THE DREADNOUGHT.

Today a new epoch begins in the history of naval construction, with the launching of the most powerful engine of destruction that has ever been devised for the Dreadnought, which will be launched by the King this afternoon. What will the Admiralty do with this ship of tremendous power when she is in commission and flying the white ensign? With her ten 12in. guns of the latest type, in contrast with only four such weapons mounted in even the best foreign battleships, she will be equal to any two vessels now afloat. Her broadside in a sea fight will consist of the fire from no fewer than eight of these deadly pieces, and in defensive qualities, thanks to the thickness and quality of her armor, she will be immune from damage by gunfire at ordinary battle range. The Atlantic Fleet, the "pivot" force of the navy, and consequently it is in the natural order of things that His Majesty's ship Dreadnought should be attached to this force, which is commanded by Vice-Admiral Sir W. Legislative Council. The Legislative Council will meet on 15th inst.

At the Hotel. It is rumored that the Chancellor of the University of Al-Azhar has resigned, owing to a difference with the Council of the Senate of that University.

Dangerous Sweats. A young Greek boy purchased some caramels at Alexandria two days ago and encumbered some afterwards. The sweets were bought from a street hawker.

The Nour at Bahr. The "Aida" left Suez hurriedly on Wednesday evening for the South, in search for the coastguard cruiser "Nour el Bahr," which vessel is overdue at Suez since some days.

There will be a meeting of the Egyptian Institute on next Monday afternoon, when Dr. Apollodorus will lecture on the linguistic and ethnological relations of the Pelasgians, Greeks and Albanians.

The inauguration of International Exhibition of Art will take place at the United Artists on Wednesday next, at 2 p.m. This year's "Salon" promises to be very fine. It will be open to the public on and after Thursday next.

From the 1st of January to the 8th of February, 9,742 tons of coal were imported into Egypt. Values were \$5,537, Net weight 16,784 tons, 2,745, Durahing 14,103, and other pieces 802 tons. During the same period last year, 10,662 tons of coal.

As a sample of the striking rise in land values at Alexandria, we may instance the case of Meatra, Husein-el-Husseini's property, opposite the Egyptian Hospital. It consists of about 400 sq. paces and was bought three years ago for \$20,000. It is now being offered for \$21,000 to the "Urban and Rural" Company.

H.M.S. Diana. H.M.S. Diana returned to Suez from Port Sudan on Monday last. After coasting in the North Sea she anchored in the Suez Roads. Captain R. S. Phylips-Hornby, R.N., of H.M.S. Diana, accompanied by Mr. V. T. Hughes-Leslie, British Press-Consul at Suez, paid an official visit to Ibrahim Hanim Bey Governor of Suez, on Thursday last.

The recording of meteorological observations as promised by the light-house in Egypt and the Red Sea has been commenced. Compared with previous records conducted by government officials and private initiative, a graphic representation will show whether the assertions of older residents, as to the climate having altered in recent years, will be borne out by accurate scientific observations.

The future prospects of Helwan are still brightening. The price of land is going up and there is no doubt that there will be a boom in the near future. The principal hotels are doing well, and the provision of new rolling stock for the railway will be a great acquisition. The new houses which have been exceptionally successful and the prospects of the forthcoming meeting are most satisfactory.

The manager of this company requests us to state that the reports which have recently appeared in the local Press with reference to its reconstruction are erroneous. No steps whatever have been taken in this direction as yet, and the statement made by the chairman at the recent general meeting held in London was only in the nature of a suggestion or motion bearing on it being put to the meeting.

In honor of the annual visit of the Bishop in Jerusalem and the East, an entertainment will be given by the pupils of St. Mary's Girls' School at 8 p.m. on Monday next. Lord and Lady Cromer will be present as the entertainment, which will consist of an English play, a version of the fairy story of the Sleeping Beauty, and a French opera Le Peuple Nègre. Bishop Byth, who will be officiating at St. Mary's Mission, will be officiating at St. Mary's Mission on Tuesday next at 8 p.m. He will spend a Sunday next at each of these centres. Tomorrow morning the Bishop will preach at All Saints' Church, Cairo. Service will commence at 10.30. Ball at Port Said.

