

#### BEEF TRUST SCANDAL The "Daily Telegraph's" New York corres

pondent writes that after protesting with might and main again t the proposed Govern-ment inspection, the Chicago meat packers, who are fairly typical of many other American packers, have suddenly discovered that they are absolutely yearning for inspection, the more, in fact, the better. This attitude, he learns, is due not to any great awakening of conscience regarding the accusations of buying diseased cattle and exporting dangerous pro-ducts to various quarters of the earth, more particularly to the United Kingdom, which has long been the favourite dumping ground, but to ominous reports from abroad, which foreshadow a heavy loss of trade. The packers, in fact, throughout the country are described as being fairly freuzied with fear, produced partly by the knowledge that the Argentice Republic, which is their next competitor in the export of meat products, will undoubtedly benefit by the present outery, and also that Canada, which might very wall supply those same products, will wake up, as she is doing to the possibilities of feeding the Mother Whether the British public, who are a most

important factor, will wake up, remains to be seen Some of the hardened packers have rather a poor opinion of the British consumer, and believe that when the present glare of publicity is withdrawn, and when the usual questions in the British Parliament have been asked and answered, he will forget all about the diseased meat, putrid livers, dyed and deodorised hams, and canned atrocities which have figured so largely in the present scandal. There have been revelations about canned beef and venal inspectors before, and they have always been "lived down," so why not this time ? The Beef Trust people are well represented in New York and in Europe, and they will doubtless be able to prove "conclusively" to a confiding public that the Chicago packing houses are the best in the world, and that the system of inspection already existing absolutely safe guards the consumer. Germany and France have made the distri-

bution of dangerous meat products from abroad practically impossible, but the British, despite all statements to the contrary, are not nearly so strict as they ought to be, and as the necessities of the public health demand. Figures are published, showing the enormous trade in meat products done by the United States with the United Kingdom, the trade in similar products with other countries, such as France, Germany, and Italy, being absolutely insignificant by comparison. These figures were furnished by Mr. Seymour Bell, the British Commercial Agent at the British Consulate General in New York. For the ten months ending April, 1906, the United Kingdom took \$802.000 worth of canned beef and the first tent. Each, 200, the United Kingdom took £800,000 worth of canned beef, and no beef, it is ominously explained by Mr. Upton Sinclair in his investigation, is canned "if it is good for anything slse." Of hog products, the United Kingdom, in a similar period, took over £4,500,000 worth. France and Germand State of the Control o many did not take much over £250,000 worth between them. The trustful Britishers are credited with spending nearly £3,000,000 for American hams, over £1,300,000 for salted and fresh canned pork, while for lard they paid nearly £3,100,000. These are only some of the figures from the

trade account of American meat products exported to the United Kingdom. They all relate to the ten months ending in April last and in most instances they show a tendency to increase substantially. Most, if not all, the items go from the packing houses, which are now so bitterly attacked, not by the British consumer, who has hitherto been largely in the dark, but by Americans, who say that they stand in still greater need of protection than the foreign consumer. It will be interesting to compare the figures for the next three months, now that people are thoroughly alarmed, with the corresponding The Egyptian Gazette thoroughly alarmed, with the corresponding period last year, when trade was booming. There is a demand now, not only for the strictest inspection of the stockyards and of meat throughout the country, but for officials who will withstand the system of 'graft," the American equivalent to bribery, corruption, and illicit commissior, which it is not disputed is a paramount evil in the United States at the present day. Unless the inspector be above "graft," it is obvious that his services, instead of being a public beuefit, become a positive public danger. At Chicago there is a story told of one inspector who not only failed to inspect, but spent his entire time in studying medicine. It is a different class of inspection and inspector which the country demands, and one who will refuse to sell himself to the Beef Trust.

