A WEEKLY HALF-HOLIDAY.

An excellent suggestion was recently made to us by one of the leading tradesmen of the city, to the effect that during the summer months, when little business is done owing to the heat, especially in the afternoon part of the day, shops should be closed at noon one day every week. Not only would the shop assistants benefit by the half holiday, but in many instances the principals themselves would be glad of the weekly relaxation, which, in our opinion, could be arranged with little or no difficulty if those interested in the matter would take up the question and urge it upon the leading employers. Already the Saturday half holiday is enjoyed by the clerks in many offices, and the extension of the boon to the retail trade should be easily brought about. There is all the more reason for the adoption of some such measure, inasmuch as there is no such thing as a weekly day of rest for very many shop assistants, who from morning to night, Sundays and holidays included, have to attend to their daily round of duties.

It is satisfactory to note that the Sunday closing of shops in Egypt is making steady progress. Not many years ago, when an English firm then commencing business in Egypt expressed its intention of remaining closed from Saturday to Monday, the leading partner was told that he would find it impossible to succeed without opening as usual on Sunday. But he would not give way and to-day his firm is one doing a very extensive business both here and in Cairo; and his example has been followed very generally among the leading tradesmen of both towns. The great exception to what would otherwise be the general rule is to be found in the provision trade, and it is somewhat surprising to find that no serious effort is made to obtain the closing of these establishments on Sunday. It would be interesting to hear what steps are being taken by the Société des Employés in this direction, though it is somewhat late in the day for anybody to bring forward arguments in favour of the absolute necessity of one day's rest in seven for the human machine is to be kept in perfect working order; the extension of Sunday closing during the last few years and the impossibility of reverting to seven days' work per week when the weekly rest-day has been established affording ample proof that the system has no been found wanting.

We look forward with some degree of confidence to action being taken in favour of weekly half-holiday in the retail trade, as we feel sure that even if in the first instance it is only arranged for during the summer, it will soon become an all-the-year-round institution and perhaps pave the way for the still greater boon of a weekly rest-day for those who do not at present enjoy this very necessary relaxation from their daily labours.

THE MURDER OF MR. GLANVILLE AT MAAGHIL.

Mr. Lonsdale asked the Secretary for Foreign Affairs in the House of Commons last week whether he had received information of the murder of several British subjects recently in the vilayets of Baghdad and Basra.

Grey: His Majesty's Government have received information of the murder of one British subject, Mr. Glanville, at Maaghil and his Majesty's Ambassador at Constantinople is giving every attention to the matter. A special commission is being dispatched by the Ottoman Government to conduct such measures as are required for the maintenance of order.

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LOCAL AND GENERAL.

Quarantine.
Quarantine restrictions as against plague against arrivals from India are no longer applied in Egyptian ports.

Bathing Fatality.
A native, aged 20, was drowned yesterday in the Mahmoudieh Canal where he was swimming. The body was recovered and sent to hospital for a post-mortem examination.

The Mahroussa.
H.H. the Khedive's yacht, the Mahroussa, left the wharf at Yorkhill and went up to the crane at Niession on the Clyde last week, to receive the remainder of her turbine machinery.

Fatal Railway Accident.
Three days ago, a Syrian employe at the Port Said railway station was attempting to mount a train which was actually starting from the station, when he slipped and fell on the rails, receiving serious injuries, to which he succumbed shortly afterwards in hospital.

The Plague.
Yesterday's plague bulletin records two cases at Alexandria, one of which was fatal. A native girl was admitted to hospital and a native porter was found dead at his house in the Labban kiam. To-day's bulletin records another case at Alexandria, a native woman living at Kom-el-Shougafah being admitted to hospital.

Bank of Egypt Interim Dividend.
The interim dividend at the rate of 8 per cent. per annum announced by the Bank of Egypt for the half-year that ended the 30th ult. is at the same rate as for the corresponding period. For the whole of 1905 18 per cent. was distributed, following 1905 18 per cent. for 1905, 14 per cent. for 1903, 13 per cent. for 1902, and 12 per cent. for 1901.

San Stefano Casino.
The Bracale Orchestra's concerts are becoming more and more interesting and popular. Yesterday a large audience listened to the matinée classique, and among other items the Prelude of Lohengrin and Goldmark's Overture were perfectly executed and much applauded. The afternoon concert with the vocal parts drew together more than four thousand people on the terrace. The management of the Casino are preparing a treat for the Fourth of July, when there will be a Venetian fête, and the Tiro Blanc (pari mutuel) will be opened.

