HANDS OFF EGYPT!

To-morrow (says the "Pall Mall Gazette" of Tuesday last) his Majesty the King is to meet the German Emperor, and it is no secret that important affairs of State will occupy the attention of the two Sovereigns. First and foremost, as we must suppose, there will be the consideration of what steps it may be possible to take to assist the Tsar and the Russian Imperial family in the event of contingencies which are, at least, within the bounds of possibility. Then, presumably, they will exchange views upon the whole situation in Russia; and, lastly, upon the somewhat delicate subject of the relations between their own respective countries. In that last connection it is instructive to note that the German Press has made, as yet, absolutely no response whatever to those overtures of friendship which have been so lavishly poured out in Press there is only ore possible answer-England during the past few months. On the "Hands off Egypt!"

contrary, the welcome-if such we may call it extended to the British Sovereign by a Press of which the representatives were hospit ably, and even enthusiastically, entertained at Windsor a few weeks ago, comes as near to positive rudeness as the circumstances permit. Of that, however, we do not complain in the least: contrariwise, we prefer it, not only because it may possibly have some effect in diminishing the volume of the cataract of soapy sentimentality which will probably overflow a certain portion of our own Press during the next few days, but also because sincerity is preferable to insincerity, and, in the present instance, may tend to awaken a good many people (who badly want awakening) to the truth about the relations, present and future, between England and Germany. What, then, is it that the German Government is looking for from this meeting of the monarchs If we may believe the "National Zeitung," which is hardly likely to speak without know-ledge on such an occasion, while the Russian situation supplies the chief reason for the meeting, there is another. England, we are told. desires to regulate the affairs of Egypt as soon as possible, and to make the proposed settlement seem plausible in the eyes of Germany. Again, as we learn from the Berlin correspondent of the "Times," the "Deutsche Revue" discusses the Egyptian "question" from the German standpoint, and proposes that Egypt should be treated "as an object of common interest to England and Germany, and that its future should be decided between the two Powers on the basis of compensating values." In short, in this and in other matters the two nations must effect settlements "upon a footing of confiding reciprocity."

It is, no doubt, a little difficult to keep one's temper in the face of the unabashed

impudence of the German assumption that

there is still an "Egyptian question" which

requires "settlement" with Germany or, for that matter, any other Power. Nevertheless, let us draw upon the materia medica of our philosophy for a stiff dose of patience, and try to understand what our German friends are driving at. The "Deutsche Revue" is, it must be admitted, delightfully frank. It seeks to use Lord Cromer's proposal of certain changes which would affect the status of foreigners in Egypt as a means of extorting British consent to give Germany a free hand on the shore of the Persian Gulf in the matter of the terminus of the Baghdad Railway. "For England to persist in her policy of transforming the Persian Gulf into a mare clausum Britannicum would be to throw down the gauntlet, and her persistence would com-pel us to meet British wishes with the same measure." In other words, Germany threatens that she will treat Egypt as she has treated Morocco, and will try to obtain "compensation for the abandonment of her rights." Now, that is a policy which no British Government can possibly tolerate. Germany's legitimate interests in the Nile Valley, which are purely commercial, are infinitesimally small, and unless she had interests there as great as those of France, with all the tradition of historical relations such as those of France with Egypt behind her, we could not consent to treat Egypt as "an object of common interest be tween England and Germany." There is no such "common interest," and the German assertion that there is can only be regarded as an impudent attempt to levy blackmail. The rights of all foreigners, Germans with the rest, will be as scrupulously safeguarded in the future as in the past; but Egypt is, and must remain, to all intents and purposes, a British Protectorate. Whatever be the outcome of the Baghdad Railway question, it will certainly not be settled by Germany's offer to abandon "rights" in Egypt which she has never possessed. That is a consideration to be commended to the notice of those among our own people who are perpetually repeating that we have no grounds of difference with Germany. We have none; but ever since the success of the German veto upon the Anglo-French Agreement in Morocco, Germany has evidently been meditating the discovery of a ground of differ ence with us-and that ground is Egypt. In order to foment that difference, Germany has egged on the Turk to assert himself in the Peninsula of Sinai, as he is defying France (doubtless by the same inspiration) in the hinterland of Tripoli. So long as Germany continues to play her game of blackmail, so long will it be impossible for us to arrive at that good understanding with her which all parties in

England desire. Germany must be made to

realise that Egypt is a piece in the game of

chess which has been definitely swept off the

board by Great Britain. Wherefore, to all

such proposals as are suggested by the German

Franco-Egyptian Convention.

Beyrout Family of Nine Drowned.

