#### RUSSIA AND HER ARMY.

It is the question of questions at present in Rassia. If the Army goes, all goes. As long as the Autocracy can rely upon a sufficient number of the soldiers to shoot down insurgents the revolutionists have no chance. You can do everything with bayonets, it has been said, except sit upon them. But the Tear can sit, ancomfortably but securely, upon his payonetunless the hands that hold them turn against him. Then-le déluge ! If the revolutionists can win over, not the whole of the regiments but a majority of them, or a majority of the men in most of the battalions, Tsardom must come down with a crash. On the other hand, if "order" can be maintained for the next few months, the fabric of society and government can be kapt together, and there may be a chance for the programme of moderate social reform outlined in the latest Imperial manifesto. Therefore, everything turns upon this point Will the Army stand firm ? As a rule, an army does stand. Long ex

perience, in many countries, has shown that the

bonds of discipline are capable of resisting the most tremendous pressure. Put a man into uniform, train and drill him, and so long as he is paid and can look to his officers he will obey orders, in spite of every incentive to disobedience. Tell him to shoot down his own townsmen, villagers, kinsfolk-his own brothers and cousins-and he does it. Military mutinies have occurred; but how rare they are! Reli gious fanaticism or racial sentiment may proluce them, as it did in our Sepoy army in India in 1857; so will the denial to soldiers of their pay and allowances. But mere discontent and patriotic feeling seem insufficient to cause the spontaneous ebulliton. One of the difficulties is that, however disaffected an army may be, it cannot easily evolve an internal movement. A public meeting cannot be held in a barrack square ; a revolutionary committee can hardly be formed in a regiment without the sergeants and officers getting to know something about it. The arrest of a ringleader, and his appearance before a squad from another regiment, with loaded rifles, is apt to discourage the others. Military conspiracy from within is one of the hardest things to organise.

The successful military revolts have gene rally occurred from without. A whole battalion or division, in a distant province, will hoist the mutiny flag; perhaps its officers will go with it. Then it marches against the Government troops as a corporate unit, and as it goes other detachments join it. If it has a sympa thising civilian population about it, and can raise a local reballion, its chances are considerably improved. The strongest of despotic governments may tremble before a combination

The situation in Russia bears a rather

surious resemblance to that of Austria in the Year of Revolution, 1848. The monarchy, despotic and reactionary, and dominated by priests and Court favourites, had stirred up a furious effervescence among the populace of Vienna and the peasants of some of the country districts. At the same time, it had deprived the Hungarians of their liberties, and kept down the non-German populations by heer force. Revolution was rife; but it could have been nothing wors; than street riots if no aid had come to the Viennese insurgents rom outside. But some of the Hungarian regiments raised the standar I of revolt, others pined them, and presently the whole Magyar army, with many thousands of volunteers, vas in fall murch upon the capital. It was civil war then; and the Hapsburg monarchy was 40 badly beaten that it would have collapsed Stogether but for the intervention of the l'sar Nicholas. A Russian army marched into Cransylvania, the Hungarian insurrection was crushed, and the Viennese despotism releitablished. The parallel is striking, and it may even become closer before the ead of the crisis

#### Slave-Trader Caught.

Abdallah El Fargawi, of the Atabdeh tribe, a notorious slave-trader of the Red Ses, has at last been caught by a patrol. He has been sentenced to six years' penal servitude.

To-day is the fourth anniversary of the Coro nation of H.M. King Edward VII. The Royal Standard or the Union Jack is flying to-day over all stations occupied by British troops.

The Sanitary Administration has given over to contract the work of filling up the public birkets. Private birkets will be subject to regulations to be drawn up and put into force during the coming winter.

A council of discipline held at the Cairo Gouvernorat has condemned a native police shawish to receive, 30 lashes and to be degraded to the rank of private, for receiving bribes. The sentence was carried out on Tuesday.

