self-supporting when once established. Hence upon the Committee are representatives of such well-reputed Societies as the Ancient Order of Foresters, the Independent Order of Foresters, the Independent Order of Oddfellows, the Hearts of Oak, the Amalgamated Society of Railway Servants, the Fawcett Association (General Post Office), the Hospital Saturday Fund, the Board of Guardians for the Relief of the Jewish Poor, the London Society of Composers, and many more.

The speakers at the meeting will include Earl Cadogan, the Bishop of Stepney, Dr. Acland, Mr. Garland (Chairman of the Committee), and Mr. Bonn (Secretary of the Hospital Saturday Fund). Details will then be given concerning the scheme, which, briefly, is to erect a first sanatorium for the accommodation of 200 patients. It is to be upon a scale simpler and less expensive than has yet been tried, and it is believed that many of those who seek its early aid will be not only capable of, but actually benefited by doing, light farm work, by which it will be made self-supporting. A most promising site has been secured at Benenden, in Kent, and the total estimated cost for its purchase and for putting up suitable premises is £50,000. After this, the various Societies co-operating will contribute towards the maintenance of their own exertions. About £2000 is already promised. According to present intentions, a monster mass meeting is to take place in the autumn to bring the project directly to the notice of working people.

On Thursday next, at Chelsea House, under the Presidency of her Royal Highness Princess Christian, with Lord Cadogan as Chairman, will be held a meeting to further a philanthropic movement of a novel and most promising character. The movement is novel in the sense that it combines two well-known principles, both of which flourish in this country, but which are rarely, if ever, found in combination. The object is primarily to fight the great White Plague—as Tuberculosis is grimly but appropriately called—as is done in many Institutions scattered over the country supported by voluntary contributions. What differentiates the aims of the "National Committee for the Establishment of Sanatoria for Workers suffering from Tuberculosis" is this: After the initial expense—only some fifty thousand pounds—of acquiring land and erecting the necessary buildings has been raised by the liberality of the munificent, the whole maintenance of the Institution will be paid for by the class for whose benefit it will exist, through the medium of the great Friendly Societies, Trade Unions and other cognate organizations. This is really a new departure, to which, perhaps, the nearest parallel is the Rowton Houses system. The effort is as economic as well as a charitable one, and as soon as the material fabric has been erected and paid for, the charitable will never be called upon to subscribe again. On the other hand, the self-respect of the working-classes will be maintained at a high level, because those who profit by the advantages offered to them will be conscious that they owe the opportunity, not to charity, but to their own qualities of thrift and providence. Most people are aware, in a general way, of the ravages of consumption and other forms of tuberculosis, but few realize how deadly and devastating this scourge is. For instance, how many who read this article grasp the awful truth that tuberculosis kills one victim in England and Wales every five minutes? Every twenty-four hours of the year, on an average day, there die two hundred and eighty-eight human beings in England and Wales of a disease which, in its earlier stages at least, is curable. This is no wild guesswork, but an inexorable conclusion drawn, as Dr. Latham told the Committee of the Hospital Saturday Fund at the annual meeting two months ago, from the unimpeachable statistics of the Registrar-General. A death list such as this, from a colliery accident or a shipwreck, would occupy public attention for weeks; and yet, day in and day out, this curable disease carries off all but three hundred victims. Dr. Latham further tells us that in London alone we have to-day forty thousand persons—the strength of an army corps—suffering from consumption, and, if we include all forms of tuberculosis, the total of the working-classes is a double that of the population of London as a whole. And Dr. Latham puts the case in this startling but too well-confirmed form: "Of the working-classes—men, women, and children—whom you meet in the streets of London to-day—at least one in thirty-three will be dead within five years from tuberculosis." These are sober facts, which may well stagger humanity.

It is not, of course, contended that treatment at the earliest appreciable stage of the disease in the best-equipped sanatoria will extinguish this colossal death-roll. Medical science, with its magnificent record of marvellous achievements to give it confidence, does anticipate that in time tuberculosis will be the name of an almost obsolete plague. But physicians are certain—with a certainty born of actual experience—that a reduction of at least one-half, or even two-thirds, can be effected at a cost which would not only increase the liabilities of the great Friendly Societies, but would actually diminish them. Messrs. Russell and Chapman, who speak with the highest authority on the financial position of the Ancient Order of Free Foresters, have given us the result of their investigation into the cost of consumption to a single Court of the Order. They say that "the average cost of sick pay to a consumptive member of this Court is three times as great as the pay to any person dying from another disease. A man dying from consumption costs the Society twenty-one pounds, and a man dying from another disease costs seven pounds."

Nor is this all we have to go by. Dr. Latham, and there is no more trustworthy authority, made the following statement to the Board of the Hospital Saturday Fund in the address from which we have already quoted:—"As many of you are aware, a law was passed in Germany some years back which compelled every one with an income of less than one hundred pounds per annum to insure against sickness. When this law had been in force for a few years the insurance companies were heavily hit by consumption. At least one person in every three who drew sick pay from them was suffering from tuberculosis. The companies investigated the matter thoroughly. They sought medical advice, and were told that the most hopeful treatment of consumption was by means of efficient sanatoria. They were, moreover, told that if no treatment were attempted, possibly two consumptives in every ten would be cured by natural means, but if patients were sent in a sufficiently early stage to sanatoria, seven out of the ten would have the disease arrested. The chairman of one of the principal German insurance companies proved that if one hundred and forty out of five hundred consumptives could be so far

restored to health as to do without sick pay for one year, this would be sufficient to recoup the company for their treatment in a sanatorium, or for the erection and maintenance of an institution of its own. Consequently, the German insurance companies erected sanatoria for their clients, and so satisfied are the business men with the results, that they are extending the system."

Already the idea, which is the object of this meeting on Thursday to promote, has caught on with the leaders of the great Friendly Societies, Trade Unions and other similar organizations. Mr. Garland, who is well known as a representative of the Post Office employees, has obtained the consent of the Postmaster-General to a reduction of two shillings a year from the pay of all employees willing to give their consent, and it is hoped that a sufficient sum will thus be raised to endow fifty beds for postmen, sorters, and other servants of the Post Office.

Of course, it will at once be asked, why do not the Friendly Societies find the money for building sanatoria of their own? The answer is simple; that, under the existing Friendly Societies Acts, the different Boards may not employ their accumulated funds in other than the strictly limited and scheduled way. But if this inexpensive experiment proves a success—as it is practically certain to do—the Friendly Societies will be stimulated to have the Acts controlling their employment of funds relaxed so as to enable them to build sanatoria for themselves, or to endow beds in existing institutions.

Our reason for calling attention to this meritorious scheme (details of which can be acquired by applying to the Secretary, at the Offices, 54, Gray's Inn Road, W.C.) is that it seeks to cope with a terrible and increasing evil, by aid of remedies the efficacy of which has been demonstrated on a large scale, and on economic principles which must induce the working-man to protect himself, at a very slight cost, against a disease which is more than decimating the class of which he is a member.

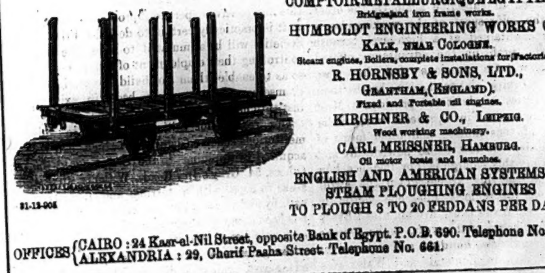
