#### LORD MILNER.

Lord Milner has received many flattering proofs since his return to England of the regard in which he is held by his fellow-countrymen. They have not forgotten, and they will not forgot, his inestimable services to that this anti-nationalism, as Lord Milner the Empire, and they have testified their admiration by presenting him with an address which both for the number and the quality of its signatures is without a parallel in politica history. The paltry and spiteful attempt was made to get the House of Com mons to pass an oblique vote of censure upor him simply excited the scorn of all honourable men throughout the Empire, and we do not doubt that it helped to ensure the success of the address from the Cape Colony which was presented to Lord Milner last week An influential deputation came all the way from South Africa to assure him that twenty-five thousand signatories in the Cape Colony alone are true to the great principles for which he worked unflinchingly in face of the most formidable obstacles, those principles being "the gradual fusion of the white races of South Africa into one nation, and the retention of that nation as a permanent member of the British group of States," Sir Lewis Michell said that he had never found him other than "calm and collected and inflexibly resolute to see that by no act of his the British flag should be trailed in the dust." Lord Milner no longer holds any official position; his influence consists solely of the weight which attaches to the opinions expressed in his speeches, and their general tenor conveys a

grave warning. From his place in the House portant speeches, the first soon after he took his place in that Assembly, the latter a recently as July 31, when the Government an nounced the terms on which they had decided to grant a Constitution to the Transvaal some people, it is well known, take pleasure in sying evil; the raven's croak is their natural voice. It is not so, however, with Lord Milner. If he had been a pessimist he could never have lived through the arduous years from 1898 to 1904, and kept the firm faith which he always professed in the future of South Africa. It would be much more gratify ing to him to believe that things were going well, as, indeed, they were, until this Govern ment came into power and started their policy of meddling and muddling in South African affairs-in Natal as in the Transvaal, Lord Milner devoted most of his speech yesterday not to any specific act of the Government, such as the new Constitution, nor yet to any of the great problems of South Africa in which British interests have been jeopardised by those who now have the deciding voice at ne. He holds that the most pressing danger of the moment in South Africa is disunion among the British Colonists, who seem ready on the very eve of the first electoral trial of strength to split into groups over merely personal differences, in face of a united Dutel party, which preaches incessantly a Dutch South Africa. But the danger of the moment at home is even geater, for it is the growth of what Lord Milner called the spirit of antinationalism. This is a subject to which we have often referred in these columns, since it is constantly breaking out in new forms and varieties, the only constant symptom being the inveterate belief that in any political quarrel ne's own countrymen must be in the wrong.

An Englishman has only to cross the seas, and in the view of those who suffer from this