#### English Printing in Egypt.

Messrs. Waterlow Brothers and Layton, Limited, who have been established at Alexandria for some time past, have opened a branch in Cairo, and Mr. Walter West has just arrived to take over the management of this new branch.

#### The Cutting of the Khalig.

The ceremony of the 'cutting of the Khalig" has been fixed to take place at Cairo on the 25th inst. A night fête will be given as usual at Foum el Khalig, and the Ministries and Government Administrations will be closed on

Yesterday's plague bulletin recorded three fresh cases at Alexandria and one case and one death at Sucz. The cases at Alexandria were those of a young native at Kom el Nadoura, a native ghaffir in Tewfikieh-street, and a native porter living at Bab Sidra.

#### Mex-les-Bains.

#### Fatal Jump.

A sad accident occurred on Thursday evening in Cairo, in Hotel du Nil street. A girl of 15 was talking with a neighbour and attempted to jump from her own to the nextdoor balcony, but missed her footing and fell. She was immediately picked up in an unconscious state, and died soon afterwards. The accident took place at dusk.

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GERMANY AND TURKEY

### TEUTONIC INFLUENCE WANING. BAGDAD RAILWAY PROSPECTS

#### (Gazette's Special Service.)

LONDON, Wednesday, August 8. M. Jean Rodes, the Constantinople correspondent of the Paris "Eclair," says that German influence in Turkey is on the wane. Turkish officials recognise that Germany's friendship has not averted the recent humiliaions of the Porte.

The correspondent affirms that the resources for completing the Bagdad Railway are unob tainable. Consequently the completion of the line is improbable before 60 years, if at all.

#### EGYPT AND TURKEY.

High tension is prevailing between Constan inople and Egypt on account of the great hostility shown towards persons arriving in Constantinople from this country. Recently three Mussulman ladies arrived in Constantinople on a visit to relatives, but they were sent back to their country without delay. The wife of the Persian Consul having arrived to spend the summer with her family, was also forbidden to remain in the city. The Persian Ambassador has made strong representations on the subject to the Porte, but his protests up to the present have been of no avail.

#### FRENCH AGENCY.

The "Figaro" announces that M. de la Boulinière, Franch Diplomatic Agent at Cairo, will shortly be transferred to Athens, and will be replaced at Cairo by M. Klokukowski French Minister to Peru.

#### BRITISH GARRISON CHANGES.

The 1st King's Own Scottish Borderers will embark at Southampton on the 21st November on the transport Dongola, which will after wards take the 2nd Battalion Royal Berkshire Regiment from Egypt to Iudia, where they will be stationed at Subathu.

The transport Assaye, which will leave Bombay for home on December 7, will bring the 2nd Battalion of the King's Own Scottish Borderers from Aden to Egypt.

#### QUARANTINE.

A telegram from Pera states that ordinary assengers and pilgrims coming from Suez and bound for Jeddah and Yambo must undergo five days' quarantine at Abou Saad. The vessels carrying them will continue their voyage after disinfection and "deratisation."

#### PURIFICATION OF ALEXANDRIA.

The Alexandria City Police arrested last night an Italian and an Austrian woman, who are believed to be demi-mondaines, in the neighbourhood of Mchamed Aly-square. Both these women were sent to their respective Consulate. Yousbashi B'attner, who is in charge of the Morality Department (Service des Mœurs) of the Alexandria Gouvernorat, is displaying great energy in his efforts to purge

#### MOSQUITOES AND MALARIA.

In a report to the Academy of Medicine at Paris, Prince d'Arenberg, Chairman of the Board of the Soez Canal Company, says that thanks to the measures adopted, i.e., filling in of marshes, drainage, and petrolising of ditches, the common mosquitoes have disappeared from Ismaïia since 1903, nor is larva of the anophytus to be found in the protected zone. which extends westwards 1 000 metres from the first houses of the Arab quarter, and eastwards 1,800 metres from the first houses of the European town.

