LONDON, January 30. M. Shakhoff, a member of the National Assembly and of the Relief Association, has arrived in England after a visit to the famine-stricken districts in South Eastern Russia.

St. Petersburg, January 30. The governor of the prison to which political prisoners are committed here was shot dead in the main street of the city this morning. He was a marked man owing to his alleged maltreatment of political prisoners. His assailant escaped.

St. Petersburg, January 30. The Duma election returns officially issued here indicate that the Conservatives and Moderates have secured a sweeping majority. LONDON, January 30.

Victoria College. Sir, With your kind permission I should like to refer a few remarks on "Engineer's" letter in your issue of the 28th inst. If that gentleman could make it convenient to visit the works in progress, I feel sure he would be greatly interested, and I venture to think, not unwilling to add another ought to the figures he suggests as representing the quantity of imported material actually in position on the ground awaiting placement. The buildings comprising the college consist of three distinct blocks of truly noble proportions, besides several smaller buildings not yet completed, which I understand are intended for the accommodation of the teaching staff. For the convocation hall, as I suppose I may designate it, is almost a mile long, with a width of 50 feet, and the ground-work which supports the floor above are very massive, and consequently of considerable weight each.

The questions of quantity or weight, however, is to my mind of only secondary importance, and the less the quantity actually is, the more I think it is to be regretted that material of British origin was not stipulated for, considering the fact that the ground-work is a patriotic building which called it into existence.