trange "disease of opinion" he changes his

nature as well as his sky. With the mind of the pro-Boer during the war everyone was painfully familiar. In some the malady reached the stage of delirium, and drove them to say that, unless the Boer cause triumphed, they would have to reconsider their belief in Providence. Perhaps the policy of the present Government may spare them such reconsi tion, if they have not already performed that mental exercise, for to give away what we have won by hard fighting and vast sacrifices seems to be the ambition of a powerful sec tion of Ministers. Lord Milner spoke of the extraordinary venom which is displayed against any South African who takes the British side the conflict between British and Dutch deals, between what was Milnerism and what Krugerism. The Little Englanders condemn him as one who must be "animated by the meanest sentiments, a tool of capitalists, a soulless, subservient creature, who can have no higher motive than the greed of gold." These are of the same kidney as the pessimists against whom the German Emperor was moved to lift up his voice in strong irritation a week or two ago, when he lamented that they would not relieve the unfortunate Fatherland of their presence. But the German anti-nationalistf are tyros compared with the British. Ours are quite unapproachable for their mischievous stence. How they filled the air with alsehoods about Chinese slavery is notorious that was perhaps, their greatest achievement, for it was a masterpiece of mendacious hypocrisy. Then a pro-Zulu agitation was started, which would have twollen to ten times its dimensions had Unionist Government been in power, and the anti-nationalist Press grew eloqueut over hypothetical outrages. The outcry against the punishment of the Egyptian villagers who set upon and murdered some British officers has hardly yet died away. Lord Cromer's measared warning to the Home Government of the growth of a fanatic anti-British agita-tion in Egypt is either derided by these "anti-nationalists" or it is accepted as natural and worthy of all sympathy. The wrongs of India, again, are wringing their bosoms. Englishmen are accused of bleeding India to death and of intensifying the poverty of her poorest classes. The Bengali agitators find eady champions here at home. Their seditious songs are carefully explained away as harmless abuilitions by a small but pertinacious group of Anglo-Indians, whose patronage of the Con-gress movement, and tolerance of the Swadeshi agitation, bid fair to cause really serious trouble in Bengal, where the success of their noisy clamour has alarmed the great Mohamedan section of the population. We do not believe calls it, is popular with the ma men, but it is unquestionably popular with the Radical pulpiteer, and with the Trade Union leaders, who are, for the most part, strongly anti-Imperialist. They carry their followers with them much further than the latter wish to go, and they do so the more-light-heartedly, because of their exceedingly limited acquaintance with the affairs of any part of the Empire but their own. There will, as Lord Milner said, be a "tremendous rally" when these pernicious doctrines are pushed too far; but before the rally comes, mishief may be done which can only be eradicated very slowly and at enormous cost.

TANTAH AGRICULTURAL SHOW.

The Khediye arrived at Ras el-Tin Palace rom Montazah this morning, and held his first reception since his return from Burope, which was largely attended.

Hassan Pasha Radwan, Mudir of Garbiel the name of the Moudirieh, Ibrahim Pasha Said, on behalf of the Khedivial Agricultural Society, and Mr. George Dominick, in the name of the Tantah Municipality, will be received by the Khedive at Ras el Tin palace, when they will pray him to preside at the opening of the Tantah Agric ltural Show. We under stand that his Highness will be graciously pleased to accept, and he will leave for Tantah by special train on Thursday, arriving at 10. 45 a.m. and will be accompanied by the

His Highness will be received with a salute of 21 guns, and he will drive direct to Ahmedi Morque to visit the tomb of Sidi Ahmed el Bedawi. He will then proceed to the mosque which has been erected between Birket Ber house and the new criminal courts, after which he will lanch on the Show ground. The guests for the lunch number one hundred including the Ministers, the mudirs, members of the Khedivial Agricultural Society, Legislative Conneil, and Tantah Municipality. After dinner his Highness will attend a horse parade previous to opening the Show, and be will leave for Alexandria at 4 p.m. An attendance of between fifty and sixty thousand persons is expected. Order will be maintained by a force 250 soldiers in addition to the police, and Mansfield Pasha will be in direct supervision.

### IMPORTANT APPOINTMENT.

The Egyptian Government has appointed Mejor Henri Gustave Joly de Lotbinière, D.S.O., R.E., to an important position in the Survey Department under Captain H. G. Lyons. He belongs to a Huguenot Canadian amily, and is a distinguished member of the Royal Engineers. He was born on the 10th March, 1868, and is the son of the Hon Sir Henry Gustave Joly de Lotbinière, K.C.M.G., V.C., (Canada), D. C. L. (France) L.L.D., Lieutenant Governor of British Columbia. He is the great-grandson of the last Marquis de Lotbinière and his father adopted his present surname under a provincial statute in 1888. His mother is the daughter of Hammond Gowen, of Quetec. #### THE BEDOUIN RAIDERS.

The latest London papers to hand confirm the news of the withdrawal of the Turkish garrison of Kusaima contained in our special service telegram of the 1st inst. We hear that Kusaima is well supplied with water, three springs, each of which gives birth to a small stream, affording a constant supply to the Bedouins of the district. An excellent well was tound at El Auja by the frontier commission in the neighbourhood of the ruins of an ancient castle constructed by the Crusaders to check Saracen raids. Several crosses were out in the walls of a ruined chapel and fragments of a Greek inscription, dating perhaps from Byzan tine times, in which the word "eteleutesan (they) 'died' could be deciphered.