The Port Said Club gave a most successful ball a few days ago, largely attended by the leading members of the French, English, Italian and Greek communities. A unique feature was the introduction of a newly composed quadrille, danced by a set who had carefully rehearsed the steps. An exhibition of a cake walk and sand dance, given by Messrs. Taser and Nugent was much appreciated. It is pleasing to see a different tendency than of old, on the part of the different nationalities, to combine in social intercourse, amusement, and entertainment. The Faculty of St. Mary's Girls' School, the International Sporting Club at Port Said, promises to be a veritable "omnibus entertainment," tickets having been largely sought for by all and sundry, hailing from places as far distant as Surway and Petersburg.

NATIONAL BANK OF EGYPT. (Gazette's Special Service). London, Saturday. It is generally expected that Sir Edward Law, K.C.M.G., will succeed Sir Vincent Caillard as chairman of the London agency of the National Bank of Egypt in the event of the selection of Sir Vincent as Sir Edwin Palmer's successor as Governor of the National Bank being finally confirmed by Lord Cromer. Neither of these appointments have as yet been officially confirmed in Egypt, according to the latest information that has been received in the city.

THE BANK'S DIVIDEND. (Gazette's Special Service). London, Saturday. National Bank shares rose on the Stock Exchange this morning, owing to rumors of a possible increase of two per cent in the dividend.

Bey Chahar Moudir of Fayoum; Hassan Bey Hassib, Moudir of Assiout, and Selim Bey Basou, chief of the service of direct taxation, the Cairo Government on whom the grade of Montemari has been bestowed and one of the principal officials of the Wafk Administration, Ibrahim Bey H. H. H. Wafk Inspector at Damahour, who has received the same honor. Five native notables, among them Abd el Kader Bey el Gharni, of Alexandria, obtain the grade of Montemari and five members of the Legislative Council become Miramirs.

CAB STRIKE AT ALEXANDRIA. Alexandria presented a very tranquil appearance to-day owing to the complete absence of cabs, the cabmen having come out on strike. The men demand the abolition of the municipal tax and the tariff, and also complain of the system of control exercised over the cabs by the Alexandria Government.

The high municipal and Governorate officials held a council and came to a decision at 1 p.m. this afternoon to meet in the course of to-day with the delegates of the cabmen.

The most just of cabmen's grievances is the five minutes' wait for half a franc, which lives upon a great deal of abuse. An agreement will probably be arrived at by a slight increase in some details of the tariff, which is now compared with the high prices generally ruling in Alexandria now.

BANK OF EGYPT. The net profits for the year, after providing for bad and doubtful debts, reserve of interest, current expenses in London and Egypt, income tax, and including £10,000 brought forward, amount to £148,907. The directors have transferred £40,000 to reserve, and they recommended the payment of a dividend of 6 p. c. for the half-year, free of income-tax, making, with the interim dividend of 4 p. c. paid in July last, 10 p. c. for the year, or a bonus of 9 p. c. (90 cents), leaving £14,655 to be carried forward.

ANTI-SEMITISM AT DAMANHOUR. A short time back a number of Jews who were making a pilgrimage to the tomb of a celebrated Rabi in the neighborhood were attacked by natives and a serious breach of the peace ensued. A number of the Jews were hurt for there were many pilgrims, the ray of Abou Kasra, as the celebration is called, being held in special veneration by the Jews in the neighborhood. The trial of the persons implicated took place at Damanhour on Thursday last. A number of natives were sentenced to terms of imprisonment from 6 to 8 months and three Jews were sentenced to months' imprisonment. The case occupied the Court for the entire day.

THE WALL OF THE TIGRANES. On page 5 we give an account of the forthcoming proceedings in connection with the building of a wall obstructing the New Khedivial Hotel at Cairo. The facts, which we learn from a Cairo contemporary, are very curious and we much sympathize with Mr. Goy's proposals, whose property will be seriously diminished in value, if the wall is allowed to remain.