It was in 1902 that malaria began to decrease markedly, and from that date not a case has been reported in Ismailie, where morquito nets for windows and beds, which were so unhealthy and uncomfortable in a warm climate, have been abolished

#### THE EGYPTIAN PRESS.

MR. FINDLAY'S ACCUSATION.

The charges brought by Mr. Mansfield de C. Findlay are still the subject of comment in the local Press. In yesterday's issue of "La Réforme" M. Canivet remarks :--

"Some of our native and European confrères have protested, but there is no need for us to follow their precedure for the following reasons. Mr. Findlay is an honourable man and, having brought a collective accuration, he will dot his i's by mentioning the newspapers who have been recipients of the 'large sums of money' or else Mr. Findlay will remain silent, and in the latter case he will acknowledge that he has deceived the Minister by means of fantastic information. Meanwhile, the accusation need not be taken seriously, and it does not deserve a contradiction. In the sposition in which Mr. Findlay—whom we are pleased to consider an honourable man—has placed himself, he will speak out and will mention the names of the payers and the recipients. In regard to our excellent confrère's de-

In regard to our excellent confices a command that the identity of the personages who gave "the large sums" should be disclosed by the British Chargé d'Affaires, we may mention that such a disclosure would be quite impossible in view of the exigencies of diplomacy. It must be presumed that some deep political reasons influenced the persons who had to disburse these large sums, and great interest attaches to the personalities of these wholesale corrupters of the Press. Whether the total amount was a million or merely some hundreds of thousands of pounds, is a question of little importance; the point is who gave the money Did it come from Yildiz Kiosque? Or was the Sultan in partnership with a great Euro-pean potentate, jealous of England's power, and they together subscribed the vast sum necessary to tempt the Ezyptian journalist from the path of virtue? There problems per-haps never will be solved, although of course the identity of the personages must be known to those who are in a position to pry behind the scenes of European politics and their influences in Egypt. Our position is one of suspended judgment.

On the one hand, it is clearly impossible to believe that Mr. Findlay would have made the accusation to Sir Edward Gray had he not been in a position to substantiate his words. This is brought out by the fact that the telegram containing the charges was included in the White Book. The telegram was despatched on July 5 and the White Book was published on Friday week, so if the accusation had been found to be incorrect, there would have been plenty of time to have prevented its publication as a State document. Therefore we must believe that there were ample grounds for holding it to be correct. On the other hand, we would be the last to think that our confrères could have deigned to accept bribes, however gigantic they may have The temptation was great, and the amount. prospect of spending a huge sum of money in trip to Europe was alluring. But at the same time our professional amonr-propre prevents us from believing it. Sir Robert Walpole de-clared that he knew the price of each member of the House of Commons, and some cynics go so far as to say that "every man has his price." If this is true (which everyone may lecide for himself)—if there, is no which a degree of temptation cannot be found which is capable of overthrowing it-if the question whether the good or the bad spirit shall gain us to its side only depends on which bids highest and offers most prompt payment—then what the Apostle says might well be true of man universally: "There is no difference, they are altogether sinners; there is none that doeth good (according to the spirit of the law), no, not one." do not believe that every man has his price, much less any of our confreres, and though we consider that Mr. Findlay must have had the strongest proofs for the charges he has brought, yet at the same time we wish to firmly believe in the incorruptibility of the journalists who are involved in this accusation.

has set us at ease and lightened the weight of the charge. For we can believe that Mr. Findlay may regret the making of such a sweeping accusation. Men like Canivet, Haï kalis, Manse, etc., cannot accept such a charge without asking in a loud voice from the British Chargé d'Affaires how he could say so much. For our part we would ask Mr. Findlay to give us proofs and tell us: What paper was bribed? Who paid it? And who would have bribed it in such an affair as Denishwai The Moslem Press was charged in the same way in connection with the Akaba ques-Germany and Turkey were mentioned somehow. But who bribed them in the Denish wai affair? Is it the inhabitants of Denishwai, the Menoufieh "Empire" (?), or who? #### ATTACK ON IRRIGATION OFFICER.