The Bedouin raiders mentioned in our last issue are described as well armed and equipped They had martinis, swords, daggers, pistols, and every man was accompanied by s spare camel. Their dress and appearance was very different from that of most of the Bedonina on the Egyptian side of the frontier, and while the latter are in general poorly armed and equipped, the raiding party which Mr. Keeling countered constituted a formidable fighting force of about 1'0 men. It appears to have composed of contingents Jazi, Turkish Barakat, and another tribe, and its object was the Hawawat clan with which the Arabs on the Ottoman side of the frontier have a feud.

## THE LOST CITY OF MARIOUT.

#### EXCAVATION OF SAINT MENAS.

The recent wonderful discovery of the longost city of Saint Menas in the wilds of the Mariout desert has aroused great interest throughout enlightened Burope, it was known that this ancient city did exist, and that its site was only a few miles from Alexandria, all attempts to discover its where abouts had been fruitless. Before the Christian Era the city had been a central point for the trade and caravan routes from Alexandria to Cyrene and the Oasis of Ammon and from central Egypt to the North West, but it is chiefly known to fame for the extraordinary sanctity, which it subsequently obtained owing to the execution of Mena, an officer in the army, son of a Governor of a province of Africa, who suffered martyrdom under Diocle tian. His body was buried there and a Church was built to mark the spot. At the end of the fourth century a magnificent basilica was great resting-place for pilgrims and travellers on their way from Alexandria to Nitria. A lescription is extant by an Arab geographer. who describes the Church of St. Mena as still standing, apparently, to an uninjured condition.

The date at which this description should he placed is probably between the early part of the eleventh and the early part of the fourteenth century, i.e. subsequent to the great destruction of churches in Egypt by the Caliph Hakim, when thirty thousand churches are said to have been ruined in Syria and Egypt. Since that date the old city has utterly disappeared from history and Sir Massie Blomfield in the Bulletin of the Alexandria Archæological Society for 1904 stated that it is believed that the site was known to the Redoning and he added :-

It seems to me that the identification this site with the assistance of the Coast-Guard authorities would be a suitable one on which to expend some portion of the funds of the Archeological Society." But the honour of the discovery of this long-lost city belongs to two German archæologists, the Rev. C. M. Kanfmann and Mr. J.C.R. Falls who alighted on the ruins on Jone 7, 1905. They have now compiled an account of their excavation during their first compaign, from November 1905, to June, 1906. The work has just been published at Cairo, and is on sale at Diemer's Library (7s. 6d.). It is well printed and illustrated with 54 autotypes, which give the reader an excellent idea of the comprehe character of the work of excavation and of the many and various artistic finds that have been the outcome of these excavations. This book, which is dedicated by the authors to ss Pasha, gives a most interesting account of the discovery of one of the greatest archieological mysteries in Egypt, and should be read by all who take an intelligent interest in the ancient history of this country. The record of their work is carried on until last June. Since then the Rev. C. M. Kaufmann and Mr. Falls have excavated the buildings connected with the basilics of Arcadius, the principal baptistry of the city, a part of the north cemetery with its basilica, and a small track of the recently discovered south cemetery. Work is now being carried on in the ancient Komobion. In Menas City all the principal buildings and churches are several metres underground and the work is of greatly difficulty. Some fifty cisterns have been discovered, and some of these have been excavated. For centuries no water has been obtainable at Karm Abu Mina, except during the winter months, and the water has to be supplied by a camel caravan from a village

TO THE EDITOR OF THE "EGYPTIAN GAZETTE." Sir, - You will have the British Colony with you if you demand a full, searching as independent inquiry into the causes of the non arrival of the "Isis" on Wednesday morning. There are rumours afloat, namely, that the ship was known to be in an unseaworthy condition by reason of a partial disablement of her machinery before she left port, and it is now alleged that she has put into Zante with a broken shaft. Of course the company will be prepared with an excu'patory explanation, for that is the way with companies as with governments whenever they are called to sount. But that will not satisfy the public. What they went, and you should insist upon their having, is an independent official investigation. To put a company upon its defence and to rest satisfied with whatever excuse it may choose to offer is like calling upon the accused to sit in judgment upon him self. In the interests of public safety, in which include both passengers and crew, the whole impartial truth, as it can alone be elicited by commission of experts, should be made known, so that the blame, if blame there be, should rest upon the proper shoulders and due recautions taken, should such be possible against the recurrence of similar accidents.