#### CHEAPER MUTTON.

#### RESULT OF BAD BARLEY CROP.

The Mariout barley crop has suffered so much this year from the want of winter rain that the Bedouins of the whole district as far as Ain Hammam have been obliged to sell large proportion of their flocks. No less than 1,700 sheep arrived at the Bab Sidra market the day before yesterday, and large consignments arrive regularly, with the result that the price of mutton has fallen consider ably. Syrian mutton now costs from P.T. 7 to P.T. 8 per oke, while the price of Egyptian mutton has fallen from P.T. 13 to P.T. 9

#### REGISTRATION OF SERVANTS.

We are informed that the notice recently published by the police authorities re the registration of servants was, in effect, merely a republication of a notice published in January, 1904, in Arabic and French, and widely circu lated by the police. As long ago as September 15, 1902, a law was passed forbidding 'placeurs' of servants to place servants who were not in possession of such certificates. To render this law operative, employers of domes tics, bowabs, gardeners, etc., must support the authorities by refusing to engage any servant who does not hold a certificate of identity earing his photograph and his si seal. A servant is not legally compelled to hold such a certificate but employers can insist on his doing so in the manner above indicated. As soon as the Berberee finds that without s certificate he can get no place, he will take care to furnish himself therewith.

The police notice was as follows : -"In view of the Decree of Sept. 15, 1902, the public is informed that the agents for the placing of domestics are forbidden to offer any domestic for employment who is not provided with a hitch, thanks to the perfect training of rinstructor, Mr. H. C. Tookey, who has in Police and with another cerificate giving the nature of his employment and the cause of his dismissal. These two certificates must bear the photograph and seal of the domestic in question.

#### DAMIETTA AGAIN.

PETITION TO LORD CROMER.

The following is the text of a petition submitted yesterday to the Earl of Cromer by the members of the Damietta delegation : -Cairo, June 7th, 1906.

My Lord, - We respectfully beg to be allowed the honour of tendering our hearty thanks for the attention lent by your Lordship to the Damietta question, for the courteous letter to the Delegation, the meeting granted to our representative, and the compromise unfolded in the communiqué published by the Ministry of Interior.

We beg, however, to point out that according to the said communiqué this compremise leaves the principal cause for complaint unchanged, for Damietta by the new arrangement will be a Governorate in name and a district of the Dakahlieh Province in practice, communicating with the Ministry through the Moudir of another Province instead of having direct and independent means of communication as heretofore. We need hardly say that this new roundabout way of transacting the public business of Damietta will lead to much worry and delay. This will be needlessly wasted and interests thereby jeo-It appears to us that the decision of the

Government was founded upon erroneous information, for if the convenience of the rural districts around our city was the main cause of the recent change as the communiqué shows a mere glance at the map will alter this view. By the new arrangement Damietta is the centre of a rural district of which one end is at a distance of 15 kilometres from this centre and the other end is some 57 kilometres distant. The northern part of the new Markaz is a mere strip of coast with only five villages, while the other part south of Damietta is a vast district with 38 villages nine-tenths of of which were nearer to the old centre of local government at Farscour. villages will surely suffer instead of benefit ing by the change. Special mention of the villages north of Damietta has been repeated in the communiqué. These as already stated are only five villages which have always been considered suburbs or even quarters of our city. We would gladly welcome any change that may ameliorate the condition of these villages, but they have always been governed from Damietta in all matters of administration and public security and have never had cause to complain. For rates and taxes they were considered part of the Dakahlieh Province, but the one single employé for this branch of public work, a Sarraf, lives at Damietta. We have gone through these details in order to show that the recent change had no real raison d'être. We of course do not complain of the addition of some villages to our own district. On the contrary we appreciate and belaud this beneficial change. But the thing we complain of is the degredation of our ancient city from the rank of a separate province to that of a rural village in the Dakahlieh Province. The glory of our arcient city to which you kindly referred on meeting our representative will vanish and we humbly pray you to complete the reform begun at our request and save Damietta from the degredation and ruin that threaten it through the new arrangement. We leave the whole matter to your Lordship trusting that our just demands will be granted in the near future.

We beg to remain, My Lord. Your humble and obedient servants.

#### RIVAL SHEIKS IN THE YEMEN

#### A STORY OF MURDER.

Constantinople, Wednesday .- Ahmed Faizi Pache, commanding the troops in the Yemen, has telegraphed to the Government complaining of the failure to send reinforcements. He adds that the situation is disquieting owing to the extraordinary preparations made by the insurgents, who are organized in regiments and battalions like a regular army. During the last few days the Government has been sending considerable sums of money to Ahmed Faizi Pacha.

A rumour is reported to-day from Hodeidah to the effect that the Imam Yahya, leader of the insurgent tribes, has been murdered by an emissary of his rival, Sherkh Kassim.