In connexion with the assault on Mr. A. P. Marson, inspector of irrigation, near Kafr Beirab, the Court of Mit Ghamr has sentenced three of the aggressors to six months' imprisonment with hard labour, while their father will be tried before the Court of Mansourah for breach of the rotation rules.

Our readers will remember that the assault was committed while Mr. Marson was accompanying the fellah to the local omdeh to draw up a proces verbal against him for working his sakieh out of rotation. The young men threw him off his bicycle, and while he lay on the ground attempted to strike Mr. Marson, who, however, repelled his assailants, and gave one of them a sound thrashing.

#### DROWNING ACCIDENT AT CHATBY.

A party numbering twenty children of various nationalities were bathing yesterday afterneon in the shallows off the Municipal depots at Chatby when, about five o'clock, five of them were drawn seawards by the waves. A shawish was the first to notice the accident, and with the help of another man, succeeded, after some difficulty, in getting them to shore. Two of them were all right and except for the fright and douse, were none the worse; their other three companions were half suffocated, and one of them, a Greek boy of twelve, died at night at the Government Hospital. The other two are in a dangerous condition.

The accident took place within calling distance of the baths, which were crowded at the time, and the shores were thronged as the children were brought to shore. The shallows have a gentle gradient, with a sandy bottom. and where the accident took place twenty-five yards out-there was no more that four feet of water.

A word of praise is due both to the Coast Guard and ambulance services for their promptitude, but at the same time we agree with the old maxim that "prevention is better than cure," and were some regulation enacted whereby bathers, especially children, should be subject to a mild form of municipal control as to how, when, and where to bathe, these lamentable occurrences might be avoided, or at any rate rendered more rare.

#### EGYPT IN PARLIAMENT.

THE KHEDIVIAL MAIL LINE

Mr. S. M. Robertson, the member for Tyneside, who was one of Mustapha Pasha Kamel's guests at the recent lunch at the Carlton Hotel, and who acted as spokesman for the gnests on that occasion, has become greatly interested in this country ever since, judging from the fact that the only two questions on Egypt in the latest papers to hand, are put by him.

On the 2nd inst. he asked the Secretary of State for Foreign Affairs whether the convey ance by sea of Egyptian pilgrims from Egypt to Arabia was made a monopoly of the Khedi vial Steamship Company, while natives of other countries were allowed to sail from the same ports by other lines; and whether Sir Auckland Colvin, formerly financial adviser to the Egyptian Government, was the chairman of the company in question.

Sir E. Grey replied:-The Foreign Office are not in possession of any information on the matter, which is one that primarily concerns the Egyptian Government.

#### MUSTAPHA PASHA KAMEL.

#### HIS WORK IN LONDON.

Mustapha Pasha Kamel is still busying himself a great deal in London. He has addressed a pamphlet on the Denishwai affair entitled 'To the English nation and the worldat large.' It is written in English and consists of eight pages. He sends out the following invitation:-

"Egypt is only two days' journey from Europe. Let those Englishmen who are animated by a spirit of justice, and do not wish to see the honour of England sullied, visit the country. Let them go about in the towns, and in the country. Let them see, with their own eyes, how Christians of all nationalities live with the fellahs, and with all Egyptians. Let them convince them selves that the Egyptian people is not fanatical, but that it is desirous of justice and equality, and that it de mands, above all, to be treated as a nation, and not as a herde of slaves."