Among the survivors of the Sirio disaster was M. Faltat Hurat, of Beyrout, who was making the voyage with his family, consisting of ten persons, of whom he is the sole survivor.

New Quay Estate.

The next sale of the Municipal estate on the new quay will take place in October. After that date there will be auctions of this land at regular intervals until the total amount of the land fixed by the Commission for sale has been diamesad of.

Mahmond Hamdi el Mutargim, who recent ly managed to escape from custody on the charge of forging telegraphic money orders, has been apprehended by the Cairo police. The official erquiry showed that Mahmoud Hamdi had committed forgeries to the extent of L.E. 400 during the last three months.

San Stefano Casino.

The fête de nuit at San Stefano on Saturday fully realized the expectations of the large throng who filled the grounds of this popular Casino. The Bracale orchestra and the Phil harmonic Band vied with each other in their musical efforts, and the evening wound up with a magnificent firework display.

A Local Composer.

Among the items of music to be played by the hand of the 2nd Batt. Royal Inniskilling Fasiliers in the Esbekieh Gardens to morrow evening, appears a march, "The Rising Nile, composed by Lieut. Colonel J. Donegan, R.A.M.C., who is at present in medical charge of the troops at Kasr e'-Nil. The arrangement for military band has been made by Bimbachi Franklin, Musica! Director, Egyptian Army.

Cairo Motor Acoldent.

The enquiry into the motor car accident which resulted in the death of a lady and injuries to Yessin Bey Mustapha, has shown that the motor carwas being driven at too high a speed, and that the cart with which it collided carried no light. Such, at least, was the evidence elicited from Gamila Saïdla, a woman servant who was accompanying them. According to her, Dame Aisha Fadel was a close relative of the Moudir, and was a frequent caller at his house, and it was while returning to her own home that the accident took place.

Armenian Lawlessness.

There was an echo of the racial feuds in the Ottoman Empire in Alexandria yesterday afternoon, when four Armenians attacked a Greek in Mohamed-Aly square because he was selling the Alexandria Greek newspaper, "Byzantium." Our contemporary has offended Armenian susceptibilities by venturing to publish a portrait of the Orthodox Bishop of Anchialos in Eastern Roumelia. This prelate is disliked by the Armenians and so these men thrashed the Greek newsvendor and tore his papers to tatters. They were arrested and ra'eased on bail.

A local newspaper stated that it had been decided to fit up the Alexandria cabs with taximeters. This statement is not correct, and was evidently based on the fact that a representative of a French firm of manufacturers of taximeters had submitted a proposal to the Municipality. As we understand that each taximeter costs about frs. 200, it is not likely that the proprietors of cabs will see their way to adopt it, especially as they are very pleased with the present cab tariff, which is considered most equitable for all the parties concerned.

NEW ABBAS THEATRE.

SIGNORINA LEONI'S BENEFIT.

The final performance of The Gelsha at the New Abbas Theatre on Friday night was very properly devoted to the benefit of Signe Baldi, who, invariably welcome to Cairo audiences, has so largely contributed to the success of that piece, which has been the best received of all the company's wide repertoire. Large as the theatre is, it was almost full, and great was the applause accorded to the much fêted Mimosa San when she appear ed on the stage.

The Italian translation is rather a grotesque paredy of the popular English play, and though the staging was certainly excellent, many of the costumes were quite incomprehensible To see the naval officers appear in military aniform made one smile, but even greater merriment was provoked by the sight of a sailor in kilts! As regards the musical repre sentation of the piec', there was not much fault to be found, but Mimosa San treated that pretty "Goldfish" song with great cruelty by singing it in such painfolly slow time, and we cannot understand why the finest of all the songs, 'Star of my Soul,' should have been omitted. Despite these faults, however, the play went with an excellent swing, and Signorine Baldi and Leoni. and Signori Urbano and Pirracini especially distinguished themselves in the principal characters of Mimosa San, Molly Seamore, Wun-Hi, and Marquis Imaro, respectively.

DEATH OF PRINCE MOHAMED IBRAHIM.

TERRIBLE FATALITY.

PRINCE'S AUTOMOBILE COLLIDES WITH TRAIN.

(Gazette's Special Service.)

LONDON. August 20.

Prince Mohamed Ibrahim, whilst motoring between Bernay and Cormeilles, smashed violently into a train at the level crossing between Paris and Cherbourg at 7.30 o'clock on Saturday night. Both the Prince and his chanffenr are dead. According to the evidence taken, the Prince's automobile was travelling at an excessive rate of speed.

PARIS, August 18.

