NEW ERA OPENS FOR INDUSTRY.

THE SUCRERIES.

On Saturday the Mixed Court of Cairo gave its final judgment in the case of the Société des Sucréries et de la Raffinerie d'Egypte. Judge Tuck presided and the Sucréries and their creditors were represented by Me. Carton de Wiart. The distinguished counsel pleaded the case of his clients with eloquence and skill, and his efforts were crowned with success, the concordat judiciare and the reconstruction of the company being granted. We understand that the new directors of

the company are Boghos Pacha Nubar, M. Raphael Suarès, Harari Pacha, Birch Pacha, and M. J. A. Cattaui. A better board could not have been formed,

and we look to the fature of the company under its direction with the utmost confidence. In the course of his pleading for the com-

pany, Maitre Carton de Wiart declared that the number of creditors favourable to the concordat had been increased after it had been signed, and that at the present moment this number was 54,402. To silence adverse criticism, he enumerated the several advantages which the concordat offered to all parties

concerned, and closed his pleading with a short peroration which made the best impression on all in Court. As not one contested his declaration the act, almost of the whole opera, but his ren-

AIDA AT THE ABBAS.

Aida was given on Friday night by the Castellano company in a most admirable fashion. Perhaps a mething of the magnificence and pomp we have for this opera in the Khedivial Opera House was wanting, but then the scenery for the latter was especially made, as was indeed the opera house itself, for the opera. of them. Faust was rather uneven. The chief features were the singing of Faust himself (Sig. Baltani) and the acting of Sig. Vecchioni as Mefistofele. He was made up to the last point of perfection, -it is curious, by the way, o notice the resemblance between Mefistofele Napoleon III., and the caricature type of early Yankee; that goatee heard has a great suggestion of hard devilry and subtlety. His acting was as good as his appearance; and if only he recovers from his cold, we shall enjoy his appearance as the far greater Mefistofele on Friday. The Haversham Grange.

The S.S. Haversham Grange, which reached Port Said early on Sunday evening with 3,500 Russian troops on board, still bears traces of her collision in the Straits of Malacca, Having received at Singapore temporary repairs she will be thoroughly overhauled on arrival at Odessa. Great credit is due to the officers of the ship and the Russian troops that no serious casualties occurred. Anything like a panic on a Russian transport loaded to her full capacity with a living freight would be too dreadful to contemplate.

Wreck of the Roon.

The S.S. Roon, of the North German Lloyd Line, well known in our port, was wrecked, during a storm on the 19th of last month, off the coast of Japan. The passengers and crew were safely landed by a relief ship sent by the Japanese Government. There is some prospect of salvage operations being successful.

Japanese Line

The Japanese Mail Steamship Co.'s Kamachee Maru arrived to day. This line has now been in fall swing again for some time. The European service of ships which call at Shanghai, Hong Kong, Singapore, Penang and Colombo is fortnightly. Almost the whole of the officers and crew are Japanese. Usually the captain is German or English. Messrs. Worms and Co., of Port Said, are the agents for this line.

NOTES FROM SUAKIN.

(FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT).

There is apparently a regulation stipulating that all 1st-class compartments should be locked, not only fastened by the latch. This order was issued mainly to prevent the break-ing of doors, left open on empty trains, when passing over bridges and other narrow places. In consequence the guards are more or less More Russian Troops. careful to do o when the compartments are not

careful to doso when the compartments are not occupied, but afteropening same for passengers to enter they very often do not trouble even to close them again, leaving this for the travellers to do. The above stated arrangement The Russian Government has signed further is of the greatest inconvenience and danger to passengers travelling by local trains. One is often kept waiting till the last minute, before being able to enter the train, as the guard is, as often as not, at the other end of the platform, and when he arrives, the key either does not fit, or the lock is too much worn for it to have the desired effect of opening same. LES DOMESTIQUES.

La police vient de publier la circulaire suivante au sujet des domestiques.

Vu l'Arrêté du 15 septembre 1902, le public est informé que les placeurs de domestiques ne doivent présenter aucun iomestique sans qu'il ne soit muni d'un certificat d'identité remis et renouvelé chaque année par la police, ainsi que d'un second certificat sur lequel doivent être inscrits les états de service avec motifs de renvoi. "Ces deux certificats doivent porter la

photographie et le signalement de l'intéressé. payables "La public est donc vivement prié de ne pas accepter à son service des domestiques sans qu'ils ne soient munis des certificats dont il s'agit.