#### THE DEKHELAH OUTRAGE.

Commenting on the sentences in the O'Brien

ase, the "Globe" says : - The exceptionally everesentences passed on a couple of native hooligans at Alexandria for brutally assaulting British soldier will, of course, excite the ndignant commiseration of the Byles brigade, That spurious sentimentality is too customary among Radicals posing as friends of humanity at large to call for comment. The point of genuine interest is the proof afforded by such drastic punishment that public feeling at Alexandria shares Lord Cromer's apprehensiveness of coming trouble. In addition to the continuous spread of Pan Islamism throughout Northern Africa, there is a special cause on the Nile to agitate the native population. The propagandists of anti-English sentiment constantly harp on it that af er the suppression of the Arabi revolt, Great Britain gave repeated assurance that she would withdraw her garrison, and so cease from exercising control as soon as the Egyptian people were qualified to govern themselves. This impolitie undertaking was like so much other mischief. Gladstonite legacy, and, for once in a way, the subsequent observance of continuity of policy at the Foreign Office produced illconsequences. Taking occasion from the accession of sympathetic Radicalism to office in the United Kingdom, Egyptian demagogy is now working both on the Nile and on the Thames to bring to an end that regeneration of the country which British control created, and has maintained. We do not care to inquire whether this movement is covertly engineered by the Old Turks at Cairo ; that is quite a possibility, as they would have everything to Ottoman supremacy on the Nile.

LE COMMERCE EGYPTIEN.

En comparant le tableau statistique de 1905 avec celui de Janvier 1898, on reste toat d'abord frappé par la croissance extraordinaire de la consommation des tissus de soie en Ezypte, consommation qui a plus que doublé dans ces dernières années et qui, en se basant sur la prospérité du pays, continuera sai s doute sa marche ascendante.

Nons croyons done utile d'attirer l'attention des fabricants et exportateurs de soieries sur cet état de choses et de leur donner quelques avis dont ils peuvent faire leur profit.

En général, l'Egyptien est peu enclin à l'économie, et le sonci du lendemain entre pour peu dans ses préoccupations. S'il gagne beaucoup, il dépense de même. C'est pour cette raison que l'usage des étoffes de scie s'est répandue dans toutes les classes de la population depuis l'habitant des villes jusqu'à celui des plus petits villages de l'intérieur ou le cultivateur se permet, chaque année, le laxe de quelques costumes de soie tant pour ses femmes que pour ses enfants.

C'est ainsi que, suivant le tableau de statistique, chaque pays a pris une part plus ou moins large à ce surplus de consommation. Cette part, rationnellement, aurait du être

proportionnelle avec l'importance de chacun des pays. Tel, cependant, n'a pas été le cas. Certains pays, en effet, s'en sont tenus à leurs anciens modèles qui ont été que'que peu délaissés par la mode ; d'autres, au contraire, onteréé des articles nouveaux qui ont plu dès leur mise en vente en Egypte. Cette faveur du consommateur les a encouragés à persévé edans leur initiative, co qui fait que la balance penche en leur faveur, et cels, au détriment des fabricants qui répugnent à imiter leur exemple. Nous sommes amenés à cette considération

par l'évolution accomplie par les fabricants de soieries italiennes en la rapprochant du résaltat obtenu par la fabrique lyonnaise qui s'est bornée, en général, à la confection de ses mo

Durant les 5 annéas, qui se sont écoulées entre 1892 et 1896, la France a importé en Egypte pour la somme de L. E. 239.949 de tissus de soie en tous genres, ce qui donne une moyenne de LE. 47.789 1/2 chaque ancée. L'Italie, pendant la même période, a vendu pour L.E. 33.924, soit une moyenne annuelle de L.B. 6.784 1/2.

Dans les 5 années, de 1901 à 1905, le total, pour la France, est de L.E. 327.501, soit une moyenne annuelle de L.B. 65.500. Pour l'Italie. le total est de L.E. 323.893, soit une moyenne annuelle de L.E. 64,778.