YESTERDAY'S ECLIPSE. A total eclipse of the moon took place yesterday morning, which was best seen in America. At Greenwich the moon set at five past 7 o'clock, 17 minutes before the middle of the eclipse, so that only the first part of it was visible in England. It will be followed by a partial eclipse of the sun on the 21st. No part of this will be visible in Europe, and it will be best seen in South America, and in New Zealand and the Australasian Islands.

THE FRONTIER DISPUTE. We understand that the negotiations now proceeding between the Khedivial Government and the Sublime Port, in reference to the question of the establishment of a Turkish post at Tarbah in the Sinaïtic Peninsula and on the Egyptian side of the frontier, are proceeding quite amicably.

AMICABLE NEGOTIATIONS. It is stated, but we do not know upon what grounds, that a British cruiser is about to pay a visit to the Gulf of Akaba. The frontier which runs from a point north of Al-Azha to Akaba has never been delimited. It is hoped that the Turkish Government will be persuaded to meet the British on a mission in conjunction with the Khedivial Government so that the frontier line may be permanently settled.

ACCIDENT TO MOUKHTAR PACHA. We regret to state that Ghazi Mouchtar Pacha met with an accident yesterday, which might have had most serious consequences. The Imperial Ottoman High Commissioner was paying a visit to his son and daughter-in-law at Bourdian, when a passing train frightened the horses. They could not be fully turned over the carriage. The Pacha was hurled to the ground and severely injured. He also received a bad cut on the lower lip. Owing to prompt medical attendance he is proceeding favourably.

THE SUCRETIERS. A meeting of the creditors of the Sucreries Company will be held at 3 o'clock to-day, and it is very probable that the proposals made under the Concordat Preventif will be read to the meeting. We understand that these proposals have been drawn up, printed, and signed by the parties interested in Paris, from which place the directors arrived. Colonel de Wiart will probably judge them to the satisfaction, unless the judges decide to proceed to the "verification de dates."

CORPORATION OF WESTERN EGYPT. Mr. Beckett, as a result of a thorough inspection which he has recently made on the properties of the above Corporation, has been requested by the London Board to go home at once for the purpose of consulting with them as to the immediate future of the streets and extensions, which in Mr. Beckett's opinion should be undertaken without delay.

BUILDING LANDS OF EGYPT. The first annual general meeting of this Company will be held early next month. The following is the extent of the property owned by the Company. The estates at Alexandria and Bahig are given in square paces; those at Cairo and Damanhour in square metres. Alexandria: Allié Mesoune, 1,500; Canal Mah. oudh, 7,100; Bond-Fond, 10,000; Ras el-Tin, 6,000. Bahig: Station Block, 9,000; Palais Khedivial, 56,000; Ras el-Tin, 10,000. At Ras el-Tin the Company has sold its property at £4.25 and made the pie, or a profit of 3s. per pie. EGYPTIAN DELTA RAILWAYS.

EXHAUSTIVE REVIEW OF THE POSITION OF THE UNDERTAKING.

II.

From the fact that the accounts of the Helwan Railway were kept in much less detail than our own until taken over by our company on January 1, 1905, I have to base my further remarks upon those of the Past accounts to be presented to you. The next accounts to be presented to you, i.e. for the current half-year, will be similarly incomplete in respect of former figures; but after that all will be in order for the usual comparisons of the working of the undertaking as a whole for the previous year. The Helwan Railway paid a dividend of 5 per cent. whereas for the year with which we are now dealing, even with the aid of the Helwan branch, it is only possible to pay 4 per cent. I admit that this has caused some disappointment; but you will remember that at our last meeting I told you our receipts had been considerably enhanced by the carriage of what was classed as manure for the purpose of reclaiming land, by the sales of such reclaimed land, and by hire of rolling stock. In the year under review we have not had the same good fortune, and, as a matter of fact, we are 3 per cent. worse off on our return for the year on these accounts. We still have reclaimed land unsold; and we are reclaiming or levelling some other, and we have proposals before us for the remunerative hire of stock, as we can spare it; but it has not been to the interests of the company, even if it were possible, to take the greatest advantage of these proposals. Our coaching earnings continued to show an increase under every item, with the exception of animals. This exception was due to the continuance of the cattle plague, and the consequent restrictions imposed by the Government. I am glad to tell you that this plague is now believed to be extinct. This decision was reached by Government last November for the reopening of the cattle markets all over Egypt, and precautions are believed to have been taken to prevent the possibility of its recurrence. The moults, or fair, held during the year were few and unimportant; that at Tanah, for instance, which usually brings us in L.E. 2,000 to L.E. 3,000, did not take place at all, and in this view an increase of L.E. 4,600, or nearly 5 per cent., in our coaching earnings, must be regarded as satisfactory. As showing how directly the travelling of the public depends upon the prosperity of a country, or of a particular district, there was a decrease in the receipts from passengers in the Behers Province and a considerable increase in what is known as the Eastern. From what I shall tell you directly in connection with our goods traffic you will see that this followed the same course, the danger of crops in these provinces respectively. In this view we may regard ourselves as fortunate in our undertaking being located in a land of increasing prosperity. Our goods traffic resulted in a small increase of L.E. 870 compared with the previous year. The decrease in manure I have already alluded to, and its magnitude may be measured by 132,000 tons and L.E. 4,500.