But the breakdown of the "Isia" and its alleged navigation in spite of what had happened opens up wider issues. What is the exact nature of the arrangements made between

#### THE NEW CUNARDER.

The builders of the Mauretania, the newest liner of the Conard Steamship Company, just floated, supply some interesting particulars recarding this monster vessel.

Grey's Monument in Newcastle is 133ft, high. The captain's bridge on the liner from the keel is the same height, the funnels standing about half that height above the bridge. Twenty trains, each of twenty large trucks, would b required to carry the coal necessary for a voyage to New York and back, and the coal consumed on such a voyage would be sufficient to keep fires going in 3,000 workmen's houses for a year, About 250 firemen and trimmers will be necessary to deal with the coal.

If the funnels were placed one above another they would make a column 4 Oft. high, while it the boilers were placed one above another they would form a co'umn 547ft. high Two handred and fifty persons cou'd lunch in one of the fun nels, each person being seated comfortably at the table. Not coduting the pipes for steam and water connexions, there will be about 144 miles of brass and steel tubes fitted to boi'ers, condensers, etc. In the engine-room there will be nearly 600 tons of rotary machinery.

In the turbines there will be three-quarters of a million of blades, which, if placed end to end, would measure 110 miles. Two electric trains could pass each other side by side in the condenser exhaust branch. The average length of the steam and feed pipes in the machinery ooms will be about a mile and a quarter. Son of the larger castings weigh about 38 tons each. The weight of the ingots from which the large drums were forged was 120 tons cach. There will be 200 miles of electric cables in the hip. The electric generating station of the ship is larger than that which supplies Paisley, a town



#### THE REBELS OF THE YEMEN.

In that masterpiece of English literature "The Life of Mahomet" by Washington Irving, the man who may be aptly described in his own words as "For all he did he had a rea on, for all he said a word in season, and ever ready was to quote authorities for what he much may be learned of the early history of the present inhabitants of Arabia, Much information, as the author acknowledges was drawn from Gagnier's translation of the Arabian historian Abu'feda, preserved in the Jesuite' convent of St. Isidor at Madrid.

The population of the Peninsula claims sent from Joetar, a great grandson of Shem, immortal for all time as one of those who alred the refuge of the Ark.

The kingdom of Yemen was founded by Yareb, one of his sons. A brother Jorham founded the kingdom of the Hedj.z. It was into the latter family that Ishmael married. From the twelve sons of the marriage the present prolific race really took their origin. In addition to carrying on the tradition or being wildmen like their progenitor "his hand against every man, and every man's hand against him," they also retain to a certain extent some of the characteristics of their Jewish appeator not only in their features, but also in their ability to accumulate flocks and

Gradually there grew up a distinction between those who beld towns and castles"

of the former we are told that they occupied the fertile wadies or valleys, scattered here and there among the mountains, where these towns and castles were surrounded by vineyards and orchards, groves of palm trees, fields of grain, and well stocked pastures. They were settled in their habits, devoting themselves to

Others gave themselves up to commerce, having ports and cities along the Red Sea; Gulf of Persia, and carrying on foreign trade by means of ships and carayans.

Such especially were the people of Yemen, or Arabia the Ha; by, that land of spices, perfumes and frankincense; the Sabasa of the poets, the Sheba of the Sacred Scriptures. Eugaged as they were in the pursuits of peace, the inhabitants lost much of the original characteristics of the Arab, who, through the necessity of always having to defend his flooks and herds was familiar

with arm; almost from infaucy, Yemen, owing to its wealth and accessi-bility, became the happy hunting ground for the adventurous invader who always carried on war on the principle of "The spoils to

the conqueror."