St. Catherine's College.
The examinations of students for the baccalaurat Français at the above college took place last week, and the extraordinarily good results are highly creditable to the institution. Out of the eighteen candidates presented, sixteen passed. The three candidates for mathematics were admitted with honours. These were Messrs. Antoine Akaouy, Mario Monferrato, and Alexandre Dibo. The candidates who were admitted in the first part were Messrs. Byron Dellaporta, E. Fiteni, Alexandre Hage Botros, Gabriel Hamouani, Antoine Kahis, Selim Marcos (honourably mentioned), Alexandre Michacos, Benoit Nahmias, Jean Santi (honourable mention), Nelson Sohranz, and Antoine Zoghbe (honourable mention). We congratulate the new lauréats on their success, as also the professors of the college.

PERSONAL AND SOCIAL.

At its last meeting the Council of Ministers decided that Boutros Pasha Ghali, Mohamed Pasha Abani, and Lord Edward Cecil should act as Minister of the Interior, Minister of Finance, and Financial Adviser respectively during the absence of Mustapha Pasha Fahmy, Mazloum Pasha, and Sir Vincent Corbett.

The Earl and Countess of Cromer arrived in London last week in the P. & O. steamer Persia. At Plymouth Lord Cromer received a telegram informing him that his name was at the head of the Birthday Honours List, the intimation that he had entered the charmed circle of the Order of Merit appearing to afford him great pleasure. Lady Cromer, who suffered from an attack of measles during the voyage, has now recovered.

The "Vossische Zeitung" announces that Professor Schwally, of Gießen University, the well-known Orientalist, has accepted the offer of the Arabic chair in the Mohammedan University at Aligarh, in India.

AFTER DENISHWAI

MORE TROOPS WANTED.

ARTICLE BY MR. DICEY.

(Gazette's Special Service.)

LONDON, Monday, July 9.
Mr. Edward Dicey, C.B., in an article in the "Daily Telegraph," says that the latent antagonism between administrators and administrators in Egypt is, in his opinion, not likely to become active under present conditions to such an extent as to endanger the tenure of our highway to India. The Tribunal, composed of native and English judges, which was constituted by the decree of 1895, has dealt out summary and just punishment to the authors of the Denishwai outrage.

Mr. Dicey is inclined to think that the prompt and stern judgment passed on the ringleaders will tend to keep things quiet. Any mitigation of the well-deserved punishment, with a view to conciliating popular sentiment, would be ascribed, not to humanity, but to fear. We must largely increase our forces both in the Delta and the Sudan, and make it manifest that any outrage of this kind will be punished with equal severity.

MORE QUESTIONS IN PARLIAMENT

Sir Edward Grey was further questioned in the House of Commons last week with reference to the Denishwai executions.
Mr. Reddy asked whether he was aware that whilst one of the Egyptian natives was being hanged at Denishwai, on June 28, two others were flogged within view of the gallows; that a large multitude, including women, were looking on; and that the flogging caused horrible cries; and whether the sentences were carried out under the supervision of Captain Macchell, adviser to the Egyptian Minister of the Interior.

Several other hon. members had put down questions on the same subject.
Sir E. Grey: In consequence of the statements which have appeared in the Press, I have asked for a full report of how these sentences were carried out with special reference to the points raised in this and other questions. Meanwhile I cannot say who is primarily responsible for the actual carrying out of the sentences.

Mr. Dillon: May we take that as an answer to all the questions on the paper? If so, when will the right hon. gentleman be in a position to answer those questions.

Sir E. Grey: I have, as a matter of fact, prepared an answer to every question, but really the reply I have given applies to all of them.

Mr. Reddy: Does the right hon. gentleman desire to cloak it? (Cries of "Order.")

Mr. Myer: Is the report in the newspapers substantially true?

Sir E. Grey: On this particular point I have asked for a full report of all the circumstances. (Ministerial cheers.) I assume there can be only one impression produced by the details as they appeared in the newspapers, and I think it most desirable that instead of giving information piecemeal we should have a full report. (Hear, hear.) When that report is received I shall, of course, be prepared to lay it on the table.

Mr. MacNeill: Will the right hon. gentleman direct the full report to be cabled?