There was a falling off in the cotton crop of the Behers Province, for which we were compensated by an increased crop in the Eastern. There were losses under barley, skins, molasses, provisions, and timber, with gains under wheat, cotton, coal, grain and seeds, and miscellaneous articles. As affecting the different provinces, the changes in the Gherbich were insignificant; but our gross earnings per kilometre per annum in Behers fall from L.E. 181 in 1904 to L.E. 164 in 1905, and those in the Eastern rose from L.E. 144 to L.E. 157. Taking our receipts as a whole, there was an increase of close upon L.E. 1,500, and I may say that the Eastern Province was in the only one that came up to our expectations. Our net earnings were most seriously affected by our increased expenses, which, I may mention, I found myself in my last report to be 10 per cent. more represented over L.E. 9,000, and consequently more than 1 per cent. for the year on our capital. We have seen for some time that the cost of our staff and maintenance could not continue at what it has been in the past. On the one hand, salaries and wages have gone up enormously, owing to the increased cost of living, and the Government itself has been forced to a reconsideration of the pay of its servants. The position is referred to by the Financial Adviser. In his report upon the Budget, the Financial Adviser says: "The enormous appreciation in the value of land and sudden acquisition of unexpected wealth by large sections of the community has sent up the prices of the necessities of life at such a rate as to render inevitable a largely increased expenditure on the wages of temporary employes and daily labourers in Government employ, and, consequently, on the cost of execution of all Government works." Later in the report, and in making provision in his Budget, the Financial Adviser remarks that salaries of the Cadre officials have diminished in purchasing power to a distressing extent, and in the case of minor officials no longer constitute a living wage. On the other hand, age and hard work have had their effect upon our roads and stock, and, in the interests of economical and efficient working, it has become necessary to undertake improvements in our roads, buildings, and stock, the cost of which has had to a great extent upon revenue. I cannot hold out hope to you that we can save much in the early future in our expenses as compared with last year, but every care is and will be taken in the preparation of estimates and the sanctioning of such expenditures that it is kept down as much as possible. Our net revenue, again, was adversely affected

by the fact that we had something over £200,000 unremuneratively employed. This was partly due to extensions under construction, but also to delays altogether beyond our power of control. In our case such an event means not only the payment of interest on such amounts, but provision for their redemption. So far as it rests with us, this capital will soon be revenue earning, but we have not yet been able to come to a final agreement with the Government in regard to the projected lines in the Menoufiah Province.