An automobile conveying the Egyptian Prince Ibrahim Mohamed collided with a train near Bernay. The Prince has been seriously

Paris, August 18. The automobile of Prince Mohamed Ibrahim (aged 38), cousin of H.H. the Khedive, ran into the engine of a train while crossing the Cherbourg road. It was entirely destroyed. The Prince's condition is desperate. The chauffeur (Havas) has already succumbed.

Paris, August 19. Prince Ibrahim Mohamed is dead. (Reuter) PARIS, August 19.

The newspapers state that Prince Mohamed Ibrahim died in the evening. (Havas)

BERNAY, August 19. Prince Mohamed Ibrahim succumbed atter having undergone a trepanning operation. (H.)

[Bernay, where the catastrophe occurred, is on the main line to Cherbourg, between Evreux and Lisienx. It is a town of 7,966 inhabitants, and is the capital of the arrondissement of the Eure. The Chemin de Fer de l'Ouest passes through the town, and while crossing this railway line the Prince met with the accident.]

A private telegram from Cherbourg to the Daïra received as we go to Press states that the Prince breathed his last at 9.30 o'clock yesterday evening. He was alone in his automobile with his chauffeur.

The Mayor of Cherbourg sent a telegram dated 4 p.m. yesterday to the Prince's Daïra at Alexandria to the effect that his Highness's condition was "très grave."

Prince Mohamed Bey Ibrahim was the son of Prince Ibrahim Ahmed, the cousin of the Khedive, and brother to H.H. Prince Seif el Din, who is living in England. He was only 28 years of age, not 38, as stated in the Havas telegram. The Prince was married twice. Seven years ago he married Princess Fazilah, the daughter of Prince Osman Fazil. He had a son by the first wife who is now six years of age. After the leath of Princess Fazilah, five years ago, his Highness married Princess Salihah, daughter of Princa Ibrahim Hilmy, uncle of the Khedive, by whom he had two children, one a daughter who is now four years old, and the other a sop, now two and a half years of

The Prince was the biggest landlord in the neighbourhood of Alexandria, The Alexandria Sporting Club's grounds is on his property, and he possessed a great deal of land in the city, including the large buildings in Mohamed Aly-quare where the offices of the Banco di Roma are situated. It is stated that the Prince was offered lately L.E. 2,200,000 for his estates in Alexandria and Cairo, but refused,

as he wanted £3,000,000. Prince Mohamed and his wife and children left Alexandria last month for France and took up their residence in the Prince's Parisian mansion in rue Callipert. His Highness was an ardent motorist and had already met with a terrible accident in Cairo the season before last, on the Pyramids road, when two European ladies who were with him, Mrs. Schrager and Mrs. Voronoff, were also seriously injured.

UNREST IN THE SUDAN.

THE EXISTENCE OF FANATICISM.

correspondent at Port Sudan we are informed that ever since the commencement of the Akaba affair considerable unrest has been evident among the Sudanese of that district, and, our correspondent remarks, 'the existence of fanaticism thereabouts cannot be denied. No uneasiness is said to exist among the

Eoglish inhabitants, who realise that any trouble which might be brewing would very soon be discovered and that immediate steps would be taken to convince the natives of the futility of any outbreak. The couple of hundred or so Greeks in Port Sudan show, however, a most unreasonable fear of an outbreak, and scares among them are frequent.

On our part, we are convinced that Colonel Drury, Governor of that province, will be able to maintain perfect order, and we would advise our Greek friends of Port Sudan to reassure themselves.

ENGLISHMAN'S GRAVE DESECRATED.

SEARCH FOR BOOTY.

We learn from Port Sudan that Mr. Cross. an ex-soldier and foreman of works at Port Sudan, died the week before last from heat apoplexy. On the day following the burial it was found that the railings round the unfortunate man's grave had been pulled down and that the grave had been re-opened. The body was found in the grave, apparently undisturbed, and it is thought that some of the Sudanese from the adiscent village had opened the grave in the hopes of finding booty.

In spite of most searching inquiries no evidence has been found to convict any of the villagers of this horrible act of desecration.

AN AWKWARD DILEMMA.

RESULT OF WASH-OUTS IN SUDAN.

Considerable inconvenience has been caused by the recent wash-outs which have been experienced on the Port Sudan railway. Parts of the line have been broken up and the tele graphic communication has suffered greatly.

At the time of the first of these wash outs which we reported a short while ago. Bimbashi Lord was up in the hills some eighty miles from Port Sudan and suddenly found himself altogether cut off from the nearest villages and without provisions. The telegraph line to Port Sudan being broken, the only means by which Bimbashi Lord could obtain assistance was by telegraphing to Atbara, which he did by "tapping" a wire, and from there the message was transmitted to Cairo. From Cairo the officer's urgent summons was telegraphed to Suez, and thence to Port Sudan. In this roundabout way the unfortunate position of Bimbashi Lord was made known to his fellowofficers at Port Sudan, from where provisions and help were sent with the utmost rapidity.