Il résulte de ces chiffres que l'écart considé rable, qui existait entre les deux pays dans la première période, a presque disparu dans la seconde, de sorte que la France qui, jusqu'ici, avait occupé le 1er rang, s'achemine prompte ment vers la perte de sa prépondérance si elle persiste dans sa routine. Jusqu'ici la France a importé : Les crépés

noirs, les crépes de Chine, la mousseline, les satins, les habaras, les étoffes pour ameublement, les brochés, les brocatelles. Pour les trois premiers articles, aucun pays

n'a pa entrer en concurrence avec Lyon qui reste sans rivale dans cette fabrication. Quant aux autres tissue, ils ont été imités

par l'Italie avec des étoffes plus légères et, par conséquent, à meilleur marché, ce qui leur procuré un débouché très facile en Egypte. Ainsi les lampas qui sont d'une vente considérable ici, sont presque exclusivement de provenance italienne. Toutefois, ce tissu, pas plus que le habara, le satin et la brocatelle d'imitation italienne, a peu contribué à l'évolution que l'Italie est en train d'accomplir. Son succès provient d'un nouvel article que ce pays a lancé sur notre place, il y a trois ane, et q i est entré en grande faveur dans la consommation. Il s'agit des zéphirs de soie. C'est un tigan léger tantôt rayé, tantôt travaillé à jour et tantôt à gros carreaux. Sa largeur est de 68/70 c.m., et son prix varie entre 1 fr. 30 et 2 fr. 50 le mètre tranco bord Alexandrie avec 5% d'escompte. Cette étoffe, excessivement légère, est traversée par de gros fils de coton qui la soutient un peu et permet de la vendre à si bon marché.

La France, jusqu'à pré ent, ne s'est pas intéressée à cet article qui est appelé, dit-on, à supplanter dans ce pays tous les autres tissus lourds tels que les brochés, les damassés, les brocatelles. Il présente, en effet, les avantages anivants :

1° Dans les climats chauds, comme en Egypte, on donne la préférence aux tissus légers et on délaisse volontiers les lourdes éteffes qui sont font gênantes surtout en été.

2º Les prix sont moins chers que ceux des antres tissus mesurant même 50 c.w., alors que les zéphirs ont tous une largeur de 70 c.m 3° L'article se fabrique en rayé et, généralement les rayures sont du goût des indigènes

et de la plupart des orientaux. On nous a cité trois maisons italiennes qui, à elles seules, ont fait depuis 4 ans une meyenne annuelle d'affaires s'élevant à un million. Les consommation vs topiours en angmentant Afia

de mieny nongger l'article les fabricants d'Italia envoient deux fois par an leurs voyageurs aur notre place avec une variété de dessins touionra nouveaux. Parfois ces dessins ne conviennent pas aux indigènes; alors, aidés par leurs représentants et par les clients eux-mêmes, les fabricants combinent quelques dispositions sur la base

des tissus qu'ils possèdent déjà dans leurs collections. C'est ainsi que chaque saison on voit apparatire quelques nouveau'é. On nons assure que les fabricants sont tellement engagés pour l'Egypte que les commandes, pour l'été prochain, sont déjà faites depuis un ou deux mois et que certains ordres retardataires ont été refusés pour Mars 1907.

### TO-DAY'S TELEGRAMS.

#### UNITED STATES & JAPAN.

## A REGRETTABLE INCIDENT.

JAPANESE RAIDERS SHOT

New York, August 8. "The "Tribune" states that Americans killed 5 Japanese caught illegally fishing off the A'entian Islands. A revenue outter arrived afterwards and captured 12 others. The reason

for killing the men is obscure. It is understood that the Government will express regret to the Japanese Ambassador for the summary treatment of the poachers. (R.)

Washington, August 8. Mr. Bacon, Acting Secretary of State, has sent to the Ambassador at Tokio the substance of a despatch from Mr. Sims, the Government official in Alaska.

Mr. Bacon states that his purpose in sending the despatch is in order to give information, such as the Government has, of the regrettable incident, the news of which may reach Japan in a distorted form. There is no intention of offering an apology or further regret than is contained in this despatch, as the State Department regards the Japanese fi-hermen as poschers if they were within the 3 mile limit. which Mr. Sims vouches was the case.

It appears that the Japanese raiders were caught skinning seals and refused to surrender, whereupon the special agent, Mr. Lempke, ordered the patrol to fire.