Since those days the various tribes have never been united except that they embraced the faith as expounded by Mahomet. Without any real say in the government of their countries they have gradually seen the trade of the old days depart from their shores. The opening of the Suez Canal following after the discovery of the Cape route to India meant to them the loss of a great source of hvelihood in the passage of the numerous caravans through their territory.

ity which meant much to the people of the Yemen.

Since the opening out of other sources of obtaining coffee, more especially the develop-ment of the West Indian Trade, even the taste for Mocha ceffee has been lost. It is a well-known fact that people can acquire a taste and liking for an article really inferior to that which they may have at one time been accustomed. To day most people who were offered pure Mocha coffee would not thank you for it, but still there is some demand for the article although we fear the supply is precarious, and what is often drunk as pure Mochs has seldom been grown in Arabia. Of late years the hold of the most recent conquerors, the Turks, has gradually been relaxed in the Yemen. Powerful chiefs have been silently organizing until we have witnessed not only the commencement of a rebellion, but also what look almost like a successful attempt to throw off

The garrison drawn from the seventh army corps at Sanaa, the capital, a town of 75,000 inhabitants, held out against odds and under difficulties besides which the troubles and hard-hips of the defenders of Ladysmith sink into insignificance. Such was the stubborn resistence of the Tark that, long before the arrival of Faizi Pasha, hastily sent out with reinforcements ill-equipped and devoid of an organized transport as the term is known to modern adjutants general, cannibalism was rife. Indeed the first relief column to arrive considerably added to the distress, as before entering Sanaa much of their transport had been captured by the rebels. When the remnant garrison ultimately reached the coast and took ship at Hodeids, they presented a spectacle reminiscent of the rigours of the eges of ancient times; haggard, gaunt human skeletons, smitten with sourcy, their bodies

covered with sores, they could hardly crawl

brand the hip.
In spite of statements to the contrary, it is now known that over a hundred of these poor remnants of humanity died either at or before reaching Suez. In such a state of direful deso lation was the ship that she went into voluntary quarantine, and quite a small graveyard mark the place where her freight was camped.

Small wonder that other transports coming from Syria and other countries with troops uninterested in a war in which others were attempting to rid them of a tyranny which they themselves would gladly be free from, in some cases landed almost in a state of mutiny How great a soldier Faizi Pasha is can only b recogni ed when one remembers that alrhough his troops are second to none in courage, h has not been able either to pay, feed, or clothe

them with any regularity.

Acting in a difficult country often far from his base without being able to keep up lines of communication it is small wonder that he and his advisers have seen the inutility of 50,000 troo; s holding a country, under the present conditions, against three times their number of resolute men imbued with patriotism and zeal and mad with the fruits of victory. How ever, evidently taking a leaf out of Kitchener's book, Turkey has decided to build a line from Hodeida direct to Sanaa, a distance of 200

kilometres.

At first this line built for strategic purpose is eventually to be used to develope the internal resources of the country. The laying of a line from Adea to Athela, as ofter suggested, would also direct into British

channels of trade some of these resources.

The abourd stories that England had inter tions of backing up the rebels and assisting by allowing "gun-running" to establish an auton-omy in the Yemen and so open out an alternative route for her Mchamedan subject to reach Messa in the pilgrimage need only to be mentioned to be shown to be a concection of that section of the Continental native press ever ready to probe for al erior motives and designs.

A direct pronouncement on the part of England that she had no designs on the territory of the Hedjaz, in which rest the sacred cities, and that on the contrary that not only will she hold these stored places inviolate, but will see that others also respec them would go far to remove any distrust which may yet remain as to

CAPE TO CAIRO CINEMATOGRAPHED.