TURKISH TRANSPORT'S DISTRESS.

RESCUED BY B. I. STEAMER.

(FROM OUR CORRESPONDENT).

Snez Sunday. The British India steamer Warora (Capt. A. E. Stebbing) arrived at Suez this morning from Bombay, having in tow the Tarkish troopship Bars, which has on board 302 troops and 45 of a crew, from Hodeidah bound to Constantinople.

The Warora sighted the Bars 17 miles south of Ras Garib, in the Gulf of Suez, at 8.30 a.m. on the 18th inst. She was in distress, her engines being disabled, and she was drifting towards the shore; in about half an hour's time she would have been on the rocks and broken up.

The commander and troops of the Tarkish transport were in terrib'e straits, and as they possessed no flags to signal with they were seen desperately waving and orying out for assistance, their only distress signal being the ship's ensign half masted. The Warora, The "Standard" of the 14th inst. contains at greaterisk, owing to the heavy see and strong wind, and also her close proximity to the land, approached the Bars and by mean of rockets threw lines to her. Finally she managed to get hold of the transport and tow her to Suez safely, after first getting the tow hawser parted, and the manguvres had to he repeated with greater rigk owing to the ship drifting rapidly closer and closer to the shore.

The plan of passing ropes from one vessel to another in a heavy sea, where there is great danger attending the lowering of boats, has apparently never been attempted before, and is entirely an idea of Captain Stebbing, to whom, as well as to the officers, great credit must be given for saving the lives of so many people, who would have very likely perish ed were it not for the prompt assistance rendered.

GAMBLING AT SAN STEFANO

VILLA MARGHERUTA RAIDED

Early yesterday morning the Alexandria City Police, including Hacheen Bey and two detectives, made a raid on the Villa Margherita, an hotel at San Stefane, while gambling was proceeding.

On the arrival of the police a scene of great excitement ensued, but no arrests were made. the 31st inst. with passengers, mails and £20 and the gambling material were confiscatad by the police.

THE CAPITULATIONS.

THEIR ORIGIN.

In a letter which we have received from a TOTHE EDITOR OF THE "EGYPTIAN GAZETTE."

Sir,-A common error, shared largely by the European colonies in the Ottoman dominions. is that the Capitulations were granted only to subjects of foreign Powers. This is not so. Originally, the score of the Capitulations comprised all non-Mussulmans, resident in Turkey. It we accept the vardict of history these Capitulations were first granted, not by the Turkish Sultans, but by the Greek Emperors, to the foreign colonies within their realm, such as the Genoese, the Pisans, and the Venetians. After the Fall of Constantinople, Mahomed II., desirous of reconciling the Greeks for the loss of their political liberties. by allowing them a certain measure of their previous communal privileges, ratified the Capitulations which the Greek Lords of Byzantium had conferred upon the Latin colonies, and by a wise and masterly stroke of policy, the effects of which have lasted to this day, extended a fair proportion of those benefits to his new nor. Mussulman subjects, chief amongst which of course at that time were the Orthodox Greeks; and these benefits were, inter alia, that they should be governed by their own municipal laws, have their own Patriarchal Court and Justinian Code, be free of military service -in fact enjoy just as much self-government as do the foreign Colonies now with the exception of those penal and civil metters which were ultra vires of the Patriarchal Court. Moreover, the groundw. rk of these original Byzantine Capitulations has served as the basis of all subsequent treaties between the Ottoman Porte and Christian Princes. An interesting and conclusive relict of this

state of things is the fact that the Consul of a European Power is even to-day described in official documents, such as the exequatur, as the "Bayle," a title borrowed from that which the head of the Genoese or Venetian colony held under the Lower Empire, and which he continued to hold under the Turks.

It was this "authority and immemorial prestige" to which I referred in my letter to you of August 4 as bound to suffer by the abolition of the Capitulations, not so much from juridicial privilege as from political status, of which more anon.