Sir E. Grey: No, sir. The number of points raised in connection with both sentences and trial make it absolutely necessary that it should be a considered report. (Hear, hear.)

Mr. Pickersgill: Will the right hon. gentleman be in possession of that report before the Foreign Office vote is taken?

Sir E. Grey: I do not think it is possible that the report can be received by Thursday.

Mr. Dillon: Then will the right hon. gentleman consider the desirability of postponing the vote, or get the report sent by cable? Would it not be very unfair to deny the House the opportunity it will have of considering the report this session?

Sir E. Grey: I recognise the importance of the matter, but there are other questions which should also be considered not connected with it. (Hear, hear.) My one object is to give the House the fullest information, and not to minimise the matter in any way. When I am in possession of the report, no doubt an opportunity will be found for its discussion.

Mr. J. D. White asked the Secretary for Foreign Affairs whether the hanging and flogging of natives at Denishwai on June 28 were of a public character; whether some hundreds of natives, men and women, were present as spectators; and, if so, whether steps would be taken to have the execution of any such sentences in Egypt conducted in accordance with the usage of civilised nations.

Sir E. Grey: The sentences were ordered to be carried out in public, and when I have received the full report the question of whether such executions should take place in public will be considered.

Mr. Dillon: May I ask whether any official attempt has been made to induce any of the London Press to abstain from publishing any of the details of these cases?

Sir E. Grey: I am not aware of any attempt, official or otherwise, to influence the Press in any way.

Mr. C. Wason asked the Prime Minister, in view of the demoralising effect of public executions and floggings, and their long abandonment in the United Kingdom, how he would order their discontinuance in all countries directly or indirectly under the flag of the British Empire.

Sir H. Campbell-Bannerman: I will consult my colleagues as to the extent, which I believe to be very limited, to which public executions take place, and consider whether any and what steps should be taken.

SIR E. GREY'S SPEECH.

COMMENTS OF NATIVE PRESS.

Commenting on Sir Edward Grey's speech in the House of Commons on Friday, "Al-Moayad" says:—"Lord Grey delivered his sensational speech a propos of the Denishwai sentence; and we may infer that the British Diplomatic Agent was the real speaker, the latter being only inspired by him to deliver so alarming a speech before the British Parliament. We understand from that speech that Lord Cromer, in the person of Sir E. Grey, has been fearing that an inquiry into the Denishwai affair would probably be required by Parliament and that such an inquiry, if seriously held, would show who were really responsible for the affair and would reveal the secret of the case. That is why he requested Parliament not to pass a hasty judgment in the matter. Lord Cromer, who knows that members of Parliament are unaware of Egyptian customs and habits of mind, could not find anything better than the plea of religious fanaticism to make the more sagacious members cease to press for a reply to their just demands. Religious fanaticism has shown itself this year, according to Lord Cromer, not only in Egypt but also in all the northern parts of Africa. He did not forget to add that this fanaticism has been directed against all Europeans in Egypt alike. Now, religious fanaticism is a sort of goblin—a Mumbo Jumbo—to the British officials here; they, it appears, become frightened of its effects and remain silent. Sir Edward Grey then emphasized his speech declaring that Parliament should by no means weaken or destroy the Egyptian Government's authority, the suppression of which will lead to serious results. It is by this unjust and unfair policy that Egypt is governed. No other voice except that of the absolute Governor of Egypt can ever be heard in England. Lord Cromer said nothing about the Denishwai incident in Parliament, but, in the person of Sir E. Grey, requested the members not to deal with the question, which was a "remit of religious fanaticism." Had the noble Lord asked himself whether that fanaticism was really in existence or not he would have believed the latter as he has experienced in the Egyptian qualities and circumstances. Hearing such a debate to have taken place in the British Parliament we have to contradict every word pronounced regarding the fanaticism of the Egyptians. Lord Cromer acts to preserve his absolutism in Egypt from any superior authority such as that of Parliament, which in discussing such matters considers nobody to be above justice. The Egyptians, consequently, cannot maintain any safeguards for their national future unless they set their matters directly before Parliament, which should know how matters stand in Egypt, from a native source. This was what we declared several years ago when we visited London and shook hands with some of the members of Parliament."