We have continued to operate in the retention of our staff with but little change, and, under the capable management of Captain Adams, E.R.E., the efficiency has continuously increased. In the directorate we have to regret the loss of some who have been long associated with us and of great value to the company in the positions which they occupied. In Egypt two members of the local directorate—His Excellency English Pasha Nubar and Mr. E. W. P. Foster, C.M.G.—have resigned their positions owing to pressure of other duties. The vacancies thus created will not be filled. In England our managing director, Lieut.-Colonel E. L. Marryat, R.E., left us to take up his abode in Canada. Colonel Marryat, with meritorious zeal, devoted his great energies and experience to the interests of the company from the day when it was formed to the hour of his retirement. We were especially fortunate in having his services during the earlier years of our enterprise, and we owe much of our prosperity to his constant care and close control of our interests. On his retirement we nominated Major W. I. le Breton, late R.A. and of the Indian Railway Department, to the post; but he was then in the employment of the Egyptian State Railways, and has only recently become free to take up the duties. He will visit Egypt at the end of this month in the interests of this company. I now beg, first, to propose the following resolution, on which you have been given notice: "That, in pursuance of Article 44 of the statutes of the Metropolitan and Cairo-Helwan Railway, and in view of the recommendation of the Council of Administration, a sum of L.E. 2,178,000 out of the profits of the Metropolitan and Cairo-Helwan Railway for the year ended December 31, 1904, be placed to special reserve fund."

I have to explain, in reference to this resolution, that we have just been advised by our agent in Egypt of a letter addressed to him by the Government, pointing out that there has been a misapprehension, and that the resolution was not an omission of the Helwan Company, and was not requested by the Government, as stated in our report. I therefore request you to consider the directors' report modified by omitting the words, "In 1904 this sum of L.E. 2,178,000 was omitted by the old Helwan Company, and it is therefore at the request of Government necessary," by substituting for these words, "It is now deemed desirable." The sum referred to is that arrived at on finally closing the accounts of the Helwan Railway at December 31, 1904, after provision for the payment of interest on the capital of the undertaking. On your passing this resolution, this money, subject to settlement with the Egyptian Government on the points raised, becomes available for expenditure on the line and its stock, and relieves current expenses accordingly.

Mr. Montagu Sharpe seconded the resolution, which was carried unanimously. The Chairman: I now beg to move the following resolution: "That, subject to my remarks in regard to the resolution just passed, the report of the directors dated January 10, 1905, together with the statement of accounts and the balance sheet for the year ended September 30, 1905, be, and they are hereby, approved, confirmed, and adopted." Before putting the resolution to the vote, I shall be very glad to answer any questions the shareholders may wish to put or to refer any information in my power. The Hon. Sir C. W. Fremantle seconded, and the resolution was unanimously agreed to.

The Chairman: I now move the following resolution: "That the interim dividend paid in July, 1905, be confirmed, and that a dividend at the rate of 4 per cent. per annum for the half-year ended September 30, 1905, on the preference share capital of the company be, and hereby is, declared to be paid to the holders of the preference shares standing on the registers of the company at January 30, 1905, and to holders of preference share warrants to bearer."

This resolution was seconded by Mr. Robert Miller and agreed to. The Chairman next moved: "That Baron Jacques de Messance (one of the directors retiring in order of rotation) be re-elected." The Hon. Sir C. W. Fremantle seconded, and the resolution was agreed to.

The Chairman: I now beg to move the following resolution: "That Mr. Robert Miller (one of the directors retiring in order of rotation) be re-elected." This was seconded by Mr. Montagu Sharpe and carried. Mr. Alf. Wilkins proposed the following resolution: "That the auditor to the company (Messrs. STRANGE CAIRO LAWSUIT.

THE WALL OF THE TIGRANES AND THE NEW KHEDIVIAL HOTEL.

The lawsuit respecting the wall which the Tigrane family are building for the purpose of obstructing the view from the northern window of the New Khedivial Hotel will be tried on the 19th inst. before the Cairo Mixed Court. Meanwhile, as we promised our readers to lay before them this case in all its particulars, we are anxious to keep our promise. Long before his death Tigrane Pasha sold to Mr. Georgopolou, a manufacturer in our town, a piece of ground of a thousand square metres, at the corner of his property between Nubar Pasha-street and Kantaret-el-Diak-street. On this very land a two storied house formerly stood with windows looking on the above mentioned streets as well as with some other back windows looking on the Tigrane's house. A few years afterwards the seller having altered his mind wished to buy back the land. As Mr. Georgopolou had already decided to build flats for his children on this site, he did not appear to be too much inclined to acquiesce in the proposition made to him. Nevertheless he consented to sell the ground again at the current price.