Greek Orthodoxy, therefore, in common with the several other communities, Christian and Hebrew, subject to, and resident within the dominions of the Sublime Ottoman Porte, have in greater or less degrees privileges just as valid as those of the colonies of foreign Powers. In the case of the Greek community these privileges are accentuated by the fact that the Orthodox Greek Church is the Christian State religion in Turkey. The Œcumenical Patriarch is officially just as much the head of the Greek nation as is the Sultan the Caliph of the Mohamedans, or the Pope Pontiff of the Holy Roman Empire. Greek Church is styled the Great Church, and claims precedence in all State cere-monies, the Patriarch being alone permitted monies, the Fatharch being alone permittee to represent the other religious commu-nities, and as conclusive proofs of his high rank, the Sultan rises upon the entry of his Œcomenical Holiness; a mark of respect which is not shown to the Grand Vizier. I might enumerate various other items of Patriarchal privileges, such as the military honours, but the fact of his spiritual equality with the Sultan will suffice.

I now come to the crux of the question. Strictly speaking, and according to precedents which are indisputable, the abolition of the Capitulations in the form proposed by Lord Cromer is impossible.

Firstly, because that measure applies to s vilayet of the Ottoman Porte, and not to the whole system of the Empire; secondly, because to become effective it must require a special Iradé of the Sultan; thirdly, because to conform to the spirit of impartiality with which it has been conceived, it must apply to all the ron-Mussulman communities resident within this Ottoman vilayet.

The abolition of the Capitulations in the er has suggested by excluding the subject non-Mussulman communities would render the status of those communities in Egypt null and void; it would subject to the local Egyptian authority, and not the Ottoman Porte, all those Christian and Jewish communities whose supreme authority is at Con stantinople.

Thus, were the abolition realised, the Greek Patriarch of Alexandria would discover himself severed from the Œoumenical Patriarchate of stantinople, and to carry the point further ould require from the Khedive, and not the Sultan, that Iradé for the journey which I mentioned in my letter.

To sum up, my contentions are that the status of these non-Mussulman communities of Ottoman nationality in Egypt has been overlooked in Lord Cromer's scheme; that to be thorough, that abolition must include them as well; that the effect of that measure will make the status of the Patriarchate of Alexandria an anomaly, by rendering it independent of the (Ecumenical Patriarchate without provision for a readjustment of its relations with the local Egyptian authority; that a special Iradé is necessary from H I.M. the Sultan for the abolition of the Capitulations, which would then, to be effective, have to apply to the Empire at large,

Opposition to Lord Cromer, to which a correspondent objected, although it might exist, as I know it to do, could not very well be officially expressed by a subordinate of the Cleumenical Patriarchate of Constantinople, who alore has the prerogative to voice the views of the Orthodox Greek Church and the reek nation.

The only solution to the difficulty would be

a form of Protectorate exercised in Egypt by one or other of the Powers subject to the spiritual authority of the Orthodox Patriarch. such as Russia or Greece, and similar to that which France wields in the Levant over the Oriental Latin communities, subject to Turkey. -Yours, etc., Alexandria, 17th August 1906.

[P.S.—I note the quibble re personal status; is this not also included in civil law ? My lawyer says it is.

TO-DAY'S TELEGRAMS.

VALPARAISO EARTHQUAKE.

ENORMOUS DAMAGE.

WIDESPREAD FIRES.

HEAVY MORTALITY.

LONDON, August 18. The seriousness of the Valparaiso earthquake is apparent from the records of the seismographs in the Isles of Wight, Vancouver, and alsowhere, which showed prolonged shocks lasting for 5 hours. The tides at Honolulu have been affected. The disturbance of the cable causes a lack of details, but the stories of loss of life which are current at New York are considered to be exaggerated. It is believed that the country north of Valparaiso has suffer-(Reuter) ed more especially.

New York, August 18. The telegrams received here represent the condition of Valparaiso as terrible. Earthquake shocks began at 8 o'clock on Thursday evening. Many houses collapsed and fires broke out. Many persons were killed or injured. The business section has been almost entirely destroyed. A large part of the fires have been unchecked owing to the panic and general disorder. The shipping is undamaged.

Belated messages from Santiago (Chili) state that many houses have collapsed. The earthquake was the severest known. The streets are filled with terrified people. (Router)

Paris, August 18. The damage done by the earthquake at Santiago and Valparaiso is enormous. (Havas)

NEW YORK, August 19.

According to the news received from Santiago on 18th inst., the earthquake extended over a zone of two degrees. Many public and private buildings have been greatly damaged. The losses are estimated at about 2,000,000 dollars. The mortality at Santiago is estimated roughly at about 30 and at Valparaiso at about 500 persons.

Firemen from Santiago have gone to Valpa raiso to quell the widespread fires. The villages of Quillota, Melipilla, San Antonio, and Llillai are in ruins. Many persons have been killed or injured at Talca, Rengo, and San Fernando. Until the telegraphs have been fully restored the extent of the disaster will be uncertain.