Sheikh Ali Youssef, it will be remembered, paid a visit to London a few years ago. A banquet organised by Mr. Benjamin Mosely, at which a number of journalists and several Members of Parliament were present, was given in his honour.
"Al Lewa" says:—How does the British Minister know that religious fanaticism exists in Egypt, and that it is dangerous? Did he derive this conclusion from the Denishwai people, who are all "learned and of a high class," or from their attacks against the British troops in their camp? There is no reason why they should put everything down in Egypt to religious fanaticism. If the British officials like to defend their policy in Egypt they will be acting most unreasonably, imputing criminality and fanaticism to all the Egyptians, and could surely find some other arguments to defend that policy. It is curious to hear that the Europeans in Egypt are in danger; and we should like to know what are the other measures which the British Government would take in Egypt beyond those already taken by the Occupation. We call upon the Regent to contradict the suspicious of religious fanaticism directed against the Egyptians in the British Parliament, as we know the effects of such serious suspicions, and to what result the suspicions of Sir E. Grey are likely to lead.

The comments made by "Al-Minbar" are on the same lines as those of "Al-Moayad." Says our new contemporary: "Lord Cromer has delivered a speech in the person of Sir E. Grey in Parliament, and he only went to the House to hear and see what effects his arguments would produce upon the members.

After mentioning the "Daily Telegraph's" statement regarding the Egyptians, their fanaticism, and attachment to the Turkish Government, "Al-Minbar" says: Our only fault is to dare to criticise British policy in Egypt and sympathise with the Ottoman Government owing to its suzerainty over Egypt.

ANOTHER ASSAULT ON BRITISH SOLDIER.

ATTACKED BY MUSTAPHA.

An attack on a soldier is reported from Sidi Gaber, where a drunken Arab caught a soldier of the 2nd Royal Dublin Fusiliers by the collar, throwing him down. The soldier recovered himself and knocked his assailant down and then seeing two other Arabs coming up retired to barracks, where he reported the incident. The police are enquiring into the matter.

Pte. O'Brien, of the Dublin Fusiliers, who was injured in an attack made on him by robbers at Mex on Monday last, is doing well.

DEMENTIS.

We are authorised to state that the account of an alleged interview with Major Pine-Coffin published by "Al-Zahir" on the authority of one of its reporters, is incorrect.

Major Pine-Coffin is reported to have stated that he did not believe one of the four condemned men to be guilty. No such statement was made.

The statement published by various papers that Murad Effendi, the dismissed police officer of the Shobada post, has died of an apoplectic fit caused by agria at his dismissal, is altogether incorrect. Murad Effendi is now in Alexandria.

SHOULD FLOGGING BE REINTRODUCED?

In the course of an interview with Ismail Pasha Abaya, of the Legislative Council, a representative of "Al-Moayad" asked his Excellency whether he approved of the suggestion of some newspapers, including the "Egyptian Gazette," that the Government should reintroduce flogging as a punishment for a certain class of criminals in Egypt. The Pasha is said to have replied as follows: "I had not read this news in the papers before you told me of it. As to flogging being more useful and effective than imprisonment, that is quite unreasonable, and I do not think that any one, possessing feelings and reason, would weigh the present circumstances of our country and yet require the Government to make use of the whip as a means of punishment."

From the Pasha's words, remarks the writer, I gather that if the suggested reintroduction of flogging is brought before the Legislative Council for discussion the project will meet with disapproval.

GOVERNMENT EMPLOYEES.

Lord Edward Cecil, Under-Secretary of State at the Ministry of Finance, has returned to Cairo on the expiration of his leave of absence, and will act as Financial Adviser in the absence of Sir Vincent Corbett. The Committee for the improvement of the condition of State employes will now, under the presidency of Lord Edward Cecil, consider the lot of the upper grade of officials.

SUNNITES AND SHIITES.

Advices from Teheran report that recently a score of Persian Mullahs who were propagating Pan-Islamism on behalf of the Sultan sought refuge in the Ottoman Embassy.
At Shiraz 500 Persians sought the protection of the British Consulate. It has not been ascertained what the reason for their action is, but it is probably due to heresy from the Shiite Faith.

EGYPT AND LEVANT STEAMSHIP COMPANY.

The statutory general meeting of the shareholders of the Egypt and Levant Steamship Company, Limited, will be held at 8, Leadenhall Street, London, on Monday, 16th inst.