#### THE REGENT.

The following is the text of the rescript issued by H.H. the Khedive, previous to his departure for Constantinople, investing H.E. Mustapha Pacha Fehmy with the Regency :-

#### THE TALUDI INCIDENT.

#### NEW SUDAN ROADS.

The "Sudan Times" states that a road 8 netres wide has been constructed between Singa and Tigo, a distance of 18 miles, while another road has been opened between Tigo and Gebel Sereig, a distance of 30 miles. In consequence of the opening of these roads the journey from Goz-Abou-Guma to Singa takes only three days instead of the ten that were formerly required.

#### MOTOR CAR DANGER.

It is reported that the Government intends to introduce a series of regulations for the drivers of hired motor cars. If the Capitulations allow of it we should like to see all drivers of motor cars, motor omnibuses, vans, etc., compelled to hold certificates of profit ciency. The very amateur driver of the dogcart is too well known in Cairo and Alexandria and the advent in large numbers of the enthusiastic but inexpert motorist will add a new terror to our streets. The French Government, we believe, refuses licences to chauffeurs who have failed to pass a practical examination in a large quadrangle strewn with prostrate lay figures. If a wheel touches any of these, no license is accorded.

### TURKISH POWER IN ARABIA.

FOREIGN INFLUENCES.

#### ORTANCE OF KOWEIT.

a European Power the Ottoman Empire wiftly declined during the last century one could judge of it from the modern history of the Arabian Peninsula, one might thick that the Turks are still a conquering and advancing race.

It was only after the opening of the Suez Canal that they conquered the fertile province of Yemen. When I travelled to Sanaa, its ancient capital, in the autumn of last year, the country was largely depopulated by a great famine and a great revolt; but there was nevertheless, an enormous amount of cultivation, chiefly of coffee and dours, and the sides of the mountains, which reach the height of 10,000 feet, were sometimes entirely covered from top to bottom with well-made terraces Later on the Turks annexed the cases of Hasa, and within the last two years they have gained a certain degree of authority over the Arabs of Nejd.

While they have lost in Europe they have gained in Arabia; and though they are almost invariably hated or despised from Aden to Baghdad, revolution is not so inevitable among the Semitic subjects of the Sultan as it is among European peoples, like the Greeks and

#### WAHABISM.

The increase of Turkish power in Arabia dowed the decline of that great wave of Puritan fanaticism known as Wahabism. Led by Emirs of the family of Saud, the Wahabis united the greater part of Arabia under one powerful rule, and resisted the Egyptian armies of Ibrahim Pacha. But the capital of the Sauds was at Riad, in the southern part of Nejd, and they governed Jebel Shammar, in the north, through deputies who lived at

One of these, named Raschid, made himself independent, and in the latter part of the last century the Emir of Riad were usually hard pressed by the Emirs of Hail. Recently continued fighting has made the exploration f Central Arabia almost impossible; but and Mr. Wilfrid and Lady Anne Blunt visited Jebel Shammar in the great days of Mahomed ibn Raschid, they found peace and order sternly enforced by that strong and unscrupulous raler. Few powerful States have been so completely isolated as Mohamed's ephemeral kingdom, and to this day, in spite of that incomparable book of travel, Doughty's 'Arabia Deserts," and several romantic accounts of Europeans who penetrated the interior of the Peninsula, many people still imagine the whole country to be an unbroken wilderness.

In the last two years there has been another greater reversal of fortunes in Nejd. There is but little Wahabism left, but the present Ibn Sand has completely triumphed over Ibn Raschid, the nephew of Mohamed, who was lately driven for a time out of Hail itself. The conqueror has now unpatriotically determined to secure his victory by admitting Ottoman troops into some of his towns, and although these are mostly deserting, and arriving at Koweit in miserable plight, there is at last some appearance of reality about the suzgrainty

The Turks have sometimes supported both parties at the same time, but until the recent events they were usually regarded as the friends of Ibn Raschid, while Sheikh Mubarak of Koweit was the ally of Ibn Sand. Ibn Raschid, however, is said to have put them in the front of the battle-an honour which they did not appreciate, and, in any case, they have abandoned him now that he has ceased to be formidable. The present agreement was come to at a meeting between Ibn Saud, Mubarak, and the Vali of Basra.

Foreign influence in Arabia is shared by the Turks and the English, and the Arabs realise that, while the Turks usually take, the English sometimes give. Ibn Saud appealed in vain for English protection before he allowed Aneyza to be garrisoned by hungry soldiers of the Sultan; and though certain Sheikhe probably have little love for us, they know that, without us, they would be at the mercy of a more greedy enemy.