To the watchful observer of affairs in the Nearer East it is not at all surprising to find that a certain amount of disturbance should have become manifest of late in the Islamic world. As yet there is no great danger to be apprehended from it, as it is more spasmodic than general, and in existing circumstances each incident may be easily dealt with. Moreover, it is far from the desire of the sagacious ruler of Turkey to see the forces of Islam in array against those of Christianity. Relatively unimportant, however, as may be the unrest in Islam at the present time, it is likely to increase in intensity, and possibly occasion trouble later on unless some change be brought about in the attitude of the Western world towards Turkey and its ruler, and more particularly in England.

It should not be forgotten that we have more Mahomedan countries under our sway than any other Power, and therefore such trouble, if it arose, would be more likely to come our way than to move in the direction of other non-Mussulman people. Too little heed has been paid in England to the spread of education among Mahomedans and the publication of news through the mediam of the native Press. Incidents are made known far and wide and commented upon, and it should surprise no one to find that exception is being taken to the constant encroachment made upon Mahomedan rights and to the treatment that the Soltan has met with at the hands of a large section of the British Press. It has, unfortunately, become a practice to speak slightingly of him on all occasions; at times the Turks and their Sovereign are spoken of in language that might be much more fittingly applied to Russians and their Tsar.

Caliph and Defender of the Faith.

The same want of observation has also existed in respect to the Sultan's position as 'Caliph." Great as the achievement of the Sultan has been in bringing Turkey out from the position in which she was left as the result of the Russian War, when she had come to be regarded as "une quantité négligeable." to that of an important factor in European politics, it stands no comparison with what he has succeeded in doing in respect to the "Caliphate." It is not too much to declare that all, or nearly all, that may have been lost in the way of territorial sovereignty through the action of the Treaty of Berlin has been regained by the great increase of political prestige acquired by the Sultan through the drawing together, in mind and thought, of the scattered Mahomedan communities and nations round the central idea of the "Caliphate." As Caliph the Sultan is regarded as the protector and defender of Mahomedan interests, and at his Court reside representatives from every Mahomedan community, through whom communication is kept up with all parts of the world.

No one who has been privileged to witness the weekly ceremony of the "Selamlik" during the period of the "Haj" or rilgrimage to Mecca, can have failed to note the variety of worshippers at the mosque attended by the Sultan. For several weeks strangely-garbed Orientals of every hue and cast of feature come trooping into Constantinople on their way to the Holy Cities. Their one object in view in passing through the city of the Sultan is to see the Caliph. Wandering about, they see the well-armed Turkish soldiers in their thousands, and the war vessels with their great guns lying in the Golden Horn. As they pass through the Bosphorus and the Dardanelles they also note the frowning batteries and forts that guard the approaches to his capital, and proceed onward greatly impressed with the majesty and power of their religious chiet. Far and wide is spread the renown of the great Caliph, as they talk over the sights they have seen at Constantinople with their less favoured co-religionists, who have had to take another route, when military service in the case of 6,000 priests they meet at the Holy Cities, and to their own rn to their homes. Revered as the Caliph is by so many millions of Mahomedans, is it strange that insult and ridicule in his direction should be felt and

The Advance of Islam,

As time moves onward, "Islam" as a religious force is bound to increase in strength. It is making vast strides in Africa, and in the opinion of those most competent to judge in the matter, will be the religion of that Continent. In addition to this, there will probably bemany converts made in Japan and a large addition to these already in China. If ever Pan-Islamism were to become a great disturbing force in the Empire it will be due to ourselves, to the ungenerous treatment the Sultan has received at our bands, and to the conviction being driven home to the mind of the Mahomedans that England is no longer their friend. With such an overwhelming number of Mussulmans under British rule, would it not be well to cultivate better relations with the Sultan, more espe cially with the German Emperor ever seeking opportunities to pose as the friend of the Mahomedan? Great mistrust, and rightfully so, is felt in Eugland of his intentions; but it is a great mistake to imagine that Turkey and the Sultan are entirely in his hands. Commer cial advantages are obtained by Germany to our detriment because the Sultan is human and the Emperor never fails to remird him on all occasions of his friendship and affection. Friendly visits are of frequent occurrence. The Emperor has been twice the guest of the Sultan,

If our alliance with Japan (a non-Christian Power, let it be observed) has enabled us to dispense with a large portion of our naval force previously maintained in the Far East, what would not an alliance with Turkey do for us in the way of adding to our military resources for defence? The Germans know this well, and therefore Tentonic intrigue is ever at work, and we are forced by it into a false position, and made to appear as if working for the destruction of Mahomedan rights, whereas in reality the Turks have no such well-wishers as we are.