According to the directors' report, the total number of shares issued is 159,000, all of which have been allotted, and of which shares there are (1) 139,000 ordinary shares of £1 each, upon which 2s. was payable on application, 3s. on allotment and the balance of 15s. by instalments of 5s. and 10s. on the 15th June 1906, and the 15th July 1906 respectively, and (2) 20,000 Deferred shares of 1s. each for which cash has been received. The total amount of cash received by the company in respect of the shares issued is £2,515 14s., and the following payments have been made on capital account:—Preliminary expenses, £563 17s. 4d.; new boats, £12,000 0s. 0d.; paid to vendors on account of purchase price, £12,800 0s. 0d.; total £24,863 17s. 4d.

THE LEVANT SQUADRON.

RUMOURS OF RE-ESTABLISHMENT.

It is rumoured that the former Levant squadron is to be re-established. Four Atlantic ships are to be attached to Malta, and six ships to remain in Malta and six ships to cruise in the Levant during the winter months. The reason given for the increase is that since the cruising was discontinued in Eastern waters numerous difficulties have arisen in Egypt and Turkey. The Mediterranean Fleet will probably remain at Gibraltar three weeks after the manoeuvres, and then, calling at Malta, will proceed to the Adriatic, and from there to the East.

DR. ANDREWS' INVESTIGATIONS IN THE FAYOUM.

The interesting results obtained by Dr. C. W. Andrews in his investigations of the fossil mammalia of the classical region of the Fayoum, have (the "Globe" states) been published in the form of a descriptive catalogue by the trustees of the British Museum. The strata from which the remains have been obtained are of middle and upper Eocene age, and are situated to the north of that ancient irrigation reservoir known as Lake Moeris. The more recent of these beds show indications of having been deposited nearer the land mass, and the coast line advanced northwards as time passed on.

One of the most interesting of the mammalian forms described is a four-toed ungulate, with remarkably massive and powerful horns. Near the place where its bones were discovered from the rocks stands the mound representing the site of Arsinoe, otherwise Crocodiopolis, where the sacred crocodile kept in Lake Moeris was worshipped. Hence Dr. Andrews has appropriately named this strange creature Arsinoitherium, that is, the beast of Arsinoe. Lake Moeris, again, has provided a name for Moeritherium, interesting as the earliest and most general representative of the Proboscidean, or Elephant, order. Africa, which is one of the two regions where elephants now occur, was thus probably the place of origin of the order.

Another interesting Fayoum species is the Megalohyrax, or Giant Hyrax. This would appear to be the first fossil representative of that curious modern animal, the hyrax. There are some thirteen species of these little animals, though some authorities consider many of them to be mere varieties. Showing in their structure and habits affinities with such diverse forms as the hare, rhinoceros, hippopotamus, and sloth, their classification has been somewhat of a difficulty to zoologists. Regarded by some as rodents, they were classed by Ouvier with his Pachyderms. Huxley cut the Gordian knot of their relationship by making them a separate order. With the exception of the Syrian Hyrax, probably the "Cony" of Scripture, the Hyracoidea are confined to Africa.

It is interesting thus to find that Africa, the present home of the hyrax, was also the place of origin of the family, and that it was in Eocene times represented by comparatively gigantic species. Dr. Andrews considers that the new facts brought to light by his researches support the theory of a former land connection between Africa and South America. This existed perhaps in Jurassic times, and continued up to Tertiary.

JEWISH HISTORICAL SOCIETY.

The annual conference of the Union of Jewish Literary Societies held in London was brought to a close last week with a meeting held in the Physics Theatre of University College, under the auspices of the Jewish Historical Society. The chairman, Dr. H. Gallanz, referred to the fact that the society now had its headquarters in that building, and opened, was being taken over by the authorities of the college. He had hoped that in return for the hospitality afforded to the Jewish Historical Society, those students who engaged in the study of Hebrew and Oriental languages at the University would derive material assistance from the memorial library now being established.

The proceedings took the form of a series of lectures by Sir Isidore Spielmann, Mr. Israel Abrahams, and the Rev. S. Levy. The first-named gave a detailed history of the events which led up to the Whitehall Conference in 1855, which resulted in the readmission of the Jews into England through the strenuous efforts of Menasseh ben Israel. Mr. Abrahams gave an interesting description of the "Crawford" Hagadah, the book recited in all Jewish households on the first eve of Passover, narrating the story of the miraculous deliverance from Egyptian bondage. A perfect series of lantern slides, taken from photographs by Mr. Frank Haas, were rigorously illustrated by Mr. Abrahams.