"La même mesure est adoptée pour les employés subalternes, tels : les portiers, jardiniers, etc., etc.; il est donc nécessaire de le leur réclamer avant de les embaucher.

" Cette mesure a été prise tant dans l'intérêt des particuliers que celui de la Sécurité Pablique. "

Nous avons trop souffert jusqu'ici du manque de renseignements sur les domestiques indigènes (vols, voire même assassinat, comme le cas s'est produit l'an dernier au Caire) pour ne pas applaudir à ce nouveau règlement.

Le choix d'un domestique est d'une importance capitale : c'est la personne qui possède la clef de votre appartement, est au cou rant de vos habitudes et à qui il est aussi facile de nuire que d'être atile. Or, jusqu'ici, il était très difficile, pour ne pas dire impos-sible, d'avoir des références sur les domestiques indigénes. Les bureaux de placement, contre les agissements desquels la Presse a eu souvent à s'élever, ne cherchent généralement que leurs intérêts et se soucient fort peu de vous procurer un domestique honnête o

Le gouvernement s'est finalement ému, il serait à souhaiter que cette émotion se renouvelle sur des questions qui ont aussi leur importance : la traite des entants, les musiciens ambulants et tant d'autres.

LA DAIRA SUGAR ET LES SUCRERIES

La Daïra Sugar était "propriétaire" d'une partie de l'actif des Sucreries et "créancière privilégiée" sur le reste. A ce double titre elle n'est pas intervenue au concordat. Mais pour le rendre possible elle a consenti à la vente des chemins de fer à l'Etat, diminuant ainsi de moifié sa créance. Pour le restant, elle abandonne la position et devient "créancière hy pothécaire" concurremment avec d'autres. Elle renonce au remboursement par semestrialités et se contente du remboursement par tirage, dans quelques années, des obligations qu'elle reçoit.

On voulait contester la condition juridique de la Daïra Sugar et provoquer une longue mbrie de procès. Ces procès auraient eu probablement le même sort que celui qui a été intenté pour contester la validité des traites et abouti à un résultat diamétralement qui a opposé à l'attente des demandeurs. D'ailleurs, l'opération de la vente des chemins de fer outre qu'elle diminuera de moitié la créance de la Daïra Sugar, permettra une économie annuelle de 40,000 livres, par l'effet de la liquidation des ateliers de Minich ; elle ouvrira de plus à la culture de la canne les hods qui lui étaient fermés et réduira sensiblement le tarif du transport de la canne et du sucre.



ironies of chance, he must be the excavator of roins. So much that is worthless has been preserved ; so little has survived of what would be priceless. It was not, unfortunately, a consideration present to the mind of the book-collectors of classical times, that fifteen hundred or two thousand years later the descendants of barbarian Northern tribes would be equipping schools and societies in order to dig out their rabbish-heaps. Doubtless they kept on their shelves other and better copies of the manuscripts which they destroyed ; and when they tore across a soiled copy of a Pindaric ode or a play of Sophoeles, they glanced with satisfaction at other per-fect copies, just as a book-lover of to-day, possessing a first edition of some volume worth keeping, would view with indifference the destruction of a cheap reprint. Two thouand years later "the wheel has come full Æschylus is immortal because we have in our eirole," and the manuscripts carefully retained hands to read to day the tremendous trilogy of by the old book-collectors have crumbled to dust. Fire, earthquake, water, air, the march of war, the ignorance of conquering barba-rians, have burnt and rotted what the scholar tried to preserve, but the world, with a shock of pleasure, still learns at rare inter vals of discoveries in his rubbish-heap.