Injustice to Turkey.

The Tarks unfortunately can point to many instances of the gross injustice with which they are treated. It was never intended by the authors of the Berlin Treaty that a Bulgaria should be created, to become a menace to the peace of Europe. Yet we have seen how, year by year, she has steadly increased her army, without one word of remonstrance on the part of the Powers, and, in face of the commanding position she has assumed in the Balkans, the desire has been manifested in certain quarters to limit the forces of the Sultan, and to restrict their action.

The Turks have seen their kinsmen driven out of Bulgaria and Eastern Roumelia as the fruit of Christian administration, and the same process will commence in Crete, unless the Powers remain firm in their attitude, and loyally maintain the guarantees for the protection of the Mahomedan inhabitants of that island. Naturally, it is the desire of the Sultan and the Turks to restrict as much as possible foreign interference in Macedonia, seeing in it the danger of its development into autonomy, always so fatal to their interests.

It is the fashion with many English writers in the Press to speak of the neglect of British interests by our diplomatic representatives, and of the ill-will shown by the Porte. Yet it would not be difficult to show that many questions have been satisfactorily settled through the agency of our Embassy at Constantinople, more particularly by the present Ambassador.

All this is ignored by those who, while airing their jealousy of Germany, will make no effort to win the goodwill of the ruler of Turkey, just as it is forgotten how honestly he set to work after the war to restore her financial credit and pay off the old debts, and the benefits he conferred upon the "foreign bondholders" by the establishment of the Public Debt. In spits of all, it may be added, the Turks still look to us as their most disinterested friends and nothing is more desired by all patriotic Turks than to see a good and friendly understanding between the two Governments.

THE RUSSIAN ENTENTE AND BRITISH TRADE.

Mr. Victor Marsden, who holds the place of honour in the "Fortnightly," points out the commercial benefits to ourselves which should follow a good understanding with Russia

"New Russia will be a land of increasing needs; capital will be more evenly distributed the peasant will be relieved of the greater part of his present crushing burden of taxation; self-respect and ambition, education and freedom of movement, will teach him a thousand needs of which he is ignorant to-day. Take, for instance, the change which has already come over the working-classes, the factory hands of Russia. These men are the leaders of the masses, precisely as the thinkers of the universities are the leaders of the middle classes. The workman of Russia has abandoned his national costume, and some of the dirty habits which accompanied it; he now dresses much the same as the self-respecting workman of Western lands; he is demanding sanitary dwellings, and leisure hours for self-improvement. The change of costume alone, when it reaches the monjik of the fields, will revolutionise the industries of Russia, which, even now, cannot apply the needs of the country except by State aid at the cost of intolerably high protective tariffs on imports."

MONEY AND SHARE MARKET.

(FROM OUR FINANCIAL CORRESPONDENT.)

London, August 10. The Money Market.

The money market continues to show ease, and the supply of gold is ample, notwithstanding the outflow for holiday purposes, which has been exceptionally large, and would appear to have reached about two millions during the last few weeks. With a bullion total or over £36,000,000, and a reserve of 48.73, against 46.7 a year ago, with nearly two millions en route to London, there is no question as to the Bank being in a strong position. Nor have we any reason to alter our often expressed opinion that ease of money is likely to continue for the present, and will prove a help to the impending activity of stocks and shares. France is again trying to employ her surplus money here, but there are rumours of Germany wanting more gold in the autumn months.

The great activity of trade as shown in the arge increase of both imports and exports is likely to keep the circulation active, but it can be safely said that never has booming trade demanded so little assistance from London banks or discount houses. Trade bills are now particularly plentiful, and not more than 3 to 3} per cent. is obtainable for good three months' paper, while Bank Bills are a shade under 3 per cent. Such accommodation as is required by the great manufacturing centres is mainly supplied by the country hanks out of the deposits in the same centres, and the enormous wealth of the country was never more clearly demonstrated than it is to-day. Any slackening of trade would no doubt bring large balances for investment and employment in London, but there are no signs of this at present; rather the contrary. Meantime, large profits are being realised in industrials, which will leave a surplus which must be invested, and will tend to raise the price of all sound securities, and possibly some of the many speculative stocks.

The Stock Markets.

This week we have seen the interesting and somewhat unusual spectacle of a revival in the stock markets after a holiday which immediately precedes the conclusion of a nineteen-day account. From the outset, on Tuesday, the tone was cheerful, and this has continued throughout Several influences have conduced to this improved state of affairs. In the first-place, the favourable monetary position has created a vigorous demand for gilt-edged securities, which has operated very appreciably upon other sections. Ther, too, the Continental Bourses are much firmer. The strike movement in Russia appears to be less serious than first thought, and the abrupt failure of the attempt to institute a revolt against the Government is accepted as an augury for peace-for the time being, at any rate.