Mr. Levy explained a number of portraits shown on the screen, giving details of some of the leading figures at the Whitehall Conference, principal among them being Sir John Glynne, the representative of law, and Major-General Lambert, one of the three members who advocated the readmission of the Jews without any restrictions whatever. Simon de Montfort's Leicester Charter, forbidding Jews to reside in the city of Leicester, was the concluding paper of the evening's programme.

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

We do not hold ourselves responsible for the opinions expressed by our correspondents, but we wish in a spirit of fair play to all, to permit—within certain necessary limits—free discussion.

MR. DILLON AND DENISHWAI.

We have received the following letter from a well-known member of a Roman Catholic Mission:

Dear Mr. Editor,—With your kind permission I should willingly try to justify Mr. Dillon's conduct in the House of Commons relative to the Denishwai affair. I don't think it fair to say he has been unfair. I don't think it right to have it asserted he has been governed by malicious impulses.

Let us consider the facts. Unfortunately I haven't a copy of his first questions, but, in my memory does not fail me, they were about the trial by special court. He desired to know if the officers were on duty, and furthermore if they were in uniform; and Sir E. Grey, being unable to answer, graciously promised to take note of the implicit remark conveyed through the questions. Now, a polite answer generally supposes a correct question, and the Secretary for Foreign Affairs had, himself, no difficulty in admitting the soundness of Mr. Dillon's view. And surely they were not both—unwise, or did Sir E. Grey feel a little of the impulse?

His more recent questions have been asked with the same apparent calm and dignity, and answered as fully as possible, a fact that proves their reasonableness has been approved. Had the justice of the Special Tribunal nothing in common with the justice of an English Court; were they in no wise related? If so, was it not the interest of the English nation to see things done thoroughly and rightly? What is unruly in all this? What is rarely in asking were the pigeons tax or wild, in asking had the officers permission to shoot, in ascertaining were the Arabs provoked before they attacked? What is unruly in all the rest? Let the judges of the Special Court give the answer: they have inquired into all these things with a greater animus, I hope, than even Mr. Dillon himself has manifested. Mr. Dillon, in my opinion, has acted through no impulse whatsoever, but his conduct is stamped with honour. I have heard most respectable Englishmen in Egypt say, with whom he is intimately acquainted, that Mr. Dillon is the most perfect gentlemen they have ever met with. It is not right then to slander him, even here in this out-of-the-way, half-civilised country: *Cui honor, honor.*

I have nothing to say for the followers of Mr. Dillon. He has no say; he is but himself the follower of an able and enlightened man who is an honour and an ornament to the British Parliament. The party to which he belongs is meant undoubtedly "but of course" it is known to all Unbritishers in this country that they, the members of that party, disturb and dirty the limpid waters of every polity, even when these waters quietly flow uphill.

These questions are sure, in fact, to do more good than harm. They plainly show to Egyptians and others that justice and fair play have their representatives in the Imperial Parliament, and that nobody shall be trodden under foot with impunity or without the stigma of abhorrence. And no man is more entitled to rank among these than Mr. Dillon, who has known how to uphold a just cause and suffer for it. I trust, then, that "Anglo-Egyptian" will not think it amiss on my part for having crossed swords with him over the honour and respect due to Mr. John Dillon.

Now, one might think I am against the severity of the Denishwai verdict. Not in the least. In the words of an English paper, it was a regrettable and unhappy necessity. The criminals acted with cowardice and brutality, and if they have met with a rigorous treatment, they have, in the full sense of the word, been cruel and merciless. And those who try to palliate their conduct do so, I am afraid, through unworthy sympathy or foul jealousy.

But this has nothing to do with justice-loving representatives of a justice-loving people.

TURKISH COAL.

TO THE EDITOR OF THE "EGYPTIAN GAZETTE."
Sir,—In reply to "Coal Merchant," I gave ten shillings as the maximum cost of the coal, as I am not sure what the latest figure is. C. I. F. The coal is sold in Constantinople, 180 miles away, at 16s. the ton, but is not much in evidence in view of the opposition of a number of coal-agents who represent English collieries and who allege that the Hercules coal contains too much sulphur to make it of use to ocean-going steamers. This is perhaps true of some refuse stuff that is brought down, but where the coal has been properly washed and screened excellent results are obtained, to the satisfaction of all. In fact I know of several agents who prefer the cheaper Turkish coal to Newcastle not only because of cheaper price but because it is nearer at hand for ships in Levant and Black Sea waters.