#### RUSSIAN CRISIS.

#### COLLAPSE OF GENERAL STRIKE.

St. Petersburg, August 8. It is officially stated that the general strike has proved to be a complete failure ; the movement never assumed serious dimensions except here and in Moscow, where it has already collapsed owing to the vigour shown by the authorities in arresting the agitators and dispersing crowds.

St. Petersburg, August 8. The general strike has completely failed. Work is being resumed everywhere. (Tavas)

#### FRANCE AND TURKEY.

EXPEDITION TO DJANET.

PARIS, August 8. Despite the protests made by the Government, a Turkish expedition has secretly left Tripoli since the 7th July with the object of occupying the Tripolitan hinterland. It is expected to reach Djar et in three months, but it is hoped that the French will occupy the Oasis beforehand.

#### TRADE OF U. K.

#### SATISFACTORY INCREASES.

LONDON, August 8. The imports and exports of the United Kingdom during the mouth of July show increases of £3,867,836 and £5,621,911 respectively.

#### LABOURITES VERSUS LIBERALS.

LONDON, August 8. Mr. Keir Hardie, in a speech at Dowlais in reply to Mr. W. Churchill's speech on the 7th instant, strong'y advised "the recent convert from Toryism" not to indulge in vain glorious The Liberal party and failed, he said, to oust the Labour party, who nevertheless intended to increase their present representation in Parliament. (Reuter

#### ADMIRAL CHICHESTER'S SUCCESSOR.

LONDON, August 8. Rear-Admiral Goodrich has been appointed to succeed Admiral Chichester as Admiral and Superintendent at Gibraltar.

#### MONEY AND SHARE MARKET

(FROM OUR FINANCIAL CORRESPONDENT.)

London, August 3. The Money Market.

A general holiday appearance has taken possession of the money market as well as of the Stock Exchange, and the only change of importance has been a further considerable amount of monetary circulation on account of the holiday makers. There is no reason to predict any alteration in the general situation, which points towards continued ease.

The Secretary of the Treasury in America has come to the relief of the New York market to the extent of another 4,000,000 dollars, and he will probably continue to do so. It is not anticipated that there will be any large demand during August, and the requirements of the last settlement were easily arranged. The Bank position is quite normal for the time of year, and the reserve would appear to be ample Sixty days' sight drafts are negotiated to-day at 3 per cent., and the discount market generally, although somewhat firmer, shows no signs of any material advance.

#### The Stock Market.

In a recent article we referred to Russia and South Africa as the "Bêtes Noires" of the stock markets. This week the remark has been peculiarly applicable. In the first place, the short period of quietness which followed the suppression of the Duma has given place to serious disturbances in Finland and at Cronstadt, which may at any moment spread to other parts of the Tsar's domains These outbreaks have revived the feelings of nervousness both in London and Paris financial circles, and the confidence in an early settlement of the troubles established during the latter part of last week has almost entirely disappeared. On the Paris Bourse the pessimism has been even more marked than here, and appears to owe its origin in a degree to difficulties connected with the monthly settlement, which have again brought in the bears.

As regards South Africa, the new Consti tution granted by the Government has been a very absorbing topic, and prior to Mr. Chur chill's announcement, business in the mining market was practically suspended. The scheme was accorded a mixed reception in the "House." There appeared to be a general feeling of relief that "it was no worse;" for the lack of confidence in the present administration entertained by members had created fears that Rands at 478. the terms might have been much less favourable to British interests in the Transvaal

Several points in the scheme were severely criticised, notably the Government's interference in the matter of native labour, it being felt that this and other purely local questions should be left to the judgment of hose directly concerned, viz., the people of South Africa, seeing that they are to be 'Agricultural Bank entrusted with the management of the country. In the main, however, final opinion on the proposals is suspended pending the verdict of the Transvaal.

The only reason that can be put forward to account for this is the idleness dominating most sections.