Eight years ago, almost to the day, a Cape fown contem; orary appoor ced with much blowing of trumpets the arrival in the Colony from London of a gentleman who was equipped with the latest style of cinematograph, with the intention of taking some photographs of the different parts of South Africa. "He inends," stated the paper from which we quote 'manipulating the machine from a tramcar, and thus be enabled to produce in England and elsewhere the scenery from Cape Town to Wynberg, and in the same manner some of the best views to be met with along the line from Cape T. wn to Johannesburg. He has arranged with the railway authorities to have a special salou car attached to an up country train, and in order not to miss any of the best scene, which will probably be passed through during the ight, will return along the same route.

History is cariously silent as to the sequel Whether the gentleman referred to succeeded in his enterprise deponent knoweth not, but certain it is that, if he did, his efforts out hardly be said to have set the Thames on fire Let us hope that Mr. Charles Urban - a name f miliar in men's mouths as household words where animated photography is concernedwill be more successful. Ever on the look-out for something new, he has hit upon the happy idea of "doing" the Dark Coutinent from Cape Town to Cairo by means of the "Urbanora," and is now busily perfecting a scheme for sending out four expeditions to various parts of Africa, commencing simultaneously at Cape Town and at Cairo. It is a spendid notion, and one which, we feel sure, would have commended itself to the great heart of the late Mr. Rhodes, who doubtless would have been the first to perceive in it a most effective means of advertising Africa and its vast resources, with a view to stimulating an early and large influx of population from the United Kingdom.

"The object of the undertaking," said Mr. Urban, in the course of conversation with a representative of the "African World," "is to secure a most comprehensive series of life notion pictures of the resources and indus tries already in operation in the territories en route, also general views of the character of the country. Special attention will b directed to accurately and advantageously depict, in detail, the agricultural, mining tock-raising, rail-roading, and other transport facilities and their development in British South Africa, Uganda, Congo States, and the hods, also throughout Egypt to Cairo. A living reproduction of these scenes would be of exceeding interest to investors, intending migrants, tourists, sportsmen, and others and of immense benefit to all Governments, companies, railways, hotels, and individuals concerned in the commercial expansion of Africa.

"No other means devised can so forcibly or convincingly put Africa, or the possibilities of its developments, before the investing pu-blic of all countries as Urbanora. This we have demonstrated by our undertakings on similar lines in depicting Canada, South America, Borneo, Australia, Switzerland, etc., with which pictures the public has been femiltarised during the past three years, much to the benefit of those countries. The leaders of this expeditionare picked men of experience, discretion, and resource, expert photographers and ournalists, and are equal to the work of such a arge undertaking. Upon the termination of the expedition the results will be exhibited by Urbatora' at the Alhambra Theatre, London, as well as publicly shown in some eight hundred to a thousand theatres and places of entertainment throughout England, Continent-al Europe and America, besides other countries. An explanatory lecture tour by the eaders of the expedition upon their return will likewise be undertaken throughout Great Britain. In this way it is expected to keep the different sections of the African series exhibited consecutively before the public during the course of one year and after.

"Arrangements," went on Mr. Urban, "have been made with leading journals for descriptive illustrated articles, contributed by the leaders of the party, to appear during the progress of the exhibition and lecture tour. In order to facilitate the vast undertaking, we have decided to start four separate expeditions into different other. This will enable as to reach the various

sections of Africa, within a few months of each other. This will enable as to reach the various countries during the most favourable climatic conditions (which is highly essential to our purposes), instead of one expedition undertaking the entire work from the Cape to Cairo."

Naturally, an undertaking of the kindwould-involve the expenditure of a very large sum of money, and we were scarcely surprised to hear that the Charles Urban Trading Company, Limited, invite the financial cooperation of the principal South African companies for the southern section of the work, and we make no doubt that when once the scheme is thoroughly understood by those chiefly concerned the necessary assistance will speedily be forthcoming. Already a good start, has been made. Questioned on the sobject by our representative, Mr. Charles Urban replied: "We are willing to contribute one half of the expenses incurred on the trip, provided the other half of the cost is subs ribed by the various companies and firms who would be benefited by the carrying out of our project.