As regards shipping facilities, there are many. First of all the société runs several steamers to and from Zonguldagh, and besides this there are a number of Turkish steamers and sailing vessels which are continually bunkering or loading coal at the port. Most of the mines being on the sea the coal can be had as soon as possible, being delved, washed, and picked almost in sight of the steamers. The natural and artificial advantages of Zonguldagh are such that ships can coal and clear without delay. The Zonguldagh valley is not the best coal of the Hercules basin; there are other beds in the neighbouring valleys opening on to the sea which contain a rich seam of coal that is much appreciated. However as there is no port of shelter vessels have perforce to call at Zonguldagh and these include nearly all steamers engaged in the Black Sea trade.

There is a large field, as you lately pointed out, for the English capitalist in this region of Asia Minor. If the German is penetrating the interior, we might at least be exploiting the seacoast of that naturally wealthy peninsula.

St. PETERSBURG, July 7. The Duma has rejected the Ministry's demand for £5,000,000, raisable by a loan, for the maintenance of the army.

A Socialist proclamation calls upon the Polish Jews to arm themselves as the police are preparing a massacre.

THE BIBLOSTOK MASSACRE.

GOVERNOR RECALLED.

St. PETERSBURG, July 8. The Governor of Grodno, against whom are serious allegations in connection with the Biblostok massacre, has been recalled.

FRENCH NAVY.

SIX BATTLESHIPS TO BE BUILT.

PARIS, July 7. The Minister of Marine announces the intention of laying down six battleships at the end of this year, also the determination to keep the lead in the building of submarines.

GREECE AND BULGARIA.

SOFIA, July 8. The Bulgarians, despite a large force of police, refused to permit a Greek metropolitan to land at Varna.

ITALIAN NATIONAL DEBT.

ROME, July 7. Chamber of Deputies—Sig. Giolitti congratulated himself on the result of the conversion of the National Debt.

ROME, July 8. The Secretary of the Treasury announced that only a small fraction of the holders of Bonds demanded reimbursements; the remainder is converted into stock.

KAISER AT TRONDHJEM.

TRONDHJEM, July 8. Emperor William has arrived. He was received by King Haakon. The two Sovereigns kissed each other.

REVISED RED CROSS CONVENTION.

GENEVA, June 7. The revised Red Cross Convention was signed here yesterday. The Conference adopted the resolution to submit to the Hague Court disputes regarding the application of the Convention arising in time of peace, Great Britain, Japan, and Korea dissenting.

JAPANESE SHIP STRIKES MINE.

SHANGHAI, July 7. The Niippo, bound for Japan, struck a mine 120 miles off the mouth of the Yangtze River. The vessel has been damaged, but no lives were lost.

THE DREYFUS CASE.

PARIS, July 7. General Mercier has written to the President of the Court of Cassation, affirming Dreyfus's guilt. The Court will give its verdict on Tuesday or Wednesday.

NATAL REBELLION.

GENERAL RISING CONSIDERED UNLIKELY.

DURBAN, July 7. The Government believes that the losses inflicted on the natives will have a salutary effect, and a general rising is now regarded as unlikely. Three columns surrounded Unavoti Gorge and elaborately searched the almost impenetrable bush for Mesini, Bambata's successor. They found the enemy gone.

TRADE OF UNITED KINGDOM.

LONDON, July 7. The imports during June amounted to £17,892,709, being an increase of £4,335,309; the exports were £20,639,187, representing an increase of £4,653,790.

"JOEY'S" SEVENTIETH BIRTHDAY.

BIRMINGHAM, July 7. Great celebrations have been held here in honor of Mr. Chamberlain's 70th birthday.

HOME CRICKET.

LONDON, July 7. Cricket. Hampshire beat Somerset by 5 wickets. Surrey beat Warwickshire by 4 wickets and 91 runs. Derbyshire beat Sussex by 5 wickets.

CAPE TO CAIRO RAILWAY PROGRESS.

The "African World" has received a cable from Victoria Falls reporting the opening of the railway bridge over the Kafue River of the Cape to Cairo Railway, the first train having passed over. The bridge, which is the longest in South Africa, has been completed in the record time of five months. It consists of thirteen spans, each 100 feet, with pillars resting on a bed 16 feet under the water.

The annual athletic sports of St. Catherine's College, Alexandria, were held in the college playground on Thursday last, and were in every way an unequalled success.