A great find of ancient papyri has been reported from Oxhyrhyncus, and has been described by Dr. B. P. Grenfell and Dr. A. S. Hunt in a communication published in a recent "Times," Four winters have been spent in excavating at Oxhyrhyncus since the discoveries made in 1897, and though it was not expected that the fifth winter would add greatly to the treasures found, as most of the rubbish-mounds on which the excavators had been at work had been dug down to the depth at which papyri cease to be preserved, it has happened by a queer twist of good fortune that the fifth season has produced results far richer than the first four. Most of the rubbishmounds which had previously been excavated had given up nothing of much greater importance than private letters, accounts, and copies of contracts belonging to individuals, or else official documents relating to local archives, of little literary interest-just the kind of documents which would be expected to be found in the house of a non-literary tradesman of a classical or any other period. But during last winter the excavators had the good fortune to light on the remains of the library, not of a tradesman, but of a scholar. The find, we read, was made on January 28th, shortly before sunset ; it was impossible in the fading light to extricate it all, and "a strong guard was posted on the spot during the night."It is impossible to read the sentence without a thrill. What did the happy excava tors dream of before morning came ? Before being thrown on the rubbish heap the papyri had been torn up, as usual, but "amid hundreds of smaller fragments there were a couple of cores of rolls, containing ten or twelve columns, several pieces containing five or six, and many more one or two." Among these longer pieces some were copies of works which are known, some are non-extant. There is a Pindar papyrus of pmans, and a new tragely of Earipides, which the discoverers identify as the Hypsipyle; part of a new history of of something widely different. all that is gained, if it is a gain, is the know ledge of several words not found in the New Testament. What more than that, except of purely antiquarian interest, could a new Gospel give, when the whole Gospe! of the Four Evangelists has already given everything ? Of antiquarian interest, of course, a new manuscript might add much ; in this particular fragment, for instance, there are references to methods of purification and to the place of purification, the Hagneuterion, set apart in the Temple, which will probably provoke speculation. But if what is hoped for by the excavator is matter of purely antiquarian or literary interest, it will not be a new Gospel of which he will dream. The great fact which the student of classical literature, or, at all events, of Greek literature, has always at the back of his mind is that, though he has inherited so splendid a kingdom, it is but a tithe of what was left to him in the beginning. Perhaps he has come into the noblest share ; but perhaps, agair, he has lost for ever what was once written for all time. . Think of the almost tiny proportion of the written work of the great philosophers and poets of Greece which has survived the extraordinarily sudden collapse of the outward wealth and majesty of the Empire. the Oresteis, and four other plays, none of them perfect, all of them difficult reading for the upside-down reason that in a world in which a man could express in words such depth and splendour of thought there were such inadequate means of preserving untouched and undisguised his great gift to his fellow-creatures. He had no printing-press to help him place his work in the hands of thousands every letter of every work must he laboriously copied down afresh to make a new book; and even when the book was made and the parch ment rolled, and the reader could study for himself the phrases which he had heard ringing through the hill-side theatre, -even then there were waiting, in an age before men knew the value of what they were destroying, all the turbulent forces of a civilisation still in the making, still liable to the danger and destruction of invasion, pillage, and rapine so wild and senseless that almost no knowledge has come to us of the manuer of the destruction ; merely it is known that priceless work

was destroyed. We have seven of the plays of Æschylus, and he wrote sixty; Sophocles wrote even more, and we have only seven ; of Aristophanes' fifty-four comedies there remain only eleven ; and when we realise what is the place in literature held by Euripidies, with the eighteen plays the ordered griefs and glories of which we chop up into twenty one lessons for inky handed sobgolboys, the question may well suggest itself ; What place should be his if we had all the four or five score he actually wrote ? If the dream of the excavator centred round the recovery of Greek drama actually known to be lost, would be prefer the grandeur of

Aeschylus or the grace of Sophoales to the compelling humanity of Euripides ?

But he might imagine some even more moving discovery. He would hardly, perhaps, find his thoughts dwelling for long on the debt which the past might be imagined to owe the future in the lost books of Livy. The great stillst who "knew neither what he had written, nor what he .was going to write, would not carve a much deeper mark on th record of literature if his collective works could be doubled. His fame belongs less to what he wrote than to his manner of writing. Perhaps, rather, the hope of the excavator is known to be written and last, but of books of which there is no record of the writing,-books

which would swing a new planet into the ken suddenly to emerge a new biographer of Cæsar of some Persian palace another journal of the Sicilian Expedition, or a log-book of the days of Abydos and Aegospatami ? Or if he had himself written a Symposium, and had added to Xenophon's and Plato's a third portrait of the greatest Greek of them all ? Inevitably the argument comes back at the last to Socrates. If he, in the long days after his trial, had written a dozen letters to his friends ; if even

the gaoler had spelt out a few words of the intimate record of that quiet prison ? Some such imagining as that, perhaps, is still a hope



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
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