#### LOCAL TRADE.

The trade of Arabia is largely carried on account being y natives of India, and almost the whole coast-line from Aden to Koweit is more or less under the protection of the Indian Government. The petty chiefs of the Aden territory and the coast of Hadramut, if they are not always obedient to the British, are certainly obedient to no one else. The Sultan of Omar enjoys a British subsidy, and is, on the whole, our faithful ally ; but he has not much autho rity over his Bedouin vassals outside Muskat, who are liable to be influenced by our French rivals. The so-called "Trucial Chiefs" of the pirate coast have long looked for protection and advice to the British Resident at Bushire, while the Sheikhs of the Peninsula of Katar owe more allegiance to the Torks than to us

Over the valuable pearl islands of Bahrein claimed both by Turkay and Persia, we hold definite position of supremacy, as Sheikh Esau and his successors are bound by treaty to have no dealings with any other Power Here, as at Muskat and Koweit, the Government of India has established a political agency, and there is also a small force of Sepoys; but the Sheikh is supposed to be entirely independent in internal affairs, and his family and serven's, who are Sunnis, brutally ill-treat the natives of the two islands

The coast of Hase, with the town of Katif, is purely Turkish, but over Koweit we have reently acquired a certain undefined influence, and Sheikh Mabarak owes his independence to British gunboats. Here, and elsewhere in the gulf, our policy has lately been much less weak and inactive than it was before Lord Curzon's viceroyalty, and it is earnestly to be hoped that the Liberal party will not abandon that unique position which we have won from a century of civilising work.

#### BRITISH POSITION

At the present time our influence in Arabia is such that, if we intrigued half as actively as certain French and German newspapers profess to believe, we could shortly make it permanent. But as we shall no doubt continue to decline to take what we can get, some other Power will assured'y take it instead. There will be no lack of opportunities, for while there are certain to be continual risings against Turkish misrule, the Arabs have shown themselves incapable of forming permanent States.

Ge-many, by utilising her influence in the Ottoman Empire, is likely to succeed to Turkey's position in Arabia. Hitherto she has apparently neglected the Red Sea, though railways to Sanaa and to Mecoa are wanted by the Government; but the Baghdad railway is intended to bring her in the near future to the hores of the Persian Gulf, and the most desirable terminus for the railway is Koweit.

This clean and thriving Arab town lies on the southern side of the shores of a large bay which forms the best natural harbour in the gulf. It has frequent communication with the interior, and I saw there some magnificent mares from Jebel Shammar which were destined to be shipped for the Bombay market. Thanks to our recent action in defeading it from Tarkish attack, the chance that it will become a German port is now extremely remote. Its importance, however, is almost lost from the fact-commonly overlooked-that there is another natural harbour between Koweit and the mouth of the Shatt-el-Arab. This is the Khor Abdullah; and the village of Um kasa, which may become the terminus of the railway, has lately been occupied by Turkish troops.

The Liberal party would perhaps be opposed, whether rightly or wrongly, to the acquisition by England of the wealth of Mesopotamia. It can hardly be willing, however, to allow Germany a naval station on the Turkish side of the gulf, or another Port Arthur on the Persian coast. To say nothing of loss of prestige, which would not be confined to Persia and Turkey and Arabia, we should have to maintain another squadron for the protection of India - an expense possibly displeasing to those politicians who favour such graceful concessions.

The danger can only be averted by the maintenance of the strong position which we now hold in this part of the East. (Mr. L. Buxton, in the "Standard").

NIGER AND LAKE CHAD.

NEW ANGLOFRENCH CONVENTION.

The new Anglo-French Convention for the delimitation of the British and French possessions between the Niger and Lake Chad was signed at the Foreign Office last week by Sir Edward Grey, Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs, and M. Paul Cambon the French Ambassador. The first Convention, concluded in 1893, was found to leave France no practicable route between the Niger and Lake Chad. A second Convention followed in 1898, but it simply laid down a map boundary, before there had been any such exploration of the region in question, as could afford the two Governments precise topographical and ethnographical information. expeditions, especially the Fourreau-Lamy expeditions, subsequently found even the second arrangement unsatisfactory. The boundary laid down was found to cut native Sultanates in two, and divided populations subject to the same authority. Moreover, the French were still obliged to use British territory to reach Lake Chad, and for reprovisioning their posts.