The splendid trade returns issued this week have also given additional stimulus to investment businers. They show that in July our exports to foreign countries exceeded all previous records, having increased by £5,621,000, while the imports are higher by £3,867,000. For the seven months to the end of July the aggregate gains in exports amount to no less than £30,509,000, and in imports to £31,299,000. These returns, added to the excellent holiday prospects, have been specially appreciated in the home railway market, which s now firmer than for some time past. Americans, on the other hand, have given away considerably.

The fact that many members are away on holiday has, of course, restricted the amount of business transacted, added to which there appears to be little stock to be had in the

The leading feature of the week has been the active demand for gilt-edged securities, and this has not up the price of Consols, which are particularly bueyant, at 881 for cash, a gain on the week of 9/16. Irish Land Stock has improved to 894 the new issue to 8 premium and other first class stocks are proportionate'y higher.

Foreign Bonds.

The quieting-down of affairs in Russia, and the consequently steadier tone of the Paris and Berlin Bourses, has brought strength to Russian bonds, which during the week have daily advanced. The Fours are now as good as 733 while the discount on the new loan has been reduced to 9. Last Friday we quoted the Fours at 71 4 and Fives at 10 4 discount. Japanese stocks are fi m, the Fiveper-cents having hardened to 103 1/8.

This market commenced the week under the depression caused by the dividend announcements of the three leading lines, the London and North Western, the Midland, and the Great Western. At one time these dividends would have been considered very satisfactory, but, in view of the splendid half-year which the lines have experienced, the market felt that it might reasonably expect more generous distributions than are being made.

The record Board of Trade returns, and the prospects of bumper holiday traffics have, however, dispelled the weakness of this section which during the past two days has developed considerable strength, quite an active business having been done in nearly all the shares. In several cases yesterday there were gains of a full point.

Americans.

the American market here. Nearly all along the line the shares have declined, Pennsylvanias being about the only exception. These stocks have been well supported, and the price has gained 1 5 on the week at 69 7 after being as high as 70 1.

There has been an excellent enquiry for Canadian Pacifics, in view of the brilliant harvest prospects. The shares are quoted tonight at 172 % compared with 171 1 last Friday. The last making up price was 165 1.

Egyptians.

The Egyptian market has been quite active durings the past few days, and there is a good demand for the leading shares. National Bank have advanced to 26 }, and Agricultural Banks to 9 § 3 3. Delta Land and Investment are also in request, and after being as good as 3 1, are now easier at 31. Egyptian Estates are firm at 17 - 18. There has been a good business done in Daira Sugar at prices between 5 and 5 1. Daira Sanieh have not yet felt the better tone, and are at at 16 7, and the Deferred at 97 nominal. Delta Preference Bearer are also unmentioned at about 11 1. The 4% Debentures of the latter are still wanted at 102. Bank of Abvesinia are a bad market, with absolutely no support, the prices being distinctly flat at 1 1-3 discount. Union Fonciere are firmer at 6 1 -1. and Land Bank of Egypt at $8\frac{5}{8} - \frac{7}{8}$. There is no change in Corporation of Western Egypt at 3 premium, and Salt & Soda at 1 16. and Egyptian Markets at $1\frac{1}{4}$ are without any transactions. Khedivial Mail are $1\frac{1}{4}-\frac{3}{4}$.

Commencing with Rhodesians, the South African market has received considerable attention. When it is remembered that this is the eve of the carry-over, this marked revival is all the more remarkable, and is very welcome as an augury of better things to come. There has been a very active demand for Tanganyikas, also for Zambesi and Bankets, the strength of these and other leading Rhodesian shares being partly attributed to a fuller realisation by investors of the wonderful potentialities for the development of the mining districts of Rhodesia contained in the late Mr. Beit's munificent gift to the Cape-Cairo Railway. It must be apparent to the meanest understanding that the results which must inevitably follow such an opening up of the country will be enormous, and in view of this fact far-seeing investors will not be slow to avail themselves of the present low price of South African mining shares.

Yesterday Kaffirs participated in the activity, and they have continued firm to-day. Rand Mines have improved to 65 and East Rands to 45.

Egyptian mining shares have kept steady. Egyptian Mines have been very firm, the price having advanced to 4s. 6d. United Africans have gained \(\frac{1}{8}\) at 1\(\frac{1}{4}\). Nile Valleys are unchanged at 5s. 6d. and Options at 11.

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
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