At that time Tigrane Pasha was ill and he assisted at the meetings without taking great interest in them; but said, according to the evidence of the broker, that it would be necessary to give up the idea of buying the land again at the price demanded by Mr. Georgopolou, and to wait till this gentleman had built the north wall of his house. Consequently the negotiations were broken off, and Tigrane Pasha having died, things were left as they were. Mr. Georgopolou did not attach much importance to this, and has since built the house which is now the New Khedivial Hotel. But the building was hardly finished when the Tigrane people on their part began to build a veritable city wall right in front of the windows on the north side of the Hotel. Of course Mr. Georgopolou then had recourse to the law, but wishing to try all ways of conciliation, he proposed to his opponents to close up to man's height all openings of his house looking on the Tigrane property. This would have been done by means of a fixed wooden partition which would have prevented his tenants from overlooking the above-mentioned house, at the same time allowing sun and air to enter freely. This proposition was made in a somewhat improbable case that the Tigrane people might build the wall in order to insure themselves against being over-looked by the brocter of the late Tigrane Pasha, Prince d'Abré, who lives in Italy, took upon himself to answer that the building of the wall was one of the last wishes of the deceased, who last days of his life had been in the hands of the law, the lower part of the first floor. But it is incredible that Tigrane Pasha, well known as he was for his good nature, could have thought on his death bed of recommending his relations to do harm to his neighbour, and this solely because, that person had asked a somewhat high price for letting him have back 1,600 square metres of land. On the other hand it is inadmissible that Mr. Georgopolou could have embittered the last days of Tigrane Pasha, for the discussions concerning the rebuilding of the land took place through a third person—the broker—and Mr. Georgopolou never had any personal dealings with Tigrane Pasha who he had never even met. Consequently the alleged reason in justification of the proceedings does not bear examination. But there is without doubt another reason which openly told, which if it does not justify, at least explains the action; that is to make Mr. Georgopolou's building uninhabitable, so that the latter will decide to sell it for a lower price.

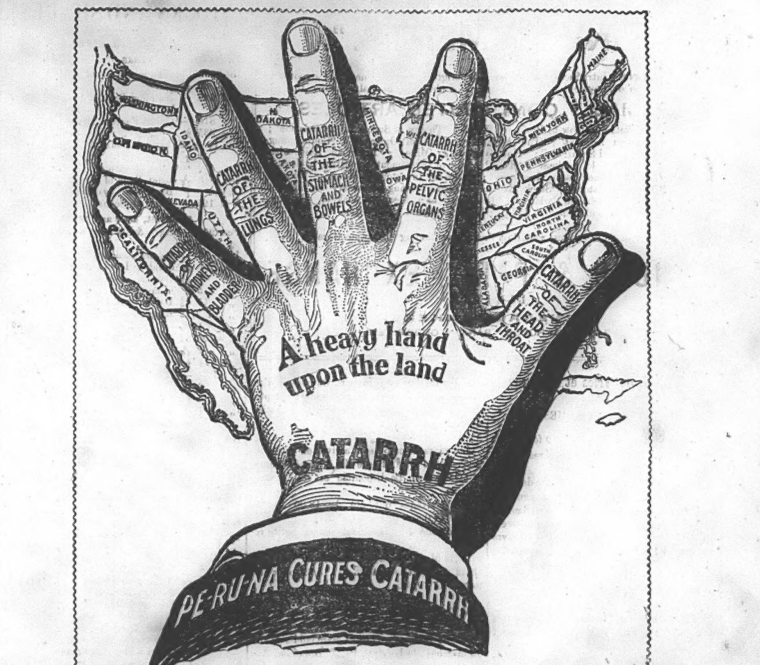
The Court will then have to solve, whether these proceedings of a more than doubtful morality will be allowed to serve as a precedent to encourage unscrupulous speculators to block their neighbours and to compel them then to sell their property at a ruinous price. We shall write more on this subject because it is interesting to the public in general. (Translated from "Le Progrès").

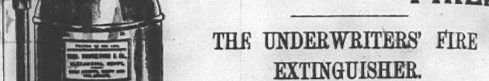