The matter was consequently again taken up at the time of the negotations which led to the Anglo-French Agreement of April 8, 1904, and it was agreed that, on the return of the Commissioners appointed to delimit the frontier, provided for in the Convention of 1898, changes should be made with a view to assuring France freedom of communication, ken of existing political divi sions. A special commission met in London to consider these modifications, the British representatives being Sir Eric Barrington (Assistant Under-Secretary for Foreign Affairs), the Hon. William Erskine (also of the Fo reign Office), and Mr. Charles Strachey (of the Colonial Office); while the French de'e-gates were M. Binger (of the Ministry of the Colonies) M. de Mannevile (of the Diplomat'e Service), and Captain Tilho. It is the labours of this commission that were lately ratified by the latest Convention. A fresh mission will be sent out to demarcate the new

#### BJORNSON ON IBSEN.

When the news of Henrik Ibsen's death reached Copenhagen, a representative of "Politiken" hastened to call on Pjörnstjerne Björnson, who is at present visiting the Danish capital. This is his account of the interview:-

The old man advanced to meet me, upright and powerful, radiant with health. He bade me be seated, and asked whether there was any particular news in the world.

'Yes," I said, "Henrik Ibsen is dead." Bjönson sat silent for a moment; then he

"So it has come at last! Ah, poor fellow, he has suffered terribly. Towards the end he had lost even the power of speech. His only wish was to die. .

"Where and when did you see him last?" "It was when I was awarded the Nobel Prize. I always looked in upon him when anything notable had happened to me. He sat silent for a long time, with my hand between both of his, and at last he managed to stammer some cordial words."

"If I now asked you to express in a few sentences your feeling as to Henrik Ibsen's work, what should you say ?"

With a gesture of his delicate white hands, Björnson seemed to ward off the question.

"Oh," he said, "what can I add to all that will now be said and written by all sorts o. celebrities all the world over ? I can only repeat what I once said in a lecture : that Ibsen' works are like lighthouses: they show you where you must not sail, and they are the first things you see when you look towards Norway. That seems to me pretty near the mark."

"And which of his works do you think the most remarkable ?"

Without a moment's hesitation the poet re

"'Ghosts !' It is there that he most lavishly develops his poetic gifts, and there that he goes deepest for his material. I do not know whether he can be called the greatest of con temporary poets; but the greatest Master-Builder, that he is. Look at 'The Wild Duck' There is not a superfluous line in it; every word has its purpose. It is absolutely mira-culous. But he worked and worked at each of his plays for two years on end, and did nothing else. It is the artistic element in Ibsen's works that will make them imperishable."

Björnson ended by expressing regret that he could not attend the funeral, being engaged to lecture in Denmark on June 2nd and succeeding days. This interview, and especially the pathetic picture it shows us of Ibsen sitting with Björnson's hand in his and struggling to utter his congratulations on the good fortune that had befallen his brother poet, ought to silence the constantly recurring tittle-tattle as to jealous enmity between the two men. There may be jealousies among the little hills, but the great peaks stand face to face and rejoice in each other's greatnes.

#### FIRE ON THE S.S. SOMALI.

During her return voyage from Calcutta to London last week a serious fire broke out on the P. & O. liner Somali in the Bay of Biscay.

The Somali, which left Marseilles on May 24, entered the Bay of Biscay on Monday evening. At half-past three on Tuesday morn ing a dense fog came on, and the vessel slowed down. At a quarter to eight smoke was found issuing from the hatchways, and it was discovered that the cargo in hold No. 4 (after) was on fire immediately under the passengers' baggage. The flames got a firm hold of the cargo, which was mainly jute and linseed, and, notwithstanding that all the available hose was turned on, they reached the baggage, and spread to the purser's room, and the refrigeratng chambers.

The hatchways were opened on Wednesday morning and the passengers' luggage brought out. It presented a remarkable sight, almost every package being rained by fire or water. and many absolutely charred to a cinder. In explanation of the baggage being soaked through, it was stated that, finding it impossible to reach the fire effectually with the hose, the captain had ordered the sea-cocks to be opened, in order to flood the hold. The upshot was that the Somali, with the whole of her stores destroyed (for the fire had made a clean sweep of the store rooms), made for Plymouth. She arrived in the Sound on Wednesday evening at nine o'clock with about 27ft. of water in the after hold and her stern deep in the water.
